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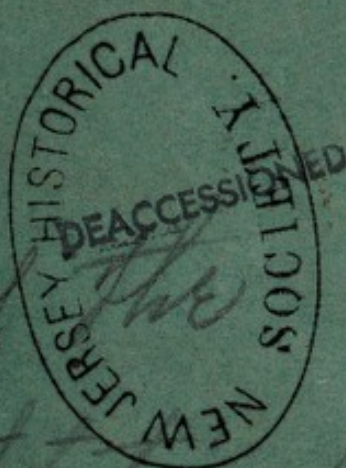

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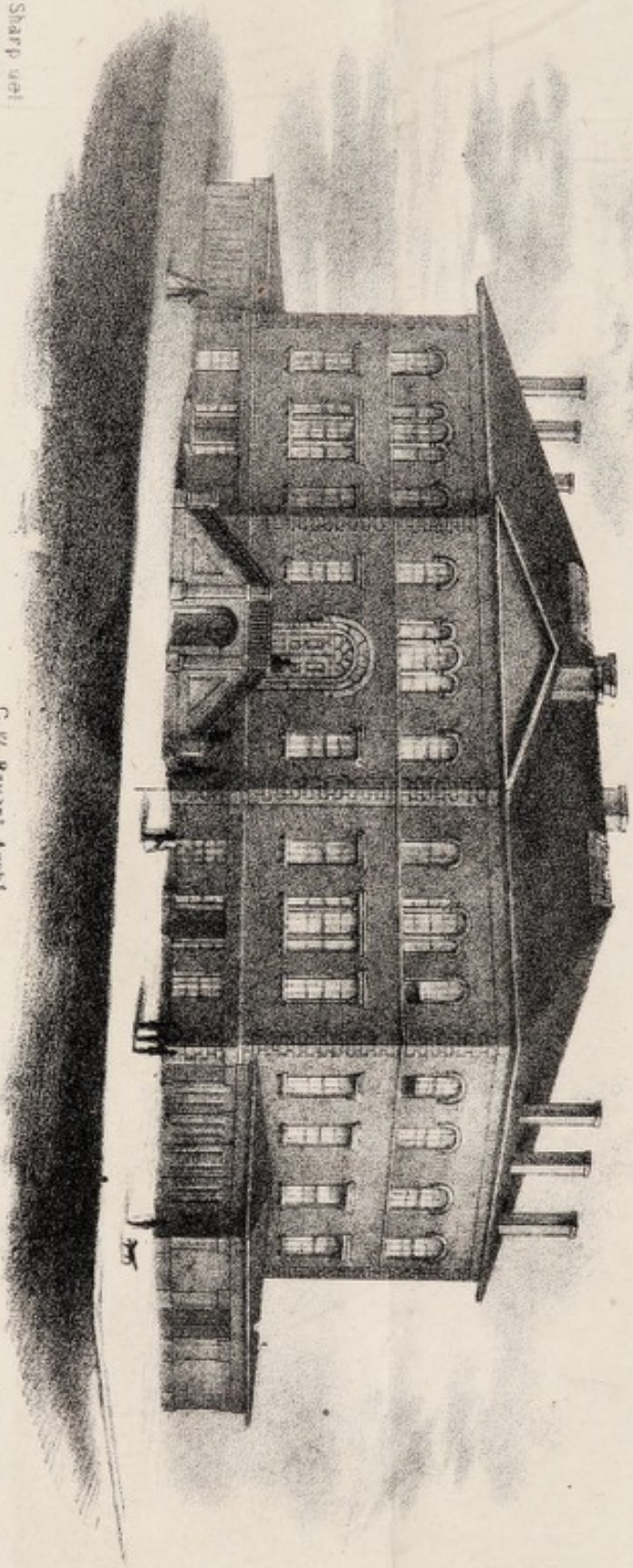


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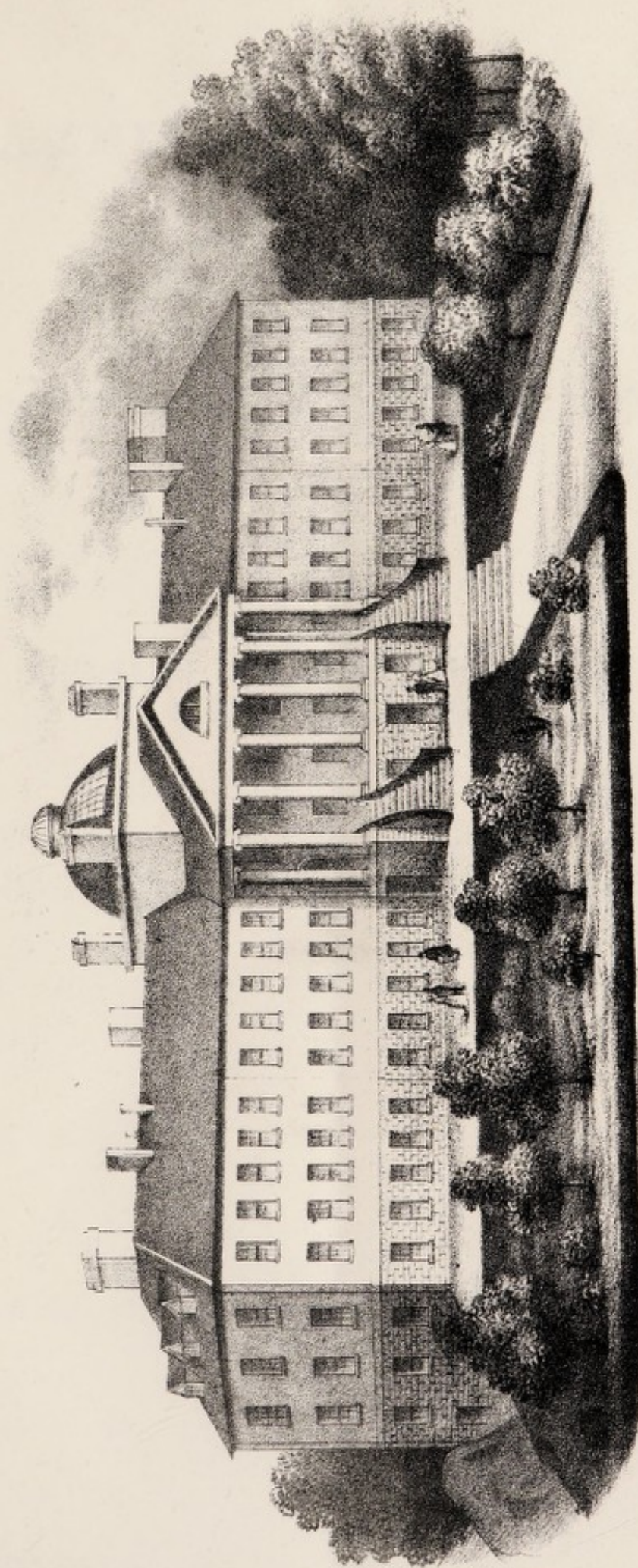

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## MASSACHUSETTS MEDICAL COLLEGE.

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THE MEDICAL SCHOOL of Boston is about to re-commence its annual course of instruction, under advantages greatly exceeding those which it has been able to offer in any former period of its history.

A new and elegant Medical College, of ample dimensions, is now in the process of erection, and will be completed in season for the coming course of Lectures. It is situated in Grove street, on the land, liberally given by Dr. GEORGE PARKMAN, near the Hospital, in a quarter of the city highly convenient for the lodging of students. It is 134 feet long by 60 broad, and contains spacious lecture rooms, an ample anatomical theatre, a library, laboratory, dissecting rooms, and all other appurtenances required in a building of this sort. Its museum and collections for illustrating the different courses, are most ample, and in some respects unequalled in this country.

The Massachusetts General Hospital has been enlarged by the addition of two spacious wings and outbuildings, which render it capable of containing more than double its former number of patients. And the increase of its permanent funds, from the numerous and large donations of the last few years, will enable the Trustees to meet the expense attending their support. This noble institution is accessible to students throughout the year. Clinical lectures given three times a week during the session of the Medical School. A great part of the surgical operations which occur among the laboring classes of the city, are performed here, besides a large number, the subjects of which resort here from a distance.



The Lectures will begin at the new Medical College on the first Wednesday in November, and continue four months, as follows :

The students attend any or all the courses, as they see fit. The collective fee for all the courses is \$75. The fee for matriculation is \$3, payable only by those who attend for the first time in this Institution. The graduation fee is \$20. The ticket for the dissecting room is \$5. Admittance to the Hospital and the use of the Library are gratuitous.

Board is as low as in any of the Atlantic cities.

Practical Anatomy is now amply provided for by law of this Commonwealth and the regulations of the City government.

The vast increase which has lately taken place in the population of Boston, the numerous avenues and extensive commercial relations, by which it is now connected with all parts of the country, its extensive and unrivalled public charities, its Hospital, its Eye and Ear Infirmary, its House of Industry, the Marine Hospital at Chelsea, the scientific collections of Mineralogy and Pathological and Comparative Anatomy, as well as the proximity of Harvard University, of which the Boston Medical School is a department—are circumstances which point to this city as a most convenient and profitable residence for the medical student, while the thorough and complete course of instruction given at the College and Hospital it is believed have distinguished the graduates of this University among those of the United States.

## HISTORY OF THE MEDICAL INSTITUTION OF HARVARD UNIVERSITY.

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BEFORE the Revolution no medical school existed in Boston, nor in the State of Massachusetts. No examinations and no licenses to practice were established, nor any other means by which the public could be assured of the qualifications of a medical practitioner. There were no dissections, and even examinations of the bodies of deceased persons were rarely permitted. The means of instruction were limited to the information that could be obtained from the private practice of the physician, and to reading the very few books which he might have in his library. Now and then a favored individual went home to England, as it was said, to walk the hospitals in London, and to attend lectures at the great institution at Edinboro'. Some time before the Revolution, in 1765, a medical school was established in Philadelphia, and afterwards, in 1768, one in New York; but the modes of travelling were so imperfect, that these cities were considered almost inaccessible from this part of the country.

The Revolutionary War supplied abundant opportunities of cultivating practical medicine and surgery, and the murmurs of prejudice against anatomy were not heeded amidst the bustle of the camp and the cries of the wounded. Under such circumstances were formed many good physicians and surgeons, among whom was Dr. John Warren, of Boston.

This gentleman was a surgeon in the army from the battle of Bunker Hill to the end of the campaign in the Jerseys. Being then compelled by illness to quit the army, he settled in Boston, was there appointed Military Hospital Surgeon, and improved the opportunity this situation afforded for cultivating the study of anatomy to an extent till then unknown in this place. In 1781 he began a course of lectures on Anatomy, which was attended by physicians in practice, and by a few medical students. These lectures attracted so much attention, that the Government of Harvard



University invited Dr. Warren to lecture at Cambridge, and give his aid in the formation of a medical school.

This school was established, and went into operation in 1783. Dr. Warren was Professor of Anatomy and Surgery, Dr. Aaron Dexter of Chemistry and Materia Medica, and Dr. Benjamin Waterhouse of the Theory and Practice of Medicine. The lectures of these gentlemen were attended by medical students from different parts of New England, usually in number about twenty, and also by those members of the Senior Class of the University who obtained the consent of their parents. The opportunities for dissection were generally limited to one subject in the course, and the efforts required to carry this subject through the course, at the time when Boston did not communicate with Cambridge by any bridge, were very great. The lectures were generally from two to three hours long, but were attended steadily, and listened to closely. The degree of Bachelor in Medicine was first conferred in 1785, and, according to the system then followed, after the lapse of seven years that of Doctor of Medicine.

Medical instruction continued in this condition until the year 1809. At this time a public dissecting room was opened at No. 49 Marlboro' street by Dr. John C. Warren, son of the Professor of Anatomy, who had been appointed Adjunct Professor three years before, viz. in 1806. The demonstrations and dissections given at that period were attended by most of the younger physicians of the town, and by some medical students. In 1809 Dr. John Gorham was chosen Adjunct Professor of Chemistry.

As Cambridge did not afford any opportunities for seeing medical and surgical practice, the number of students there did not materially increase, and it was proposed, and finally arranged, that the medical institution should be transferred to Boston. This arrangement was effected on the condition that certain Professors should give lectures to one or more classes at Cambridge. A course on Human and Comparative Anatomy has accordingly been given annually in the spring by the Professor of Anatomy, and a course of Hygiene by the Professor of Medicine.

Lecture rooms were arranged at the place before mentioned, and the lectures were opened by the Professors, whose names have been given, in the fall of 1810. In the same year Dr. James Jackson was appointed Lecturer on Clinical Medicine, having for a hospital the Infirmary of the Boston Alms House. This infirmary was attended by the younger professors of the school gratuitously for three or four years, in order to afford the students the advantage of seeing medical and surgical practice. The



course of lectures, which originally occupied only six weeks, was extended to three months. At this time was laid the foundation for a collection of anatomical preparations. Another collection at Cambridge, and now used in the lectures annually delivered in the University before the graduates and members of the senior class, was formed by Ward Nicholas Boylston. Through the agency of this gentleman it was obtained from Sir John Nichols, the heir of the eminent anatomist, Dr. Frank Nichols, of London. To this have been added donations from E. Haskett Derby, Esq., of Salem, from the present Professor, and Thomas W. Ward, Esq., Treasurer. The latter purchased and gave all the casts and skulls which the late Dr. Spurzheim brought to this country.

In the year 1812 Dr. James Jackson was appointed Professor of the Theory and Practice of Medicine.

In 1813 Drs. James Jackson and John C. Warren made efforts to obtain a grant from the Commonwealth for the erection of a suitable Medical College. They succeeded in this object, with the aid of President Kirkland and the Hon. John Lowell, officers of the University, and procured in connection with it a very large grant for the University at Cambridge.

In 1816, a handsome building having been erected in Mason street, the lectures were begun in that place by Dr. James Jackson, Professor of Theory and Practice of Medicine; Dr. John C. Warren, Professor of Anatomy and Surgery; Dr. John Gorham, Professor of Chemistry; Dr. Jacob Bigelow, Professor of Materia Medica; and Dr. Walter Channing, Professor of Midwifery; the two latter gentlemen having been appointed Professors in 1815. Connected with the Institution was a Library of about 500 volumes, mostly contributed by the Professors, and which was subsequently augmented by the removal of appropriate works from Cambridge, belonging to the donation of Ward N. Boylston, Esq. There was also formed in 1810 a Society for Mutual Improvement, under the name of the Boylston Medical Society of Harvard University, and which has been continued to the present time.

In 1810 an effort was commenced by Drs. John Warren, James Jackson and John C. Warren, to raise funds for a Hospital, as an auxiliary to the Medical School. A large number of individuals became interested in the object, and considerable efforts were made at this time. In 1811 the State, on being applied to, gave its aid by an Act of Incorporation, and a grant of the Province House, the ancient seat of the Governors of the Commonwealth. But the war, which followed, caused a suspension of



this movement until 1816. It was then renewed, and, through the personal exertions of the Trustees of that period, and in an especial manner of the Hon. John Lowell and Col. Joseph May, a subscription, exceeding in amount any that, even to this day, has been known in New England, was obtained. Two distinct Institutions, though under the charge of one Corporation, were the speedy result of this noble contribution to the cause of humanity ; the Hospital in Allen street, and the McLean Asylum for the Insane in Somerville.

In 1818 the Insane Asylum was opened, under the charge of Dr. Rufus Wyman, Superintendent and Physician, a situation at present occupied by Dr. Luther V. Bell. The first patient entered the Massachusetts General Hospital, in Allen street, in September, 1821 ; of this Institution, Dr. Jackson was appointed Physician, and Dr. John C. Warren Surgeon. To the medical department have been subsequently added Drs. Bigelow, Channing, Ware, Hale, and J. B. S. Jackson ; and to the surgical department, Drs. Hayward and Townsend.

Regulations were made for the admission of students to the Hospital, at first for a moderate fee, and afterwards gratuitously. To enable them to derive all possible advantage, arrangements have been agreed upon, by which during the lectures a public visit takes place twice a week with one of the Medical Professors, Dr. Bigelow, who concludes his visit by a Clinical Lecture. On Saturdays surgical operations are performed, when necessary, by all the Surgeons, and there is afterwards a visit by one of them, Dr. Hayward, who subsequently gives Clinical Lectures on the cases which have been visited. During the remaining eight months of the year, the Surgical Department of the Hospital is attended by Drs. Warren and Townsend, and a public visit for the benefit of Students is made gratuitously twice a week. At these visits surgical operations are occasionally performed, but important operations are generally practised on Saturday, as during the winter course of lectures.

The Hospital has been one of the most useful and popular Institutions of the country. In cleanliness and comfort, and in the perfection of all those details which are necessary for the sick and wounded, it is not excelled by any similar establishment in this country, or in England. These advantages it has derived partly from the munificence of its endowments,\*

and partly from having always had the benefit of the time and labor of trustees and other persons, distinguished by their talents and education, not less than by their benevolence. The increasing number of applications for admission has led the Trustees to make an appeal to the public in favor of an enlargement of the edifice. This appeal has resulted in additions, which will afford room for at least 160 persons, more than double the present number of patients.\*

In the Medical School in 1826, Dr. John W. Webster was chosen Adjunct Professor of Chemistry, and in the following year he was made Professor, to supply the loss of Dr. Gorham. In 1832, Dr. John Ware was appointed Adjunct Professor of Theory and Practice of Medicine. In 1835, an additional department was created of the Institutes and of Clinical Surgery, and Dr. George Hayward chosen the Professor. In 1836, Dr. Jackson resigned his professorship, and was created *Emeritus* Professor, and Dr. John Ware was appointed the Professor of Theory and Practice.

Subjects for dissection had been freely obtained from the period of the removal of the Medical School to Boston, but the practice not being recognized by the laws of the State, was attended with great inconvenience. In the year 1830, this matter was brought forward at a meeting of the Counsellors of the Massachusetts Medical Society, and a Committee was appointed to memorialize the Legislature on the necessity of the establishment of practical anatomy as a branch of public instruction. A law was therefore passed by the Legislature of the same year to legalize the study of anatomy, by which the bodies of unclaimed State-paupers were allotted. The subjects thus afforded not being sufficient, the Legislature amended their law in 1833, so as to include unclaimed town-paupers. The operation of the amended law was very satisfactory for several years, but at length difficulties were opposed to its execution, and the number of subjects afforded was in consequence reduced. This state of things having been represented to the Legislature, in the session of 1844-45, they again amended the law in such a way, as was judged by them adequate to remove all the difficulties.

The increase in the number of Students has been pretty regular from the time when the Institution was first established in Boston. The number, which was then about thirty, has now increased to an hundred and sixty, and the lecture rooms being inadequate to contain them conveniently, it has been decided to erect, this year, a new and costly edifice in the western part of the city, near the Hospital. The expense of this building has been provided for, partly by the sale of the old College and land, partly by a liberal donation of an ample lot for the reception of the new College by George Parkman, M. D., of Boston, and partly by voluntary contributions of other wealthy citizens of our metropolis, whose aid is rarely sought in vain for the promotion of necessary scientific or charitable objects. Notwithstanding the difficulties which have opposed the cultivation of practical anatomy by students of the medical school, subjects have always been found in sufficient numbers, and at as low a rate as at any Institution in the country. Since the passage of the present law, no difficulty or want has occurred.

The Anatomical Museum has so much increased, that the room, arranged eight years since for its reception, is no longer adequate to receive and display all the preparations, and is not in a condition to accomplish the desirable object of regularly admitting the medical students and others. The collection was made by the labors, and at the expense of the Professor of Anatomy and Surgery. Other collections of preparations and of chemical apparatus have also been made by the other professors, and are used by them for the illustration of their lectures.

The character of the students in this medical school has always been highly respectable. A large number of them have had the advantage of a previous liberal education. From these circumstances it has arisen, that no medical institution in the country, as far as we know, has supplied a greater number of professors to schools created in various parts of the United States.

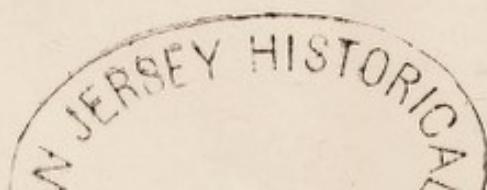

## STATUTES RELATING TO THE DEGREE OF DOCTOR OF MEDICINE.

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I. — The Faculty of Medicine of this University shall consist of the President, and of the Professors and Lecturers authorized to give instruction to the medical students. This Faculty shall always have a Dean elected by themselves, for such periods as they may think proper, and may also adopt rules for their own government, provided that the same do not, in any respect, contravene the laws of the University.

II. — Students of medicine, designing to attend the Medical Lectures, or any of them, shall be matriculated in this University, by entering their names with the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, to be enrolled by him; and by signing an obligation to submit to the laws of the University, and to the direction of the Faculty of Medicine, and by paying three dollars.

III. — There shall be holden by the Faculty two meetings annually for the purpose of examining candidates for the degree of Doctor of Medicine. They shall be holden in the Massachusetts Medical College, unless otherwise specially ordered. They may be continued by adjournment, by a vote of the members present; and if only one member attend at the time and place designated, he may adjourn the meeting from day to day till three members of the Faculty may attend the meeting. Three members of the Faculty must be present on every examination.

IV. — The first meeting for examination in every year shall be holden on the day next succeeding that on which the winter courses of Medical Lectures shall terminate, at ten o'clock, A. M. The second meeting for examination shall be holden on the Monday next but one preceding the day of the annual Commencement in the University, which takes place on the fourth Wednesday in August, the examination beginning at ten o'clock, A. M. In extraordinary cases, the Faculty may hold meetings for examination at other periods.

V. — Every candidate for the degree of Doctor of Medicine must comply with the following conditions before being admitted to examination, viz.

1. He shall satisfy the Faculty that he has arrived at the age of twenty-one.
2. He shall have attended two courses of the Lectures delivered at the Massachusetts Medical College by each of the Professors. Except that if he have attended a course of similar Lectures in any other College or University, the same may take the place of one of the above courses.\*
3. He shall have employed three years in his professional studies, under the direction of a regular practitioner of medicine, and shall have a good moral character.
4. If he has not received a University education, he shall satisfy the Faculty of Medicine in respect to his knowledge of the Latin language and experimental philosophy.†

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\* A third course may be attended without fee, provided that no two courses of Lectures shall be admitted to qualify students for gratuitous admission to Lectures and graduation in this school, which have not been attended in separate years, or at least six months from each other, and in schools in which the number of teachers is not less than six, and in which the time occupied by lectures is not less than four months.

† Certificates of competent persons are deemed satisfactory, without a personal examination.



5. He shall, four weeks previous to the day on which he presents himself for examination, have given notice of his intention to the Dean of the Faculty, and at the same time shall have delivered or transmitted to the Dean a dissertation, written by himself, on some subject connected with medicine, and shall at the same time present his certificates from the physicians, under whose care he has studied ; also his tickets to the several courses of the Medical Lectures. He shall at the same time deposit with the Dean the graduating fee.\*

VI. — Every dissertation shall be submitted by the Dean to the examination of the Faculty in the mode which they shall point out.

VII. — At the meetings for examinations, the Faculty shall examine all those candidates who shall present themselves, after having complied with the conditions enumerated in the fifth of these statutes, upon the following branches of medical science, viz. Anatomy, Physiology, Chemistry, Materia Medica, Pharmacy, Midwifery, Surgery, and the Theory and Practice of Medicine, and upon their several Dissertations. At these meetings every candidate shall be examined separately, and the decision of the Faculty in respect to each shall be made and declared to him immediately after the examination has closed. The decision in respect to each candidate shall be determined by the votes of the major part of the members of the Faculty present at the examination of the same ; and this decision, if favorable to the candidate, shall be recorded by the Dean.

VIII. — At the close of each examination, the Faculty shall decide in respect to each candidate, whether he shall be recommended as worthy of the degree for which he has applied. The decision of the Faculty, in respect to all those candidates whom they do so recommend, shall be recorded by the Dean, and shall by him be certified to the President, to be laid before the Senatus Academicus.

IX. — Those candidates, who have received from the Senatus Academicus the final approbation and Degree, will, after the Spring graduation, receive their Diplomas from the Dean ; and those who may be approved at the Summer Examination will receive their Degrees and Diplomas in Cambridge on Commencement day.

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The Lectures for Medical Students, on the various branches mentioned in the Statutes, are delivered at the Massachusetts Medical College in Boston. They commence annually on the first Wednesday in November, and continue four months.

Students attending the Lectures of the Professor of Anatomy and Surgery are admitted to see the Surgical Practice in the Massachusetts General Hospital ; and those, attending the Lectures of the Professor of the Theory and Practice of Medicine, are admitted to see the Medical Practice in the same.

The Hollis Professor of Natural Philosophy will admit Medical Students to attend the Lectures on Physics and Astronomy. The Lectures are delivered in the Philosophy Chamber in University Hall, at such times as the Professor may give notice from term to term. A Medical Student, applying for admission to these Lectures, must produce, to the professor above mentioned, a certificate of his matriculation from the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, and another certificate from the Steward of the University, that he has paid him seven dollars for the Treasurer. Other persons may be admitted to the same Lectures, with the approbation of the President, and producing a certificate from the Steward that they have paid ten dollars.

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\* The Fee for the Degree of Doctor of Medicine is twenty dollars.
