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

The Mode of applying them for the removal of a Disease on the Human Body and Horses, is explained, to the Comprehension of the smallest Capacity, in a Paper of Directions, which accompanies the TRACTORS.

THE present representation of PERKINS'S PATENT METALLIC TRACTORS, is given through this medium with a view to satisfy the daily applications made to the Patentee by his numerous Correspondents, respecting their form, bulk, the proper mode of conveying them, &c. &c. The Observer will here be enabled to form a ready idea of their very portable nature; and, considering their durability and very extensive efficacy in the removal of Diseases, now so universally admitted, "how necessary are they (in the language of the Rev. Dr. Trotter) "as a Remedy in every Family, "and especially as a *vade mecum* for Clergymen, whose professional "avocations lead them so frequently among the afflicted."

An additional motive for the above representation of the GENUINE TRACTORS, are the impositions which are not unfrequently practised by the substitution of counterfeits. These, though not attempted openly, have, in several instances, been privately put in circulation, by persons interested in depreciating the Credit of the GENUINE TRACTORS, and consequently occasioning their disuse. As no benefit would be derived from such spurious Imitations, the unsuspecting patient, it has been supposed, would be satisfied of the inefficacy of the Metallic Practice. Such artifices, while they infringe on the right of the Patentee, at the same time defraud the Public; and he must therefore not be thought unreasonably severe in determining to employ the means the Law affords, for the prevention of such abuses in future. As innocent artificers and tradesmen, from not knowing the nature of his Patent, which secures every possible external application of the Metallic Influence in the removal of Diseases, may be led into a violation of the law, by making something of a different shape, &c. it is right to inform them that they are equally liable to damages with their employers.

To guard against Impositions, applicants will please to observe, that every genuine Set of Tractors is stamped with the words, PERKINS PATENT TRACTORS; and, which will be the most sure means of detecting frauds, to the printed Directions for their use, which accompany them, is subjoined a Receipt, signed, "BENJAMIN DOUGLAS PERKINS," in the hand-writing of the Patentee. To counterfeit this is Felony.

THE TRACTORS

Have been found a safe, speedy and effectual Remedy in the following Disorders. *Acute and Chronic Rheumatism, including Lumbago and Sciatica, Gout, Sprains, Contusions, Burns, Scalds, Inflammations of the Eyes; also of the Skin, as Erysipelas and Tetters; Painful Inflammatory Tumours, as Biles and Whitlows; Violent Spasmodic Convulsions; as Epileptic Fits, Cramp and Locked Jaw; Pleurisy; Stings and Bites of Venomous Insects, Fluor Albus; Pains in the Head, Face, Teeth, Ears, Breast, Side, Back, Limbs, and all analogous Diseases of Horses.*

In proof of the Efficacy of the Tractors in these Complaints, there have been published, by the Patentee, during the last three years, four different works, in which have been presented nearly Three Thousand Cures, communicated by Characters of the highest respectability. The present limits do not conveniently admit of the titles of only the two last of these, which are given, *gratis*, to the purchasers of the Tractors: one was published in January, 1800, and entitled as follows:

The other work above alluded to, published in April, 1801, has the following Title:

"Cases of Successful Practice with Perkins's Patent Metallic Tractors, communicated since January, 1800, the Date of the former Publication. Sold, price 1s. as above."

As these two books are entirely distinct with respect to their contents, (the Patentee never publishing one case twice) Enquirers are respectfully referred to them for a full account of the merits and pretensions of the Patent Metallic Tractors. In both of them are exposed to public view the curious artifices of a medical cabal at Bath, which aimed to propagate an opinion that the Tractors cured Diseases by operating on the Imagination of the Patient! It will be readily conceived how effectually that ridiculous attempt was exploded, (though a favourable report on it has been admitted into a *venal* Monthly Journal) when it is known that the Patentee, in reply, immediately adduced several hundred cures of the most unequivocal kind, by the Tractors, on Infants and Horses, and other Subjects, where, from the nature of the Cases, Imagination must have been equally dead and inactive. Among the Vouchers to these facts, in those two Publications alone, are eight Professors in four Universities, as follows:—Three of Natural Philosophy; Four of Medicine; One of Natural History. Also Nineteen regular Physicians; Seventeen Surgeons; Twenty Clergymen, ten of whom are Doctors in Divinity, &c. &c.

Having received since the publication of his Book in April, 1801, about Seven Hundred Cases from different Parts of Great Britain, the Patentee will present abstracts of one or two in this place. The perusal of the first upon a Horse, like very many others, which have been published, of the same character, will shew how ridiculous must persons appear who endeavour to persuade the Public that the Tractors cure Diseases by an operation on the Imagination.

W. HUNT PRINN, ESQ.

of Sandford, near Cheltenham, in a Letter of January 1st, 1802, favored the PATENTEE with the following Cases;

"CASE I.—*Violent Sprain and Lameness of a Horse.*—During the last frost, a young Horse of mine that was at grass in a field adjoining my house, in leaping a hedge to follow some other Horses, sprained himself violently in the near fore Leg. I immediately used those applications which I had before tried in similar Cases, such as Goulard, Opodeldoc, bandages, &c. however the Leg still continued as bad as at first. The Fetlock was exceedingly tender and inflamed; nor could he bear the slightest pressure of the hand upon it. Between the back sinews and the bone, there was also a considerable fulness; the Hoof itself was highly inflamed, and he could scarcely turn himself in the stall. Whilst he was precisely in this situation, I was prevailed upon to try the Tractors which were applied for the first time on Friday, the 18th of last Month, when we totally discontinued the bandages and every other application. They were used twice a day beginning above the inflamed part, and drawing them down to the Hoof, for half an hour each time. MATTHEW YATMAN, ESQ.

of Chelsea, London, a Gentleman regularly educated in the Medical Profession, now retired from Practice, December 1st, 1801, addressed to B. D. PERKINS, two interesting Cures; one of a Scald, which we have not room to insert, and the other as follows:

"CASE I.—*Wound from a Sickle.*—A young man struck the point of a sickle into his leg, which swelled much, and, for several hours, filled him with excruciating pain. I applied the Tractors forty minutes: he said he felt the pain decrease every stroke, till it became quite easy, and the swelling was nearly gone. "CASE I.—*Severe Inflammation in an Eye.*—A person had for three years been much afflicted with a rheum about one of her eyes. For ten days before she applied to me, the eye had been so covered with a web, that she could not see at all. Her Physician, who had used a wash, without any benefit, feared the sight was irrecoverably lost: she could neither sleep nor rest from the violence of the pain and inflammation.
