# Annual Report 1940

Acting on the instructions contained in Circulars 2134 and 2067 in which it states that reports should be confined to essential and urgent matters which have affected the public health during the year, especially any matters arising from or connected with the War, outbreaks of infectious disease and measures for maternity and child welfare, together with any exceptional administrative measures taken or recommended by the Medical Officer of Health, I beg to make the following observations.

The population as given by the Registrar General is 19,350. The factor for correction is 0.81 which gives a corrected Death Rate of 9.04.

#### EVACUATION

At the end of the year there were approximately 1,300 mothers and children in the District who had been evacuated from vulnerable areas. In addition there were 287 other evacuated persons in the District (blind persons, old age pensioners etc.) During the year 81 evacuee children received treatment at the Sick Bay, Storrington.

### WATER

Regular routine samples of water from the public supplies at Storrington, Nutbourne, Washington, and Steyning and from the private supplies at North Stoke, Beeding and Wiston, were taken during the year and proved generally satisfactory.

### SANITARY INSPECTION

I have had complete reports from the Sanitary Inspectors, Mr. Brockway and Mr. Burrows as in former years, but as these are not required I do not think it is necessary to amplify any further beyond stating that Mr. Brockway made 3154 inspections as compared with 5495 in 1939, and that Mr Burrows made 255 inspections in connection with buildings as compared with 852 in 1939.

# RECORDS

All records including statistics supplied by the Registrar General are being carefully preserved in order that after the termination of the War a report can be made-dealing more fully with the period from the beginning of 1939 to the end of the last complete year, so that annual reports may as far as practicable be continuous and complete.
