FIRST ANNUAL REPORT.

THE COMMITTEE have much pleasure in presenting to the subscribers their first Annual Report. It will be remembered that the Institution was opened by the Earl of Derby on March 8th, 1900, the first patients being received on March 17th. Our further experience of the site chosen at Meathop for carrying out the open air treatment, confirms the favourable opinion expressed in our original circular, and the results so far obtained are not only most encouraging, but amply justify us in asking for a continuance of support.

It was explained in the appeal made a year ago, that the Institution was for the poorer classes of Westmorland, and only for those in the early stage of disease. Notwithstanding this, letters have been received from all parts of the country applying for admission of cases, both paying and otherwise, plainly showing the eagerness with which this system of treatment is now sought after, and how inadequate is the provision for dealing with such cases. As regards the stage of disease, it cannot be too strongly urged that the Institution is for the *EARLIER STAGES ONLY*; the admission of advanced cases can only lead to disappointment, and bring discredit upon the system. Our experience (as yet, of course, limited) distinctly proves this point, as will be seen by reference to the Medical Officer's Report. Almost the only cases which have not received substantial benefit during their stay, have been those somewhat too advanced on admission. When a Sanatorium of this kind is opened in any County, it is only natural, during the early months of trial, that the well known (generally advanced) cases should be those first applying for admission, and there is some difficulty in refusing these, especially if a district, owning a free bed, can produce no other than an advanced case. As experience is gained, however, and everyone becomes alive to the importance of treating consumption in the early stage, when almost certain success may be expected, this difficulty will diminish. Had we confined our attention solely to such early cases, our results would have appeared even more favourable than they are, as may be seen by reference to class C. in the Medical Report, although the great improvement in many patients of Classes A. and B. is very satisfactory.

Soon after the Institution was opened, it became absolutely necessary to increase the accommodation, as more beds were subscribed for than we could place in the wards. Three wooden sleeping shelters were therefore erected, and during the greater part of the past half-year 18 patients have been in residence. It may be of interest to mention that the patients who sleep in the outside shelters, far from disliking their quarters, in most cases prefer them to the wards.

It is satisfactory to note that our Sanatorium is being quoted in various places as an object lesson: (1) as being the first

Institution in England, of any size, to deal with the poorer classes of consumptives free of charge ; (2) with regard to the system of dividing the County into districts, each of which possesses its "free bed," at a cost of £50 per annum ; (3) as being cordially supported by the chief public bodies (County Council, Guardians, District Councils).

The Medical Officer's Report speaks for itself, but we may further point out that, apart from curing patients, there is a great educative influence at work in a Sanatorium. The patient is taught to appreciate the value of fresh air, and, on discharge, can hardly fail to carry out, as far as circumstances will allow, the lines of treatment that have proved so beneficial ; and this leads us to emphasize the importance of placing discharged patients, if possible, to some kind of work that will not be prejudicial to their health ; often a return to the old occupation would be suicidal, and we therefore earnestly beg the local committees in each district to consider this point carefully, and endeavour to find work for their discharged patients that will tend to render permanent their cure, rather than bring on a relapse.

It has been most gratifying to find how happy the patients are in the Sanatorium. A number of letters have been received from discharged patients, speaking in cordial terms of the kindness and attention bestowed on them during their stay ; and here we may mention how fortunate we have been in our staff, the members of which have worked with a zeal, which has contributed in no small degree to our successful results.

Referring to the Financial Statement, it will be seen that there is an adverse balance of £64 12s. 5d. on the Maintenance Account, which, however, would have been less by £50, had not that sum been transferred to a Building and Improvement Fund, in order to assist us in carrying out certain Extensions and Improvements to be presently mentioned. On the other hand, it must be remembered that in this statement we are not dealing with a complete year of full working expenditure ; were this so, our deficit would be considerably larger. During January and February only 3 of the staff were in residence, no patients being admitted until the middle of March. The items of general expenditure have proved to be heavier than anticipated. The total for provisions is necessarily somewhat large, a liberal dietary being part of the treatment. The small amount spent on stimulants will be gratifying to many. It has been found that the actual expenditure, when 18 patients are under treatment (with a staff of 8), is about £120 per month, or £1,450 per annum :—Our present income from subscriptions is £1,183, and we may reckon on £60 or £70 per annum from small payments of patients, and from the occasional extra cases paid for by the public bodies or other districts at £1 per week, making a total income of £1,250. In short, assuming our income to remain as at present, the deficit at the close of the current year could scarcely be less than £200—exclusive of the present adverse balance. The position will be more clearly appreciated by the following considerations. The average cost per week for each patient is 30s., or £78 per annum, whereas our free beds are offered at £50 per annum. We have thus to depend upon the liberality of the general subscribers (those not identified with any district bed) to make up this large deficiency, and we are most anxious that additional subscribers of this class should be secured. We further feel that the more wealthy districts possessing free beds, should, if possible, furnish a total contribution somewhat nearer the

actual cost of a patient's maintenance. Similarly, the public bodies might reasonably be asked to increase their subscriptions to £60. We may point out that the raising of the charge for free beds to £60 per annum would enable us to pay our way satisfactorily.

The donations (£132 12s.) were placed to the credit of the Building and Improvement Fund, and this, augmented by the £50 already mentioned as having been transferred from the Maintenance Fund, was utilised in the erection and equipment of 3 sleeping shelters, an additional one for the doctor, general improvements in the garden, and the purchase of a pony and dog cart. The latter was bought partly in consequence of the serious expense incurred in constantly having goods brought up from the station by hired conveyance; and partly for the benefit of the staff, the life in so retired a situation being somewhat monotonous; in both ways the purchase has proved very satisfactory. There is the small balance of £3 19s. 8d. to our credit on this Fund.

We have had many visitors during the year, all showing great interest in, and appreciation of the Institution. A collecting box, placed in the entrance porch for any visitors who might be disposed to contribute, at the close of the year contained upwards of £4, which will be devoted to books and games for the patients.

Our best thanks are due to the Rev. F. R. C. Hutton, of Witherslack, who has kindly conducted a service on Sunday afternoons during the summer, which has been altered to Wednesdays for the winter months. We also beg to thank Miss Gwatkin for her kindly interest in teaching the patients drawn-thread work and basket making. We are under an obligation to many kind friends for gifts of provisions, books, games, linen, &c., and especially we must mention Mrs. Williams' enterprise in collecting a sum of money sufficient to purchase 18 garden seats to be placed in the grounds for the use of the patients—a most welcome gift. Finally, we would express our gratitude to all donors and subscribers for the ready response made to our appeal, and would earnestly beg of them to continue, and if possible increase their support, so long as we are able to present a record of successful work.

Medical Report for 1900.

THE Sanatorium first received patients on March 17th, 1900, between which date and December 31st, 1900, forty-one have been admitted. Of this number five need not be considered, four being discharged almost at once as hopeless and the fifth as unsuitable.

There have thus been thirty-six patients treated at Meathop, and with the exception of three all have benefited. Some have been cured,* very many have much improved, while those whose improvement has been less marked have gained much in learning the conditions of life most favourable to consumptives.

The thirty-six cases may be grouped in two different ways :—

- i. According to the result of treatment at Meathop.
- ii. According to their condition on admission.

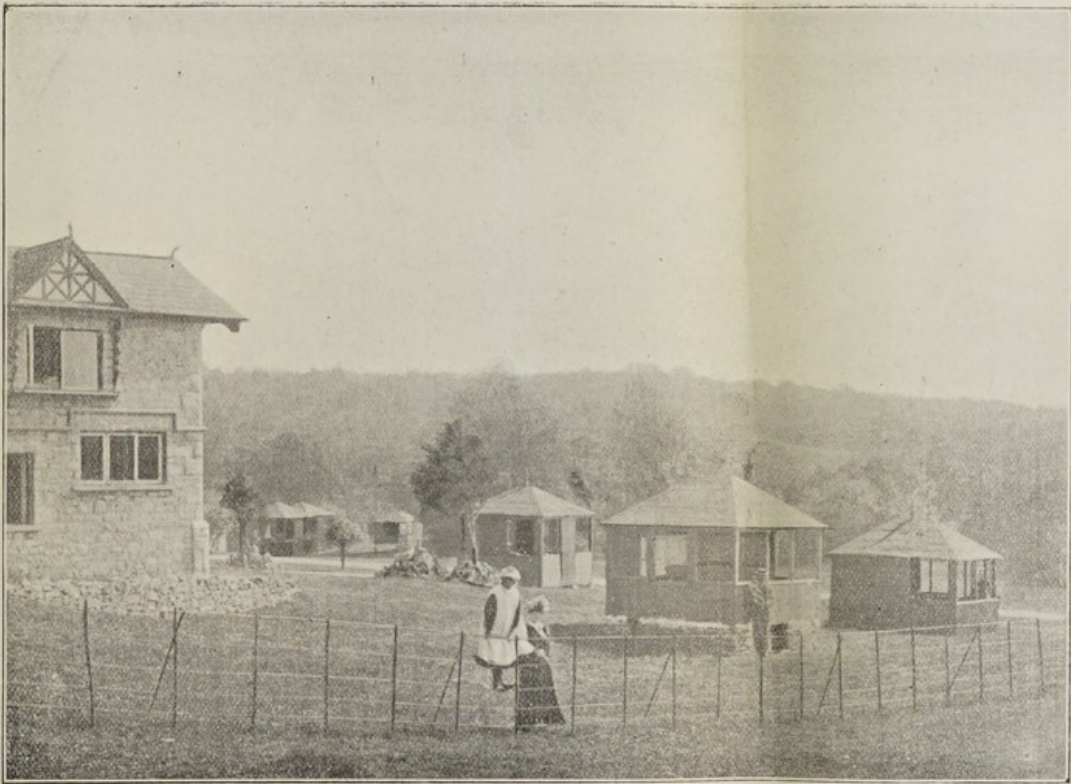

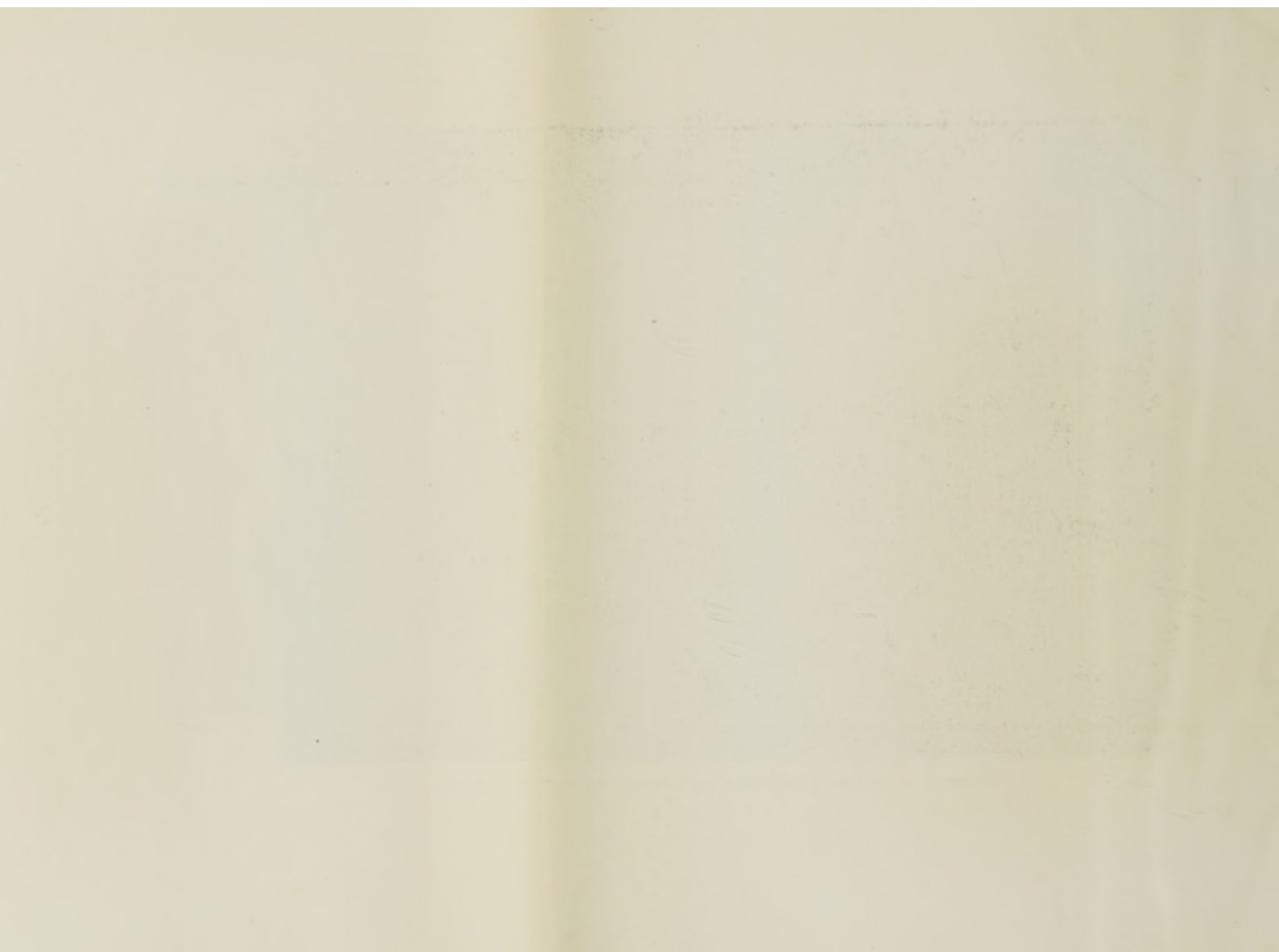
