# Sir W-l-r Ra-l-gb's Ghoft,

Which appear'd to Sir R -- t, at his House in St. Fames's-Square; with his Reprimand for laying New Imposts on Tobacco, which he first introduc'd into England,

HE terrible Apprehensions which Nature is alarmed with at the Appearance of Spectres and Apparitions, have for fome Ages furnished most curious Scrutinies, as well into the Caules as Realities of thele tremendous Visions: And that such Things have been, is evident, both from Christian and Pagan Antiquities; nor needs there any strained Argument to confirm the Certainty of the Queftion, where Reason and Probability so strenuous-

ly combine to support it.

failed him, and his Speech feemed interrupted by broken Accents, and being estranged to all Form of Prayer and Exoration, he adjured him only in the Name of his black Attendants, to specify what Particulars could raffe him from the Infernals, and furnish him with this Occasion of Horrour and Self Conviction: To whom the Ghoft; I am come from the Elyfiam Fields, where all thy baffled Projects have reached mine Ears; where every Shade that arrives from the terraqueous Globe, brings Bundles of Accu'a. tions against you; and beho d'ne e he stretched forth his Right-hand) the glaring Guilt of thy pernicious Counfels; see with what Pains, but how in vain, thou wouldst establish Innovation, trespals on the Properties of thy Fellow-subjects, and end avour to reconcile (what was never before attempted) the jarring Contradictions of Servitude and Freedom: The grim Monatch of our Abodes has iffued Orders for your Reception, and all the Ghofts adjudged to Punishment, will, for some Time, enjoy Intermission from Pain on your Arrival; Tantalus, Prometheus, Syfiphus and Ixion, confess thy Machinations have outdone their Attempts: In the Hell is in an Uproar, and waits thee with Impatience. Then know, bold Mortal, that thy Posalty's decreed, the Furies have new lathed their Whips with Scorpions, and a capacious Snuff millis juft erected to employ thy Labour to Perpetuity, by grinding Mundungus to regale the Noftrils of our Highland Shades: Our Merchants have supplicated great P.uto to interdide all Commerce between thee and his Subjects of the infernal Regions; even Charon's fees are retrenched to prevent new Imposts on the Souls which ferry over; therefore retire, and let the Shame and Confusion which thou art involved in to justly in this World, confirm thee of what Rewards thou shalt surely meet below; but the Dawn approaches, and forbids my longer stay: With that he lifted up his Hand, and with Impercitious Brow and fower Grimace, thrice ftruck him o'er the Head with plaitted Stalks. The Phantom vanished, but the indelible Marks of Infamy we e to deeply imprimed on he " tick's Face, that no bireling Art of Vindication will ever extenuate those Offences which so Justly transmit his Memory to the Censure and Resentment of future Ages. It is impossible to fuggest with what Refignation he submitted to Rebuke; how Pride and Reflection stuggled with Admonition; howe'er is withdrew most visibly discompos'd, and cishoped, the publick Remonstrances may not so immediately affect so haugt y a Disposition, yet in Regard to tome inward Conflicts, he may have Grace to repent, and attene for the Dilplea. fure of the People, which to manifelly appears by fundry Accufations hourly exhibited against a Conduct io flagrantly vicious and arraignable.
