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
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### ECLIPSES, 1883.


II. A Total Eclipse of the Sun, May 6. Invisible. Visible chiefly to the South Pacific Ocean.







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## WHAT IS BRONCHITIS?

Bronchitis is an inflammation of the bronchial tabes, either acute or chronic.

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# PNEUMONIA.

Pneumonia is an inflammation of the spongy tissue of the lungs. It occurs at all seasons, but is most prevalent in the spring. It attacks persons of all ages. The inflammation may be confined to a single lobule, or a part, or the whole of one or both lungs may be affected.

The pleura may also be involved, in which case

we have pleuro-pneumonia.

The name typhoid pneumonia is given to those cases in which a low or typhoid condition of system exists.

Pneumonia when complicated with functional derangement of the liver, is called bilious pneumonia

Pneumonia is caused by sudden changes of temperature, and by exposure to cold when heated or perspiring.

There are three stages of this disease:

First congestion, second inflammation, third sup-

puration.

The first stage is usually ushered in with a chill of greater or less intensity, followed by fever, difficult and hurried breathing, a feeling of tightness, heat and oppression. There is also generally pain in the lung, with cough and expectoration of viscid mucus.

If the congestion is not relieved in a short time, the second stage or that of inflammation sets in. The second stage is attended with fever, difficult breathing, cough and expectoration of viscid mucus of a rusty or brick-dust color.

The inflamed portion becomes solid like liver and almost impervious to air. If this stage of the disease is not relieved by proper treatment the third stage,

or that of suppuration sets in.

In this stage there is great debility and exhaustion with profuse expectoration of pus, and night sweats. If the disease should not be cured before reaching this stage, the patient has a lingering recovery or dies from exhaustion. In treating pneumonia it is very important to begin treatment at the very commencement of the disease; that is as soon as there is a chill.

As the treatment varies with the age and condition of the patient, also with the severity and stage of the disease, I would advise that a skillful physician should be called in. By proper and prompt treatment the disease may be prevented from reaching the second stage. 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# THE LIVER.

#### ITS FUNCTIONS AND DISEASES.

The liver is the largest and most important gland in the body. It is situated in the right side below the ribs and between the stomach and spine.

The liver has at least three important functions. First it is a depurative gland, removing from the blood many impurities existing there from the disintegration of tissues and the remains left in the blood by the oxygenizing of the carbon during res-

hot climates.

dark coffee colored urine, and light colored stools. Besides the above diseases the secretory functions may be deranged. There may be excessive secretions of bile, which may be known by the deep bilious color of the stools and by the loss of appetite and a slight vomiting of the bile. When very excessive there may be bilious diarrhoa or dysentery. There is often a deficient secretion of bile, or the liver may cease to secrete any bile. In the first case the stools become light yellow or lead colored; in the second almost or entirely white. The bowels are generally constipated, but when this condition is attended with congestion of the blood vessels of the stomach and bowels there is copious discharges of watery passages, causing diarrhea, dysentery or cholera morbus. Jaundice frequently ensues, indigestion and other derangements of different organs may follow therefrom. The secretions may also be vitiated in character causing much derangement of the stomach and bowels.




