PREFACE TO SIXTH EDITION.

EACH successive edition of this small handbook will bring to the front in a condensed form some of the later researches of scientific men, and in it will be found a valuable collection of information that can be used not only by Medical men, but by Chemists and Scientific people. There are many kinds of drugs that it would not be expedient to publish details of, and which should be administered by a medical man; these are therefore omitted in this Edition, but I shall be glad at all times to furnish details to those who feel interested. The drugs referred to are to be found at most leading chemists, and are used by the Profession and in our chief Hospitals.

I have always taken a keen interest in the introduction of new remedies, foods &c., and at the present time the schools and colleges in England, Germany, France, and America, are working on new drugs and foods which I furnished to them.

When work is done in Germany or Austria, it is published there, translated into American works and the press, and it thus comes through these papers to England.

When it was proved in Australia that *Euphorbia pilulifera* relieved and cured Asthma, I alone held a stock of this drug. Jambul for Diabetes is another instance. Americans came to me from

Chicago, solely to obtain relief from its use.

I have collected a mass of information from Natives on the uses and the history of their drugs, and from planters who have made researches, and every week I receive new drugs from different parts of the world ; so no one is in a better position than I am for sifting and dispersing the knowledge. Of late years it has been found that Menthol is the most active germ destroyer, and at the same time it is very good for the throat.

The tendency of the present age is undoubtedly towards palatable medication. It used to be considered at one time that a remedy could not possibly be effective unless it were nasty, but the introduction of Tabloids, Tabellæ, Capsules and Cachets, has long ago exploded this absurd idea, and opened the pathway to many developments of modern pharmacy. STEANS' WINE OF COD LIVER OIL, to which I especially call the attention of the profession on page 15, is the outcome of some of the latest contributions of scientific research to practical pharmacy, and, judging from the hearty reception it has already been accorded at the hands of medical men, one is enabled to augur well of its consistent usefulness and permanent introduction.

PALMA CHRISTI.—This is one of the names Castor Oil is known by. It has been treated by a chemist, who has extracted the nasty flavour, and after testing it carefully, one of the medical papers said "for the future it would be inexcusable to subject patients to the nausea occasioned by the ordinary Castor Oil."

OXONIA LOTION has cured many suffering from lupus, rodent ulcer, cancer, and varicose veins.

I have, therefore, taken up the whole introduction and distribution, for it is in no way a dangerous preparation, but one that can be used in families.

Every one knows how sticky oiled silk becomes. I invented and patented a substance called Christia which has replaced it, and it is much cheaper, and is waterproof. Since this was first introduced, many improvements have been made in it, and other materials have been developed. One of the latest of these is Christia Lint, which I am encouraged to believe has an immense field of usefulness before it. A high-class Lint is backed with Christia, so that it is thoroughly impermeable, not only to hot and cold water but to spirit, chloroform, grease and oil; it can therefore be used in the application of any spirituous or greasy liniment, poultices, &c., without the least fear of soiling or spoiling clothing or bedding.

At the time when Hospitals are complaining of their being short of money, it is most important that such materials as Christia and Christia Lint should be thoroughly tested, and eventually adopted in the place of oiled silk, gutta-percha tissue and other such costly articles.

One of the first surgeons in London gave me the information relating to the cure of chilblains, and it took three years to carry out his views in a practical way of giving the relief in the form of a pill, owing to the difficulty of keeping the drug in a liquid form.

Milk Sugar is a product which is not nearly so much used as it deserves to be. Its importance is not realised. On pages 24-25 I give some facts and figures, which I am sure will commend themselves to all intelligent readers.

THIS is a nut from the *Sterculia Acuminata*, and has been known before the earliest written records, for it enabled the natives to perform journeys, the reports of which, at the time, seemed incredible, and in fact they were called 'traveller's tales.' But from the information given by travellers, through the press, we have now proved their value. How often after an operation it is advisable that the strength of a patient should

sleeplessness, occasioned by the derangement of the nervous system, great relief will be afforded by taking a few lozenges.

MENTHOL.

THIS is certainly one of the most wonderful drugs that has been introduced into England from China and Japan, and it has been in use there from the time of the earliest record. By it I was cured of sunstroke when in China, and by my means it has been introduced into Europe. The poorest class of people in China and Japan carry a bottle about with them. It is the finest disinfectant ever worked in a laboratory, and a small quantity of this drug will destroy germ life more effectually and quicker than any other known substance. The most infectious disease may be nursed in a room, if Menthol is freely vaporised, and no one will suffer, for the germs are destroyed.

In cases of INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC the plan is to vaporise the Menthol by means of the water evaporator. This is soothing but lowering: the patient should be kept up with stimulants if the pulse commences to fall too low. A kettle or saucepan should be started also in the hall of the house, and the fumes should be allowed to pass all through it; the attack is stopped and does not spread, the germs being all destroyed.

In the time of hay fever Menthol destroys the germ that floats about attacking some people more than others. The former ought to be grown largely in England. I introduced this plant into the United States, where it has done well.

This green herb is quite hardy ; it only requires to be ploughed at the side of the row and manured each winter. The foliage can be made into an infusion in case of fever.

Special Directions for using Cushman's Patent Menthol Inhaler.

CATARRH.—Use the Inhaler often enough to keep the nostrils open and the head cleared. Always use thoroughly on retiring at night. It should be remembered that chronic or deepseated catarrh cannot be cured in a day or a week, and that the patient is constantly exposed to sudden changes of temperature, dust, &c., which are causes of the disease, so that at times the symptoms may feel aggravated. But perseverance and regularity of treatment will in the end effect a cure.

Mentholized air produces a cool, soothing sensation throughout the head, with a feeling of instant relief: it opens up the "stuffed" and heated nostrils, permits the air to enter its

Menthol Evaporator,

which will be found extremely useful. It consists of a small spirit lamp to burn methylated spirit, which fits underneath a receptacle in which Menthol Crystals are placed with a small quantity of hot water. Directly the small lamp is lighted evaporation commences, and continues until the supply of spirit is exhausted. During an epidemic of Influenza this Evaporator should be kept in every household, so that it can be immediately utilized when any of the family are attacked. In fact, it will be found very advisable to periodically use it as a preventive, or for disinfecting clothes.

EUCALYPTUS HONEY.

Eucalyptus Honey is not an artificial product, but a pure honey, collected by the bees from the Eucalyptus trees, hence the wonderful antiseptic and anti-malarial properties, attributed to it by the Australians.

It is much appreciated by children when overtaxed with a bad cold, and many people drink it when mixed with hot water. In Australia and Tasmania it has a high reputation. It has been employed with great success in the treatment of Laryngeal, Bronchial, Pulmonary, Cardiac, and Scrofulous Affections; in Malarial and Typhoid Fevers; in Whooping Cough and Influenza; in diseases of the Bladder and Kidneys; and in Catarrhs.

PAPAW MILK AND PAPAIN

THE Papaw Tree (*Carica Papaya*) yields a succus or milk, which is used in all parts of the tropics.

In the East the milk is taken daily, and it generally keeps the Europeans in robust health.

It is very useful in the treatment of Diphtheria, Ulcerated Throat or Mouth, &c.

In cases of diphtheria the plan to adopt is, to get a wine glass and place it cup downwards and on the flat base pour out a very small quantity of the powder; to this add a few drops of water. Take a clean camel-hair brush and paint the throat or part affected. Then wash the base of the glass and the brush. This ought to be repeated in bad cases of diphtheria every ten minutes until the inflammation has subsided; there is no disagreeable taste, so it does good to swallow the saliva. The very worst cases will generally yield favourably to this treatment. It at once allays the inflammation and sets up a healthy action on the skin, and as it is also a splendid digestive the stomach soon responds. It *must not* be used in inflammation of the eye.

When ordering through a chemist be careful to specify Papain "Christy," or Papaw Milk "Christy," as there are other so-called Papaines upon the market.

PAPAIN AND COCAINE

THE combination of these two drugs in a dry form was suggested by the constant use of Papain and Cocaine separately. Cocaine does not suit some people, and Papain has such a good record of result that experiments were made to see if it were taken in the form of a lozenge whether it would allay inflammation in the throat. It was

found to do so. The Cocaine being in such minute quantities there can be no fear of any ill effect. The Papaine sets up a stimulating action not only in the throat but in the stomach. The consequence is that a large weight of these lozenges are sold every week, not only in Europe but in our colonies. Some people assert that if they are "dead tired," and yet forced to travel still a long distance, half a lozenge (only) picks them up. Clergymen who have to preach after doing a hard day's work can rely on these lozenges enabling them to carry out their duties without pain or difficulty.

THIS lozenge has been made specially for indigestion, and will be found to give immediate relief. The fruit of the Papaw tree is eaten fresh by colonists and millions of natives, and is found to

have a most beneficial action upon the digestive organs. This lozenge is manufactured from the juice obtained direct from the plant and specially prepared for us, and it will be found to give as good results as the fruit itself. One lozenge should be allowed to slowly dissolve in the mouth after each meal. It acts beneficially when the kidneys are out of order.

It is also useful for young children who reject their food, as it prevents it from turning sour.

CHAULMUGRA OIL.

THE pip of the orange-shaped fruit of *Gynocardia Odorata*, a forest tree growing in India, yields this wonderful oil, that has been used from time immemorial on the battle-fields of India, and also by all the medicine doctors in China, Mongolia, Siberia, and Egypt.

This pure oil will cure the worst cases of rheumatism when properly imbibed. Always take it, or apply it, when the stomach is not empty, but full, or else it will probably produce sickness. Many people who desire a rapid result take as much as a teaspoonful of the oil at a time, sometimes with a little brandy. In very bad cases of rheumatism I have often known poor men out at work again in four days. If the oil cannot be tolerated, owing to its smell (and yet it is known that beneficial results will follow on its being used), the oil can be warmed and rubbed on to the stomach. It is important that plenty of underdone meat should be eaten, and it is also well to take some good wine, Port or Burgundy, for this oil produces great appetite and improvement in spirits, if only the prejudice against the smell can be overcome.

There is nothing new in these remarks, for a writer on leprosy, which this oil cures, in India says: "a liberal supply of food is absolutely necessary." In the case of stiff joints or accidents this oil cannot be applied too soon to any part of the body, for it will heal the flesh so rapidly and keep the edges of the wound so soft that no scar will be left. In my books* some remarkable cases are recorded. In many parishes in England where the poor used to suffer from rheumatism, small bottles of this oil are supplied by the clergyman or lady visitor to those who cannot afford to buy it for themselves. For curing the sore back and shoulders of horses it is equally effective.

Chaulmugra alleviates, if not cures, consumption when rubbed into the chest and back.

TINCTURE LYCOPODIUM (Christy).

Lycopodium Clavatum, or Club Moss, Stagshorn, &c., from which the tincture is made by a special process.

Some years since I found that the tincture, if taken twice a day, cured boils and eradicated them from the system—ten drops being taken (fasting) twice a day. This was tested by very many physicians and surgeons. Details of results have been published and circulated, showing what valuable results were revealed of its action in internal disorders, especially of the bladder, when much larger doses were given. It is a perfectly safe medicine, and can be given to children for pustules on the eyelids (styes) which generally disappear in eight or ten hours after one or two doses.

It has been found to have a singular action in dissolving stone in the bladder. A specimen has been placed in St. Peter's Hospital that was

passed by a man, showing how the surface was eaten away in three days. In case of pain in the feet and legs, 10 drops twice a day has given relief.

PICHI

Under the name of Piché, the *Fabiana imbricata* is known in Chili, Peru, and the Argentine Republic for its prompt and decisive action in diseases of the bladder and in the urinary passages. This shrub, which might from its appearance be taken for a Conifer, belongs to the *Solanaceæ*, and grows on dry elevated slopes.

I am now growing this plant in the South of Europe. I have published full particulars for the use of medical men, which they can always obtain by writing for them. The fluid extract is sold and can be taken mixed with water. The lozenge made from the plant is invaluable for children troubled with incontinence, and it can be carried in the pocket. It will be found to have a soothing effect upon the system. Pichi is largely used in St. Peter's Hospital for Stone, and in other hospitals. It speedily allays irritation in the bladder and urinary organs. This is one of the drugs that is found to effect a cure in most cases without having to continue its use.

KERPOT.

A CURE FOR CHILBLAINS.

Many ladies who have been great sufferers from chilblains, at the beginning of the season send for a box of chilblain pills, and take one of a morning for a few mornings, and so never suffer now during the whole season from cold hands.

The nurses in some of the large hospitals get a supply of these through the Dispenser, and have now used them regularly for years.

It is important to note that we mark packages

poison, on account of the drug being so powerful. The perles should not be given to children under five years of age.

The best result is obtained by taking one or two perles when first waking in the morning, fasting, or in other words, on an empty stomach.

EUPHORBIA PILULIFERA.

EUPHORBIA was first introduced for asthma, but since its introduction it has proved of great value in cases of coughs, colds and throat affections generally.

This now well-known drug was discovered in Australia, and it was observed that the natives used it whenever they were troubled with throat and chest affections, and several Europeans who were suffering from asthma were cured by the natives. I was the first to receive it in this country. The late Dr. Bancroft, of Brisbane, sent me a large case of this herb. It is sold in the form of Fluid Extract, and a more palatable preparation, Euphorbia Cordial.

It became so popular that a lozenge was asked for that could be carried in the pocket, and eaten at the time of the cough. The lozenge will afford immediate relief on a sudden attack.

(*Syzygium Jambolanum.*)

THIS is the kernel of a delicious plum, and has been known in India to give great relief in diabetes. The most convenient form for taking it is in perles or cachets.

PESTALOZZI'S MILK SUGAR.

Milk Sugar is found in a dissolved state in the milk of all mammals, and the easy digestibility of milk is due to the action which it exerts. Bearing this fact in mind, it has long been the aim of scientists to extract the milk sugar from milk and to present it in an available form for use in medicine and food. At first the production was so costly that it could only be used in medicine, but with improved methods of extraction larger quantities have been produced at less cost, with the result that Milk Sugar is now universally used for nourishing children and weak persons in general.

The use of some other carbo-hydrate might be suggested, for instance, common white sugar, which would answer the same purpose and would cost less. Such a suggestion may be answered by the following:

Common white sugar causes the formation of acetic acid in the stomach, and this especially impairs digestion, as it causes the albumen, a substance which has to form the muscles of our body, to curdle. In consequence of this rapid curdling, a weak stomach is not able to digest this albumen, and the stomach of a child more often than not expels the food which it had shortly before admitted. The irregular development, and in many cases the premature deaths of children, are to be imputed to the disturbances caused by the use of ordinary white sugar.

Milk Sugar, on the contrary, assimilates very easily without forming any acids in the stomach, so that all food is digested far more easily, especially the albumen, which curdles in small and delicate flakes. It is, in fact, the principal food that nature has assigned to children, and to all persons with weak digestive organs. I would particularly emphasize the following three points:

(1) Milk Sugar promotes digestion instead of hindering it, as ordinary sugar does.

If, therefore, to this we add $5\frac{1}{2}\%$ of Milk Sugar, we obtain a fluid containing

Albumen.	Milk Sugar.	Fat.
1%	7%	1.2%

which is equal to mothers' milk.

Thus it will be seen that the simple addition of sugar of milk to cows' milk and water to all intents and purposes converts this into mothers' milk, a forcible fact which should be realised by all parents.

The blood only absorbs as much Milk Sugar as is beneficial to health, even if a larger quantity is taken, while if too much is taken of ordinary white sugar it may not be quite so harmless. The use of Milk Sugar is also recommended to diabetic patients. Care should be taken to see that Messrs. J. H. Pestalozzi's Milk Sugar is always supplied. The Directions for its use are as follows:—

One tablespoonful of Milk Sugar should be added to every pint of milk before boiling it, thus boiling the Milk Sugar with the milk.

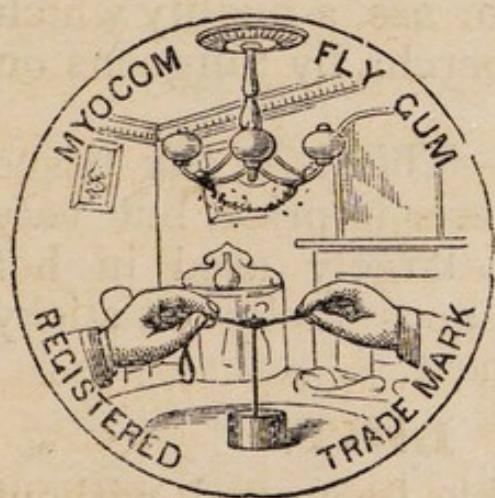

FLY GUM.



THIS is a gum not nearly as well known as it ought to be—gauged by the comfort it affords to the country. We supply it to India and Egypt. It is used in the large hotels, at the buffets, wound on pieces of bamboo, and placed amongst the table decorations as depicted in the accompanying woodcut.



Those who have watched the habits of flies assert that when the first few occupants of a house are caught it is some time before a new lot of flies take possession of the same premises. One gentleman in Brisbane found that he had to change the strings four times (as they were quite full) each hour, before the house was cleared. It is sold in bulk for shipment to hot climates.

A string or straw lightly covered with this preparation, and suspended from the chandelier or other convenient place, will free any room of flies in a few moments.

NEW SURGICAL DRESSINGS. CHRISTIA.

This material consists of a thin, soft, and flexible tissue, having in weight and resistance great advantages over such substances as oiled silk, india-rubber or gutta-percha.

It is, from its lightness and strength, eminently suitable for bandages, surgical sheets, and waterproof linings or coverings.

It does not become sticky and useless like gutta-percha and rubber when heated, nor deteriorate when kept for a time, like oiled silk, nor become tacky like gutta-percha.

It is already being used in several of the principal Hospitals on a large scale both in Germany and France, it has been passed by the Board of Trade for use on passenger ships in place of gutta-percha tissue, and is also used by many ambulance societies, being much preferred to other dressings, not only on account of its lightness, but for the reason that it is always fit for use, a quality which is seldom found in gutta-percha by Surgeons on active service.

FIBRINE CHRISTIA.—This is a silk tissue made waterproof, a little dearer in price, but very thin and beautiful; it is largely used in hot climates, because it never goes tacky or sticky as oil silk does, nor does it heat.

CHRISTIA LINT.

Christia Lint is a veritable boon, and, without the least fear of being considered egotistical, I repeat this. It has been tried and severely tried

and not found wanting. When rubber-backed Lint was first introduced it was regarded with great satisfaction. Rubber-backed Lint is proof against water, but soon deteriorates. Its competitor, and that which will eventually entirely supersede it, Christia Lint, is not only proof against water, both hot and cold, and change of climate, but is in addition impervious to spirit, oil, grease, chloroform, &c. If for the future you wish to apply a spirituous or greasy liniment in the case of rheumatism, lumbago, or the like, you will have no need to envelope yourself in wadding or costly bandages to prevent the soiling of your wearing apparel or of your bedding. The remedy can be applied directly upon the Lint, and the latter can be most easily kept in position by means of a silk scarf, or piece of calico where convenient, or by means of tapes sewn on, sticking plaster, &c.

It has been very exhaustively and favorably reported upon by Dr. Richard Drews, of Hamburg, who has suggested its use in numerous circumstances. In addition to its other advantages it prevents the too rapid evaporation of the medicaments, and in this way helps the remedy to exert a continuous action upon the affected part for many hours.

RUBY CHRISTIA (Paper) (For Photographic purposes)

Is soft, pliable, strong, and is very suitable for Dark Room Illumination, and many other uses in photography; can be folded into a small space, crumpled up and put into the pocket without being creased when unfolding it again. Being very transparent and carefully coloured, it easily permits the non-actinic rays to pass, whilst keeping back the actinic rays of light. By making a blind of it, panelling it on to window frames or

other suitable framework, large windows can be covered up at a very small expense, and amateurs who have no dark room at their convenience will find this material very cheap and especially useful.

In developing Isochromatic plates it is advisable to take two or more thicknesses when the light is powerful. Even in four or five thicknesses this material will let a large amount of non-actinic light pass through.

Great improvements have been made in this material since the last edition.

Ruby Christia stands a fair amount of handling, but for those photographers who prefer a stronger base, I manufacture Ruby Silk and Ruby Cotton.

The difference between

RUBY SILK

and the ordinary Ruby Christia consists in the former having a strong open silk as a base, whereby greater transparency and increased strength is obtained. The open silk is so finely covered with the Christia ruby solution that only the non-actinic rays of light are allowed to pass through. The base being of silk, the material is obviously somewhat expensive in the first instance, but the length of time it can be utilised must be taken into consideration.

I thoroughly recognise the important point that for general adoption a cheap, and at the same time a durable, material is desirable, and, to meet this requirement, I have been experimenting with various tissues, and have at length succeeded in finding a calico that appears to be admirably suited for the purpose. To this I have given the name of

RUBY COTTON.

It is not quite so transparent as Ruby Christia, but is very strong, and for ordinary purposes will be found most effectual.

PINE EXTRACT (Christy)

we have made for us fresh every season because it is so much better for use in the hot bath before the aroma dies off.

People suffering from gout, rheumatism and kidney complaints much appreciate it. You can put about a wine-glassful in a large bath.

OXONIA LOTION (Simms).

THIS is a preparation that has been in constant use for eight years. I have read the history of many cases of various forms of cancer, lupus, fistulæ, carbuncle, varicose, &c., since my friends urged me to take up the whole of the commercial working and introduction to the public of this preparation.

ASTHMA.—With EUPHORBIA PILULIFERA, a simple herb, the natives cure this frightful complaint; it affords a great relief; the lozenges will generally stop the cough and afford quiet sleep. Another plan is to get into a room with a temperature of 98° Faht., and not come out for some days until there is a change for the better.

BUNION OR INFLAMED JOINT.—There is nothing better to apply than Laudanum, on Christiated Lint or Felt that will not let the moisture pass through. The swelling rapidly subsides.

BURNS OR SCALDS.—At once bathe and coat the wound in milk, and allow it to form a skin over the part affected. A little Cocaine may be added by melting some in water.

CANCER.—Oxonia Lotion having proved so valuable, we have published a book on the cures.

Hundreds of people in all classes will come forward to testify to the cures. In bad cases a Surgeon or nurse should dictate the treatment to be adopted. Many medical men are using gallons of Oxonia Lotion, so useful do they find it.

COLD IN THE HEAD.—Quinine taken in 15 to 20 grain doses in Sherry or Brandy will often stop it; one dose is generally sufficient.

Mistole may be rubbed into the head on retiring to rest. It may also be put on cotton wool, which should be squeezed dry, and then put into the ear on the side of the head most affected. Menthol may be set free in a room by steam produced in a kettle over a spirit lamp; it rapidly lowers the pulse; and Menthol Lozenges can also be sucked, and it is sure to produce relief for reasons given.

CORNS, although but a slight ailment, are particularly trying, especially to those who have to walk much. Anything, therefore, that will speedily remove them is a veritable boon. We have a Corn Solvent that has stood the test of a good many years. It has only to be applied night and morning regularly for about a week, and a difference will be apparent.

EARACHE.—Nothing acts more quickly than Mistole, and it may be put in both ears at one time if both are affected. It will not impair the hearing, but on the contrary, we are continually getting reports from medical men that they have cured cases of what they thought would be permanent deafness. A small quantity on cotton wool is enough.

The Chinese have a small feather brush for clearing out the ear, and a pair of forceps with long

flat points ; the rounded form prevents them hurting it. Wool can be most easily placed in the ear or removed by their aid. We have regular supplies from China.

ECZEMA AND ROUGHNESS OF THE SKIN is a trouble many suffer from, particularly smokers. To cure or relieve this a preparation invented in America, called Dermaline, is good, but it is very dear. It is also used by photographers to prevent their fingers being stained, also by travellers before starting on a journey, for it prevents the hands taking up dirt ; but, strange to say, it does not soil satin, silk, or cloth.

Paint Oxonia on the part affected, and after 12 hours well wash it with hot water and soap and a flat brush, allow it dry, then paint on Oxonia again, and repeat ; the flesh soon returns quite smooth. Some sand paper is good to take down the roughness.

Sometimes a Carbolic Lotion for rough skin will allay all irritation and cure it.

Woolfat Soap is very useful and comforting.

INDIGESTION.—A portion of a *Menthol lozenge* will remove or relieve this, and induce sleep. It is not a dangerous remedy. *Papain* is another harmless remedy.

LUPUS.—Oxonia Lotion can be relied on. A book of treatment is in print.

NEURALGIA IN THE JOINTS.—When accompanied by pain, apply Mistole by rubbing, and the pain will leave ; it is then a question if it returns. If so, rub it again hard with the finger ends. If relief is obtained, *Chaulmugra Oil* taken in perles will produce a permanent effect. The pain often comes in the small of the back ; rub it well with Mistole and keep it warm, and the pain will leave.

Analgen taken in tabella of 8 grains, two or three times a day, will drive it away and produce a cure. Oxonia may be painted on.

PILES.—A reliable cure is to get some Calomel. Dip the finger in the powder and apply it direct to the part after sponging and wiping the flesh dry.

Paint on the part affected Oxonia full strength, it soon cures the complaint, and removes all the pain.

Another remedy is to put Epsom Salts (1 teaspoonful) in a wine glass, pour on milk, and sip it during the morning (and day if convenient) and the Piles disappear.

RHEUMATISM often defies treatment.

The plan is to try the vegetable drugs that have been put within your reach. Chaulmugra has been known to succeed when all else has failed, and some people can support a teaspoonful at a time; but plenty of food must be taken—meat and wine—or a pain as of great hunger will be set up in the chest.

There are many other drugs, but as in most villages a poor person can be found suffering, give them the chance of having a little Chaulmugra Oil with a little spirit to take off the taste, but mind and give them a liberal supply of meat and wine for a few days. Leprosy can also be cured with Chaulmugra if meat and wine are liberally given.

(See Dymock on Indian drugs, and many writers in medical journals.)

Analgen (Dr. Vis) has been found a most effective cure. It has the merit of not producing any ill effects.

RINGWORM is cured in three days and the fungus destroyed by Oxonia. It is used by the

first authorities and recommended by them. With a preparation of Menthol and Chloroform there is no fear of infection. It should be rubbed and painted on the patch with a brush when the hair over the place has been cut short with scissors. The Menthol put in the hat or cap will destroy every germ of disease at once.

RODENT ULCER.—Oxonia Lotion applied with a brush. The scab and core must be pulled out when it is free, which is generally in a few days.

SEA SICKNESS.—With many people Papaine and Cocaine Lozenges answer, some being taken before going on board, and continued, if necessary, one after the other. The Cocaine paralyses the tongue, and the Papaine acts on the digestive organs. Kola Lozenges have also been recommended; some prefer Menthol Lozenges.

SICKNESS WITH INFANTS.—Take a pinch of dried Papaw Milk, and sprinkle it on the food just as it is prepared: the child will be able to digest the food at once and be as merry as possible; or give a child a lozenge of Papaw to suck.

SORE THROAT.—Menthol will give rapid relief. The vapour may be obtained by a kettle over a spirit lamp, into which a teaspoonful of Crystal of Menthol should be placed. If the sore throat is infectious, the Menthol destroys all germs, and they cannot affect anyone injuriously who enters the room. If there are diphtheric patches, then some Papaine-Christy should be applied as directed in this book. The lozenge will stop a slight attack, or a Cushman's Menthol Inhaler can be used. Oxonia may also be painted on with good effect, taking care to wash the brush directly after use.

STIFF JOINTS.—Painful stiff joints in many cases are relieved and cured by Analgen. Tincture of Lycopodium will also remove the pain if there is swelling in the legs and feet. More will be heard of this soon.

STONE.—PAIN IN THE KIDNEYS.—In tropical climates where the Papaw tree grows, the fresh milk is used, taken direct from the stem or leaves of the tree. The next best thing to take is the dried Milk of Papaw in small doses of one to three grains at a time with food. Tincture of Lycopodium is also found efficacious. It dissolves the stone rapidly, and it at once allays irritation in the bladder.

TOOTHACHE.—If this is Neuralgia, then apply Mistole by rubbing it on the part affected with the ends of the fingers. (See page 13.)

Frequently the gums become painful and leave the teeth. We have a wash which was recommended to us by one of the first Surgeon-dentists. It is used by putting a few drops into a little water in a glass, and the mouth is well rinsed with this after cleaning the teeth; or pure Caffein may be placed on the gums, and the saliva swallowed.

VARICOSE VEINS.—These have been cured by Oxonia Lotion (Simms). See book.

VOICE.—Menthol Lozenges will be found to improve the voice and allay inflammation and thickness. Singers and men at the Bar prefer the Cocaine and Papaine lozenge on account of its rapid action in clearing the voice. In bad cases, mistole can be rubbed on the neck or chest, and then compresses of Lint, backed with Christia, which prevents the fumes or vapours passing off too rapidly, should be used.

Eucalyptus Honey mixed with hot water is a good beverage in certain forms of cold, and Eucalyptus Oil put into the steaming kettle often affords relief. This is also a disinfectant and germ destroyer, but not so sure as the Menthol.

WISDOM TOOTHACHE.—This is attacked by putting a little Mistole on cotton wool, placing it in the ear, and leaving it there for some days. If the tooth is hollow, then a piece of cotton wool can be saturated with Mistole and put over the tooth, but this should be done after food, not on an empty stomach, for the taste of the Chaulmugra Oil in the Mistole may remain in the mouth for some time; or a small pinch of pure Caffeine placed with the fingers in the tooth, or on the gums, or put on cotton wool, will afford relief.

WARTS, or fleshy excrescences, are easily removed with Papaine-Christy. This name is given to a pure drug to show the difference between a composition that is sold under a somewhat similar name.
