How often it relieves a mind in distress.


Gazing in her sweet face whose eyes with gladness beamed,

#### General Directions.

For outward application shake the bottle well, and apply the Oil three or four times a day, by rubbing it in with increasing friction; or if necessary, by saturating flannel with it and binding it on, after which cover the parts to keep the heat of the Oil in. Should the Oil prove too strong, as occasionally it does, causing much smarting, dilute it with a little whisky or water. For Rheumatism, Neuralgia, Etc., rub it on thoroughly near the fire. 
