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

# DR. GUSTAV JAEGER'S CLOTHING REFORM

FOR

## MEN, WOMEN AND CHILDREN.

THE extent to which the health is prejudiced by the material and form of the ordinary clothing of the present day was scarcely suspected, and was never made generally known, until Gustav Jaeger, M.D., Professor at the Royal Polytechnic School, Stuttgart, commenced, about 1872, to publish the result of his investigations on the subject.

The special study, based on exhaustive scientific and practical experiments, which Dr. Gustav Jaeger has continued during subsequent years to give to this question, has established that much of the bodily derangement to which men and women are liable may be prevented or cured by the adoption of Sanitary Woollen Clothing and Bedding, which afford to the body the maximum of protection from chill and damp, with the minimum of impediment to the body's exhalations.

That these conditions are instinctively felt to be better fulfilled by woollen than by linen or cotton clothing is shown by the general use of flannel for cricket, boating, tennis, and other athletic exercises likely to cause profuse perspiration, which, however, is simply an intensification of the action of the skin incessantly going on, and only ceasing with life itself. If this action of the skin be imperfect or repressed, fat and water accumulate in the tissues, lowering their functional powers, and the flesh, which should feel elastic and firm, is flabby, causing a series of disorders in the general economy (see "Effects of Excess of Fat and Water in the Tissues."—Selections from Dr. G. Jaeger's Essays.)

It is in view of the importance, not only for active persons but also for those who lead sedentary lives, of maintaining the healthy action of the skin, that Dr. Gustav Jaeger denounces the use in clothing and bedding of all material manufactured from, or adulterated with, vegetable or silk fibre, as incapable of the necessary absorption, and obstructive to the natural process of evaporation. Linen and cotton are, moreover,

rapid conductors of heat, and thus, when damp, readily cause a chill, while wool acts in precisely the reverse manner, as is explained further on.

He, therefore, selects animal wool as the proper substance of his Sanitary Clothing (Normal Kleidung), and rejects all linen, cotton and silk, for under-clothing and for linings to coats, &c. The advantages of this material are obvious, as wool, when woven into tissues, possesses, above all textile fabrics, a peculiar power of absorption, and of acting as a non-conductor of heat, preserving an equable temperature of the body. It has the faculty of eliminating from the tissues excess of fat and water, making the flesh firmer, and thus exercising a hardening, instead of the softening effect generally ascribed to wool—and rightly, when it is worn under linen or cotton. The unnatural pallor of the skin under the ordinary clothing is due to the stagnation of the surface blood-vessels, caused by the repression of the exhalations: under Jaeger's Sanitary Woollen Clothing the body resumes its natural colour, such as temporarily follows from the stimulus of a cold bath, showing that the blood is freely circulating at the surface.

Wool fabrics, as they have hitherto been woven, are, to many persons, highly objectionable, irritating the skin, and not allowing sufficiently free escape for the exhalations, besides which they are heavy and can scarcely be worn in the summer; but Sanitary Woollen Clothing should be such as can be worn in all seasons, with freedom from oppressive heat, while maintaining the necessary warmth. It therefore became necessary to alter the process of weaving, and to adopt a method which produces a much less closely woven fabric than the ordinary flannel. Jaeger's Sanitary Woollen Under-clothing is made in shirts, chemises, or in combination garments of shirts or chemises and drawers (in one piece) for both sexes. In appearance and feel these fabrics are very similar to spun silk, and it may be confidently asserted that no garments hitherto made are so agreeable to wear. They are perfectly soft, and will not irritate the most delicate skin, while the folds adapt themselves to the body in the most comfortable manner. The shirts, &c., are not open in front, but are of double thickness over the chest, and button at the sides and on the shoulder. They may be worn through the heat of the summer with comfort, and in colder weather they maintain as much warmth as the heavier flannel clothing.

Jaeger's Sanitary Woollen Clothing having achieved marked success in Germany and other foreign countries (where leading members of the medical profession have testified to its value), its introduction into this country, which possesses a climate so liable to sudden and extreme changes of temperature, should attain results even more satisfactory. The system needs only to become known, and to be tried, to ensure its permanent adoption by the public at large. All articles are manufactured of the finest and purest wool, without any admixture of vegetable fibre, and free from noxious dyes. The great prevalence of the practice of adulterating woollen fabrics, and the free use of injurious dyes, make this a most important consideration. To healthy persons the timely adoption of Jaeger's Sanitary Woollen Clothing will prove an excellent defence against bodily disorders from climatic and other influences; while its use will be accompanied by most beneficial results to those whose constitutions are not robust, or whose health is impaired, especially to sufferers from asthma and other pulmonary complaints, affections of the chest, gout, rheumatism, disorders of the digestive organs, &c. The Sanitary Woollen System acts on such diseases by assisting the efforts of the skin to expel the secretions with which they are retained. (See "The Nature of Disease."—Selections from Dr. G. Jaeger's Essays.)

Members of the military and naval professions, as well as of the mercantile marine, and travellers in general, will find Jaeger's Sanitary Woollen Clothing to be of great convenience, in addition to its sanitary value.

#### THE SANITARY ADVANTAGES OF PURE ANIMAL WOOL.

I. Wool has a more stimulating effect on the skin than linen or cotton, and consequently promotes its action and exhalation.

II. Wool is much less a heat-conductor than linen or cotton, and thus diminishes the withdrawal of animal heat, maintaining a higher temperature throughout the skin and body.

III. Wool, when made up into porous material, has, owing to its great warmth and porousness, the considerable advantage over linen and cotton, that it throws off the exhaled matters in the form of vapour, thus preventing them from turning to water on the skin. Linen and cotton, on the other hand, by reason of their inferior warmth and porousness, cause these exhalations to be converted into water, and this explains why the body, even when freely perspiring or exhaling, remains dry in woollen clothing, while in linen or cotton it becomes wet, as is matter of common experience with all who engage in athletic exercises.

IV. The exhalations of the body are the means provided by nature for cooling it. The more freely the body exhales or perspires, the more equable will be its temperature, and the more readily will it deal with an excess of heat, whether proceeding from inward or outward causes. Hence wool, while warming the skin in a greater degree, is a better preventative than linen or cotton of overheating the blood through internal heat. This explains why, when the skin is accustomed to the stimulating effect, woollen clothing is felt to be less oppressively hot than linen or cotton in summer, causing less perspiration, and is considered more comfortable in the hottest climates.

V. Wool is electrical, while linen and cotton are not; i.e., wool can excite electricity, but will not conduct it. It follows, therefore, that a body clothed in wool loses less of its animal electricity, while fresh electricity is excited on the surface.

Dr. G. Jaeger's Sanitary Woollen Clothing System is therefore salutary for those whose bodies are deficient in animal heat. With persons leading sedentary lives, the action of the skin is usually defective, and requires the stimulating aid of the woollen clothing, which has the effect of eliminating from the tissues the excess of water and fatty matter always ready to accumulate when insufficient exercise is taken.

The System is salutary in cases of catarrh, accumulation of phlegm, fluxions and gouty affections, disorders of the digestive organs, &c. Sometimes these complaints can only be permanently cured through its adoption.

The System is further salutary in cases of tendency to congestions of blood in particular parts, such as in the head—whence arise vertigo, headache, singing in the ears, apoplexy, &c.—and in the chest, causing pains, asthma, coughing, &c. The increased freedom for the passage of the exhalations of the body afforded by the Sanitary Woollen Clothing has an excellent effect on these complaints; and the System may thus prevent the setting in of lung disease, hemorrhoids, spitting of blood, and other fluxions of blood.

The System is salutary for nervous, hypochondriacal and hysterical persons, whose health is especially dependent on the unimpeded exhalation of the skin. It is salutary during and after all serious illnesses, preventing relapses, and for persons who are sensitive to changes in the atmosphere. There can be no better protection against heat, cold, wet, electric, or other atmospheric influences. The System is therefore salutary in climates and conditions of life subject to frequent and sudden changes, and especially in travelling. Chills contracted through draughts or cold, damp clothes or bedding, are very dangerous, because the exhalations of the body are suddenly checked, interfering with the circulation of the blood, thus disturbing the action of the lungs, the liver, the stomach, &c., and setting up inflammation and fever.

#### DR. G. JAEGER'S SANITARY WOOLLEN OUTER-CLOTHING.

The material should consist throughout of pure wool, sanitarily dyed, or of the natural colour, and should offer as little impediment as possible to the passage of the exhalations of the skin.

It should, therefore, be not unnecessarily thick. The web should be porous and pervious to the light; and very closely woven textures should be avoided, the best being the so-called "stockingnette" or "tricot." As exhaled vapours move similarly to rays of light—i.e., in a straight direction, they are impeded by accumulation of web over web, the pores of the upper surface obstructing those beneath. The ordinary waistcoat between coat and shirt, and padding in the coat, should therefore be dispensed with. Overcoats should not be worn, except in extreme cold, such as is seldom experienced in this country. If the material be of the proper thickness, the same clothing may be worn summer and winter; if any difference be made, it should consist of lighter or heavier shirts and trousers.

The clothing should fit so closely that the air between it and the body cannot move in an ascending direction, producing a draught of cold air from underneath. This is best attained by the employment of as elastic a web as possible—"the stockingnette"—both for over and underclothing. The coat should button compactly to the figure, and be well closed at the throat, so as to maintain uniform warmth over the whole body. By additional warmth to the middle line of the trunk, where the blood-vessels converge, these are expanded, and the skin exhales more freely and rapidly. This is attained by a double thickness of material along the line in question, both in coat and trousers. The sleeves of the coat should be lined with woollen material, and these as well as the trouser-legs should be closed against upward draughts of air by webbings sewn in them, fitting round the arms and legs, and maintaining an equable temperature.

As ordinary clothing by no means complies with these conditions, special constructions have been devised and patented, avoiding, as far as possible, unusual appearance or departure from the general fashion.

The admixture of greater or less quantities of vegetable fibre in professedly pure woollen fabrics is so general, and is frequently so difficult of detection, that only such material is admitted in Jaeger's Sanitary Woollen Clothing as will bear the test of scientific microscopical examination, and is free from injurious dyes.

#### Dr. G. JAEGER'S SANITARY WOOLLEN BEDDING.

The bedsteads should be made entirely of metal, or if of wood, should be thoroughly painted or varnished, inside and out. The bedding and coverings should consist throughout of materials made from animal fibres—wool, hair, feathers—of the natural colour or sanitarily dyed. Materials of vegetable fibres, such as linen or cotton, should be entirely excluded, for reasons fully explained above.

As the ventilation of the air in the clothing effected by the movements of the body is not attained when in repose, experience has shown that the bedding is a most important part of the Sanitary Woollen System.

The remarks under the last heading as to the frequent admixture of vegetable with animal fibre, apply with at least equal force to bedding materials. For instance, the horsehair stuffing of mattresses is commonly adulterated with a species of grass, which only the closest examination can detect.

#### THE ATMOSPHERE OF THE ROOMS.

To secure the full advantage, as described above, of the Sanitary Woollen System, it is necessary, at all seasons of the year, to sleep with the window open, which may be done without the least danger when the clothing and coverings are woollen. The window must be open in the sleeping-room itself, but the air can be prevented from blowing on the sleeper by the interposition of a blind or curtain. The test of a perfectly ventilated room is simple—it must be free from odour.

A sanitarily clothed person need have as little fear of draughts as of cold and wet, but should avoid overheated, overcrowded, and "fusty" rooms.

# THE RELATION OF THE BODY TO VARIOUS SUBSTANCES.

The following briefly summarises Dr. G. Jaeger's explanation of the importance of the Sanitary Woollen System, in connection with his researches on the diverse character of the body's exhalations.

(Further information is afforded in "Selections from Dr. Gustav Jaeger's Essays on Health-Culture," comprising translations of many of his most important essays which have appeared in his *Die Normal Kleidung* and monthly *Monats-Blatt*.)

Dr. G. Jaeger points out that in the health and sickness of mankind the exhalations and secretions perform a most important part. These exhalations may be divided into two classes, which are of entirely opposite character.

I. The mal-odorous, or "noxious" exhalations, are generated in the body during and after the digestion of food, or when the body is attacked by disease, or the mind is under the influence of depression or dread. The retention of the "noxious" exhalations induces contraction of the blood vessels of the skin, diminishing its power of exhaling and of throwing off heat; relaxation of the tissues, causing accumulation of fat and water and general enervation; increased tendency to disease, as the blood and tissues become more subject to decomposition through adverse influences in proportion to the greater quantity of water which they contain; diminished energy of the muscles, blood vessels, and nerves, and premature ageing.

II. The hitherto unrecognised "salutary" fragrant exhalations, which the body also generates, may from their quickening, healing influence be considered the medicine and healing power implanted by nature in the body. By expanding the blood vessels of the skin, they assist it to throw off moisture, odorous matters, and heat, preventing an excessive internal temperature. They promote the exhalation of the skin, and diminish the tendency of the tissues to accumulate water, rendering them hardy, and less subject to decomposition. There is greater power of resistance to influences of weather, of the emotions, of infection; greater capacity for labour, mental and physical. If sickness sets in, the predominance of the "salutary" exhalations exercises an important healing influence.

The body not only gives off its exhalations in the surrounding air, but also communicates them to all objects with which it and its atmosphere come in contact; for instance, a dog will recognise by the scent anything belonging to its master.

Dr. Gustav Jaeger explains that the relations of these two kinds of exhalations to various materials are diverse.

Metallic substances, glass, and wood of which the pores are closed by paint, varnish, etc., are practically impervious to exhalations, while the two classes of materials next mentioned absorb them, but in very different manner.

I. All vegetable fibres, such as linen, cotton, hemp, jute, paper, unvarnished and unpainted wood, silk, and unsanitarily dyed or dressed wool and leather, attract only the "noxious," "self-poisoning" exhalations and therefore these substances become, when in contact with human beings, gradually offensive and even poisonous in their effect. Clothing

made from such fibres is only agreeable and wholesome when quite new or just washed, but soon becomes saturated with the "noxious" exhalations, producing discomfort and, if wet, when the vapours are set free, becoming especially dangerous.

II. All kinds of animal wool and hair, leather (undressed or sanitarily dyed and dressed), feathers, horn, only absorb the "salutary" exhalations. As soon as clothing made from animal fibre has absorbed the "salutary" exhalations of the body, it becomes exceedingly agreeable, and this feeling grows to one of positive pleasure in the woollen clothing.

# RULES TO OBSERVE IN ADOPTING THE SYSTEM AND GENERAL REMARKS.

To secure its benefits the System must be adopted in its entirety. Much may be effected by wearing the Sanitary Woollen Under-clothing, with coats and trousers altered as far as possible to the Sanitary models; the old linings and padding should be removed, and the coat be made to button closely to the figure; coat-sleeves and trouser legs should be closed against draught by the webbings described above, &c., &c.; as to which advice and assistance will readily be given. The upper and lower coverings of the bed should be woollen, and a spare woollen shirt, drawers, and socks will be found most comfortable to sleep in.

The stimulus temporarily imparted by cold baths to the comparatively stagnant blood-vessels on the surface of the bodies of wearers of ordinary linen or cotton clothing is permanently supplied by the Sanitary Woollen Clothing. Wearers of the latter should, therefore, not dry the body after a bath, and in hot, dry weather should apply a wet sponge over the shirt before putting on the outer-clothing. This may be done without danger, and the evaporation which ensues counteracts the excessive rush of blood to the surface of the body, while adding greatly to the refreshing effect of the bath.

The Sanitary Woollen System requires time to work its full benefits and those who adopt it should not be misled or repelled by symptoms consequent on the efforts of the skin to expel, through its secretions, any disease previously retained in the body through the repression of the exhalations, by the unsanitary ordinary clothing and bedding. In such cases the System performs an inestimable service, as until these secretions are expelled no permanent recovery is possible.

The Sanitary Woollen System does not pretend to promise perfect health under all and every condition, any more than it promises to perpetuate existence. But wide experience has shown that by its adoption disturbances of health are less frequent, and when such take place, they pass away much more quickly, and seldom result in chronic disease. The relief afforded to the healthy body by its freedom from the confinement of the ordinary unsanitary clothing engenders a previously unknown feeling of health and of full possession of the energies.

The Sanitary Woollen System has proved a powerful and lasting cure for diseases (and there are many) caused through the enervation of the tissues of the body by the action of its own or extraneous "noxious" vapours, and the System thus supplies an important gap in the science of healing.

The great sanitary success and widespread adoption in Germany and other countries of Dr. Gustav Jaeger's Sanitary Clothing Reform encourage the conviction that its importance will be quickly recognised in this country.

## FURNITURE.

# Dr. Jaeger's Sanitary Woollen System.

THE remarks of Dr. Jaeger on the diverse relations of the exhalations of the body to various substances (see pages 9 and 10) explain the importance which he attaches to the selection and treatment of the materials employed in the manufacture of Furniture.

Upholstered Furniture is frequently covered, and almost invariably stuffed, with materials of vegetable fibre, which become permeated with noxious odours and exhalations. A sensation of discomfort is often felt when sitting or reclining on an upholstered sofa or chair, and rooms which contain upholstery soon become stuffy if not thoroughly ventilated. Dr. Jaeger asserts that the various emanations proceeding from such Furniture have an incessantly deleterious effect on the atmosphere of rooms.

Dr. Jaeger further requires that the pores of all wood-work shall be closed by paint, varnish, etc. Most furniture is only painted and varnished where the surface is intended to be seen, but noxious odours and exhalations are as readily absorbed by plain wooden surfaces as by material of vegetable fibre in clothing.

Constructions of Furniture specially devised to meet these objections have been patented in this country, and the Company has entered upon arrangements with a leading firm of upholsterers to supply Furniture in accordance with Dr. Jaeger's Sanitary Woollen System. ## OUTFITS FOR INDIA AND THE COLONIES.

Jaeger's Sanitary Woollen Clothing is the best and least cumbersome protection against the evil effects of change of climate and the injury to health which may ensue, not only from extremes of heat and cold, but from ignorance of particular climatic conditions, such as the sudden cooling of the air after sunset, etc. Jaeger's Sanitary Woollen Clothing protects the body from chill and damp, and increases its power of resistance to such diseases as Cholera, Typhus, Dysentery, etc. See Selections from Dr. G. For the tropics, very light under-clothing can be supplied, and white cashmere is recommended as a substitute for the ordinary linen underclothing.

A gentleman who adopted the Sanitary Woollen System for his journey round the world, during which he encountered the most various climatic conditions, has kindly complied with the request to furnish a brief account of his experience of the System.

I have pleasure in stating my experience of Dr. Jaeger's Sanitary Woollen System, under most varying and trying circumstances. I adopted the System during the summer of 1882, and conformed to the general rules laid down by Dr. Jaeger as to sleeping, etc. The results were so satisfactory that I decided to adhere to the system during a journey round the world. I was away nearly a year and travelled through a considerable part of India, Ceylon, and Java, also visiting Australia and the United States.

During the whole journey I enjoyed the most perfect health, and was not even troubled by a single influenza until reaching Melbourne. The Sanitary Woollen System seems to me to be eminently adapted for hot climates and rapid changes of temperature, effectually guarding the body against chills, and protecting it at the same time from the excessive heat of a tropical sun.

I was several times exposed to great variations of temperature in the space of a few hours, but I experienced no ill effects, although I dispensed with greatcoat and wraps. In going from Kandy (Ceylon) to Nuwera Elia, a sanitarium 7,000 feet above the level of the sea, I was transported in about six hours' time from a temperature of 90° Fahr. in the shade (or about 140° in the sun) to 32° or freezing point. I underwent a similar variation of temperature, without change of costume, in journeying from the Plains to Darjeeling, a hill station in the Himalayas, and I had no reason to regret the absence of an overcoat, etc.

Light stockingnette under-clothing, with coat and trousers of white cashmere, all of pure woollen material, appears to me the most suitable dress for the tropics. White flannel will replace the cashmere in place of need, but it does not wash so well, and there is less style about it.

In conclusion I can only state my complete satisfaction with Dr. Jaeger's Sanitary Woollen System, and warmly recommend it to anyone undertaking a similar journey or intending to reside in the tropics. I find the system equally suitable to this climate, and I have worn nothing but woollen material since my return.

### TAILORING DEPARTMENT.

#### JAEGER'S SANITARY COATS AND TROUSERS.

THE material should consist throughout of pure wool sanitarily dyed or of the natural colour, and should offer as little impediment as possible to the passage of the exhalations of the skin.


It should, therefore, be not unnecessarily thick. The web should be porous and pervious to the light; and very closely woven textures should be avoided, the best being the so-called "Stockingnette" or "Tricot." As exhaled vapours move similarly to rays of light—i.e., in a straight direction, they are impeded by accumulation of web over web, the pores of the upper surface obstructing those beneath. The ordinary waistcoat between coat and shirt, and padding in the coat should therefore be dispensed with. Overcoats should not be worn, except in very extreme cold, such as is seldom experienced in this country. If the material be of the proper thickness, the same clothing may be worn summer and winter; if any difference be made, it should consist of lighter or heavier shirts and trousers.

The clothing should fit so closely that the air between it and the body cannot move in an ascending direction, producing a draught of cold air from underneath. This is best attained by the employment of as elastic a web as possible—"the Stockingnette"—both for over and underclothing. The coat should button compactly to the figure, and be well closed at the throat, so as to maintain uniform warmth over the whole body. By additional warmth along the middle line of the trunk, to which the blood-vessels converge, these are expanded, and the skin exhales more freely and rapidly. This is attained by a double thickness of material, both in shirt and coat, from the throat to the abdomen; the sleeves of the coat should be lined with woollen material, and these as well as the trouser-legs should be closed against upward draughts of air by webbings sewn in them, fitting round the arms and legs, and maintaining an equable temperature.

As ordinary clothing by no means complies with these conditions, special constructions have been devised and patented, avoiding, as far as possible, unusual appearance or departure from the general fashion.





Weak Feet are hardened by the unimpeded evaporation set up; the joints are strengthened; corns and other troubles from undue pressure are prevented. Jaeger's Sanitary Boots and Shoes are free from the danger to health involved when the ordinary boot becomes wet, the foot remaining dry and warm even when its covering is wetted through (although the moveable inner soles may be changed with advantage). Tourists are particularly recommended to use Jaeger's Sanitary Boots and Shoes, as on lengthy walking excursions the feet remain longer fresh and capable of exertion.

Care should be exercised in cleaning the Sanitary Boots and Shoes. The dirt must be removed with a clean brush, and ordinary blacking can be applied to the margins of the soles, and to the heels. But the outer leather equipment should be treated exclusively with a specially prepared blacking or mineral grease, in order to preserve its porosity. This prepared blacking should be lightly rubbed in with a small sponge every 3 or 4 days, and after the leather has been allowed about 10 minutes to dry, a soft brush should be used to it.



C D-Width over the ball of foot.


E F-Height over instep.



#### Directions for Washing the Sanitary Woollen Under-clothing.

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The clothes should be placed in water in which soap has been boiled up, the temperature recommended being 30° Reaumur (or about 100° Fahr.) Any good soap may be used. Add about an ounce and a half of ammonia, which instantaneously removes all grease and perspiration, and wash out the clothes at once, as rapidly as possible, without delaying to rinse them. In washing out, draw the clothes through the hand, avoiding rubbing; after lightly wringing them out, pass the clothes through two separate quantities of luke-warm water, free from soap and ammonia. Hang up the clothes to dry immediately, if possible in the open air, and iron them when half dry, stretching them to the necessary length; this is especially important with the collars.

Washing out quickly is particularly advised, and the careful observance of these instructions will be found greatly to conduce to the durability of the clothes, preventing them from shrinking.

Disregard of the foregoing instructions, and carelessness in washing, will do infinite harm to the Sanitary Woollen Clothing, causing it to shrink up, and spoiling the quality of the texture.
