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
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

HE great Benefits the Difeafed Poor have received from the Infirmaries, which have been of late Years eftablished within this Kingdom, fufficiently fhew how very useful they are.

This Kind of Charity has many special Advantages. In common Cafes the Poor may be provided with Necessaries by the Parishes A

Parishes to which they belong: But in cafe of Illnefs, a convenient Lodging, Nurfes, Diet, and feveral other Things are abfolutely neceffary, and yet fcarce ever to be had; for want of which the Poor, even though they should be attended by proper and skilful Perfons, would in a great many Cafes find the Endeavours of the best Phyficians or Surgeons fruitles.

But befides those who are intitled to Parochial Relief, these Hospitals are intended for the Reception of many others, who, tho' not reduced to take the Alms of the Parish, may nevertheless become great Objects of Charity, after having, by Dint of Industry, and hard Labour, supported their Families, by accidental Hurts or Sickness becoming a Burthen to those whom they formerly maintained, and rendring a whole Family miserable.

Thefe great Evils cannot otherwife be cured than by eftablifhing Publick Hofpitals for the Sick and Lame Poor, in which the Care, Neatnefs, Lodging, and Regularity of Diet, will in all Cafes much facilitate the Recovery; and, in the Cure of fome Diftempers, are more effectual than Phyfick itfelf.

These and several other Reasons, which it would be needless to urge in Behalf of a Charity, the Usefulness of which is so apparent, together with the Eftablishment of an Infirmary at Winchester, occasioned a Talk of erecting one at *Tork*, for the Ufe of this County. Every one was convinced of the Benefit which would arife from it, and the Lady Elizabeth Hastings, well known for her Goodness to the Poor, was pleased to declare, that if such a Charity was fet on Foot, fhe would contribute One Thousand Pounds: But nothing being done for a long Time after, though the Talk still continued, occasioned the faid Lady, when she made her Will, to leave only Five Hundred Pounds; and that on Condition that fuch a Charity should be fet on Foot in a Time therein limited.

The Lofs of Five Hundred Pounds, and the Danger of lofing Five Hundred Pounds more, occafioned feveral well difpofed Perfons to meet and open a Subfcription; which fucceeded fo well, that a Houfe was agreed to be hired, and furnifhed, for the Reception of as many of the difeafed Poor as it could conveniently contain. This was accordingly done, and Servants were hired, feveral Patients were admitted into the Houfe, and feveral others who could A 2 not not be admitted, were relieved by the Advice and Medicines which they received from thence.

The Numbers that were cured, and the good Ufage with which they had been treated, foon gave the Infirmary a Reputation, and the Number of Subfcribers and Benefactors accordingly increased.

The Legacy of Five Hundred Pounds left by Lady *Elizabeth Haftings* being received, and feveral other confiderable Benefactions fent in; it was thought neceffary to purchafe a Piece of Ground in fome convenient Place, in, or near the City of *Tork*, in Order to erect a new Infirmary, which, being built by a Plan contrived for that very Purpofe, in which all the Offices would be difpofed in the beft Manner, might be much more convenient than any Houfe that could be hired.

A Piece of Ground near Monk-Bar was accordingly bought, and a general Meeting of all the Subscribers was appointed, to confider in what Manner, and to whom the Land should be conveyed; when it was agreed, that the Estate should be vested in Thirteen of the Subscribers; who were then named and appointed, viz.

In Truft for a Publick Infirmary for the County of *Tork*: Subject to the Regulations which fhould be made, for the Government thereof, by a Court of Governors, with the Confent of a Majority of the Truftees. As likewife, that the Number of Truftees fhould be always kept compleat, by electing new ones from amongft the Subferibers, in the Room of fuch as fhould die, or refign their Truft.

This Conveyance being figned, a Committee was appointed to confider of a Body of Rules for the future Government of the Infirmary, to be reported on a certain Day, to which the Meeting was adjourned. The Report was made, and the following Rules agreed to.

RULES



RULES and ORDERS

Agreed on by the

Trustees and Governors

OFTHE

INFIRMARY or HOSPITAL for the County of YORK,

At their General Meeting, on the 28th Day of *February*, in the Year of our Lord 1742, in Purfuance of an Indenture of Release, Dated the 19th Day of the same *February*.

RULES and ORDERS relating to the TRUSTEES, in Pursuance of the Indenture above-mentioned.

I.

T HAT the Truftees mentioned in the above-named Indenture be a feparate Court, (independent on the Governors hereafter mentioned) whose Powers shall be as follows. No lefs than five Truftees shall act as a General Court, which may appoint a Committee of three, with Powers of acting till the next General Court; whose Acts during that Time shall be valid, provided they contradict not the fundamental Rules following.

III.

They shall have no Vote in a Court of Governors, nor be of their Committee; but in all other Things shall act, as intitled, by their Subscription.

IV.

They shall have a Negative in chusing the Treasurer, Physicians, Surgeons, Apothecary, and Steward, and likewise in changing them: All which shall be chosen, or removed, by a General Quarterly Court; never by a Committee of either one, or both Courts.

V.

All Elections, or Removals, of this Kind fhall be determined by balloting; and in Cafe the Numbers on both Sides be equal, the Truftee first named in the Indenture, who is there prefent, shall have a Casting Vote. A Week's Notice shall be given them by the Governors of their General Court: Befides which, the Trustees may meet by their own Appointment; and if they see Occasion, appoint a Committee.

VII.

They may proceed in what Manner they pleafe in their own Body, except in electing or difplacing of Officers, which must always be done in the Manner above-mentioned.

VIII.

They, or a Committee appointed by them, must be prefent at the General Audit, which shall be once in a Year; namely, on the second *Tuesday* in May: The Quarterly Courts to be on the same Day of August, November, and February, respectively at three o'Clock in the Afternoon.

IX.

If in flating the Accounts of the preceding Year, it appears that the Current Expences have exceeded the Annual Income of the Hofpital, the Truftees shall have a Power of striking off, or less shall have a reduce the Expences to agree with the Income of the preceding Year. Upon the Demife or Refignation of any Truftee, a Week's Notice shall be given (by the Governors) to the reft, who at a Court appointed by themselves for that Purpose, shall chuse a new One, within the Space of three Months; which new One shall be chosen out of such as are, and were Governors before the Demise, or Resignation above-mentioned; who shall have the same Power as those mentioned in the Deed of Truft.

XI. ·

The Concurrence of the Truftees, or of their Committee, shall be necessary in contracting with Workmen, or any others concerned in furnishing Materials for building, repairing, or fitting up the Hospital.

XII.

If on the Election of any of the Principal Officers, namely the Treafurer, Phyficians, Surgeons, Apothecary, or Steward, Difputes shall arife between the Court of Trusses, and that of the Governors, so that the Election be not determined at either of the two first General Quarterly Courts next enfuing; then it shall be in the Power of the remaining Principal Officers above-mentioned, or the Majority of them, at a Meet-

ing

ing held for that Purpofe, of which a Week's Notice fhall be given, to appoint a proper Perfon to fupply fuch Vacancy, till a new One be chofen, by the joint Confent of the Truftees and Governors, according to the true Intent and Meaning of the Indenture, that the Progrefs of the Hofpital be not interrupted.

RULES and ORDERS relating to the GOVERNORS, in Pursuance of the Indenture above-mentioned.

I.

THE Governors shall be a seperate Court (distinct from, and independent on, the Trustees) which shall consist of such Benefactors, as either give Twenty Pounds to the Hospital, or subscribe Two Pounds per Annum.

II.

As many of these as will, not less than Seven, when affembled, form a Court; but no Subscriber shall be accounted a Member of the Court, or have a Vote, till his Subfoription be paid.

III.

A Week's Notice shall be given of eve-

ry

ry General Court, which shall meet four Times every Year, at the Times specified in the 8th Article of the Orders, relating to the Trustees.

IV.

They may appoint other Meetings at fuch Times as they judge convenient, and appoint a Committee with full Powers, whose Acts shall be binding till the next General Court.

V.

The Court shall nominate a Chairman, and appoint its own Ways of Proceeding, except in electing or discharging the principal Offiers, which shall always be done by Ballot, as mentioned in the Articles relating to the Trustees, and in case the Votes are equal, the Chairman shall have a Casting Vote.

VI.

The Court fhall have the Cognizance and Direction of all Matters relating to the Receipt or Disburfments of Money, for the current Expences of the Hofpital, independent of the Truftees, except in the Cafe fpecified, at the General Audit ; but to all new and uncommon Expences, or what relates to building, repairing, or fitting up the Hofpital, the Concurrence of the Truftees alfo fhall be neceffary.

VII.

VII.

The Court may chuse the Housekeeper, Cook, Nurses, and under Servants, or remove them as they think convenient, without the Consent of the Trustees.

VIII.

The Court may make fuch Rules as they think neceffary, about the admitting or difcharging of Patients, and Management of the House.

IX.

The Court may elect a Treasurer, two Physicians, two Surgeons, one Apothecary, and a Steward; and recommend them to the Trustees, at the General Quarterly Courts; all which must have the Approbation of the Trustees also, before they can act as such.

Х.

All future Orders (except the Powers herein before fpecified) agreed on by the Court of Governors, fhall be fent to the Court of Truftees for their Approbation, and be fign'd by them alfo, otherwife be null.

XI.

That as the Governors are a more numerous and variable Body than the Truftees, all Orders pass'd in the Court of Governors, nors, requiring the Concurrence of the Truftees, fhall be fign'd by Five of their Body, in the Name of the whole, and be brought to the Truftees by them, for their Concurrence.

RULES and ORDERS relating to the Physicians and Surgeons.

I.

THAT each Physician and Surgeon attend alternatively by their Weeks, to take in Patients, on the Days of Admission.

II.

That each Patient shall belong to the Physician or Surgeon respectively, in whose Week they are admitted.

III.

That no Phyfician or Surgeon, whether belonging to the Hofpital or not, prefume to order or intermeddle with the Patients who are not under their own Care, except defired by the Perfon to whom they belong.

IV.

That their Bufiness on the Days of Admission be, to report the Condition of the Patients recommended, to the Governors who attend, attend, but they shall not take in, except there be no Governors present.

V.

They shall make a Report of the Difcharge of their Patients if required.

VI.

That each Surgeon or Phyfician, whofe Affairs or Indifpofition fhall oblige him to be abfent from the Hofpital, fhall depute fome other to officiate for him during his Abfence, that the Patients be not neglected, always preferring those of the Hofpital to others.

VII.

That no Surgeon prefume to order any internal Medicines except in Cafes Chirurgical, nor any Phyfician to act as a Surgeon; but that in difficult and mixt Cafes, namely, where the Conftitution of the Patient and Nature of the Humours, are to be confidered, the Phyfician fhall be confulted; who fhall give his Opinion jointly with the Surgeon; and in cafe they do not agree in Opinion about treating the Difeafe, the other Phyfician and Surgeon fhall alfo be confulted, that the beft Method of Cure may be taken for the Patient.

RULES

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RULES and ORDERS relating to the APOTHECARY.

THE Apothecary shall keep a Book of the Names, Ages, Admission, Parish, Recommendation, and Discharge of the Patients.

II.

He shall keep a regular Account of the Prescriptions, and not make up or administer any Medicines but by Directions of the Physicians or Surgeons, neither shall he practife for himself.

III.

He fhall put a Ticket over every Patient's Bed, containing their Names, Places they came from, when admitted, and fpecifying the Phyfician or Surgeon to whom they belong.

IV.

He shall keep a Check Book of such Commodities as are bought in, on the Shop Account.

V.

He fhall not be absent from the Hospital without Leave of the Physicians or Surgeons, and shall leave Directions with the Matron where he may be found, during such Absence.

RULES

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RULES and ORDERS relating to the TREASURER.

I.

THE Treasurer shall sign all Tradefmen's Bills before they are paid, and produce a regular Account when called on by the Trusses, or Governors, or their Committees.

II.

He shall take a proper Security of the Steward, and receive and iffue out Money for the Use of Hospital.

RULES and ORDERS relating to the STEWARD or SECRETARY.

I.

I IE shall keep a regular Account for himself, and Post from Time to Time the Publick Accounts.

II.

He fhall pay off fuch Bills as are figned by the Treafurer, fhall examine them all by the Check-Books before Payment be made, and produce his Accounts when called on by the Court of Governors, their Committee, or the Treafurer.

III.

III.

He shall collect the Subscriptions, and receive Benefactions, giving Receipts; and shall pay them into the Treasurer's Hand, when demanded.

IV.

He shall lay out the Money committed to him, faithfully, and to the best Advantage, for the Use of the Hospital, without any Partiality to one Trader more than another.

V.

He shall attend the General Courts, both of the Trussees and Governors, and their Committees, and enter their Orders.

It is agreed, That the pretent Officers
be continued, and no new ones taken in
till a Vacancy shall happen, either by the
Demise, Refignation, or Removal of any
of them by the Trustees and Governors;
after which the faid Vacancy shall be
fupplied, as before directed.

The Court of Governors, in Pursuance of the Power vested in them by the 6th and 8th of the above Rules relating to the Governors, have made the following ORDERS.

I.

ORdered, That a Subscriber of One Pound per Annum shall be allowed to have one Out Patient on the Hospital-Book at a Time, and no more; and that a Subscriber of two Pounds per Annum shall be allowed one Out, or one In Patient at a Time, and no more; and a Subscriber of three Pounds per Annum shall be allowed one Out and one In Patient at a Time. That a Benefactor, who at one Time has given to the Infirmary the Sum of Twenty Pounds, shall be equal to an Annual Subscriber of two Pounds; and so in Proportion for greater or less Sums.

II.

Ordered, That the Whole of all Annual Subscriptions shall be collected as near as can be to the Beginning of each Year, which shall commence at May-day; and that the Receipt given shall be in Form following, viz.

And that no Subscriber, who shall not have paid in his Subscription within three Months after May-day, at the Beginning of the Year, shall be allowed to recommend a Patient till the Subscription is paid in.

III.

* Ordered, That no Perfon, however recommended, who fhall appear to belong to the Parish of St *Maurice*, shall receive any Benefit from the Infirmary.

IV.

Ordered, That the Cafes of Patients to be recommended, who live at a Diftance from the Infirmary, may be properly drawn up, and fent to the Hofpital by Letter, Poft paid, to which an Anfwer shall be return'd, whether, and when, such Patients may be admitted.

V.

* As the Parish have Assessed the Hospital to their Poor, it was thought unreasonable that they should have any Beness from the Charity. Ordered, That the Times of Admiffion be on *Mondays* and *Thurfdays*, between Ten and Eleven o'Clock in the Morning, and that no Patient be admitted without a proper Recommendation, except only, accidental Hurts which require immediate Relief, for thefe may be admitted at all Times and without Recommendations; and that no Children under feven Years old fhall be made In-Patients, except only, those who are to be cut for the Stone.

VI.

Ordered, That the Salaries and Wages of the Officers and Servants of the Hofpital, fhall be as followeth.

SOON after, a Plan for the New Hofpital was defigned and agreed on, and Workmen contracted with for the Building, which which is at prefent pretty well advanced, and it is hoped will be covered in this Summer.

A Housekeeper, or Matron, who takes Charge of all the Houshold Goods and Furniture; weighs and examines the Provisions, keeping a Check-Book, as well for them, as for every Thing else which comes in on the House Account; and is to take Care that all the Nurses, and other Servants do their Duty.

A Cook, who is to drefs the Patients Victuals, according to the Diet order'd by the Phyficians and Surgeons, of which fhe is to keep an Account, and to clean all the Low Rooms.

Nurses, who are to attend the Patients and keep them in order, to see that they take their Medicines as directed; to be accountable table to the Housekeeper for the Rowlers and Cloth which they receive from her on the Patients Account, and to keep their Wards clean.

The Apothecary's Man, who is to follow the Directions of the Apothecary, to carry Meffages, and do any other neceffary Work which is required for the Service of the Hofpital.

> It is also proposed to allow a Salary to a Clergyman, who shall read Prayers, and officiate in the Hospital.

In-Patients, viz. Such Patients as are admitted into the House. They are not to go out of the Hospital without Leave from the Physician or Surgeon under whose Care they are; to behave themselves decently, and affist the Servants in doing the Hospital-Work, as far as they are able, by Permission of their Physician or Surgeon.

Out-Patients, who have the Benefit of Advice and Medicines, but are not admitted into the House. They are to attend at the Times appointed by the Apothecary, bringing their own Gally-Pots and Vials for the Medicines, The Manner of admitting Patients is as follows: The Perfons defiring to be admitted are to attend on *Monday* or *Thurfday* in the Morning, between Ten and Eleven o'Clock, at the Hofpital, with Recommendations figned, purfuant to the Order of Court, before-mention'd. A Form of which Recommendation is as follows:

To the Governors of the Infirmary for the County of York,

Gentlemen,

I defire you will admit of the Parifs of to be a Patient of the County Hospital, and you will oblige,

Your humble Servant,

The Phyfician and Surgeon in Waiting, examine the Condition of the Perfons thus recommended, which they report to fuch Governors as pleafe to attend, who may take into the Hofpital, or make Out Patients of fuch as they think proper, giving a Reafon to fuch as are not admitted. But it is expected that all Perfons who are taken in, fhall depofit in the Apothecary's Hands the Sum of Twenty Shillings, as Caution-Money, to indemnify the Hofpital from any Charge which may arife from burying burying or removing them; which Money, when they go out, is to be returned.

In keeping the Accounts, the Bills or Notes which come in are all examined by the Steward with the Check-Books, which are kept by the Housekeeper or Apothecary; if he finds they agree, after figning the Notes, they are fent to the Treasurer, who likewife, if he thinks proper, may reexamine them, before he likewife fign them for Payment. The Steward and Treafurer has each his diffinct Account, which is audited once a Quarter; and once a Month is Posted into the General Account Book, which is kept in a mercantile Manner, where every Article is diffributed under its proper Head : This Book is kept at the Hofpital for the Infpection of the Governors who please to call for it, and the whole Account is closed once in the Year, against the General Audit.

They who shall be disposed to contribute to this Hospital by their Last Will and Testament, may do it in the following Form.
