habited with her about a Month; then left her, and returned to his own Seat, Lulworth-Castle, where he continued till February, 1728-9, and came back to his Wife at her Father's Seat, and stayed with her about Three Weeks. Left her there a fecond Time, and went home to Lubworth - Castle, and continued there till the latter End of May following. Then returned to her again for One Week. After this they both came to London, and cohabited as Man and Wife for about Five or Six Weeks. After which Time Mr. Weld goes home to Lulworth, and stayed there till November following; Mrs. Weld goes to her Father's, where Mr. Weld and the again cohabited for about Three or Four Weeks. He leaves her there; but thinks, in all this Time, that he did once or twice CARNALLY Know her *. Likewife,

wife acknowledging her to be Able, Apt, and Fit for the PROCREA-TION of Children. Yet, farther confesses, that, for Relief of his Natural Impotency, he confulted Mr. John Williams, a Surgeon, who advised him to apply to Dr. Mead; this, he did not do, but applied to Dr. Strother concerning the fame. Lastly, he owns that he did declare to the Duke of Norfolk and Mr. Colclough, that he had not Consummated his Marriage; and that his Wife will not therefore any longer cohabit with him. Heurged to her, that, Many married People had lived together like Brother and Sifter *. But this Kind of matrimonial Life his Spoule justly difliked, replying, My Dear, we ought not to live together after this Manner. All the Fair Sex will agree with Mrs. Weld, that a married State

INTRODUCTION.

AVING upon OATH (made before the late Right Hon. and truly upright Judge, Sir Robert Raymond, Lord Chief Justice of his Majesty's Court of B

of King's-Bench, on the 10th Day of March 17;2) published all the genuine Proceedings I could then procure, in a Cause depending in the Arches Court of Canterbury, between the Hon. Mrs. WELD and her Hufband, whom the libelled for IM-POTENCY. I now offer, according to my Promife, what was in that Tract omitted, viz. Nineteen LET-TERS, which were fent to the LADY by her HUSBAND, sometime before the commenced the Suit against him; as likewise one LETTER wrote by her to his MOTHER, which is here inferted. And as the Abstracts of the feveral DEPOSITIONS in the former Tract, made by Matrons and Surgeons, were fo imperfect, that there did not, I acknowledge, appear fufficient Grounds to found a Sentence upon them: The Reader will find in this Tract, the full Substance of all those DEPOSI-TIONS,

TIONS, which were, indeed, the most material in the Cafe. Here is farther added, a just Translation of the Sentence given in the Court of Arches, which was confirmed (upon an APPEAL) by the Court of Delegates, a Sentence, in every Part, esteemed by all Men of Learning, most equitable : For, tho' a Caufe of Frigidity and Impotency may be justly commenced after Three Years Cohabitation of the Parties Married, where no Confummation was had, when repeated Endeavours were used to that End; and, tho' this plainly appears to be the Cafe here, from the Answer of Mr. WELD himfelf, from the DE-POSITIONS of Witness of great Honour and Credit, containing frequent Complaints made by him of his own Inability that Way; from the Reports likewife of the Matrons who inspected the Lady; yet it appearing in the fame Caufe, by the B 2

the Report of very able Surgeons, commissioned to inspect the Hufband, that he was then, before Sentence given, able to perform the Act of Generation to all Intents and Purposes; and, moreover, the former Obstruction and Caufe of the Husband's not Confummating his Marriage, being clearly accounted for, by Mr. Williams, another skilful Surgeon, and the Removal of the Obstacle attested by him. The Court could not be supposed to give any other Sentence than what they did; for it must ever be allowed a fufficient Reason to discharge the Husband from fuch Complaints made by his Wife against him; that, there is, at the Time, an Ability to confummate the Marriage notwithstanding any previous Defect.

One Thing more, I beg leave to fay, That without enquiring into the the Cafe of Others differently circumftanced from the prefent, this Lady muft always be efteemed blamelefs in commencing this Suit, as *fbe* was herfelf, and her Husband likewife, a Roman Catholick. For it is very well known, that by their Religion, Matrimony is a Sacrament; and it is underftood amongft those People, that this Sacrament is violated by fuch as continue together in that State, while they are confcious to themfelves, that they cannot Answer the holy Ends of MATRIMONY.

IN the Name of God Amen. We JOHN BETTESWORTH, Doctor of Laws, Official-Principal of the Arches Court of Canterbury, London, lawfully conftituted, rightly and duly Proceeding, having heard, feen, and understood, and fully and maturely difcuffed the Merits of a certain Caufe of Nullity of Marriage, by Reason of Impotency and Frigidity, which is controverted, and remains undetermined before us in Judgment, between between the Hon. Catherine Elizabeth Weld, otherwise Aston, the Wife of Edward Weld, Efq; of Lubworth-Castle in Dorsetsbire, of the Diocefe of Briftol, and Province of Canterbury, the Party Agent and Complainant on the one Part. And the Proctor also of the faid Catherine Elizabeth Weld, earneftly praying Sentence and Justice to be done to his Party. And having first carefully and diligently fearched into, and confidered the whole Proceedings had, and done, before Us in this Cause; and having observed All and fingular the Matters and Things, that G 2

that by Law, in this Behalf, ought to be observed, in order to give our Definitive Sentence and final Decree in this Caufe. That the faid Catherine Elizabeth cohabited with the faid Edward Weld at the faid Lady Howard's Houfe in Ormond-Street, at the efpecial Request and Defire of the faid Edward Weld, or, at least, by and with his good Liking and Confent, and continued at the faid Lady Howard's House, and at the faid Lord Aston's in Hertfordshire, until

until his Return to her, which was not till on or about the 17th Day of November following, with the like good Liking and Confent of the faid Edward Weld.

15. That the faid Edward Weld, and Catherine Elizabeth, during the faid Time from the faid 29th of July 1729, to the 17th of November following, did correfpond together by Letters after a very affectionate Manner; and the faid Edward Weld, in fome of the Letters he fent to her during the faid Time, did promife, from Time to Time, to return to her, and excufed himfelf for not returning to her by the Time he propofed to her, when he parted from her.

16. That for a Supply of Proof of the Premises, of the Three foregoing Articles, and to all other Intents and Purposes in Law what-L 2 foever,

foever, the Party proponent doth exhibit, and hereunto annex, feveral Original Letters, marked, No. 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, which the faid Edward Weld wrote and fent to the faid Catherine Elizabeth, at or about the respective Times of the Dates thereof, and doth alledge, that the whole, Series of all the faid Letters, marked No. 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, and the feveral Subscriptions thereto, and Dates thereof, to be all of the proper Handwriting of the faid Edward Weld, and fo known and believed to be, by Perfons who have feen him write, and are well acquainted with his Character and Manner of Handwriting, and that the fame were fent by him to the faid Catherine Elizabeth; and that by the Words, My Dear, wrote at the Top of the faid feveral Letters, he the faid Edward Weld did mean and intend the foever

the faid Catherine Elizabeth, Party in this Cause; and that the faid Letter, marked No. 18, was wrote and fent by the faid Catherine Elizabeth, on or about the 11th Day of November 1729, at which Time the faid Edward Weld was at the faid Lady Howard's House in Ormond-Street, and had been there for a Week, or nine Days, before, improving himfelf upon the Harpficord, with the Affiftance of Mr. Lally, a Music-Master, mentioned in the Postfcript of the faid there till the 8th Day of Letter.

17. That on or about the faid 17th Day of November, 1729, the faid Edward Weld came to the faid Catherine Elizabeth, then at the faid Lord Afton's House, and continued to live with her there, and lay together, in one and the fame Bed, Solus cum fola, & mudus cum nuda, till the first Day of December following,

following, and then the faid Edward pretending to have Bufinefs in London, went thither, and did not alk the faid Catherine Elizabeth to go with him, but promifed to return again foon to her at the faid Lord Afton's House; but not coming fo foon as he had promifed, did fend a Letter of Excuse to her, dated upon the 9th of December 1729, and did not return to her till on or about the 20th Day of the faid Month, and, from that Time, continued to live with her there till the 8th Day of January following, and lay in one and the fame Bed, Nudus cum nuda, solus cum sola: That within the last mentioned Time, to wit, on or about the last Day of December, the faid Edward Weld did tell the faid Catherine Elizabeth, that he intended, in two or three Days, to go to Lubworth-Castle, and did then ask the faid Catherine Elizabeth if :eniwoiloi ihe

she would not go with him; that the the faid Catherine Elizabeth did not then refuse to go with the faid Edward Weld, or tell him that she would not go with him to Lubworth-Castle; but confidering that it was in the Winter, and a bad Time for Travelling, she did ask him, How he did think her Father would like it, or approve of her taking so long a Journey in that Season of the Year; and the faid Edward Weld did not, after that Time, during his Stay at the faid Lord Afton's House, mention any thing to the faid Catherine Elizabeth about her going with him to Lulworth-Castle, or taking any Notice to the Lord Afton, or any of the Family, that he was defirous of having her go with him there.

18. That for Supply of Proof of the Premises in the foregoing Article, and to all other Intents

Intents and Purposes of Law whatfoever, the Party proponent doth exhibit, and hereunto annex the faid Letter, dated the 9th Day of December 1729, marked Nº. 19, and doth alledge, that all the faid Letter, Subscription thereto, Date thereof, and Superfcription thereon, is all of the proper Hand-writing of the faid Edward Weld, and fo known and believed to be, by Perfons who have feen him write, and are well acquainted with his Character and Manner of Handwriting, and that the faid Edward Weld did, on or about the Date thereof, fend the fame by the General Post, as directed to the faid Catherine Elizabeth Weld.

19. That the faid Edward Weld did, on or about the 8th Day of January 1729, leave the faid Catherine Elizabeth at the faid Lord Afton's Houfe, and came to London to

to the Lady Howard's Houfe aforelaid, where he stayed for three or four Days, within which Time the faid Edward Weld did acquaint the faid Lady Howard, that he was going to Lubworth-Caftle, and had asked his Wife to go with him, who had given him no direct Anfwer; and thereupon the faid Lady Howard told the faid Edward Weld, that, She believed the Lord Afton had been with Counfel, advising about his not having confummated his Marriage, which might be the Reason of her giving him no positive Answer; and the faid Lady Howard did then tell the faid Edward Weld, that, He would do well if he would advise with Counsel also, concering the same; to which the faid Edward Weld replied, that There was no Occasion for That; for altho' they did not Bed or Lye together (meaning himfelf, and the faid Catherine Elizabeth) they might live together M

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as Brother and Sifter; and that was all he defired, as the faid Edward Weld did then express himself, or to the fame Effect and Purpose.

20. That during all the Time the faid Edward Weld and Catherine Elizabeth lived together, and cohabited at the faid Lord Afton's, and the faid Lady Howard's, as in the preceeding Article is mentioned, he the faid Edward Weld was received and entertained by them with great Kindness and Civility; and the the faid Catherine Elizabeth behaved herfelf towards him in a very dutiful Manner; and he the faid Edward Weld, some short Time before his going to Lubworth-Castle, as in the preceeding Article is mentioned, was very kindly invited by the faid Lord Afton, as also by the faid Lady Howard, to continue and live at their respective Houfes

Houses with the faid Catherine Elizabeth.

21. That foon after the Premifes, to wit, on or about the third Day of February, mentioned in the 13th Article of this Allegation, he the faid Lord Afton did write and fend a Letter to the faid Edward Weld, then at Lubworth-Caftle, and therein did again invite him to come and refide with his Wife at his the faid Lord Afton's House, where he might have a more eafy Recourse for the best Advice and most proper Remedies, to enable him to confummate his Marriage, than he could have at Lubworth-Castle, being so great a Distance from London, or the faid Lord Afton did write and fend a Letter to the fame Effect to the faid Edward Weld; which Letter the faid Edward Weld did receive, but the faid Edward Weld did not send any Anfwer M 2

Answer to the faid Letter to the faid Lord Aston.

22. That in or about the Month of June 1729, the faid Edward Weld being fenfible of his own Inability to confummate his Marriage, did, in Discourse with the faid Catherine Elizabeth, tell the faid Catherine Elizabeth, that, It would signify nothing to advise with Surgeons or Phylicians, for that, in another Year, they must part Beds (meaning thereby, when Three Years after the Time of his pretended Marriage were expired) at which the faid Catherine Elizabeth being much furprised, faid, What, part Beds! He the faid Edward did make Answer, that, They could not in Conscience do otherwise, or expreffed himfelf to the fame Effect and Purpofe.
