GENTLEMEN,

ON February the 6th, 1746, the Prefident and Cenfors of the College were pleafed to fend me a Summons in the Words following:

"SIR,

"THE Prefident and Cenfors of the College of Phyficians, London, do hereby require you perfonally to appear before them on Friday the fixth Day of March next, between the Hours of Five and Six in the Afternoon, at their College in Warwick-Lane, there to anfwer to fuch I "Things " Things as shall be objected to you, con" cerning your Skill in Physic, and your
" Practice thereof. Given at the College of

On *March* the 6th, 1746, I wrote a Letter to the Cenfors Board, to excufe my Attendance; informing them, I intended to enter myfelf a Member of the University of *Cambridge* the then next Term, and hoped they would give me Leave to defer waiting on them until I had my Doctor's Degree from thence.

I afterwards received a fecond Summons from the Prefident and Cenfors in the Words following:

On April the third, 1747, I attended the Cenfors Board, in Confequence of this fecond Summons, and informed them, I was entered of Trinity-College, Cambridge, and defired they would indulge me, as they had done others, until I had obtained my Doctor's Degree from the Univerfity of Cambridge.—The Anfwer given by the Cenfors was, That unlefs I fubmitted to be examined, my Practice fhould be prohibited.

June 27, 1747. The College, on a Report from the Cenfors, were pleafed to interdict

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interdict my Practice by an order in the following Words :

" By Order of the College,

July 21, 1749. I obtained my Detree of a Doctor in Phylic from the University

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"THE Statutes of our College juftly deeming all Perfons ignorant and unqualified for the Practice of Phyfic, who, after fufficient Summons, do not appear to take their Examination before the Cenfors of the College, according to the Laws of the Land; and you having been duly fummoned to appear before the Cenfors, and having refufed to fubmit to to be examined by them;

" The Prefident and College think it their " Duty towards their Country and its Laws " to interdict and prohibit you from exhibiting any Medicines, or giving your Advice, to any fick People, for any Fee or Reward, within the City of London, or feven Miles about, as you will anfwer the contrary in his Majefty's Courts of " Juffice, " Justice, according to the Laws of the " Land in such Case provided.

" By Order of the College,

July 21, 1749. I obtained my Degree of a Doctor in Physic from the University of Cambridge.

Dec. 1, 1749. I attended the Cenfors Board, and produced to them the Diploma of my Degree, and defired Leave to vifit the Fellows in order to my being examined; which being granted,

February 2, March 2, And April 6, 1750. and was directed to attend the College the next Grand Comitia.

April 9, 1750. I attended the College, and defired to be admitted a Candidate, which I was advifed to, as a Graduate of the University of Cambridge, after having gone thro'

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thro' the ufual Examinations, I had a Right to afk; and being withdrawn, was afterwards called in again, and the Prefident verbally informed me the College had refufed my Requeft, without affigning any Reafon for fuch Refufal, or permitting me to read or fee the Minute thereof.

. Oct. 1, 1750. I a second Time after my Examinations attended the Comitia, and by Letter renewed my Request of being admitted a Candidate, agreeable to former Precedents, and the immemorial Cuftom and Usage of this College, with respect to Graduates of both our Universities of Cambridge and Oxford :- And in cafe of Refufal I thereby defired to know the Reafons for fuch Refufal, as also Copies of the Minutes of the Cenfors, or fuch other Entries as had been made in the College Books, with regard to me, fince my first Application to the College, in order that the Validity of those Objections, and my Right to be admitted into the College, might be brought to be determined in a legal Course by the Persons by Law intitled to judge and determine thereon.

To this Letter and Application I then received a verbal Anfwer from the Prefident and College, [by Mr. Mead] That my Affair must be deferred to the next Quarterly Comitia.

On Dec. 22, 1750, being the next Quarterly Comitia, I attended the College a third Time, when a verbal Anfwer was brought me to my Letter and Application of Oct. the first [by Mr. Mead] to this Effect, " The " Prefident acquaints Dr. Schomberg, that " the College is determined not to recede " from their Refolution of the ninth of " April last, with which the Doctor was " then made acquainted by the Prefident; " and with regard to the Copies of the " Minutes and Proceedings which the " Doctor requires, he may, in Company " with any Perfon he thinks fit, fee the faid " Minutes and Proceedings that relate to " him, upon giving proper Notice to Mr. " Mead and the Register. - And upon my " afking Mr. Mead whether I might be per-" mitted to have Copies of them, he faid, the " College had left that to his and the Regi-" fter's Discretion.

In consequence of this Permission I, at the Register's Appointment, attended him, Mr. Mead, and Mr. Geekie, on the 26th of January last, in Company with Mr. Webb, to inspect and take Copies of the faid Minutes. When the Book was produced, and the Minutes read over, and my Sollicitor having begun to take fhort Extracts from them; it was declared to be unneceffary to proceed in that Manner; Mr. Mead then agreeing I should have Copies of them; and for that Purpose Mr. Webb then delivered to Dr. Lawrence a Lift, in Writing, of the Minutes of which he defired Copies to be made, Mr. Webb agreeing to pay for the Copies whatever Mr. Mead should think proper : But Dr. Lawrence expressed a Difficulty of delivering the Copies without an Order of the -Cenfors Board, which, as was then faid, would doubtless be obtained at their next Meeting, which was to be in a few Days. I afterwards fent to the Register for the Copies, who refused to deliver them, faying, the Cenfors Board did not think proper to give any Directions concerning it.

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* February 23d and 25th laft, I fent again to the Register and Mr. Mead, to defire that, as it was not thought proper to give me Copies, I and my Sollicitor might again inspect the Minutes, which the Register said he did not think himself at Liberty to grant, without new Authority from the College.

I am very forry to find myfelf obliged to enter into this long Detail of these Proceedings, but as the Delays I have met with prove very injurious to me, feveral Members of the College having refused to confult with me, under Pretence that by your Order of June 25, 1747, I am interdicted Practice; you will be of Opinion this Proceeding is very unreasonable when you reflect, that that Interdiction was founded fingly upon my not fubmitting to be then examined by the Cenfors. - This you know I have fince done, and have repeatedly applied and offered to be admitted into the College ; and the Cenfors and College, in December 1749, came to a Refolution, " That I had given them " proper Satisfaction." - It therefore feems very hard for any one now to infift that the Inter-

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voured in the fame Manner as all Graduates of our two Universities have been.

He was directed to withdraw; and the Beadle brought him a Paper containing the following Words;

I do affure you, Gentlemen, I never had the leaft Intention to affront the College of Phyficians. And if any Part of my Behaviour has given Offence, I am extremely forry for it.

I hope you will believe this Declaration to be made with the utmost Sincerity of Heart. And if I am fo happy as to be admitted a Candidate, I will do every thing in my Power to promote the Peace, Welfare, and Honour of the College.
