*Subject.*—Annual Report on Mental Hospitals for the year 1956.

I submit the Annual Report on the Mental Hospitals in the State of Bombay for the year 1956 *in two parts*. The Part I contains the report for the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 for the pre-reorganisation Bombay State showing the information for the areas transferred to the Mysore State separately and the Part II of the report covers the period from 1st November 1956 to 31st December 1956 of the New Bombay State.

#### PART I.

#### GENERAL.

2. During the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 all the six Mental Hospitals including the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, which has been transferred to the Mysore State with effect from 1st November 1956, were overcrowded. The actual population in all the Mental Hospitals except in the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, in the first week of January 1956 was 4,176 against the sanctioned accommodation of 2,435. During this period, 435 patients were discharged as "cured" and 440 as "improved". There were 1,233 cases under observation in the various Mental Hospitals. The total number of criminal insanes confined in Hospitals was 241. The total receipts amounted to Rs. 5,46,605. The gross expenditure during this period on maintaining the Mental Hospitals was Rs. 32,47,217. As regards the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, the actual population in this Hospital in the first week of January 1956 was 349 against the sanctioned accommodation of 249. During the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956, 44 patients were discharged as "cured" and 11 as "improved". There were 51 cases under observation in this Hospital. The total number of criminal insanes confined in the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, was 18. The total receipts amounted to Rs. 15,305. The gross expenditure during this period on maintaining the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, was Rs. 2,19,188.

The facilities for indoor and outdoor games were provided to the patients at all Mental Hospitals. The facilities for treatment on modern lines such as insulin shock therapy, Electric Convulsive therapy and Hydro therapy are given at the majority of the Mental Hospitals.

## BUILDINGS.

3. *Major Works.*—The following major works have been started during the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 :—

(a) Providing additional accommodation for 50 beds at the Mental Hospital, Ratnagiri.

(b) Construction of two dormitories for accommodation of 160 patients at the Central Mental Hospital, Yeravda.

(c) Construction of two dormitories for 320 patients at the N. M. Mental Hospital, Thana.

The first major work was expected to be completed by April 1957 and the latter two works are still in progress.

4. *Minor works.*—The minor works costing about Rs. 19,881 were sanctioned at the Mental Hospitals, Yeravda, Thana and Rs. 13,100 at the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, during the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956. The Building of the Mental Hospitals are in fairly good state of repairs.

5. *Water Supply.*—The water supply at the Mental Hospital, Baroda, was adequate during the period under report due to working of the electric motor pump. At the Mental Hospital, Ahmedabad, water is obtained from the Municipal pipe lines. It is good but not sufficient. The water supply for gardens and lawns and for agricultural purposes at this Hospital is obtained by an electric pump which also does not work satisfactorily. The proposal for installation of an additional pump is under consideration. The water supply at the Mental Hospital, Thana, is quite satisfactory. The scarcity of water is felt at the Mental Hospital, Ratnagiri, during the summer viz. from March to May due to the limited water supply from the Municipal water works and drying up of the Hospital wells.

As regards the water supply at the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, adequate water supply is still not available at the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, from the Neesagar scheme. Increased water supply at this Hospital will be available when the Municipality changes its narrow main pipes with bigger ones. This Hospital is now under the control of the Mysore Government and the proposal for installation of an electric pump is under consideration of that Government.

6. *Accommodation.*—Overcrowding at the Mental Hospitals except at the Mental Hospital, Baroda, continued throughout the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 as can be seen from the following table showing the approved scale of accommodation and the actual population in the first week of January 1956 :—

Thus there were 1,741 patients (905 males and 836 females) in excess of the sanctioned accommodation at the Mental Hospitals at Thana, Ratnagiri, Yeravda, Ahmedabad and Baroda and there were 100 patients (76 males and 24 females) in excess of the sanctioned accommodation at the Mental Hospital, Dharwar. In order to relieve the congestion and overcrowding to some extent at the Mental Hospitals, Government in September 1955, had directed that the accommodation at all the Mental Hospitals in the Bombay State should be extended by the construction of dormitories to accommodate at least 50 patients at each of the Mental Hospitals. The work of constructing these dormitories at all the Mental Hospitals (except at the Mental Hospitals, Dharwar) is still in progress. Government have also sanctioned the proposal for construction of additional dormitory in the female section at the Central Mental Hospital, Yeravda.

As regards the construction of dormitory at the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, the plans and estimates for additional accommodation are under correspondence with the Executive Engineer, Dharwar Division, and the Executive Engineer, Karnatak Public Health Works, Dharwar.

7. *Employment on Occupation.*—The employment of suitable patients on various occupations such as gardening, weaving, tailoring, carpentry, broom and bidi making, grinding, cooking, mat-making, ground levelling, sewing, knitting, compound cleaning, basket making and poultry farm work, etc., continued as usual at all these six mental Hospitals. The daily average number of patients employed under Occupational Therapy in the various Mental Hospitals excluding in the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, during the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 was 1,548 and the percentage of the same to the daily average works out to be about 35.4.

The daily average number of patients employed under Occupational Therapy in the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, during the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 was 173 and the percentage of the same to the daily average works out to be 48.

8. *Amusement.*—Indoor and outdoor games such as Carom, ping-pong, card volley ball, badminton, ring-tennis, etc., were provided for the patients at all the six Mental Hospitals. Some of the patients took part in the sports and some of them, enjoyed with interest. Cinema shown, radio-programmes, records were arranged for the entertainment of the patients and they were greatly appreciated by them. Books, newspapers, magazines, periodicals were supplied to the literate patients. A sum of Rs. 6,207 was spent on amusement and recreation of patients during the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 at the Mental Hospitals, Thana, Yeravda, Ahmedabad, Baroda and Ratnagiri.

As regards the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, a grant of Rs. 1,000 for library and periodicals sanctioned by Government was utilised for the purchase of novels, stories, newspapers, etc., for patients.

9. *Visitors.*—The official visitors at all the Mental Hospitals were regular in their attendance and nothing special was reported by any of them.

10. *Parole.*—The system of sending patients on parole has to some extent relieved the congestion at the Mental Hospitals. During the period under report 611 patients (459 males and 202 females) took advantage of it at the Mental Hospitals, Thana, Yeravda, Ahmedabad, Baroda and Ratnagiri and 11 patients (10 males and 1 female) took advantage of it at the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, as compared with 766 patients at all Mental Hospitals in the year 1955.



11. *Special Accommodation.*—The scheme for the provision of special accommodation and facilities to patients who were prepared to pay for such additional amenities introduced at the Central Mental Hospital, Yeravda, continued to be appreciated by the Public.

12. *White House.*—White House, a bungalow about 2 miles away from the Main Mental Hospital, Yeravda, was rented for the patients and was also utilised to keep better class of patients.

13. *Appointment of a Psychiatric Social Worker.*—The proposal for the creation of the posts of Psychiatric Social Worker at the Mental Hospitals, Ratnagiri and Dharwar, was under consideration of Government. Such post has already been sanctioned by Government at the Mental Hospital, Baroda, and such posts already exist at the Central Mental Hospital, Yeravda, the N. M. Mental Hospital, Thana, and Mental Hospital, Ahmedabad.

14. *Acknowledgement.*—The Department expresses its thanks to all bodies and individuals who have extended their generosity towards providing additional comforts for patients in the various Mental Hospitals.

15. *Population.*—The following table shows the admissions, population and the daily average strength of patients in the Mental Hospitals at Thana, Ratnagiri, Yeravda, Ahmedabad and Baroda and in the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, separately for the year 1955 and for the period 1st January 1956 and 31st October 1956 :—

16. *Discharge and Cures.*—During the period under report 435 patients were discharged as “cured”, 440 as “improved”, 87 as “Not improved” and 815 as “otherwise” (which includes the cases discharged on parole) at the Mental Hospitals, Thana, Ratnagiri, Yeravda, Ahmedabad and Baroda. The ratio of cured to daily average strength was 9·9.

At the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, 44 patients were discharged as “cured” and 11 “improved”. The ratio of cured to daily average strength was 12·2.

17. *Sickness and Mortality.*—The daily average number of sick treated in Mental Hospitals, Thana, Ratnagiri, Yeravda, Ahmedabad and Baroda during the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 was 470·61 and at the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, was 20·9. The percentage of sickness to the daily average strength at the above five Mental Hospitals was 10·7 and at the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, was 5·7. There were no cases of any epidemic diseases in the Mental Hospitals during the period under report.

18. During the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956, the total number of deaths at the Mental Hospitals at Thana, Ratnagiri, Yeravda, Ahmedabad and Baroda was 169 as against 227 in 1955. The percentage of deaths to the daily average strength was 6·1 as against 5·1 in 1955.

At the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, the total number of deaths during the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 was 8 as against 11 in the 1955. The percentage of deaths to the daily average strength was 2·2 as against 3·2 in 1955.

The following table shows the percentage of deaths to the daily average strength at each of the Mental Hospitals during the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 and the previous year:—

The chief causes of deaths among the inmates of the Mental Hospitals were pulmonary T.B. and T.B. intestines 11, Mental Deficiency 5, Epilepsy 17, Schizophrenia 12, Diarrhoea and General Debility 7 and Anaemic and General Debility 6, of which 6 deaths were due to Epilepsy and 1 due to T.B. at the Mental Hospital, Dharwar.

## STATEMENT No. II.

19. During the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956, 1,233 cases were under observation at the Mental Hospitals, Thana, Ratnagiri, Yeravda, Ahmedabad and Baroda as compared with 1,297 in 1955. Out of these 1,233 cases, 1,054 were certified and admitted and 145 were released as uncertifiable as compared with 1,123 and 108 respectively in the previous year.

During the period under report 51 cases were under observation at the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, as compared with 52 in 1955. Out of these 51 cases, 38 were certified and admitted and 13 were released as uncertifiable as compared with 43 and 9 respectively in the previous year.

## STATEMENT No. III.

20. The total number of criminal insanes confined in the Mental Hospitals, Thana, Ratnagiri, Yeravda, Ahmedabad and Baroda during the period under report was 241 (154 males and 87 females) as compared with 215 (134 males and 81 females) in the previous year. The daily average strength was 145.33 during the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 as compared with 122.7 in the previous year. Of these 64 were admitted under section 466 of the Criminal Procedure Code, 4 under section 471 (*ibid*) and 4 under section 30 (I) of the Prisoners Act, 1900.

During the period under report the total number of criminal insanes confined in the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, was 18 (15 males and 3 females) as compared with 18 (16 males and 2 females) in the previous year. The daily average strength was 13.5 during the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 as compared with 15.1 in the previous year.

## STATEMENT No. IV.

21. During the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956, the total number of patients admitted for treatment was 2,538 out of which 2,127 were Hindus, 249 were Mohamadans, 126 were Christians and 36 were belonging to other castes.

Of the total number of 81 patients admitted for treatment at the Mental Hospital Dharwar, 69 were Hindus, 7 Mohammedans and 5 Christians.

STATEMENT NO. VIII.

25. *Cash Accounts Receipts.*—The receipts from paying patients during the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 at the Mental Hospitals, Thana, Ratnagiri, Yeravda, Ahmedabad and Baroda amounted to Rs. 4,81,443 as against Rs. 4,87,735 in 1955. The value of stores received from Manufacturing Department less the cost of raw materials at the above Hospitals was Rs. 41,034 and miscellaneous receipts amounted to Rs. 24,128. The total receipts

under three heads at these five hospitals amounted to Rs. 5,46,605 for the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 as against Rs. 5,98,478 in the previous year.

As regards the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, the receipts from paying patients during the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 amounted to Rs. 7,570 as against Rs. 30,066 in 1955. The value of stores received from Manufacturing Department less the cost of raw materials at this hospital was Rs. 6,954 and miscellaneous receipts amounted to Rs. 781. The total receipts under the three heads at this hospital amounted to Rs. 15,305 for the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 as against Rs. 37,902 in the previous year.

26. *Expenditure.*—The gross expenditure on maintaining the Mental Hospitals at Thana, Ratnagiri, Yeravda, Ahmedabad and Baroda during the period under report amounted to Rs. 32,47,217 as against Rs. 30,84,957 in the previous year. Deducting the receipt from the actual expenditure, the net cost to Government during the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 was Rs. 21,54,802 as against Rs. 20,48,133 in the year 1955.

The gross expenditure on maintaining the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, during the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 was Rs. 2,19,188 as against Rs. 2,22,764 in the previous year. Deducting the receipt from the actual expenditure the net cost to Government on maintaining the Mental Hospital, Dharwar, during the period under report was Rs. 1,88,578 as against Rs. 1,46,960 in the previous year.

The amount spent on original works (Major and minor) at the Mental Hospitals are excluded from the expenditure in calculating the cost per patient for ten months from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956.

28. A summarised report of the Central Mental Hospital, Yeravda, for the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 is attached as an Appendix to this report.

## PART II.

Due to reorganisation of States from 1st November 1956, out of the six Mental Hospitals from the pre-reorganisation Bombay State, the Mental Hospital at Dharwar has been transferred to the Mysore State and three Mental Hospitals, viz. Mental Hospital, Nagpur, Mental Hospital, Akwada, Bhavnagar, and the Mental Hospital, Kutch, Bhuj, have been added to the New Bombay State. Thus there are now eight Mental Hospitals in the New Bombay State.

## GENERAL.

2. During the period from 1st November 1956 to 31st December 1956, the actual population in all the Mental Hospitals in the first week of November 1956 was 5,349 against the sanctioned accommodation of 3,075. During this period 85 patients were discharged as "cured" and 97 as "improved". There were 259 cases under observation in the various Mental Hospitals. The total number of criminal insanes confined in Mental Hospitals was 332. The total receipts amounted to Rs. 92,934. The gross expenditure on maintaining the Mental Hospitals was Rs. 5,77,891. The separate information under each of the four units of the Mental Hospitals of the former Bombay State, Kutch, Saurashtra and Vidarbha is given in the statements I to VIII.

3. *Water Supply.*—The position of water supply at the Mental Hospitals at Thana, Baroda, Ahmedabad and Ratnagiri was same as mentioned in Part I of this report.

However, the Mental Hospital, Nagpur, needs improvement in the water supply. The administrative approval to plans and estimates amounting to Rs. 14,863 was accorded by the former Government of Madhya Pradesh for effecting improvement in water supply at this Hospital. The work is being undertaken.

The water supply at the Mental Hospital, Bhuj, is not adequate. The water is fetched from the city well. Due to the inadequacy of water, there is no garden or lawn at this Hospital.

4. *Accommodation.*—The following table shows the approved scale of accommodation and the actual population in the first week of November 1956 at each of the Mental Hospitals :—

Thus there were 2,274 patients (1,230 males and 1,044 females) in excess of the sanctioned accommodation.

As shown in the above table, there is no over-crowding in the Mental Hospitals at Nagpur, Akwada and Kutch but there is an over-crowding at the Mental Hospitals of the former Bombay State except at the Mental Hospital, Baroda, as explained in the first part of the report.

5. *Employment on Occupations.*—As in the case of Mental Hospitals of the former Bombay State the suitable patients at the Mental Hospital, Nagpur, were also employed on various occupations, viz. Agriculture, dairy, gardening, tailoring, weaving, mat making, sewing, needle works, cleaning the grains, ground levelling etc. There are no such facilities at the Mental Hospitals, Akwada, Bhavnagar. The suitable patients were also employed at the Mental Hospital, Bhuj, for ground levelling, compound cleaning and bringing the food for the patients, etc. No other facilities are available for employment of patients at this Hospital also.

6. *Amusement.*—As in the case of Mental Hospitals of the former Bombay State, no facilities for amusements are available at the Mental Hospital, Akwada, Bhavnagar. Such facilities however, exist at the Mental Hospital, Nagpur. Indoor and outdoor games such as carom, Volley ball and Badminton, etc., were provided for the patients at this Hospital. Suitable patients were also sent to the picture house under escort. A Radio set with an amplifier and harmonium are also available for the amusement of the patients. Besides, there is a reading room for the patients where newspapers, magazines and books etc., are provided.

At the Mental Hospital, Kutch, Bhuj, also indoor and outdoor games are provided to the patients. No other facilities are available at this hospital for the amusement of the patients.

7. *Parole.*—There is no system of sending the patients on parole at the Mental Hospitals at Akwada, Bhavnagar and Kutch as in the case of the Mental Hospitals of the former Bombay State. The system of releasing patients on parole continued at the Mental Hospital, Nagpur. During the period from 1st November 1956 to 31st December 1956 one male and 2 females patients were released on Parole at this Hospital. Similarly 106 patients (66 males and 40 females) were released on Parole at the five Mental Hospitals of the former Bombay State.

8. *Special accommodation.*—There is no provision of special accommodation at the Mental Hospitals, Bhuj and Akwada, Bhavnagar, as in the case of Central Mental Hospital, Yeravda. The special accommodation is, however, available only in the paying wards at the Mental Hospital, Nagpur, for which the patient has to pay the scheduled charges of Rs. 60 per month inclusive of diet.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CENTRAL MENTAL HOSPITAL, YERAVDA,  
FOR THE PERIOD FROM 1ST JANUARY 1956 TO 31ST  
OCTOBER 1956.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit herewith the report of the Central Mental Hospital, Yeravda, Poona-6, for the period from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956.

Shri I. K. Mujawar, M.B.B.S., B.M.S., Class I, continued to hold the post of Superintendent at the Central Mental Hospital, Yeravda, throughout the period under reference.

*Accommodation.*—On the 1st of January 1956 there were 1,982 patients as against 1,880 patients on the same day of the previous year.

The daily average number in residence during the period under report was 2,055·59 as against 1,951·77 for the previous year. The number in residence on the 31st October 1956 was 2,139 as against 1,982 on the 31st December 1955.

The authorised total accommodation at the Central Mental Hospital, Yeravda, is for 1,297 patients.

Due to the abnormal increase in the hospital population, it was not possible to accommodate some of the patients comfortably. The existing blocks were always overcrowded as on an average 758·5 patients were over and above the sanctioned strength of accommodation. However the construction of new block in the male side is under progress.

*Admissions.*—The total number of admissions during the period under report was 1,017 ; out of which 688 were males and 329 were females, as against the total of 1,070 patients for the previous year.

The total number of patients treated during the year under report was 2,999 as against 2,950 patients for the previous year.

*Discharges.*—The total number of discharges during the period under report was 811, out of which 544 were males and 267 females. Out of the total number of 811, 160 patients were discharged as recovered and 651 patients as improved or otherwise under section 33-A of Indian Lunacy Act, 1912.

*Deaths.*—There were 49 deaths (31 males and 18 females) during the period under report. The rate of death worked out for the period of 10 months from 1st January 1956 to 31st October 1956 on the basis of the average number of daily residence was 2·38 per cent. as against 3·95 per cent. for the previous year.

*Health of Patients.*—The general health of the patients was satisfactory. There was no epidemic during the period under report.

*Occupation Theraphy.*—The daily number of patients who occupied in different spheres of the hospital, such as hospital garden, kitchen, ward work, weaving and tailoring department and carpenters' workshop, etc., during the period under report was 474 males and 318 females. Some suitable female patients were encouraged to occupy themselves in knitting and needlework.

*Special Therapies.*—The special therapies like Insulin, Electric convulsive therapy, Leucotomy operations and Psychological treatments were given to suitable patients and the number of patients treated with different therapies is as under :—

A statement showing the number of recovery or otherwise in the different therapies, is enclosed.

*Amusements.*—There are recreational clubs in the male and female sections for patients. Patients collect in the recreation rooms and read newspapers, periodicals and magazines. They listen to radio programmes. There are facilities for playing billiards, table-tennis and other indoor games. Twice a week, on Tuesdays and Thursdays, clubs are held in the evenings. Patients have social gatherings, where more than hundred patients take part in club. Besides indoor games, patients play outdoor games like Cricket and Volley ball and etc.

The general annual sports of the hospital patients and staff for the period under report were held in January 1956. Shri Junwalla, Advocate of Poona, was to grace the function by presiding over it; but could not do so on account of unexpected bereavement in his family. The Superintendent of the Yeravda Industrial School was kind enough to send a group of school boys, along with their School band. The boys played music during sports activities. A number of patients and staff members actively took part in the sports like running race, thread and needle race, sack race, three-legged race, relay race and etc. Sweets and fruits were distributed to the patients on the function. Many respectable guests from Poona were present to witness the function.

On important festivals of various communities, sweets and special dishes were served to the patients.

The number of patients that took part in games and etc., is as under :—

1. Cinema shows were arranged in the hospital itself and the total number of patients that attended the shows during the period under report is 20,800 males and 2,324 females.

2. About 40 per cent. of the patients took part in the games and listening to radio, etc.

3. Patients were sent out for drives in the Hospital bus. The total number of patients that went out in the bus drives during the period under report is 1,105 males and 295 females.

A total expenditure of Rs. 3,597-11-0 was incurred on account of amusements from the discretionary grants placed at the disposal of this Hospital, during the period under report.

*Visitors.*—The attendance of visitors was satisfactory. The Social workers and the sick visiting committees also visited the hospital.

The post of psychiatric Social worker at the Central Mental Hospital, Yeravda, has been made permanent. The work of investigating of the Social histories of patients and rehabilitation of some improved patients of Hospital has been carried out satisfactorily.

*Acknowledgement.*—The hospital is indebted in the management of the Bombay Chronicle Daily and Sunday Edition for the supply of copies of their issues to the reading room of the hospital free of charge.

Acknowledgement is also due to Shri A. C. Patel and Shri P. S. Gazdar, wellknown Parsee Gentlemen of Poona and Bombay, respectively, for organising Annual Sports and arranging Social Gatherings every year and distributing Sweets and etc., to the patients.

*White House.*—White house, a bungalow, about 2 miles from the main Hospital is continued to be rented and has been utilised for keeping suitable class and ordinary patients.

The Republic Day and World Health Organisation Day and etc, were observed by holding meetings of the staff and patients of the Hospitals.

I have the honour to submit herewith the report of the Central Mental Hospital, Yeravda, Poona 6, for the period from 1st November 1956 to 31st December 1956.

Shri I. K. Mujawar, M.B.B.S., B.M.S., Cl. I, continued to hold the post of Superintendent at the Central Mental Hospital, Yeravda, throughout the period under report.

*Accommodation.*—On the 1st of November 1956 there were 2139 patients as against 1982 patients on the 1st of January 1956.

The Daily average number in residence during the period under report was 2156·39 as against 2055·59 for the previous period of 10 months. The number in residence on the 31st December 1956 was 2156 as against 2139 on the 31st October 1956.

The authorised total accommodation at the Central Mental Hospital, Yeravda, is for 1297 patients.

Due to abnormal increase in the hospital population, it was not possible to accommodate some of the patients—comfortably. The existing blocks were always ever crowded as on an average 859·39 patients were over and above the sanctioned strength of accommodation. However the construction of additional dormitories in the male section is under rapid progress. The proposal for construction of additional dormitories in the female side has been sanctioned by Government.

*Admissions.*—The total number of admissions during the period under report was 198 patients : out of which 135 were males and 63 were females, as against the total of 1017 for the previous period of 10 months.

The total number of patients treated during the year under report was 2337 patients as against 2999 patients, treated during the previous period of 10 months.

*Discharges.*—The total number of discharges during the period under report was 159 ; out of which 108 were males and 51 were females. Out of the total number of 159 patients 27 patients were discharged as recovered and 132 patients as improved or otherwise under section 33-A of Indian Lunacy Act, 1912.

*Deaths.*—There were 22 deaths (9 males and 13 females), during the period under report. The rate of death worked out for the period of 2 months from 1st November 1956 to 31st December 1956 on the basis of the average number of daily residence was 1.02 as against 2.38 per cent. for the previous period of 10 months.

*Health of Patients.*—The general health of patients was satisfactory. There was no epidemic during the period under report.

*Occupation therapy.*—The daily number of patients who occupied in different spheres of the hospital such as hospital garden, kitchen, ward work, weaving and tailoring department and carpenters workshop, etc., during the period under report was 480 males and 332 females. Some suitable female patients were encouraged to occupy themselves in knitting and needle works.

*Special Therapies.*—The special therapies like Insulin, Electric convulsive therapy, Leucotomy operations and Psychological treatments were given to the suitable patients and the number of patients treated with different therapies is as under :—

*White House.*—White house, a bungalow about 2 miles from the main hospital, is continued to be rented and has been utilised for keeping suitable class and ordinary patients.

1. *General.*—There were 416 male patients and 136 female patients (total 552) on the 31st October 1956. New patients admitted during the period under report were 33 males and 15 females (total 48) making the total of 449 males and 151 females (total 600). Out of these eight patients were discharged leaving 442 males and 150 females (total 592) in balance on the 31st December 1956. The classification of the patients discharged was as below :—

The general health of the patients during the period under report remained good and there were no deaths. Preventive measures were undertaken to prevent an epidemic and there was no epidemic of any kind during this period.

Whenever requested the patients were sent to the T. B. Clinic, X-Ray department of the Mayo Hospital, Nagpur, and the Medical College Hospital, Nagpur, for diagnosis and opinion.



The services of a trained Pathologist have been made available since 1952 and the laboratory has been equipped for testing the blood and cerebrospinal fluid for Kahn's test and doing C. S. F. chemistry. Sensitive photo electric colorimeter is also available. These facilities have been of great help in the treatment of patients as routine pathological investigations could be done in every patient admitted. Kahn's test was done in 70 patients during the period under report.

There is a post of a Part Time Dental Surgeon provided for this hospital. But as the term of the previous Dental Surgeon expired on 31st July 1956, A. N. and as no one was appointed in the vacancy, no dental treatment could be carried out during this period.

Besides this, there were three male patients under Insulin treatment during this period. But as they had not completed the course of treatment, the results could not be assessed in them.

No operations were performed during the period under report.

2. *Buildings.*—The work of dividing the old quarters for the Deputy Superintendent into two blocks to provide an accommodation for the Pathologist and the Second Assistant Medical Officer has been completed during this period.

The new building of the kitchen has already been completed and the Electric Cooking Ranges for the same are awaited from Messrs. Clubwala and Co., Bombay. The Public Works Department is providing funds for this purpose in its budget estimates for 1957-58.

Under the Second Five Year Plan, stage I estimates for Rs. 1,43,717-0-0 and the plan for the construction of the Out Patient Department and Administrative block have been approved by the Government. Order has also been placed for the supply of one Electro Encapholograph Equipment under this plan through the Directorate of Supplies and Disposals, New Delhi.

3. *Water Supply*.—The revised administrative approval to the plans and estimates amounting to Rs. 1,48,630-0-0 only for effecting improvement in the water supply system at the Mental Hospital, Nagpur, was accorded by the old Madhya Pradesh Government, Public Health Department, *vide* No. 8562-3828-XIV, dated 30th September 1956.

The Executive Engineer, Nagpur Division No. I, Public Works Department, Nagpur, has also intimated this office, *vide* his memorandum No. 17305, dated 21st December 1956, that the detailed estimates for the above work has been sanctioned and the work is being undertaken shortly.

4. *Accommodation*.—The accommodation available in this hospital is for 458 males and 152 females, i.e. total 610 beds. This included accommodation for 24 male paying patients and 8 female paying patients; but in practice extra accommodation is made available for 12 male patients and 8 female patients in the paying wards. Thus in all 630 patients are accommodated. There was no over-crowding in this hospital during the period under report, as patients over and above the figure of 630 seeking admissions, were temporarily detained in the special ward opened at Central Jail, Nagpur, for this purpose. The Deputy Superintendent, Mental Hospital, Nagpur, visits this Jail once a week to see and advise treatments for these patients.

5. *Employment or Occupations*.—Suitable patients, who were physically fit, were employed on various occupations, viz. Agriculture, Dairy, Gardening, Tailoring, Weaving, Niwar making, making of mattresses after teasing the coir and cotton, sewing, needle work, cleaning the grain and vegetables and on other miscellaneous jobs such as helping in the kitchen, cleaning, and ground levelling, etc. The full demand of milk and most of that of vegetables is met with from the produce of the hospital dairy and vegetable gardens.

6. *Amusements*.—Indoor and outdoor games such as carrom, Volley Ball and Badminton, etc. were played by the patients. Suitable patients were also sent to the picture house under escort. A Radio set with an amplifier, table and harmonium are also available for the amusements of the patients. Besides these, there is a reading room for the patients and newspapers, magazines and books, etc., are provided therein.

7. *Visitors*.—The official and non-official visitors attended the monthly meetings.

8. *Parole*.—The system of releasing patients on Parole continued during the period under report. One male and two female patients were released on parole during this period in question.

9. *Special Accommodation*.—This was provided only in the paying wards of this hospital for which the patients had to pay the scheduled charges of Rs. 60 per month inclusive of diet.

10. *Administration*.—As Dr. K. C. Dube, M.B.B.S. (Bombay), D.P.M. (London), who had been in charge of this hospital so far, has left on deputation. Dr. G. D. Pimpalkar, M.B.B.S., was in charge from 1st November 1956 to 31st December 1956. Dr. Ramsingh was Deputy Superintendent throughout the year.

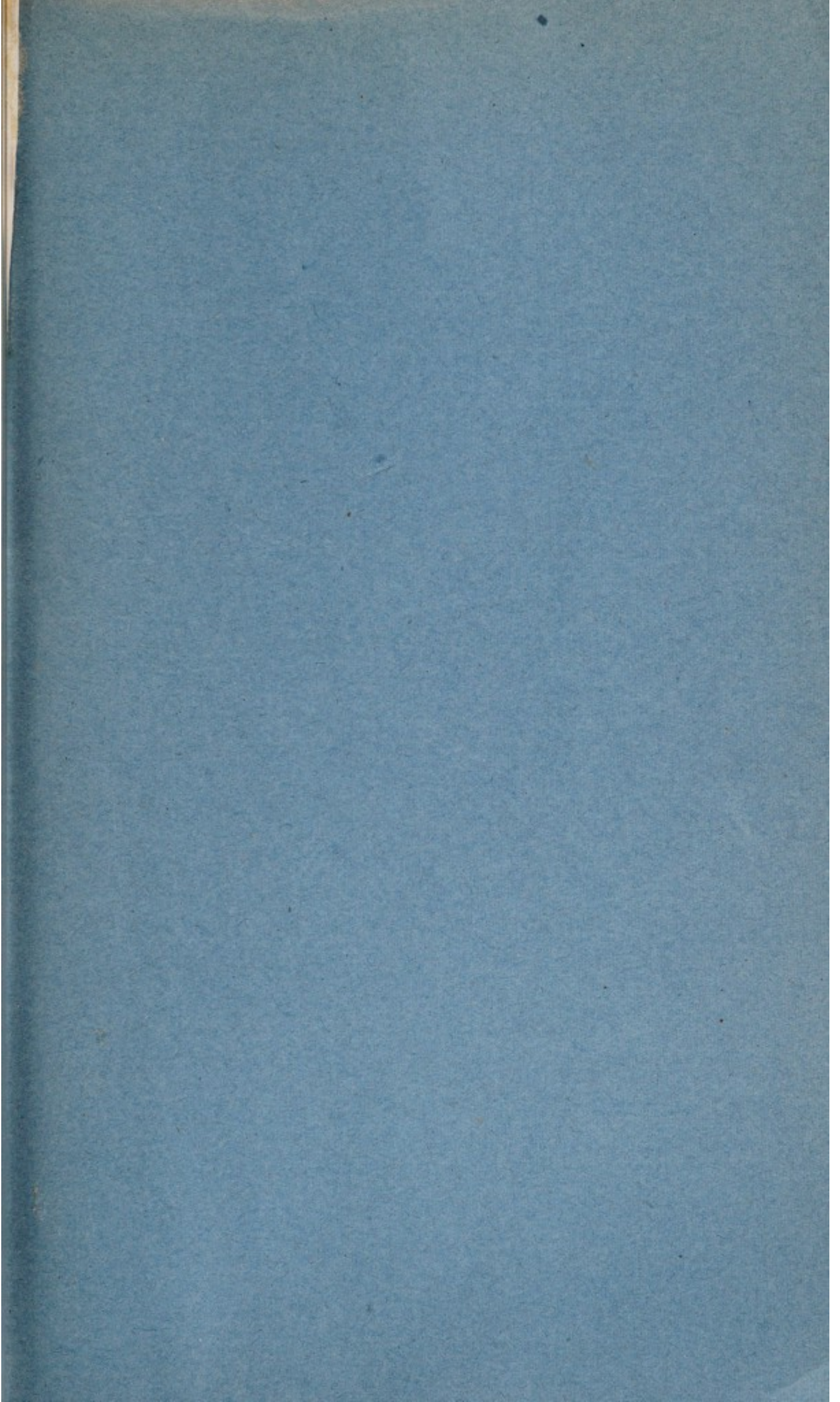
