## SURREY COUNTY MENTAL HOSPITALS

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### Annual Report of the Visiting Committee

(Pursuant to the Lunacy Act, 1890, Sec. 190).

*Presented to the County Council at their meeting held on  
the 10th day of May, 1921.*

---

*To the County Council of Surrey.*

The Visiting Committee submit their Report for the year ended 31st December, 1920, together with the audited accounts to the 31st March, 1921.

At the annual meeting on the 22nd March, Col. the Hon. A. G. Brodrick, A.D.C., was appointed Chairman of the Committee, and Mr. W. G. de F. Garland was elected Vice-Chairman.

Ten meetings of the Committee and 57 meetings of the Standing Sub-Committees were held during the year. In addition several meetings of Special Sub-Committees were held and inspections of the buildings and grounds of the Hospital were carried out in accordance with the provisions of the Statute.

The normal accommodation in the two Hospitals is as follows:—

which appears to be sufficient for ordinary requirements.

On the 1st January, 1921, there were 172 out-County Patients, 84 Private Patients, 74 Service Patients, and 70 Patients temporarily accommodated as a result of the war. The total number of patients in the two Hospitals was 2,084, leaving a margin of 289 vacant beds.

The total number of deaths shew a marked decrease, being 155 as against 243 in the preceding year.

It is satisfactory to note that the death-rate at Brookwood, viz., 4.35 per cent., was the lowest that has been recorded since the opening of the Institution in 1867. The number of recovered cases was 134 as compared with 135.

The Rev. F. H. Roberts, who had held the Chaplaincy at Netherne since the opening of the Hospital, resigned in February, he having been appointed Rector of Wanstrow, Somerset. The Rev. J. G. Marshall, M.A., was appointed in his place.

In April Mr. R. A. Hodges resigned his appointment as Clerk to the Committee, after acting in that capacity for a period of nine years. Mr. W. Hall, a member of the County Council Staff, was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Owing to the difficulty of retaining a full staff at the two Mental Hospitals, consequent upon a shortage of housing accommodation in the neighbourhood, proposals for the erection of twelve cottages each at Brookwood and Netherne were considered, and a strip of land encroaching on the proposed site of the cottages at Brookwood was purchased for the sum of £125. Plans were prepared and firms of builders invited to tender for carrying out the work.

The lowest tender submitted, however, was found to be so far in excess of the Architect's estimates and of the expenditure authorised by the County Council, that the Committee were obliged reluctantly to come to the conclusion that they would not be justified in proceeding with the erection of the cottages.

A paragraph was inserted in the County Press explaining the Committee's reasons for not going on with the work, and the employees at the two Mental Hospitals were informed of the Committee's decision in the matter.

At their meeting held in November, 1920, the County Council consented to the payment of a gratuity of £93 7s. 9d. to the widow of Attendant George Ledger, who died from pulmonary tuberculosis after  $22\frac{1}{4}$  years' service at Brookwood. The Medical Superintendent of that Hospital was of opinion that the deceased contracted the disease whilst in the employment of the Committee. The gratuity was granted under the provisions of Section 4 (b) of the Asylums Officers Superannuation Act, 1909.

The rents of cottages on the Hospital estates were increased 30 per cent. as permitted by the Increase of Rent and Mortgage Interest (Restriction) Act, 1920.

On the 1st August, 1918, it was decided that all cases of early mental disorder in the County should be received into the Netherne Mental Hospital, and a portion of that building was set aside for the purpose. This arrangement continued until December last, when the accommodation for these cases was found to have become inadequate. In view of this fact and of complaints having been received from residents in the southern portion of the County in regard to the difficulty experienced by them in visiting their relatives at Netherne, the practice above mentioned has been revised, and all persons in the County certified under the Lunacy Acts for admission into an Asylum, whether suffering from their first attack of insanity or otherwise, are now sent to the Mental Hospital serving the area of the Union to which the patient is chargeable (Brookwood or Netherne, as the case may be).

One of the Wards at Brookwood has been set aside for the separate accommodation and treatment of male cases of early mental disorder.

A verandah is being erected at the Garden Villa at Brookwood for use in connection with the treatment of tuberculous patients at that Hospital. The cost of the structure, viz., £480, will be met out of the Excess Weekly Charge Fund.



The scheme for improving the heating arrangements at Brookwood referred to in the Committee's last annual report has been completed.

Owing to the impossibility of entering into ordinary contracts for the supply of food, etc., to the Mental Hospitals, the Committee have continued the practice of obtaining competitive prices from reputable firms, and with a view to effecting economy, joint purchases of the principal items of groceries and provisions for delivery at the two Hospitals are, whenever practicable, made.

### FIFTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

*To the Visiting Committee of the

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report of the Medical Superintendent for the year 1920, together with the usual Statistical Tables.

The numerical changes that have taken place among the patients are as follows:—

#### ADMISSIONS.

The total admissions were 141—60 males and 81 females—being an increase over last year of 16. The direct admissions totalled 125; as all curable cases were being received at Netherne very few of these patients were regarded as being likely to recover. The arrangement by which Netherne received all recoverable cases terminated at the end of the year and this change will be reflected in our admission and discharge rates for the current year.

Many of our admissions were very feeble, and thirty-six of them were over 65 years of age; twenty-five of these thirty-six were over 70 years of age.

Table 10 shows the ascertained causes of Insanity in the admissions.



## DISCHARGES.

Forty patients were discharged as recovered, giving a recovery rate calculated on the direct admissions of 32 per cent.

Considering the type of patient that we have been receiving this rate is very high and has not been equalled here since the year 1911.

Money allowances were granted to seven discharged patients.

Eighteen patients were sufficiently improved to be discharged to the care of their friends, and one patient was discharged as being suitable for detention in the Union.

Of the 260 patients removed to other asylums, the majority were War accommodation patients re-transferred to Middlesex. There are now only 98 War accommodation patients remaining in the Hospital.

## DEATHS.

Fifty-three patients died, giving a death rate calculated on the average number resident of 4.35 per cent.

This compares most favourably with the death rate of 10.36 per cent. for the preceding year, and is actually the lowest death rate that has been recorded since the opening of the Institution in 1867.

Pulmonary tuberculosis was the cause of death in 11 instances as against 31 in 1919; the percentage due to tubercle being in each year almost identical.

Nineteen patients died of senile decay and six of general paralysis of the insane.

## HEALTH.

From the above it will be realized that the general health of the patients was exceedingly good and the average body weight of the patients showed a marked increase.

There was complete freedom from Dysentery during the year, but one male patient contracted Enteric Fever with a fatal result.

A mild epidemic of Influenza occurred in the early spring, chiefly affecting the female staff.

One male nurse developed Measles and one female patient Diphtheria; the latter case occurred shortly after the patient's admission, and it is possible that she contracted the disease at home.

The Garden House was opened for the isolation and treatment of male patients suffering from tuberculosis, and a verandah is in course of erection there.

It is hoped shortly to provide similar isolation on the female side.

### ESCAPES.

Three male patients escaped during the year; two were brought back within a few hours, but one remained at liberty for three days.

### CASUALTIES.

Ten casualties involving fractures of bones occurred, all being due to accidental causes, six of the patients being aged females and two being epileptic. All these patients made good recoveries; one, however, died three months afterwards of Senile Decay and an inquest was held in the case, a verdict of "Death from Natural Causes" being returned.

Two other inquests were held, one in the case of a male patient, F.F., who was found dead in bed, the verdict being "Death from Valvular Heart Disease," and in the other, W.J.W., a male patient absent on trial, a verdict of "Death from Cyanide of Potassium Poisoning, self administered while of unsound mind," was returned.

All of these cases were fully reported to and considered by the Visiting Committee at the time of their occurrence.

### BOARD OF CONTROL.

Two members of the Board of Control visited the Hospital on May 26th. Their report is appended.

### BOARDS OF GUARDIANS.

Deputations from the following Unions visited the Institution and interviewed the patients chargeable to them:—West Ham (twice), Henley, Richmond, Hambledon, Chertsey, Kingston-on-Thames, Farnham and Camberwell St. Giles.

### WORKS DEPARTMENT.

The following work was carried out during the year:—

Alterations to the heating arrangements by which Wards 1, 2 and 4 on each side were supplied with a hot-water circulating apparatus, which has proved of great value and is working satisfactorily.

A new Dough-Kneading Machine has been erected in the Bakery, and the Baker's Ovens have been overhauled and put into a good state of repair.

A new Airing Court has been planned on the female side and is nearing completion.

A Starching Machine has been installed in the Laundry.



A hot water tube circulating boiler has been made on the premises to replace a worn-out greenhouse boiler, and is working well.

Painting and re-decorating is being continued in various wards of the Institution, but no work in connection with the outside painting has yet been done. This it is hoped to commence at an early date.

It was decided to dispense with the system of stoking by mechanical stokers and to revert to hand firing methods with a better class of coal. The necessary alterations to the boilers have been carried out and the change has been found to have beneficial results.

Two filing cabinets entirely the work of a patient have been made and supplied to the Surrey County Council.

#### STAFF.

As in previous years changes in the staff have been numerous, but it is not now so difficult to obtain suitable candidates for the vacant positions.

The conduct of the staff generally has been good, but two nurses were dismissed for misconduct affecting a patient; the Visiting Committee prosecuted one of the offending nurses and obtained a conviction.

Bricklayer Leonard Taylor and Carter William S. Crouch retired on pension.

I regret to report the death of male Nurse George Ledger after 22 years' service; in accordance with the provisions of the Asylum Officers' Superannuation Act the Visiting Committee were enabled to grant a maximum gratuity to his widow of £93 7s. 9d.

I also regret to record the death of Dr. J. E. Barton, the late Medical Superintendent, who retired on pension in 1910.

The Medical Staff is now at full strength, R. N. B. McCord, M.B., Temporary Lieutenant R.N., having been appointed Assistant Medical Officer in August.

I have to thank my medical colleagues, Mr. Butt and other officers for their able assistance, and I also wish to thank the members of the Visiting Committee for their unvarying kindness and encouragement to me during the year.

## CHAPLAIN'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1920.

*To the Chairman and Committee of the

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit my report as Chaplain for the year ending in December last.

The services on Sunday mornings in the Chapel have been held regularly throughout the year; there have also been frequent services, also in the Chapel, on Sunday afternoons. On Sunday mornings there has been an average attendance of 167 male patients and 170 female patients. There has been an attendance of 50 to 60 at Holy Communion, and about 58 male patients and 77 female patients at the daily services on week-day mornings. I have also been able to arrange for the Holy Communion to be celebrated on several occasions in the day-room of Ward 10E for patients unable to attend in the Chapel. There has been a monthly celebration for the staff on Sundays at 8 a.m.

The Hospital—wards, workshops, workrooms and airing courts—has been carefully visited and particular attention, in this respect, has been given to the patients in the infirmaries.

During the year, as in previous years, I have been able to gain the help and interest of clergy either resident or visiting the neighbourhood, who have addressed the patients at the usual services or on festival occasions.

I desire to acknowledge with warm appreciation the co-operation of the Medical Superintendent and of the Hospital staff in discharging my duties, also the ready help of the organist and of the choir of attendants and nurses at the services during the last year.

## ROMAN CATHOLIC CHAPLAIN'S REPORT, 1920.

Their attitude at the services is always quite respectful, and I have not had a single cause of complaint. This reflects great credit upon those who have charge of the patients during service time.

Besides Sunday, there is an additional service on the second Monday of each month; to these I have added about eight extra services.

I wish to record my thorough appreciation of the kindness and help always cheerfully given to me by all on the asylum staff.

# APPENDIX III.

SURREY COUNTY ASYLUM,

BROOKWOOD.

26th May, 1920.

We have to-day visited this institution and can report that it continues to be well maintained and administered for the well being and comfort of the patients.

Since our colleagues' visit five months ago the following changes have occurred amongst the patients:—

There are now on the Statutory Books the names of 1,227 patients in the proportion of 453 men to 774 women. Of these, 21 men are classified as private, being "service patients," 79 men and 242 women as Out-County patients. The men who were here as War transfers from Napsbury Asylum have returned there as well as some others who were received on an ordinary contract, but there still remain 139 women belonging to Napsbury, and 76 men and 65 women who came from the Oxford Asylum under War Contracts. One man is out on trial, leaving 1,226 patients in residence. Calculated on the pre-war standard of accommodation there are vacancies on the male side for 149 patients, and on the female for 269. One whole ward, No. 8, is closed in the male division.

The weekly maintenance charge per head is 28/- for both Home and Out-County patients, and for the "service" patients 31/9. All the latter with one exception receive the special grant of 2/6 weekly or its equivalent in kind.

We have seen all the patients who are in residence and found them generally very orderly in their behaviour, and apart from appeals for discharge we received no complaints, and many expressed their thanks for the kindnesses they received from the medical and nursing staff. Their clothing was very tidy, and their personal appearance satisfactory.



The day rooms and galleries were well kept and comfortable, and the dormitories and bedding clean, and neatly arranged. We noticed that a good many of the sheets had holes in them, occasioned we are inclined to think by one of the washing or ironing machines. We have talked this matter over with Dr. Lowry, who has been paying attention to it, and told him of the experience we have gained elsewhere which may prove useful.

A good deal has already been done to overtake the arrears of painting and whitewashing, and work is now in hand.

The suggestions made by our colleagues as to the guarding of the rollers of the mangles have been carried out, and the sides are now properly shielded.

The airing courts of the male division, and at the detached female block are adequate and well kept, but there is only one court to the female division of the main building. This we think is a great defect. Aged people and quiet and well behaved women have to be indiscriminately mixed up with those who are turbulent or of low mentality. There are no doubt considerable difficulties in increasing the number of the airing courts, but we have discussed this question with Dr. Lowry, who is in full agreement with our views, and have made some suggestions to him for adding some ground to the existing court, and then dividing it into three or four parts. If on further consideration this proves feasible, the difficulties may be overcome.

We learn that the precautions against the spreading of disease by milk, which our Board have recently suggested in a circular memorandum have been in force here for some time. The herd is registered with the Surrey Milk Recording Society, and occupies the fifth position with regard to the quantity, quality and excellence of its milk.

We saw the dinner served in the dining hall of the female detached block. It consisted of hot pot, and haricot beans, which would have been improved by more boiling; otherwise it was good and appreciated by those partaking of it.

The patients looked healthy, and were well nourished. Ten of each sex were suffering from Tuberculosis. The arrangements for the segregation of male patients attacked with this disease, by placing them in a detached house in the grounds, are now partially in force, but the proposal to utilize the isolation hospital for women similarly affected, has, we think rightly, been abandoned, and Dr. Lowry hopes shortly to promote another scheme for them.

The death-rate (per cent. to daily average number resident) for the year ended 31st December last, was 10·36 per cent., a very great improvement on the corresponding death-rate for the previous year, which was 21·3 per cent.

During the last five months there have been only 26 deaths. They have all been due to natural causes, but an inquest was held in one case, that of a man who died during the night unexpectedly from heart disease.

No patient has during the period under review been attacked in the Asylum with either Dysentery or Enteric Fever, but an imbecile man was admitted in a state of much excitement which proved to be the delirium of an attack of enteric fever from which he made a good recovery.

Seven patients have sustained fractures of bones. Most of them were fractures of minor importance. Five of them were occasioned by accidental falls; in one instance the fracture was caused by the roughness of a fellow patient, and in another instance the cause of the injury, fracture of the external condyle of the humerus, was not ascertained.

The nursing staff consists of 8 men and 12 women as charge attendants and nurses, of 59 men, and 73 women for ordinary day duty, and of 9 men and 13 women for night work. Their working hours are 60 a week, with two days off duty, and 14 days annual leave.

Dr. Lowry has the assistance of three medical colleagues, one, Dr. W. B. Keith, as permanent Assistant Medical Officer, and two, Drs. Madden and Russell, as temporary Medical Officers.

### INSPECTION OF SERVICE PATIENTS.

SURREY COUNTY ASYLUM,

BROOKWOOD,

23rd June, 1921.

I visited this Asylum on June 23rd, 1921, and saw and examined each of the Service patients in residence on that date.

The following list shows the total admissions, discharges, deaths, etc., which have occurred:—

One patient (J. C. Smith) is at present at home on trial, and will probably receive his discharge at the next meeting of the Visiting Committee.

*Accommodation, Etc.*—The Service patients are warded and classified with the ordinary patients as suitable to their mental conditions. The living rooms and dormitories occupied by the men were clean, comfortable, and in good order throughout. Ward games, daily papers and books are provided for the use of the patients and associated entertainments are held each week in the Recreation Hall, and there is a cinematograph installed.

*Clothing.*—All the pensioners were neatly dressed in lounge suits made of superior quality serge, and their general cleanliness and neatness pointed to their receiving all necessary attention.

*Allowance.*—Twenty-five of the men are receiving the equivalent of the weekly allowance of 2/6. Shopping parties go beyond the grounds each week, and make any suitable purchases as they desire, and for those confined to the premises any extras they wish for are bought for them.

*Diet.*—I saw to-day's dinner, which consisted of rabbit pie with potatoes and cabbage, followed by bread and cheese, which I was informed is given daily as a second course, and on Tuesday and Saturday, currant pudding is also served. The meal to-day was nicely cooked, plentiful, and appreciated by the men. A few of the service patients on special diet were having a well cooked rice pudding as an extra. A copy of the diet scale is attached.

*Bodily Health and Condition.*—With the exception of two patients, the bodily health and condition of the Service men appeared to be very good. A. H. Burns, suffering from General Paralysis of the Insane, and G. Hayes, suspected to be suffering from Phthisis, were in bed, and receiving every attention.

The prognosis for the majority of men under treatment is unfavourable, of whom 30 per cent. show symptoms of Dementia Praecox, and I only noticed one man (G. Adams) as showing definite improvement, and it is probable that he will leave the institution on trial in the near future.

*Complaints and Requests.*—Only one man (S. Bistin) made a complaint about the food, and also stated that he considered the Service patients should be provided with separate accommodation. This patient shows evidence of Delusional Insanity with persecutory ideas, which probably have an influence on his attitude towards his surroundings and conditions. The remaining patients all appeared to be comfortable and contented, and some expressed appreciation of the kindness and attentions shown them.

A patient named C. T. Denby informed me that he had not been visited by his friends for some years, and expressed a wish to see some of his relations. I mentioned his request to the Medical Superintendent, who will endeavour to arrange for him to be visited.

*Awaiting Classification.*—The name of a patient (Frederick Glaze) was submitted on Form 1, to P.I.O., on the 14th June, 1921, with a view to consideration of his eligibility for the Service class. No Regimental particulars are at present available, but the man's home address is 29, Phoenix Place, Notting Hill.

*General Remarks.*—Parole is allowed freely to patients who are reliable and unlikely to abuse the privilege, and the men are encouraged to follow some useful occupation, when fit to do so, eight of the Service patients being employed in the grounds, and five indoors at the time of my visit.

Doctor Lowry, the Medical Superintendent, accompanied me while interviewing the Service men, and kindly gave me full details respecting them, and my thanks are due to him for facilitating my visit.

I have the honour to present the 12th Annual Report of the Medical Superintendent, together with the Statistical Tables for the year 1920. The numerical changes that have taken place among the patients are summarised as follows:—

*The Admissions.*—These numbered 408 or excluding transfers from Class to Class 367. The Direct Admissions numbered 340, 138 men and 202 women. Thirty-three Service Patients were admitted during the year. Two patients, a man and a woman, were found to be "Not Insane" on admission. The chief ascertained aetiological factors were Heredity 11.47 per cent., Climacteric 9.41 per cent., and Senility 7.64 per cent. Alcohol was responsible for only 1.9 per cent. of the cases. Nineteen per cent had had previous attacks and 7.6 per cent. had previously recovered in this Mental Hospital.



*The Discharges.*—Excluding transfers from Class to Class 292 patients were discharged, of whom 94 were discharged "recovered," 32 "Relieved," 164 "Not Improved" and 2 "Not insane." The recovery rate on the direct admissions was 27.64 per cent., M. 21.01 per cent., F. 32.17 per cent. The recovery rate for the males was below the average, but it should be stated that the male cases were of an unfavourable type, and in 21 per cent. of them no recovery was to be expected. Twenty-four per cent. were "Service" patients whose breakdown was held to have been either caused or aggravated by War Service.

*The Deaths.*—During the year 102 patients died, 37 men and 65 women. Senile Decay was the chief cause of death, being responsible for 18.62 per cent. of the deaths. Dysentery was the cause of 4.9 per cent. of the deaths (as against 7.5 per cent. in 1919). The death rate from Pulmonary Tuberculosis showed a welcome decline from 36.8 per cent. in 1918 and 26.4 per cent. in 1919, to 15.6 per cent. last year. The death rate on the daily average number resident was 10.61 per cent. There were six inquests during the year. A verdict of "Death from Natural Causes" was returned in three of them, A.B., M.D.B., and G.C., the last named, a male patient, dying from Influenza contracted outside during absence on leave. G.J. died from "Shock following a perforated duodenal ulcer." "Suicide whilst of Unsound Mind" was the verdict returned in the case of C.P., a female, who was admitted suffering from grave injuries, the result of precipitating herself from a window, and who died four and a half months afterwards, and "Accidental Death" in that of E.P.W., also a female, who sustained a fracture of the left thigh accidentally and died three months later.

*Escapes and Accidents.*—Eleven male patients and one female escaped during the year. Four male patients, not having been captured within the statutory 14 days, were discharged by the operation of the law. Three of the four were at the time of escape on parole in the Male Villa; one of them had been on parole for many years.

There were during the year three serious but non-fatal casualties, all due to accidental causes. They comprised a dislocation of the left shoulder in a male patient, a fracture of the left radius in a female, and a dislocation of the left patella, also in a female.

*Visits.*—Two Commissioners of the Board of Control visited the Institution on December 10th. Their Report is appended. Deputa-



tions from the Brentford, Brighton, Croydon, Epsom, Godstone, Hambleton, Kingston, Reigate and Richmond Boards of Guardians visited their respective patients during the year.

*Health.*—An epidemic of Whooping Cough broke out in September in the Villa for Children; there were no fatal cases. There was one case of Scarlet Fever in December, a nurse contracting the disease. Enteric Fever, I regret to say, made its appearance for the first time since the opening of the Institution in 1909. There were four cases which occurred sporadically in March, May and July, and three proved fatal. The cases were confined to one female ward in the Main Building, which fact appears to point to the presence of a carrier, but it was not found possible to ascertain the cause of the outbreak. All the nurses and the 53 patients in the ward were inoculated with anti-typhoid and paratyphoid vaccine and there were no fresh cases subsequently.

*Staff.*—Rev. F. H. Roberts, who had been Chaplain here since the opening of the Institution, left in February, having been appointed Rector of Wanstrow in Somerset. He was succeeded by Rev. J. G. Marshall, M.A. Rev. W. Evans was appointed R.C. Chaplain in April. Miss Patterson, Head Laundress, was superannuated on February 27th after 26 years' Asylum Service. I regret to record the death of Mr. D. Bell, late Farm Bailiff, during the year. At the Preliminary Medico-Psychological Examination 11 nurses out of 14, and 6 attendants out of 10, were successful, and at the Final Examination 3 nurses out of 4. The hours of duty for the Laundry Staff were reduced from 55 to 51½ hours per week. F.J.B., Mess Attendant, was prosecuted by the Committee for larceny of two keys and a uniform great coat, and was sentenced to 12 months' hard labour at the Surrey Quarter Sessions on August 10th.

*Works Department.*—The following alterations and works were carried out by the Hospital Staff during the year:—

- Iron guard made for bull pen.
- Independent steam supply fitted to No. 2 steam oven.
- Two 5in. valves fitted into hot water ring main.
- Installation of electric irons in laundry.
- Resistance box made and fitted for Stoker Motor.
- Two new coppers erected in Main Kitchen.
- Wire guards fitted to Church Windows.
- Speed regulator for electric motor fitted.
- Electric forge blower fixed in Smith's Shop.



New Cricket pitch laid. Water service laid to cricket field.

Gate fixed at Entrance Lodge.

Gas supply laid on to North Villa.

Solid rubber band tyres fitted to wheels of Foden Steam Wagon.

Outside painting of houses on Estate and internal cleaning and painting.

Matron's quarters. Dining room cleaned and re-papered.

Milk cooler fixed at Farm Dairy. Renovation of old buildings at Netherne Farm commenced.

Nisson Bow Hut erected for Garden Store.

The laundry, bakery, main kitchen and scullery plant and machinery is in good working order. The steam heating plant continues to give satisfaction. The reports of the Boiler Insurance Company have been very good.

The outside painting of the buildings is in arrears owing to the difficulty in obtaining labour. An increased staff of painters will be necessary to enable us to catch up with this work. So far as possible every endeavour has been made with a small staff to execute the most urgent repairs.

*General.*—In January 56 male "War" patients were transferred to the Napsbury Mental Hospital, 14 male patients were removed to the Croydon Mental Hospital in February, and 21 female patients to the Springfield Mental Hospital, Wandsworth, in June, on expiration of Contract. R.N., a female patient, was in October transferred to Darenth under the Mental Deficiency Act, 1913.

In conclusion, I desire to express my thanks to the Staff, the Officers and my Medical Colleagues for their willing help and loyal co-operation, and to the Visiting Committee for their confidence, encouragement and support during the past year.

## CHAPLAIN'S REPORT FOR 1920.

*To the Chairman and Committee of the  
Surrey County Mental Hospital, Netherne.*

*February, 1921.*

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present my Report for 1920—my first report as Chaplain.

The daily services at 8.40 in the Recreation Hall have been held regularly throughout the year, and the Sunday Services at 10.30 and 4 in the Chapel—except that during the winter months the afternoon services have been held in the Hall. The Holy Communion for the patients has been celebrated on each second Sunday in the month and also on the Great Festivals—and there have also been special celebrations for the Staff. Short services have also been held in the Infirmary Wards from time to time. For some months a Service for the children on the Estate was held at 3 o'clock on Sunday afternoons, but, unfortunately, owing to an outbreak of infectious disease in the Coulsdon School it was thought advisable to discontinue this Service—greatly to my disappointment, as I believe it was much appreciated by children and parents.

On Palm Sunday the Choir of St. Andrew's came to the Chapel and sang Stainer's Crucifixion for the patients.

I have also held for several months a short class for the children in the North Villa. The little ones are very affectionate and seem to enjoy our times together looking at pictures and talking about them.

The various wards and airing courts have been regularly visited on each week-day, and I have also been to call at the various houses on the Estate and to minister to the sick there from time to time.

In all these duties I have been ably assisted by my colleague, the Rev. Warrington Stock—who has also specially taken charge of the Hospital Library, which is now in admirable order. The Committee kindly made a grant of £5 some months ago, and a splendid collection of books was obtained from W. H. Smith & Sons, 377 volumes being forwarded to us on November 23rd. About 120 of these were in very good condition and were immediately placed on the shelves. The remainder were repaired by degrees, and at last only 40 were found to be useless. Twenty-five volumes were also presented by a former patient, so that we now have 578 books in circulation.



I have also to thank the Committee for grants for Hymn Books and Psalters for the Choir, and for a much enjoyed outing to Brighton.

Thirty patients have been laid to rest in the Asylum Cemetery, all but two of these being members of the Church of England. Two infants have been baptised in the Chapel.

I also should like to take this opportunity to express my grateful appreciation for the very kind way in which I have been received and helped by both Staff and Patients ever since I entered on my duties here.

#### ROMAN CATHOLIC CHAPLAIN'S REPORT FOR 1920.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit an account of the R.C. Services for patients and others in the above Institution for the year 1920.

During the year I visited the Hospital on 73 occasions, of which Mass was said on Wednesdays 40 times, and an afternoon Service on alternate Sundays 26 times. There was an aggregate attendance for the year of 1415. This, I think, compares favourably with the previous year when the Hospital was visited 52 times by the R.C. Priest, with an aggregate attendance of 632. Greater numbers attend the Wednesday morning Mass than the Sunday afternoon Service—the proportion being about two to one.

## APPENDIX V.

### REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE BOARD OF CONTROL.

SURREY COUNTY ASYLUM,

NETHERNE.

*December 10th, 1920.*

We have to-day inspected this Institution and can report that it continues to be well maintained and administered for the well being and comfort of the patients.

Since our colleagues' visit twelve months ago the following changes have taken place among the patients:—

There are now on the books the names of 360 males and 629 females, a total of 989. Of these 33 men and 49 women are classified as private patients, and 52 men as "Service" patients. There are 13 males and 68 females out county patients, of whom one man and 49 women belong to the Middlesex County Asylum at Napsbury, the one man and 20 of the women being received under a "War Contract." The other out county patients belong to some 20 various Unions.

The weekly maintenance charge per head has risen from 28/- to 30/4 for the Home and Out County patients, and for the private patients is from 35/- to 52/6.

One man and two women are out on trial, and one woman is out for the day, the remainder of the patients, 985 in number, have all been seen by us during the course of our visit. We have paid particular attention to those of the "Service Class," who are distributed through the male wards according to their mental state. We received no complaints of unkindness on the part of the attendants from them, and they appeared to be quite contented with their surroundings. They are clothed in a special suit of khaki cloth, and have shirts distinctive from the other patients. The special grant of 2/6 weekly is spent on their behalf on such things as cake, tobacco or cigarettes, and all the Service patients are in receipt of these extras.



Generally we found the patients of both sexes very quiet and orderly in their behaviour; they were neat and tidy in their personal appearance and gave every evidence of being kindly and considerately treated. Apart from appeals for discharge we received no complaints.

There are vacancies for 31 men, and one ward on the male side, No. 6, is closed. The female side is, however, overcrowded to the extent of 57 patients.

The dayrooms and galleries are well kept, being bright with flowers and plants, and well supplied with books and papers. We noticed that on the female side the patients are encouraged to raise plants in the wards.

The wards are well warmed by the radiators, but in many cases the covers of these require renewal, and are in a dangerous state.

The dormitories and side rooms were tidy and in proper order, and the beds and bedding clean and neatly arranged.

The recommendations of our colleagues as to protecting the rollers of the box mangles have been adopted. We suggest that the dough mixing machine in the bakehouse should have an automatic cover fixed to it.

We saw a good dinner being partaken of in some of the wards; it consisted of stewed rabbit, potatoes and cabbage, followed by fig pudding. It was well cooked and was appreciated by the patients. The breakfast and teas throughout the week consist of bread and margarine, but we are glad to hear that a jam ration on some days is to be introduced to relieve the monotony of the tea meal.

The patients generally presented a healthy and well nourished appearance. Thirty-eight of the males and 58 of the females were in bed at the time of our visit, 18 of the total occupying beds on the verandahs attached to the infirmary wards, including five patients who are suffering from tuberculosis. The total number now in the institution who are known to be tuberculous is 11, of whom nine are male subjects. There is one recent case of dysentery—a female. One nurse is at present under treatment for scarlet fever. So far this is the only case of this disease that has occurred, and was probably contracted outside.

The death rate for year 1919 was 10.4 per cent., or for males 11.3 per cent. and for females 9.8 per cent.

Of the 103 deaths that have occurred since the last visit six were due to general paralysis, or about six per cent., 18 to phthisis and two to general tuberculosis, while 19 were attributed to senile decay.

On my visit to this Institution on the 24th June, 1921, there were 75 patients on the Service footing, all of whom I interviewed and examined, and was satisfied that they are suitable for detention in an asylum.

*Accommodation, Etc.*—The pensioners are suitably classified with the other patients, and the living rooms and dormitories occupied by them were cheerful, clean and comfortable; plants and flowers were freely distributed throughout the wards, producing a bright and pleasant effect. There is a full supply of daily papers, library books, etc., for the use of the men, and the usual ward games are provided.

*Clothing.*—The Service men were at once distinguished from the other patients by their khaki lounge suitings; all the men were neat and clean in person and dress, and gave the impression of being well looked after by those attending them.

*Allowance.*—Seventy-three men are availing themselves of the weekly half a crown allowance, only two not being able to appreciate or benefit by it. No cash is allowed to the men, but a proportion go out in walking parties on Saturdays and select their own extras,

and for the others the Head Attendant makes a list of requirements, and these are purchased for them; all the patients seem satisfied with the method of distribution, and to appreciate the allowance; in no instance is the amount used to cover the cost of additional diet.

*Mental and Bodily Condition.*—Seven patients were in bed, all of whom appeared to be most comfortable and to be suitably nursed and tended.

I noted sixteen men were showing symptoms of Dementia Praecox, which in many instances had developed on a basis of congenital mental effect; six were suffering from General Paralysis of the Insane; eighteen showed evidence of systematised and non-systematised delusional insanity, and the remainder comprised cases of melancholia, mania, and secondary dementia. I noted one patient (E. Etherington) as improving mentally, but he is still unstable and not yet fit for discharge. For the remainder, the prognosis is, in most instances, unfavourable.

*Diet.*—The dinner to-day consisted of vegetable soup with potatoes and bread, followed by a boiled currant pudding. The first course was not apparently appreciated by the men, but the pudding was quite satisfactory.

From the attached diet sheet it will be observed that the morning and evening meals are not very substantial, and not much variety is introduced. A fair number of patients complained of the monotony of these meals, and a little variation and addition would give satisfaction and be appreciated.

A luncheon is given to the working patients daily, consisting of cheese with tea or cocoa.

I examined the weight book, and noted that several patients had gained weight since admission; some were practically stationary, and I did not notice any entries which showed appreciable loss.

*Complaints and Requests.*—In addition to complaints previously mentioned in respect of diet, a few patients, who are not fit for discharge, resented being detained, and asked to be allowed to return to their homes.

The patients generally appeared to me to be a well-conducted and uncomplaining body of men, and to be under good and kindly exercised control.



A man named G. Butt made a request that he might be transferred to another Asylum to be near his friends who live at Portsmouth, and another man, C. Tapner, asked if arrangements could be made for his removal to Graylingwell Hospital, Chichester, for a similar reason. I beg to recommend that consideration be given to the requests of these two men.

Meat Pies are made up as follows:—Males, 2 ozs. Flour, 5 ozs. Meat, ¾ ozs. Margarine. Females, 2 ozs. Flour, 5 ozs. Meat, ¾ oz. Margarine, per patient, with 7½ lbs. Onions per 100 Patients.

Soup consists of the Liquor of the Boiled Meat of the previous day, Bones, &c., with an addition of 1½ ozs. Peas, ¾ oz. Rice, ¼ oz. Pearl Barley, and ½ oz. Pea Flour per patient, with 11 lbs. Carrots and 6½ lbs. Onions per 100 Patients.

Currant Puddings are made up as follows:—Males, 3 ozs. Flour, ½ oz. Dripping. Females, 3 ozs. Flour, ½ oz. Dripping, and ½ oz. Currants per patient.

Stewed Garden Fruit is substituted for Dried Fruit when in Season, with 1½ ozs. Rice each, and 1 oz. Demerara Sugar males, 1 oz. females. Alternately with Stewed Fruit and Rice, Fruit Pies are issued. These pies are made up as follows:—Males, 2 ozs. Flour, ¾ oz. Margarine, 1 oz. Demerara Sugar. Females, 2 ozs. Flour, ¾ oz. Margarine, 1 oz. Demerara Sugar, each.

Mince Meat Diets consist of 2 ozs. Cooked Meat for Males, 2 ozs. for Females, 1 oz. Rice, and 12 ozs. vegetables, each patient.

Patients who attend the Entertainments are given Cake and Coffee made as follows:—Cake each 4 ozs. Flour, ¾ oz. Dripping, and ¾ oz. Granulated Sugar, with an addition of 1 lb. Ginger the lot, 7 ozs. Cream of Tartar and 3½ ozs. Carbonate of Soda, per 100 patients. Coffee: 1½ lbs. Coffee and ¼ lb. Chicory, 2½ lbs. Demerara Sugar, and 5½ pints of New Milk, per 100 patients. Males, 6½ ozs. Cake and 1 pint Coffee. Females, 5½ ozs. Cake and ½ pint Coffee each.

Currant Cake and plain Bread and Butter is given with Tea on Sundays, viz.:—Males, 4 ozs.; Females, 3 ozs. Sunday Cake is made up as follows:—Each, 2 ozs. Flour, ¾ oz. Margarine, ¾ oz. Granulated Sugar, Caraway Seeds at 7 ozs. per 100 with 3½ ozs. Cream of Tartar, and 1½ ozs. Carbonate of Soda, per 100 patients added.
