

SURREY COUNTY MENTAL HOSPITALS.

Annual Report of the Visiting Committee

(Pursuant to the Lunacy Act, 1890, Sec. 190).

Presented to the County Council at their meeting held on the 13th day of November, 1923.

To the County Council of Surrey.

The Visiting Committee submit their Report for the year ended 31st December, 1922, together with the audited accounts to the 31st March, 1923.

At the annual meeting on the 28th March, Col. the Hon. A. G. Brodrick, A.D.C., was re-appointed Chairman of the Committee, and Mr. E. A. Medus was re-elected Vice-Chairman.

Seven meetings of the Committee and 54 meetings of the Standing Sub-Committees were held during the year. In addition meetings of special Sub-Committees were held, and frequent inspections of the buildings and grounds of the two Mental Hospitals were carried out in accordance with the provisions of the Statute.

On the 1st January, 1923, there were 45 patients adjudged chargeable to out-County Unions, 89 Private Patients, 91 Service Patients, and 259 patients received from other Mental Hospitals under Contract. The total number of patients in the two Hospitals was 2,332, leaving a margin of 41 vacant beds.

On the 8th July, 1922, a fire broke out at the Home Farm buildings, Brookwood, causing considerable damage to the buildings and their contents. The re-building of the premises has since been completed and the claim in respect of damage has been settled by the Insurance Company.

The Farm and Garden Accounts show that the profit, excluding value of patient labour, was £2,561 15s. 11d. at Brookwood and £246 15s. 4d. at Netherne. The latter figure reveals a very satisfactory state of affairs at Netherne as the accounts of that Institution for the previous twelve months showed a loss of £1,084 0s. 5d.

Commissioners of the Board of Control have visited both Mental Hospitals during the year and left satisfactory reports.

Members from the various Boards of Guardians have also paid visits, and have recorded in the Visiting Book their appreciation of the treatment of the patients.

During the period under review a Contract was entered into with the Napsbury Mental Hospital for the reception and maintenance of 30 female patients at Netherne. In view of the shortage of accommodation at Brookwood it was found necessary to terminate the Contract which had been entered into with the London County Council in respect of 100 male patients.

In view of the continued fall in the cost of living during the year a reduction of 10 per cent. was made in the wages paid to members of the Artisans' Staffs, so as to bring these employees into line with the Nursing and Indoor Staffs whose bonus and children allowance had previously been withdrawn. The payment of a cost of living bonus to the Clerical Staffs was discontinued from the 1st July, and new scales of salaries were granted to these employees as from that date.

Your Committee regret to report the death of Mr. E. L. Lunn, who was appointed architect in connection with the

building of cottages at Brookwood and Netherne. Mr. Frederick J. Hodgson, M.S.A., of Guildford, who purchased the late Mr. Lunn's business, was appointed to succeed him.

A Visiting Dentist has been appointed to attend at the Brookwood Mental Hospital for a session of three hours' duration per fortnight at an annual fee of £50.

Your Committee considered applications from 19 Asylum Pensioners for the continuance and re-assessment of increase of pension granted under the provisions of the Pensions (Increase) Act, 1920. In considering the revision of increases already paid your Committee adopted generally the principle of a reduction of 10 per cent. in view of the fall in the cost of living during the previous twelve months.

The Brookwood and Netherne Standing Sub-Committees gave long and careful consideration to the question of revising the patients' dietary, and as a result new scales were adopted resulting in a net increased cost of about 9½d-per patient per week at each Mental Hospital.

The rate charged to the various Boards of Guardians for the maintenance of ordinary patients was reduced from 27s. 5d. to 21s. per week on the 1st October, 1922. At the date of this Report the figure stands at 18s. 1d.

To the Chairman and Members of the Visiting Committee, Brookwood Mental Hospital.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to report that the Audit of your accounts and of those of your Officers for the year ended 31st March last was completed on the 13th instant.

The balance standing to the credit of maintenance account at the close of the financial year amounted to £75,162 5s. 6d. This appears to be unnecessarily large, and I would suggest that the Committee should seek some means available at law whereby this balance may be reduced to a more reasonable figure.

The present practice of furnishing tradesmen with printed forms on which to render their accounts appears to me to be open to objection and should, I suggest, be discontinued. It is very desirable that the tradesmen should present their claims on their own account forms.

I would also suggest that the Committee should consider whether it is not now possible to revert to the pre-war method of placing contracts. The present practice whereby selected firms are asked to submit prices without recourse to public advertisement is not easy to justify now that the markets are more stable.

APPENDIX II.

FIFTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

To the Visiting Committee of the Surrey County Mental Hospital, Brookwood.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report of the Medical Superintendent for the year 1922.

The numerical changes amongst the patients are as follows:-

Three hundred and sixty-eight patients were admitted, being a decrease of 124 on the figures of the previous year.

The recoveries during the year were 88; the percentage of recoveries on direct admissions was 28:12.

The number of deaths was 95, the mortality rate on the average number resident being 6.96 per cent.

All the deaths with the exception of one were due to natural causes. Four inquests were held; in three of which verdicts of death from natural causes were returned, but in one case, R.R. (a female patient, aged 74 years) a verdict of accidental death was found. This patient accidentally fell, sustaining a fracture of the right femur, and died two days subsequently, of shock.

Six other patients sustained injuries involving fractures of bones in each case due to accidental falls. All these cases were reported to you at the time of their occurrence.

The general health of the patients was good. There were, however, two cases of dysentery, our first cases of this type since 1919.

Six patients died during the year of Pulmonary Tuberculosis, and at the end of the year there were 43 patients suffering from this disease.

Seven patients made their escape during the year, all were brought back to the Hospital after short intervals.

Two members of the Board of Control visited the Institution on September 29th and 30th. Their report is appended.

Dr. E. L. Forward, of the Ministry of Pensions, visited and examined all "Service patients" on October 26th. An extract from his Report is appended.

Deputations from the following Boards of Guardians also visited the Hospital and interviewed the patients chargeable to them:—Wandsworth, Richmond, Chertsey, Hammersmith, Hambledon, West Ham, Hackney, Islington, Farnham, Kingston and Bermondsey.

An outbreak of fire occurred at the Home Farm on the night of July 8th, and did considerable damage; the destroyed buildings have now been re-instated.

The Works Department has been fully engaged during the year.

The outside painting of the Institution has been completed, painting and redecorating of various wards and houses has been carried out.

One of the Glass Houses at the Garden has been re-erected.

A verandah for female tuberculous patients has been completed.

A new Exercise Garden has been laid out for female patients; the printer's shop has been enlarged and many other improvements and necessary repairs made. The whole of the plant has been carefully looked after, and is in satisfactory working order.

The conduct of the Staff was good; the usual nursing lectures and demonstrations were given by the Medical Officers and twenty members of the Nursing Staff passed the Final examination of the Medico-Psychological Association and obtained the Nursing Certificate.

I have again to thank my Medical Colleagues, Mr. Butt, the Officers and other members of the Staff for their able and willing assistance, and to express my gratitude to the Chairman and Members of the Committee for their unfailing kindness.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT FOR 1922.

To the Chairman and Committee of the Surrey County Mental Hospital, Brookwood.

April, 1923.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit my report as Chaplain of the Mental Hospital for the year ending last December.

The services on Sunday mornings have been duly held through the year in the Hospital Chapel; and on week days in the Recreation Hall at 8.15 a.m. At the former there has been a usual attendance of 150—160 male patients, and of 175—185 female patients; and on week days usually a congregation of 125 patients.

On Sunday afternoons on alternate Sundays we have had in the Chapel some 290 present, and on the remaining alternate Sundays in the afternoon I have arranged for short services in each of the Wards adjoining the Male and Female Infirmaries; these have been much appreciated.

During the year frequent opportunities of Holy Communion were afforded to the Staff, also to the patients; and I have found that an occasional celebration of the Holy Communion on week day mornings is much valued. In reporting on the services I would express my appreciation of the ready help rendered by the Organist and Choir, and also of those to whom is allotted the care of the Chapel which is always in excellent order.

The Wards, Infirmaries, Workshops and Workrooms have been carefully visited and constant touch has been kept with cases of sickness.

In the autumn by the kindness of a musical friend resident in Woking, I was able to arrange for an excellent concert, much appreciated by the audience of staff and patients.

I cannot close my report without readily acknowledging the cooperation which I have received from the Medical Superintendent and the staff generally, in carrying out my duties as Chaplain during the year under review.

APPENDIX III. (a).

REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE BOARD OF CONTROL.

SURREY COUNTY MENTAL HOSPITAL, BROOKWOOD, September 30th, 1922.

When we commenced our inspection of this Institution yesterday we found 547 men and 831 women under care—1,378 patients in all. The difference between this number and the total on the statutory books (1,381) being accounted for by the absence on trial of two men and one woman. The number in residence includes 36 in the private class, of whom 34 are "service" patients, 70 men received on contract from London County, 91 women from Middlesex (Napsbury), and 16 cases chargeable to almost as many Out-County Authorities.

Excluding from consideration the Garden Villa (which being adapted for the reception of Tuberculous cases, is available for one type of patient only) there is to-day vacant accommodation for the admission of no more than a further six cases on the male and two on the female side of the Institution-unless the return made to our Board in January last underestimated the available night space, for which suggestion there appears to be no justification. Indeed it seemed to us that special efforts had been necessary to accommodate the number of patients now under care, and that the addition of another 6 males and 2 females, or at least anything materially exceeding that number would lead to something perilously near overcrowding. We understand that the termination of the London and Middlesex contracts are under consideration, and hope that every effort will be made to expedite the removal of patients who have been received under them; the present restricted facilities for the admission of new home-county cases from the area served by Brookwood being very unsatisfactory.

Patients generally presented the appearance of being thoroughly well cared for in all respects, and we satisfied ourselves that they were treated with kindness and consideration by those in whose charge they were placed. We received, as usual, a large number of requests for discharge from persons unfit for freedom; but no complaints other than those obviously due to mental disease. Except

for a tew excited cases, in the airing court set aside for turbulent women, the general behaviour was quiet and orderly. were neat and tidy in their dress and appeared to be properly cared for so far as their physical needs are concerned. We were pleased to learn that the Committee visit the wards regularly, and take a very practical interest in the welfare of patients. with some of the more modern Mental Hospital buildings those at Brookwood do not lend themselves to ideal classification, and cannot be made to do so without an expenditure of money at present impossible. Dr. Lowry's task, therefore, in this particular is a difficult one; but after full enquiry we were convinced that he is fully alive to the need for doing everything he can in this direction, and that he is successful in his efforts. The recovery rate for 1921 was 27.9 per cent., and so far as can be judged at present the figure for the current year will be even better. Since December 12th last 165 persons have been discharged, 67 on recovery, or about 40 per cent. The need for a small cheaply erected acute hospital, separate from the main building, where a few recent recoverable cases can be treated apart from others, is very great, and should receive the earliest possible consideration as soon as the necessary expenditure becomes practicable. A comparatively small outlay in this direction would go far towards justifying the postponement of any large scheme such as was suggested before the war.

The general health of the Institution, and the nutritional state of patients appeared to be good—a conclusion supported by the return of monthly weighings. The dinners yesterday and to-day, both for normal and sick, were of excellent quality, sufficient in quantity and well served, especially to patients in the wards. In the large dining halls for women, owing to the number dealt with, the food became cold before it could be eaten—a fault that every effort should be made to remedy. The diet scale is a fairly good one: but, as in many similar institutions, there is a regrettable monotony in breakfasts and teas.

Amongst the 107 patients in bed there was little in the way of acute illness, nearly all cases under nursing care being the subjects of senile or other debility, general paralysis, or cases under special treatment for recent mental disease or excitement. All sick persons were receiving adequate medical and nursing care and attention. We were glad to learn that the Medical Superintendent has a free hand to obtain the assistance of consulting physicians and surgeons whenever he considers such course desirable, and that a dentist attends fortnightly.

Classed as tuberculous were 16 men and 25 women, 11 of the former sex and 14 of the latter being in a sufficiently active state to necessitate treatment in bed. The male cases were very satisfactorily housed in a villa set apart for the purpose, most of them being in the open air. Although female tuberculous patients are taken out into the grounds whenever weather permits their segregation under satisfactory conditions is not at present possible; but we were glad to hear that all the materials for the erection of a verandah for their accommodation are now on the premises, and that the work is to be proceeded with at once. We are in cordial agreement also with Dr. Lowry's suggestion with regard to the more free opening of ward windows, as a desirable prophylactic measure.

One case of dysentery, mild in character, was notified in June of this year, otherwise the Institution has been free from this disease. There is no record of the occurrence of any other form of infectious disease except influenza, of which there was an outbreak during last winter.

The deaths between December 12th last and this date have numbered 75, of which 22 were due to old age, 10 to heart disease, 9 to disease of the kidneys, 7 to general paralysis and 6 to tuberculosis. The predominance of deaths from old age appeared surprising until the large proportion of cases of senile debility in the institution, and under hospital care was realised. With one exception, a case of fatal shock following fracture of the femur accidentally incurred, all deaths were due to natural causes. Three inquests were held, one in the case above mentioned, a second on a man who died from acute cellulitis and a third on a woman who succumbed to exhaustion from acute mania.

The serious casualties were 7 in number, all being in the nature of fracture of bones, the result of accidental falls.

The buildings throughout are well maintained, and we found the wards and dormitories clean and orderly, and the bedding all that could be desired. Many repairs have been carried out during the period under review, and the outside painting of the institution is now nearing completion.

The management generally may be congratulated on the real vitality of their industrial departments, the excellent work carried on in them, and the extent to which the labour of patients is made use of. This feature of Brookwood is an interesting and instructive one, especially as we were given to understand that many patients now skilled have been entirely institution trained.

The maintenance rate for "service" patients is, at present, 31/2 per head per week, and for all other cases 27/5. We understand, however, that on and after October 1st next the latter figure will be reduced to 21/-.

The nursing staff now consists of 73 attendants and 83 nurses for day, and 12 attendants and 13 nurses for night duty. Of the attendants 9, and of the nurses 11 hold charge rank. Fifty-seven attendants and 58 nurses were on duty in the wards to-day, making a ratio of one officer to 9.6 patients on the male side, and one to 14.3 on the female side.

Dr. Lowry has the assistance of three medical officers, two permanent and one temporary. We understand that one of the permanent Assistant Medical Officers has not yet qualified in psychological medicine, and we hope that the Committee will see their way to favourably consider the grant to him of study leave, and all necessary facilities for obtaining his diploma. Any expenditure so entailed would, by improving the efficiency of officers, be of great advantage to patients.

EXTRACT FROM REPORT OF INSPECTOR OF MINISTRY OF PENSIONS.

SURREY COUNTY MENTAL HOSPITAL, BROOKWOOD. 27TH OCTOBER, 1922.

There are to-day on the register of this Mental Hospital the names of 30 Service Patients, each of whom I interviewed and examined in their respective wards.

The figures below show all the changes which have taken place since the previous visit on the 23rd June, 1921.

A total of 13 deaths have occurred amongst the ex-service patients to date, of which 10 were due to general paralysis of the insane and 3 to pulmonary tuberculosis. The 25 cases discharged since my last visit as "not improved" mostly comprise transfers to other Mental Institutions.

Three patients whose disabilities were found to be neither attributable to, nor aggravated by, service, were de-classified on 30th September, 1922, and, in the case of three patients, appeals against de-classification have been lodged, and pending a decision they remain in the service class. I noted the following particulars respecting these men, but as some of the record cards were not available, fuller details were unobtainable:—

R.A.

Enlisted 27/11/06, discharged 26/1/15 with melancholia, on-set dating from December, 1914. Now suffering from Dementia Præcox.

G.H.

Enlisted 20/10/16, category B2, discharged permanently unfit 30/3/17, home service only; two brothers died in this Institution and one sister died at Dartford Asylum. Shows evidence of congenital mental deficiency.

D.D.

Enlisted 13/12/15, discharged service 2/8/16. Was in Long Grove Hospital in 1916 and remained there over 2 years and 9 months, when he escaped; admitted to Brookwood 11/1/21. Is suffering from delusional insanity.

G.B.

Joined up July, 1916; discharged April, 1917; said to have shown symptoms of mental disorder eight years before admission to Brookwood; a sister died in an asylum.

H.W.H.

Enlisted 1908; called up from Reserve 1914; served in France two months. Suffering from general paralysis of the insane.

J.T.

Joined Navy at age of 14 years; served six years and was transferred to Reserve; called up 1914 and was discharged as permanently unfit; seven months' service; contracted venereal disease at age of 17 years. Is suffering from general paralysis of the insane.

ACCOMMODATION.

The Service Patients, as at the previous visit, are warded with other inmates, as suitable to their conduct and mental states, 13 of whom are in the higher grade wards, where more liberty is allowed. The wards and dormitories occupied by the pensioners are maintained in excellent order and condition, comfortably heated and equipped, and the day rooms are supplied with papers, books, games, etc. Five bed cases were accommodated in the infirmary ward, all of whom appeared to be comfortable and to be receiving all necessary attention. CLOTHING.

Each Service patient is supplied with two suits and an overcoat, made of superior quality material of different patterns. The clean and neat appearance of the men reflects much credit on their attendants.

ALLOWANCE.

Twenty-four patients were benefiting by the weekly allowance of 2s. 6d., and the remainder either did not wish to draw it or would not appreciate it; suitable facilities are given for the expenditure of pocket money.

DIET.

I am informed that porridge is given three days a week for breakfast, and on the remaining days the morning meal consists of bread, margarine and cocoa; four ounces of cake are issued for each male patient for tea on Sundays, but on other days at the evening meal, only bread, margarine and tea are provided. I learnt that the improvement of the dietary is receiving consideration and some addition to, and variation of, the meals supplied, as is being effected at many other Mental Institutions, will, I am sure, be appreciated by the patients.

MENTAL AND BODILY CONDITION.

Six patients were confined to bed, of whom five were suffering from general paralysis of the insane, and one man was a recent admission. The remaining patients were in good bodily health and their weights are well maintained.

AWAITING CLASSIFICATION.

Particulars of an ex-Service man (S.M.) admitted 19/10/22 were submitted to Pension Issue Office with a view to his classification as a Service patient, on 26/10/22. His regimental particulars were not available. A patient (F.G.) noted at the previous visit as awaiting classification was found to be not eligible.

GENERAL REMARKS.

I received a request from a Service patient (D.J.M.) that he might be transferred to an Institution near his home to facilitate visits from his relatives.

There was a total absence of complaints amongst the Service patients at this Institution, and all capable of expressing an opinion informed me that they were kindly treated and were comfortable in all respects; the friendly relationship existing between patients and staff was very noticeable.

My visit was much facilitated by the kindness and attention of the Medical Superintendent, Dr. Lowry, who takes a great personal interest in promoting the comfort and well-being of the ex-Service men; my thanks are due to him for accompanying me during my interview with the men, and for giving me any details I requested respecting them.

The Admissions.—These numbered 339, or 45 less than during the previous year. The direct admissions numbered 217 (109 men and 108 women), as against 255 in 1921. Of the 109 male admissions, 37 came from the Ministry of Pensions Hospital, Ewell, and, from the point of view of recovery, were of a very unfavourable type. Thirty female and 12 male patients were admitted under contract from Middlesex and London respectively. The chief Aetiological

factors were Prolonged Stress 19.81 per cent., Senility 14.74 per cent., Heredity 14.74 per cent., and Climacteric 9.67 per cent. Alcohol was the ascertained cause in only 3 of the total admissions.

The Discharges.—Of the 220 patients discharged, 52 were discharged "recovered," 54 "relieved," 113 "not improved," and 1 "Not insane." Money allowances were granted to 10 of the patients discharged recovered. The recovery rate on the direct admissions was 23.96 per cent. (Male 14.6 per cent., Female 33.3 per cent.). The male admissions were again of a most unfavourable character, 51.37 per cent. being not recoverable. The low recovery rate of 23.96 per cent. is accounted for by the fact that only 46 per cent. of the direct admissions were first attack cases and of a duration under 3 months on admission. It need hardly be pointed out how important it is that cases of mental disorder should be diagnosed and treated at an early stage, either with or without certification.

The Deaths.—The 77 deaths that occurred during the year represent a death rate of 8.22 on the average number resident (Male 10.30, Female 6.75 per cent.) as against 8.43 last year. The chief causes of death were Senile Decay 22.07 per cent. and General Paralysis 14.28 per cent. Dysentery as a causative factor showed a decline from 8.9 to 5.19 per cent., and Pulmonary Tuberculosis was responsible for 6.49 per cent. of the deaths. Three inquests were held during the year. A verdict of "Accidental Death" followed in 2 cases where death was the result of a fracture of the right femur. In the remaining case death was due to "Natural Causes."

Escapes and Accidents.—Twelve male and two female patients escaped during the year, all with one exception being recaptured. Three of the male patients who escaped were on parole at the time. The patients are allowed as much freedom as possible; they are permitted to go for walks with their relatives and friends, and are frequently given leave of absence extending from 4 days to a fortnight.

No serious non-fatal casualty occurred during the year, a fact redounding to the credit of the Staff and commented upon by a Commissioner of the Board of Control on the occasion of his visit.

Visits.—A. H. Trevor, Esq., a Commissioner of the Board of Control, visited the Institution on October 13th and 14th. His report is appended.

Deputations from the Brighton, Croydon, Dorking, Epsom, Godstone, Hammersmith, Kingston, Reigate and Wandsworth Guardians visited their respective patients during the year.

Health.—The general health of the inmates was on the whole good. An epidemic of Influenza occurred in January, and 48 patients and 23 members of the Staff were attacked, two male patients, both over 65 years of age, dying.

Works Department.—List of works carried out by Hospital Staff during the year ended December 31st, 1922:—

Alterations in Admission Hospital to provide observation, dormitory, &c.

Two steam drying radiators fixed in Laundry.

Batten seats fixed on Cricket Field.

Iron hood and ventilating pipe fixed in Kitchen, Admission Hospital.

Additional lavatory accommodation provided in Admission Hospital.

Water service laid to trough in meadow for cattle.

Lightning conductors fixed to recreation hall and at main entrance block.

Gas service laid to Netherne Farm cottages.

Cricket shelter erected.

Approach path repaired and lamp and seat provided.

Cinematograph apparatus installed.

Stott's pressure reducing gas governor installed.

Radiant heat bed made.

Check gas meters fixed in kitchen and laundry.

Pegging stations fixed in North Villa and connected up to Admission Hospital system.

Fifty radiator guards made and fixed.

Staff.—Dr. J. H. Ewen was appointed 2nd Assistant Medical Officer on January 1st after previous experience at the Kent County Mental Hospital, Chartham. Upholsterer J. G. Fagan was superannuated, the Committee granting him 5 years added service with the approval of the Ministry of Health. I regret to report the death of Attendant J. West from Pulmonary Tuberculosis following Influenza.

The conduct of the Staff generally was good, and their work characterised by patience, kindness and forbearance towards the patients under their care. Fourteen nurses and 11 attendants obtained the Preliminary and 8 nurses and 8 attendants the Final Nursing Certificate of the Medico-Psychological Association. This is satisfactory, but there is still, however, a regrettable tendency to regard Mental Nursing not as a profession but as a stop-gap or stepping-stone to something else. The continued prevalence of unemployment no doubt sufficiently accounts for this so far as the male attendants are concerned.

General.—The reorganisation of the Admission Hospital was carried out during the year, and one hopes that it may soon be possible to have open-air verandahs provided for the better treatment of the recent cases.

The dietary of the patients received much careful attention, and on December 1st a new dietary was brought into force improving the dinners and varying the monotony of the breakfasts and teas. A tomato house was built, and its erection was more than justified by the crop of over 2 tons of tomatoes sent into the Institution for the exclusive use of the patients.

A Cinematograph was installed, the first performance taking place on December 15th. Its installation was largely due to the generosity of J. T. Mears, Esq., a member of the Committee, to whom we are all greatly indebted.

I desire to express my best thanks to E. A. Medus, Esq., the Chairman of the Committee, and to the British Red Cross Society, for their kind gifts of books to the Hospital Library, and to A. Mizen, Esq., for his welcome gift of tomato plants.

In conclusion, I desire to thank the Consulting Surgeon and Consulting Physician for their valuable assistance during the year, my Medical colleagues, the Clerk and Steward and other Officers and the Staff for their loyal and willing help, and the Visiting Committee for their continued confidence, kindness and support.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT FOR 1922.

To the Chairman and Committee of the Surrey County Mental Hospital, Netherne.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit to you my report of last year.

The daily services at 8.40 have been held regularly in the Recreation Hall, and the two services of Sunday at 10,30 and 4. The attendances, especially in the morning, have been good, and the patients take a most hearty share in them. The Choir has much improved lately, and the singing is now quite excellent. For sometime I was without an Assistant Curate, but towards the end of the year I managed to secure the help of the Rev. W. G. Booth, M.A. Unfortunately later on he was obliged to leave, but I have had some admirable temporary help until I can get another permanent assistant.

The Celebrations of the Holy Communion for staff and patients have been held regularly. I prepared and presented to the Bishop for Confirmation five of the younger Nurses who were confirmed at St. Andrew's in March.

The work of visiting the patients in the wards and airing courts is always to me a most interesting task. This has been carried out systematically, and I feel I have many friends who appreciate my visits. From time to time short services are held in the Infirmary wards and the Holy Communion administered to the sick and those unable to get to the Chapel.

There have been 17 patients (5 male and 12 female) laid to rest in the Hospital Cemetery; all of these members of the Church of England.

The Hospital Library has been enriched by some very kind gifts of books—from the British Red Cross Society and later on by some 150 paper-bound books from the Imperial Book Club Library. These are issued and changed weekly on Friday mornings, and are much appreciated by both staff and patients. There are now altogether about 700 books in circulation.

I gratefully recognise the assistance and sympathy I am constantly receiving from all the Hospital Staff.

ROMAN CATHOLIC CHAPLAIN'S REPORT FOR 1922.

To the Chairman and Committee of the Surrey County Mental Hospital, Netherne.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit an account of the R.C. Services for patients in the Netherne Mental Hospital during the year 1922.

Mass was celebrated 52 times, and other services, consisting of Prayers and Sermon, were given on 15 occasions. The total attendance at these Services for the year was 1,507, as compared with 1,487 for 73 Services in the previous year. Although on several occasions I had to administer the Sacraments to sick patients in the Wards, none of those who died was buried in the Hospital Cemetery.

As in previous years, the attendances at the Wednesday morning Mass are better than the Sunday afternoon services, which accounts for there being fewer services on Sundays than in the year 1921. The numbers of the R.C. patients have also decreased during the past few months.

Since my colleague's visit to this Institution in December last, there have been the following changes among the patients:—

There were to-day on the books the names of 939 patients, 386 being of the male and 553 of the female sex; two of each sex were away either on leave or trial. Of the 152 patients of the private class, 65 are "Service" patients, who appeared to me to be most suitably cared for—in all but five instances they are in full receipt of the privileges arranged for them. The Institution has only a narrow margin of vacant accommodation, and consequently it will probably be necessary to make some modification in the numbers of Out-County patients received under Contract from other Authorities, especially as regards the 30 males received from London and the 33 women from Middlesex.

The maintenance charges per head per week for both home and Out-County patients has been reduced to 21s., private patients being charged for at the rates varying from 35s. to 63s.

All parts of the Institution were in excellent order, and the patients generally seemed to be contented, except on the question of discharge. I had nothing in the nature of a complaint, and many of the more sensible patients spoke gratefully of their treatment.

I had the opportunity of seeing a fruit and vegetable show that had been arranged for the Committee at their meeting last Thursday, and was much struck with the excellent display of potatoes, cabbages, tomatoes, and other garden produce. The new tomato house is theroughly justifying its erection.

I was glad also to hear that the Committee have determined to start a Cinema, a form of entertainment which experience in other institutions shows is much appreciated by the patients.

The dinner yesterday consisted of a thick soup with bread followed by a substantial suet pudding, and to-day of a very palatable meat pie with vegetables and bread. I had no complaints as to the food, but I am glad to know that the Committee are giving close attention to the dietary and to devising means of giving greater variety at the breakfast and teas.

The general health of the patients was quite satisfactory; 24 Males and 63 Females were confined to bed, but very few of them appeared to be acutely ill. The nursing of the sick is carried on efficiently, good use being made of the verandahs on both sides; great pains are taken to keep tuberculous and dysenteric patients apart from the others. As regards dysentery, there have been 23 cases under treatment since the last visit, 20 of them having been on the female side where four deaths occurred; there were no active cases of this disorder to-day; 9 cases are suffering from tuberculosis in an active form. The great majority of the newly-admitted cases are received and treated in the Admission Hospital, where it is unfortunate that there are no facilities for open-air treatment.

The 55 deaths were in all but two cases due to natural causes, the 2 excepted deaths being the result of accidents and the subject of inquests. Eleven of the deaths were due to general paralysis (10 males and 1 female) and 15 to senile decay. In 27 of the deaths the causes were verified by post-mortem examination.

The mortality rate per cent. during 1921 was 8.4 per cent. (10.1 males and 7.2 females).

The arrangements at North Villa where 19 Male and 40 Female idiot and imbecile children are housed seemed to be very satisfactory. I was assured that close attention is given to any cases that seem to be capable of benefiting by a higher standard of training than can be given there. The majority of the children are of a very low type.

In the Villas on both sides occupied mainly by convalescent and well-conducted patients most of the occupants have their parole in the grounds which they much appreciate.

The annual returns of miscellaneous subjects made to my Board are generally satisfactory and do not call for special comment.

During the period under review there have been no serious nonfatal casualties, a fact which redounds to the credit of the attendants and nurses.

The Nursing Staff consists of the following: -

The Committee have for financial reasons been unable to sanction the appointment of Night Superintendent, but it has been arranged for the Night Patrol Attendant on the male side at the Reception Hospital to visit the four male observation wards in the main building every hour between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. This arrangement, though an improvement, cannot be regarded as entirely satisfactory.

The hours of duty for the Nursing Staff are 60 hours per week for both Attendants and Nurses, exclusive of meal times; the attendants work 5 days of 12 hours and have 2 whole days' leave per week; the Nurses work 6 days of 10 hours and have one whole day's leave per week. Both attendants and nurses have 17 days' annual leave. Twenty of them have the Nursing Certificate of the Medico-Psychological Association with a pecuniary allowance in respect of them of 6s. per week.

Dr. Coombes has now the assistance of three Medical Colleagues, the Committee having appointed the third at the beginning of the present year.

"I visited this hospital to-day and examined all those patients who were classified as Service Patients. The total number of such patients on the books was 63, to all of whom I gave a separate interview, with the exception of L.T., who was absent on trial.

"The hospital was last visited by Dr. Forward on June 24th, 1921, when there were 75 Service Patients in residence.

"Very good accommodation was being given to the Service Patients. Twenty of the better type of patients were together in one ward, M.6., with only six other patients, and the remainder were well classified with the other patients in the general and infirmary wards according to their mental states. The hospital is of the modern type, and the wards were conveniently small and looked bright and cheery. Attention is given to the question of parole, and the patients are well catered for in regard to entertainments and amusements. The hospital has its own cinematograph installation which provides an entertainment once a week in the recreation hall, and dances are also held once a week during the winter months.

"With the exception of one patient who refused to wear it and those patients in bed, all the Service Patients were quite neatly dressed in special khaki clothing with collars and ties. Fifty-seven of them were drawing the special weekly allowance of 2s. 6d., arrangements being made for them to spend this in accordance with their own individual needs—the arrangements made for the issue and expenditure of this allowance were quite satisfactory and showed that every consideration was being given to the individual wants and peculiarities of the patients.

"I saw an excellent dinner being served in several of the wards, consisting of boiled beef, potatoes, cabbage, and bread, with date pudding as a second course. The dinner gave complete satisfaction to all and was of good quantity and quality. It was noted in the last report that some of the patients complained of the monotony of the meals; since the last visit several alterations in and additions to the diet have been made, and at to-day's visit it was gratifying to note how much the patients had appreciated this improvement. The dietary is now well varied, either porridge, dried fish, tinned meat or sausage meat is given for breakfast daily, two courses are given for dinner on six days a week, and either cake, jam or marmalade is issued for tea on three days a week.

"The general bodily health of the patients was excellent, and there were no patients in bed for reasons other than those connected with the treatment of their mental states. The prognosis for the large majority of the patients was unfavourable. I saw no cases who were likely to be fit for discharge in the near future, though J.C. was showing considerable improvement.

"It must be pointed out that this Mental Hospital has rendered very valuable service to the Ministry—apart from the treatment of the cases—as a clearing hospital for those patients who have been certified from the Ministry of Pensions Hospital, Ewell, for out of 76 admissions since the last visit, 51 cases have been transferred to other hospitals. As the accommodation is limited, it is essential if this practice is to be continued, that all Service Patients whose homes are not in the vicinity should be transferred to their respective districts with the least possible delay.

"General Remarks.—I received no complaints except as to detention by patients who were obviously unfit for discharge. It was obvious that the patients were receiving the most sympathetic consideration, and each patient's condition was intimately known to the staff and was receiving careful attention.

"I am indebted to Dr. Coombes, the Medical Superintendent, for his kindness and courtesy in affording me all the facilities for my visit as well as giving up much of his time to my assistance, and also to his colleague, Dr. Webber, for giving me all the necessary information as to the patients."
