

Annual Report of the Visiting Committee

(Pursuant to the Lunaey Act, 1890, Sec. 190).

Presented to the County Council at their meeting held on the 25th day of November, 1930.

To the County Council of Surrey.

The Visiting Committee submit their Report for the year ended 31st December, 1929, together with the audited accounts to 31st March, 1930.

At the meeting held on 6th May, Col. the Hon. A. G. Brodrick, A.D.C., was re-elected Chairman of the Committee, and Mr. E. A. Medus was re-elected Vice-Chairman.

Seven meetings of the Committee and 56 meetings of the Standing Sub-Committees were held during the year. In addition, meetings of special Sub-Committees were held, and frequent inspections of the buildings and grounds of the two Mental Hospitals were carried out in accordance with the provisions of the Statute.

The normal accommodation in the two Hospitals is as follows :-

Brookwood.

Netherne.

Total. 1,419 Beds. 1,000 Beds. 2,419 Beds. On 1st January, 1930, there were 18 patients chargeable to out-County Unions, 93 private patients, 65 Service patients, and 2 patients received from other Mental Hospitals under Contract. The total number of patients in the two Institutions was 2,421, being 2 in excess of the authorised accommodation.

Since your Committee's last Annual Report the erection of a Reception Hospital at Brookwood has been completed, and the building was formally opened by The Lord Lieutenant of Surrey (Lord Ashcombe, C.B., T.D.) last month. This block provides an additional 88 beds, thereby bringing the total normal accommodation at that Hospital up to 1,507 beds.

Commissioners of the Board of Control have visited the Netherne Mental Hospital during the year, and their report will be found on page 29. No visit was made to Brookwood during the period under review.

Members of the various Boards of Guardians paid visits and recorded in the visiting book their appreciation of the treatment of the patients. Six pairs of cottages for occupation by members of the staff were erected at Brookwood.

Builders' tenders for further extensions at the two Mental Hospitals have recently been accepted, and the buildings to be erected will provide accommodation for an additional 120 patients at Brookwood and 480 at Netherne, and the necessary staff.

At the request of the Standing Joint Committee a small portion of the Brookwood Mental Hospital Estate was appropriated for the purpose of being used as a site for a police house.

The acquisition of more pasture land at Brookwood became necessary in order to replace considerable portions of the Hospital Estate which had been allocated to housing purposes, and for the Reception Hospital. On your Committee's recommendation the Council purchased 16½ acres of freehold land adjoining the Hospital Estate.

Under the provisions of Section 284, Lunacy Act 1890, a sum of £5,000 was transferred from Brookwood to Netherne during the year.

The rules for the guidance of nurses, attendants and servants at the two Mental Hospitals have been revised and brought up to present day requirements.

Miss J. M. Adams resigned her appointment as Matron at Netherne in September, 1929, after completing 20 years' loyal service. Your Committee have placed on record their appreciation of her services to the County. The vacancy in the post was filled by the promotion of Miss E. M. Webb, Assistant Matron at Brookwood.

Sums paid in respect of superannuation allowances during the financial year ended 31st March last, and in the previous year were as follows:—

The average weekly cost of maintaining the patients at the two Mental Hospitals during the past financial year was approximately 21s. $10\frac{3}{4}$ d., and the weekly rate charged to the various Boards of Guardians in the County was 21s. 7d., thus showing that the Committee worked at a loss of $3\frac{3}{4}$ d. per patient per week. Statements showing how the average cost at each Hospital was arrived at are printed on pages 12(a) and 12(b).

At the date of this Report the maintenance rate stands at 21s. 7d. which is considered sufficient to meet the needs of the two Hospitals for the remainder of the current financial year.

GENTLEMEN,

I have to report the completion of the audit of your accounts, and of those of your officers, for the year ended at the 31st March, 1929.

BROOKWOOD MENTAL HOSPITAL. Wages.

If officers or workmen are unable to attend for their salary or wage at the usual time, it is the present practice to pay the wages on the production of a proxy slip. The receipt for the wage or salary is signed, however, not by the person receiving the amount, but at a later date by the person to whom the wage is due. It is desirable that the immediate recipient should sign for the wages at the time of receiving them, the proxy form being attached to the wages sheet on which his signature appears.

Gas and Water Accounts.

Although the Engineer keeps a record of the gas and water meter readings, the accounts received from the Water and Gas Company had not been checked with the Engineer's records or certified by him as being correct.

INVENTORY.

Although provision is made on the invoices for reference, when applicable to the Inventory, no such reference appeared on the invoices for the year under review. It is most desirable that every purchase of new furniture or equipment should be readily linked up with the entry in the inventory.

NETHERNE MENTAL HOSPITAL.

Farming and Gardening Account.

The year's working as recorded by the books resulted in a loss of £448 7s. 10d., as compared with a loss of £142 8s. 6d. for the previous year. It is of interest to note that although the supplies to the Hospital and receipts from sales during the year amounted to £5,613 3s. 2d., as compared with £7,396 17s. 2d. for the Brookwood Farming and Gardening Account, the expenditure on wages was £3,050 15s. 0d. at Netherne and £2,499 7s. 10d. at Brookwood.

General.

Stock.

The stock lists presented to the Committee at the end of each quarter include only the stocks of provisions, necessaries, and canteen. It is desirable that at the 31st March in each year a complete stock list be presented, setting out clearly the differences between the stock as recorded in the books and the actual stock as certified by the Stocktaker.

Superannuation.

It is observed that the value of uniforms supplied to the Nursing Staffs is not regarded as an "emolument" for the purpose of the Asylums Officers' Superannuation Act, 1909. Section 16 of the Act defines "Emoluments" as including all fees, poundage and other payments made to any established officer or servant as such for his own use, and also the money value of any apartments, rations or other allowance in kind appertaining to his office or employment. In the case of Netherne Mental Hospital, extra duty payments to Engineers and Pigmen as such did not appear to have been taken into account for superannuation purposes.

My thanks are due to your officers for their assistance at audit.

To the Surrey Asylums Committee.

GENTLEMEN,

I have to report the completion of the audit of your accounts, and of those of your officers, for the year ended at the 31st March, 1930.

I. BROOKWOOD MENTAL HOSPITAL.

No matter arose at audit of sufficient importance to necessitate special mention. Minor matters were discussed with the Clerk and Steward, who undertook to adopt the suggestions made.

II. NETHERNE MENTAL HOSPITAL.

It was observed that the Clerk and Steward has been in the habit of cashing cheques for officers out of money received on behalf of the Committee. There is greater excuse for this procedure here than in most places, the nearest bank being fully two miles away, but it has the effect of neutralising, to some extent, certain valuable audit tests, and should be discouraged.

Long investigation was necessitated by the state of the Farm Account, the figures submitted tending to shew that the value of potatoes produced was £624 7s. 3d. in 1928-9 and only £94 3s. 5d. in 1929-30. After making full allowance for difference of season, reduction of area planted with potatoes, etc., the discrepancy is too large, and I was convinced, after very full inquiry into detail, that neither figure can be trusted. No record is kept of the quantities raised, but they are arrived at by merely taking the quantities issued and the stock as certified to be correct, the amount produced being the resultant difference. As the issues are recorded in money, and the pricing has, to say the least of it, been somewhat unsystematic, such a method is wholly untrustworthy. The amount destroyed through spoilage is nowhere recorded. And even the stock-

taking affords little ground for confidence, in view of the following passage which occurs in a letter written by the valuer to the Clerk and Steward on the 14th April, 1930:—

"Herewith please find Draft Valuation in this matter, amounting to £7,040 5s. 10d. I should be glad if you would look through the same, making any alterations that you consider necessary, and return to myself, when I will have a fair copy prepared for the Committee."

The naiveté of the suggestion may, perhaps, be taken as proof that it had no improper motive; and the readiness with which the Clerk and Steward produced the letter acquits him of any complicity in it. But I find it very difficult to understand the mentality of a professional man who could write in this manner, when employed to make an independent valuation for the Committee's satisfaction. The valuation should be sent to the Committee's Clerk, and the Clerk of the Asylum should not be allowed to see it until he has balanced his accounts in draft. Then any discrepancies should be the subject of investigation.

APPENDIX II.

To the Visiting Committee of the Surrey County Mental Hospital, Brookwood.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report of the Medical Superintendent for the year 1929. The Statistical Tables are appended, and also the Financial Accounts prepared by the Clerk to the Hospital.

The changes that have occurred among the patients are as follows:-

These numbers show an increase of 16 men, a decrease of 6 women, a total increase of 10 patients. There were 26 more admissions than in 1928, but only 2 above our average number for the past five years. Sixty-two patients were discharged as recovered, and 27 were sufficiently well to permit of their discharge to their friends; the recovery rate being 26.27 per cent., practically the same as the previous year.

The death rate was considerably higher at 8.96 per cent., as against 5.58 last year. But although so much higher, the general health of the patients was very good, and we were free from all epidemics, except for a rather widespread outbreak of influenza in the spring, 48 members of the staff, and 114 patients being affected. 9 patients developed influenzal broncho-pneumonia, and of these 3 died.

The increase in the number of deaths was due, however, principally to the fact that we have a very large accumulation of senile cases; and of our deaths, 55 were 65 years of age and over.

General paralysis of the insane was the cause of death in 21 instances.

During the year, Dr. McCord has taken over the care of all general paralytics, and treatment by induced malaria was adopted in 10 cases; 5 of these cases have since died, 3 remain unchanged, and 2 are much improved.

One inquest was held during the year. In this instance, a female patient was received in an unconscious condition, and died 10 hours after admission. The jury returned a verdict of Death from Natural Causes.

Five female patients sustained fractures of small bones due to accidental falls, and one male patient sustained a fracture of the humerus, the result of being accidentally pushed down by another patient.

Two male parole patients broke their parole, and left the Hospital. They remained at liberty for 14 days, and were therefore discharged, by operation of the law.

One afterwards returned voluntarily and asked for re-admission.

Three other patients attempted to escape, but were brought back to the Hospital after a few hours.

Mr. Higgins, our Consulting Surgeon, performed 5 major operations for us, all successfully, during the year; he paid us many visits, and his services were of special value to the Hospital.

One female patient attempted suicide by swallowing a needle. An X-ray examination revealed the needle in her larynx, and it was successfully removed by Dr. Jobson, of Guildford.

Two Commissioners of the Board of Control visited the Hospital on January 7th and 8th.

Dr. Forward, the Headquarters Inspector of the Ministry of Pensions, visited the Hospital, and examined all service patients on June 6th.

Deputations from the Richmond, Hambledon, Guildford, Chertsey and Farnham Boards of Guardians visited the Hospital, and paid us a farewell visit during the year.

The structure and decoration of the Hospital has been maintained in good repair.

Important items completed include: -

The extension of the nurses' home. Twelve cottages for the staff. Extension of the fire station. Electrically heated plate-warmer to all wards in main building. Alterations to mortuary.

Lagging to steam and hotwater pipes. Heating:—

Attendants' billiard room.

F.8 Ward dormitory.

Laundrymaids' quarters.

Fire main to farm buildings.

Works at present in progress include: -

Reception hospital of 88 beds.
Automatic telephones.
Electric tell-tale clocks.

Dr. Barber left in November on his appointment as Second Medical Officer to the Bristol City Mental Hospital. The vacancy has been filled by the appointment of Dr. E. P. Boyle, from the Durham County Mental Hospital, Sedgefield.

I much regret to record the death of Charge Nurse Josephine V. Marsh, after nine and a half years' service. She was a very able nurse, and had endeared herself to her patients. Her death was a cause of real sorrow to the Hospital. Nurse Marsh was a widow, her husband having been killed in the Great War. With the consent of the Minister of Health, you returned her Superannuation Contributions to her young daughter.

Pensions were granted to Attendant H. Henwood, after 23 years' service; to Attendant R. E. Jones, after 33 years' service; to Charge Attendant G. Goody, after 26 years' service; and to Charge Nurse E. Newell, after 24 years' service. To all these we are indebted for their long and faithful service, and we parted with them with great regret.

Attendant E. Chapman was pensioned after 14 years' service, owing to infirmity.

Miss Webb, Assistant Matron, left in September on being promoted to the position of Matron at Netherne Mental Hospital.

The vacancy was filled by the appointment of Miss Graham, from Royal Asylum, Montrose.

The general conduct of the staff has been very good. We have, however, suffered from frequent changes in the probationer nursing staff. These changes throw a very heavy burden indeed on the more senior nurses and attendants, and I must give a special word of commendation to the Charge and Deputy Charge Nurses and

Attendants for their unremitting efforts to aid their patients, and, by their example, to train the junior staff in habits of kindliness and self-control.

The Medical Staff, the Matrons, Head Attendants and the Sister Tutor have, as in previous years, spent much time and labour in the technical training of the staff, 2 members of which were successful in obtaining the nursing certificate of the Royal Medico-Psychological Association; 70 members of our staff now hold this certificate.

To my Medical colleagues, to the Clerk and Steward, and to the Matron and Head Attendant, I am again indebted for their unvarying help in all that works towards the efficiency of the Hospital.

I cannot end my report without an acknowledgment of the unceasing support, consideration, and personal kindness which I have received from you, Mr. Chairman, and from the Members of the Committee.

Throughout the year ending 31st December, 1929, I had the assistance of my two curates, Rev D. R. Evans, B.A., and the Rev. Captain F. E. Lamb, R.N., in carrying out the Chaplain's duties.

Services were conducted in the Hospital Church on Sundays and special Days such as Good-Friday and Christmas-Day, as follows:—

On 1st Sunday in each month there was held a Service of Holy Communion with hymns at 9.30 a.m. (Short Ward Services in the afternoon in M. 11, F. 9, F. 10, E.).

On 2nd Sunday, Morning Prayer and Sermon in the Church at 9.30 and Evening Prayer and Sermon at 3.15 p.m.

On 3rd Sunday, Morning Prayer and Sermon at 9.30 a.m. (Ward Services in the afternoon, as above under 1st Sunday).

On 4th Sunday, same as 2nd.

On 5th Sunday, Morning Prayer and Sermon at (9.30 a.m.). No Service in the afternoon.

On Festivals (e.g., Christmas, Easter Sunday and Whit Sunday) I engaged the services of the Rev. W. F. T. Hamilton to assist me, and he conducted a Service of Holy Communion for the Staff only at 8 a.m. and Morning Prayer with Sermon and a 2nd Celebration of the Sacrament for the Patients and Staffs at 9.30. I conducted an afternoon Service on Easter Sunday and Whit-Sunday myself.

On Week-days (excepting Monday only) brief Morning Prayers of 20 minutes' duration were held in the Recreation Hall at 8.15 a.m., and were conducted by my Colleagues or myself with occasional help from Mr. W. J. Sidery, Organist and Schoolmaster in Knaphill, for which I remunerated him.

Regular visiting was carried out weekly by my colleague, Mr. Evans and myself in the Wards, and by the Rev. F. E. Lamb in the Hospital Cottages. Special attention was given to the Infirmary Wards. Once again it is my pleasure to express my appreciation of the invariable courtesy received from all members of the Hospital Staff during the carrying out of the Chaplaincy duties.

If, in conclusion, I might venture on one small suggestion, it would be in the form of a request that a small Chaplain's Notice Board, covered with green baize or felt and some 18in. x 15in. in dimensions, might be provided and placed somewhere in the front hall not far from the Porter's room. It would serve a useful purpose in regard to occasional notices affixed thereon giving information about special Services, etc., or events of interest in one of the Churches in the Parish as e.g., a Confirmation by the Bishop of Guildford.

The Admissions.—There were 228 admissions during the year, and of these 204 (75 males and 129 females) were direct admissions. The chief ætiological factors were Senility 20.5 per cent., the critical periods of life (Adolescence and Climacteric) 19 per cent. and Insane Heredity 17.6 per cent. There was a great preponderance of melancholic over maniacal states.

The Discharges.—During the year 127 patients were discharged, of whom 51 were discharged "Recovered," 68 "Relieved," 7 "Not improved" and 1 "Not insane." There is an increasing tendency

on the part of relatives to apply for the discharge of patients under Section 79 of the Lunacy Act. The Committee, in many cases, grant a probationary period on leave, on the expiration of which the relatives are required to attend at the Hospital to report to the Committee and to sign the Statutory Undertaking, or to bring the patient back. The recovery rate calculated on the direct admissions was 25 per cent., males 30.6 per cent. and females 21.7 per cent.

The Deaths.—There were 63 deaths during the year. Senility was the chief cause of death and was responsible for 25.4 per cent. of the mortality. Two patients died from Pulmonary Tuberculosis and four from General Paralysis. Autopsies were performed in 57.1 per cent. of the deaths. The death-rate on the average number resident was 6.2 per cent., the lowest recorded since the opening of the Hospital, in spite of the fact that 15 patients of an unfavourable type, or 23.8 per cent., died within a month of their admission. There was no inquest during the year.

Escapes and Accidents.—One male and three female patients escaped during the year. One female, who was not captured within the statutory period, was discharged by the operation of the law. Two male and five female patients sustained fractures of bones through accidental falls.

Visits.—Mr. S. T. Fraser Macleod, K.C. and Dr. A. Rotherham, Commissioners of the Board of Control, visited the Hospital on November 25th. Their report is appended. Dr. E. L. Forward, Ministry of Pensions Headquarters Inspector, visited the Service patients on August 7th. Deputations from the Croydon, Epsom, Dorking, Reigate and Richmond Guardians visited their respective patients during the year.

Staff.—I am glad to report that Dr. J. H. Ewen obtained the Diploma in Psychological Medicine during the year. Miss J. M. Adams, Matron, retired on pension in September after 20 years. Her pleasant, cheerful personality, her strong sense of duty and her devotion to the patients under her care made her deservedly popular with both Staff and patients. Miss E. M. Webb, Assistant Matron at Brookwood, was appointed in her place. Nurse Alice Kelley, who had been seconded by the Committee for three years' General Hospital training, resumed duty on July 9th. Three nurses and three attendants obtained the Nursing Certificate of the Royal Medico-Psychological Association, two nurses and one attendant passing with distinction. Three nurses and seven attendants passed the Preliminary examination.

General.—In January, February and March two nurses and four male patients suffered from Typhoid Fever. These cases formed part of a small epidemic (9 cases in all) which began in the latter part of 1928. Dr. S. E. Gill, Inspector of the Board of Control, visited the Hospital on March 26th. He approved generally of the methods of treatment, curative and preventive, being adopted, but made certain valuable suggestions which were carried into effect.

Five major operations were performed by our Consulting Surgeon, Mr. H. L. James, and both he and Dr. C. C. Tudge, our Consulting Physician, were of great help to us during the year.

The Fireman and members of the Hospital Fire Brigade were given a course of instruction by the Chief Officer of the Purley Fire Brigade. The fire appliances have been brought up to date, the Committee authorising an expenditure of £500 for that purpose.

The conduct of the Staff was good, and I desire to acknowledge my indebtedness to them. I have also to thank my medical colleagues, the Clerk and Steward, and the other Officers for their loyal and willing help. In conclusion, I wish to express to the Visiting Committee my grateful appreciation of their continued confidence, consideration and support.

APPENDIX IV.

SURREY MENTAL HOSPITAL, NETHERNE,

November 25th, 1929.

It appears from the figures returned to us to-day, that there are a few vacancies on the male side, but there is overcrowding on the women's side, and we understand that the whole question of providing further accommodation here and at Brookwood is at present receiving consideration.

Since the last visit a useful shelter has been erected in North Villa airing court in connection with the ward where the children are quartered, a fish fryer has been installed in the main kitchen, and a hydro, washing machine and clothes press have been added to the laundry appliances.

We were glad to hear that the Chief Officer of the Purley Fire Brigade has gone thoroughly into the means provided for dealing with an outbreak of fire, including the instruction of the Hospital Fire Staff, and that the Committee have resolved to provide further appliances at an outlay of £500.

The Committee have also authorised the provision of labels indicating the area of the various day rooms and dormitories, they have purchased some three dozen new seats for the use of patients in the airing courts, and have made some improvements in the Mortuary in the provision of curtains to separate the slabs. We do, however, hope the Committee will go further and, as so easily might be done with the space at their disposal, fit up this space so as to form a real viewing room where friends could pay their last respects to deceased patients in really suitable and reverential conditions. In asking them to do this we are asking for no more than has been done at so many Mental Hospitals throughout the country.

We must again return to the provision of letter boxes in the wards, a subject in which not only our Board but the Royal Commission have expressed clear views. We hope that this question and the suggestions of our Board in reference to notices as to correspondence will receive further consideration.

The Hospital is in all respects in capital order; the patients were without complaint, except in some few instances where appeals were

made for discharge, and, indeed, appeared to be as contented and well satisfied with their surroundings and treatment as the circumstances permit. Evident attention is given to their dress, the diet appears to be good and ample, though some have full parole a more limited freedom within the grounds is permitted to 37 men and 20 women. Short leave is granted to some and the system of granting trial is liberally used.

We understand that every endeavour is made to induce patients to engage in some form of work, but think that more useful and beneficial occupations might be carried out were, as is the case in so many hospitals, an officer appointed whose special duty it would be to seek out and train patients in other forms of work than those carried out in the shops, laundry, etc.

We are glad to know that an endeavour is made to trace the friends of unvisited patients and hope that this endeavour is not limited to the cases of patients who request this to be done, but that steps are taken to induce friends or relations to visit those whom it is noted are not in fact visited.

Since March 22nd, 1928, there have been 384 admissions, and as a result of other changes amongst the patients there are 388 males and 631 females on the books, in all 1,019. Four patients are on trial and a like number on short leave, so that there are in residence 388 males and 623 females, a total of 1,011. As many as 72 patients have been dealt with under Sec. 79 of the Lunacy Act.

The private patients number 129, including 34 "Service" and 3 "Ex-service."

There are 11 Out-County patients, but the contract as to the Brighton patients is terminated.

The maintenance rate for home patients is 21/7, and for private patients from 35/- to 42/-.

for day, and 8 and 11 respectively for night duty. Those registered or certificated in mental nursing number 34 males and 29 women.

There have been 8 cases of entertic fever, 4 of each sex, amongst the patients, and three members of the staff have also contracted the disease with, we regret to say, one fatal result. This small epidemic was investigated by one of our Board's Medical Inspectors and a conclusion was arrived at that, with one exception, all the cases could be traced to the same source, the infection spreading from the female to the male side through the foul laundry. Since then better precautions have been taken with this laundry to prevent further risk, but we made one further suggestion in regard to it to Dr. Coombes. In the excepted case, that of a Nurse, there appeared to be evidence that she was infected whilst away from the hospital. One "Carrier" is now kept in isolation.

There were also three cases of diphtheria and one of scarlet fever in the children's ward and 10 cases of diarrhea, one of which was recorded as being a dysenteric case. Of these 10 cases, 3 died, but in no case was the diagnosis confirmed by tests in the laboratory. We consider that such tests should be the invariable rule and their omission emphasizes the necessity for the appointment of a skilled laboratory assistant, as was advocated by our colleagues at the last visit. The whole time of the three Assistant Medical Officers must be taken up in the clinical examination and treatment of the 1,019 patients, and it cannot be expected that they should also be able to spend the necessary time for these and other routine tests in the laboratory.

Apart from the above the health of the patients appears to have been good, and there was little sickness in the Hospital to-day, the majority of those in bed being recent cases, infirm or under treatment for mental reasons. The sick and admission wards, though somewhat lacking in hot bottles and bed tables, which we understand are to be increased, are well equipped, and the patients in them were receiving careful nursing, but we thought greater use might be made of the verandahs for those needing treatment in bed, especially in the admission wards.

The Hospital is equipped with an operating theatre, a dental room, an X-ray and violet ray department and continuous baths for use in the admission hospital.

All the 114 deaths were due to natural causes, but the cause was verified by post-mortem examinations in only 75 of the deaths. No inquest has been held.

Only four patients, 3 women and 1 man died from tuberculosis, and it was surprising to see that only one patient, a man, is now known to be suffering this disease in an acute form.
