

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

Presented to the County Council at their meeting held on the 28th day of November, 1933.

To the County Council of Surrey.

The Visiting Committee submit their Report for the year ended 31st December, 1932, together with the audited accounts to 31st March, 1933.

At the meeting held on 26th April, Col. the Hon. A. G. Brodrick was re-elected Chairman of the Committee, and Mr. E. A. Medus was re-elected Vice-Chairman.

Nine meetings of the Committee and 34 meetings of the Standing Sub-Committees were held during the year. In addition, meetings of special Sub-Committees were held, and frequent inspections of the buildings and grounds of the two Mental Hospitals were carried out in accordance with the provisions of the Statute.

Commissioners of the Board of Control visited both Mental Hospitals during the year, and their reports will be found on pages 26 and 30.

In last year's Annual Report attention was drawn to the fact that at both Mental Hospitals the number of patients during the period under review had been greatly in excess of the certified accommodation. Your Committee are glad to be in a position to inform the Council that the extensions provided for in the scheme for which a capital vote of £300,000 was granted in 1929 have since been completed, and 600 additional beds (120 at Brookwood and 480 at Netherne) have been brought into use.

The drainage system of the whole of the Hospital buildings at Netherne has been connected up with the main sewer of the Coulsdon and Purley Urban District Council, and as a result the sewage disposal beds which had been in use at the Institution since its opening in 1910 have now been abandoned.

The new buildings at Netherne were formally opened by the Earl of Onslow on the 11th March last.

The Council decided, on your Committee's recommendation, to purchase at the price of £100 a strip of land situated immediately in front of certain of the staff cottages at Netherne in order to remove a number of trees which were obstructing the access of light and air to the cottages in question.

A contract was entered into with the Visiting Committee of the Napsbury (Middlesex) Mental Hospital for the reception at Netherne of 25 male and 25 female patients at a maintenance charge of 28s. 0d. per head per week.

The average weekly cost of maintaining patients at the two Mental Hospitals during the past financial year was approximately 21s. 8\frac{1}{4}d. per head, and the average weekly rate charged to the Public Assistance Committee was 22s. 2d., thus showing that the Committee worked at a profit of 5\frac{3}{4}d. per patient per week.

Statements showing how the average cost of each Hospital was arrived at are printed on pages 12a and 12b.

At the date of this Report the maintenance rate stands at 22s. 2d., which is considered sufficient to meet all practical needs for the remainder of the current financial year.

To the Chairman and Members of the Surrey Mental Hospitals Committee.

GENTLEMEN,

I have to report the completion of the audit of your accounts and of those of your officers for the year ended at the 31st March, 1933.

The average weekly cost for the year of the maintenance of each patient at Brookwood and Netherne Hospitals amounted to £1 ls. 9.667d. and £1 ls. 7.12d. respectively.

Brookwood Patients' Property.—The Clerk and Steward has the custody of certain small articles received from patients who, since their admission, have died in the Hospital. Failing any claim from relatives, these articles should be sold and the proceeds brought into account.

General.—It was observed that neither Farm Bailiff appeared among the officers covered by the Fidelity Guarantee Policy. It is desirable that these officers should be regarded in the same way as the Storekeepers who are already bonded.

My thanks are due to your officers for their attention at the audit.

APPENDIX II.

To the Visiting Committee of the Surrey County Mental Hospital, Brookwood.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present the 67th Annual Report of the Medical Superintendent, together with the Statistical Tables and also the Financial Accounts prepared by the Clerk to the Hospital.

The following table shews the numerical changes in the patients during the year:—

The Admissions.—There were 243 admissions, 48 less than in the previous year, due to Netherne now taking patients from an area formerly allotted to Brookwood. The admissions included 26 voluntary and 2 private cases. The chief factors assigned in causation were: Heredity, 20 per cent., Senility, 18 per cent., Stress, 15 per cent., Syphilis, 4 per cent., Alcohol, under 2 per cent.

The Discharges.—82 patients were discharged as recovered, giving a recovery rate of 35 per cent., as against 29 per cent. for the preceding year. 29 were sufficiently well to be discharged to the care of their friends, and 27 were transferred to other Institutions.

The Deaths.—107 patients died. The chief causes of death being Senility 21, Lobar pneumonia 19, cerebral hæmorrhage and thrombosis 12, and cardiac disease 11. 8 patients died of cancer and 7 of tuberculosis. The death rate was 7.1 per cent. as against 5.4 per cent. last year. Of the 107 deaths, 61 were over the age of 65.

Treatment.—In addition to the usual therapeutic measures, a special course of Artificial Hyperpyrexia was given to 14 cases; the results

were on the whole disappointing. Four cases of General Paralysis of the Insane were treated by means of Induced Malaria and one was discharged as recovered.

Accidents and Inquests.—One male and seven female patients sustained fractures of bones due to accidental falls. One female patient died five weeks after her accident and an inquest was held on this case, a verdict of accidental death being returned.

Escapes.—Three patients escaped during the year, all were returned to the Hospital after short periods.

Operations.—Major surgical operations were performed on four members of the staff and on eleven patients with uniformly satisfactory results. In this, as in former years, we are indebted to Mr. Higgins, our Consulting Surgeon, for his ever-ready skill and attention.

General Health.—The general health of the patients has not been so good as usual. Ten fresh cases of tuberculosis were recorded, but two were suffering from the disease on admission; we had a severe outbreak of influenza in March and April, 190 cases occurred, many members of the Staff being affected, and 4 cases developed Influenzal Pneumonia. 27 cases of Lobar or Broncho-pneumonia were also treated. Two female patients suffered from Erysipelas, four female patients and one nurse contracted Diphtheria; one nurse contracted Scarlet Fever; and one female patient suffered from Paratyphoid Fever.

Visits.—Two members of the Board of Control visited the Hospital on July 13th and 14th. Their report is appended.

Dr. Forward, the Headquarters Inspector of the Ministry of Pensions, visited and examined all the Service patients in residence on October 6th

The South-Western Area Guardians Committee visited the Hospital on May 27th.

Staff.—Dr. Boyle left on his appointment as Deputy Medical Superintendent at Powick Mental Hospital. Dr. Johnston was appointed to fill the vacant position as Junior Medical Officer, Dr. Hinds and Dr. Hennelly being promoted. Dr. Hennelly obtained the M.D. degree of his University, and Dr. Hinds obtained the Diploma in Psychological Medicine of the College of Surgeons.

Charge Attendants Rapley and Ayling retired after 28 and 32 years' service respectively, and Fitter J. C. Evans retired owing to ill-health after 31 years' service.

W. Hill, Head Cowman, retired after 35 years' service, and H. Barker, Assistant Baker, after 31 years' service.

During the year 14 members of the Nursing Staff obtained the Nursing Certificate of the Royal Medico-Psychological Association, and 40 passed the Preliminary Examination.

New Lavatory Basins and Hot Water to Wards F.10, A, B, C and D.

Four new Villas for Male and Female patients; these were opened in August, and have added very considerably to the amenities of the Hospital.

General.—The Staff have continued to maintain their state of efficiency and to carry out their duties with care and kindness.

I am grateful to the Medical Staff, to the Clerk and Steward, to the Matron, to the Head Attendant, and indeed, to all the Officers for their able and very willing help.

CHAPLAIN'S ANNUAL REPORT, 1932.

During the year 1932 I had the assistance of my two colleagues, the Rev. D. R. Evans and the Rev. C. E. Sylvester; and also on special occasions, such as Easter, Whit-Sunday and Christmas of the Rev. W. F. T. Hamilton. Mr. W. J. Sidery, Schoolmaster in Knaphill, gave occasional help by taking Morning Prayers in the Recreation Hall when one or other of the Clergy was prevented from attendance.

The Services have been duly carried on in the Hospital Church as follows:—

In addition on the 1st and 3rd Sunday afternoons, Ward Services of some twenty-five minutes' duration each have been conducted in M.11 and F.8 and M.11 and F.10E respectively. These have been well attended as also have the regular Services abovementioned held in the Chapel. The behaviour of the patients has been most reverent, their participation in the singing hearty, and their quiet attention to the Sermon with scarcely a single exception admirable. It seems evident that they both enjoy and appreciate the ministrations of their chaplains, as frequent reference by one another during the latters' visitation in the Wards show.

Morning Prayers at 8.15 a.m. every day of the week except Monday have been conducted in the Recreation Hall and the attendance has been fair. The number of male patients attending has certainly increased of late.

The Wards and Recreation Rooms and Yards have been visited on three or four afternoons each week in all parts of the Hospital buildings. I would like to acknowledge the capable services of Mr. Graham, the Hospital Organist and Choirmaster, as also on occasions (in Mr. Graham's absence on holiday) of Dr. Hinds.

The Church has been tastefully decorated for the various Festivals by Nurse Dykes (F.10B) and her helpers.

The Library.—With the permission of the Committee and approval of the Medical Superintendent, Miss Bischoff, of Ridgeacre, Hook Heath, has attended for an hour or two on Wednesday afternoons to look after the books which she has rearranged in the bookcases and shelves.

Once again I desire to acknowledge the courtesy at all times of the members of the Hospital Staff.

The Admissions.—There were 437 admissions during the year, and of these 330 (107 men and 223 women) were direct admissions, an increase of 75 over the previous year.

The chief ætiological factors were Insane Heredity 20.3 per cent., Senility 19.6 per cent., and Climacteric 16.9 per cent. Nearly a third of the patients admitted suffered from Melancholia and 20 per cent. from Delusional Insanity. Fifty-four voluntary patients were admitted and nineteen temporary patients of whom five had subsequently to be certified.

The Discharges.—During the year 210 patients were discharged, of whom 67 were discharged "Recovered," 103 "Relieved" and 40 "Not Improved." The recovery rate based on the direct admissions was 20.3 per cent., males 20.5 per cent. and females 20.1 per cent. Full advantage was taken of the provisions of Section 79 of the Lunacy Act, 1890, and during the year a large number of patients were discharged on application to the care of their relatives. In cases of doubt the Committee granted four weeks' leave as a precautionary measure, and the fact that it became necessary for several of the discharged patients to be brought back to the Hospital within the probationary period justified the wisdom of this course of action.

The Deaths.—There were 93 deaths during the year. Senility was again the chief cause of death, accounting for 19.3 per cent. of the mortality. The cause of death was verified by autopsy in 70 per cent. of the cases. The death rate on the average number resident was 8.1 per cent. Seven patients died from Pulmonary Tuberculosis, six from Influenza and its sequelæ, and one from Dysentery. Five inquests were held. The verdict in two cases was "Accidental Death," in one "Death from Natural Causes," in one "Broncho-Pneumonia following Fracture of the Femur," and in the last "Shock following Suicide whilst of Unsound Mind."

Accidents and Escapes.—Four male and six female patients sustained fractures of bones. They were all due to accidental falls, and the circumstances attending each were duly reported to you at the time. Four male and four female patients escaped during the year. All were recaptured and brought back to the Hospital within the statutory period.

Visits.—Deputations from the South Eastern, Mid Eastern (twice) and North Eastern Guardians Committees visited their respective patients during the year. The Hon. H. C. Bailey and Surgeon-Admiral J. F. Hall, Commissioners of the Board of Control, visited the Hospital on November 21st. Their report is appended. Dr. E. L. Forward, Headquarters Inspector, Ministry of Pensions, visited the Service patients on October 5th.

The Staff.—Mr. G. H. Steele, our Consulting Surgeon, performed two major operations during the year. In one case a man was admitted suffering from scarlet fever and in an acutely maniacal condition. As a rather rare sequela he developed gangrene of the leg. The limb had to be amputated and convalescence was uninterrupted. He was eventually discharged recovered. Both Mr. Steele and Dr. Tudge were of great assistance to us in difficult cases. I regret to report the death of Nurse M. Beadle, which occurred as the result of a motor accident. The Rev. G. Ayles-Waters was appointed Resident Chaplain. Dr. C. C. Beresford was appointed 4th Assistant Medical Officer on April 1st. I am glad to report that Dr. J. H. Ewen, 2nd Assistant Medical Officer, obtained the qualification of M.R.C.P.(Edin.) in October.

New Buildings.—The 80-block extension to the Main Building was opened for female patients on May 3rd. In November and December two villas of 40 beds each were occupied by male patients, two villas of 40 beds each and the convalescent villa of 20 beds by female patients. The opening of these buildings considerably relieved the congestion and did away with any overcrowding of the wards. While building operations were in progress the bakery, laundry and kitchen were also remodelled and fitted with up-to-date machinery. While untoward happenings are largely fortuitous it says much for the care and vigilance of the staff concerned that these works on the Hospital premises were carried out without incident.

Seven loose boxes converted into twenty-four standings, and automatic drinking bowls installed.

Garage.—Heated by steam.

Female Wards.—Floors relaid in concrete in kitchens, corridors and sanitary spurs of F.4 and F.12 Wards.

Painting.—Male Wards 3 to 7 outside. Steward's and Engineer's yards. Laundry yard. Laundrymaids' Block. Nurses' Sitting Rooms. Main corridor windows, administrative centre and Male side. North Villa redecorated top floor. F.1 to 12 Wards, back courts. Chaplain's house redecorated. Assistant Matron's Office. Reception Rooms M. and F. Admission Hospital. F.2 Admission Hospital, three side rooms. Estate Cottages redecorated. Piggeries repainted, Netherne Farm.

Hair Carding Machine, Upholsterer's Shop.—Additional guards provided.

General.—An epidemic of influenza occurred in January and February, and six patients died from the disease. One patient was admitted suffering from scarlet fever. With these exceptions the health of the Hospital was on the whole very good. There was no case of enteric fever and only one case of dysentery during the year. Fifty patients, twenty-five of each sex, were received under Contract from the Middlesex County Mental Hospital, Napsbury. One female patient was repatriated and removed by our staff to the Mental Hospital at Klosterneuburg, Lower Austria. The staff performed their exacting duties satisfactorily, and their conduct was good. To them, to my medical colleagues, to the Clerk and Steward, to the Matron, Head Attendant and other Officers my grateful thanks are due for their willing and loyal help. In conclusion I desire to express to the Visiting Committee my sincere thanks for their unvarying kindness, confidence and support.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

This year has seen vast extensions in every direction; the opening of many new buildings with the consequent increase in the number of staff and patients. This has meant a steady output of work, and, in certain directions at least, considerable progress. Church Services have been regularly maintained and extended, not only on Sundays, but on the Great Festivals also. Three collections were taken, viz., at Christmas, Easter and Harvest Festival. The total, £10 3s. 7d., has been forwarded to the Mental After-Care Association.

Services have been held regularly in the Wards and visiting has been thoroughly systematized, so that no part of the Hospital remains unvisited.

One might ask if there is any real response to Religious Teaching. To which I should reply that mental defect does not necessarily carry with it defect of Spiritual endowment. Those who seem quite unable to learn anything else show themselves able to learn their religion, when it is presented to them in a simple manner.

Permanent Early Services each Sunday and a monthly late Evensong for the staff and village have more than justified their introduction.

There have been laid to rest in the Cemetery twenty-three members of the Church of England, nine males and fourteen females.

The Library, both in the main building and also in the Admission Hospital, is still in great demand. New supplies of books and periodicals are always welcome. Our thanks to the kindly people who sent us so many, they were deeply appreciated.

Every kindly help and consideration has been shown by the officers and staff, with whom I have always maintained friendly relations. Ten candidates for Confirmation have been prepared and presented by me at local Churches from the staff and their children.

APPENDIX IV.

We have to-day complete the annual inspection on behalf of our Board of this Hospital and have found it well maintained and administered and the patients in receipt of good medical and nursing care and kindly attention.

Since the last visit by two of our colleagues a new villa for men has been completed and is now in occupation by some parole patients. The villa is very comfortable and suitable for the purpose and each man has a locker with a key for his private possessions. Three new villas are now in course of construction and these villas with the new Admission Hospital will add very much to the usefulness of the Hospital. We were much struck by the amount of work that must have been expended in laying out the grounds round the Admission Hospital, and we have no doubt that when the plants and shrubs have spread and taken good hold that they will add much to the attractiveness of the block. The verandahs too at the Admission Hospital appeared to us to be of a most satisfactory type, and the patients using them told us that even in the intense heat and bright sun of the last few days there was no glare and no oppressive heat under them.

There are now on the books of the Hospital the names of 1486 patients, 601 men and 885 women, but at the time of our visit one man and three women were on leave or trial leaving in residence 1482 patients, all of whom we believe we have seen.

During 1931, 123 men and 168 women were admitted, including 2 male and 3 female voluntary patients and 2 male and 4 female patients on a temporary basis. At the moment there are no temporary patients on the books, but there are 2 male and 3 female voluntary patients. During 1931, 36 patients were allowed out on leave or trial, and pecuniary assistance to 14 of these patients.

The patients classed as private number 32, and these with the exception of two women are all service or ex-service patients.

The figures supplied to us to-day show that there are vacancies in the day accommodation for 129 men and 13 women and for 24 men in the night accommodation, but that on the female side the night accommodation is exceeded by three. The weekly maintenance charge per head is 22s. 2d. for Home and 42s. 0d. for private patients, the average weekly maintenance cost as last ascertained was 23s. 0.294d.

Two male wards are open to the grounds and two male and three female wards are open to the ward gardens.

The present nursing staff consists of 12 male and 15 female Charge Nurses, 77 male and 88 ordinary Nurses, and 15 male and 19 female Night Nurses. 41 men and 34 female nurses are certificated or registered as mental nurses and 38 men and 22 women have passed the preliminary examination.

We found the patients very contented and orderly and free from complaints. They were very ready to converse, and we had long conversations with many of them and investigated such small complaints as were made to us as far as we could. The wards were well kept, clean and well ventilated, and the beds and bedding all that could be desired. We saw a good meal being served on the female side consisting of cold roast meat with new potatoes and salad and hot gooseberry and rhubarb tart. The day was very warm, and it was nice to see several of the women taking their mid-day meal at tables in the shade in the gardens.

We were very glad to see that the dietary sheet is made up for four weeks, so that the patients do not know beforehand what they will have for meals.

In the laundry we noticed that a temporary and easily movable guard was placed by the collar machine; we suggest that this guard should be properly fitted and fixed. The present guard is obviously only a makeshift.

We saw excellent work being done in the various workshops, and found the patients all very interested in their occupations. We understand that but for the present financial situation, an occupation centre would have been started by now, and we trust that as conditions improve the urgent necessity for one at which both sexes can attend will receive due attention. The site shown us by the Medical Superintendent is excellent and can be reached easily from the main building, Admission Hospital and the proposed new villas for female patients.

When circumstances permit, we should like to suggest an improvement in the mortuary, by making the present post mortem room into a viewing room, and building a new post mortem room at the back of the present mortuary. In this way friends would see the bodies in more reverent and less grim surroundings, and there would be no possibility of other bodies being accidentally exposed by curtains being inadvertently drawn aside. The structural character of the proposed viewing room would make it most suitable for the purpose.

The general health of the patients and staff has been good, with the exception of an epidemic of influenza in February, March and April of this year, which attacked 154 patients and 78 of the staff, and was of a severe type especially amongst the women. There have been three cases of erysipelas and four of diphtheria, including one of the female staff who is now making good recovery. The origin of this outbreak could not be traced, but the necessary precautions regarding isolation, etc., have and are being carried out. We were pleased to note that there have been no cases of enteric fever or dysentery.

There are now 14 cases of tuberculosis under treatment. The incidence and mortality for 1931 were 8.1 and 6.7 per thousand respectively, both of which are slightly higher than 7.7 and 5.7, the average for all Mental Hospitals.

The mortality rate for the year ended 31st December, 1931, was 5.4 per cent. (6.3 males and 4.8 females), which is considerably lower than 7.2 per cent., the average death rate of all Mental Hospitals.

Since the last visit there have been 92 deaths, 26 males and 66 females, and we note that in 50 cases the diagnosis was verified by post mortem examination. An inquest was held in one case, the particulars of which were duly reported to our Board at the time. The principle causes of death were pneumonia 26, senile decay 19, heart disease 13, disease of kidneys 8, brain disease 8, tuberculosis 4, general paralysis 1, the other causes of death not calling for special mention here.

There have been nine serious casualties since the last visit, all were fractures and all were in the case of women; these were due to accidental falls except in two cases in which the patient was pushed over by another patient.

Dr. Lowry who accompanied us round the Hospital on both days, has to assist him Dr. McCord and Drs. Paton, Hinds, Hennelly and Johnston.

Our visit was a pleasant and an interesting one.

APPENDIX V.

SURREY MENTAL HOSPITAL,

November 21st, 1932.

Since the last visit by two of our colleagues, a large amount of useful work in the way of improvements and additions have been completed or are nearly completed. The new female wards 11A and 11B are now in use and appear to be well designed. These are well and most comfortably furnished, fitted with lockers for each patient and are so designed that noisy patients can be isolated in side rooms, which are cut off from the dormitory by a glass screen. A new Male Villa is to be opened on Wednesday next; three Female Villas will probably be ready by January next and a Hospital Block for 180 patients will be ready probably in March or April. Alterations have been made in the cow houses, in the laundry, kitchen and bakehouse, and a considerable amount of decoration has been done on both sides of the Hospital. A new bathroom is now being provided at the Acute Hospital, on the female side of it, and the North Villa is being redecorated. A new bathroom on the male side is contemplated at the Acute Hospital.

These additions are most satisfactory and are evidence of the determination of the Committee to keep their Hospital up to date and in accordance with modern requirements.

Three men and 5 women were to-day away on leave or trial, leaving in residence 435 men and 729 women, 1,164 patients in all. Of these 1 man and 5 women are here voluntarily, 117 are private patients, 52 of these being women and 39 are service or ex-service patients. There are 5 female patients who are here temporarily.

During 1931, 8 patients were admitted voluntarily and 14 temporarily. The day and night accommodation in the Hospital exactly tallies and the figures show that there is overcrowding on the male side to the extent of 28, and on the female side of 64. The weekly maintenance charge per head is 22s. 2d. for Home and 31s. 6d. to 42s. 0d. for Private Patients and the average weekly maintenance cost as last ascertained was 21s. 2.875d.

The Nursing Staff consists of 9 men and 17 women with charge rank, 52 men and 74 women ordinary, and 8 men and 12 women night nurses. Forty-one men and 34 women are certificated or registered as mental nurses and 7 men and 10 women have passed the preliminary examination.

We found the patients to-day very happy and contented, and except on the subject of detention we had very few complaints. Such as we did have, our enquiries showed to be without foundation. We saw a large number of the patients in the ward gardens. We were interested to see some extremely pretty gardens in the waste plots of ground inside the Hospital. These have been laid out and planted, and are mown and kept by the nurses and patients, and even at this late date were to-day bright with chrysanthemums. The wards were quite beautiful with flowers, particularly on the female side, and it was a very great pleasure to us to see that the noisy wards were quite as well supplied with flowers as the others, and we were told that no difficulty is experienced in keeping the flowers and plants there.

In the new block 11A and 11B the W.C.'s have foot releases which are said to work well, and round the cloak room wall there is a seat with lockers underneath for patients to rest on when changing their boots. In the kitchen we saw a comparatively new fish fryer, and in the bakehouse and laundry some new and very up-to-date machinery. We are inclined to think that the carding machine requires some further protection, and think that if the feeding trough was lengthened and the casing over the rollers carried further along the movable feed, it would meet the case and would not be an expensive alteration.

When writing of the inside gardens above, we should have suggested the provision of a few garden seats and chairs and hope that in the summer the patients may be allowed to use these for tea and open-air recreation; these gardens are so attractive and some of them so sunny and at the same time sheltered that it is a pity not to make full use of them.

In the Visiting Rooms we think the addition of some small tables at which patients and friends could sit would make for comfort and would make the place more hospitable looking and break up the line of people sitting round the edge of the room which cannot but look formal and uncomfortable.

The canteen we are glad to hear continues to supply a real need and give pleasure to many.

The general health of the patients since the last visit has been very good; there have been only 29 cases of influenza and one each of dysentery and scarlet fever, the latter being admitted with the disease.

The number of deaths was 127, 49 males and 78 females, and in 96 cases the cause was verified by post mortem examination. The principal causes of death were senile decay 28, pneumonia 18, heart disease 13, organic brain disease 12, tuberculosis 10, and general paralysis 6.

At our visits there were only three females suffering from acute tuberculosis. In 1931 there were 4.7 per thousand reported with a death rate of 7.5 per thousand, the admission rate compared very favourably with that of 7.7 per 1,000 for all Mental Hospitals, whilst the death rate was slightly higher.

Last year there were no dysentery cases, and this year only one female who died from the disease. The source of infection could not be traced and we were glad to hear that her case was an isolated one.

Inquests were held on 5 patients, the verdict in 3 being "Accidental death," one from natural causes and one suicide. In each case the particulars were referred to our Board at the time.

Serious but non-fatal casualties since the last visit have numbered 16, and in two cases the injury was self-inflicted during excitement, in two the patient was pushed down by other patients and 12 were due to falls mainly in the wards. All were of an accidental character and require no special notice here.

Dr. Coombes has to assist him Dr. Webber, Dr. Ewen (whom we congratulate on passing successfully the M.R.C.P. examination lately), Dr. McEvoy and Dr. Beresford.

Our visit was a most satisfactory one.
