

**An improved arm bandage, more particularly for children / [Salomon Strauss].**

COMPLETE SPECIFICATION.

An Improved Arm Bandage, more particularly for Children.

I SALOMON STRAUSS of 5 Reichneustrasse, Frankfort-on-the-Main, in the Empire of Germany, Merchant, do hereby declare the nature of this invention and in what manner the same is to be performed, to be particularly described and ascertained in and by the following statement:—

5 My invention has for its object an improved bandage for the arm more especially for children's use intended to prevent the wearers during illness or sleep, and without impeding freedom of movement, from scratching or otherwise injuring themselves on the upper part of the body, or interfering with any other bandages which may be applied, such for instance as over the eyes, and also to prevent them  
10 sucking their fingers or biting their nails.

In the accompanying drawings,

Figure 1 is an elevation of this improved bandage whilst

Figure 2 shows its position on the arm.

A piece of drill or ticking *a* of any suitable length is prepared exactly corre-  
15 sponding to the shape of the arm at the elbow, so that when the bandage is put on, the elbow lies in the centre of the widest point of the ticking and the two longitudinal edges *cd* connected by a lace or cord *b* lie uppermost. Stiffening strips *e* are sewn or inserted in the bandage against the elbow, and in consequence of their position and want of flexibility prevent the arm from being bent at the  
20 elbow, but allow the upper arm and hand to be moved so that the wearer is not altogether prevented from using the bandaged arm. The two longitudinal edges have an overlapping flap, so that the bandage when placed directly on the arm, entirely covers the same.

Having now particularly described and ascertained the nature of my said  
25 invention and in what manner the same is to be performed, I declare that what I claim is:—

An improved arm bandage more particularly for children, consisting of a piece of ticking or the like formed to the shape of the arm secured by means of a lace or cord and having stiffening strips inserted in a suitable position, whereby the  
30 bending of the arm at the elbow joint is prevented without interfering with the free movement of the upper arm or of the hand; substantially as hereinbefore described and shown on the accompanying drawing.

COMPANIES ACT, 1862

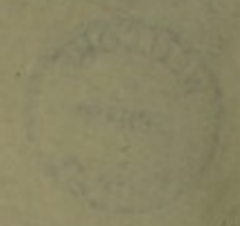

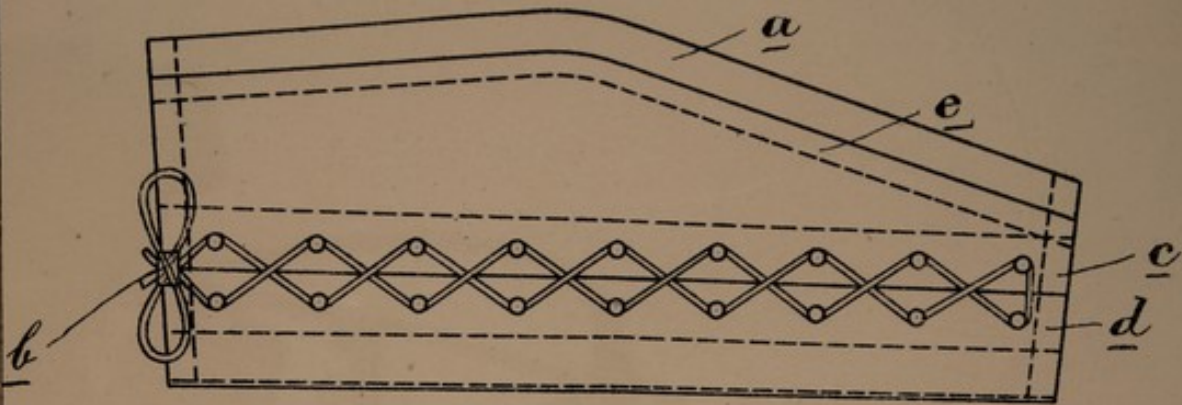
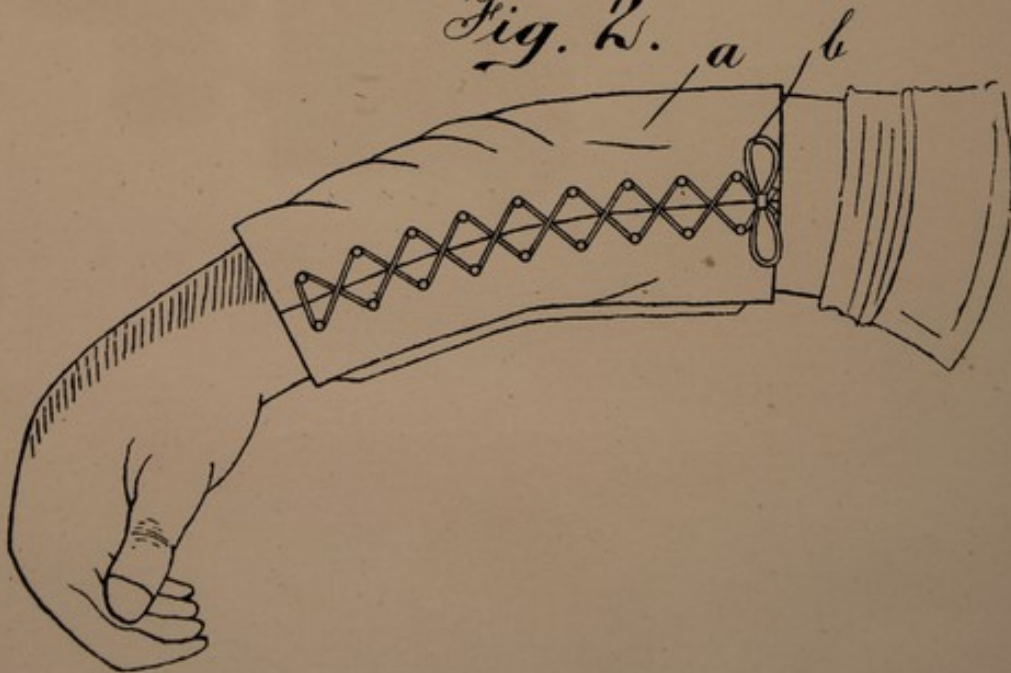
