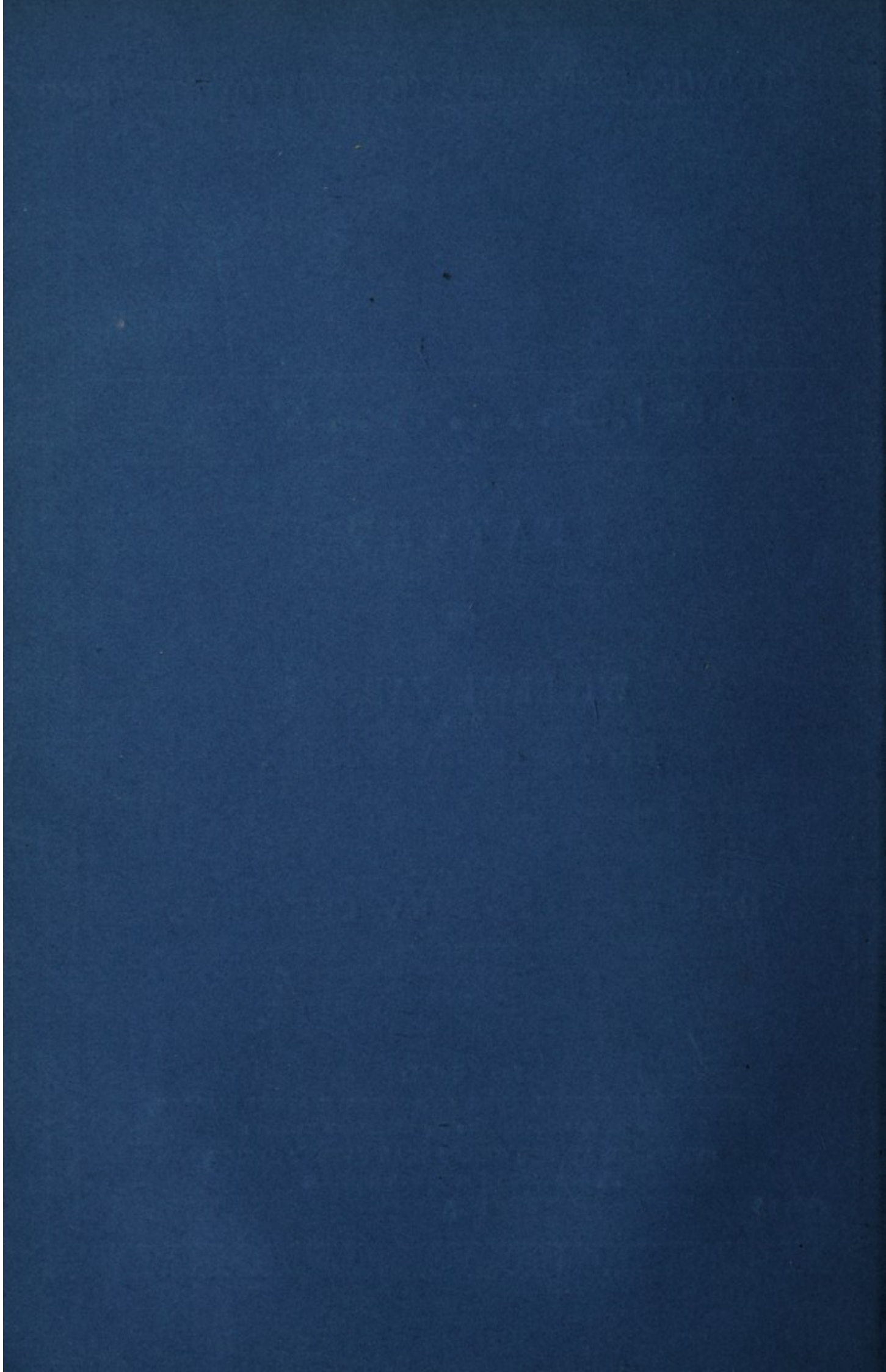

FABENE AND CAMPBELL'S PATENT.

GEORGE THE SECOND, by the grace of God, &c., to all to whom these Presents shall come greeting.

WHEREAS our trusty and welbelovèd **WILLIAM FABENE** and **EDWARD CAMPBELL**, Gentlemen, have by their petition humbly represented vnto vs that
5 they have with study, labour, and long observation, found out, invented, and brought to perfection "A CERTAIN, SAFE, AND INFALLIBLE REMEDY FOR SMOKY CHIMNEYS OR ANY ANNOYANCE THEREFROM," which new method they perform by what they call an established mantle chimney being fixed vpon the top of the chimney without doors, and can be made of brick and lime, or any other
10 building materials: That the said Invention, if vsed, will very much contribute toward^e putting a stop to the dangerous practice of carrying the chimney to that extravagant height now commonly done, and frequently by further addiçon of funnels and other ineffectual devices, which render not only the houses but peoples lives in great danger in time of high winds; and
15 having prayed vs to grant to them, their executors, administrators, and assignes, our Royal Letters Patents for the sole vse and benefit of their said new Invention, within that part of our Kingdom of Great Britain called England, our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick-vpon-Tweed, for and during the terme of fourteen yeares, according to the Statute in that case made and
20 provided, wee being willing to give encouragement to all arts and inventions that may be for the publick benefit, are graciously pleased to condescend to their request.

KNOW YEE THEREFORE, that wee, of our especial grace, certain know-
 ledge, and meer moçon, have given and granted, and by these Presents, for vs,
 our heires and successors, do give and grant vnto the said William Fabene
 and Edward Campbell, their executors, administrators, and assignes, our
 especial lycence, full power, sole priviledge and authority, that they the said 5
 William Fabene and Edward Campbell, their executors, administrators, and
 assignes, by themselves, or by their deputy and deputies, servant^c or agents,
 or such others as they the said William Fabene and Edward Campbell, their
 executors, administrators, or assignes, shall at any time agree with and no
 others, from time to time and at all times hereafter during the term of yeares 10
 herein expressed, shall and lawfully may make, vse, and exercise their said new
 Invençon for a certain, safe, and infalible remedy for smoaky chimneys, or any
 annoyance therefrom, as above described, within that part of our Kingdom of
 Great Britain called England, our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick-
 vpon-Tweed, in such manner as to him the said William Fabene and Edward 15
 Campbell, their executors, administrators, and assignes, or any of them, shall
 in their discreçons seem meet, and that they the said William Fabene
 and Edward Campbell, their executors, administrators, and assignes, shall
 and may have and enjoy the whole profit, benefit, cōmodity, and advan-
 tage from time to time comeing, growing, accrewing, and ariseing by 20
 reason of the said Invention, for and during the full term of yeares herein
 mençoned to have, hold, exercise, and enjoy the said lycence, powers, pri-
 viledges, and advantages herein-before granted or mentioned to be granted
 vnto the said William Fabene and Edward Campbell, their executors,
 administrators, and assignes, for and during and vntill the full end and 25
 term of fourteen yeares from the date of these Presents next and immediately
 ensueing and fully to be compleat and ended, according to the Statute
 in such case made and provided, and to the said William Fabene and
 Edward Campbell, their executors, administrators, and assignes, and every of
 them, may have and enjoy the full benefit and the sole vse and exercise 30
 of the said Invention, according to our gracious intençon herein-before
 declared, wee do by these Presents, for vs, our heires and successors, require
 and strictly cōmand all and every person and persons, bodies politick and
 corporate, and all other our subiects whatsoever, of what estate, quality or
 degree, name or condition soever they be, within that part of our Kingdom of 35
 Great Britain called England, our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick-
 vpon-Tweed, aforesaid, that neither they or any of them, at any time during
 the continuance of the said term of fourteen yeares hereby granted, either
 directly or indirectly do make, vse, or put in practice the said Invençon, or

any part of the same so attained vnto by the said William Fabene and Edward Campell, as aforesaid, nor shall in anywise counterfeit, imitate, or resemble the same, nor shall make or cause to be made any addition thereunto, or subtraction from the same, whereby to pretend himselfe or themselves the inventor or inventors, devisor or devisors thereof, without the lycence, consent, or agreement of the said William Fabene and Edward Campbell, their executors, administrators, or assignes, in writing vnder their hands and seales first had and obtained in that behalfe, vpon such pains and penalties as can or may be iustly inflicted on such offenders for their contempt of this our
5
10 royal cōmand, and further to be answerable to the said William Fabene and Edward Campbell, their executors, administrators, and assignes, according to law, for their damages thereby occasioned: And moreover wee do by these Presents, for vs, our heires and successors, will and cōmand all and singular the justices of the peace, mayors, sheriffs, bayliffs, constables, headboroughs,
15 and all other officers and ministers whatsoever of vs, our heires and successors, for the time being, that they or any of them do not nor shall at any time hereafter during the said term hereby granted in anywise molest, trouble, or hinder the said William Fabene and Edward Campbell, their executors, administrators, or assignes, or any of them, or their deputies, servants, or
20 agents, in or about the due and lawfull making vse or exercise of the aforesaid Invention, or anything relating thereto: Provided always, and these our Letters Patents are and shall be vpon this condition, that if at any time during the said term hereby granted it shall be made appeare to vs, our heires or successors, or successors, or any or more of our or their Privy Council, that this
25 our grant is contrary to law or preiudicial or inconvenient to our subiects in general, or that the said Invençon is not a new invention as to the publick vse or exercise thereof, in that said part of our said Kingdom of Great Britain called England, our Dominion of Wales, or Town of Berwick-vpon-Tweed, aforesaid, or not invented and found out by the said William Fabene and
30 Edward Campell, as aforesaid, then vpon signification and declaraçon thereof to be made by vs, or heires or successors, or by the lord^e and others of our or their Privy Council, or any six or more of them, vnder their hand^e, these our Letters Patents shall forthwith cease, determine, and be vtterly void to all intents and purposes, anything herein-before contained to the con-
35 trary thereof in anywise notwithstanding: Provided also that these our Letters Patents, or anything herein contained, shall not extend or be construed to extend to give priviledge vnto the said William Fabene and Edward Campbell, their executors, administrators, or assignes, or any of them, to vse or imitate any invention or work whatsoever which hath heretofore been

found out or invented by any other of our subject^e whatsoever, and publickly
 used or exercised in that said part of our Kingdom of Great Britain called
 England, our Dominion of Wales, or Town of Berwick-vpon-Tweed, afore-
 said, vnto whom like Letters Patent^e or priuiledges have been already
 granted, for the sole vse, exercise, and benefit thereof, it being our will 5
 and pleasure that the said William Fabene and Edward Campbell, their
 executors, administrators, and assignes, and all and every other person or
 persons to whom like Letters Patent^e or priuiledges have been already granted,
 as aforesaid, shall distinctly vse and practise their severall invençions by
 them invented and found out, according to the true intent and meaning of the 10
 same respective Letters Patents, and of these Present^e: Provided likewise
 nevertheless, and these our Letters Patents are vpon this express condiçon,
 that if the said William Fabene and Edward Campbell, the executors or
 administrators, or of them, or any person or persons which shall or may at
 any time or times hereafter during the continuance of this grant have or 15
 claime any right, title, or interest in law or equity of, in, or to the power,
 priuiledge, and authority, of the sole vse and benefit of the said Invention
 hereby granted, shall make any transferr or assignement, any pretended
 transferr or assignement of the said liberty and priuiledge, or any share or shares
 of the benefit or profit thereof, or shall declare any trust thereof, to or for 20
 any number of persons exceeding the number of five, or shall open or cause to
 be opened any booke or books for public subscriptions, to be made by any
 number of persons exceeding the number of five, in order to the raising any
 sume or sumes of money vnder pretence of carrying on the said liberty or pri-
 uiledge hereby granted, or shall by him or themselves, or his or their agent^e 25
 or servants, receive any sume or sumes of money whatsoever, of any number
 of persons exceeding in the whole the number of five, for such or the intents
 or purposes, or shall presume to act as a corporate body, or shall divide the
 benefit of these our Letters Patents, or the liberty or priuiledges hereby by vs
 granted, into any number of shares exceeding the number of five, or shall 30
 comitt or do or p^ecure to be comitted or done any act, matter, or thing what-
 soever during such time as such person or persons shall have any right or title,
 either in law or equity, in or to the said premisses which would be contrary to
 the true intent and meaning of a certain Act of Parliament made in the sixth
 year of the reign of our late Royal Father King George the First, intituled 35
 (An Act for the better securing certain Powers and Priuiledges intended to be
 granted by His Maiestie by Two Charters for Assurance of Ships and Mer-
 chandizes at Sea, and for lending Money vpon Bottomry, and for restraining
 severall extravagant and vnwarrantable Practices therein mençoned), if these

our Letters Patent^c had not been granted, or in case the said power, priviledge, or authority shall at any time hereafter become vested in or in trust for more than the number of five persons or their representatives at any one time (reckoning executors or administrators as and for the single person whom
 5 they represent, as to such interest as they are or shall be intitled in right of such their testator or intestate), that then and in any of the said cases these our Letters Patents and all liberties, privileges, privileges, privileges, and advantages whatsoever hereby granted, shall vtterly cease, determine, and become void, anything herein-before contained to the contrary thereof in anywise
 10 notwithstanding. And lastly, wee do by these Presents, for vs, our heires and successors, grant vnto the said William Fabene and Edward Campbell, their executors, administrators, and assignes, that these our Letters Patents or the inrollment or exemplificaçon thereof shall be in and by all things good, firme, valid, sufficient, and effectual in the law, according to the true intent and mean-
 15 ing thereof, and shall be taken, construed, and adiudged in the most favourable and beneficial sense for the best advantage of the said William Fabene and Edward Campbell, their executors, administrators, and assignes, as well in all our Courts of Record as elsewhere, and by all and singular the officers and ministers whatsoever of vs, our heires and successors, within that part of our
 20 said Kingdom of Great Britain called England, our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick-vpon-Tweed, aforesaid, and amongst all and every the subiects of vs, our heires and successors, whatsoever and wheresoever, notwithstanding the not full and certain describing the nature or quality of the said Invention, or of the materials thereto conducing and belonging.
