

10 exercise, and vend my new Invention of "AN ELIXIR FOR THE CURE OF THE DROPSY, JAUNDICE, STONE, AND GRAVEL," within England and Wales and Town of Berwick-upon-Tweed; in which said Letters Patent there is contained a provisoe, obliging me, the said Joseph Collett, by some instrument in writing under my hand and seal, to cause a particular description of the nature

rectifyed and incorporated according to art, and then filtered for use, which compleats the preparation, and then it is to be taken in the quantity of one large spoonfull, in half a gill of warm marsh mallowes tea, four times a day by a grown person, and so in proportion for persons of more tender years, and to be continued till the cure is performed.
