I, David Dick, Engineer, residing at 55, George Street, Paisley, in the County of Renfrew, do hereby declare the nature of the said Invention for 5 "Improved Cushions for Trusses and other similar uses," to be as follows, and consists in substituting a small bag of caoutchouc or other suitable material, filled with air, in lieu of mocmain or any of the materials now in use. By this means, when applied to a truss or other like purpose, the cushion can receive any required pressure and still accommodate itself accurately to the 10 body.
