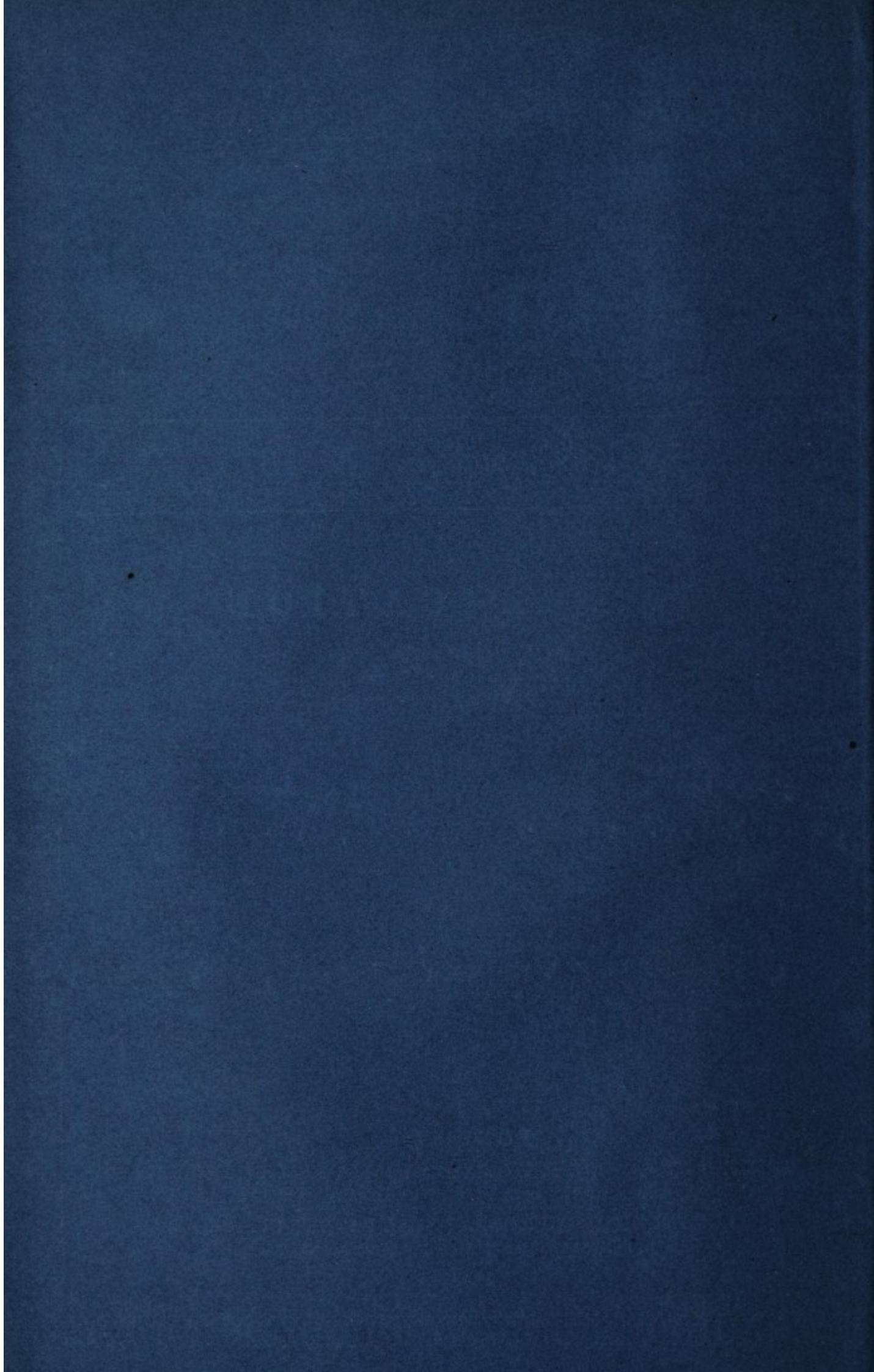

**PROVISIONAL SPECIFICATION** left by Henry Wikoff at the Office of the Commissioners of Patents, with his Petition, on the 24th July 1858.—A communication.

I, HENRY WIKOFF, of Holly Lodge, Kensington Gore, in the County of  
5 Middlesex, Esquire, do hereby declare the nature of the said Invention for  
“AN IMPROVED APERIENT MEDICINE, TO BE USED IN THE SHAPE OF A BISCUIT, CAKE,  
OR SWEETMEAT” (a communication), to be as follows:—

This Invention consists in mixing “Arabian scammony” with the materials  
used in the manufacture of cakes, biscuits, and sweetmeats, to be used as an  
10 aperient medicine, at the same time disguising the nauseous taste thereof and  
rendering it more palatable. Other aperient drugs may be mixed in like  
manner, the object being to render doses of aperient medicine less objection-  
able to the palate and less difficult to retain on the stomach.
