PROVISIONAL SPECIFICATION left by Jean Sirou at the Office of the Commissioners of Patents, with his Petition, on the 7th February 1863.

I, JEAN SIROU, of Castel Sarrazin, in the Department of Tarn-et-Garonne, 5 in the Empire of France, Contractor of Public Works, do hereby declare the nature of the said Invention for "**A NEW MEDICINAL PREPARATION FOR INTERNAL AND EXTERNAL APPLICATION,**" to be as follows:—

The preparation forming the subject of my Invention will afford almost immediate relief in cases of headache, cramps in the stomach, colic, bruises. 10 burns, cuts, female complaints, diseases of children, such as worms and convulsions, and other ailments. It may also be used to preserve the hair.

It is composed of the following plants, culled when at maturity and in possession of all their aroma, both flower and leaf being used, unless one or other be specially indicated:—1. *Mentha viridis*. 2. *Artemisia foliis pin-*
15 *natisidis* (vul. mugwort). 3. *Hypericum perforatum*. 4. *Lavendula spicata*.
5. *Achillea millefolium*. 6. *Hypericum fuga demonum*. 7. *Plantago*
arenaria. 8. *Hissopus officinale*. 9. *Thymus serpillum*. 10. *Thymus*
vulgaris. 11. *Teucrium foliis cordatis undulatis*. 12. *Artemisia absinthium*.
13. *Salvia officinale*. 14. *Fœniculum officinale*. 15. *Anettrum fœniculum*.
20 16. *Apium petroselinum*. 17. *Borrago officinale*. 18. *Lilium candidum*.
19. *Flores sambuci*. 20. *Spirea almaria*. 21. *Flores tilia parvifloræ*.

Sirrow's Medicinal Preparation.

I place the flowers and leaves above enumerated in a glass vase or bottle, mixing them in about equal proportions. I then press them gently down with the hand, and pour upon them as much wine brandy as will cover them, leaving the whole to macerate and steep at an ordinary temperature during thirty days, when I filter, and the liquid is ready for use. It may be applied with ⁵ a linen rag or a sponge to the skin or rubbed in, or it may be taken internally.
