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

NTRODUCTION.

1. OTHING has contributed more to the advancement of fcience, than the eftablishment of literary focieties. These excite a generous ardour in liberal minds, and raise even envy itself into useful emulation.

2. In that fcience, which rational effimation has placed first in the fcale of honour, the fcience which proposes the noblest object for its end, the prefervation and restoration of health; the improvements which have already resulted from the formation of focieties, are well known to the medical world.

3. The principal part of our knowledge must be ever derived from comparing our own observations with those of others. In this view the utility of societies, A 2 which which afford an opportunity for the mutual communication of our thoughts, must be fufficiently apparent. Deceased authors cannot folve all our difficulties, nor will the observations made in other ages and climates, hold always true in our own.

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in medicine

4. There are fome circumftances peculiarly favourable to a rifing fociety. Each member thinking the honour of the affociation in fome meafure dependent upon himfelf, is ftimulated to the higheft exertion of his powers; unawedby the fame, and fearlefs of being eclipfed by the luftre of his predeceffors, no damp is call upon the vigour of that genius, which can alone produce great difeoveries.

5. The intention of this fociety is to give the practitioners in the healing art, frequent opportunities of meeting together, and conferring with each other, concerning any difficult or uncommon cafes which may have occurred; or communicating any new difcoveries in medicine [5]

6. Medical papers, which may tend to the advancement of the fcience, will be received by the fociety, and fuch as may be deemed worthy of publication, carefully preferved, until fufficient matter for a volume fhall be collected.

7. Many useful facts are lost from the *Hisrough* want of a proper opportunity of conveying them to the world; and though when confidered feparately, they may not be of fufficient importance to claim the attention of the publick, yet when a number of them are collected together, they may become highly deferving of notice. To fuch facts, when properly authenticated, the fociety will always be particularly attentive.

8. In order to excite practitioners to bring those talents to light, which would otherwise lie buried and useless to the community, the society have resolved to hold forth honorary rewards to those who shall improve the medical art : and altho' this has not been hitherto attempted in these kingdoms, yet they hope that their A_3 example dele { example may appear not altogether unworthy of imitation.

9. The fociety has likewife founded a medical library, that its members may obtain an eafy accefs to the best ancient and modern authors.

10. The members of this fociety have extended its foundation as much as poffible. Wishing to rife superior to all low distinctions, they have endeavoured to render every perfon useful in that branch of the science, to which he properly belongs.

11. Animated with these designs, the fociety submit their plan to the confideration of the faculty in general, whose affistance is requested, in order to render it extensively beneficial to mankind.

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CHAPTER I.

Of the different branches of the Society, and the qualifications of its Members.

HE fociety shall confist of prac- 24 titioners in physick, surgety, frans /30/10115 and pharmacy, divided into lapothecasies fellows, corresponding members, and candidates.

2. The number of fellows shall be restricted to thirty in each branch of the profession, who alone shall direct the affairs of the society, and be eligible into any office.

3. No perfon shall be eligible as a fellow, or candidate of this fociety, unless fettled in business in the city of London, or within seven miles of it.

4. No phyfician shall be eligible as a fellow, who does not produce a diploma, and testimonials of having studied medicine regularly in some reputable university, or belong to the College of Myricians of London. A 4 5. No 5. No furgeon shall be eligible as a fellow, who has not been approved of by the court of examining furgeons.

_____6. Thefe-rules fhall not, however, prevent the fociety from receiving perfons of acknowledged literary merit.

7. As foon as any of the divisions of which the fociety confists, shall have thirty fellows, those perfors who may defire to become members of the fociety, can be admitted only on the list of candidates.

8. These candidates shall enjoy all the privileges of fellows, except that of voting in any question which may come before the society.

9. They shall pay the same fine on admission, and the same annual subscription with the fellows. But when elected into the list of fellows, they shall not be required to pay a second admission fine.

10. When any vacancy shall erife in the list of fellows, it shall be filled up by ballot from the candidates of that distinct branch of the society, such they belows. 11. This election shall be always made

at

oneof at the two general meetings of the fociety, hereafter to be ransed.

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12. No perfon shall be eligible as a corresponding member who refides within feven miles of London. Nor shall any perfon be elected on that lift, who has thall not have delivered a memoir to the fociety, which shall have received its approbation.

13. If any perfon who has been elected a corresponding member, shall come to refide in London, or within seven miles of Lond of it, he shall, on paying his admission fine, and figning the obligation, be admitted as a fellow, if the lift on which there he must stand should have a vacancy. a But if the lift should be full, or any candidate on it, he shall be confidered as a ladnu candidate, without Parther ballot.

14. No perfon shall be eligible as a fellow, who is not of known merit in his profession, unless he shall have exhibited to the fociety fatisfactory fpecimens of his abilities.

15. No proprietor of any empyrical nostrum shall be eligible into the fociety.

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CHAPTER II.

Of the Election and Admission of Members.

1. Every perfon who defires to be admitted a member of the fociety, shall be recommended by three or more fellows on their perfonal knowledge, or from his being known to them by his publications. Worky.

2. In the recommendation, the profeffion, Splace of abode, and chief qualifications of the perfon proposed for election shall be specified in the Recommendation

3. This recommendation shall be delivered to one of the secretaries, and first read in the council, that they may be fatisfied, that the person recommended is defirous of becoming a member, has been informed of the regulations of the society, and is eligible according to its statutes.

4. The conditions last mentioned being complied with, the recommendation shall be read at the enfuing meeting of mordinary the the fociety, and directed to be hung up in the common meeting room for two fucceeding ordinary meetings.

5. An abstract of it, with the names of those who recommended the candidate, shall be inserted in the books of the society, and read at each of these meetings.

6. On the last of these meetings the votes shall be taken by ballot, if twelve fellows of the society be then prefent.

7. If of the fellows who may be prefent, those who shall ballot for the eandidate be double the number of these fellows free who shall ballot against him, he shall be in favor of declared duly elected. 9. The admiffion of every perfon who fhall be chosen a fellow or candidate, fhall be at some ordinary meeting, when, after he has paid his admiffion fine, he shall fign the following obligation.

"We whofe names are hereunto fub-" fcribed, promife that we will to the "utmost of our power, promote the hos "nour, and observe the regulations of " the Medical Society of London, as " long as we shall continue members " thereof."

10. The prefident shall then take him

"By the authority deligated to me, I " admit you a fellow (or candidate) of the reof " Medical Society of London."

Any perfor refuting to fign the obligation, thall not be received as a member of the fociety.
12. Any member who thall fignify in writing to the prefident his defire to withdraw from the fociety, thall ceafe to be a member thereof, and thall not afterwards be eligible.

CHAPTER III.

Of the Payment of admission Fines, Annual Contributions, &c.

1. Every perfon who shall be elected a fellow or candidate of this fociety shall before

before his admiffion pay the fum of three guineas.

2. If any perfon shall neglect to pay his admission fine within two months after being elected a fellow or candidate, his election shall be void, and he shall be rendered incapable of being proposed again for the space of one year, will be has been preven for the space of one year, will be has been preven by ill by 3. Every fellow or candidate as long as he continues a member, shall pay to the fociety, the annual sum of one guinea by two equal payments on the first of January and July.

4. A lift of all perfons in arrear, shall be publickly read at the third meeting of the society, after each of these days of payment, and lie upon the table for the perusal of the members at all future meetings.

6. If any member shall neglect the payment of the annual contribution for two years, he shall, at the end of two months after notice has been given him by the secretary, be liable to expulsion from the society. cp/clledp.

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7. If any member shall advance to the fociety, the fum of ten guineas above his admiffion fine, and all arrears then due, he

I fouriful the difeharged from all annual payments for the future.
8. No fine on admiffion or annual contribution is expected from corresponding members.

CHAPTER IV.

Of the Officers, Council of Committees.

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1. For the purpose of conducting with regularity the affairs of the fociety, there shall be elected annually, a prefident, a: treasurer, a librarian, three secretaries, a council, and three committees.

2. This election shall be by ballot on the first of the two general meet-ings, viz the 18 of Samuery.

3. At least three days before the time of election, particular fummonses shall be fent to every fellow, together with two printed lifts.

4. One of these lists shall contain the name

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name of every member, with marks affixed, fhewing what office he has formerly held or now holds in the fociety.

5. Such members likewife as are not eligible to any office, or to that only which they may hold at the time of election, shall be respectively distinguished, to the end that no person may throw away his vote.

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6. The fecond balloting lift fhall have the offices and places printed, with blank fpaces left for the infertion of the names of fuch perfons as fhall be thought beft qualified to fill them.

7. At the beginning of the balloting lift, the following recommendation shall be always printed.

"As the welfare of the fociety de-"pends in a great meafure upon the "election of proper perfons to fill thefe "offices, it is earneftly recommended to "every member to be extremely cautious in felecting <u>none</u>, but fuch as are well "qualified to execute the truft, and have "the intereft of the fociety at heart." 8. Every fellow who attends the fociet

8. Every fellow who attends, shall first deliver his name to one of the secretaries attending loting glass. 9. The fecretar, together with the treasurer shall take the utmost care to prevent any illegal vote from being received.

10. The ballot shall be opened at the hour of one, and closed half an hour before three, the noon, after which it shall be examined by the fecretaries of the society, council, and committees, together with two scrutineers of the members present, drawn by lot by the president, out of the members

11. No lift shall be rejected because not intirely filled up; as it shews that the fellow who delivered it, afted from knowledge; not chusing to nominate perfons, with whom he was not acquainted to any post, therefore wifely submitted the rest to the decision of the other members. So far therefore as any list expresses the fentiments of the member, it shall be admitted.

12 Should any lift contain more names

to fill up any office, than the fellow had a right to infert; the irregular part only of fuch lift shall be fet as and the remaining part of it be taken as if no such mistake had existed.

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13. No perfon shall be eligible at this election to any office, who shall be in arrear to the fociety when the lists are and year ordered to be printed, which shall be done dip months by the council, on the eighth day before the election.

14. In this election if any doubt or difficulty arife, in relation to the perfons who thall have the majority of voices, wates or to the manner of voting, or whenever there thall be an equality of voices in *portes* favour of different fellows, the fame thall be determined by the majority of *President of* the council of the preceding year then the preceding year prefent.

15. When any vacancies happen in the rintervals of the anniverfary election, they fhall be filled up in the manner above fpecified.

16. No perfon shall remain in any office, or place in the council, longer than three years. Nothing in this rule B however, Acle however, shall preclude any member, who has enjoyed one office for the limited space of time, from being elected to another.

CHAPTER V.

Of the President.

r. The prefident when present, shall take the chair at all meetings of the fociety. He shall be particularly attentive that no diforderly proceedings be permitted. He shall regulate all debates, and prevent any from being profecuted upon trivial subjects. He shall state and put all questions, according to the intention of the movere. He shall fummon all extraordinary meetings of the fociety, and enforce the execution of their statutes.

In the word

2. In the absence of the prefident, the treasurer, or librarian, shall prefide in the fociety; and in their abfence, the fenior member of the council or fellow of the fociety who is prefent, shall betake the hair prefident for that meeting. 3. All

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3. All members shall pay implicit obedience to the president in the execution of his office.

4. The prefident shall only vote when the fuffrages are equal.

5. The prefident whilft in the chair fhall be always covered, except when addreffing himfelf to the whole fociety.

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CHAPTER VI.

Of the Treasurer.


1. The money belonging to the fociety shall be kept by the treasurer.

2. He shall keep a regular account of all receipts and difbursements; which shall be audited by the council at their meetings, immediately preceding the two general meetings of the society.

3. He shall not expend any of the fociety's money, but by order of a general meeting of the fociety, or of the council, or prefident.

4. Every fum of money, payable for the ufe of the fociety, of three pounds *Ifp* or under, shall be paid by a written or B 2 der

der of the prefident, and every fum exceeding three pounds, thall be paid by an order of the council, figned by the prefident and one of the fecretaries; and if the fum exceed twelve pounds, it shall not be paid until having been laid before the fociety, it fhall be approved of Jouety by them without an order from the



5. Whenever the council, or any five members of the fociety, defire to fee the treasurer's accounts, he shall produce them, and be at all times ready to pay to the fociety any balance which may be in his hands.

CHAPTER VII.

Of the Librarian and Library.

1. The books shall be properly arranged, and each volume diffinctly numbered. An alphabetical catalogue shall be kept of all the printed books, expreffing the edition, place where printed, date, fize, price, and number as it stands in the library. A feparate catalogue shall be kept of the manuscripts, ranged under

under proper heads. These catalogues shall be always open in the library for the inspection of every member.

2. A paper shall be kept, wherein against each members name, the number of any book taken by him from the library, and the time when, shall be marked; and as soon as returned, a line shall be drawn thro' the number, in the prefence of the person who brings the book.

3. A printed paper shall be affixed to the infide of each volume, containing the name of the fociety, the number of the book, and an abstract of the laws relative to the receiving and returning of books; and if such book were presented to the fociety, the donor's name shall be subscribed by the librarian.

4. The library shall be open at every meeting of the fociety, council or committees.

5. The library shall be always open on Monday and Friday, between the hours of ten and twelve, when all books shall be sent for and returned to the library.

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6. Every member fending for a book fhall write down the title, figning and directing it to the librarian of the Medical Society of London.

7. If a book when fent for, be in the poffeffion of another member, an anfwer shall be returned, containing the name of the perfon who has it, and the time when it was taken out of the library.

8. No member shall have more than o volumes one folio, two quarto's, four oftavo's, or fauf eight of smaller fize at a time in his possession.

9. No member shall detain a pamphlet or duodecimo above one week; an octavo two weeks; a quarto three weeks; and a folio four weeks; after which period he shall be liable to a penalty of one, two, three or four shillings, in proportion to its fize, for each week he shall detain it, provided such penalty exceed not the value affixed to the book by the council.

10. No manuscript shall be taken out of the library, without a written permission from the council.

11. All new publications shall remain in the library for the space of one, two, three, three, or four weeks, in proportion to their fize, that the members in general may have an opportunity of infpecting them.

12. A member who shall loose, or in any way injure a book belonging to the fociety, shall be liable to pay the full value, together with such fine as the council shall think proper.

13. Any member shall have the liberty at all times of visiting the library, and reading and taking extracts from such books or manuscripts, as he has previously applied for to the librarian or his deputy.

14. No member, the librarian or his deputy excepted, shall take down any book from its place.

15. All books shall be returned before. the general meeting in every January, that the librarian on entering into his office, may see whether any are wanting. Every perfon neglecting to return a book at that time, shall forfeit one half of its value.

16. No books shall be purchased for B4 the

the use of the society, but such as treat of physical medical subjects.

17. As expending the money of the fociety properly is of the utmost confequence, the recommendation to purchafe any book, shall be figned by three members, and first read in the council, and afterwards on two fucceffive nights in the fociety.


18. For any book above three guineas Iten in value, twenty fellows; and above ten hounty guineas, thirty fellows must be present guineas, thirty fellows must be prefent before a ballot can be taken.

19. No book shall be purchased unless the number of those who ballor in its favour, be twice as great as of those who ballot againfit. two thirds of the fellows Vallot in its Javer.

CHAPTER VIII.

Of the Secretaries.

I. All medical papers intended for the use of the fociety, shall be transmitted to one of the fecretaries, who shall deliver them to the committee, to whole infpection



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inspection they are referred by the laws of the fociety.

2. The fecretaries shall take an exact account of all the transactions of the fociety at every meeting.

3. They shall read the minutes of the former meeting, and also any papers which have been referred by the committees to the fociety.

4. They shall preferve carefully the books relative to the transactions of the fociety, and also all papers committed to their charge. These they shall arrange in proper order, and have ready for the inspection of the fociety at all meetings.

5. They shall be exact in marking the time when any paper on a medical fubject is delivered to them, that no perfon may be robbed of the title to a new thought or difcovery, by first communicating it to the foeiety.

6. One of the fecretaries shall immediately after every election of a member, fend notice thereof to the perfon elected, with a copy of the law concerning the admission of numbers.

7. Upon

7. Upon the election of any correspondent member, a letter shall be sent him by one of the fecretaries, informing them of the fame, and acquainting him, that the fociety hope he will from time to time, favour them with an account of fuch matters as may come within his knowledge, that may tend to the elucidadation or improvement of any of the branches of medicine.

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CHAPTER IX.

I. The council shall confift of the /together officers of the fociety, with three physicians, three furgeons, and three apothecaries, elected by the fociety.

> 2. The council shall chuse a chairman and fecretary out of their own members.

3. The officers of the fociety shall be incapable of presiding in it. 4. The council shall meet on Tues-days alternately with the fociety, and have a power of adjourning themselves to any 7. Upon

any future day at pleasure, giving written notice of such adjournment to every Joele member.

5. An extraordinary meeting of the council may be held at any time, by an order of the prefident of the fociety; one of the fecretaries giving notice of the meeting to every member.

6. On the ordinary nights of meeting, three members shall be empowered to transact busines. But at other times, the prefence of five members shall be requisite

7. All transactions of the fociety, the permission to read medical papers alone excepted, shall previously pass thro' the council.

8. The council shall have no power to make new regulations, but shall always refer them to the general meetings of the society, appointed for that purpose.

9. The council shall receive questions relating to medicine, and shall lay such before the society, as they shall deem worthy of its notice.

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CHAPTER X.

Of the Committees.

1. There shall be three committees, confisting of five fellows in each, to read and prepare for the inspection of the fociety, all such medical differtations and papers, as shall be delivered to them.

2. The first shall confist of physicians, to whom shall be referred, all memoirs, foly &c. relating to the theory and practice of physick.

3. The fecond shall confist of furgeons, to whom shall be committed all papers concerning anatomy and furgery.

4. The third shall confist of chymists and apothecaries, to whom shall be delivered all differtations on chymistry, pharmacy and drugs.

5. These committees shall meet every Tuesday at the hour of six in the evening.

6. They shall chuse a chairman and secretary

fecretary from their own number, and in their absence, any member present may be chosen to officiate for that meeting.

7. Each committee shall record the minutes of their proceedings, in a book fet apart for that purpose, which shall be reported to the society at their next meeting? required.

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8. These committees shall lay before the fociety, such memoirs, papers, &c. as they may judge worthy of communication, and no differtation shall be read before the fociety, until it shall have passed through the committee to which it properly belongs.

9. These committees shall have a power to suppress the whole, or any part of a paper, which they may judge improper to be laid before the society, previously acquainting the be laid before the society, previously acquainting the is correspondent the society of the society of

10. The particular time, at which any paper has been prefented to them, shall be marked upon it by the secretary, and signed by the chairman of the committee.

12. Any fellow who chuses to attend fhall have an equal right to vote or deliver his fentiments, with those who are appointed of the committee.

CHAPTER XI.

Of the Ordinary Meetings of the Society.

2. The book of regulations shall lie on the table before the prefident at all meetings.

3. When fix fellows shall be prefent, they may proceed to bufiness; except in those particular cases, in which the prefence of a greater number is required by the regulations.

4. Bufinefs shall begin by reading the lift of visitors, and afterwards the minutes of the preceding meeting: but no part of these minutes shall be difcuffed cuffed until the whole has been read over.

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5. Such parts of the minutes as shall not be objected to on the second reading of them, article by article, shall stand confirmed, and be subscribed by the prefident.

6. Propositions connected with these minutes, or those of former meetings, may be entered upon and confidered, or referr'd to the council.

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7. The minutes of the council shall be read twice in a similar manner.

8. Medical intelligence, or extracts of letters, may be laid before the fociety.

g. Recommendations of perfons defirous of entering into the fociety shall nep to be read, And

10. A ballot shall be taken for those perfons who have been proposed at the two preceding meetings.

11. The minutes of the committees shall be read, and such papers as have been by them referred to the confideration of the society.

12. No new business shall be entered on after the hour of nine. eight o'clock. CHAP-

CHAPTER XII.

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Of the General Meetings.

1. There shall be two general meetings of the fociety every year, for confidering the state of the fociety, examining the books, fettling the accounts, and for making fuch alteration in, and additions to the regulations of the fociety, as may be thought neceffary.

2. At the first of these meetings, shall be elected the officers, council and committees for the year enfuing. Any vacancies which may have arisen on the list of fellows shall be filled. And a member shall be nominated to deliver the annual discourse the fucceeding year.

3. This election shall begin at one o'clock and close half an hour before three. After two 5. Any member who shall be chosen it within the space of one month after the election, on paying a fine of one guinea, and another shall be chosen in his room, at the rust ordinary meeting 5. After6. Afterwards there shall be delivered 14 a discourse on the best means of improving last Oration the science of medicine.

6. At the fecond meeting, the honorary medals shall be conferred, according to the regulations specified by the society hereafter,

7. At these meetings, the prefident shall request each member to deliver to the council, at the end of every month, or as often as may be convenient, 'an account of the diforders which have come under his notice, that a compleat history may be formed of the epidemic difeases of London.

8. No member shall be proposed, elect as a summe ed, or admitted a member at either of these meetings.

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CHAPTER XIII. honarary Of the Gold Medalf.

1. The fociety refolve to give two gold medals annually, under the following Junior regulations.

2. The first shall be given to the author of the best differtation on a subject to be C proposed to be proposed by the society, which the learned of all countries shall be invited to discuss. as la.

4. Each differtation shall be delivered to the fecretary, written in a legible hand, in the Latin or English language, at least two months before the meeting for adjudging the medal.

5. With it shall be delivered a sealed packet, with some device on the outside, and within the author's name and de signation.

6. The fame device shall be put upon the differtation, that the fociety may know how to address the successful candidate.

7. There shall be a committee appointed by the society, for adjudging this medal; confisting of the council, to whom shall be joined, such other members as the society shall think proper; and their sentence shall be final.

8. No paper with the name of the author affixed, will be received, that the committee may decide upon the merits of

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each, without any knowledge of, or partiality for the author.

9. All the differtations, the fuccefsful one excepted,) shall be returned, if defired, with the packets unopened, containing the names of the authors.

10. The fecond medal shall be confined to the members of the fociety, and, shall be adjudged to the perfon, who shall have delivered to the fociety, the best differtation on any medical fubject during the preceding year.

II. For the purpose of deciding the medal, there shall be delivered to each member who attends, a lift of all the papers which have been read in the fociety, fince the adjudication of the former medal- After the member has affixed an. afterick to the differtation which he efteems most, he shall put the list into the balloting glass; and the medal shall be adjudged to the author, who shall have the greatest number of fuffrages.

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
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CHAPTER XIV.

Of the making and repealing of Regulations.

1. No new regulations shall be made, nor old ones repealed or altered, but at the two general meetings of the fociety.

2. The making of new and altering of old regulations, shall be proposed first in the council, and after, being read in the fociety, at least one month before the general meeting, they shall be hung up in the fociety's room until that time, when the question, whether such proposals be admitted or not, shall be determined by ballot.



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3. If double the number of those who ballot against any proposed law, should ballot in its favour, it shall be declared a law of the society, inferted among the general or bye-laws, as may seem most proper, and figned by the president.

CHAPTER XV.

Of Papers for Publication.

1. All medical papers which have been read twice in the fociety, shall be afterwards wards referred to the confideration of the council, to whom the determination of all queftions concerning the publications of papers shall be referred.

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2. Every member of the council shall / tack have each differtation two days in his flow possession.

3. Any member, through whofe neglect the papers are detained, during the circulation, longer than the specified time, shall pay one shilling for every fix hours a paper is so kept.

4. Any member of the council, who fhall lend a paper thus fent to him, or fuffer any perfon, that is not a member of the fociety, to read it, fhall for this offence, forfeit his office or place in the council, and never afterwards be eligible into any place in the fociety.

5. After a paper shall have thus circulated thro' all the members of the council, letters shall be fent to them by the fecretary, requesting their attendance on the next night of meeting, to ballot for the fame.

6. At this meeting, the members prefent shall decide by ballot, whether the

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paper

paper shall be inferted in the manuscript books of the society.

7. If this queftion pass in the affirmative, all further proceedings with respect to it shall be ftopt.

8. But if the queftion pafs in the negative, the council shall at fome subfequent meeting, notice of which shall be previously given to all its members, proceed to decide also by ballot, whether such paper shall be published.

9. If the decifion be in favour of the paper, it shall stand for confirmation on the next night, when the determination shall be final.

10. No ballot shall be taken for the publication of any paper, unless nine members of the council are present. A majority of the meeting shall determine whether it shall or not be published. If a majority of the council determine against the publication of a paper, no entry thereof shall be made in the minutes.

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11. In judging of a paper for publication, the council shall have a power to call in to their affistance, at some future meeting, other fellows of the society, who who are confidered as well skilled in that particular branch of medicine, that may happen to be the subject of the paper.

12. These perfons so called in, shall not exceed the number of three.

13. They shall give their opinions, and their votes shall be received, as to that paper only, equally with any member of the council.

14. If any member defire that the paper may be read previous to the ballot, it shall be complied with.

15. If on the ballot, the number of votes for and against a paper be equal, the confideration of it shall be adjourned to a future day; and if the votes be equal the second time, the paper shall be rejected.

16. No paper shall be taken out of the possession of the secretary, after it has been approved of for publication, nor shall any alterations be made in it, without the permission of the council. These alterations shall also go the same form of shough ballot as the original paper, and if confiderable, must likewise be circulated among the members.

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17. No member of the council shall vote, or be present when the propriety of publishing of any of his own papers is agitated.


18. The annual difcourse alone shall be exempt from this mode.

19. If any motion be made and feconded, for referring it to the confideration of the council, a meeting of the council thall be called by fpecial fummonfes; where, after it thall have been circulated as fpeedily as poffible, it thall be read over deliberately, and if nine members be prefent, a ballot thall be taken, concerning the expediency of printing it. If the opinion of the majority be in its favour, it may be confirmed at the next meeting of the fociety.

20. The member who delivers the discourse, shall not be present at this meeting of the council.

21. Each member of the fociety, who lip months is not in arreat, thall receive gratis from the librarian, one copy of fuch memoirs, as may be published from time to time, during his remaining in the fociety.

22. Any member who thall neglect to



fend for a volume, until two months after its publication shall be elapsed, shall forfeit his right to it, unless the council, upon being made acquainted with the reason of such delay, shall order the same to be delivered.

CHAPTER XVI.

Of Benefactions to the Society.

1. Every perfon who shall prefent any valuable gift to the fociety, shall receive their thanks, and have his name registered in the catalogue of benefactors, with an account of his donation.

2. Every benefactor, who shall prefent a sum of money or gift to the value of five guineas, upon acceptance thereof by the society, shall have the privilege of being present at all their ordinary meetings.

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CHAPTER XVII.

Of the Expulsion of Members.

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1. Befides the caufes of expulsion already mentioned, if any member publickly defame the fociety, attempt to defeat the end of its inftitution, conduct himfelf in fuch a manner, as to become a difhonour to it, or malicioufly do any thing to its detriment, he shall be liable to expulsion.

2. If any member advisedly perfift in the breach of any law of the fociety, he shall be liable to expulsion cofuelled.

3. If any member, having broken a law of the fociety, refufe to make fuch fatisfaction as they may preferibe, he shall be liable to expulsion. a spulled.

4. If to avoid making fatisfaction for any offence, any member attempt to withdraw himfelf from the fociety, he shall be expelled.

5. Whenever from any of these causes, or from contumacious behaviour in the fociety, it shall appear to the council, that a member has deserved expulsion; special funmonfes shall be directed by them to be be iffued for the next meeting of the fociety, fpecifying the caufe of complaint, and if twice as many fellows ballot against as for the offending party, he shall be expelled the fociety.

6. The prefident shall then pronounce him expelled in these words:

"By the power delegated to me, I de-" clare A. B. to be no longer a member of " the Medical Society of London."

7. And shall at the fame meeting make an entry thereof opposite to his name in the register.

CHAPTER XVIII.

OF VISITORS.

I. Each member shall have the privilege of introducing two visitors, at every an ordinary meeting of the society.

2. Their names shall be entered in the visitors list, and they shall be introduced into the society before the minutes of the former meeting are read.

3. After the reading of the minutes, no vifitor shall be introduced, but by a particular order from the prefident.

4. No

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4. No perfon, who is not a member of the fociety, shall be admitted to hear the annual discourse, except by a written permission from the president for that jumpose 5. The members shall have from the president as many tickets for the admission of visitors to hear the annual discourse as the room can conveniently contain.

CHAPTER XIX.

GENERAL LAWS.

members I. No fellow shall vote by proxy.

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2. All questions, except those already specified, shall be determined by the majority of the fellows present.

3. No queftion shall be put on any motion, unless the motion be seconded.

4. No refolution, except those already mentioned as final, shall be valid, until it shall have been approved of at two meetings.

5. When the determination of the fociety is required on a queftion, it shall be in the power of any fellow to demand, that it shall be taken by ballot.

6. No

6. No refolutions which may be made at any meeting of the fociety, shall be valid, unless fix fellows be prefent.

7. All fines shall be paid to the treafurer, and applied to the general use of the fociety.

8. Any perfon who intends to fpeak in the fociety, shall rife up and address himself to the prefident.

9. When two or more offer to fpeak at the fame time, the prefident shall determine, which of them shall speak first chiluis h

10. On a motion being made and feconded, any fellow may demand the fenfe of the fociety being previoufly taken, whether fuch queftion shall be put.

12. The fociety shall not be adjourned, until a motion be made and the question put for that purpose.

CHAPTER XX.

BYE LAWS.

t. Should any officer or member of the council be fo forgetful of his duty, as to abufe the extensive powers entrusted with him, to the detriment of the fociety and its members, the council on complaint made to them in writing, and figned by three members, shall order funmonfes to be iffued, specifying the complaint, and requesting the attendance of all the members at the next meeting, which shall have a power of finally determining the nature of the offence, and the steps necessary to be taken in confequence of it.

2. No perfon shall take the chair when any complaint respecting himself is to be agitated.

3. The prefident shall have a diferetionary power of calling any member to order; and if such call be difregarded, he he shall be authorized to enjoin the disobedient member to absent himself from the society, until his demerit shall be determined at the subsequent meeting.

4. As contradictions to a prefident must appear indecent, it is expected that he will interfere in any matter before the fociety, no otherwife than to execute his office, that the dignity and impartiality of the character may not be leffened by the paffions or interests of the individual. And even where the prefiding member shall, for very urgent reasons, think it incumbent on him to lay afide this neceffary decorum, he shall delay giving his opinion upon any subject under debate, until fuch members as are inclined to fpeak, shall have delivered their sentiments, that no perfon may be precluded from giving his opinion with freedom.

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
