Many of the Hermetic Writers concluded that the author wrote indifferently under the pseudonyms of Eyrenaeus, or Eirenaeus Philalethes and Eugenius Philalethes, the latter known to be Thomas Vaughan. In his 'Lives of the Alchemistical Philosophers' Waite states the grounds of confusion.




