

CHAPTER I

METEOROLOGY AND ECONOMIC CONDITIONS, I.E. PRICES OF FOOD-GRAINS, ETC.

Rainfall and other weather conditions.

Rainfall and other weather conditions.

Was largely in excess in the west United Provinces. Rainfall in February was slightly in excess. Skies were more cloudy than usual in January. Humidity was in excess in February. Temperature was below normal in January.

The hot weather period (March to May)—The weather was dry during March except for light showers in the west of the province and the Kumaun hills. The first fortnight of April was, however, unusually wet and thereafter the weather was dry. The total rainfall of the month was largely in excess. The month of May was dry. Humidity was in defect in March and May. Both the maximum and minimum temperatures were below normal in April while maximum temperature alone was above normal in May.

The monsoon period (June to September)—The first ten days of June recorded very high maximum temperatures and caused about a hundred deaths from heat-stroke. Temporary relief was noticed later by occasional thunder showers. The high temperature was finally reduced by the advent of the monsoons on the 28th. They continued to be active up to the first fortnight of August and withdrew temporarily from these provinces after the 24th August, but scattered falls were again recorded in the last three days. The rainfall in September was scattered but became wide-spread between 12th and 20th. Thereafter the weather was dry except for a few falls in the Kumaun hills.

The percentage departures of rainfall for the two sub-divisions of the province during the monsoon period were as follows:

Humidity was below normal and maximum temperature was above normal in June.

The retreating monsoon period (October to December)—The weather was dry throughout except for local thunder showers in the west United Provinces on the 30th October, and in the Kumaun hills and the adjoining plains between the 6th and 8th November. The total rainfall was consequently in large defect in the whole province during October and in the east United Provinces during November. In December the total rainfall was in large excess in the whole province.

Humidity was in defect in October when the minimum temperature was also below normal.

2. The rainfall was general throughout the province in the month of January and was beneficial to the standing crops. Agriculture and Damage from frost and cold wave was universal, Economic conditions. arhar and potato suffering the most. Light showers were received in most districts in the first and third weeks of February and aided the standing crops towards recovering partially from the effects of the frost There was little rain in March and April, the second and third weeks of June the rain was moderate but the monsoon became more active in the last week of the month. Rainfall was widespread in July and in the first half of August, but it was only light to moderate in the latter half of the month. It was also very unevenly distributed. The kharif crops suffered to some extent from insufficiency of rainfall in some of the western districts and parts of the Allahabad and Lucknow divisions. The deficiency of rain in the last fortnight of August was to a large extent remedied by the general and widespread rainfall in the first 3 weeks of September. The average outturn of kharif crops was estimated between 12 and 15 annas. With the exception of light showers in the Meerut, Agra, Jhansi and Kumaun Divisions, October was practically rainless. Light showers in the first fortnight of November were received in the Meerut, Rohilkhand and Kumaun Divisions. In the second week of December there was general rainfall throughout the province which benefitted the standing crops.

The wheat crop gave a better yield—about 75 per cent. of the normal as compared with the last year's yield of 70 per cent. The yield of cotton crop taken as a whole was 78 per cent. of the normal against 70 per cent. last year. The quality of fibre was on the whole up to the average.

There was ample employment at good wages for the labouring classes.

- During the year 1935, the total number of deaths reported from municipalities was 124,574, yielding a death-rate of Mortality in muni-36.66 as against 136,179 and 40.07 in the preceding cipalities year. Out of 85 municipalities 34 recorded a death-rate higher than the provincial average. Among the municipalities recording the highest mortality, Benares stood first with a death-rate of 64.00 and was followed by Tilhar with 59 44 and Hathras with 54.72. The high death-rates in Benares, Tilhar, and Hathras were due to fevers and all other causes; respiratory diseases, small-pox, dysentery and diarrhoea being additional factors in Hathras, small-pox in Tilhar and respiratory diseases and dysentery and diarrhoea in Benares. Like lastyear the lowest mortality was recorded in Mainpuri (6.36), followed by Banda (8.70) and Lakhimpur (12.86). Mainpuri has retained this position for the last six years while Banda for the last three years.
- Mortality in notified areas recorded 10,816 deaths during the year under review against 14,361 deaths in the previous year, the ratios of deaths per 1,000 of the population for the two years being respectively, 25 35 and 33 58. Out of the 53 notified areas 30 returned death-rates above and 22 below the provincial average, while the figures for one notified area were not available. Kosi (Muttra District) returned the highest death-rate (52 51) and was followed by Fatehpur-Sikri (Agra district) with 48 44 and Bhowali (Naini Tal District) with 46 81. The high mortality in Kosi and Fatehpur-Sikri was chiefly due to malaria while in Bhowali it was due to respiratory diseases. The lowest mortality was noticed in Moghalsarai (Benares District), Badshahpur (Jaunpur district) and Chunar settlement (Mirzapur District), the ratios for these places being 7.90, 9.18 and 9.81, respectively.

The mortality among infants during the year 1935 was lower than that in the preceding year and decennial average. 1,544 deaths were recorded in the municipalities employing medical officers of health as due to tetanus, out of which 1,190 were verified by medical officers of health and 873 were found to have actually occurred from this cause. Five deaths were also certified by the medical officer in charge, sadr hospital, Fyzabad. No deaths from this cause were reported from the municipalities of Dehra Dun, Mussooree, Saharanpur, Muzaffarnagar, Meerut, Hapur, Brindaban and Naini Tal.

20. The provincial infantile mortality rate in 1935 was 157.20 as against 184.64 in 1934.27 districts recorded infan-Infantile mortality tile mortality rates above and 21 below the provinin districts. Among districts returning high cial average mortality, Naini Tal topped the list with a death-rate of 203 35 and was followed by Pilibhit, Shahjahanpur and Lucknow with death-rates of 202.12, 199.23 and 197.69, respectively. The high infantile death-rate in the Naini Tal district was chiefly due to malaria, enteric fever and other causes. In Pilibhit and Shahjahanpur it was due to malaria, other fevers other respiratory diseases, tetanus and convulsion and other causes; measles being an additional factor in the case of Shahjahanpur, and in Lucknow to malaria, diarrhoea, pneumonia, tetanus and convulsions, premature birth and other causes.

The lowest mortality among infants was recorded in Gorakhpur (100.31), Ballia (105.65), Azamgarh (116.53) and Rae Bareli (120.58).

Infantile mortality in municipalities.

1935 as compared with that in 1934, the mortality rates for the two years being 224.49 and 271.89 respectively. In 36 municipalities the death-rate was higher, while in 49 it was lower than the provincial average (224.49). Tilhar returned the highest infantile death-rate (330.21) which was chiefly due to tetanus and convulsions and other fevers.

High infant mortality rates were also noticeable in Atrauli (322.20), Etawah (310.88) and Sahaswan (308.97). In Atrauli high mortality was due to malaria and other causes, in Etawah to other fevers, tetanus and convulsions, pneumonia and exhaustion and mal-nutrition and in Sahaswan to malaria, measles and other causes.

The municipalities returning the lowest infantile mortality rates were Banda (93.69), Ghaziabad (113.15), Lakhimpur (118.00) and Ghazipur (125.43).

As usual Gorakhpur returned the highest number of still-births (3,648), followed by Gonda (1,272) and

Sitapur (809).

The above districts have been recording the highest number of still-births for a number of years. As stated in my last year's report the district medical officers of health concerned were asked to look into this matter and from an enquiry made by them it appeared that in Gorakhpur the increase in number of still-births was chiefly due to misclassification and in Gonda to the incidence of malaria. In Sitapur a close scrutiny was maintained over the figures of still-births and the number for the year has come down to 809 as compared with 1.399 in the previous year. The lowest number of still-births were as in the preceding year recorded in Mainpuri (2), Jalaun (15) and Etah (20).

29. During the year under report as many as 4,640 deaths (which occurred within the limits and practice of Govern-Verification of causes ment medical officers, including medical institutions) of deaths. were verified by civil surgeons and their subordinate medical officers against 4,535 deaths in the preceding year. As usual the largest number of deaths (3,256) were returned under all other causes. Next in order came pneumonia with 453, tubercle of the lung with 222. dysentery with 130, all other infective diseases with 111, other tubercular diseases with 84, malaria with 70, enteric fever with 67, tetanus with 64, pyrexia of uncertain origin with 45, cholera with 42, leprosy with 25, syphillis with 19. The number of deaths from plague, influenza, beriberi, small-pox, kala-azar, gonorrhoea, rheumatic fever and rheumatism ranged from 12 to 4. Only one death was returned from scurvy while none from relapsing fever. Of these total verified deaths, 889 were among children, 2,703 among adults from 16 to 45 years of age and 1,048 among adults exceeding 46 years of age.

- 3. In 12 districts out of 48 the mortality from cholera exceeded the Cholera in districts provincial death-rate. The district of Mirzapur inclusive of towns headed the province with a death-rate of (1.84). (Statement VII.) followed by Jhansi with (1.16), Garhwal with (1.09), Ghazipur with (.90) and Gorakhpur with (.77). The district of Almora remained entirely free from the disease while those of Banda and Hardoi reported only 2 and 5 deaths respectively, which were too low to yield a ratio. The districts of Bulandshahr, Mainpuri, Etah, Budaun, Farrukhabad, Lucknow and Sitapur returned a death-rate of (.01) each.

4. The total number of deaths from cholera in rural areas during the year was 9,338 showing a death-rate of '22. The highest mortality was returned from the rural areas of the Mirzapur District (2.00), followed by

Garhwal (1.10), Jhansi (1.09) and Ghazipur (.83).

With a view to prevent importation of cholera cases from the Nepal territory, the "Barrier Scheme" which was introduced last year was continued during the year under report from 1st March to 15th September, 1935, by posting special staff to the Nepal border of the Gorakhpur and Basti districts.

Cases of cholera imported from the Nepal territory were treated at these barriers and wells of surrounding villages immediately permanganated.

5. The total number of deaths from cholera in urban areas was 1,074 Cholera in urban yielding a death-rate of ·20. The highest mortality areas. (Statement VI- was returned from Gharwal (Mirzapur District) 16·53, followed by Gahmar (Ghazipur District) 8·05, Mau (Jhansi District) 7·03; and Rikhikesh (Dehra Dun District) 6·79. In 113 towns the number of deaths did not exceed ten, while 301 were free from the disease.

Anti-cholera scheme - For want of funds this scheme could not be extended to any more districts than 23 in which it has been in operation

for the last several years.

The total quantities of potash permanganate, kaolin and essential oils mixture supplied during the year from the provincial allotments were 44, 106, 8,987, and 2,154 lbs. respectively.

The scheme regarding early reporting of outbreaks of cholera by patwaris in the districts of Gorakhpur, Basti and Azamgarh has been

extended to another year.

Inoculations—The total number of inoculations performed by different agencies including travelling dispensaries was 207,620—115,026 were performed by travelling dispensaries, 48,674 by district health staff and the remaining 43,920 by other agencies.

Monetary grants—Grants amounting to Rs.6,637 were placed at the disposal of the district magistrates and district medical officers of health for

expenses in connexion with anti-cholera measures.

Temporary regulations — Temporary regulations under the Epidemic Diseases Act were enforced in a number of districts and municipalities.

The mortality from plague during the year under report has shown-considerable decrease since 1925 excepting the years 1927, 1930, 1932 and 1933.

The highest mortality (6,426) occurred in April and the lowest (54) in August.

- 7. Muzaffaraagar with a death-rate of 5.98 was most conspicuous. Plague in districts Other heavily infected districts in order of severity inclusive of towns were Saharanpur, Bulandshahr, Gorakhpur and (Statement XII). Muttra with the respective death-rates of 1.74, 1.57, 1.55 and .98. Dehra Dun, Allahabad, Unao, and Hamirpur reported one or two deaths, which were too low to yield a ratio. The lowest rates were returned from Garhwal (.02), Agra and Jaunpur (.03) each. The districts of Pihbhit, Etawah, Fatehpur, Jhansi, Jalaun, Banda, Benares, Mirzapur, Almora, Lucknow, Rae Bareli, Sitapur, Hardoi, Kheri, Gonda, Bahraich, Partabgarh and Bara Banki were immune from the disease.
- 8. The provincial death-rate from plague in 1935 in the case of all towns of the United Provinces was '55. The highest mortality was noticed in Chharra (Aligarh): 37.68, followed by Bhojpur-Pipalsana (Moradabad District) 35.50, Purqazi (Muzaffarnagar District) 34.69 and Mohanpur (Etah District) 25.88. In 40 towns the number of deaths did not exceed ten, while 350 towns were free from the disease.
- 9. The total number of deaths in rural districts was 20,033 in 1935
 Showing a death-rate of •47. Of the rural districts returning the highest mortality rates Muzaffarnagar stood first with a death-rate of 6•17, followed by Saharanpur 1•99, Gorakhpur 1•55 and Bulandshahr 1•33. No deathswere reported from the rural areas of 19 districts.

Inoculations—The total number of inoculations performed was 207,991 of which 102,411 inoculations were performed by travelling dispensaries (including reserve and temporary medical officers), 77,286 by district health staff and 28,294 by different agencies.

Plague inoculations are now becoming popular particularly amongst educated people.

Evacuation—Evacuation of infected dwellings as usual proved useful in checking the spread of the disease. Rs.6,632 were placed at the disposal of district magistrates to assist people in evacuating their houses and for other anti-plague measures.

Rat destruction—Anti-rat campaign was carried out in 22 districts, 36 municipalities and 6 notified areas. Rat destruction was mainly carried out by means of barium carbonate and rat trapping. In addition to this cyanogas fumigation was also started in the districts of Moradabad, Saharanpur, Muzaffarnagar, Meerut, Bulandshahr and in the municipalities of Meerut, Cawnpore and Hardwar, but had to be stopped for want of funds. The total number of rats killed was 2,167,087.

Most of the local bodies appreciated this measure and continued it from their own funds even when the Government grant was not available. It is advantageous to continue anti-rat campaign from year to year as this minimizes chances of outbreaks of plague. Cyanogas fumigation deserves more extensive trial and efforts will be made to push it on as funds are available.

Four thousand two hundred and twenty pounds of barium carbonate were supplied free of charge to districts and municipalities and a grant-innid aggregating Rs.6,785 was given to district magistrates and local bodies for expenses on preventive measures.

Disinfection of plague-infected houses was done by means of slow fire or Indian torch flame. This has proved to be the cheapest and most effective measure of disinfection.

Epidemic regulations - As mentioned under the heading cholera epidemic regulations to control the spread of plague were promulgated where necessary.

SMALLPOX

FEVERS

Deaths and death-rates from fevers in the province [Statement VI(a) and IX.]

15. During 1935, fevers accounted for 929,298 deaths as compared with 970,289 deaths in 1934, yielding a death-rate of 19 20 and 20.04 respectively. The quinquennial average was 18.81. The maximum mortality (101,557) was recorded in June and the minimum (64,167) in December. Malaria was responsible for 8,13,591 deaths, other fevers for 81,907, measles for 23,460, enteric fever for 8,578, cerebro spinal fever for 756, influenza for 437, relapsing

for 8,13,591 deaths, other fevers for 81,907, measles for 23,460, enteric fever for 8,578, cerebro spinal fever for 756, influenza for 437, relapsing fever for 213, diphtheria for 105, kala-azar for 101, typhus for 76 and acute poliomyelitis for 74.

As registration of deaths is in the hands of village chaukidars their reports cannot be relied upon particularly in regard to causes of deaths.

- 16. The districts recording the highest mortality from fevers were Fevers in districts Budaun (2971). Bulandshahr (29.51), Pilibhit inclusive of towns (29.22) and Shahjahanpur (28.90). The lowest (Statement IX). deaths-rates were returned from Ballia (8.83), Allahabad (11.92), Fatehpur (12.06) and Partabgarh (12.80).
- 17. The death-rate from fevers in towns in 1935, was 13.03 and the Fevers in urban actual number of deaths was 70,650. The highest areas (Statement death-rate was recorded in Baiswan (Aligarh) VI-B(. (50.96) followed by Kosi (Muttra) (50.18), Nizamabad (Azamgarh) (48 69) and Sheopuri (Bareilly) (45.72). Of the towns showing the lowest death-rates the most conspicious were Chandausi (Moradabad) 67, Mussoorie (Dehra Dun) 1.09, Chunar settlement (Mirzapur) 1.22 and Rampur (Gorakhpur) 1.46.

- 21. During 1935, 5,698 deaths from tuberculosis were registered in the municipalities of the United Provinces against 4,402 in the preceding year. As in the preceding two years the largest number of deaths (922) was returned from the Lucknow municipality followed by Agra (472), Moradabad (454) and Allahabad (411), 7,325 deaths were returned from phthisis during the year, 6,952 in urban areas and 373 in rural areas.

DYSENTERY AND DIARRHOEA

- 28. The total number of deaths from these diseases in the 438 towns Respiratory diseases during the year was 38,187 with a death-rate of 7.04. Of the towns showing the highest death-rates Bhowali (Naini Tal) with 24.11 stood first, followed by Cawnpore with 21.93, Bhojpur-Pipalsana (Moradabad) with

17.95 and Hathras (Aligarh) with 16.84. Lowest mortality was reported from the towns of Debai (Bulandshahr), Mawana, (Meerut), Biswan (Sitapur) and Rudrapur (Gorakhpur) giving death rates of 09, ·10, ·11 and ·12 respectively. In 156 towns the number of deaths did not exceed 10, while 79 towns were free from the disease.

29. These diseases were responsible for 8,083 deaths in 1935, the Respiratory diseases death-rate per 1,000 of the population being 19. Of the districts showing the heaviest mortality, (Statement VI A.) Hamirpur stood first with a death-rate of 5.45 and was followed by Garhwal with 1.44, Almora with 99 and Dehra Dun with 88.

Cerebro Spinal
Meningitis Statement
VI-(a)1.

30. Altogether 756 deaths were reported from this disease during 1935-474 from towns and 282 from rural areas.

Mortality from this cause was chiefly reported from the towns of Cawnpore, Agra, Aligarh, Allahabad, Muttra, Jhansi, Lucknow, Farrukhabad and Meerut.

The disease was found to usually set in suddenly with irregular fever, intolerable piercing headache, repeated vomiting with rigidity in neck and dilated pupils in most cases. Positive Kernig's sign and delirium were also noticed in many cases. Moreover such motor defects as defective hearing and dimness of vision, aphasia, hemiplegia and flaccid paralysis with retention of urine were also observed in certain number of cases. The unusual and grave complication during the convalescent period of the disease noticed was the development of thyroiditis which proved to be fatal in practically all cases.

The disease, though contagious, was found to be irregular in its distribution. The number of proved cases of direct contagion was very small. Again unfavourable living and housing conditions which are frequently a contributory cause of spread of other infectious diseases appear to have played a much smaller part in the propagation of cerebro spinal meningitis. Direct contagion therefore cannot be regarded as a very serious factor.

Majority of the cases occurred in persons between 10 to 30 years of age, than 35 to 45 years of age. Children under 2 years and persons above 55 years were the least affected. It was observed that people of all communities were susceptible to the disease, but males were comparatively more affected than females. Cases were mostly reported from amongst the poorer classes.

Cases were mostly treated in dispensaries where specific treatment with lumber puncture and repeated injections of anti-meningococcus serum were given.

The measures adopted to check the spread of the disease were as follows:

- (a) Disinfection of patients' houses, clothes, etc.
- (b) The contacts and people of the infected area were asked to expose their cots, beddings, etc. to the sun daily.
- (c) Gargling of throat and nose of school children and of contacts was done with potash permanganate lotion daily.
- (d) Particular attention was paid towards the general cleanliness, sanitation and disposal of nightsoil and rubbish of the whole infected area.
- (e) Roads and kachcha patries were watered to keep down the dust.
- (f) Leaflets and posters dealing with preventive measures were distributed amongst the public.
- (g) Strict supervision was kept over the local cinemas. The managers were warned against overcrowding and sealing of doors and windows during shows.
- (h) Prophylactic anti-meningococcus inoculations were performed, but nothing definite can be said about protective effects.

It is very necessary that people should realize the dangers of the disease and take immediate treatment in hospitals. It was found that the recovery rate in cases treated in hospitals was more favourable than that treated in homes.

31. There were in all 380 deaths from this disease—339 in urban areas

Beri-Beri or Epidemic and 41 in rural areas. The disease, though present in Benares in the month of October, 1934, did not attract the attention of the general public till the end of November, when cases began to be reported in large numbers. The disease appeared to have been imported into the Benares city in the Bengali community from the presidency of Bengal and the neighbouring districts of the Bihar Province. 304 deaths were returned from the Benares city alone.

The onset of the disease was insidious. Its incubation period varied from about 3 to 6 weeks and the disease ran a course of 4 weeks to a few months. Only in a few cases the onset was sudden and the course was less than a week. Generally the disease began with diarrhoea or nausea, which passed off unnoticed. The first warning came on with swelling of shins which pitted on pressure, loss of breath, palpitation of heart and low fever. Sometimes there were muscular pains, feeling of weakness or defective vision.

The disease was primarily confined to the Bengali community living in overcrowded, damp and ill ventilated localities on the river side wards of the town. It then spread to other communities and a few cases also occurred amongst Muhammedan and non-Bengali communities.

Investigations were made by the local officers with a view to find out the possible causation of the disease. Samples of flour, mustard oil and rice were taken from several big shops and analysed, but nothing definite could be elicited. As an additional precautionary measure samples were also sent to the Chemical Analyst to the United Province Government and to the Provincial Hygiene Institute, United Provinces, for analysis but nothing definite was found. It was observed that the disease was more like epidemic dropsy than beri beri, the causes of which are still imperfectly known.

An officer of the Provincial Public Health Service was detailed by the department to assist the medical officer of health in carrying out the necessary investigations and measures to check the spread of the disease. He was also assisted by the school health officer in conducting these investigations. The officers made house to house visits, gave suitable advice to sufferers and contacts and took down detailed history of cases. The Medical Officer, in charge, Provincial Hygiene Institute, United Provinces, was also detailed to carry out becteriological investigations on the spot. He also made house to house visits and collected samples of blood and faeces, as well as samples of rice, atta, etc. for examination. When I visited the city early in January, I also discussed the situation with the medical officer of health of the municipality and advised on the lines of investigation. Dr. A. C. Banerjea, DR. P. H., Assistant Director of Public Health, Incharge, Epidemiology Branch, inspected the place in February, 1935, and carried out his investigations by making house to house enquiries about the cases and advised people on preventive measures.

The measures adopted to check the spread of the disease were as follows:

(1) The houses where cases occurred were disinfected.

(2) People were advised to take plenty of raw tomatoes, green

vegetables, viz. carrots, peas, turnips, onions, salad, lettuce.

(3) Leaflets giving symptoms and preventive measures were distributed. Posters were also printed and posted in streets and lanes.

(4) Lectures were delivered by hygiene publicity bureau.

- (5) Special attention was paid to the sanitation of the infected localities and sanitary inspectors were directed to keep strict watch on the sale of rotten fish, meat, eggs, fruits and vegetables in markets.
- (6) Samples of rice, atta, mustard oil were taken from the various shops of infected areas and sent to the Publi: Analyst for examination and report.
 - (7) Vendors were pursuaded to expose hand milled rice for sale.
- (8) Over ripe, decayed and rotten fruits and food articles were destroyed whenever detected,

INJURIES

- Deaths from several minor causes in the province (Statement VI)

 32. Out of 19,831 total deaths registered during the year under report as due to injuries, 1,749 were suicides, and 13,173 deaths were caused by wounds or accidents. Snake-bites or wild beasts were responsible for 4,437 and rabies for 472 deaths.
- Deaths from several recorded under the head "Injuries." Of these minor causes in towns (Statement VI-B). 147 were suicides, wounds or accidents claimed 3,307 deaths while snakes or wild beasts 216 and rabies 81.

Deaths from several were suicides, 9,866 were due to injuries. Of these 1,602 were suicides, 9,866 were due to wounds or acciminor causes in rural dents, 4,221 to snake bites or wild beasts and 391 to rabies.

CHAPTER IV

EPIDEMIOLOGY

DR. A. C. BANERJEA, DR. P. H., Assistant Director of Public Health (Malariology), United Provinces, held charge of this branch throughout the year in addition to hisother duties. The staff consisted of 30 medical officers of the Provincial Subordinate Public Health Service, class III, for the charge of travelling dispensaries, 12 reserve medical officers, one store-keeper and one medical officer for the manufacture of anti-cholera vaccine. In addition, 20 medical officers were employed to cope with outbreaks of epidemic diseases in various districts of the province almost continually for Considerable difficulty was experienced in the nearly nine months. recruitment of suitable type of temporary medical officers at short notice for epidemic duty. These temporary men have neither adequate training nor requisite skill to give prophylactic inoculations and to carry out preventive measures. Besides, owing to change of addresses and other obvious reasons the required number of temporary officers are not forthcoming immediately on demand with the result that epidemic conditions get worse by the time these officers reach the place of their posting. The consensus of opinion is that this agency is unsuitable for epidemic work. This fact has already been brought to the notice of Government by my predecessor and myself more than once. There is an imperative need for the cadre of travelling dispensary medical officers being strengthened at the earliest possible date by at least 20 posts.

2. Travelling dispensaries - There was no change in the number and constitution of travelling dispensaries. Of the thirty such dispensaries, 23 are public health, four district board, one forest (Kheri) and two belong to Tarai and Bhabar Estates. Each of the four district boards, viz. Pilibhit, Gorakhpur, Cawnpore and Muttra contributed as usual Rs.1,000 annually towards the upkeep of its dispensary. The Forest and Tarai and Bhabar Estates' travelling dispensaries are maintained entirely at the cost of the departments concerned.

In addition to above two reserve travelling dispensaries, the equipment of which is kept stored at the headquarters of each district were mobilized during the year, one at Ramnagar (Naini Tal) for six months for medical aid to pilgrims to Badri Nath and the other in Gonda for medical inspection of passengers at Lakarmandi Ghat in connexion with the Sawan Jhula fair.

During the year under report travelling dispensaries were mostly busy in dealing with epidemics of plague, cholera, malaria, etc. in rural areas. A large number of them was also detailed for medical inspection of passengers and fair duties.

The total number of villages visited by these units during the year was 3,959 and the number of patients treated was 154,347. They also performed 1,220 minor operations and did 47,147 anti-plague and 38,145 anti-cholera inoculations. In addition to their normal duties the medical officers in charge of travelling dispensaries helped in rural uplift work. They got manure pits dug by the villagers and got rubbish heaps removed outside abadi to these pits. They also trained a large number of village aiders in village-aid scheme and in anti-epidemic work.

3. Educational work—A large number of leaflets, relating to plague, cholera, malaria, smallpox, tuberculosis, relapsing fever, consumption, venereal diseases, school hygiene, flies, eye diseases, etc. were freely distributed to literate persons through the agency of the travelling dispensaries.

CHAPTER V

FAIRS AND FESTIVALS

During 1935, the most important fair was the Magh Mela which was held at Allahabad from 14th January, to 18th February, 1935. The gathering on the chief bathing day (Amawas) was ten lakhs. The usual medical and sanitary arrangements, such as inspection of pilgrims travelling by rail and by road, the essential conservancy arrangements in the fair area, etc. were organized and guided by the Assistant Director of Public Health, II Range. Adequate arrangements for the supply of water were made. The wells in the mela area as well as those in Arail and Jhusi villages were permanganated periodically. Articles of food exposed for sale were regularly inspected. Temporary regulations under the Epidemic Diseases Act were enforced in the mela area and in the Allahabad municipality. The standard of sanitation throughout the mela was kept at a very high standard and there was an entire absence of flies during the whole mela period. The general health of the pilgrims was excellent. Out of the seven cases of cholera detected in the mela area, five were imported ones. They were all admitted into the infectious diseases hospital. Vigorous measures were, however, taken to check the spread of the disease. The contacts were given essential oils mixture and were inoculated and in all 621 anti-cholera inoculations were done. The activities of the Hygiene Publicity Bureau in connexion with this fair consisted of a public health exhibition, cinema shows and health songs and talks with the aid of loud speakers. Films on the Allahabad Kumbh, cholera, tuberculosis, smallpox, malaria, temperance, etc. were screened. These shows were very popular and attracted large crowds every evening.

2. Then came the Piran Kaliar Fair which was held at Roorkee (District Saharanpur) from 4th to 19th June, 1935. The medical and sanitary arrangements were as usual organized by the District Medical Officer of Health, Saharanpur, under the guidance of the Assistant Director of Public Health, I Range. Only four imported cases of cholera were detected in the fair area. One of these died and the rest were cured. Adequate measures to check the spread of the disease were taken and no more cases

occurred.

3. The next important fair was the Dadri Fair which was held at Ballia from 7th to 22nd November, 1935. The arrangements of the fair were supervised by the Assistant Director of Public Health, II Range, and the District Medical Officer of Health, Ballia. The gathering at this fair on the chief bathing day was over three lakhs. The sanitary and medical arrangements were as in the past organized on the lines of the Magh Mela, Allahabad. The health of the pilgrims during the mela was good and not

a single case of infectious disease was detected.

4. In addition to the above fairs the medical and sanitary arrangements of the Garhmuktesar and Nauchandi Fairs (Meerut), Dikhauti Fairs (Hardwar and Rikhikesh), Shahkumber Devi Fair, Saharanpur, Sawan Jhula Fair at Ajodhya (Fyzabad), Batesar (Agra), Daranagar (Bijnor), Dhaighat (Shahjahanpur) and Dewa (Bara Banki) Fairs were either organized or supervised by the range Assistant Director of Public Health. The sanitary and medical arrangements made at the pilgrim route to Badrinath (District Garhwal) and at the Banjatra Fair (District Muttra) were also inspected by the Assistant Director of Public Health, I Range. The Director of Public Health also inspected the arrangements of the Ram Naumi Fair at Ajodhya and made various recommendations for the guidance of the

local authorities in future fairs. In the \$0 districts with a district health service, medical and sanitary arrangements of all the fairs and religious gatherings held in the towns other than those where a wholetime municipal medical officer of health is employed and in the villages of those districts were conducted by the district health staff. Health exhibitions at these fairs were also organized. There was no outbreak of an infectious disease at any of them.

- 5. The officers of the Hygiene Publicity Bureau visited some of the fairs and gave magic lantern and cinema demonstrations. The cinema van also visited as many fairs as it possibly could. Cinema demonstrations were also given at Dayalbagh (in Agra) on the occasion of the All-India Seva Samiti Scout Mela.
- 6. Analysis of railway water supplies at important railway stations was also carried out during the important fairs and adequate steps were taken to disinfect water supplies where necessary.

CHAPTER VI

URBAN SANITATION (INCLUDING NOTIFIED AREAS) AND MUNICIPAL WATER SUPPLIES

- 1. The position in regard to the number of municipal medical officers of health was the same as last year as none of the vacant posts of 12 municipal medical officers of health of class II could be filled on account of the prevailing financial stringency. The arrangements regarding appointment of district medical officers of health as ex officio medical officers of health of 27 small municipalities and 36 notified areas situated in the districts with district health service were continued.
- 2. The question of increase in the scale of sanitary inspectors for municipalities on the basis of increase in population, as disclosed by the census of 1931, was under the consideration of Government for some time past. In 1935, Government passed orders that while the increases suggested are approved, they do not propose issuing any general orders asking boards to bring up the number to the required scale.
- Conservancy and general sanitation.

 Conservancy and good for this year also and there is nothing special to report.
- The construction of a new building for the infectious diseases hospital, Lucknow, was completed. The hospital Infectious diseases has permanent accommodation for 52 beds which hospitals. can be increased by 25 per cent. in case of emergency. There are five general wards in addition to four private wards, viz., two for cholera, one for plague, one for smallpox and one for other diseases. A laboratory has also been provided in the hospital for chemical and bacteriological analysis of water and for carrying out pathological examinations. The above wards and laboratory have been equipped on modern lines and have got the latest type of apparatus. Plans and estimates for the construction of a well-equipped infectious diseases hospital for Allahabad are under preparation. The building of the infectious diseases hospital, Gonda, is nearing completion. infectious diseases block was constructed by the Municipal Board, Farrukhabad, in the compound of the Civil Hospital. The proposal for the construction of an infectious diseases hospital, Gorakhpur, is still under consideration. The Municipal Board of Naini Tal is also earnestly considering to provide a well-equipped infectious diseases hospital, and proposal for the acquisition of a building has been submitted to Government.

Municipal water supplies.

Municipal water supplies and notified areas for the year 1934—
35 based on the reports received from medical officers of health were prepared at the Provincial Hygiene Institute and

submitted to the Board of Public Health together with recommendations for improvements where necessary, and a classification of the various water-works was also indicated according to their efficiency. In the table below are given particulars as to the daily consumption of water, analytical results, etc. of the water supplied during 1935:

As usual, in the majority of towns with piped water supplies analysis of water was carried on by medical officers of health in municipal laboratories and the routine weekly reports of water analysis received from various municipalities were examined at the Provincial Hygiene Institute and necessary action was taken in cases where the results were unsatisfactory. Seasonal analyses both chemical and bacteriological of samples of municipal water supplies were carried out thrice a year at the Provincial Hygiene Institute to serve as a control on reports of weekly analyses received from medical officers of health of such municipalities. Bacteriological and chemical examinations were also carried out both for routine and control purposes.

The Assistant Director of Public Heath, I Range, took a number of samples of water from the Kolukhet water supply at Dehra Dun and from the Bhola water-works at Meerut and inspected water supply of Piran-Kaliar fair (Saharanpur), Gola (Kheri) and Lucknow and that of the II Range examined samples of water at Fyzabad.

According to the reports of water analyses received from the water works in the United Provinces and the results of seasonal analyses carried out at the Provincial Hygiene Institute, United Provinces, it was possible to classify the water supplies in the United Provinces under the three following groups:

Group I was made up of water supplies in which more than 80 percent. of the samples examined during the year, were found to be up to the standard. They were as follows:

(1) Aligarh.

- (3) Fyzabad.
- (4) Kosi.

(5) Muttra.

Aligarh—The quality of water of the Aligarh municipality was found to be very good, when judged from the water analyses reports received from the medical officer of health, but from the records of the results of seasonal analyses done at the Institute, the quality of water of this municipality was not found up to the standard.

Meerut -- The quality of water of Meerut water supply showed improvement over the quality of water noted in previous year's report according to the results of seasonal analysis carried out at the Institute.

Group II was made up of those water supplies in which 60 to 79 per cent, of the samples examined during the year were found to be up to the standard. They were as follows:

(1) Hardwar.

- (2) Dehra Dun (Chlorinated).
- (3) Lucknow.(4) Bhowali.

Hardwar-Water supply which was noted to be in the group of unsatisfactory ones last year was found to show considerable improvement this year. But as the quality of water from various sources in this water supply was found to vary from time to time during the year,

continuous system of chlorination was introduced to ensure a uniformly satisfactory quality of water throughout the year.

Mirzapur—Although this water supply has been included in group II of fairly satisfactory ones on the basis of the reports received from the Medical Officer of Health, Mirzapur, yet it should still be regarded as belonging to group III of unsatisfactory water supplies, as the results of seasonal analyses of the samples, received from Mirzapur were found to be chemically and bacteriologically unsatisfactory. Chlorination of the water supply and the installation of a proper filtration and chlorination-plant was recommended.

Group III was made up of those water supplies in which less than 50 per cent. of the samples examined were found to be up to the standard. They were as follows:

(1) Unao.

(3) Haldwani.

(2) Dehra Dun (Unchlorinated). (4) Gola Gokaran Nath.

(5) Brindaban.

Dehra Dun-A water supply reorganization scheme for Dehra Dunhas been prepared and approved by the Board of Public Health. The scheme will be completed in about a couple of years.

Jhansi-A new balancing tank is being put in and a chlorination plant will be installed as soon as the tank is ready.

7. During the year under report the Bengal and North-Western, the Analysis of water Rohilkand and Kumaun and the North-Western supplies of railway Railways also agreed to the examination of railway stations.

Water supplies of their chief stations before the commencement of large melas and to co-operate with the Public Health Department in the matter. A large number of samples of water from important railway stations on prilgrim routes were examined at the Provincial Hygiene Institute before the commencement of the Adh Kumbh Mela at Allahabad and other fairs and technical advice was given to the railway authorities concerned for providing a pure and wholesome supply of water at railway stations. The reports of results of bacteriological examination of water carried out at railway laboratories were also scrutinized and necessary action was recommended.

CHAPTER VII.

RURAL SANITATION.

The district health service was not extended to any more districts in

1935. The provision made in the budget for the year 1935-36, for extension to three districts was withdrawn by Government owing to financial stringency. The labour gangs continue to be held in abeyance and their absence is a great handicap to the district health staff.

2. This scheme continues to function. The sub-joined table will show the work done under the different heads during the year 1935:

Village aid dispensaries have maintained their popularity and in some cases district magistrates ordered their maintenance from the surplus fund of panchayats. In areas where these dispensaries were in charge of teachers as counsellors of Junior Red Cross groups, the school boys were helpful in dressing wounds.

3. Mention was made in last year's report of the departmental orders issued early in 1935 for the improvement of at least one village in each district on model lines. These orders have been carried out, and each district where the health service is in force has improved villages in which the various forms of sanitary conveniences have been provided from local material and local labour.

In the district of Gonda one village, named "Kumar-gaddi" in police station Pachperwa was converted into a model village with model houses and proper sanitary conveniences, thus bringing the number of typical model villages in this district to three.

4. Departmental orders were also issued in 1935, to the district medical officers of health of (1) Jaunpur, (2) Partabgarh, (3) Rae Bareli, (4) Fatehpur, (5) Allahabad, (6) Mirzapur, (7) Benares, (8) Sultanpur and (9) Fyzabad for the improvement on sanitary lines of wells on pucca roads leading to Allahabad, specially those in places used as paraos" as these are very much used by pilgrims proceeding to Allahabad

during bathing fairs. With funds provided by district boards and the board of public health a large number of wells have thus been made sanitary.

In the Gonda district a very large number of sanitary wells have been constructed or improved by the Balrampur Estate and other estates under the court of wards, the expenditure of all estates under this head being Rs.25,000 in the year. This is an effort which other districts might well emulate. In the Partabgarh district, outside the health unit area about 400 notices were issued for improvement of wells.

- 5. The scheme for the appointment of resident public health officials

 Appointment of resident Public Health reports was continued by the district board of Goofficials for groups of rakhpur during the year 1935, also. It was financed entirely from their own funds.
- 6. This scheme continues, with the financial co-operation of the Rocke-feller Foundation of the United States of America to the extent of one-fourth of total expenditure or Rs.7,500, whichever is less. Work under this activities in line with actual rural conditions:
 - (1) All urban methods were given up, as they were unsuited to rural life;
 - (2) Training of indigenous dais was pressed forward;
 - (3) Recording of births and deaths was improved;
 - (4) Trench-pattern latrines and urinals on soakage pit system were constructed in place of bored-hole latrines which were found to breed blue-bottle flies;
 - (5) Medical relief for minor ailments was introduced, and
 - (6) Other types of sanitary conveniences, e.g. bathing platforms, etc. were introduced.
- Rural development. tion was the inception of the local Government's programme of rural development from contribution received from the Government of India. The plan of work under the United Provinces Government is broadly divided into:
 - (1) the "main" scheme, which is worked by district officers and under which a programme of general economic improvement of villagers and village conditions is aimed at, and for which co-operation of all other departments of Government is secured through the co-ordinating medium of the district officer, and
 - (2) the "departmental" schemes, under which each department has to work typical schemes of improvement in smaller selected areas in order to demonstrate the value of intensive work in particular directions.

The "main" scheme is in force in 72 villages in each of the plains districts, divided into six different groups. The Public Health Department is closely collaborating with district officers in respect of public health improvements in the villages.

(a) Training of personnel—A preliminary point of much importance for the success of the rural development schemes was the training of workers. Inspectors and organizers employed in the "main" scheme were deputed by Government for elementary training in various subjects, e.g. agriculture, veterinary, co-operative, public health, etc. in which they have to assist villagers. This training was arranged at four different places in the province. The public health department co-operated in the scheme for the training of these persons in the public health portion of their duties. A detailed syllabus was prepared and this was made to suit practical work required in rural areas. An illustrated booklet containing detailed notes on the public health measures to be enforced has also been supplied to the workers for their guidance.

Details of work done under "main" scheme—The following is a summary of the public health work which is being done in the "main" scheme, local material being utilized as far as possible.

Village officials, school teachers and older boys are being trained in hygiene and first aid. To keep village sites clean and also to increase the available manure and conserve its quality, rubbish, litter and dung are being stored in pits. To keep village paths dry, soakage pits for demonstration purposes have been constructed for the reception of waste water. Screened trenches have been constructed for women, to serve as latrines. The advantage of providing such latrines is that they are foolproof and the trenched excreta can be dug out in six months as excellent manure. Urinals have been provided separately for men and women near inhabited sites. People have been advised to have outlet for smoke in kitchens and to remove cattle-sheds to the back of their houses. Screened bathing platforms, draining into large soakage pits, have been constructed at a small distance from wells, to prevent their contamination. Parapets and pulleys are being provided on wells. Excavations are being discouraged. Villagers are being trained in anti-epidemic work. Dwellings are being disinfected with the "torch-flame" method. Indigenous dais are being trained in clean aseptic methods of confinement.

A portable dais' box has been designed by the public health department. They contain simple articles necessary for conducting labour cases cleanly and printed instructions in English and the vernaculars. The cost of each box is Rs.4. A large number of such boxes have been issued.

The village chaukidar is being trained in the identification of the common diseases. Junior Red Cross groups have been started. They play health dramas, chant songs and help in popularizing anti-epidemic measures. Suggestion has been made for the supply of sprouting grams, fruits or vegetables as midday meals in village schools.

Medical aid for minor ailments has been provided as part of the programme and the public health department has designed medicine boxes containing simple indigenous drugs of known therapeutic value, most of which are available in villages. Printed instructions in English, Urdu, and Hindi containing the prescriptions and mode of administration of the drugs have been supplied with each box. These medicine chests are kept in the charge of village school teachers or other responsible persons. The cost of each box is Rs.10. Over three thousand and three hundred such boxes have been issued.

Modified Health Units-These units incorporate methods of work in the Partabgarh Health Unit, with certain modifications dictated by experience and the consideration for economy. The chief modification has been in superior staff. Unlike the Partabgarh Unit, where a separate wholetime medical officer of health has been provided for its supervising charge, the district medical officer of health or a reserve officer of the provincial public health service has been placed in supervising charge of these "modified" units. The subordinate staff consists of three sanitary inspectors, one health visitor, six midwives, six indigenous dais and five apprentice vaccinators, and they have to live in a central village in the area placed in their charge. A provision of Rs.2,000 has been made for sanitary works. The cost of these units in this way has been brought down to Rs.11,000 against Rs.30,000 of the Partabgarh Unit, the number of villages and population served being the same in both types of units. With the funds available it has thus been possible to have nine units in the different parts of the province, and their demonstrative value has consequently been enhanced. These units have been located in Meerut, Moradabad, Allahabad, Jhansi, Benares, Gorakhpur, Lucknow, Fyzabad and Agra districts and are under the administrative control of the Assistant Director of Public Health Incharge Epidemiology Branch.

The items of public health work undertaken in these units are mainly those mentioned above for villages under the "main" scheme, but work in every direction is much more intensive. In the sphere of maternity and child welfare work clinics are held by health visitors and they also pay house-to-house visits for advising mothers on infant welfare. Qualified midwives conduct normal labour cases. Indigenous dais are given training on general principles of clean midwifery, conducting of normal labour cases cleanly and without interference, child welfare and feeding of infants.

A sanitary board consisting of zamindars, mukhias, retired civil and military officials and tenants has been formed in several villages in the health unit areas to maintain the sanitary measures enforced and to arrange for funds. Slides on rural uplift work have been prepared and are being shown in the villages.

Medical relief has been arranged in the areas under the "modified" units. In this scheme one wholetime medical officer has been appointed to tour in the villages with portable medicine chests for treatment of the minor ailments, and a considerable measure of success has been achieved. The cost of the medical portion of each health unit is Rs.2,540. It is hoped that when more funds are available, this treatment scheme will be extended so as to reduce the suffering of the people and by cutting down the period of their illness will save them from loss of wage or earning capacity from which they now suffer, particularly during harvesting operations when rural labour is required at its maximum efficiency.

The following booklets were specially prepared by the Epidemiology Branch for rural health work in English and the vernaculars:

(1) Village medicine chests.

(2) Instructions for village dais.

(3) Programme of health work in rural areas.

- Public health legislation in rural areas.

 Some cases. In many cases district medical officers of health have not yet been empowered to institute prosecutions. The level of fines imposed for infringment of the public health byelaws is still very low.
- 9. During the year 1935-36, the Board of Public Health originally gave grants aggregating Rs.64,835 for small public health works in rural areas, against Rs.71,685 in 1934-35. Out of the former sum, Rs.10,449 were subsequently resumed, and allowing for other minor adjustments. a sum of Rs.54,449 only was available for public health works in rural areas, against Rs.58,229 in 1934-35. Priority was, as usual, given to schemes for improvement of water supplies.

Receipts of district boards from Government, the Board of Public Health and other sources specially earmarked for public health purposes were Rs.2,43,674. Out of their own revenue of Rs.1,07,47,494 the boards therefore spent Rs.3,53,492 or Rs. 3.5 per cent. In 1933-34, the percentage of expenditure from their own sources was Rs.2-9.

CHAPTER VIII

MALARIA

The charge of the Malaria Branch was held by Dr. A. C. Banerjea,

Assistant Director of Public Health. Dr. P. N.

Chatterji continued as the Senior Assistant up to
October 9, 1935, after which he proceeded on a Rockefeller Fellowship to
the All-India Institute of Hygiene, Calcutta. Dr. R. S. Srivastava continued as the Junior Assistant up to 9th October, 1935, and thereafter
as the Senior Assistant. Dr. Diwan Chand officiated as the Junior
Assistant from October 10, 1935, to the end of the year.

Summary of the principal activities of the Malaria Branch

1. Anti-malarial measures at Banbassa-Headworks of the Sarda Canal—Periodical visits were made to Banbassa to supervise anti-malarial measures. Fortnightly blood films from fever cases were examined and the results of examination communicated to the medical officer at Banbassa for proper treatment of chronic malaria carriers.

The usual "Blanket" treatment was given to the whole population in the spring and autumn malarial seasons as also to newcomers to Banbassa with a view to minimize infection from outside sources. Persons with more than three fingers enlarged spleen were as far as possible excluded from Banbassa. These measures helped considerably in keeping the labour population fit in an intensely malarious zone.

2. Anti-malarial works in the Tarai and Bhabar Estates—The areas were visited in summer and advice as regards "Paris greening" and other measures was given on the spot. Anti-larval measures with Paris green were carried out in 50 villages. Two hundred and eighty-five volunteers were trained in this work. These helped in filling 29 tanks and 200 borrow pits and in Paris greening of 171 breeding grounds. The scheme for intensive mass treatment of 36 villages around Bazpur and Shafakhana was continued with two travelling whole-time compounders. In these villages not only the number of sick days was reduced from 7.5 to 3.3 per cent., but the sick rate from malaria was also reduced from 57.3 to 40.25 per cent. The spleen index showed a reduction from 72.6 to 64.7.

One hundred and twenty-five pounds of quinine and 132 lb. of cinchona and 4,985 tablets of plasmoquine were distributed free during the malarious season for treatment of cases in some of the villages not served by dispensaries.

The anti-malaria works, viz. cleaning of drains, providing suitable culverts, filling of depressions, etc. were carried out from April to December, 1935, by the engineering staff of the estates at a cost of Rs.10,634.

- 3. Training in the principles of malaria control—(a) Advanced courses of instructions in malariology including field work were given to 9 class I and 10 class II officers.
- (b) A regular course in malariology, theoretical and practical was given to 10 candidates for the Licence in Public Health.
- (c) A short preliminary course, theoretical and practical was given to 10 candidates of Part II course for sanitary inspectors and 6 candidates for chief sanitary inspectors.
- 4. Malaria Investigations The final reports on malaria investigations in Khurja, Chandpur and Dhampur Municipalities were

submitted. Investigations were made in the Fatehgarh Municipality and some villages in the Cawnpore District. Enquiries relating to high figures of mortality under malaria from 35 municipalities were made and it was found that these figures were exaggerated and the percentage of error was about 36·15 per cent. The district health staff carried out similar investigations in 30 districts with district health scheme and the percentage of error detected in reporting was 57·31 per cent.

5. Investigation and control of malaria epidemics—Malaria in an epidemic form was prevalent in the districts of Bulandshahr, Moradabad, Muzaffarnagar, Kheri, Sitapur, Aligarh, Sultanpur, Mainpuri, Bahraich, Muttra, Bareilly, Saharanpur, Shahjahanpur, Budaun, Hamirpur, Hardoi, Pilibhit, Fyzabad and Gorakhpur. The outbreak although generalized was not widespread and was in most cases an accentuation of the usual

autumn malaria.

In all 5,272 villages were affected. Four hundred and eighty eight pounds of quinine and cinchona were distributed for the treatment of 101,921 persons. Permission to utilize the reserve stock of quinine for free distribution was also given.

In view of the timely treatment of malaria cases there was no complaint

from any of these districts regarding delay in rabs sowings.

6. Investigations in the Sarda Canal Area—The investigation in the Sarda Canal "sample areas" and allied tracts was continued during the year. The villages under canal irrigation in Shahjahanpur showed a maximum spleen rate of 100 per cent. as compared to 7.2 per cent. maximum spleen rate prevalent in areas (Unao district) not irrigated by canals.

A detailed investigation was carried out to elicit epidemiological features in relation to malaria in the villages situated along the Hardoi Branch of the Sarda Canal in the districts of Pilibhit and Shahjahanpur around Khanaut river in response to the request made by the Commissioner, Rohilkhand Division. A report on the subject dealing with the factors responsible for the hyperendemic conditions in that area with suggestions to ameliorate these conditions was submitted to the Government but action could not be taken on the report owing to financial stringency.

7. Spleen census by mortality circles in districts with health scheme—This was carried out twice during the year. The pooled averages for the spring and autumn malaria seasons for 30 districts were 3.30 per cent. and 5.58 per cent. respectively, as compared to 3.07 per cent. and 3.25 per cent. in the preceding year. The highest rates were for Naini

Tal, Saharanpur and Mirzapur Districts.

8. Anti-malarial work through the agency of boy scouts and junior red cross groups—Training in simple principles of the causation and prevention of malaria was given in 160 centres of which 127 were rural centres. The number of boys trained was 10,874. The services of this agency were utilized for minor anti-mosquito measures such as oiling, draining and filling of pools and ditches, and the distribution of notices pointing out insanitary practices conducive to malaria. Samples of mosquitoes and larval collections obtained from these groups were examined.

9. Anti-malarial byelaws passed by the local bodies - During the year "anti-malarial byelaws" were passed by the following municipali-

ties and cantonments:

(1) Gorakhpur Municipality.

(2) Lucknow Cantonment.

(3) Allahabad Cantonment.

This brings the total number of municipalities, cantonments and notified areas that have adopted these bylaws to 32.

- 10—Special anti-malarial schemes—(i) Rural mass treatment scheme with cinchona and plasmoquine—(a) This was continued in some of the village groups in the districts of Lucknow, Hardoi and Unao. The necessary cinchona and plasmoquine tablets were supplied free from the reserve stock. The number of cases treated during the year was 1,402 and the reported clinical seasonal relapse rate was found to be 4.78 as compared to 5.6 per cent. in 1934.
- (b) Kosi notified area—As in the previous year two "Blanket" treatment courses were given to scholars in Kosi where there is compulsory primary education. The number of scholars put through the "Blanket" treatment courses was 335 for the spring and 227 for the autumn malaria seasons. Five pounds and 4 ounces of cinchona and 4,378 tablets of plasmoquine were used in this treatment. This treatment has resulted in reducing the number of sick days amongst the scholars but there has been no reduction in chronic spleens.
- (c) Brindaban Municipality—"Blanket" treatment was also given to the scholars in this municipality. Due to slight increase in the autumn malaria the spleen rate (19.28 per cent.) was higher than that in the last year (7.14 per cent.) but it was much below that in the year 1933 (36.3 per cent). Three and a quarter pounds of cinchona and 2,773 tablets of plasmoquine were used in this treatment.
- (d) Budaun District-Eight pounds of cinchona were used for treating 500 adults and children.
- (e) Khurja Municipality Three pounds and 5 oz. of cinchona tablets out of 10 lb. supplied by this branch were distributed for treating 417 persons.
- (ii) Distribution of cinchona through local agencies—(a) Shahjahanpur Rural Uplift Association—One thousand four hundred and thirty-one persons were treated and 22 lbs. of cinchona were distributed in rural areas under this Association.
- (b) Taraqi Sabha, Pilibhit—Eight pounds and $5\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of cinchona were distributed by the local agencies and 1,235 persons were treated under this scheme.
- (c) Rural Sale Scheme of cinchona products subsidized by local agencies—This scheme continued to operate in the Gorakhpur District but was operative only in few villages.
- (d) Unao "Panchayat" Village Treatment Scheme—This scheme was in force in six villages of this district and 309 persons were treated.
- (e) Partabgarh Health Unit Scheme—The scheme of treatment with cinchona and plasmoquine was continued in five villages and 516 cases were treated.
- (f) Modified Health Unit Scheme—This scheme was started in nine districts during the latter part of the year. Besides other drugs, quinine for intensive malaria treatment has been supplied to all units.
- (g) Rural Development Schem3—Under this scheme 72 village medicine chests each containing 4 oz. of quinine and cinchona tablets have been supplied to each of the 45 plains districts.

- 11. Special Investigations—Special investigations on malaria were conducted in the following places:
 - (1) Bareilly Central Jail.
 - (2) Bareilly District Jail.
 - (3) Lucknow Municipality.

The investigations in the two jails were completed and reports submitted to the authorities concerned, while the one in the Lucknow municipality is still in progress. Periodical visits to the Lucknow Municipality were made to supervise the anti-malarial work and the information regarding the chief carrier anophelines and their breeding was supplied to the medical officer of health from time to time together with recommendations for modification of measures as and when required.

12. Government quinine tablet manufacturing factory-(i) Manufacture and sale of quinine and cinchona febrifuge tablets—During the year under report quinine and cinchona tablets worth Rs.38,028-14 were sold by the factory. The details of this are as follows:

In addition, 117 lb. of quinine powder out of Director of Public Health's reserve stock and that received from district boards, was converted into tablets earning for the factory a sum of Rs.468 as conversion charges.

- (ii) Quinine Reserve—Twenty-one pounds and 3 oz. of quinine and 152 lb. and 4 oz. of cinchona tablets were issued from the reserve stock to the districts of Saharanpur, Muzaffarnagar, Meerut, Bulandshabr, Muttra, Allahabad, Ballia, Gorakhpur and Sitapur for replenishment of district reserve stock consumed during malaria epidemics.
- 13. The Government of India's free grant of 6,000 lb. of quinine was received during the latter part of the year. A scheme for its distribution in rural areas is under the consideration of the Government.

The table below represents the total consumption through all sources of quinine and cinchona per head of population for the year 1935. It will be seen that the consumption of quinine per head of population varies from 0.02 to 16.34 grains in the different districts. These figures give a clear indication of the inadequate supply of quinine for malaria cases in these provinces:

According to the report of the Inspector-General of Civil Hospitals, United Provinces, for the year 1934, 1,091,195 patients of malaria were treated in all the dispensaries of the United Provinces, and 1,146 lb. of quinine and 1,769 lb. of cinchona were consumed. This works out to an average of 18.6 grains per patient against a minimum of 60 grains required for each paroxysm of malaria.

CHAPTER IX

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE

Organization.

Organi

There are also local committees for Red Cross work at district headquarters and the collector of the district is the president and the medical officer of health or the civil surgeon is the honorary secretary of the district committee. These committees have been taking interest in child welfare work and endeavouring to open new centres by raising subscriptions.

The municipalities in the province as a rule do not organize separate schemes for maternity and child welfare work.

To secure active co-operation, the Dufferin and Mission Hospital authorities were made active members of the local committees in some places to supervise maternity and child welfare work.

- 2. One child welfare and three new maternity centres were opened Maternity and Child during the year. The total number of centres both Welfare centres. maternity and child welfare as well as maternity only at the end of the year was 223 (114 rural and 109 urban) and all these were run by the Red Cross. The Cotton Mills, Cawnpore, and Dayal Bagh, Agra, also maintained one centre each. The maternity and child welfare work in the rural areas of the province has received an impetus by the opening of nine modified health units.
- 3. The Local Government contributed a sum of Rs.1,21,252 in 1935, as against the allotment of Rs.1,22,600 last year. The Central Council of the Victoria Memorial Scholarship Fund, Delhi, continued their annual grant of Rs. 2,300 for improvement of indigenous dais and the executive committee of the Red Cross Society contributed Rs.20,000 during the year under report. In addition to the above a sum of Rs. 3,509 was realized on account of fees, etc. for the maternity services rendered. The total expenditure during the year under report amounted to Rs.1,47,886. The excess in expenditure was met from the opening balance of the last year. In addition to this, a sum of Rs.80,000 was spent on maternity and child welfare work by local branches from local subscription, etc.
- 4. The number of medical women employed on preventive work in municipalities and other local bodies (Red Cross) was 18 (4 M. B., B. S.'s, 6 L. M. P.'s, and 8 certified Sub-Assistant Surgeons.)

The number of health visitors with diploma in the municipalities (Red Cross) was 10 (1 Nagpur, 4 Delhi and 5 Lucknow trained).

One medical woman (L. M. P.) and two Delhi trained health visitors worked in the Provincial Training Centre, Lucknow.

One medical woman (M. B., B. S.) and two Lucknow trained health visitors worked in the Health Unit, Partabgarh.

The number of midwives employed was 293. A table showing particulars of maternity and child welfare centres, health visitors and trained midwives employed in this province forms appendix C of this report.

Maternity Service The Director of Maternity and Child Welfare is a and Vital Statistics. The Director of Maternity and Child Welfare is a touring officer and inspects all maternity and child welfare centres which are required to employ qualified workers. During 1935, she inspected the maternity and child welfare work both in rural and urban areas of 22 districts, and visited Rampur and Delhi to give necessary instructions to the local workers in regard to organization and direction of maternity and child welfare work.

The staff paid ante-natal and post-natal visits, trained indigenous dais and organized baby shows and magic lantern demonstrations and lectures in exhibitions, fairs, etc. In maternity and child welfare centres clinics were also held. The total number of cases conducted by the staff with or without indigenous dais during the year under report was 44,163, while that of the cases not attended by Red Cross workers in the same areas in the United Provinces was 120,211 the percentages in proportion to births in the two cases were 26.87 and 73.13, respectively. The deaths reported amongst children under one year of age in the former case were 2,708 and in the latter 34,845, yielding a ratio of infantile mortality per mille of 61.34 and 289.87, respectively, as compared with 66.01 and 260.5 in the preceding year. The maternal mortality rates among cases conducted by the Red Cross staff in the rural and urban areas were 3.40 and 4.07 respectively, and infantile mortality was 79.28 per thousand in rural and 53.63 per thousand in urban areas, whereas the mortality rates for infants in general for the same areas were 127.25 and 143.55 respectively. A number of cases reported as tetanus were investigated by medical officers of health of first and second class municipalities and by medical women and health visitors where employed. Mortality among children between 1-5 years was 52.46 per 1,000 of population in 1935, against 51.56 in 1934.

Training of personthe Provincial Training Centre, Lucknow, in domiciliary midwifery and house visiting. Twenty probationers passed during March and September examinations out of 26 and were awarded a certificate by the State Medical Faculty, United Provinces, Lucknow.

Facility for midwifery training also existed in the Cawnpore Maternity and Child Welfare Centre, Dufferin and Mission Hospitals, but these institutions trained these workers for their own needs.

A serious effort was made to train the indigenous dais right through the province, specially in 25 maternity and child welfare centres, where medical women or health visitors were employed and in areas under the ten health units in the province.

Six hundred indigenous dais were trained during the year, of whom 278 were trained in the Partabgarh Health Unit. A sum of Rs. 1,00,000 has been sanctioned for the building of a Health School in Lucknow for training of health visitors and midwives from the Silver Jubilee Fund and steps are being taken to erect a building which it is hoped will be erected shortly.

- 7. The Registration Act for health visitors, nurses, and midwives which was passed in 1934, has not yet been enforced in the United Provinces. But there are byelaws in several municipalities and notified areas of the province and they were directed towards the prevention of practice by unlicensed midwives and dais. The position in regard to clean midwifery in the province is steadily improving and the public are showing signs of appreciating methods of clean midwifery so much so that there is a great demand for qualified health visitors and midwives.
- 8. The modified health units were introduced in nine districts during Modified Health the latter part of the year in connexion with rural development work. The scheme in each modified health unit for maternity work consists of —

One health visitor.

Six midwives.

Six trained indigenous dais.

This work has been started well and it has great possibilities. The rural public is very appreciative of the real good and substantial work done in these modified health units.

9. The most recessary lines of advance in maternity and child welfare work in these provinces are the education of the public and of mothers especially in health matters and the training of indigenous dais in clean and normal midwifery. The latter activity has been undertaken on a large scale. Maternity boxes have been distributed to many successfully trained candidates.

CHAPTER X

SCHOOL HYGIENE AND MEDICAL INSPECTION OF SCHOOL CHILDREN

1. This report on the working of the scheme of medical inspection covers the period of the school year from July, 1935 to April, 1936. It deals particularly with the work of the 13 whole-time school health officers. There were a few changes in the personnel owing to a few transfers. The continuity of the system and co-ordination in work was however maintained through inspections by the Assistant Director of Public Health (Hygiene Publicity Bureau).

A comparison of the defective conditions with those which existed at

the start of the work forms the special feature of this report.

2. Detailed examination of boys was conducted in 150 out of 151

Anglo-Vernacular Schools situated within the larger municipalities where whole-time school health officers are employed. The number of boys whose history sheets were filled was about 25,000 out of about 2,000 on roll, i.e. 48 per cent. Out of 480 primary and vernacular schools 200 were visited for ordinary examination consisting of noting main defects only, and out of 62,000 boys in them 18,000 were examined, i.e. 29 per cent. These examinations were besides a large number of parade inspections. The School Health Officer, Allahabad, examined 73 pupils of the Training College as well for physical fitness.

The reports submitted by 20 medical officers of health who are exofficio school health officers for the schools in their municipalities show that out of a total number of 53 schools for detailed examination, 45 were visited and out of about 17,000 boys on roll over 8,000, i.e. 47 per cent. were examined. These medical officers also inspected 161 schools out of 235 for ordinary examination, and examined 10,000 boys out of about 25,000, i.e. 40 per cent.

Similarly the 21 district medical officers of health who submitted their reports made detailed inspections in 43 out of 71 schools and examined more than 7,000 boys out of 19,000 on roll, i.e. 36 per cent. The number of schools for ordinary examination in their areas was more than 8,100. Of these 1,771 were visited and over 93,000 boys out of 586,000 on roll were examined, i.e. about 16 per cent.

3. Poor nutrition—In the larger urban areas this defect was in 12 per cent. against 13.9 per cent. in 1931-32. The percentage of this defect does not show much variation in rural areas, being 19.8 against 19 19 in 1931-32 and 20 in 1932-33. There is a noticeable improvement in the urban areas which is attributable to the better organized system of feeding on germinating gram and possibly of milk-feeding.

Defects in teeth—There were 9 per cent. scholars with defects in teeth (caries) against 11.9 per cent. in 1931-32 in the urban areas and 9.3 per cent. against 10.3 per cent. in 1931-32 in rural areas. There was an appreciable improvement in the urban areas.

Pyorrhoea was found in 4 per cent. against 5.6 per cent. in urban areas, there being again a noticeable improvement in this defect. The percentage of pyorrhoea in rural areas was 1.3 per cent. against 1.5 per cent. recorded previously.

Enlarged tonsils and adenoids—In the urban areas enlargement of tonsils was 8 per cent. against 10.6 per cent. in 1931-32 which is again an improvement. In the rural areas this figure was 3.3 per cent. against 3.65 per cent. in the past.

Glandular enlargement—The enlargement of other glands was an additional record made during the year. It was 3 per cent. in urban areas and 1.3 per cent. in rural areas.

Defective hearing—In urban areas 1.7 per cent. scholars had this defect against 2 per cent. in 1931-32, while in the rural areas it was only 9 per cent. against 1.5 per cent. in the past. The school health officer, Jhansi, traced chronic otorrhoea, enlarged tonsils, mechanical injury and infectious fevers as causes of defective hearing.

Diseases of the eyelids—(Conjunctivitis and granulation). There was a very marked fall from 13.98 per cent. in 1931-32 and 9 per cent. in 1932-33 to 6 per cent. in the urban areas, while in the rural areas there was a slight fall from 6.47 per cent. in 1931-32 to 5 per cent.

Defective vision—The figures for urban areas was 12 per cent. against 10.65 per cent. in 1931-32. The percentage of defective vision was 13.3 in 1932-33 and 17 in 1934-35. The increase in the incidence of this defect from year to year had clearly been due to greater facilities provided for its detection, specially on account of the establishment of school clinics. But the fall in the percentage from the maximum during the year, and its approach to the first year's figure shows that the incidence is not particularly on the increase.

The percentage of defective vision in rural areas was 1 against 1.9 in the past. In semi-rural areas the percentage was 3.5 against 3.78 in the past. These figures for rural and semi-rural areas were not the records of actual incidence of this defect as the facilities for the detection of the defects in vision for ordinary examinations in these areas were few, but the figures give a comparative indication of the prevalence of the defect.

Anaemias—The figures for anaemias of all kind including those due to worm infection and malaria having fallen down from 7.2 per cent. to 2.4 per cent. show marked decrease in rural areas for any comment at present. In urban areas the fall was from 3.53 per cent. to 1.9 per cent.

Skin diseases—The dirt diseases of the skin show a very marked fall, from 3 per cent. to '15 per cent. in urban areas and from 9 per cent. to 3.5 per cent. in rural areas. These decreases are attributed to the activities of the Junior Red Cross specially in districts.

Deformities—Cases of physical deformity, congenital and acquired as reported in urban areas were to the extent of 3 per cent. and in rural areas '25 per cent.

Unvaccinated—The school health officers found 14 per cent. unvaccinated children in urban areas and 24 per cent. in rural areas.

Some other defects—The whole time school health officers found cases of epidemic dropsy in Benares and Fyzabad; goitre in Fyzabad, Bareilly and Gorakhpur and filarial infection in Benares. The school health officer Benares found in two institutions 9.5 per cent. boys who harboured microfilaria in their blood. He also found 6 per cent. cases with cardiac abnormalities almost all of whom had a history of epidemic dropsy.

Nervous diseases due to the same cause were in 5 per cent. Cases of flat-foot were found in Gorakhpur and Jhansi. Cases of venereal diseases, leprosy, epilepsy, hernia, tumour of the skull, facial paralysis and dextrocardia were also detected by the officers. Cases of goitre were found in the municipalities of Bahraich, Pilibhit and Naini Tal. The spleen index in the Brindaban municipality was as high as 19.3 per cent. in December, 1935, and 16 per cent. in April, 1936. The index in the Muzaffarnagar district which has a canal system was 15.6 per cent.

The whole-time school health officers found 15 cases of suspected tuberculosis of the lungs and 30 cases of other forms and the exofficio school health officers found 21 and 22 cases, respectively, in smaller municipalities

and 28 and 48, respectively, in districts.

Cases of influenza, mumps, malaria, chicken-pox, small-pox and infective conditions of the skin and of the eye-lids were temporarily quarantined. A few schools were recommended for closure on account of plague in

the Gorakhpur and Garhwal districts.

Total defectives. It is worth noting that the percentage of defectives for all the main defects enumerated above comes to 61 in urban areas if it is assumed that each boy had only one defect. This figure for rural areas is 48. It has also been calculated that roughly only 17 per cent. had one defect, 7 per cent. two defects and another 7 per cent. had more than two defects in urban areas so that there were not less than 31 per cent. defectives to share all the defects. These figures for rural areas were 14, 4.3 and 1.6, respectively, giving a figure of 20 per cent. defectives to share the defects.

Oral hygiene. Oral hygiene. Oral hygiene. Oral hygiene but it is to be remembered that the boys in rural areas were of a younger age where the incidence of the defect is greater. The conclusion is that the teeth of the boys in rural areas are better looked after. The incidence of pyorrhoea which is a condition of older age is very much greater in urban areas. The useful system of recording the findings of the defects by age groups, which was continued by the school health officer, Allahabad, lends support to these statements. The incidence of enlarged tonsils in urban areas is again much higher. All these conditions have distinctly improved in urban areas and the incidence of mouth breathing has been reduced from 3.2 per cent. to 1 per cent. which is now at the same level in rural areas. The central school clinic which is held at five places at present has been mainly responsible for improvement in hygiene of the mouth in these towns.

Although the condition of nutrition has made some improvement, attention to the hygiene of the mouth has under the existing condition gone a long way to bring about the improvement in the condition of the teeth.

5. The dirt diseases of the eye and skin show a decrease both in urban and rural areas. The figures for these diseases quoted above speak well of the attention which has been paid to these conditions, and the improvement in rural areas is attributed mainly to the practice of the health habits which forms an important part of the Junior Red Cross movement. General cleanliness is greater in rural areas specially in primary classes. The environments of most of the municipal schools are reported to be unsatisfactory from sanitary point of view. Washing arrangements were made in some of the primary schools as before. The municipal board of Jhansi

supplied soap for washing in municipal schools. The Junior Red Cross movement in the higher grade of schools has also done effective work, e.g. in Bareilly, the Islamia High School has improved since weekly cleaning up competitions were introduced in it. A Junior Red Cross Bank was opened in this school and prizes were given at the competitions.

- Central school dispensary.

 be the purpose of the school medical inspection cannot be properly served if there are no adequate arrangements for removal of defects. The establishment of the central school dispensary for this purpose by raising monthly a fee of Re.0-1-0 per head in the five towns of Agra, Allahabad, Cawnpore, Benares and Lucknow was mentioned in the last report. The working of these dispensaries for another year has fully justified the extension of the programme to other towns as well and this is the crying need of all other whole-time school health officers. The outstanding features of the work in the central school clinics are summarised below:
 - (1) In addition to the provision of treatment facilities for removal of defects of a routine nature the clinics gave an opportunity of paying attention to the conditions which needed an "educational" treatment for follow-up work.
 - (2) From the records at the clinics it was possible to check the results of treatment of the defectives who had been sorted out at the medical inspections and thus the follow-up work was again systematised.
 - (3) Boys of defective vision received attention which otherwise could not be given without considerable loss to their studies. In addition indigent boys had the benefit of the free supply of glasses.
 - (4) Cases of defective teeth and gums were suitably advised and attended to.
 - (5) There, was a marked tendency towards centralization of treatment as hostellers also attended the dispensaries and the chief use of the stock of medicines in hostels was confined to emergent cases.
 - (6) The dispensaries served as a sorting place for reference to specialists in hospitals.

The total number of cases who attended these school dispensaries was about 16,000 with an attendance of 37,000, the maximum daily attendance being in the neighbourhood of 40. The number of vision cases was 1,700 and dental about 550. About 340 ill-nourished and poorer boys were given a milk feed at each clinic and the improvement in their nutritional condition watched. 472 pairs of glasses were supplied free.

7. It is accepted on all hands that dental defects are closely connected with faulty nutrition but that does not mean that conservative dentistry can be neglected. This work in the clinics is done by honorary dentists at a sacrifice which is commendable. It is obvious that they can touch only a very small fringe of work. In this connection the clinic in Lucknow was particularly fortunate in

Dentist of the Balrampur Hospital, who continued to work regularly. Dr. D. D. Watt, L.D.S. (Glasgow) worked in the Cawnpore clinic, Dr. Verman in Agra, Dr. Singh in Benares and Mr. Gupta in Allahabad were the other dentists who were helpful to the school health officers. The clinics were also provided with dental equipment as far as possible towards the end of

the year under report.

8. Other measures for treatment.—It has been mentioned that the clinics served as a sorting ground. At Allahabad help was given in the Jumna Mission Dispensary under Dr. (Mrs.) Hayes, in the Railway Laboratory, the Eye Hospital and the Colvin Hospital, where a few cases underwent operative treatment. Cases for operative treatment were also sorted out at the other clinics, particularly, in Lucknow. The existence of clinical laboratories was not ignored. The treatment arrangement for municipal school boys at the Cawnpore clinic was continued and the Agra municipality gave a grant of Rs.300 for the treatment of these boys, 22 of whom were supplied glasses free. The tendency to leave a dispensary box in charge of the school teachers in municipalities was however deprecated as it tends to over medication for ailments which need only educational treatment or an open air régime. Special arrangements for the treatment of cases of epidemic dropsy were made. A supply of marmite sandwiches and milk was made to the sufferers besides the regulation of diet and a cure in 20 per cent, and improvement in 63 per cent, is reported. In one hostel where micro-filaria infection was investigated the use of mosquito nets was made compulsory.

The measures for treatment in places where there are no clinics did not stop short with the issue of vouchers. In Saharenpur the School Health Officer arranged to hold a weekly clinic, in the Sadar hospital and he secured the honorary services of Dr. J. N. Vaish an Eye Specialist who not only examined 130 cases but even supplied glasses free to some deserving boys.

The School Health Officer also made efforts to establish contact with parents by making personal interviews. In Gorakhpur the association for the treatment of school boys working on a co-operative basis continued its activities and 71 pairs of glasses were supplied free. Dr. H. N. Varma and Dr. Gulhati were specially helpful in giving them the treatments. Also the school health officer attended the Sadr Hospital for the treatment of school children. An anti-goitre campaign by iodinisation was undertaken by the medical officer of health in Pilibhit and the district medical officer of health in Gorakhpur. In Moradabad and Fyzabad 25 per cent. cases of defective vision purchased glasses. In Bareilly 10 lb. of quinine was distributed in municipal schools. In Jhansi the school health officer visited the Sadr Hospital once a week but the municipal board discontinued the allowance to the hospital compounder which used to be given for the school work and also discontinued the grant for free glasses.

The attendance of cases recorded by 29 Civil Surgeons shows that 33 per cent. of voucher cases attended the dispensaries in municipal areas. This figure was as low as 1.3 per cent. in districts.

A large number of vaccinations and revaccinations and inoculations for cholera and plague prophylaxis were given by the school health officers in boys' schools and also some in girls' schools. Naso-pharyngeal

antisepsis as an anti-meningitis measure was practised. Training in anti-malarial work was given by the school health officers and lectures in anti-epidemic measures were given in patwari schools. Lectures on Hygiene were also given in training colleges and normal schools.

- 9. First Aid and Junior Red Cross-The whole-time school health officers examined 3,300 boys and 50 girls in the Mackenzie school course and over 300 in First Aid to the Injured and Home Nursing, besides giving training in the subject. Twenty ex officio school health officers in municipalities examined 400 boys in the Mackenzie School course and 21 officers in the district examined 2,810 candidates. The school health officers and the officers of the Hygiene Publicity Bureau took a prominent part in the local, divisional and provincial competitions in First Aid. A large number of magic lantern and oral lectures were given by all the officers. The number of schools and colleges with Junior Red Cross groups in them for the calendar year 1935 was 2,366 with a membership of 80,599 boys and 2,792 girls, making a total of 83,391. Most of the groups-95 per cent. were registered in rural areas and this movement coupled with the village aid dispensaries was the mainstay for the improvement of the health of the school child in these areas. The activities of the Junior Red Cross described in the school health officers' report form an interesting reading. They are given in the annual report of the Red Cross and their repetition will unnecessarily lengthen this report. Too much stress cannot be laid on their usefulness in the field of school hygiene.
- Investigations—The school health officer, Benares, submitted a graphic chart of the improvement of the conditions in his area. With the exemption of the cardiac, nervous and glaucomatous complications of epidemic dropsy there was a marked fall in all other conditions. The school health officer, Allahabad, drew up a concise scheme of medical inspection for primary municipal schools. The school health officer, Agra, carried out an investigation of border-line mental cases in 19 vernacular schools and found that 1.6 per cent. were "mentally-retarded" on account of acquired defects (backward children) and 3 per cent. were " feeble-minded." The school health officer, Cawnpore, attempted to adopt the tests for mental defectives for their application in vernacular schools. But none of the five whole-time school health officers who in order to ascertain the extent of mental deficiency for special treatment are required to examine the higher grades of mental defectives in the compulsory education areas, when referred to, gave a report on the subject.
- 11. Sanitary conditions of municipal schools—Almost all the school health officers made a sad commentary on the sanitary condition of primary municipal schools and on the facilities for physical exercise which were few and far between. Nor did they consider that the accommodation and seating arrangements were satisfactory. The health of the school child depends mainly on the provision of ample play grounds and the School Health Officer, Saharanpur, has rightly remarked that as a result of inattention to physical exercises the defects persist. This officer also inspected some of the girls' schools and did not find them up to the mark.
- 12. Conclusion—It is gratifying to note that the picture reproduced at the beginning of the report shows an improvement in the average

of the state of the school child's health which is the measure of evaluating the success attained by the school health service in five years' time, the improvement being greater wherever treatment facilities were better. It is therefore hoped that the establishment of clinics in other towns in future will go a long way towards the attainment of the ideals which the school health officers have before them.

CHAPTER XI

HEALTH PROPAGANDA

Dr. A. Hamid, D. P. H., Assistant Director of Public Health, held charge of the Hygiene Publicity Bureau, and was assisted by Dr. S. K. Arora, D. P. H., and Dr. R. N. Tandon, L. P. H., who worked as Assistant Hygiene Publicity Officers (Senior) and (Junior) respectively. Dr. Diwan Chand, D. P. H.. was also attached to the Bureau for a period of about 3 months. Dr. Hamid also continued as Honorary Secretary of the Provincial Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society in addition to his own duties and Dr. Tandon as Deputy Director and Honorary Secretary of Provincial Junior Red Cross Sub-Committee.

- 2. The number of schools with Junior Red Cross groups during 1935 was 2,366 against 2,886 in 1934, 93 per cent. being in rural areas while the number of Junior Red Cross groups was 3,057 in 1935 against 3,708 in 1934. The number of members was 83,391 against 94,818 in 1934, the number of girls being 2,792 against 3,892 in 1934. The reason for these decreases was that the membership was not renewed in many cases. The activities of these groups continued as usual and some of the main features for the year were as under:
 - (i) In Jhansi a bathing scheme was introduced in some of the vernacular schools to create a sense of cleanliness among the boys. Juniors were also trained in book binding and paper cutting.
 - (ii) The juniors in the Farrukhabad district published a "Silver Jubilee Magazine" containing their activities on the occasion of His Majesty the King's Silver Jubilee. Some groups organized fresh air camps in villages.
 - (iii) In Partabgarh a boy aged 11 years was bitten by a snake and he was able to save his life by first aid methods.
 - (iv) The Government Intermediate College, Fyzabad, formed a Junior Red Cross Board of selected members who looked after the sanitation of the school and boarding houses. Some schools were provided with clean water reservoirs with covers and taps.
 - (v) In Budaun the students of Islamnagar Middle School as well as those of primary school got a water trough built for cattle near the school by road side.
 - (vi) Some groups in Shahjahanpur were interested in certain industries such as soap making and minor wood work and they put in a good deal of useful work.
 - (vii) The juniors of Saharanpur gave first aid to a school-boy who had received sulphuric acid burns.
 - (viii) Fifteen portfolios were received from overseas, viz., Japan, Denmark, New York, Canada, United States of America, France, Estonia, Montana, Poland and Dublin and seven were sent out by the Junior Red Cross groups of the United Provinces. One portfolio was also exchanged with the Madras Presidency. The Sultanpur District headed in the exchange of portfolios with foreign countries. A collection of gifts was received from the Juniors of Japan in exchange of albums sent to the 15th International Red Cross Conference held at

Tokyo through the Indian Headquarters and they were distributed among the groups of the Province.

A Red Cross exhibition was also set up at Partabgarh on the occasion of His Excellency's visit to the Health Unit area.

Health Publicity. cinema projector, petrol engine, loud speakers with pick up, records on rural development and epidemics in addition to some of common interest and four additional model boxes on maternity and child welfare and village sanitation.

The van covered about 6.100 miles and gave 107 demonstrations which were attended by about 55,000 persons. Intensive demonstration work was done in the districts of Agra, Allahabad, Benares, Fyzabad, Gorakhpur Jhansi, Lucknow, Meerut and Moradabad where a Modified Health Unit Scheme was introduced by the department towards the end of the year.

The staff of Hygiene Publicity Bureau gave demonstrations at Allahabad Magh Mela which was attended by more than 25 000 people. A public health exhibition was also put up there. Cinema shows were given at the Capitol Cinema, Naini Tal, for girl guides and at the Government House where the film "A pilgrimage to Badrinath and Kedarnath" was shown. Three cinema demonstrations were arranged for the benefit of the public at Naini Tal and such demonstrations were also given at Dayal Bagh, Agra, on the occasion of the All-India Sewa Samiti Scout Mela.

During a severe epidemic of smallpox, the film entitled "Tragedy of smallpox", was lent to the Honorary Secretary, Baby Welfare Committee, Jaipur. The film on malaria was sent to the Civil Surgeon, Gauhati, at the request of the Secretary to Government, Assam.

Magic lantern demonstrations were given by the Assistant Hygiene Publicity Officers and the Reserve Officers throughout the Province particularly in epidemic areas. Lectures were broadcasted on loud speakers and the demonstrations made as educative, interesting and effective as possible.

The other departmental staff gave 1,017 magic lantern demonstrations and 50,000 oral lectures, which were attended by over 2½ lakhs and 21 lakhs of persons, respectively. One thousand, six hundred and forty-five lectures were delivered without magic lanterns by medical officers of fixed dispensaries and the approximate gathering at these lectures was 88,653. Two thousand, one hundred and ninety-six lectures and 21 magic lantern demonstrations on epidemic diseases were given by the public health and medical staff of the Garhwal district to pilgrims going to Badrinath and Kedarnath.

Two sets of slides were prepared on "A pilgrimage to Badrinath" and hygiene propaganda was done with these slides at Hardwar, Rikhikesh and the pilgrim route upto Srinagar by Assistant Hygiene Publicity Officer (Junior). Leaflets on cholera, flies, smallpox, etc were widely distributed. Treatments for minor ailments were given and 77 anti-cholera inoculations were performed by him on the pilgrim route. A reserve medical officer was also deputed for duty on the pilgrim route, Garhwal, during the pilgrim season with necessary material for propaganda work.

Bullock carts equipped with locally made models, posters and literature on public health subjects toured in the interior of the districts of Unao,

Jaunpur and Jhansi for about a period of two months under the supervision of the district medical officers of health at Unao and Jaunpur and the district publicity officer in Jhansi.

A Silver Jubilee Sanitary Demonstration contest was held at Shahjahanpur early in May to judge the condition of sanitation of the various wards of the municipality.

The artist of the bureau prepared 20 sets of slides on "Rural Development", 20 slides on "Meningitis" and 58 slides on "Pilgrim route to Badrinath and Kedarnath". He also repaired models, loud speakers, magic lanterns and their accessories.

Booklets on "Our Food in villages" and "Programme of Health work in Rural Areas" in English, Urdu and Hindi were prepared and distributed for educating the masses in rural areas. These booklets were supplied to district medical officers of health, medical officers in charge health units, special managers of courts of wards, commissioners and the district officers for the use of the organizers and supervisors under the Rural Development Scheme.

New leaflets on anti-rabic treatment and meningitis were also printed and widely distributed. Improved designs of pictorial posters on plague, smallpox, malaria, childwelfare and cholera were made in which only important points were illustrated and the chances of confusion of ideas caused by profuse illustrations were thus eliminated. Special posters on prevention of cholera were prepared and distributed to various railway authorities for posting at railway stations for the guidance of pilgrims attending the Allahabad Adh-Kumbh Fair. More than 100,000 leaflets, 5,500 booklets and 3,500 sets of posters were distributed throughout the province. The officers of the Bureau conducted vigorous propaganda against the spread of epidemic of dropsy in the affected places, viz., Moghal Sarai, Benares and Mu (Azamgarh district) and in Agra, Cawnpore and Aligarh in connexion with the epidemic of cerebro-spinal meningitis. They also delivered lectures wardwise in the Lucknow municipality for the prevention of typhoid fever.

The Bureau supervised the health unit scheme at Partabgarh, composting work at Shahjahanpur, village aid scheme and medical inspection of schools all over the province. Details of work under these heads will be found in other chapters of this report.

4. On the occasion of the visit of His Excellency the President of the Provincial Red Cross Society to the Partabgarh health The cinema section. unit, an additional film depicting the activities of the health unit was taken.

Training of staff 5. The following work was done in this connec-

- (i) A class for training 30 school teachers was hold each in Bulandshahr, Gorakhpur and Partabgarh districts lasting for a period of three months from January 29, 1935. The training was composed of lectures in agriculture, co-operative work, animal husbandry and general subjects. The public health part of the syllabus for this class was drawn up by Assistant Director of Public Health (Hygiene Publicity Bureau) and the training was imparted on that basis by the district medical officers of health at Partabgarh and Bulandshahr and by the assistant medical officer of health at Gorakhpur. The intention of this training was to qualify teachers to take up rural reconstruction work in villages.
- (ii) Training of organizers and inspectors.—In connexion with the scheme of rural development training of organizers and inspectors in health subjects was conducted by the district medical officers of health of Partabgarh, Bulandshahr, Fyzabad and Benares. Necessary syllabus was prepared by the Bureau for this as well. The Assistant Director of Public Health (Hygiene Publicity Bureau) himself supervised and delivered lectures to these training classes whenever he happened to be on tour in these districts.

Theoretical and practical lectures in regard to various methods of Hygiene Publicity were delivered by Assistant Director of Public Health to officers on post-graduate and post-licentiate training at the Provincial Hygiene Institute. Assistant Hygiene Publicity Officer (Senior) delivered lectures on this subject to the L. P. H. class and gave training in first aid to the sanitary inspectors' class and examined the students of the Training College, Lucknow, in the same subject.

6. The voluntary contributions made by the local bodies amounted to Rs. 3,349 during the year under report against Rs.4,400 in the previous year.

CHAPTER XII

PUBLIC HEALTH ADMINISTRATION

The strength of the superior staff of the department in 1935 remained the same as in 1934, viz.—

one Director of Public Health;
four Assistant Directors of Public Health;
one Public Analyst to Government (Part-time);
one Deputy Public Analyst;
one Assistant Public Analyst; and
seventy-two officers of the United Provinces Public Health
ervice.

The post of Assistant Director of Public Health in charge of Provincial Hygiene Institute continued to remain in abeyance.

The strength of the subordinate public health staff consisted of—fifty officers in grade I, and forty-three officers in grade II.

Appendix D to this report gives further details of the public health staff employed in urban and rural areas of the province.

2. A sum of Rs. 23,75,576 was passed by Government in the year 1935-36 for the entire public health department Budget grants. and for grants to local bodies through the board of public health, against Rs.19,84,785 in 1934-35. Of the sum of Rs.23,75,576, Rs.14,84,832 only was subject to the control of the director of public health. Out of this latter sum, a sum'of Rs.45,268 representing new expenditure was, subsequent to the passing of the budget, withheld by Government owing to financial stringency and a further lump cut of Rs. 16,000 was applied to the public health budget, in common with all other budgets. The net sum available at the commencement of the financial year 1935-36 for items of public health activities controlled by the director of public health was consequently Rs.14 23,564. Additional funds to the extent of Rs.48,637 had to be obtained during the year by reappropriation from other portions of the budget not under the control of the director of public health or out of amounts previously resumed by Government. Rupees 25,000 out of the additional sum so obtained was for further expenditure on anti-plague vaccine and Rs. 14,000 for extension of the operations of the Government Quinine Tablet Manufacturing Factory-a paying concern.

The allotment for expenditure on school clinics is at present in the education budget. During the year 1935 the director of public health was appointed controlling officer in respect of this allotment although the appropriation continues to form part of the main education budget.

CHAPTER XIII

VACCINATION

Expenditure on the province amounted to Rs.3,87,860 against Rs.3,83,598 in the preceding year. This was exclusive of the charge on account of assistant directors of public health, their establishment, contingencies, as well as the expenditure on the maintenance of the Government Vaccine Depot. Out of the total expenditure of Rs.3,87,860 a sum of Rs.3,14,111 was incurred in rural areas and Rs.73,749 in urban areas.

1,955,003 by the special (district and municipal) staff, 379 by dispensary staff, 372 by private medical practitioners and 2,909 at railway dispensaries as against 1,835,806 in the preceding year, showing an increase of 122,857. The number of vaccination operations performed

in 1935-36 also showed an increase of 114,729 as compared with the preceding year, the actual figures for the two years being 1,972,458 (1,605,718 primary and 366,740 re-vaccinations) and 1,857,729 (1,575,704 primary and 282,025 re-vaccinations). Thirteen thousand seven hundred and ninety-five secondary operations were performed during the year under report as compared with 21,923 in the preceding year. The number and percentage of successful vaccinations in which the results were known during the year amounted to 1,520,476 and 95.88 in the case of primary vaccinations and 132,465 and 40.78 in the case of re-vaccinations as against 1,476,441 and 94.93 and 101,168 and 40.33 respectively, in the preceding year. Each vaccinator vaccinated on an average 1,985 persons in the year under report as compared with 1,935 in the preceding year. These figures generally show an increase under all heads.

- 9. During the year under report 1,612,930 persons were vaccinated in rural districts. The number of operations per-Vaccination in rural formed was 1,623,603 (primary 1,399,352 and redistricts. vaccinations 224,251). The number and per-(Statement I-A.) centage of successful vaccinations in which the results were known during the year under report amounted to 1,332,170 and 96.28 in the case of primary varcinations and 94,470 and 47.80 in the case of re-vaccinations. The number of persons successfully vaccinated per mille of the population during the year under report was 33.20. The districts showing the highest degree of protection per mille of the population were Garhwal (63.66, Almora (55.23), Ballia (44.51) and Benares (40.82). Amongst those showing the least protection were Sitapur (26.06), Kheri (26.91), Mainpuri (27.05) and Farrukhabad (27.10).

 Under report was 245,086 (138,446 primary and 106,640 re-vaccinations) against 218,823 (137,979 primary and 80,814 re-vaccinations) in the preceding year. The total number of persons vaccinated in municipal towns was 242,763 against 214,982 in the preceding year. The ratio of persons successfully vaccinated per 1,000 of the population was 44 55 against 41.40 in the preceding year.

Among the well protected municipalities Mussocie as during the last three years stood first with a ratio of 221.38 per mille and was followed by Sultanpur (86.02), Budaun (81.47) and Gonda (71.86). Among those showing the least protection were Mainpuri, Kanauj, Bijnor and Chandausi with ratios of 23.24, 26.03, 27.34 and 28.05, respectively.

The number of successful operations performed on children under one year of age during the year under report was 94,502 against 86,429 in the preceding year showing an increase of 8,073.

Vaccination in Cantonments.

Vaccination operations numbered 20,048 (5,667 primary and 14,381 re-vaccinations). Of these, successful primary vaccinations totalled 5,370 and successful re-vaccinations 5,136. The corresponding figures for the preceding year were 18,294 and 18,345, 5,102 and 4,993. The ratio of persons successfully vaccinated per mille of the population was 52.89 as against 50.32 in the preceding year. Since the last five years Chakrata has been the best protected cantonment. Fyzabad with a ratio of 12.50 was the least protected.

Eleven thousand one hundred and twenty-ene operations were performed by military medical officers.

Vaccination in notified areas.

Vaccination in notified areas was 23,792 and 24,078 (17,223 primary and 6,855 re-vaccinations) as against 24,668 and 25,073 (18,245 primary and 6,828 re-vaccinations), respectively, in the preceding year. The number of successful primary vaccinations and re-vaccinations were, respectively 16,033 and 3,244 as compared with 15,989 and 3,632 in the preceding year. The ratio of persons successfully vaccinated per mille of the population was 43.15 as against 45.88 in the preceding year.

Amongst well-protected notified areas Charbagh-Alambagh stood first with a ratio of 354.93, whereas Nimsar with a ratio of 5.44 was the worst protected.

- Dispensary vaccination operations performed by medical subordinates at dispensaries during the year under report was 379 (52 primary and 327 re-vaccinations) as against 287 (29 primary and 258 re-vaccinations) in the preceding year.

(Vaccination Statement I). was staff at railway of successful cases in which the results were known was 81.06 in the case of primary vaccinations and 66.67 in the case of re-vaccinations as compared with 92.50 and 50.07, respectively, in the preceding year.

Vaccination in provaccination operations in proportion to births was portion to births and according to age. 25.87 as regards those between one to six years of age and 87.10 in the case of all ages. The corresponding figures for the preceding year were 51.31, 25.87 and 83.00.

An examination of the figures of ranges shows that 63.02 children under one year of age were successfully vaccinated per 100 births during the year under report in the first range and 49.10 in the second range against 55.06 and 47.66, respectively, in the preceding year. As in the previous year the first range showed better protection than the second range.

- 18. (a) Charge of the depot. The charge of the depot was held by Government Vaccine Depot, Patwa Dangar (district Naini Tal).

- The contract for the supply of buffalo calves was (b) Supply of calves. given to a butcher of Bareilly and a certain number was also obtained on hire locally. The total number of calves obtained on hire or through the agency of the contractor was 632 (45 cow and 587 buffalo calves) against 477 (36 cow and 441 buffalo calves) in the preceding year. Out of 632 calves 512 were successfully vaccinated, 117 were either unsuccessfully vaccinated or rejected as unsuitable for vaccination and 3 died under operation or quarantine. As to their disposal, 602 were returned to the contractor and owners, 2 were sold locally and 28 died during convalescence. The arrangement made last year for physical examination of calves by the veterinary assistant surgeon at Haldwani was continued this year as well. The total number of calves which died in the depot was 28 against 16 in the preceding year. The calves supplied during the first few weeks were largely found immune to vaccination and as many as 59 out of 91 failed. It was soon found that this failure was noticeable in Bareilly calves alone. The contractor was accordingly directed to supply calves from places other than Bareilly to prevent a breakdown in the supply of vaccine.

The total quantity of vaccine pulp obtained during the year under report was 29,836.3 grammes from 512 successfully (c) Quantity vaccinated animals, giving an average yield of lymph obtained and manufactured. 58.30 grammes per animal against 25,026 grammes from 471 calves with an average yield of 53.13 grammes in the preceding year, showing an increase in the yield per calf by 5.17 grammes. average yield of pulp per cow and buffalo calves separately was 23.60 and 61.61 grammes, respectively, as compared to 22.97 and 55.63 grammes respectively, in the preceding year. The average yield of lymph is steadily showing an increase every year on account of the scientific methods adopted in the regeneration of seed lymph during the last 3 years and it can be said that the vaccine depot is now at par with other such depots in India in this respect.

Three thousand six hundred and twenty grammes of seed lymph (1 in 5) were prepared during the year as compared to 2,590 grammes in the

preceding year.

One lakh sixty thousand one hundred and forty-eight grammes of issue lymph, mostly 1 in 5 and some 1 in 64 and 1 in 7 were manufactured against 129,360 grammes in the preceding year. The total amount of vaccine manufactured represents 4,003,700 doses calculated on the basis of 25 vaccinations with 3 or 4 insertions per gramme as compared to 3,234,000 doses in the preceding year, showing an increase of 30,788 grammes or 769,700 doses. At the beginning of the year there was a stock of 58,176 grammes of vaccine lymph on account of unconsumed balance of the year 1934-35 against 68,213 grammes of 1933-34.

The total quantity of lymph issued for vaccination was 134,114 grammes (3,352,850 doses) against 139,239.5 grammes (3,480,987 doses) in the preceding year. The decrease in the issue of lymph was due to control exercised on undue wastage in districts and municipalities. 83,837.5 grammes of glycerinated issue lymph (1 in 5) and 925 grammes of seed lymph (1 in 5) have been set aside in the cold storage for use in 1936-37 as against 58,176 grammes of glycerinated issue lymph (1 in 5) and 607 grammes of seed lymph (1 in 5) in 1934-35 and 68,213 and 1,774, respectively, in 1933-34.

Bacteriological tests were carried out on every sample of vaccine before its issue. The results obtained showed complete absence of streptococci and gas-producing anearobes in all the samples tested. The number

of viable organisms per cc. of vaccine lymph was less than the prescribed standard of 5,000 in all the samples issued for vaccination. Almost all the samples were chloroformed and issued only when subsequent tests

showed adequate reduction of organisms.

The potency test on rabbits was performed with every batch of vaccine lymph. Contents from several samples were pooled and then tested on rabbits in various dilutions ranging from 1 in 500 to 1 in 8,000. The tests indicated that the vaccine was of uniformly good quality. The potency of vaccine was so high that it was possible to further dilute the vaccine to the strength of 1 in 6½ or even 1 in 7 instead of usual 1 in 5 and such diluted vaccine was used as a trial during cooler months with good results. Appended is a table showing the results of vaccinations performed during the year under report.

As the laboratory is not yet fully equipped and the staff provided is also not sufficient, the testing of individual samples separately could not be done. However, the contents of various samples were pooled together and tests were performed on mixtures.

The causes of large number of failures in calves noticed this year were

(f) Scientific investigations and improvelymph which was first to be suspected wasments.

thoroughly investigated by all known methodsand it was found to be of excellent quality.

- (ii) Calves from various areas were especially obtained and tested for their relative susceptibility to vaccinia and the areas giving the best results were selected for the supply of calves.
- (iii) Quality of seed lymph was further improved by careful animals passages. This resulted in a considerable increase in the average yield of pulp by more than 5 grammes per animal.
- (iv) The method of chloroforming vaccine lymph was further developed and a chemical test based on Guaresche-Lustgarten reaction was adopted to indicate the complete absence of chloroform from vaccine lymph.
- (v) Wastage of lymph in various districts, municipalities and notified areas was further investigated and measures were taken to minimise it.
- (vi) Deterioration of vaccine in transit during summer months was minimised to some extent by modifying the method of packing vaccine. Vaccine is packed in cotton wool soaked in ice cold water, evaporation of which keeps the vaccine cool during transit.
- (vii) Field tests on children in the municipalities of Bareilly, Benares, Lucknow, Allahabad, and also Naini Tal and Haldwani were started and the vaccine giving 100 per cent. case success rate and almost the same percentage of insertion success rate in primary cases on 6 children vaccinated at every place was issued subsequently for use. All the samples gave 100 per cent. case success rate in a dilution of 1 in 7½, but to provide for a factor of safety, vaccine was issued for general use only in a dilution of 1 in 5 except for a period of about 10 weeks during cooler months when it was issued in a dilution of 1 in 6¼ with encouraging results.
- (viii) Owing to increased potency of issue lymph manufactured, it was proposed to commence the vaccination season from 1st October instead of from 1st November.

This was done as an experimental measure in 15 municipalities and 20 districts including their notified areas and the results of vaccinations performed were very encouraging. The scheme will be given a further trial in October, 1936.

- (ix) Bacteriological tests on water samples of Naini Tal municipality were undertaken.
- (x) Water-supply of the depot was frequently tested and on the installation of the E. C. D. chlorination plant several tests were performed with a view to find out the minimum dosage of ammonium sulphate and hypochlorite and also the economical and convenient method of working the plant.

The contract price from all local bodies amounting to Rs.39,005 was realized in advance early in the year under report. Lymph to the value of Rs.1,469 (including packing and postage) was supplied to the Military Department during the year under report, as compared to that of Rs.1,652 in the previous year. Cost of vaccine

supplied to Indian States, private persons, railways, cantonments and other indenters amounted to Rs.10,933 as compared to Rs.6,453 in the preceding year i.e., an increase of Rs.4,480 primarily due to a special supply of vaccine to the value of Rs.4,733 to the Health Officer of Calcutta Corporation.

One hundred and ninety capillary tubes and 158 grammes of vaccine to the value of Rs.114 were issued free for use in jails and charitable institutions against 372 grammes to the value of Rs.213 in the preceding year.

The total cost of vaccine lymph and other articles sold by the depot during the year under report was Rs.52,911 (Rs.51,406 by sale of vaccine lymph and Rs.1,505 on account of sale of calves, rabbits and other miscellaneous articles) against Rs.48,657 (Rs.47,110 by sale of vaccine lymph and Rs.1,547 on account of sale of calves, rabbits and other miscellaneous articles) in the preceding year showing an increase of Rs.4,254.

The total expenditure including pensionary charges and depreciation on machinery incurred during the year under report amounted to Rs.40,325 against an income of Rs.52,911 by sale of vaccine lymph and other miscellaneous articles. This shows that the depot worked at a profit of Rs.12,586. The expenditure last year was Rs.41,980. The budget allotments for the year under report and the last year were, respectively, Rs.41,129 and Rs.40,010.

Considerable improvements made during the last two years in the cold storage plants and the two cold rooms (i) Cold storage together with the overhauling of both the complant. pressors have resulted in considerable improvement in the working efficiency of the plants, greater savings in the working expenses and prolongation of the life of the plants. Both the old and the new plants gave satisfactory services. The old plant which remained out of order for over five years and which was reconditioned last year, was run throughout the winter season without any trouble. Its efficiency was also improved by providing better seat for the delivery valve. The plants were inspected by the Mechanical and Water Works Engineer to the Government, United Provinces, and the improvements suggested by him were fully carried out. The services of Mr. Haddow, Electrical and Mechanical Engineer, obtained for all technical assistance on an annual honorarium of Rs. 100 were beneficial.

The supply of electric current from the Naini Tal Municipal Board's power house was satisfactory. The consumption of the current was well within the contracted units of 16,000 for Rs.3,000 per year. Recent improvements in the cold storage plant have resulted in considerable economy in the consumption of electric energy.

Lightening conductors fixed to the four important buildings were tested and found satisfactory. On two occasions atmospheric lightening struck the electrical installations in various buildings resulting in certain amount of damage to the electrical incubator, meter and a few bulbs.

In addition to the thorough annual repairs to all the depot (k) Buildings and buildings and roads and paths, a good deal of new roads.

construction was undertaken, mostly out of a grant of Rs.4,963 from the Board of Public Health, United Provinces, viz:

- (i) Extension of a calf shed for calves under operation and thereby increasing the accommodation for calves in that shed from 12 to 32. Necessary overhead ventilators have also been provided.
- (ii) A new preparation room for calves where shaving and preliminary washing of calves is done a day before their actual vaccination has also been constructed by the side of the calf shed.
- (iii) A new quarter has been constructed for the Bacteriological Laboratory Assistant.
- (iv) Suitable drains have been constructed for the sullage in the vaccinators' quarters.
- (v) The spring in the Ballia ravine near the Talli Tal Post Office supplying water to the depot has been properly fenced in. Half of the cost was met by the Naini Tal municipality.
- (vi) A small room was provided near the Inspection House kitchen for installing the E. C. D. chlorination plant.
- (vii) A small store-room was constructed in the head clerk's quarter, another in the electrician's quarter.
- (viii) A small covered passage has been constructed between the Superintendent's bungalow and the kitchen.
- (ix) A spacious verandah in front of the grain godown has been built.
- (x) New pucca paths connecting the two laboratories and the calf sheds for calves under operation have been provided.
- (xi) Some new drains measuring about 75 feet in length have been constructed at various places.
- (xii) An extra room has been provided in the second clerk's quarters.

To provide safe water for drinking purposes several proposals were considered by the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department and two visits were paid by the Mechanical and Water Works Engineer and subsequently an E. C. D. chlorinating plant was installed at a cost of Rs.1,520 sanctioned by the Board of Public Health, United Provinces. The sterilization of water by chloromine has improved the quality of water and a satisfactory standard of water purity is being maintained without in any way affecting the taste or odour of water.

As a result of installation of this plant lot of changes have been made in the distribution system whereby separate pipe lines have been laid for treated and untreated water to various places according to requirements. Wastage of water has also been controlled by providing suitable pipe line with regulating valves and judicious distribution of water at various sites. The extra pipe line laid is about 2,500 feet long and a new iron reservoir for untreated water for laboratories, rabbit farm and refrigerating plant has been provided. Water from the condenser pipes of the refrigerating plants which used to be worked has been utilized for the supply to various calf sheds.

Control burning of the depot forests was done in March 1936, and (m) Control burning. the entire area within the depot boundary was burnt with success to minimise the risk of fire.

The depot was inspected by His Excellency the Governor on 16th

(n) Inspections.

June, 1935, besides a number of informal visits paid by him to this place—Sir Laurie Hammond and Justice Din Mohammad of the Delimitation Committee also paid a visit to the depot.

CHAPTER XIV

OTHER PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES

Hygiene Institute

- Staff.—Dr. J. T. Cornelius, M.A., M.D., PH.D., D.P.H., held charge of the Provincial Hygiene Institute throughout the year excepting for the period from April 27, 1935 to July 6, 1935, when he was on leave and was officiated by Dr. H. G. D. Mathur, Dr. P.H., etc., II Lecturer in addition to his own duties.
- Dr. H. G. D. Mathur, DR. P.H., and Dr. K. N. Segal, D.P.H., worked as II and III Lecturers throughout the year excepting in the case of the latter for the period from July 22, 1935 to November 2, 1935, when he was on leave. Dr. Segal also held charge of the Anti-rabic Treatment Centre, Lucknow, until it was transferred to the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Municipal Board, Lucknow, on June 30, 1935. Dr. Khalil-ul-Rahman, D.P.H., was placed on reserve duty at the Institute on April 22, 1935, and he continued to be attached to the Institute till the end of the year.
 - 2. The following routine and special laboratory work was undertaken:

 Laboratory work.
 - (i) Seven hundred and fifty-three samples of water were examined bacteriologically and 161 samples chemically. Apart from this, bacteriological and chemical examinations of water samples from municipal water supplies, tube-wells and ice-factories were carried out for routine and control purposes. Samples from Fatehpur Sikri and Almora water supplies were also analysed to give definite advice to the local bodies concerned for improvement of their water supplies. Seasonal analysis (chemical and bacteriological) of samples of water from municipalities with water works, was carried out thrice a year to serve as a control on the weekly analysis reports of local medical officers of health. The routine weekly reports of water analyses received from various municipal medical officers of health were examined by the Institute staff and necessary action taken in cooperation with the medical officers of health and the public health engineering department. A statement was compiled to classify the various water works according to their efficiency and it was submitted to the Board of Public Health. Detailed particulars in this respect will be found in paragraph 6 of Chapter VI.

A large number of water samples from important railway stations on pilgrim routes were in addition examined at the Institute before the commencement of Adh Kumbh Mela of Allahabad and other fairs and advice was given to railway authorities for securing a pure and wholesome supply of water at railway stations. The reports of analyses carried out by the railway authorities were also scrutinized and necessary action recommended.

(ii) Eighty-nine samples of stools from suspected cases of cholera from different parts of the United Provinces including those from certain jails were examined at the commencement of epidemic to enforce early anti-epidemic measures.

- (iii) An enquiry was conducted in Benares in connexion with the outbreak of epidemic dropsy in that city in the early part of the year. After various experiments it was found that rice was of very inferior quality and that this fact probably had a bearing on the outbreak of the disease. Byelaws for the control of storage and sale of the same were framed and they were subsequently adopted by the Benares Municipal Board, with the approval of the Government.
- (iv) A large number of samples of water was taken at different points from the Gomti river and examined bacteriologically to determine the degree of pollution due to the discharge of sewage at different points and at the bathing ghats. The north bank showed a greater degree of pollution.
- (v) A number of samples of cerebro spinal fluid from patients suspected to be suffering from the disease were examined.
- (vi) Samples of stools from the Central Jail, Lucknow, were examined bacteriologically to see if there were any enteric carriers among the cooks employed in the jail.
- (vii) Advice was given to the stores purchase officer, United Provinces, in regard to the relative germicidal efficiency of 10 brands of disinfectants as determined by Rideal Walker test for Government notification.
- (viii) Samples of ghee, milk, etc. were examined at the request of the officers of the Public Health Department.
- (ix) A field laboratory to work in connexion with the Adh Kumbh Mela at Allahabad was organized and fitted up by the Institute.
- (x) Other miscellaneous work such as examination of rats, blood and pus films from suspected cases of plague, ice-cream and paper mill effluents was also undertaken and reports submitted to various authorities for needful.
- Manufacture of Cholera vaccine manufactured during the year was 403,279 of which 235,486 doses were issued in ampoules of different capacities and the balance held in stock for use in 1936. The demand for the vaccine has been continually increasing and if it continues, the strengthening of the staff employed on this work shall have to be seriously considered.
- 4. A scheme for the prophylactic treatment of school children in the Almora district against endemic goitre was also recommended to the education department. It has since been approved and is being given effect to.

5. Training of public health personnel:

(a) The details of examination and teaching work done at the Institute are appended below:

⁽b) Post-graduate courses composed of training in malariology, hygiene publicity, maternity and child welfare along with other courses in public health chemistry, bacteriology, hygiene, sanitary law, epidemiology, medical inspection of school children and vital statistics were given to medical officers of health each of the first and second classes from October to December and July to September, respectively. A course in antirabic work was also given to first class medical officers of health.

(c) The optional refresher course for the candidates for the chief sanitary inspectorship was held with six candidates commencing from February, 1935.

(d) The Sanitary Inspectors' classes remained suspended temporarily this year but candidates for part II of Sanitary Inspectors' examination admitted in the previous year were trained and examined.

6. The museum has continued to function as usual as a medium of instruction to students and to visitors. It needs addition of certain more models illustrative of public health topics to make the existing collections up to date and it is hoped that as soon as funds are available, the museum will be equipped more adequately.

47 Bacteriological, parasitological and epidemiological charts were prepared, as also plans and sketches for the malaria branch and in connexion with the scheme for rural reconstruction. These charts have been found very useful for teaching and propaganda work and are being lent to public health officers for local public health exhibitions.

Anti-rabic treatment

- 7. Three treatment centres at Meerut, Bareilly and Fyzabad were opened from April 1, 1935. The number of permanent treatment centres (which worked throughout the year) is now 12, and there is a seasonal centre at Mussoorie.
- 8. Numbers attending for treatment—During the twelve months ending December 31, 1935, 7,871 persons attended the centres under this department for treatment against 8,134 in 1934, 62 patients in addition belonging to the United Provinces, were admitted to treatment direct at Kasauli. Of the 7,871 persons who attended, 7,298 were actually admitted to treatment against 7,195 in 1934 and 573 were "advised", i.e. treatment was not necessary for them.

- 12. The office of Public Analyst to Government, United Provinces, was held by Professor P. S. MacMahon, M. Sc. (MANC.), B.SC. (OXON)., F. I. C., from January 1 to April 30, 1935, and again from August 1 to December 31, 1935. During his absence on extraordinary leave from May 1 to July 31, 1935 Dr. B. M. Gupta, M.SC., PH. D. (LONDL.), Deputy Public Analyst to Government, United Provinces, acted as Public Analyst to Government in addition to his own duties except for the period from June 10, to July 9, 1935, when he was on leave, and was officiated by Mr. S. C. Roy, M.SC., Assistant Public Analyst to Government, United Provinces, who carried out the duties of the Deputy Public Analyst and Public Analyst to Government in addition to his own duties.
- 13. During the year under report the provisions of the United Provinces Prevention of Adulteration Act were further extended to the following areas in respect of the articles mentioned against each:

(1) Town areas of Ambehta, Sultanpur Chilkhana, Jabrera Sirsawa, Rampur and Titron in the Saharanpur district in respect of ghee and milk.

(2) Garhwal district in respect of mustard oil.

(3) Soran, Gadaiya-Jari (combined bazar), Bharwari, Manauri, Handia, Janghai, Meja Khas, Daranagar, Manjhanpur and Sahison in the Allahabad district in respect of ghee only.

(4) Baheri notified area in the Bareilly district in respect of ghee,

milk, edible oils and flour of every kind.

(5) Muttra municipality in respect of sugar, honey, gur, rabri, khoa,

dahi, sweatmeats, flour and cooked food of all kinds.

- (6) Town areas of Kanker Khera, Buxar Khera and Abdullapur in the Meerut district in respect of edible oils, flour, milk and its preparations, e.g., ghee, butter, khoa, etc.
 - (7) Utraula notified area in the Gonda district in respect of ghee.
- (8) Certain bazars and the Chandauli tahsil in the Benares district in respect of ghee and milk.
 - (9) Bulandshahr municipality in respect of oil, sweets, tea and flour.
 (10) Gorakhpur municipality in respect of flour, curd, khoa and sugar.
- (11) Garhmukhtesar, Buxar and Kharkhanda in the Meerut district in respect of ghee and milk only.

(12) Hamirpur town area in respect of milk and ghee.

(13) Rasra notified area in the Ballia district in respect of vegetable oils.

(14) Whole of the rural areas of the Moradabad district in respect of

ghee, milk and all edible oils.

(15) Beharigarh, Kailaspur, and Behat in tahsil Saharanpur, Landhaura, Piran Kaliar and Bhagwanpur in tahsil Roorkee, Nanauta and Nagal in tahsil Deoband, Islamnagar and Khera Afghan in tahsil Nakur in respect of ghee and milk only

The provisions of the United Provinces Prevention of Adulteration Act were thus in force in 85 municipalities, 6 districts, 32 notified areas

and several rural and town areas in 24 districts.

Working of the Act. was 7,896 against 6,448 in 1934. The increase in number of samples was partly due to the fact that greater interest was taken in the prevention of adulteration by the officers of this department and partly due to the extension of the provisions of the Act to several new areas.

Of these 6,066 samples were certified as genuine, 1,723 adulterated as detailed above and 107 samples were received in a damaged condition or were found unfit for analysis for various reasons.

No samples were received from 11 places, and the attention of the authorities concerned was drawn to the fact and they were asked to send a certain number of samples every month.

15. Of the 1,409 persons prosecuted under the Act, 798 persons were fined, 37 persons were acquitted, one person was Prosecution and amount of fine levied. jailed, cases against 125 vendors were either filed and dismissed by the court or were withdrawn by the local bodies as the vendors could not be traced and cases against 448 persons were pending before the court at the close of the year. The total amount of fine realised for 804 successful cases was Rs. 33,338 against Rs. 28,884 realized for 737 cases in 1934. Although there has been a considerable improvement in the average amount of fine inflicted in the whole province, the actual amount of fine inflicted in several municipalities was still insufficient to produce the desired effect. In August, 1935 the attention of the district magistrates was drawn by Government in regard to the inadequacy of fines imposed, and they were asked to impress upon all magistrates both stipendiary and honorary, the necessity of passing adequate sentences against persons convicted and in cases the honorary magistrates continued to inflict inadequate sentences, it was ordered that such cases should be tried by stipendiary magistrates instead of by honorary magistrates. To watch the results of these orders the submission of a brief report by district magistrates with particular reference to the appropriateness of the sentences passed was ordered by Government. The reports received were consolidated in this office and submitted to Government. From the information thus received it was noticed that the level of fines imposed by honorary magistrates was low in

the districts of Dehra Dun, Moradabad, Farrukhabad, Sitapur, Hardoi, Kheri, Fyzabad and Sultanpur as the average fine in these places ranged from Rs.5 to Rs 19. As district magistrates have recently drawn the attention of the trying magistrates to the orders of Government, it is hoped that the next year will show better results.

The subjoined table shows the number of persons fined, total amount of fines realized and the average amounts of fine inflicted in the 14 larger cities of these provinces as also the corresponding figures for the whole province.

It would appear that the percentage of adulterated samples detected in the municipalities of Agra, Benares, Allahabad, Moradabad, Muttra and Naini Tal showed an increase, whereas a decrease was noticed in the districts of Lucknow, Cawnpore, Bareilly, Aligarh, Shahjahanpur, Fyzabad, Dehra Dun and Mussoorie as compared to the figures of the last year. The average percentage of adulterated samples detected in the whole province during this period was 22·1 as compared to 23·6 per cent. in the last year showing a decrease of 1·5 per cent.

19. The number of inspections of factories by district and municipal medical officers of health as ex officio additional inspectors of factories under the Indian Factories Act having declined in the previous year, particular attention of these officers was drawn to the matter and they were asked to make more frequent inspections of factories in future.

The Assistant Director of Public Health, I Range, inspected the sugar factories in Pilibhit and also the Diwan Sugar Mills at Sakoti in the Meerut district, while that of the II Range inspected the Bahraich Sheo Rice Mills and the Allahabad Milling Company, Limited.

No satisfactory progress has yet been made in evolving suitable methods for proper disposal of molasses and effluents from sugar factories. The experiments that are being carried on by the Sugar Technologist at the Harcourt Butler Technological Institute, Cawnpore, are still in progress and no final conclusion has so far been arrived at. To provide for immediate public health requirements, factory rules and byelaws have been amended to make factory owners responsible for the proper disposal of molasses and the maintenance of their factories and surroundings in a neat and sanitary condition.

The Provincial Board of Public Health were held during the financial year ending March 31, 1936—two at Lucknow and one at Naini Tal. Further details are contained in the report of the Board which forms Appendix A to this report.

CHAPTER XV

GENERAL REMARKS

1. Public Health Essay.—The subject of the essay in connexion with the Rai Shambhu Dayal Sahib gold medal for 1935 was "A practical scheme for rural reconstruction with special reference to matters pertaining to public health." In all 29 essays were received and the essay written by Srimati Shanti Devi Srivastava was adjudged to be the best and the medal was awarded to her.

PERSONAL PROCEEDINGS

2. The charge of the office of the Director of Public Health was held by me throughout the year. I inspected Health Unit work at Partabgarh several times during the year and, in January, 1935, had the privilege of taking His Excellency the Governor round certain villages during his inspections in the Partabgarh district. I inspected rural reconstruction work in the villages in Partabgarh, Meerut, Bara Banki, Fyzabad, Lucknow, Rae Bareli, Sitapur, Bareilly, Naini Tal, Allahabad, Saharanpur districts, and the working of the Special Health Scheme in the Gorakhpur district. I organised Health Unit work in the Meerut district.

I inspected sanitation of Basti Town Area, of Benares, Jhansi, Agraphehra Dun, Mussoorie and Meerut municipalities, and of a portion of the Lucknow and Bareilly municipalities. I inspected the Bhowali sanatorium and visited Cawnpore for inspection of the site for a kotwali. I also inspected sewage pumping arrangements at Allahabad and Lucknow, and the water-supply in Fyzabad, Agra, Jhansi, Dehra Dun and Mussoorie. I inspected vaccination work in the Benares municipality and in the rural areas of Gorakhpur, Lucknow, Rae Bareli and Partabgarh districts.

I inspected medical and sanitary arrangements at the Magh Mela, Allahabad, the Ram Naumi fair, Ajodhya, and the Garhmuktesar fair in the Meerut district. I discussed the medical and sanitary arrangements of the Adh-Kumbh fair, Allahabad, with the Commissioner, Allahabad division, the Collector, Allahabad, the Chief Medical Officer of the East-Indian Railway, and the District Medical Officer of Allahabad of the same railway, the Assistant Director of Public Health, II Range, and the Manager of Adh-Kumbh Mela. I inspected preliminary arrangements for the mela at Allahabad. I inspected passengers' inspection post at Ajodhya railway station in connexion with the Ram Naumi fair. At Saharanpur, I discussed with the Principal Medical and Health Officer, North-Western Railway, the question of disinfection of railway water-supply during fairs.

I made local investigations into the prevalence of epidemic dropsy in the Benares municipality, plague in the rural areas of Basti and Gorakhpur districts and Meerut and Cawnpore municipalities, cerebrospinal meningitis in the towns of Cawnpore and Agra and cholera in the towns of Lalitpur, Dehra Dun and Meerut and in the rural areas of Jhansi and Saharanpur districts. I also organized anti-fly measures in the Meerut municipality. I inspected infectious diseases hospitals at Benares, Allahabad, Cawnpore, Ajodhya, Jhansi, Agra, Bareilly and Dehra Dun, the sites for such hospitals at Gorakhpur and Naini Tal and the public health laboratory at Fyzabad.

I inspected anti-rabic treatment centres at Benares, Gorakhpur, Allahabad, Fyzabad, Jhansi, Agra, Mussoorie, Bareilly and Meerut, the

work of the school health officers and the school clinics at Benares and Allahahad, the offices of District Medical Officers of Health at Basti and Gorakhpur, and of the Municipal Medical Officer of Health at Fyzabad, the office of the Health Unit at Partabgarh and a travelling dispensary in Gorakhpur. I conducted examinations for the L. P. H.

and sanitary inspectors' courses.

I attended the budget meeting of the Association of the Pasteur Institute of India at Delhi, at which the question of reduction of the price of anti-rabic vaccine supplied to the United Provinces was discussed. I also attended two meetings of the King Edward Sanatorium Committee at Naini Tal and Allahabad, the meetings of the Branch and Executive Committees of the United Provinces branch of the Indian Red Cross Society, its Maternity sub-committee, the Silver Jubilee Committees. tuberculosis sub-committee, the Board of Public Health, United Provinces Medical Council and the United Provinces State Medical Faculty and their conjoint sub-committees. I also attended the Conference of Medical Research Workers at Calcutta and had a conference at Dehra Dun with the Assistant Director of Medical Services, Meerut district, on the question of improvement of water-supply in that city and cantonment. I also attended the Selection Board for recruitment to the United Provinces Public Health Service, and some meetings of the United Provinces Legislative Council. I discussed with the Secretary to Government, United Provinces, Public Health Department, and the representative of the Kina Bureau, the question of disposal of the reserve stock of quinine of the Government of India. I gave evidence before the United Provinces Un-employment Inquiry Committee. I arranged and attended shows of public health films at Naini Tal. I attended a meeting at the Government House, Lucknow. in connexion with arrangements for the Camp of Girl Guides and several conferences on rural development at the headquarters of Government and in districts, and several meetings convened for other purposes, viz.: about disposal of molasses, about sanitary conditions in the Terai and Bhabar Estates. etc. I also inspected the Government Vaccine Depot at Patwa Dangar.

3. Dr. L. K. Ray, D.P.H., Assistant Director of Public Health, was in charge of the I Range throughout the year. He inspected rural development and junior Red Cross work in the districts of Lucknow, Saharanpur, Moradabad, Meerut, Rae Bareli, Sitapur, Kheri. Bulandshahr, Muttra, Agra and Muzaffarnagar. He also organized sanitary improvements in

villages of the Health Units of Meerut and Moradabad.

He inspected vaccination in the rural areas of Meerut, Muzaffarnagar, Etah, Budaun, Bareilly, Pilibhit, Lucknow, Agra, Saharanpur and Moradabad districts and in the municipal towns of Sikandra Rao, Etah, Kasganj, Soron, Ujhani, Sahaswan, Budaun, Bareilly, Pilibhit, Bisalpur, Agra, Aligarh, Muzaffarnagar, Deoband, Hapur, Saharanpur, Roorkee, Nagina, Najibabad, Bijnor, Chandpur, Moradabad, Sambhal, Amroha,

Ghaziabad, Bulandshahr and Baraut.

He inspected sanitation of the municipal towns of Baraut, Sitapur, Khairabad, Lakhimpur-Kheri, Muttra, Brindaban and Sambhal, trenching and dumping grounds in the municipalities of Lucknow, Muzaffarnagar, Deoband, Bijnor, Chandpur, Meerut, Moradabad and Etah, drains in Mainpuri and a tank in Shikohabad which was proposed to be filled up. He also inspected arrangements for the disposal of blood and washings from the slaughter house and the improvements effected in sullage pipe line in Mussoorie.

He inspected anti-plague measures in the rural areas of Muzaffarnagar, Saharanpur, Moradabad, Bulandshahr, Etah and Meerut districts and in the municipal towns of Sikandra Rao, Sahaswan, Hardwar, Roorkee, Nagina, Najibabad, Bulandshahr, Kairana and Aligarh. He supervised and organized anti-plague measures in the city of Meerut and inspected anti-rat campaign work at Budaun, Bareilly, Pilibhit, Deoband, Saharanpur, Bijnor, Chandpur, Meerut and Moradabad and in the districts of Bulandshahr, Muttra and Moradabad.

He inspected and organized anti-cholera measures at Hardwar, Rikhi-kesh, Dehra Dun, on the pilgrim route to Badri Nath and in the interior of Dehra Dun district. He inspected anti-cholera measures at Roorkee, Bareilly and Brindaban, anti-cerebro-spinal meningitis measures in the rural areas of the Muzaffarnagar district and in the towns of Agra, Aligarh, Muzaffarnagar and Moradabad.

Dr. Ray also supervised and organized medical and sanitary arrangements of Nauchandi fair in Meerut, Dikhauti fair in Hardwar and Rikhikesh, Piran Kaliar fair in Saharanpur, Shah Kumbar Devi fair in Saharanpur and Garhmuktesar fair in Meerut. He made sanitary arrangements for the Batesar fair in Agra, Daranagar fair in Bijnor, Dhaighat fair in Shahjahanpur and inspected sanitary and medical arrangements on the pilgrim route to Badrinath in the Garhwal district and the Banjatra fair in the Muttra district.

He inspected some travelling dispensaries, sugar factories, some of the anti-rabic treatment centres, infectious diseases hospitals, maternity and child welfare centres, water works and several offices of district medical officers of health.

4. Rai Bahadur Dr. K. P. Mathur, D.P.H., Assistant Director of Public Health, held charge of the II Range throughout the year. He inspected rural development work in Sultanpur, Bahraich, Allahabad and Jaunpur districts, the health unit in Partabgarh and modified health units in Allahabad, Fyzabad, Benares and Gorakhpur. He inspected sanitation of the Azamgarh Nawabganj (Bara Banki), Gonda, Balrampur, Bahraich, Mau Ranipur, Lalitpur, Jhansi, Orai and Kalpi municipalities, Nanpara, Karwi and Jalaun notified areas and Basti and Hamirpar town areas. He also inspected sanitation of portions of the Allahabad City.

He inspected vaccination work in the municipal towns of Mau Ranipur, Lalitpur, Jaunpur, Ballia, Azamgarh, Kanauj, Fatehgarh, Etawah, Ghazipur and Ballia, and in the rural areas of Jhansi, Allahabad, Jaunpur, Azamgarh, Farrukhabad, Etawah, Ballia and Ghazipur districts.

He conducted local investigation into the prevalence of epidemics in Benares, Jaunpur, Ballia, Azamgarh, Partabgarh, Cawnpore, Fatehpur, Fatehgarh, Mirzapur, Gorakhpur, Basti, Jhansi, Mau Ranipur, Lalitpur, Bara Banki, Gonda, Bahraich, Hamirpur, and Banda and the prevalence of cerebro-spinal meningitis at some of these places.

Rai Bahadur Dr. Mathur also supervised medical and sanitary arrangements of the Magh Mela at Allahabad, Sawan Jhula fair Ajodhia, Dadri fair Ballia and Deva fair in Bara Banki.

He inspected the working of several anti-rabic treatment centres in his range, the offices of some district medical officers of health, posts for inspection of railway passengers, travelling dispensaries, factories and water works.

The part time clerk of the Maternity and Child Welfare Centre at Hardoi who had been prosecuted for the Cases of corruption in embezzlement referred to in the report for last public health service. year, was found guilty of having embezzled a sum of Rs.1,011-12 and was sentenced to three years' rigorous imprisonment and a fine of Rs. 1,200 by the Sessions Court. Two other embezzlements - one in the office of Medical Officer Incharge Anti-rabic Centre, Jhansi, and the other in the office of District Medical Officer of Health, Azamgarh, were also reported during the year 1935. In the former case the amount involved was Rs. 257-10-9. The clerk of the Centre admitted his guilt and in view of his youth was sentenced to imprisonment only till the rising of the court and to a fine of Rs.557-10-9 of which Rs.257-10-9 was made good to the centre. The clerk was also dismissed from service. In the case in Azamgarh the head clerk of the office of the district medical officer of health absconded with Government and district board money amounting to Rs. 565-3. He was ultimately arrested, committed to the Sessions, tried under sections 420, 467, 201 and 204 of the Indian Penal Code for fraudulently withdrawing a sum of Rs. 435 from the post office savings bank and under section 409 of the Indian Penal Code for embezzling money from the district medical officer of health's office. He was sentenced to three years' rigorous imprisonment and a fine of Rs.850 and, in default, to further imprisonment for six months.

DURING the year 1935-36 the total amount placed by Government at the disposal of the Board of Public Health for expenditure on public health works amounted to Rs.1,79,431 and was made up as under:

Too great an emphasis cannot be laid upon the fact that the amounts placed at the disposal of the Board of Public Health are inadequate to meet the large demands for public health works both in urban and rural areas. With the progress of time and advance in education these demands will continue to increase. Even the smaller towns are now coming forward and clamouring for water supply and drainage amenities more or less on the lines of the larger ones.

The clamant need of villages, for which large sums of money are required, is a provision of pure water supply. But the funds provided for these purposes are very inadequate. During the last few years the allotment for minor public health works has been reduced from Rs.2,40,000 to Rs.53,000 only, with the result that many of the works are being postponed and the progress made is very slow. It will therefore be something if at least the amount, which used to be allotted in past years, i.e. before the retrenchment, be restored. Even if one activity alone, e.g. the provision of pure water supply to villages could be adequately tackled, it will be a great boon to the public and will help in raising the standard of health of the province.

The paucity of funds is responsible for the curtailment of the number of meetings of the Board of Public Health also and this has led to some difficulty in the transaction of its business. Complaints have been made that the important duties entrusted to the Board could not be carried out

owing to insufficient opportunities for meeting. It was, therefore, decided that the matter be brought to the notice of Government for the provision of sufficient funds to enable it to meet more frequently and to discharge its duties efficiently.

During the year under report only three meetings of the Board were held—one at Naini Tal and two at Lucknow, all along with the Council Sessions.

The following were the important matters which received attention of the Board.

(a) Special assistance to pilgrim centres

Ajodhya-An estimate amounting to Rs.4,26,750 for water supply and another estimate amounting to Rs.4,60,034 for drainage of this all-India importance pilgrim centre, were approved by the Board many years ago, but the works could not be taken in hand so far on account of the inability of the Fyzabad Municipal Board to finance them either from their own funds or by taking a loan. The question of financing these works by means of a grant to the extent of the full amount has been before the Board of Public Health since long, but it could not be solved on account of funds at their disposal being inadequate. During the year under report the matter was again referred to the Board of Public Health but owing to paucity of funds, they could not see their way to defray the total expenditure from their limited resources. The Municipal Board was, however, asked to put up proposals for financing these two schemes, the first working instalments of which, as calculated by the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department, would cost about Rs. 80,000 and Rs. 70,000, respectively. In this connexion it was also suggested that the local body would be well advised to explore the possibility of increasing the pilgrim-tax with a view to taking a loan for financing these schemes at an early date.

Bindhyachal—The request of the Municipal Board of Mirzapur for a grant-in-aid for the improvement of the Bindhyachal water supply was considered and a report was called for from the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department, who directed one of his subordinates to make preliminary investigations in the matter. The Municipal Board, however, expressed its inability even to meet the expenditure in connexion with the reconnaissance of the scheme and requested that the matter may be indefinitely postponed. Accordingly the matter was dropped.

Brindaban—The revised estimate amounting to Rs.17,538 for the construction of three tube-wells along the river bank in connexion with the Brindaban water supply was approved and a further grant of Rs.3,838 was sanctioned. A grant of Rs.13,700 was given last year towards the cost of this work. It is hoped that the long felt need for a piped water supply for this important pilgrim centre will now be met.

Gola Gokarannath, district Kheri-The question of maintenance of the canal feeder constructed to supply water to the sacred tank at Gola Gokarannath, the full cost of which was defrayed by the Board, again came up before them, who decided that the maintenance should be entrusted to the Irrigation Department for one year as an experiment. The Irrigation Department was also asked whether it could provide a suitable escape for the first flush of the feeder and the tank.

Hardwar—The drainage scheme, which has been the most essential need of Hardwar, a very important pilgrim centre, was being postponed time after time for one reason or another. All controversial questions having been settled, a project amounting to Rs.5,57,579 was prepared by the Public Health Engineering Department and approved by the Board of Public Health who have undertaken to finance it by a grant of Rs.1,00,000. The remaining cost of the work will be met from loan funds. Consequently the Municipal Board applied for a loan of Rs.4,00,000 which has been sanctioned by Government and the work will now shortly be taken in hand. During the year a grant of Rs.8,898 was made available by the Board of Public Health towards the cost of this scheme.

The grant asked for by the Hardwar Municipal Board for deepening certain wells was refused as the wells in question were reported to be giving an adequate supply of water.

Pilgrim route, Garhwal—The Board of Public Health sanctioned grants aggregating Rs.10,000 towards the cost of constructing sweepers' huts on the pilgrim route, Garhwal, during the last two years. During the year under review a further grant of Rs.5,000 was made available for another ten huts, on the distinct understanding that they did not commit themselves for further expenditure in this direction. The estimated cost of constructing 96 huts, the estimate for which was sanctioned by the Board, is Rs.44,188.

Piran Kaliar, district Saharanpur—Last year the Sajjada Nashin Sahib of Piran Kaliar was advised to obtain the services of Messrs. Jessop and Company of Calcutta, who alone had work men skilled in the particular kind of plant installed there, to overhaul and maintain it in a satisfactory state, as required under the terms of the agreement between the Sajjada Nashin Sahib and the Government. With a view to save heavy expenditure in travelling allowance, the Sajjada Nashin Sahib proposed to entrust this job to the Water Works and Electrical Engineer, Hardwar, who was a trained man and looked after the tube-wells of the board, on payment of a fee. The Board agreed to this proposal provided the plant was kept in an efficient condition and in conformity with the undertaking given.

A grant of Rs.2,797 was, as usual, given for defraying the cost of the sanitary arrangements at Piran Kaliar Fair held in June, 1935.

(b) Urban Sanitation

Of the schemes discussed by the Board during the year under report, projects for the works, detailed in Appendix III, the estimated cost of which amounted to Rs.19,20,473 were administratively or finally sanctioned. In addition to these forecasts of cost for certain works were also approved.

Most of the waterworks in these provinces were inspected by the Mechanical Engineer for Waterworks during the year. Inspection reports or the action taken thereon by the local bodies concerned in respect of the following waterworks and sewerage pumping stations were considered by the Board;

(1) Aligarh, (2) Allahabad, (3) Benares, (4) Fyzabad, (5) Hardwar, (6) Jhansi, (7), Lucknow, (8) Meerut, (9) Mirzapur, (10) Moradabad, (11) Mussoorie, (12) Naini Tal, and (13) Unao.

As the report showing action taken by the Municipal Board of Allahabad to rectify the defects pointed out by the Mechanical Engineer for Waterworks was not satisfactory, the Board was asked to take further action on the points raised by the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department, and also to report within six weeks what was being done with regard to the loan of Rs.50,000 granted for its metering scheme. The reply received from the Municipal Board was considered to be wholly unsatisfactory and it has again been addressed in the matter.

In connexion with the unsatisfactory action taken by the Municipal Boards of Meerut, Mussoorie and Naini Tal on the recommendations of the Public Health Engineering Department with regard to their water works, the local bodies concerned were given to understand that if proper action was not taken within a reasonable time, the fact will be reported to Government and it will also be considered by the Board of Public Health when the question of a grant-in-aid or a loan for any work, whatsoever, comes up.

The Board read the inspection report on the Benares water works with interest and desired to convey their appreciation of the year's working and the general progress attained to the Additional District Magistrate, Incharge of the Municipal Board, and the Superintendent of Water Works.

The condition of the Mirzapur water works is reported to be particularly bad. The Board considered the report on these water works to be most unsatisfactory. The matter was therefore brought to the notice of Government for such action against the Board as it might find advisable under the Municipalities Act. The Board also declined to assist this Board with financial aid or to recommend it for financial assistance in any circumstances, whatever, until it took suitable action to put its water supply on a proper footing.

The necessity of running night tests in compliance with Government orders was urged upon the Jhansi municipality, and it was asked to designate its present Mechanical Supervisor as Water Works Superintendent so that he could perform all the duties of a Superintendent under the Municipalities Act.

The attention of the Unao Municipal Board was particularly drawn to the necessity of inaugurating a 24 hours' supply and the replacing of the present mistri by a competent fitter, who could be trusted to undertake the necessary overhauls and be of assistance to the Water Works Superintendent.

Tabulated results of municipal water supplies in these provinces for the year 1934-35 were also considered and recorded.

Allahabad—Owing to financial stringency the Board was unable to give a grant of Rs.36,330 asked for for the construction of an infectious diseases hospital at Allahabad but recommended to Government the grant of a loan of the entire cost, viz. Rs.72,660 provided a detailed project of the work was prepared. In response to this recommendation the Government have requested the Board of Public Health to ask the Municipal Board, Allahabad, to submit the loan application along with the detailed project and to obtain a report from the Commissioner to the effect that the site proposed is suitable and available. The matter is pending with the Municipal Board.

Almora—A grant of Rs.3,474 was sanctioned for the construction of two drains and four washing ghats at Almora, but the Board of Public Health were of opinion that before actually giving the money the Municipal Board should be advised to come to a decision as to whether the protection of the catchment area of the springs on which the city depended for its water supply was not a work of greater urgency than those for which this grant was being asked.

On the recommendation of the Director of Public Health, United Provinces, the proposal for the construction of an infectious diseases

hospital at Almora was dropped.

Banda—The scarcity of water at Banda is great and there are but few wells. A scheme was prepared by the Irrigation Department for the construction of water supply channels to the Diggi and Chhabbi tanks which was approved and a grant equal to half the cost of the work sanctioned.

Budaun—The supplementary estimate amounting to Rs.19,187 for the Budaun drainage extension was approved and the grant of Rs.9,593 sanctioned to meet half the cost of the work provided the Municipal Board was prepared to find a similar amount from its own funds. The drains have now been provided in the whole of the town and the scheme is nearing completion.

Dehra Dun—The present water supply at Dehra Dun is insufficient and the quality of water is not good. To solve this problem a scheme amounting to Rs.5,54,982 for supply of water from the river Bandal has been prepared by the Public Health Engineering Department. The scheme was administratively and finally approved by the Board of Public Health. The work, which is being financed wholly by a loan, has been taken in hand and is being carried out under the supervision of the

Department mentioned above.

In 1933-34, the Board of Public Health gave a grant of Rs.18,700 for sinking a trial tube well at Dehra Dun on the condition that the money will be refunded by the Municipal Board if the tube-well proved a success. The work was carried out by Messrs. Cariati, the expert engineers in this kind of work, but the boring proved a failure. A water-bearing strata was, however, found at a depth of 80 to 100 feet and the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department, was of opinion that the yield from this should be tested by cutting slots in the 8" tube from 80' to 90' below ground level, as there was a possibility of a supply of over 100 gallons per minute being obtained. For this work he submitted an estimate amounting to Rs.5,040 which was sanctioned and the entire cost defrayed by the Board of Public Health. It is regretted that this experiment also proved a failure.

As regards the grant of Rs.10,000 sanctioned by the Board of Public Health towards the cost of the Lakkhibagh drainage scheme on the condition that the balance was met from the funds of the Municipal Board, it was decided that the money be given if and when the Board had provided an equal amount and placed it at the disposal of the Public Health Engineering Department, so that a sum of Rs.20,000 might be available for

constructing the main portion of the scheme.

Fyzabad—The loan application for Rs.10,000 for the purchase of water meters was recommended to Government. The amount has since been sanctioned and paid to the Municipal Board during the year under report.

Sanction was also accorded to the utilization of the saving of Rs.1,494 from the work of the Ajodhya tube-well towards the cost of the new tube-well near the existing tube-well no. 3 at Fyzabad.

Gorakhpur—The Municipal Board of Gorakhpur came up for a full grant of Rs.15,000 for covering the section of the drain between the Bharat Prakash Press and the Court of Wards building and another grant of Rs.3,000, equal to half the cost for lining the bed of another drain with brickwork.

The Board of Public Health sanctioned a grant of Rs.8,000 provided the rest of the money required for the completion of both the works was contributed by the Municipal Board and the detailed schemes were submitted for approval.

Hardoi—The fair project amounting to Rs.83,576 for the Hardoi drainage was approved and the grant Rs.41,788, equal to half the cost of the work, was sanctioned. To meet the share of their cost the Municipal Board have applied for a loan of Rs.31,788 and have deposited a sum of Rs.10,000 from their own funds with the Public Health Engineering Department, under whose supervision the work has now been taken in hand.

Jhansi-A further grant of Rs.3,408 was given to meet the excess in the estimate for the construction of a city service reservoir at Jhansi.

Sanction was also accorded to the utilization of the saving of about Rs.2,500 from the grant given for the Jhansi drainage survey to meet part of the excess in the work of the city service reservoir.

The balance from the grant given for the infectious diseases hospital at Jhansi was also allowed to be utilized in carrying out certain minor improvements in connexion with the hospital.

Kasganj.-The project amounting to Rs.11,780 for the construction of two nalas at Kasganj was rejected and returned to the Municipal Board for rectification on the lines suggested.

Lucknow—The forecast of cost submitted by the Municipal Board, Lucknow, for certain additional works in connexion with the infectious diseases hospital was rejected and the Board was asked to revise it in the light of the remarks made by the Director of Public Health and to report whether it was willing to man, equip and maintain the same to the satisfaction of that officer. It was also decided that the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department, be requested to inspect and submit a report on the completion of this work.

In view of the urgency of providing a clear water reservoir at Aishbagh Water Works in Lucknow and the satisfaction of the Super-intending Engineer, Public Health Department, that the measures recently taken to check waste have proved more or less effective, recommendation was made to Government for the grant of the loan of Rs.60,000 required for the purpose, on the understanding that metering will be taken up in right earnest and the Board will abide by the report and recommendations of Messrs, Lane Brown and Hewlett, their consulting engineers.

The Lucknow Board was also asked to apply to their consulting engineers for advice concerning the maintenance of their sewerage and to arrange with the firm to supervise the maintenance for a sufficient period to put it in proper order to admit of the mosquito nuisance being abated in the city and to train the Board's staff.

With regard to the project for the construction of a platform, steps and certain other works by the side of the river Gumti on the River Bank. Road at Lucknow it was decided that the President, the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department, and the Secretary be authorized to examine the proposal and forward it to Government with their observations. 'The proposal was not supported and therefore could not be recommended to Government,

An estimate amounting to Rs.6,532 for laying 9" Hume Pipe Sewer on Shahmina Road was approved and a grant of Rs.3,000 sanctioned towards its cost on the condition that the balance would be met from Municipal funds.

The Municipal Board of Lucknow, which has agreed to carry out the recommendations of the Mechanical Engineer for Water Works for the improvement of its water supply, came up for a loan of two lakhs of rupees. The Board was asked to prepare the necessary projects and it was decided that recommendation be made to Government for sanction of the loan required.

The Board of Public Health approved the estimate amounting to Rs.9,831 for the construction of a trial tube-well with "Essbee" patent coir strainer at Lucknow and sanctioned a grant to meet the entire cost of the work.

The question of a grant for certain sanitary arrangements in the Dufferin and Kinnaird hospitals at Lucknow was fully discussed, but the Board considered that grant-in-aid to purely medical institutions was outside their province. They were, however, fully alive to the importance of the proposals and consequently recommended them for favourable consideration of Government and the authorities incharge of the Silver Jubilee Fund.

The proposal of Messrs. Duncan Stratton and Company of Bombay for sewage disposal at Lucknow and similar big cities was ordered to be circulated to the Municipal Boards of Lucknow, Cawnpore, Allahabad, Agra and Benares for report after considering the same. The reports are awaited.

Mussoorie—The project amounting to Rs.71,014 for the extension of the Landour and Kulri Sewage outfalls to Castle Hill Estates at Mussoorie, submitted by the City Board for sanction and allotment of a suitable grant, was rejected and instructions were given for the rectification of the same in the light of the remarks made by the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department.

Muttra—Sanction was accorded to the utilization of the unspent balance of the grant made for the reconstruction of the dispensary block of the infectious diseases hospital at Muttra towards the cost of construction of a godown comprising of two rooms.

The Board expressed their inability to increase their previous offer of half the grant for financing the project for the Antapara storm water drain at Muttra.

The grant applied for for making the drain behind the canal office in the Muttra Civil Lines was refused as the Board of Public Health

considered that they were not justified in giving any further grant for this work.

Orai (district Jalaun)—In connexion with the Orai water supply scheme a forecast of cost estimated at Rs 86,250, prepared by the Public Health Engineering Department, was submitted and approved by the Board of Public Health, who have also sanctioned the estimate amounting to Rs.13,017 for the construction of a trial tube-well. A grant to meet the entire cost of the trial tube-well was made on the condition that the Municipal Board will be required to refund the full amount in case the well proved successful and was not utilized for the water supply scheme within a reasonable period.

Partabgarh—The project amounting to Rs.9,567 for the construction of a trial tube-well in connexion with the Partabgarh water supply scheme was sanctioned and a grant of the full amount made on the condition that the Municipal Board, if the tube-well is successful, undertake to complete their scheme for water supply to the city within three years from the end of the year in which the well is finally handed over to them complete. It was further decided that the whole amount will have to be refunded by the Municipal Board if the well proved successful, but was not used for water supply within the time-limit fixed.

Sultanpur—Board of Public Health had agreed to give a grant not exceeding Rs.6,000 as part of the cost of a scheme for dealing with the dust nuisance at Sultanpur. Proposals amounting to Rs.11,623 for the installation of a pumping plant, etc. were submitted, but could not be approved and the local authority was asked to submit a proper scheme, which is awaited.

Unao—The Board, on account of limited funds at their disposal, could not see their way to assist the Unao Municipal Board towards the cost of its schemes for metering and the extension of the drainage.

In addition to the above grants for certain petty works such as Rs.548 for composting of nightsoil and refuse on an experimental basis in the Shahjahanpur Municipality and Rs.178 for improvement of wells at Hardoi were also sanctioned.

(c) Rural and Minor Sanitary Works

The note, prepared by the Secretary in connexion with the Rural Sanitation, which could not be considered by the Board of Public Health for a long time owing to the accumulation of heavy agenda at every meeting, was at last discussed in the November meeting of the year. In view of the fact that a scheme, that of Rural Reconstruction initiated by the Government of India, similar to the one embodied in the note, has been instituted in the province and is in operation, the Board of Public Health decided to record the papers.

Another proposal put forward by the Secretary for the supply of pure drinking water to villages near the State tube-wells constructed by the Irrigation Department was put up to the Rural Development Officer, who appreciated the scheme but regretted that no funds were available to carry it out. Consequently it had to be shelved.

Funds to the extent of about Rs.65,000 were placed at the disposal of the District Magistrates of a number of districts mentioned in Appendix II(c), for small public health works, such as drainage schemes,

construction of new sanitary wells, improvement and repairs of existing wells, filling of depressions, and so forth.

Azamgarh District Board—The pumps, purchased by the District Board of Azamgarh from a grant given by the Board of Public Health many years ago and reported to be lying idle, were ordered to be auctioned. The District Board, however, delayed the disposal of the pumps. In the meantime the Director of Public Health requested that these pumps be given to his department for installation in one of the districts in which the health scheme had newly been introduced. This suggestion was accepted and the District Board was asked to hand over the pumps to the Director of Public Health, who was asked to submit a report after installing them.

Bahraich District Board—In view of the fact that the Bahraich District Board had refused to provide funds for the maintenance of the pumps, which were installed in that district from a grant of Rs.21,600 and a similar amount from its own funds, the Board of Public Health decided that all the pumps be auctioned and the sale proceeds be deposited into the treasury. Further the District Board was given to understand that its failure to abide by the undertakings given by it has been noted and will be duly considered when the question of giving a grant-in-aid for any purpose whatsoever comes up. On this, the Bahraich Board undertook to employ a mistri and maintain the pumps in good working order and requested that the decision to auction all the pumps be cancelled. This request was accepted and the District Board was required to submit a report in April every year to the effect that a pump mistri was being employed and the pumps were being kept in good working order.

Baldeo Town Area—The project amounting to Rs.26,856 for the drainage scheme of the Baldeo Town Area was approved subject to the condition that lime mortar was not used in place of cement mortar provided for in the estimate, but the Board of Public Health, on account of paucity of funds, could not see their way to accede to the request for a grant-in-aid of Rs.16,856.

Bhowali.—The revised scheme estimate I to cost Rs.1,00,627, prepared by the Mechanical Engineer for Water Works, United Provinces, for the first instalment of the Bhowali water supply was rejected on account of its being too ambitious in present circumstances. Consequently the proposal was dropped.

Kosi Kalan Notified Area—The project amounting to Rs.78,896 for the Kosi drainage scheme was submitted for sanction and allotment of full funds. Owing to paucity of funds the Board could not see its way to sanction a grant for meeting the entire cost of the scheme and advised the notified area committee to take up the scheme piecemeal and to make a start with the sewage farm, for which a loan should be obtained. As the notified area committee was neither prepared to take a loan nor was in a position to contribute anything towards the cost of the scheme the matter was dropped.

Kotdwara—The question of a grant for the Kotdwara water supply and drainage was considered but the Board were not prepared to commit themselves to anything until the springs supplying water had been fully tested and a detailed scheme was prepared.

Moghalsarai Notified Area—The project amounting to Rs.7,726 for the construction of a trial tube-well in connexion with the Moghalsarai water supply scheme was approved and a grant to meet the entire cost of the work was sanctioned subject to the condition that if the well was successful the amount will either be refunded or with the permission of the Board of Public Health will be applied towards the cost of the water supply scheme.

Patwadangar, District Naini Tal—The proposal amounting to Rs.4,963 for the disinfection of water supply at Patwadangar and the provision of drains and a quarter for the laboratory assistant and minor alterations and extensions of the calf-shed was approved and a grant was sanctioned to meet the entire cost of the work.

Sahora, District Bareilly—The District Board of Bareilly resubmitted the project amounting to Rs.11,145 for filling up a pond at village Sahora duly rectified and asked for a grant equal to half the cost of the work. The proposal was approved and a grant of Rs.5,572 sanctioned subject to the conditions imposed by the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department.

Sringhirampore, District Farrukhabad—The grant of Rs.3,956 given towards the cost of construction of two wells at Sringhirampore fair area in the Farrukhabad district having been allowed to lapse to Government by the District Magistrate at the close of the last financial year, i.e., 1934-35, a similar amount was regranted to carry out the work, which has now been completed. The saving of Rs.848, which accrued from this work, was resumed and utilized elsewhere.

Indian Red Cross Society, United Provinces Branch—A grant of Rs.12,000 per annum is being given for the production of cinema films on health and hygiene for exhibition purposes at fairs and religious gatherings for the last 9 or 10 years. As usual, a like sum was sanctioned by the Board for the year under report. A sum of Rs 790 was, however, surrendered to and resumed by the Board, leaving the net amount of Rs.11,290 for expenditure in this connexion.

The films produced are reported to have been very well received not only in British India but also in the states and have been highly commended in Germany and other European countries. The Health Committee of the League of Nations who saw the demonstrations in 1931, have been very pleased with them and appreciated the good work. There is no doubt that these films have been the means of educating the public in general to safeguard themselves from the infectious diseases, etc.

It is reported that the number of cinema shows given during the year 1935 was 150, most of which were in rural areas. The total attendance at the shows at a rough computation was one lakh. The shows always attracted crowds and served as the best method for the dissemination of health knowledge in the interior of the country.

The application for a grant of the usual amount of Rs.12,000 for 19363-from the Honorary Secretary of the Society at whose disposal the 7 money is placed was also considered by the Board of Public Health in March last. On account of financial stringency and the paucity of funds the Board could not sanction more than Rs.5,000 but decided to increase

the grant if the members after seeing the films agreed to its increase and provided funds were available.

A grant of Rs.400 was also made for the preparation of 20 sets of coloured slides for magic lantern in connexion with the programme of rural development.

(d) D-Works

Dewa Fair Water Supply—The project amounting to Rs.57,859 for the Dewa Fair water supply, sanctioned in 1930, was wholly financed by the Board of Public Health. Although the work has been completed still the accounts have not yet been closed. This year a sum of Rs.120 only was given towards its cost.

Necessary arrangements for the supply of water during the mela held in October, 1935, were made by the Public Health Engineering Department, the cost of which was defrayed by the Dewa Fair and Exhibition Association. Approval to the estimate amounting to Rs.588 was given by the Board of Public Health.

The question of maintenance of the water supply plant at Dewa Fair was also discussed and the proposal of the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department, to give the work to Messrs. Noorullah Ghazanfarullah, contractors, was approved. The Superintending Engineer was asked to draft a suitable agreement in consultation with the firm and the Exhibition Association, if the latter agreed to the proposal put forward.

Owing to lack of funds the Board was not in a position to assist the Exhibition Association by giving the grant of Rs. 5,880 asked for the extension of the pipe line along the Dargah Road for the Dargah.

Syed Salar Fair (Bahraich) Water Supply.—As the Board of Public Health had agreed in principle to have an independent water supply scheme for this important Muslim place of pilgrimage, the Dargah Committee was addressed if it was prepared to meet the recurring maintenance charges of the proposed scheme. The Committee, though it refused in the first instance, later on communicated its willingness to the proposal provided it was allowed to use the tube-well, besides water supply purposes to the fair area, for irrigation needs. The Board of Public Health allowed this demand on the condition that the supply of water to the mela was not adversely affected. The question of maintenance having been settled the Public Health Engineering Department was asked to take up the preparation of the detailed scheme. As regards financing the scheme it was decided that the work be spread over two years but provision of the money required would necessarily be dependent on the grant of adequate funds from Government.

Malaria Sub-Committee

As there was no important business, which could be referred to the subcommittee, no meeting was held during the year under report. A few cases were, however, disposed of by the Chairman.

Rai Bahadur Dr. K. L. Chaudhri, O.B.E., D.P.H., Director of Public Health, held the office of the Chairman of the sub-committee throughout the year.

Dr. A. C. Banerjea, M.B., B.S., Dr. P.H., Assistant Director of Public Health (Malariology), United Provinces, continued to perform the duties of the Secretary to the sub-committee.

GENERAL

The last annual reports of the Director of Public Health, United Provinces, and the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department, United Provinces, copies of which were supplied to members, were recorded.

The annual report on the working of the Board of Public Health for the year ending 31st March, 1935, prepared by the Secretary, was passed and a copy was forwarded to the Director of Public Health, United Provinces, for incorporation in his annual report as usual.

It was further decided that a copy of the report be sent to the Secretary, Legislative Council, United Provinces, and he be requested to inform the honourable members of the Council that a copy of the same can be had on requisition from the Secretary of the Board.

A copy was also ordered to be supplied to the Press.

The budget estimates of the office of the Secretary as well as of the grants and loans for public health works for 1936-7 were approved and forwarded to Government.

- Mr. D. L. Drake-Brockman, C.S.I., C.I.E., I.C.S., Senior Member, Board of Revenue, continued to hold the office of the President throughout the year except for 4 months and 9 days from 31st May, 1935 to 8th October, 1935, when he was on leave and during which period Mr. C. W. Grant, I.C.S., worked in his place.
- Mr. H. G. Trivedi, A.M.INST.C.E., worked as Secretary to the Board throughout the year in addition to his own duties as Executive Engineer, 2nd Division, Public Health Department, Allahabad, from the beginning of the year to 16th October, 1935, and as Executive Engineer, 1st Division, Public Health Department, Meerut, from 17th October, 1935, to the close of the year.

The Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department, was asked to prepare proposals regarding the appointment of qualified staff for water works and the security of their tenure to enable them to discharge their duties efficiently. The preliminary proposals received from this officer were considered by the Board, which formed a sub-committee consisting of the President, the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department, Rai Bahadur Dr. B. N. Vyas, M.B., and Saiyid Ali Zaheer Sahib, Bar.-at-Law, M.L.C., and called for a report after considering the question. Subsequently the Secretary to Government, United Provinces, Local Self-Government and Public Health Departments and the Mechanical Engineer for Water Works, United Provinces, were also appointed to serve on the sub-committee. Saiyid Ali Zaheer, Bar.-at-Law, M.L.C., whose term of membership was to expire on 7th April, 1936, was co-opted as a member of the committee to represent the municipal boards. This committee could not, however, meet during the year under report.

The question of registration of projects for public health works by the Board of Public Health was considered and recommendations were made to Government, who agreed with them. These decisions were communicated to all the local bodies in the province, and are embodied in this report as appendices I and I-A.

Some additions and amendments to the rules framed under the Municipalities Act, 1916, section 95, for the preparation of plans and estimates for works, the execution of works and conditions of sanction were recommended to Government who are considering them.

Rai Bahadur Lal Sheo Pratap Singh Sahib, M.L.C., Rae Bareli, was appointed by Government as a member of the Board for a term of two-years in place of Pandit Joti Prasad Upadhyaya Sahib, M.A., LL.B., M L.C., Agra, whose term of membership expired on 6th March, 1936.

The following members whose term of office had expired in August or November, 1935, were reappointed by Government for a further period of 2 years with effect from the date noted against their names:

The Board thereupon placed on record its great regret at the retirement of this officer, who had been a member of it for over 16 years and its great appreciation of the most valuable services rendered by him to the Board of Public Health and the Government during the period he had been in charge of the Public Health Engineering Department.

- (3) all projects, other than those for ordinary works, will be recorded in the archives of the Board of Public Health, and
- (4) the President, Board of Public Health, may accord sanction to health projects on behalf of the Board in urgent cases to avoid delay.
- (5) Projects for ordinary works will however continue to be sanctioned either by the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department, United Provinces, or by Government, and after that, stamped and registered in the office of the Board of Public Health.
- 2. I am, therefore, to request that in future you should submit to the Board of Public Health in the case of health works and to Government in the case of ordinary works two copies of all projects for which sanction is solicited, as a copy will be recorded in this office and the other will be returned to the authority concerned.

SUBJECT. Registration of projects.

IT appears that the instructions issued in this office circular letter no. 2080-2525/B.P.H.--164-34, dated the 19th July, 1935, which related only to major works and not small public health works, have been misunderstood by some local authorities as they are submitting their proposals for small public health works costing Rs.200 and over to this office in duplicate. I am, therefore, directed to explain that the above-mentioned circular letter was intended for projects for major works only. It is unnecessary to submit in duplicate the proposals costing Rs.200 and over and projects costing Rs.5,000 and over should only be submitted in duplicate.

2. In this connexion I am to point out that the instructions regarding the initiation of projects and the carrying out of public works by local authorities are not complied with by most of the local bodies with the result that the aim of getting the projects prepared and the works carried out satisfactorily is frustrated. I am, therefore, to request that the necessity of complying with these instructions strictly in future may kindly be impressed upon your office staff.


