CHAPTER I

METEOROLOGY AND ECONOMIC CONDITIONS, i.e., PRICES OF FOOD-GRAINS, ETC.

The cold weather period, January and February—Three western disturbances affected the province during January and caused fairly widespread showers in the province. A village in the Jhansi district was visited by a devastating hail-storm which completely destroyed the crops and resulted in many casualties to men, cattle and birds. The total rainfall of the month was in slight defect in the east and in large defect in the west.

Rainfall and weather conditions.

During February weather was dry for the first ten days ; later there were frequent rainfalls associated with five western disturbances causing scattered showers or widespread rains. The total rainfall was in moderate excess. Cloud amount was above normal and humidity normal. Maximum temperature was above normal in January, while the minimum was above normal in February.

The hot weather period, March to May—March was dry except for local falls on some days of the month. The total rainfall of the month was in moderate defect in the the west and in large defect in other subdivisions. Weather during April was also dry except for scattered falls. The rainfall in this month was in large defect. May was also dry and the total rainfall was in large defect. Kumaun hills and the adjoining plains were affected by widespread thunder showers and a few falls during the latter part of the month.

Cloud amount was in excess in March and in defect in May. Humidity was in defect in April and May. Maximum temperature was below normal in March, while both maximum and minimum temperatures were above normal in May.

The south-west monsoon period, June to September—The monsoon started from the second week of June and it became vigorous towards the end of the month and caused fairly widespread rain.

The monsoon was generally weak during the first week of July, but thereafter it became active and continued till the end of the month as also in August causing widespread or local rain in the province sometimes with breaks of a few days.

During September the monsoon was active till 17th and gave widespread rainfall in the province and withdrew thereafter. During the rest of the month the weather continued mainly dry except for local or scattered showers in the eastern districts and in the hills.

Cloud amount was in excess in June and September. Humidity and temperatures were generally normal.

The retreating monsoon periods, October to December—October began with a few falls of rain in the hills and had scattered thunder-showers and local rains in the first fortnight. Weather during the second fortnight was practically dry except for local thunder showers in the east on the 23rd and 24th. The total rainfall was in large defect.

Weather during November and December was practically dry. The total rainfall during these months was cent. per cent. in defect.

Cloud amount was above normal in October and below normal in November. Humidity was generally normal. Maximum temperature was above normal in November and December while the minimum was above normal in October.

Taking the year as a whole the total rainfall was normal in the United Provinces East and in slight defect in the West.

Agriculture and economic conditions—The wheat crop was reported to have been damaged in a number of districts owing to hail-storms, drought and strong winds. The estimated outturn was 72 per cent. of the normal. The cotton crop also suffered for want of rain in August and heavy rains and strong winds in September. Its total outturn is estimated at 68 per cent. of the normal. The quality of lint was reported to be fair. The average outturn of *rabi* crops was estimated to range between 10 and 15 annas in the rupee while that of *kharij* crops between 12 and 15 annas. The condition of the labouring and agricultural population was satisfactory.

CHAPTER II.

Vital statistics including population.

The population of the United Provinces, excluding the Indian States of Rampur, Tehri-Garhwal and Benares, according to the census of 1931, is 48,408,703 and on this the provincial birth and death rates shown in the report have been calculated. The area of the province is 106,248 square miles and the average population per square mile is 456.

Population of the United Provinces on which birth and death rates have been calculated and the area in square miles.

The population of the United Provinces for mid-year 1939, estimated by the natural increase method is 53,618,255. The sub-joined table gives the birth and death rates for 1939 based on these populations :

2. In 1939, the provincial birth-rate showed a decrease of 0·53 over that of the preceding year, and a decrease of 0·64

as compared with the quinquennial average, the rates for the two years and for the quinquennial period being 36·26, 36·79 and 36·90 per mille of population, respectively. The provincial death rate for the year also showed a decrease of 2·73 as compared with that of the preceding year and a decrease of 1·18 as compared with quinquennial average, the figures for the two years and for the quinquennial period being 23·09, 25·82 and 24·27, respectively.

3. A statement showing the birth, death and the infantile mortality rates of the United Provinces and those of other provinces is appended below :

4. In 1939, 1,755,421 births were registered giving a birth-rate of 36·26 against 1,781,118 and 36·79, respectively, in 1938. The quinquennial average was 36·90. As recorded in September and the lowest (2·43) in May.

5. The number of males born to every 100 females was 113·75 in 1939 against 113·04 in the preceding year.

6. The highest birth-rate was recorded in the district of Moradabad (49·86) followed by Etawah (47·07), Jalaun (47·02) and Jhansi (46·63), while the lowest was recorded in the district of Partabgarh (25·33), followed by Basti (26·20), Ballia (26·29), and Naini Tal (26·39).

7. During the year 1939, the number of births exceeded deaths by 637,412 or 13·17 per mille of population.

8. Appended is a comparative statement showing birth-rates per mille in the chief communities during the years 1938 and 1939:

9. The total number of births registered in municipalities during the year 1939 was 168,367, yielding a ratio of 49·57 per thousand of population against 170,605 and 50·25, respectively, in the preceding year. The municipality recording the highest birth-rate was Orai (66·79), followed by Agra (64·95), Kalpi (64·51) and Atrauli (64·33).

Mainpuri recorded the lowest rate (9·38), followed by Banda (15·75), Mussoorie (19·65), and Fyzabad-Ajodhia (24·90).

10. The birth-rate in municipalities exceeded the death-rate, the excess being 14·54 and it was shared by all except Hardwar Union and Lalitpur.

11. In 1939, the provincial birth-rate for the notified areas was 37·53 as compared with 37·10 in the preceding year, the number of births for the two years being 18,212 and 17,529, respectively. Notified areas recording high birth-rates were in order Jalaun (66·05), Mughal Sarai (65·16), Rath (63·41) and Fatehpur-Sikri (62·16). Those recording low rates were Chunar Settlement (3·68), Basti (6·04), Mainpuri Civil Station (11·57) and Rikhikesh (13·84).

12. Taking the notified areas as a whole, births were in excess of deaths by 13·75 per thousand of population. The excess was shared by all except Rikhikesh, Mainpuri Civil Station, Chunar Settlement and Shahganj.

Deaths

13. During the year under report, the total number of deaths recorded was 1,118,009 (604,402 males and 513,607 females) against 1,249,988 (675,228 males and 574,760 females) in the preceding year, the respective death-rates for these years being 23·09 and 25·82. The quinquennial average was 24·27.

14. Of the 48 districts, 24 returned a death-rate higher than the provincial average (23·09). Bijnor recorded the highest death-rate (34·21) and Ballia the lowest (15·03).

15. In 1939, the death-rate for municipal towns was 35·03 per mille of the population compared to 37·39 in 1938; the actual number of deaths being 118,989 and 126,958, respectively. Out of the 85 municipalities, 33 recorded a death-rate higher than the provincial average and the rest below that figure. Conspicuous amongst the former were Lalitpur (66·13), Hathras (53·04), Cawnpore (52·00) and Benares (51·29). The high rates in these municipalities were chiefly due to fevers, all other causes and respiratory diseases; small-pox being an additional factor in the case of Hathras. The lowest mortality was recorded in Mainpuri (5·21), followed by Banda (11·46), Mussoorie (12·59), and Unao (15·60).

16. Compared with 1938, the notified areas showed a decrease of 102 deaths in 1939, the figures for the two years being 11,539 and 11,641, respectively, and the rates 23.78 and 24.64. Out of the 56 notified areas, 27 returned death-rates above and 29 below the provincial average. Mawana (Meerut) returned the highest death-rate (47.36), followed by Rath (Hamirpur) with 45.26, Jalaun 44.20 and Anupshahr (Bulandshahr) 40.14. The high death-rates were chiefly due to "fevers", "and all other causes"; "smallpox", being an additional factor in Mawana, Jalaun and Anupshahr; "respiratory diseases" in Rath and "dysentery" and "diarrhoea" in Anupshahr. The lowest death-rate was returned from Juhi in the Cawnpore district (3.93), followed by Basti (5.02), Baghpat in the Meerut district (6.09), and Chunar settlement in the Mirzapur district (6.13).

17. The highest mortality was recorded in September and the lowest in March, the respective death-rates for these months being 25.27 and 20.29. (For further details refer to Statement III.)

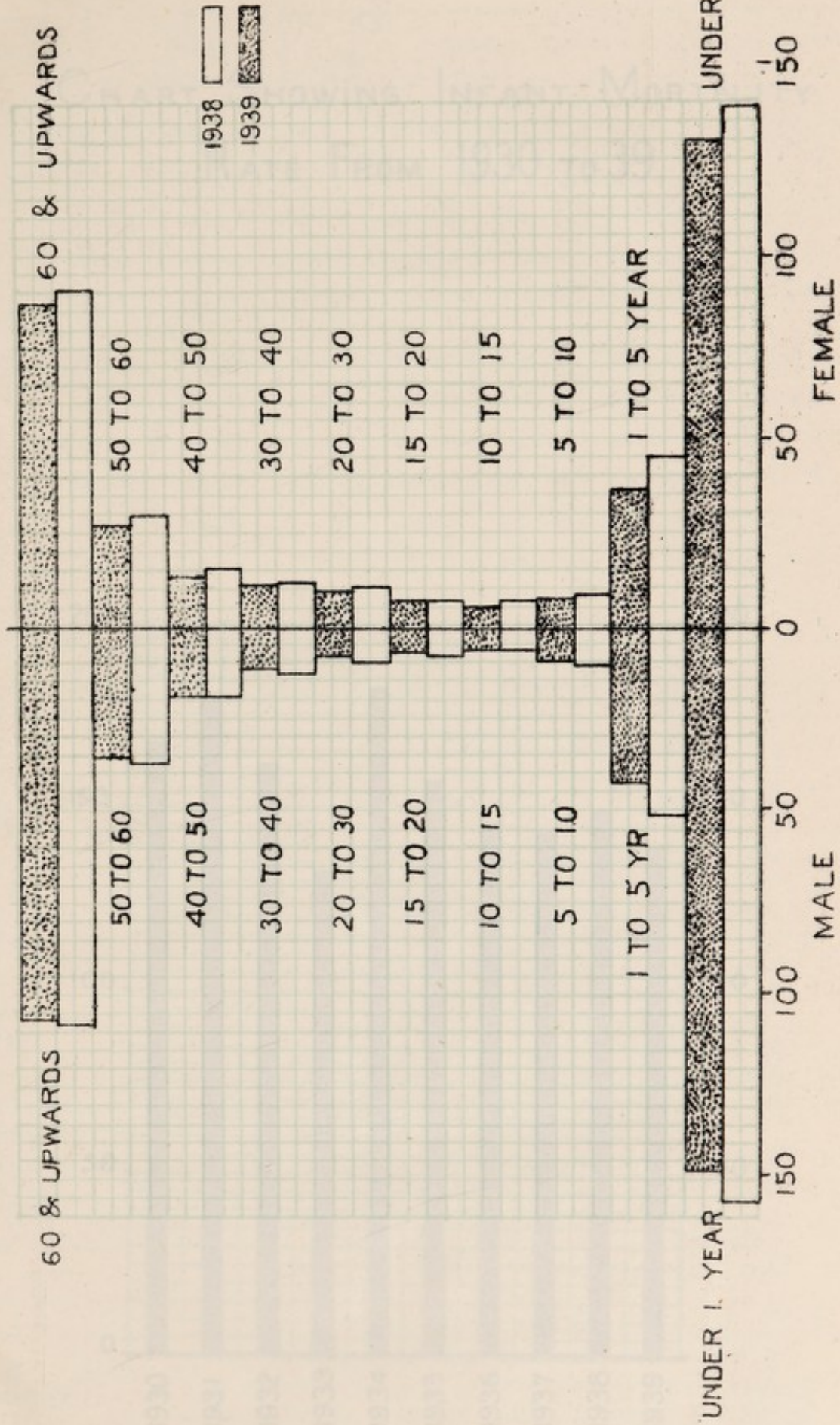
18. During the year under report, deaths registered under all ages amongst males and females aggregated 604,402 and 513,607, respectively, as compared with 675,228 and 574,760, respectively, in the previous year. The death-rates for the two sexes were 23.75 and 22.36 in 1939 and 26.54 and 25.03 in 1938. Deaths among infants under one year of age numbered 244,794, of which 136,247 were amongst males and 108,547 amongst females as against 264,689 (147,566 males and 117,123 females) in the preceding year. 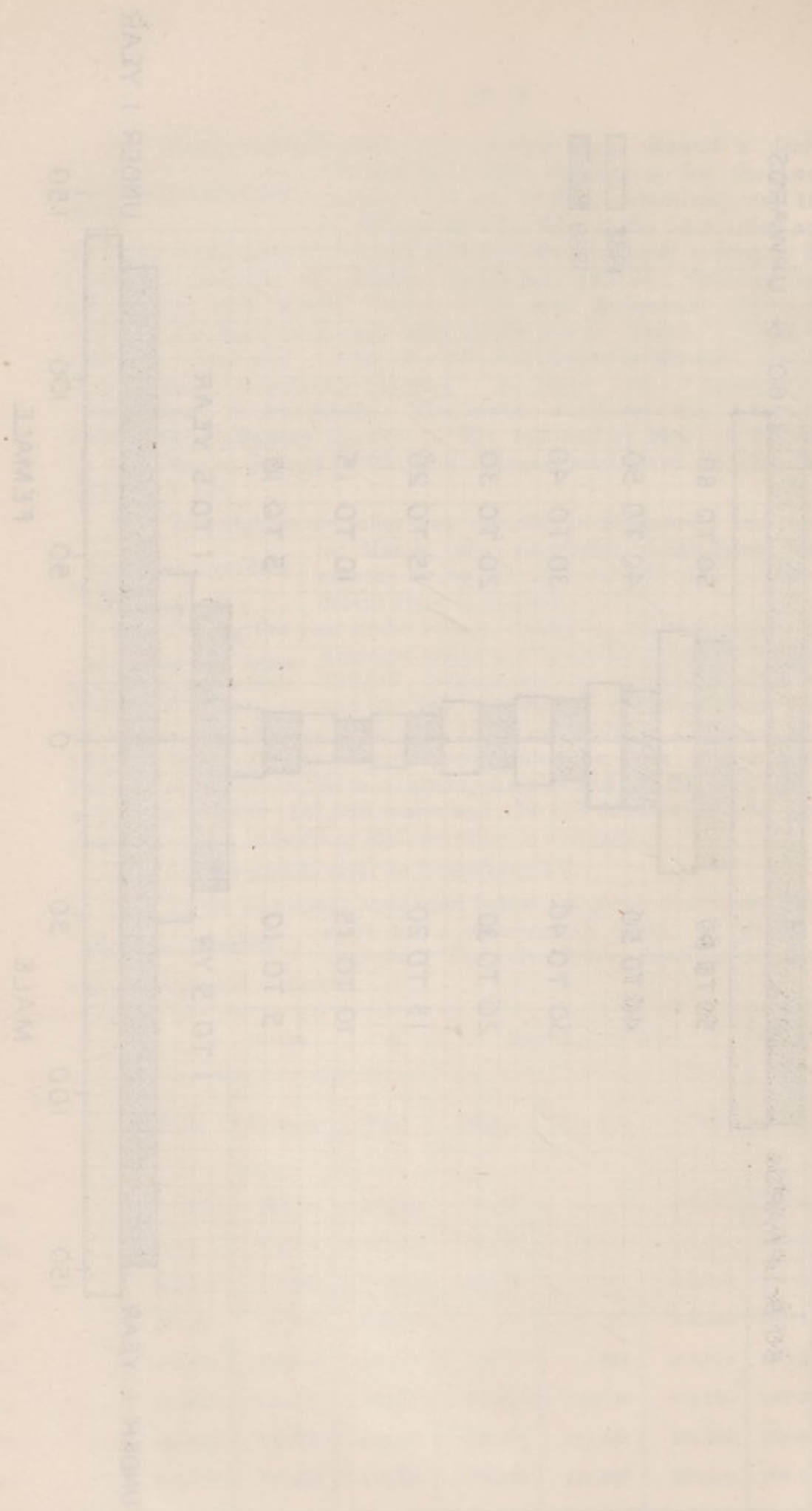

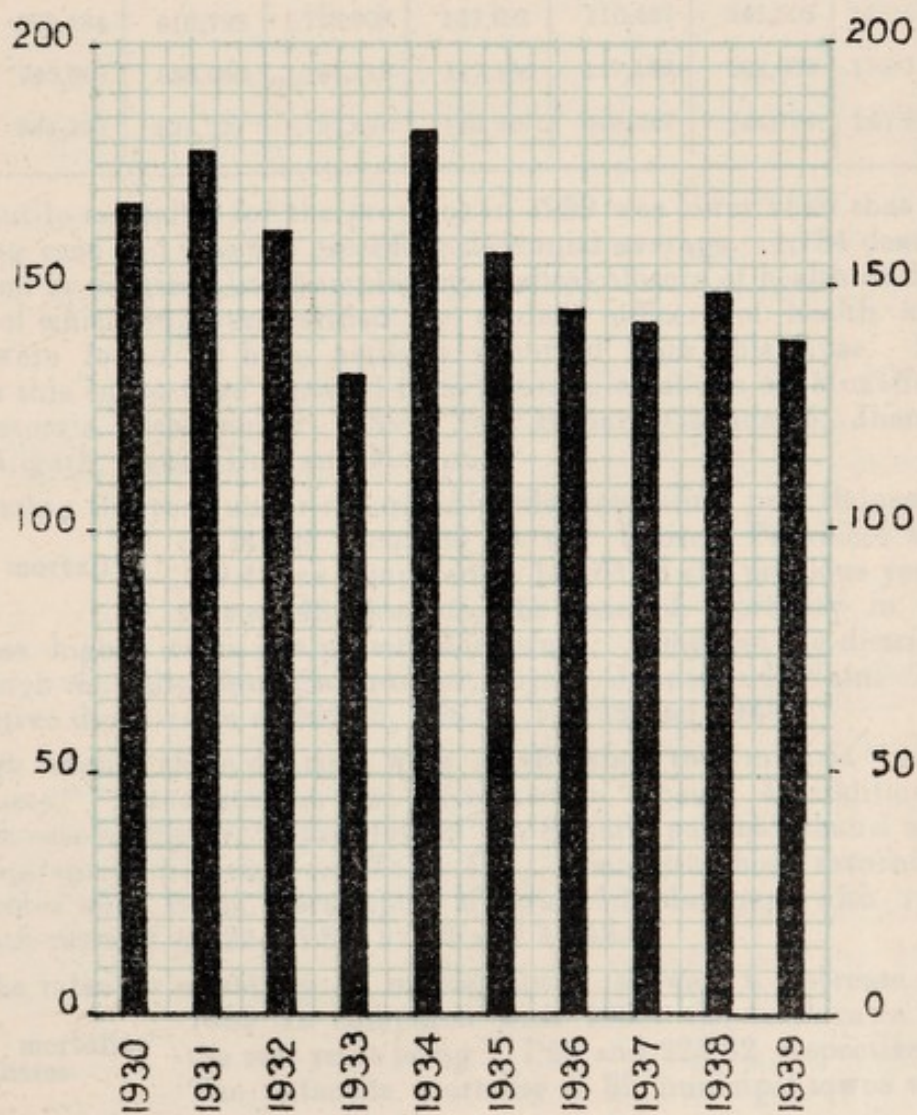
DEATH RATE AT EACH AGE PERIOD 1938-39

The infantile mortality for the province in 1939 was lower than that in the preceding year and also the preceding decennial average. 1,134 deaths were recorded in municipalities employing medical officers of health as due to tetanus, of which 882 were verified by medical officers of health and only 600 were found to have actually occurred from this cause. No deaths from this cause were reported from the municipalities of Muzaffarnagar, Mussoorie, Saharanpur, Naini Tal, Hapur, Chandausi, Jhansi, Hardwar, Aligarh, Dehra Dun and Meerut.

20. During the year under report infantile mortality per thousand of births recorded in the United Provinces was 139·45 as compared to 148·61 in the previous year. Out of 48 districts, the rate of mortality in 24 districts was higher than the provincial average. Amongst the districts returning high mortality were Saharanpur, Bijnor, Jhansi and Naini Tal with respective death-rates of 202·35, 198·85, 196·22 and 194·20.

The high rates in these districts were chiefly due to "malaria" and "other causes," "exhaustion and malnutrition" being an additional factor in the case of Bijnor, "other fevers" in Saharanpur and Jhansi and "other respiratory diseases" in Naini Tal. Amongst those returning the lowest rates were Ballia, Gorakhpur, Muttra, and Mainpuri with respective death-rates of 90·22, 91·89, 92·96 and 94·45.

21. The infantile mortality in municipalities showed a decrease in 1939 as compared with 1938, the death-rates for the two years being 217·69 and 223·62 respectively. The infantile mortality in 35 municipal towns was

higher while in 50 lower than the provincial average (217·69). The highest infantile death-rate (334·67) was recorded in Lalitpur. It was followed by Saharanpur (331·6), Etawah (327·38) and Cawnpore (301·00). The high mortality in Lalitpur was chiefly due to "other causes" "malaria," "other fevers," and "other respiratory diseases" In Saharanpur. Etawah and Cawnpore it was chiefly due to "other causes", "other fevers" and "pneumonia".

The municipalities returning low mortality were Ghazipur (97·44), Banda (116·15), Gonda (117·95) and Lakhimpur (120·91).

22. The infantile mortality rate relating to notified areas was 187·73 as compared with 185·18 in the preceding year. Infantile mortality in notified areas. In 26 areas, the rate was above the provincial average (187·73). Chunar Settlement topped the list with an infantile death-rate of 333·33. Mawana came next with 329·52 and was followed by Pihani (318·68) and Sandi (309·73).

23. During the year under report, the infantile death-rate per thousand of registered births was 199·66 in the case of urban areas and 129·57 in rural areas against 204·07 and 139·56, respectively, in the preceding year. Infantile mortality in Urban and Rural areas. [Statement VI(a)].

24. The mortality among children under one year of age was the highest in the month of August (25,298) and the lowest in the month of February (15,066). Seasonal infantile mortality.

25. During the year under report, the infantile mortality rate per thousand of births amongst Hindus, Muslims, Christians and other classes were 137·44, 151·17, 95·49 and 132·86, respectively. Infantile mortality by classes. [Statement IV(a)].

26. Mortality per mille amongst Hindus was 23·05, amongst Muslims 23·86, amongst other classes 21·02 and amongst Christians 5·19. Mortality according to class. (Statement V).

27. In 1939, the death-rate from all causes was 31·10 in the case of Urban and Rural towns and 22·08 in the case of rural areas as compared with 32·66 and 24·96, respectively, in 1938, the respective quinquennial averages being 32·97 and 23·28. (Statement VI).

28. During the year under report the recorded still-births aggregated 12,806 as compared with 13,100 in the previous year. Of these there were 10,110 amongst Hindus, 2,620 amongst Muslims, 44 amongst Christians and 32 amongst other classes. As usual, Gorakhpur returned the highest number of still-births (2,992), followed by Gonda (837), Sitapur (653), and Lucknow (615). The lowest number of still-births was recorded in the district of Jalaun (5), followed by Etawah (7), and Farrukhabad and Jhansi (14) each. No still-births were reported from Mainpuri. [Statement I(a)].

29. During the year under report, 5,528 deaths (which occurred within the limits of the practice of Government medical officers including medical institutions) were verified by civil surgeons and their subordinate medical officers against 5,556 deaths in the preceding year. As usual, the largest number of deaths (3,861) was returned under "all other causes". Next in order were "pneumonia" (508), "tubercle of the lungs" (262), "dysentery" (192), "other tubercular diseases" (110), "tetanus" (100), "enteric fever" (92), "all other infective diseases" (83), "cholera" (81), "malaria" (80), "pyrexia of uncertain origin" (70), "leprosy" (35), "syphilis" (15) and "influenza" (13). The number of deaths from "small-pox", "plague", "rheumatic fever and rheumatism", "gonorrhoea", "kala azar", "beri-beri", "relapsing fever" and "scurvy" ranged from 6 to 1. Of these total verified deaths, 929 were among children, 3,233 among adults from 16 to 45 years of age and 1,366 among adults exceeding 46 years of age.

30. During 1939, 1,341,620 entries of births and deaths were checked by the vaccination staff, 263,734 by the district health staff and 875 by the Assistant Director of Public Health, I Range.

31. During 1939, the number of persons fined and the amount of fines realized for neglect in complying with registration rules were 1,423 and Rs.658 against Rs.2,030 and Rs.676, respectively, in the preceding year. 173 cases were compromised on payment of Rs.81 and 46 persons were let off with a warning.

CHOLERA

During the year 1939, 27,732 deaths from cholera were reported against 70,612 in 1938. The rate per mile of the population for the two years was respectively 27 and 1.46 and the mean for the previous 5 years was 52. The maximum number of deaths, viz. 7,032 occurred in August and the minimum, viz. 55 in February.

In 8 districts the mortality rate was 2.46 above the provincial average (1.57). Lakhnao had a death-rate of 2.58 was the most conspicuous. It was followed by Bahraich with 2.37, Lucknow with 1.98, Kheri with 1.78 and Gorakhpur with 1.52. The districts showing the lowest mortality rates from cholera were Deoria (0.4) and Main (0.4). Other districts with low mortality rates were Bahraich (0.4) and Bahraich (0.4).

In total cases during 1939 aggregated 27,732 with a death-rate of 59 as compared with 68,857 and 1.56 respectively in 1938. The highest mortality was reported from Bahraich (5.55), followed by Bahraich (2.37), Bahraich (2.37) and Kheri (1.83).

CHAPTER III

THE STATE OF PUBLIC HEALTH IN THE PROVINCE AND HISTORY OF CHIEF DISEASES.

CHOLERA

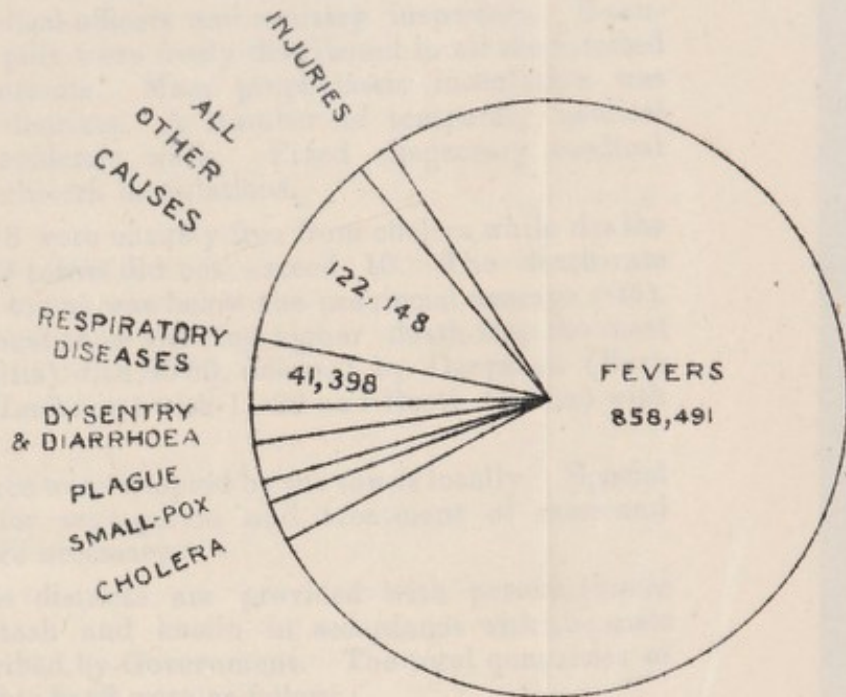
2. During the year 1939, deaths from cholera numbered 27,732 against 70,622 in 1938. The rate per mille of the population for the two years was respectively ·57 and 1·46 and the mean for the previous 5 years was ·52. The maximum number of deaths, viz. 7,052 occurred in August and the minimum, viz. 55 in February.

3. In 8 districts the mortality rate was far above the provincial average (·57). Bara Banki with a death-rate of 5·36 was the most conspicuous. It was followed by Bahraich with 2·27, Lucknow with 1·93, Kheri with 1·78 and Ghazipur with 1·53. The districts showing the lowest mortality rates from cholera were Dehra Dun and Naini Tal (·01), Meerut ·02, Moradabad ·03, Bijaor ·04 and Saharanpur, Muttra and Etah ·05.

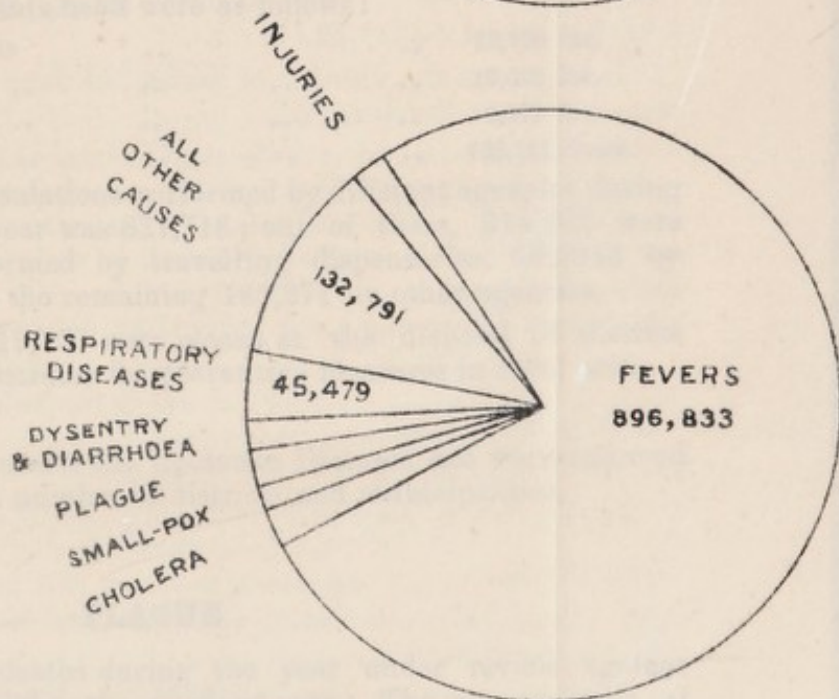
4. In rural areas deaths during 1939 aggregated 25,289 with a death-rate of ·59 as compared with 66,667 and 1·55, respectively, in 1938. The highest mortality was reported from Bara Banki (5·55), followed by Lucknow (2·65), Bahraich (2·34) and Kheri (1·83).

1939 AND FOR MEAN 1934-1938

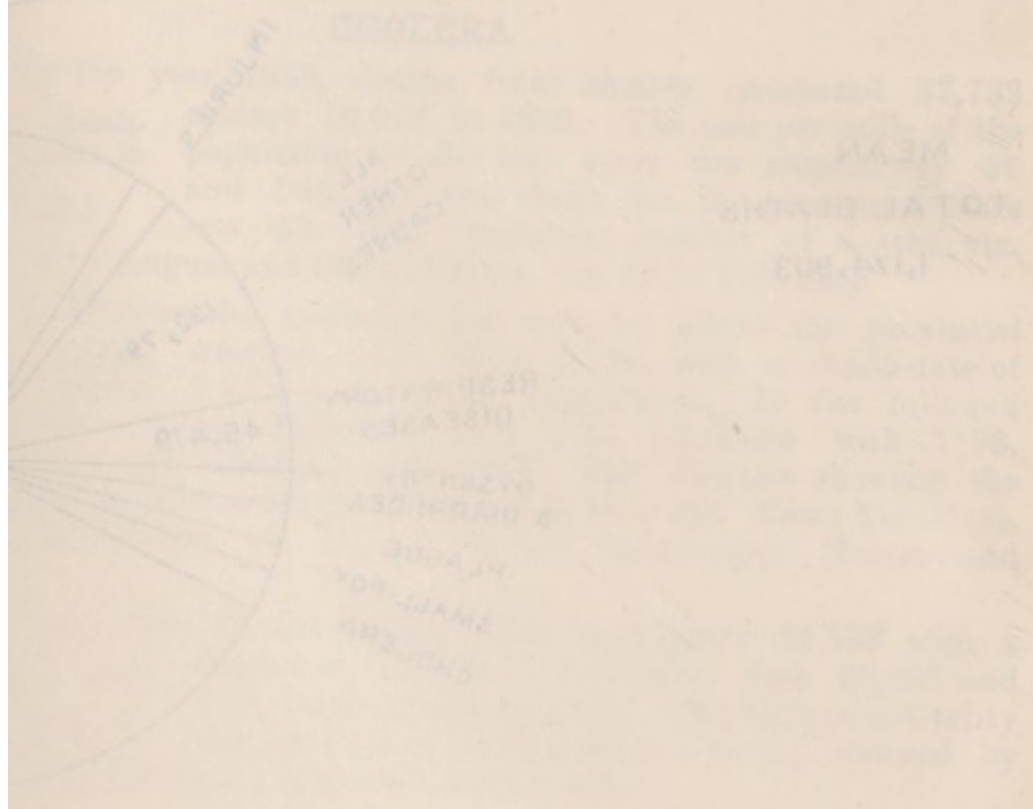

Vigorous anti-cholera measures were taken in all the infected areas. Permanganation of wells was carried out through the revenue staff, rural development organization, public health staff and local workers wherever available. A large number of epidemic coolies was engaged for permanganation of wells. Owing to water scarcity and silting up of wells in some districts the problem of control of cholera was more difficult. A special grant was made to the District Board of Agra for cleansing of wells and for anti-malarial measures necessitated by floods. Disinfection of infected houses, patients' vomits and excreta, was carried out under the direction of epidemic medical officers and sanitary inspectors. Essential oils mixture and cholera pills were freely distributed in all the infected areas for the treatment of patients. Mass prophylactic inoculation was given free in all the infected districts. A number of temporary medical officers was recruited for epidemic work. Fixed dispensary medical officers also carried out anti-cholera inoculations.

5. Out of 442 towns, 278 were entirely free from cholera while deaths in 109 towns did not exceed 10. The death-rate in 78 towns was below the provincial average (.45).
 Cholera in urban areas.
 (Statement VI-B.) Amongst those showing higher death-rate the most conspicuous were Bairia (Ballia) with 30.80, followed by Daryabad (Bara Banki) with 14.59, Kakori (Lucknow) with 11.99 and Reoti (Ballia) with 10.75.

Active preventive measures were adopted by the towns locally. Special arrangements were made for segregation and treatment of cases and extra staff was engaged where necessary.

Under this scheme all the districts are provided with permanganate of potash and kaolin in accordance with the scale prescribed by Government. The total quantities of the drugs consumed under this head were as follows:

1. Potassium permanganate	72,190 lbs.
2. Kaolin	19,650 lbs.
3. Essential Oils mixture	2,277 lbs.
4. Anti-cholera vaccine	736,111 doses.

The total number of inoculations performed by different agencies during the year was 821,716; out of these, 374,402 were performed by travelling dispensaries, 262,043 by the district health staff and the remaining 185,271 by other agencies.

Grants aggregating Rs.19,750 were placed at the disposal of district magistrates for preventive measures in rural areas.

PLAGUE

6. There were 21,662 deaths during the year under review against 13,436 in the previous year. The rate per mille of the population for the two years was respectively .45 and .28 and the mean for previous 5 years was .48.
 Deaths and death-rates from plague in the Province.

March was the month of maximum mortality (7,086) and July of minimum (35).

7. The highest mortality was noticed in the Azamgarh district where the death-rate was 2.83. This was followed by Jaunpur with a death-rate of 2.76, Gorakhpur with 1.98, Basti with 1.28 and Benares with .98. The districts of Dehra Dun, Bulandshahr, all districts in Agra, Rohilkhand (except Budaun), Kumaun, Lucknow and Allahabad divisions (except Allahabad) and Jalaun, Banda, Gonda, Bahraich and Bara Banki districts were entirely free from plague. The number of deaths reported from Meerut, Budaun and Partabgarh was too small to yield a ratio.

8. The total number of deaths in towns was 1,677 in 1939, showing a death-rate of .31. The highest mortality was noticed in Mehndawal (Basti) 24.59, followed by Lar (Gorakhpur) 22.00, Atraulia (Azamgarh) 19.40 and Sahatwar (Ballia) 19.12.

In 14 towns the number of deaths did not exceed 10 while 406 towns were free from the disease.

9. The total number of deaths in rural districts was 19,985 in 1939, showing a mortality-rate of .46. Of the rural districts returning the highest mortality Azamgarh headed the list with 2.93, followed by Jaunpur with 2.80, Gorakhpur with 1.96 and Benares with 1.18. No mortality was reported from the rural areas of 32 districts.

The total number of inoculations performed during the year was 262,843 of which 105,303 were performed by travelling dispensaries, 104,423 by district health staff and the remaining 53,117 by other agencies.

Evacuation is gradually becoming more popular with the masses. They have begun to realize its importance but are reluctant to resort to it until it is absolutely necessary. Rs.10,147 were placed at the disposal of the district magistrates for anti-plague measures.

Anti-rat campaign was carried out in 19 districts, 31 municipalities and 2 notified areas.

Rat destruction.

Rat destruction was carried out chiefly by poisonous baiting and cyanogas fumigation. The latter was specially recommended for adoption during epidemics as it had the advantage of killing both the rats and fleas while the former kills only the rats. This method was accordingly used largely as a disinsectisation measure in infected houses. Poisonous baiting with barium carbonate and trapping were also done in endemic centres. Grants amounting to Rs.3,100 were made for anti-rat campaign including cyanogas fumigation.

An intensive fumigation scheme with cyanogas was launched in Bansgaon, Deoria and Sadar tahsils of the Gorakhpur district. This scheme worked for a period of eight months and had to be discontinued owing to the restricted supply of calcid briquettes, a German product.

An experimental intensive fumigation scheme was also carried out in Bansgaon under the supervision of an expert, Mr. T. J. Lever, deputed by Messrs. Chemdyes Ltd., Bombay, in a compact area with a view chiefly to train a squad of disinfecting coolies and the sanitary inspectors of the district. Mr. Lever carried out the campaign for over a month. The Assistant Medical Officer of Health, Bansgaon, was put in immediate charge of the scheme. In addition to the seven sanitary inspectors of the district, four from Azamgarh and three from Jaunpur were also trained.

Owing to limited supply of calcid only infected houses and huts in severely affected areas were treated with cyanogas fumigation method in addition to those villages which had been badly affected for the last three years or were foci for the spread of the disease to the neighbouring villages. The general apathy of the public to such campaigns still remains to be overcome.

Temporary epidemic regulations to control the spread of plague were enforced where necessary.

SMALLPOX

10. The total number of deaths during 1939 was 10,205 as compared with 4,411 in 1938. The death rates for the two years were, respectively, .21 and .09 and the quinquennial average .26. The deaths among infants under one year of age were 2,820, between the ages of one to ten years, 3,582, and the rest among adults. Like last year the highest mortality, 2,055, occurred in May and the lowest, 134, in October. (A separate note on vaccination is contained in Chapter XIII of the report.)

11. Like last year, the district of Bulandshahr returned the highest mortality .95, followed by Saharanpur and Aligarh with a death rate of .82. The number of deaths reported from the districts of Kheri and Partabgarh was too small to yield a ratio, while Allahabad and Bara Banki returned a death rate of .01 each.

12. Out of 442 towns, 197 reported mortality from this cause. The total number of deaths reported during 1939 was 2,795 with a death-rate of .51 as compared to 1,167 with a death-rate of .21, respectively, in 1938. The highest mortality was recorded in Amanpur (Etah), Kauriagarj (Aligarh), Rampur (Saharanpur), Sahawar (Etah) with respective death-rates of 21.97, 16.14, 14.27 and 12.36.

13. During the year under report 7,410 deaths occurred in the rural Smallpox in rural tracts as compared with 3,244 deaths in 1938. The areas. death-rates for these years were '17 and '07, respectively.

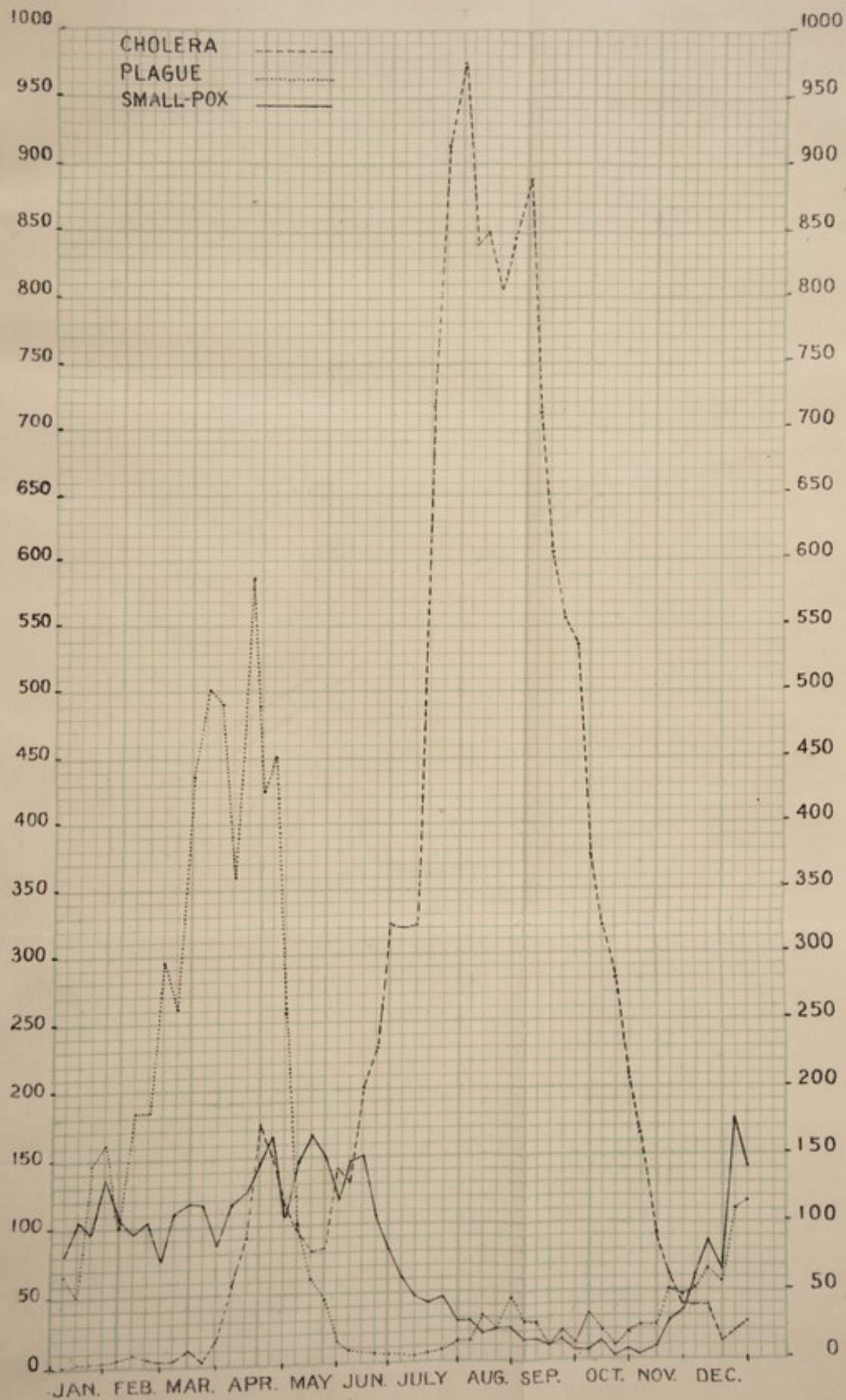
(Statement VI-A.) Like last year, Bulandshahr with a death-rate of '90 stood first and was followed by Meerut, Saharanpur and Aligarh with '71, '59 and '58, respectively. One district was immune from the disease while in 8 districts the number of deaths due to smallpox did not exceed 10. The lowest death-rate ('01) was recorded in Naini Tal and Gonda. Muttra, Pilibhit, Hamirpur, Benares and Sitapur recorded a uniform death rate of '02.

14. As stated in previous reports there are no regular smallpox hospitals in these provinces. In the sub-joined Smallpox hospitals. table are given particulars of the patients treated in the infectious diseases hospitals where such exist or in the hospitals with infectious diseases wards :

DEATHS REGISTERED FROM CHOLERA, PLAGUE AND SMALL-POX DURING THE LAST TEN YEARS.

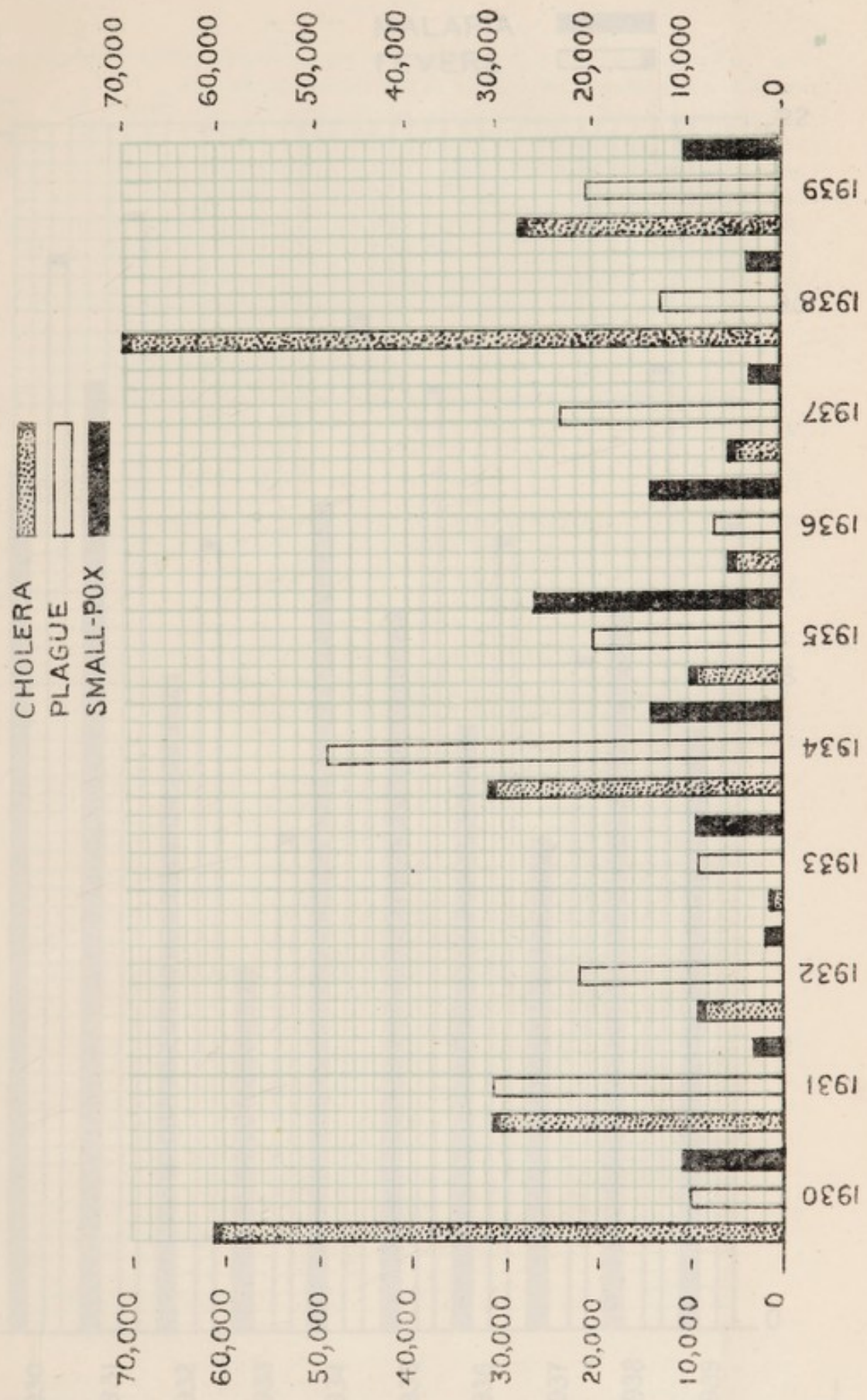
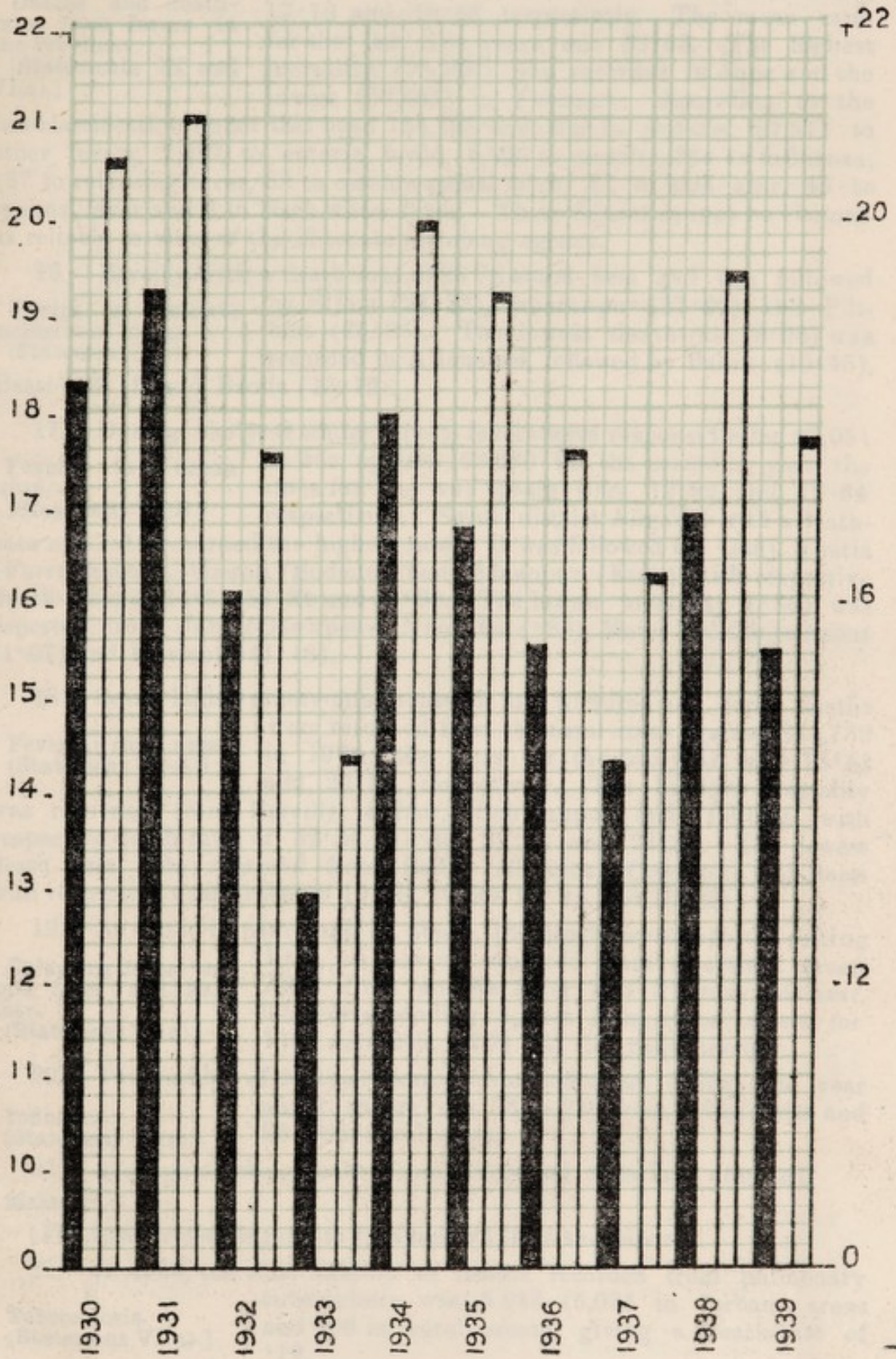


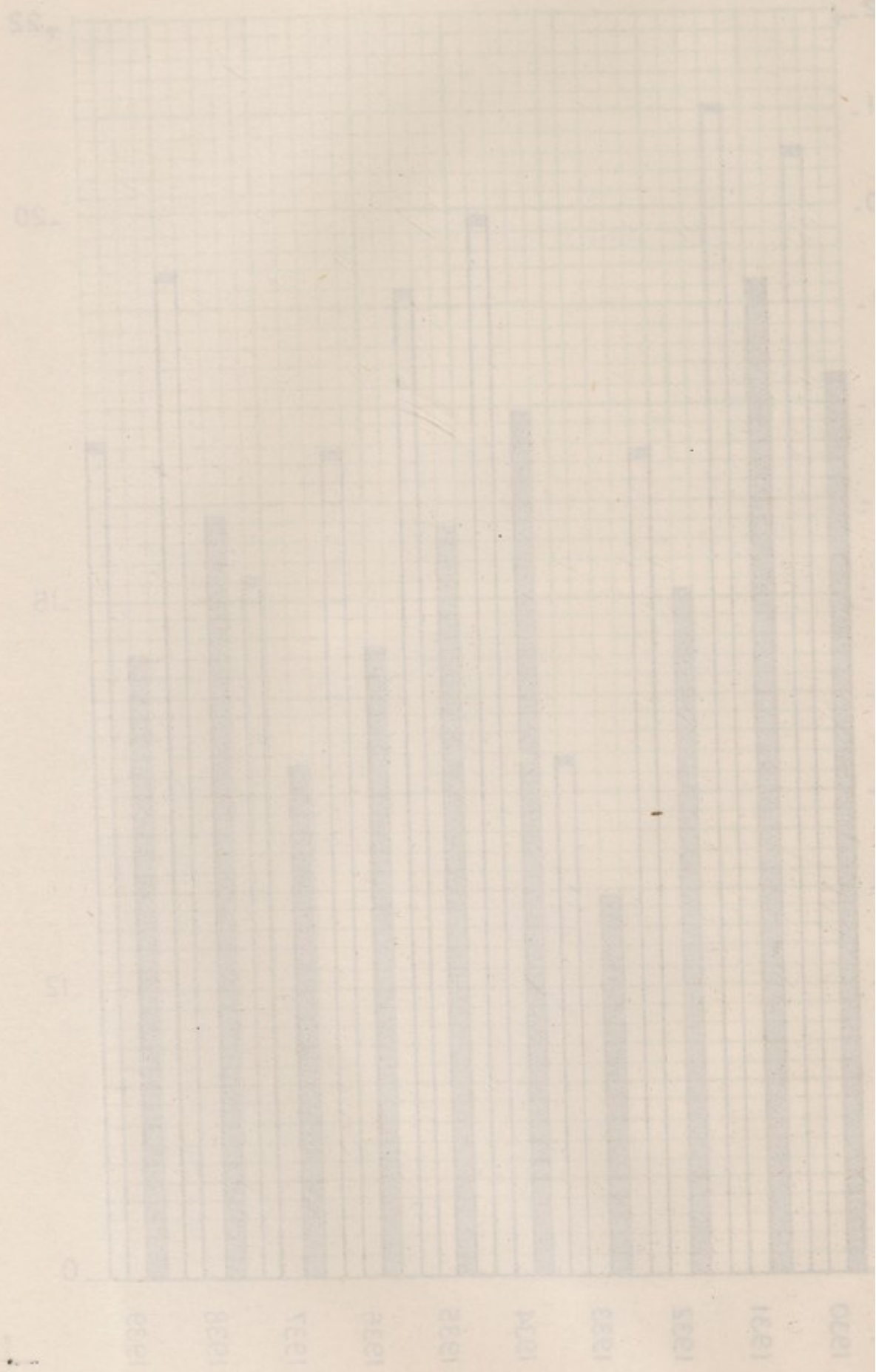
CHART SHOWING MORTALITY RATE FROM

15. During 1939, fevers were responsible for 858,491 deaths as against 940,469 in 1938, the death-rates being 17.73 and 19.43 respectively. The mean ratio for the last five years was 18.53. The highest mortality (78,763) was recorded in June and the lowest (58,405) in February. According to the sub-classification under this head 754,168 were due to malaria, 91,571 to other fevers, 7,367 to enteric fever, 4,596 to measles, 384 to influenza, 187 to relapsing fever, 89 to cerebro-spinal fever, 81 to kala azar, 45 to typhus fever and 3 to black water fever. These figures cannot be claimed as reliable in view of the illiterate reporting agency.

16. Bareilly with a death-rate of 28.76 stood first and was followed by Bijnor (28.23), Saharanpur (27.02) and Pilibhit (26.23). The lowest death-rate (9.98) was recorded in Allahabad, followed by Ballia (10.45), Basti (13.11) and Banda (13.12).

17. During the year under report, fevers were responsible for 67,051 deaths against 68,680 in the preceding year, the rates for the two years were 12.32 and 12.64 respectively. Sasni (district Aligarh) with a death-rate of 83.10 returned the highest rate. It was followed by Ganj Thatia (Farrukhabad), Gawan (Budaun) and Amanpur (Etah) with respective death-rates of 64.33, 53.34 and 50.32. The lowest mortality (.50) was reported from Juhi (Cawnpore), Naini Tal (.88), Naini Tal Cantonment (1.07) and Mussoorie (1.18).

18. Seven lakhs, ninety-one thousand, four hundred and forty deaths were returned from the rural areas against 871,789 in 1938; the rates for the two years were 18.42 and 20.29, respectively. The highest mortality was returned from Bareilly, Bijnor, Saharanpur and Pilibhit with respective death-rates of 32.54, 31.88, 29.60 and 28.31. The lowest death-rates were returned from Ballia, Allahabad, Cawnpore and Basti with respective death-rates of 10.69, 10.90, 12.45 and 13.25.

19. As stated in paragraph 15 above, 187 deaths were reported during 1939, as having occurred from relapsing fever, 7,367 from enteric fever and 81 from kala azar. The corresponding figures from these causes for 1938 were 249, 8,709 and 155, respectively.

20. The number of deaths reported from influenza during the year under report was 384 - 288 from urban areas and 96 from rural areas.

22. In 1939, the total number of deaths recorded from pulmonary tuberculosis was 5,643 (5,035 in urban areas and 608 in rural areas), giving a death-rate of .12.

The number of deaths recorded from tuberculosis of joints was 190 (84 from urban areas and 106 from rural areas.)

The number of deaths recorded from other tubercular diseases was 1,814 (1,285 in urban areas and 529 in rural areas.)

DYSENTERY AND DIARRHOEA

23. During 1939, dysentery and diarrhoea were responsible for 17,962 deaths, representing a death-rate of $\cdot 37$. The corresponding figures for the preceding year were 21,015 and $\cdot 43$ respectively and the mean ratio for the previous five years ($\cdot 37$). The highest mortality (2,643) was reported in August and the lowest (771) in February.

Deaths and death-rates from dysentery and diarrhoea in the Province.
(Statement X.)

24. Garhwal as usual reported the highest mortality with a death rate of $3\cdot 68$. It was followed by Moradabad (1 \cdot 53), Dehra Dun (1 \cdot 42) and Benares 1 \cdot 14). Lowest mortality was noticed in Mainpuri, Basti and Sultanpur with respective death-rates of $\cdot 01$, $\cdot 03$ and $\cdot 04$.

Dysentery and diarrhoea in districts inclusive of towns.
(Statement X.)

25. During 1939, the mortality recorded under this head was 12,682 with a death-rate of $2\cdot 33$ against 14,168 and $2\cdot 61$, respectively, in 1938. Of the towns showing the highest death-rate, Pauri (district Garhwal) topped the list, the death-rate being $22\cdot 20$, Afzalgarh (district Bijnor) stood second with a death-rate of $13\cdot 42$. High death-rates were also recorded in Hapur (district Meerut) ($8\cdot 20$), and Srinagar (Garhwal) ($7\cdot 90$). The lowest death-rate ($\cdot 08$) was returned from Jais (district Rae Bareilly) followed by Khekra (district Meerut), Bareilly and Allahabad Cantonments and Sherpur (district Ghazipur) with a death-rate of $\cdot 10$ each.

Dysentery and diarrhoea in urban areas.
(Statement VI-B.)

26. These diseases claimed 5,280 deaths in 1939 and 6,847 in 1938, the death-rates for these years being $\cdot 12$ and $\cdot 16$ respectively. Of the districts recording the highest mortality, the first was Garhwal ($3\cdot 65$), followed by Almora, Dehra Dun and Moradabad with respective death-rates of $\cdot 94$, $\cdot 82$ and $\cdot 55$. The lowest mortality was returned from the districts of Budaun, Shahjahanpur, Cawnpore, Jhansi, Jalaun, Jaunpur, Basti, Kheri and Gonda with a uniform death-rate of $\cdot 01$.

Dysentery and diarrhoea in rural areas.
(Statement VI-A.)

RESPIRATORY DISEASES

27. These diseases were responsible for 41,398 deaths during the year under review as compared with 46,957 in the preceding year. The death-rates for the two years and the mean for the previous five years were $\cdot 85$, $\cdot 97$ and $\cdot 94$, respectively. The highest number of deaths 4,600 was recorded in January and the lowest (2,942) in October.

Deaths and death-rates from respiratory diseases in the Province
(Statement XI.)

28. As usual, Hamirpur with a death-rate of $5\cdot 74$ stood first. It was followed by Dehra Dun ($3\cdot 71$), Agra ($3\cdot 19$) and Lucknow ($3\cdot 12$). The lowest death-rate ($\cdot 04$) was recorded in the district of Sultanpur, followed by Partabgarh, Kheri, Bahraich and Basti with $\cdot 06$ each.

Respiratory diseases in districts inclusive of towns
(Statement XI.)

29. The total number of deaths from these diseases in towns during the year was 32,761 against 37,218 in the preceding year, the death-rates for the two years being $6\cdot 02$ and $6\cdot 85$, respectively. Muttra returned the

highest mortality (17·05). Then in order came Jhalu (district Bijnor), 16·60, Konch (district Jalaun), 15·58 and Agra 14·36. The town recording the lowest mortality (·08) from these causes was Mubarakpur (district Azamgarh), followed by Kairana (district Muzaffarnagar), Allahabad Cantonment, Gahmar and Sherpur (district Ghazipur) with a death-rate of ·10 each.

30. These diseases were responsible for 8,637 deaths during 1939 with a death-rate of ·20 against 9,739 and ·23, respectively, in 1938. Hamirpur, as usual, returned the highest mortality (5·76), followed by Moradabad (1·33), Dehra Dun (1·15) and Garhwal (1·14).

CEREBRO-SPINAL MENINGITIS

31. During 1939, deaths from this disease aggregated 89 against 84 in the preceding year. 83 of these were reported from 21 towns and six from five rural districts. Mortality was most conspicuous in the towns of Benares (16), Cawnpore (13), and Agra and Karwi (Banda) (12 each).

Majority of deaths were reported in persons between 5 to 35 years of age. Children under one year and persons over 50 years were least affected. It was noticed that no particular community had special predilection to the disease. Females were comparatively less affected than males.

Serum treatment was given to the patients admitted in civil hospitals and the usual preventive measures were adopted to check the spread of the disease. These measures included,

- (1) Removal of patients to the nearest hospitals.
- (2) Disinfection of infected houses and fomites.
- (3) Exposure of clothes, beddings and furniture, etc. of the infected houses to the Sun daily and to avoid over-crowding in the house and unnecessary worry.
- (4) Use of potassium permanganate lotion by contacts for gargling of throats and washing of the nose.
- (5) Watering of roads and paties to keep the dust down.
- (6) Distribution of leaflets and delivering of lectures, explaining preventive measures against the disease.
- (7) The proprietors of cinemas were advised to avoid over-crowding and to keep the doors and windows open during shows.
- (8) Particular attention was paid to general cleanliness of the infected areas.

EPIDEMIC DROPSY

32. During 1939, only 29 deaths were reported from this disease against 90 in the preceding year. Of these 22 were reported from 9 towns and seven from five rural districts. The largest number of deaths (8) was reported from the Benares city.

All the cases were treated either in the infectious diseases hospitals or at the fixed dispensaries.

Necessary preventive measures were taken to check the spread of the disease. These measures included :

(1) Distribution of leaflets, putting up of posters at prominent places and cinema shows giving broad outlines of the disease and general methods to prevent it. These measures were also published in local newspapers in some cases.

(2) People were advised to exclude rice and mustard oil from their diet and take plenty of green vegetables and fruits.

(3) Advice for proper medicinal treatment of patients in hospitals.

INJURIES

33. Eighteen thousand, four hundred and eleven deaths were recorded under this head during 1939, of which 1,499 were due to suicides, 12,961 to wounds or accidents, 3,718 to snake-bites or wild beasts and 233 to rabies.

Deaths from several minor causes in the province.
(Statement VI.)

34. In 1939, 3,557 deaths were returned under the head injuries. Of these 135 were due to suicides, 3,134 to wounds or accidents, 201 to snake-bites or wild animals and 67 from rabies.

Deaths from several minor causes in towns.
(Statement VI-B.)

35. The total number of deaths under this head in 1939 in the case of rural tracts was 14,854, (i.e. 1,344 from suicides, 9,827 from wounds or accidents, 3,517 from snake-bites or wild beasts and 166 from rabies).

Deaths from several minor causes in rural areas.
(Statement VI A.)

(Further details are available in Statement VI).

ALL OTHER CAUSES

36. The deaths on this account were 122,148 in 1939, yielding a death-rate of 2.52 against 132,906 and 2.74, respectively, in the preceding year.

Deaths and death-rates under the heading "All other causes" in the Province
(Statement VI.)

37. In 1939 deaths under "All other causes" in towns numbered 46,211 with a death-rate of 8.49 as compared with 47,617 and 8.76, respectively, in 1938.

38. In 1939, the deaths in the rural districts from "All other causes" were 75,937 and the death-rate 1.77 against 85,289 and 1.98, respectively, in 1938.

39. In 1939, altogether 2,230 deaths were recorded as having occurred in the province from child birth (1,710 in towns and 520 in rural areas) against 2,274 deaths in 1938 (1,665 in urban and 609 in rural areas).

CHAPTER IV EPIDEMIOLOGY

The charge of this branch was held by me up to November 14, 1939, in addition to my duties of Assistant Director of Public Health, Malariology, and is still held by me in addition to my duties.

The arrangement according to which 20 assistant medical officers of health were withdrawn from their fixed charges in districts early in the year and were placed on reserve for epidemic work, eventually failed to show any economy. On the other hand their absence from fixed charges militated against satisfactory public health and anti-epidemic measures in all public health units to which they were originally attached. The scheme was therefore given up and the officers were again restored to their posts in October, 1939. The employment of 20 temporary medical officers for epidemic duty was again authorized by the Government by the close of the year.

2. The number of travelling dispensaries at the beginning of the year was the same as in the preceding one ; namely 32. Of these 26 were public health, three district board, one forest and two Tarai and Bhabar estates travelling dispensaries. The travelling dispensary maintained by the District Board, Muttra, was abolished from June 6, 1939. Each district board contributes the usual amount of Rs.1,000 per annum towards the up-keep of its travelling dispensary and the rest of the cost is borne by Government, while the Forest Department and Tarai and Bhabar estates maintain travelling dispensaries at their own cost.

Four reserve travelling dispensaries were mobilized during the year. Of these three were posted at Budaun, Shahjahanpur and Bareilly in connexion with fairs for short periods and one was posted at Ramnagar (Naini Tal) for six months to render medical aid, undertake anti-epidemic measures and to look after the sanitation of the pilgrim route to Badrinath and Kedarnath and from Mohan to Ramnagar and the neighbouring villages. After the pilgrim season was over this travelling dispensary was deputed to Kashipur tahsil for control of malaria.

The activities of the district board travelling dispensaries are confined to their respective districts and the forest and Tarai and Bhabar estates travelling dispensaries work in the departmental areas concerned, while the provincial public health travelling dispensaries are mobile units for work in connexion with epidemics, fairs, medical inspection of passengers, and normally to afford medical relief in the interior of rural areas, to help in rural uplift work, to carry out health propaganda and to execute village sanitary measures, such as removal of manure heaps outside the abadi. These units visited 6,149 villages, treated 196,764 patients and performed 105,303 anti-plague and 3,74,402 anti-cholera inoculations.

3. As usual the agency of the travelling dispensaries was utilized for free distribution of literature dealing with prevention of epidemic disease in the interior of rural areas, and especially during fairs, public gatherings and epidemics.

4. During the year 1939, 289 new village medicine chests were supplied and their replenishment was made according to the indents received from the various districts. The total number of medicine chests at present operating in the rural development villages of the 48 districts is 4,289. These chests are very popular with the villagers and of considerable help in giving relief for minor ailments in rural areas.

CHAPTER V.

FAIRS AND FESTIVALS.

The most important fair of the year was the Magh Mela held at Allahabad which lasted from January 4 to February 4, 1939. The Assistant Director of Public Health, II Range, held charge of the medical and sanitary arrangements of the fair. The fair passed off without the outbreak of an infectious disease.

2. The Assistant Director of Public Health, I Range, inspected the sanitary and medical arrangements of the Dikhauti fairs at Hardwar and Rikhikesh, the Piran Kaliar fair (Saharanpur), the Nauchandi fair (Meerut), the Chaubari fair (Bareilly), and the Batesar fair (Agra) and supervised those of the Lunar Eclipse fair at Hardwar and the Garhmuktesar fair (Meerut). The Assistant Director of Public Health, II Range, supervised the arrangements of the Nauratri fair (Mirzapur), the Sawan Jhula fair (Ajodhya), the Dadri fair (Ballia), the Syed Salar fair (Bahraich), the Etawah exhibition, and the Dewa fair (Bara Banki). Other smaller fairs were supervised and controlled by the local health staff.

3. Three cases of small-pox were reported from the Dikhauti fair and two from the Mahabarni fair both held at Hardwar. Ten imported cases of cholera and one local with two deaths were reported from the Ram Naumi fair, two imported cases (both cured) from the Sawan Jhula fair and one from the Kartiki fair all held at Ajodhya (district Fyzabad). Twenty cases of cholera with 8 deaths were reported from the Dadri fair (Ballia). A few cases of cholera were also reported from the Sawan Jhula fair at Gola (Kheri district). Other fairs and religious gatherings held in the province passed off without any epidemic.

4. These gatherings were, as usual, availed of by the Hygiene Publicity Bureau for public health propaganda through magic lantern lectures, cinema demonstrations and through the exhibition of models and posters and distribution of leaflets on epidemic and other diseases. In places where direct attention by the bureau could not be given, the local public health officers took similar action. The departmental efforts in this respect were generally appreciated by the public. In some fairs baby shows were also held.

5. In addition to other measures necessary to protect public health on occasions of large gatherings medical inspection of the pilgrims at important railway stations was undertaken in connection with the large fairs. Temporary regulations under the Epidemic Diseases Act were also enforced wherever necessary and expedient.

CHAPTER VI

URBAN SANITATION (INCLUDING NOTIFIED AREAS) AND
MUNICIPAL WATER-SUPPLIES.

There has been no change in the number of municipal medical officers of health which continued to be thirty four as usual. Medical officers of health. District medical officers of health were appointed in the districts of Budaun, Shahjahanpur and Jhansi. These will function as *ex officio* medical officers of health for smaller municipal towns and notified areas in those districts.

2. The sanitary conditions of towns are regularly inspected by the officers of the Public Health Department and the local authorities are advised for improvements. Sanitary conditions in municipal towns. Instances are, however, not wanting in which such recommendations are not met with adequate response for financial and other reasons with the result that insanitary conditions continue. Public is now awakening to the needs of public health and a higher standard of sanitation is demanded. It is hoped that the local authorities would feel likewise and make serious attempts to carry out the recommendations made for improvement of sanitation. Surface cleanliness, drainage, disposal of rubbish and nightsoil, water-supply arrangements and provision of an infectious diseases hospital for reception and treatment of infectious cases are matters of primary responsibility for local authorities. The municipalities of Aligarh, Saharanpur, Agra, Pilibhit, Mirzapur, Jaunpur, Ghazipur, Gorakhpur, Fyzabad, Kalpi and Tanda do not appear to be sufficiently alive to their responsibility in this direction.

3. Owing to the operations of the Improvement Trusts at Lucknow, Cawnpore and Allahabad, the demand for better housing in urban areas. housing conditions has to some extent been met in these places so far as residences for the better classes are concerned. There is however, a great demand for cheap sanitary dwellings to meet the requirements of the poorer sections of the community.

Nearly all the towns in the province are now growing rapidly, both in extent and population. The demand for houses and for building sites is thus increasing. The question of the formation of Improvement Trusts for Agra and Benares has been under consideration for some time. When they are formed, they should be greatly instrumental in improving housing conditions in these congested cities. Municipal boards can, however, in the ordinary exercise of their powers under the building regulations, and by making suitable use of section 222 of the United Provinces Municipalities Act, gradually improve housing conditions in places where separate Improvement Trusts cannot be formed. This section empowers boards to regulate the alignment of existing streets where these may be faulty, without resorting to wholesale demolitions.

Generally the old houses in the urban areas are lacking in proper ventilation and sanitation arrangements. The new houses are being constructed now according to sanitary requirements. In towns with medical officers of health plans of buildings are generally sent to them for

opinion, though this is not the case in all the municipalities. In Agra, and Hathras there are no building byelaws and this is a great handicap in the construction of proper sanitary houses.

4. Statements showing the results of the chemical and bacteriological analyses of water-supplies in the United Provinces for the year 1939-40 were prepared at the Provincial Hygiene Institute and submitted to the Board of Public Health, United Provinces, as usual. In the appended table are given particulars in regard to the daily consumption of water, analytical results, etc. of the existing water-supplies during 1939-40.

As usual, in nearly all the towns with piped water-supplies, water analysis was carried on by the medical officers of health in municipal laboratories. But for control purposes samples of water were also examined at the Provincial Hygiene Institute chemically and bacteriologically during the hot, rainy and cold seasons.

The classification of the various water-supplies according to the percentage of samples that came up to the standard during 1939-40 on the results of examinations carried out by municipal medical officers of health showed that more than 80 per cent. results came up to the standard in Fatehpur Sikri, Mussoorie, Agra, Cawnpore, Hardwar, Dehra Dun, Unao, Fyzabad, Benares and Aligarh.

Group II showing more than 50 per cent. and less than 80 per cent. of results up to the standard consisted of Hathras, Allahabad, and Lucknow (chlorinated), Meerut, Kosi, Aligarh, Moradabad (unchlorinated) and Naini Tal (chlorinated and unchlorinated).

Group III showing less than 50 per cent. results up to the standard comprised of Jaunpur (chlorinated), Muttra, Mirzapur, Hathras, Haldwani, Cawnpore, Almora, Ghazipur, Lucknow, Bhowali, and Gola Gokaranath (unchlorinated) and Jhansi (chlorinated and unchlorinated).

5. Samples of water from important railway stations and pilgrim centres were examined bacteriologically at the commencement of and during the fairs and at the time of the prevalence of epidemic of cholera in the districts. Results of analyses carried out by the railway medical officers were, as usual, scrutinised at the Provincial Hygiene Institute and necessary recommendations to improve the water-supplies at these stations were made to the railway authorities.

CHAPTER VII

RURAL SANITATION

The health service was extended to Budaun, Shahjahanpur and Jhansi districts during the year and the existing staff in the Garhwal district was expanded. This brings the number of districts under the rural health service to 37. Appendix B to this report contains a summary of the more important activities of the district health staff during the year 1939.

Construction of manure pits is one of the important activities and it is practised in all districts with varying degree of success. In Benares 2,649 such pits were made, in Bulandshahr 2,364, in Bahraich 1,569 and in Gorakhpur 1,097.

3. The rural development organization paid particular attention to improvement of village water supplies. The amount provided for the purpose in the budget of that organization for the year 1939-40 was Rs.3 lakhs out of the Government of India's grant for rural development to which the provincial Government added Rs.34,000. In areas where the sub-soil water level was high, hand-pumps offered a cheap method of ensuring the supply of pure drinking water. In the Gorakhpur district, 231 wells were bored and 738 were sunk. In Moradabad 21 hand-pumps were installed. In the Tarai and Bhabar area of the Naini Tal district, 20 hand pumps were installed, besides 146 in the previous year. In the Chaiti mela area of Kashipur in the Naini Tal district an artesian well was constructed at a cost of Rs.1,561 from funds collected by the people and grants given by the district board and the board of public health.

It is a matter for regret that the model byelaws framed by Government many years ago to regulate the future construction of wells in villages have not been adopted by many district boards and are not fully enforced by others, with the result that the new wells are still being constructed on the same insanitary lines as in the past.

4. The reports for the years 1937 and 1938 gave some account of the attempts made to popularise the use of latrines and urinals in villages. Borers for the construction of bored hole latrines were obtained in some districts. The matter in most districts is still in the nature of experiment and further advance has, therefore, been restricted.

5. The following extract from the report of the district medical officer of health of Partabgarh gives a true picture of Rural housing conditions in the villages of the United Provinces, and the difficulties in the way of improving them on sanitary lines :

“ The housing conditions in rural areas are far from satisfactory chiefly due to poverty and ignorance and partly due to illiteracy. The houses of poor people are generally small, single-storeyed and enclosed with mud walls. The roofing is generally lower and consists of country made tiles of the crude type. In some cases the roofing is thatched. The absence of chimneys prevents the smoke from escaping. Houses are generally ill-ventilated, dirty, damp and surrounded with rank vegetation. Arrangements for stores, kitchen, residential rooms and cattle-byres are most unsatisfactory. No latrines are constructed inside the houses and either fields, or barren lands near the houses are used for satisfying calls of nature.

In densely populated villages, houses are generally built close together in an irregular manner, leaving narrow spaces to be used as shelter for protection in case of dacoity. The streets are very narrow and unpaved, without any drains or conservancy arrangement.

The houses of well-to-do men are also ill-ventilated, though they can afford to have windows in their houses. They do not provide windows in their houses for fear of thieves. Where the houses are two-storeyed, the upper portion is used for storing grains, etc. and the lower portion is utilized for residential purposes. To strengthen the walls of the lower storey, additional outer wall is also made, so that the thickness of the wall is doubly increased. Thus any attempt to open windows in rooms of the lower storey is of no value. To add to this, there is a common custom of tethering cattle within residential houses for fear of theft and this makes the house still more filthy.”

From the above account it will be seen how difficult it is to secure improvement. However, the following measures are being adopted by the public health staff, where conditions permit, for improving the existing housing conditions :

- (i) well-to-do persons are persuaded to provide openings and windows in their houses at their own cost ;
- (ii) round openings of 9 inches diameter in the upper portion of *kachcha* walls at suitable places are advised for lighting and ventilation ;
- (iii) the removal of rank vegetation surrounding houses is advised ;
- (iv) the construction of soakage pits is advised, and many such pits are actually constructed. The subsequent upkeep of such pits varies according to local conditions (e.g. availability of sweepers and the extent to which the higher castes would by local custom agree to clean their own pits) ;
- (v) separation of cattle-sheds from dwellings is advised, with some success.

More definite results can be achieved if district boards could frame bye laws to regulate the construction of dwellings on simple sanitary lines and the alignment of village roads or paths on which they abut.

From the report of the rural development department for the year 1939, it appears that people are being persuaded by the staff of that department also to improve their housing conditions, and that over 26,000 ventilators were made, and about 1,160 model houses constructed. It is believed that with an improvement in their economic condition, people will do more and more in this direction.

6. The Health Unit in Partabgarh continued to function during the year. The Government gave a non-recurring grant to continue its activities during 1939-40, and have made provision for a recurring grant from 1940-41. The following summary from the detailed report of this activity will be of interest.

In addition to the usual agency available in all villages of the province, those in the health unit have the additional advantage of house-to-house visits by medical officers and sanitary inspectors. The midwives reported all births in their areas, and the health visitors reported maternal and infant deaths. Secretaries of health leagues, junior Red Cross counsellors and village aiders also recorded vital statistics. As the result of this, vital statistics are much more accurate in the health unit area than in the rest of the district. The following comparative table will show the exact difference.

Except for one imported and one indigenous case of smallpox in the year, the area in the unit was free from smallpox—a tribute to the high degree of protection afforded by the vaccination campaign. The total number of re-vaccination operations done was 10,376 and it was possible to revaccinate whole villages even in the absence of smallpox in the neighbourhood.

Out of total births in the health unit area, 46.26 per cent. were attended by the maternity staff. Infant mortality rate among cases conducted by this staff was 46.48 per thousand births against 195.49 conducted by the village (untrained) dais.

Detailed medical inspection of scholars was carried out by the two medical officers who, besides the medical officer in charge of the unit form part of the regular staff. Stress was laid on the practice of health habits. "Cleanliness days" were observed and nail-cutting drills and teeth cleaning parades were held. Soap was prepared in three village schools

under the guidance of the medical officer incharge of the health unit and boys were taught the method of cleansing their dirty clothes by the soap so manufactured. Members of junior Red Cross groups helped in anti-epidemic measures, anti-rat campaign, and sanitary works in and outside their schools.

The purpose of the health unit is not merely to carry out sound health work of all types in a selected area, but also to have a rural station in the province where it may be possible to carry out, under proper supervision and guidance, investigation, experiments and researches on public health problems, besides epidemiological studies, special surveys and large-scale immunisation schemes. The unit has thus been a training centre where all grades of public health personnel and also officers of other departments engaged in rural welfare work received practical training. Ever since the establishment of the unit in 1932, a large number of workers visited the same for the study of specific questions.

The medical officer incharge and staff of the health unit gave lectures, demonstrations and training to—

- (i) 90 supervisors undergoing training at the Partabgarh Agriculture Co-operative Institute, on public health and first aid ;
- (ii) rural development workers in practical methods for carrying out public health measures to completely sanitise a village ;
- (iii) members of the health leagues in the preparation of windows ;
- (iv) 14 school teachers and 8 students from schools in and outside the health unit in first-aid to the injured ;
- (v) a batch of six girl students of the "Home-making" department of the Agricultural Institute, Allahabad, and the students of the Girls' Schools in Partabgarh, in Home Nursing ;
- (vi) all workers in the health unit and a number of local masons in the preparation of cement windows, moulds, slabs, squatting plates, bored-hole covers, etc., or village houses and to one sanitary inspector of the health unit in the construction of cement moulds for windows and ventilators and in casting the same. This training was arranged through the Concrete Association of India.

In connexion with the construction of village sanitary conveniences, windows and ventilators, and the sanitary conveniences in houses, which the health staff were called upon to provide or advise, intensive studies have been carried on ever since the unit has started, and a large number of models on various subjects have now been prepared.

These embrace—

- (1) A house for better class villagers. ;
- (2) Kitchen, rat proof godown, latrine, urinal and bathroom ;
- (3) Protection against ants, whiteants, rats, monkeys, cats, birds, flies, insects, dust and children ;
- (4) Food-safe basket with lid ;
- (5) A sanitary cattle shed ;
- (6) A mould for casting cement windows ;
- (7) Windows and ventilators ;

- (8) A model well ;
- (9) Soap making outfit ;
- (10) Rat-trap ;
- (11) Milk carrier ;
- (12) Milk covers with perforations ;
- (13) Squatting plates ;
- (14) Movable screens (cement slabs) for latrines ;
- (15) Bored-hole absorption pit cover ;
- (16) Cement base and cover for domestic water pots ;
- (17) Cement "chowki" for removing dust or ashes from a "chapati" taken out of oven.
- (18) Different types of drains, viz bamboo, tiles, earthenware channels, masonry (saucer-type), and masonry with arrangements to keep off snakes, frogs, etc. ;
- (19) Various types of roof ventilators ;
- (20) Manure pits ;
- (21) Various kinds of absorption pits ;
- (22) Urinals of various types ;
- (23) Latrines of various types, and
- (24) Platform for scrubbing utensils.

The rural health staff continued to maintain close touch with the local Government's programme of rural development and gave the inspectors and organisers all necessary help and directions in carrying out sanitary improvements. The following extract from the annual report of that department for the year will show the amount of work done by them in that connexion with the help of the public health staff.

"Much good work was done in the direction of sanitary improvements. Ceaseless propaganda was carried out for creating interest in this important problem of the rural areas. The efforts bore satisfactory results. About 124,000 rubbish heaps were removed from habitations, and over 86,000 new manure pits were dug. A very large number of soakage pits was made. Over 4,500 ruins were levelled, and about 11,000 insanitary hollows were filled up. About 18,000 lanes were cleansed, and drains about 30 miles in length were constructed. A very large number of urinals and latrines were provided. The number of those who were vaccinated or inoculated was over 196,000.

A large number of villagers was trained in first aid, and numerous meetings were held to encourage clean habits. It is gratifying to note that village people are growing more and more conscious about the need for clean surroundings. In the beginning their efforts were spasmodic, but now their interest appears to be permanent.

Dispensaries under indigenous system of medicine.—During the year, 146 Ayurvedic and 10 Unani dispensaries were opened, each in charge of a qualified vaid or hakim. These were located in suitable rural development villages, to provide treatment to the rural masses who prefer

this system of medicine. The financing, equipment and control of these dispensaries was made the concern of the public health department. They were accordingly administered by the director of public health through the district medical officers of health, and civil surgeons, where district medical officers of health have not been appointed. The appointment of staff and location of these dispensaries vested in the Inspector General of Civil Hospitals, United Provinces.

Dispensaries under western system of medicine—In addition, Government sanctioned the opening of 16 travelling and 48 fixed allopathic dispensaries in charge of qualified medical men of the L. M. P. class but 61 were actually opened. These were under the control of the medical department which administered them through the civil surgeons.

The travelling dispensaries were located in areas having no dispensaries. They had instructions to attend to village sanitation in the course of their tours.

Village Medicine Chests—Two hundred and eighty-nine new village medicine chests were supplied during the period under report, raising the total in use to 4,289. Replenishments through the director of public health were promptly made, and the popularity of these chests is on the increase. It is reported that the total number of patients who received medicines out of these chests comes to about a million."

Public Health Legislation. Many of the district boards have not yet adopted model byelaws on the various public health matters: consequently members of the district health staff had to rely mostly on persuasion. This in itself is the right measure of approach in matters of rural sanitation but some times it is necessary to enforce the law and here district medical officers of health are greatly handicapped by the absence of byelaws, or authority to institute prosecutions. In one district (Mirzapur) the district medical officer of health has been authorised to sanction prosecution himself under the district board byelaws. In Bareilly about one thousand notices for removal of manure and rubbish were served, with the imposition of petty fines in a few cases. The results were reported to be good.

Rural Public Health works. During the year 1939-40, the board of public health gave grants aggregating Rs.49,564 for public health works in rural areas against Rs.59,739 in 1938-39.

Expenditure by district boards on public health. During the year 1938-39, the total income of district boards in the United Provinces from all sources, including all Government grants was Rs.2,06,07,605 and excluding such grants it was Rs.1,12,04,751. The total expenditure by district boards on public health was Rs.6,44,037 distributed as follows:

- (i) Vaccination, Rs.3,11,063.
- (ii) Public health establishment, other than vaccination, Rs.2,09,120.
- (iii) Epidemics, Rs.50,351.
- (iv) All other public health purposes, Rs.73,503.

Receipts of the district boards from Government, the board of public health and other sources specially earmarked for public health purposes were Rs.2,29,942. Out of their own revenue of Rs.1,12,04,751 the boards spent Rs.4,14,095, or 3.7 per. cent. only on public health. In 1937-38, the percentage of expenditure on this head was 3.2; in 1936-37 also it was 3.2 and in 1935-36 it was 3.7.

CHAPTER VIII

MALARIA

The charge of the office of the Assistant Director of Public Health (Malariology) was held by me up to November 14, 1939. The activities of this branch are still supervised by me in my capacity of Director of Public Health, United Provinces, which post I took over on November 15, 1939. The post of the Assistant Director of Public Health (Malariology) has been left unfilled meanwhile. Doctors P. N. Chatterjee and R. S. Srivastava continued as assistant malaria officers.

2. Malaria in epidemic form was reported from the districts of Gorakhpur, Allahabad, Bareilly, Bijnor, Gonda, Saharanpur, Debra Dun, Moradabad, Bahraich, Agra, Pilibhit, Kheri, Shahjahanpur, Meerut, Banda and Sitapur and 2,250 villages were affected in these districts. Permission to utilise the reserve stock of quinine and cinchona for free distribution in the affected areas was given. Accordingly 384 lbs. of quinine and cinchona were distributed free and in all 98,596 persons were treated. During 1939, 754,168 deaths were reported from malaria as against 819,057 in the preceding year, the death rates for the two years being 15.58 and 16.92, respectively.

Verification of deaths reported under malaria showed that the percentage of malaria deaths recorded correctly varied from 1 per cent. to 100 per cent. in rural areas and from 5 per cent. to 100 per cent. in urban areas.

3. (a) Malaria surveys and investigations connected with certain specific local problems were carried out in the following areas and necessary recommendations made :

I—Kanauj and Moradabad municipalities, Dig Darwaza at Muttra and Ajodhia in connexion with drainage projects.

II—Muttra municipality and Kotdwara in connexion with water supply projects.

III—Kosi Kalan (Muttra district) in connexion with reopening of irrigation in its vicinity.

IV—Agra district in connexion with floods.

V—Meerut District Jail in connexion with an outbreak of malaria.

Malarial surveys were also undertaken in a group of villages in the Etawah, Gonda and Meerut districts, a village in the Mainpuri district and in a sugarcane plantation area of a sugar mill in the Lakhimpur district.

The headworks colony of the Sarda Canal at Banbassa was visited and a report on the anti-malaria measures in force with suggestions on further lines of control measures was sent. A field trial was made of anti-mosquito spraying with a preparation called multicide under the special labour-housing conditions at Banbassa. This preparation unlike Pyrocide '20' which has to be mixed with kerosene oil (at present the standard spraying mixture) can be mixed with water and hence its working costs

are comparatively lower. The trials enabled a tentative strength of 1 in 50 to be indicated for use in labour sheds. Further laboratory tests with different strengths of preparation were carried out and these require to be continued.

(b) Examination of blood films received from sources indicated below were carried out :

- (I) Sarda Canal Headworks, Banbassa.
- (II) Central and Juvenile Jails, Bareilly.
- (III) Hospitals and dispensaries, Lucknow municipality.
- (IV) Villages with malaria epidemics in the districts of Basti, Gonda, Allahabad and Etawah.
- (V) Special anti-malaria scheme, Hardoi district.

(c) Mosquitoes received from 269 centres where boy scouts and members of junior red cross groups have been trained in the organization and adoption of simple anti-malaria measures were examined.

(d) Spleen census by mortuary circles in districts with health service was carried out during the spring and the autumn malaria seasons. The districts of Naini Tal, Unao, Meerut, Muzaffarnagar and Agra reported the highest spleen rates during the autumn and the districts of Mirzapur, Hardoi, Agra and Sitapur during the spring season.

4. Malaria investigations and anti-malaria schemes for rural areas were continued in the Bazpur pargana of the Naini Tal district and in certain villages of the Hardoi district in collaboration with the Indian Research Fund Association to determine cheap and effective methods of rural malaria control and reports were submitted to the authorities concerned. The principal findings and measures carried out during the year were as under :

(i) *Bazpur area*—The chief carrier species has been found *A. minimus* while *A. culicifacies* appears to act as a supplementary carrier species during the earlier months of the malaria season. These species have been found to breed principally in the natural nullas and the irrigation channels.

The feasibility of installing automatic flush and the distance over which such a flush exerts its sterilizing effects was also studied in collaboration with the Malaria Institute of India. It is not possible to indicate at this stage the extent of success from this and other measures under trial. Spraying campaign with pyroicide '20' kerosene oil mixture was continued in the appropriate seasons, viz., between February 7 and April 30, 1939, when a total of 1,17,505 rooms were sprayed with an average consumption of 1.1 oz. of the spraying mixture. The frequency of spraying was thrice weekly. This campaign was carried out to perfect the organisational details so that when the spraying for the actual malaria transmission season was to commence in July the work could go on smoothly and uninterruptedly.

The second campaign was carried out between July 1 and November 7, 1939, when a total of 4,04,949 rooms were sprayed using 1.5 oz. of the mixture per room per spraying. The frequency of spraying was increased to four and five times weekly in two groups of villages.

Intensive treatment scheme remained in force throughout the year. Besides supervision of the work of compounders engaged by the Tarai and Bhabar Estates, the staff of the special anti-malaria scheme themselves carried out intensive treatment supported by blood examination in 8 villages. 4,312 fresh cases and 2,098 relapse cases were treated.

(ii) *Hardoi area*—The chief carrier anopheline species on epidemiological evidence appears to be *A. culicifacies*. Its principal breeding sites were irrigation channels.

The first spraying campaign was in force between February 21 and April 30, 1939 when 39,317 rooms were sprayed and the amount of spraying mixture used per room was 0.53 oz. The next campaign was carried out between July 1 and November 9, 1939 when 73,380 rooms were sprayed using 1.05 oz. of the spraying mixture per room during each spraying. The frequency of spraying remained thrice weekly during both campaigns.

Intensive treatment with cinchona and plasmoguinine was continued in all the villages. 723 cases were treated. The treatment was carried out by the supervisors of the special anti-malaria scheme who also examined the bloods of all fever cases occurring in these villages.

5. *Tarai and Bhabar Estates anti-malaria schemes.*

(a) *Treatment schemes*—The treatment schemes which were introduced on the advice of this branch in October, 1934, have since considerably expanded and the total area covered by the scheme is roughly 95 square miles and comprises 210 villages with a population of about 24,000 persons. The number of travelling compounders employed was 10, but two additional temporary compounders were engaged during the busy malaria season.

The number of malaria cases treated was 6,410. About 72 lb. of quinine sulph. tablets, 17 lb. of cinchona febrifuge tablets, and 18,849 plasmoguinine 1/6 grain tablets and 4,528 plasmoguinine 1/12 grain tablets were consumed. An additional quantity of quinine sulph. in mixture form was also used.

Apart from the regular treatment scheme, 109½ lb. of quinine and 297½ lb. of cinchona were as usual distributed in the Estates through fixed and travelling dispensaries, peshkars, padhans, rural development organization, public health staff and village aid dispensaries.

(b) *Anti-larval measures with paris green*—This was continued in villages of Kitcha, Sisai, Bandia, Sittarganj, Khatima, Tanakpur and Gadarpur.

All the katcha anti-malaria drains constructed in Tarai were cleaned of silt and kept in proper state of repairs at a cost of Rs.169.

6. *Mass treatment scheme with cinchona and plasmoguinine in selected malarious villages*—This is in force in the districts of Hardoi, Unao and Lucknow. 695 cases including 6 relapse cases of malaria were treated.

7. *Blanket treatment with cinchona and plasmoguinine* was given to 963 children in the schools of Kosi and 34 children in Brindaban at the commencement of the two malaria seasons (spring and autumn). The object was to cut off the reservoir of infection at the critical phase of

malaria transmission and thus to minimise the spread of the disease in these two malarious towns.

8. *Free distribution of quinine*—313 lb. of quinine sulph. tablets and 1,187 $\frac{3}{4}$ lb. of cinchona tablets were supplied to 48 districts for distribution in the villages under the rural development scheme.

9. *Training in the principles of malaria control*—A course of training in malariology was given to the L. P. H., sanitary inspectors and post-graduate classes. Necessary advice was also offered in all cases of inquiries made by departmental officers.

10. *Anti-malaria byelaws*—The total number of local bodies which adopted these byelaws stands at 35.

11. *Government Quinine Tablet Manufacturing Factory*—

(i) Sale of quinine and cinchona tablets.

The factory continued to manufacture quinine and cinchona tablets of standard weight and quality to meet the demands of various Government departments, public health, medical, prisons, agriculture, irrigation, education and local bodies. Sales worth Rs.71,786-3 were effected against Rs.89,313 in the preceding year. The details are as follows:

(ii) *Sale of quinine and cinchona powders*—With effect from April 1, 1939, the Assistant Director of Public Health (Malariology) has been appointed the Central Agent for United Provinces for obtaining and distributing the supplies of quinine and cinchona powders. 1,781 $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. of quinine and 1,443 $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. of cinchona powders worth Rs.48,144-8 were sold to various government departments and local bodies.

(iii) *Quinine reserve*—187 lbs. of quinine and 748 lb. 10 oz. and 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ drs. of cinchona tablets were issued from the provincial reserve to the districts of Dehra Dun, Saharanpur, Meerut, Muttra, Bareilly, Moradabad, Shahjahanpur, Pilibhit, Cawnpore, Allahabad, Jhansi, Hamirpur, Gorakhpur, Basti, Lucknow, Sitapur, Hardoi, Kheri, Gonda, Bahraich and Bara Banki for replenishment of the district reserve stock.

12. *Consumption of quinine in the province*—According to the report of the Inspector General of Civil Hospitals, United Provinces, 1,819 lb., 5 oz. of quinine and 2,021 lb., 14 oz. of cinchona were consumed during 1939 as compared with 1,709 lb. 11 oz. of quinine and 1,716 lb., 11 oz., 7 dr. of cinchona during 1938. 1,164,053 cases of malaria were treated during 1939. This works out to an average of 23 grains per patient treated in 1939, against a minimum of 60 grains required for each paroxysm of malaria.

The appended table shows the consumption of quinine and cinchona products in the urban and rural areas of the province during 1939. The

figures are based on the amounts of quinine and cinchona distributed by all known sources (medical, jails, health, local bodies and other departments) but does not include the private purchases from chemists and other stores by individuals.

CHAPTER IX.

MATERNITY AND CHILDWELFARE.

Dr. (Mrs.) T. S. Iyer, M.B.E., M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., continued to hold charge of this section under the direct control of the Director of Public Health, United Provinces, in his capacity as Vice-Chairman of the Indian Red Cross Society, United Provinces Branch. Administrative direction of work was also exercised by the maternity sub-committee of the Indian Red Cross Society under the chairmanship of Lady Haig and the executive committee of the United Provinces Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society. Owing to the keen interest taken by Lady Haig, the maternity and childwelfare work of the province has flourished and obtained a higher standard.

There are also local committees for Red Cross work at district headquarters. The district magistrate is usually the president and the medical officer of health or the civil surgeon is the honorary secretary of the district committee. There is no separate municipal organization for maternity and childwelfare work. To secure active co-operation the Dufferin and Mission Hospital authorities have been made active members of the local committees in certain places.

2. The following staff was engaged in domiciliary midwifery in these provinces:

A table showing particulars of maternity and child welfare centres and the medical women, health visitors and trained midwives forms Appendix C of this report.

In addition to this staff, the services of women doctors in hospitals were available for domiciliary midwifery in places where the red cross medical women were not employed.

The normal cases were, as usual, conducted by the assistant midwives under the guidance of the red cross medical women and abnormal cases were always advised to go to the nearest local women hospitals. The associations for moral and social hygiene, as usual, carried out some work on child protection.

3. The total number of centres is 317 (160 rural and 157 urban). Some of these centres are located in the hills where between 40—50 miles there is no medical aid for women.

* One assistant midwife is employed in Ranikhet for six months only.

Cotton Mills, Cawnpore and Dayalbagh, Agra, maintained one child-welfare centre each. The centre at Dayalbagh had to be closed temporarily for want of a worker.

There is no Red Cross Maternity Hospital in the United Provinces. Clinics were held at maternity and childwelfare centres. The local staff of the maternity centres in addition to the domiciliary midwifery work consisting of ante-natal and post-natal visits and confinement of cases in their houses, trained indigenous *dais*, organized baby shows, held magic lantern demonstrations and delivered lectures during exhibitions, fairs and festivals.

The total number of cases conducted by the staff with or without indigenous *dais* was 48,453 while that of the cases not attended by Red Cross workers in the same area was 142,662. The Director of Maternity inspected maternity and childwelfare work in the districts of Garhwal, Almora, Partabgarh, Bareilly, Pilibhit and Shahjahanpur.

4. The training of probationer assistant midwives was carried out at the provincial training centre up to September 1939 and thereafter in the Silver Jubilee Health School, Lucknow, in domiciliary midwifery and house visiting and was supplemented by three months' hospital training at the Dufferin Hospital and one weekly lecture and demonstration at the Queen Mary hospital. Twenty-two probationers were declared successful in March and September examinations. This training was also imparted in the Cawnpore maternity and childwelfare centre. The Dufferin and Mission Hospitals also trained workers for their own needs.

Indigenous *dais* were given training in clean midwifery methods in the maternity and childwelfare centres and the Health Unit, Partabgarh. Twelve rural development maternity centres also undertook this work. A sub-committee appointed by the United Provinces Nurses and Midwives Council has drawn up a curriculum for the training of *dais* in 50 suitable centres.

The health visitors course will be given shortly in the Silver Jubilee Health School, Lucknow.

5. The following legislation exists for the control of midwifery and childwelfare work :

Legislation.

(i) The Registration Act for health visitors, nurses and midwives.

(ii) Municipal byelaws to prevent practice by unlicensed midwives and *dais*. These byelaws are also observed by notified areas. It is proposed to extend such byelaws to rural areas under the District Board's Act.

(iii) Provision for registration of births and deaths in municipal and notified areas under section 298J of the United Provinces Municipalities Act.

Further legislation is desirable for—

(i) the earmarking of an appreciable percentage of their annual income by local bodies towards maternity and childwelfare work ;

(ii) extension of the Registration Act to trained *dais*.

6. The local Government and the Central Council of the Victoria Memorial Scholarship Fund, Delhi, continued their Finance. annual grants of Rs.1,22,600 and Rs.2,800 respectively. The former was for the Red Cross activities and the latter for the improvement of indigenous *dais*. The executive committee of the Red Cross Society also contributed Rs.23,264. In addition a sum of Rs.1,671 was realized under miscellaneous receipts including fees for services rendered by staff. The total expenditure during the year under report was Rs.1,46,128. A sum of Rs.1,41,139 was also spent by local branches from local subscriptions.

7. The deaths reported amongst children under one year of age in Vital Statistics. the cases conducted by Red Cross workers was 2,739 and in others 49,167, yielding a ratio of 56.55 and 344.63, respectively, as compared with 57.81 and 243.48 in the preceding year. The maternal mortality among the cases conducted with and without *dais* was 3.18 against 6.08 in all unattended cases in the same area. The provincial rate for maternal mortality was 1.26. A number of tetanus reports was investigated by the medical officers of health, medical women and health visitors where employed. Infantile mortality in the age group 1—5 years was 39.7 per 1,000 population in 1939 as compared with 50.00 in 1938.

8. The following difficulties are experienced in furthering the causes of maternity and child-welfare work in these provinces :
Difficulties facing the administration of maternity and child-welfare work in the Province.

- (i) Lack of funds.
- (ii) Lack of registered and qualified staff.

CHAPTER X.

SCHOOL HYGIENE AND MEDICAL INSPECTION OF SCHOOL CHILDREN
DURING THE YEAR 1939-40.

This chapter deals with the medical inspection of school children for the session 1939-40.

It deals with the activities of 13 whole time school health officers and refers in general to the inspection of scholars by the district and municipal medical officers of health. Dr. S. N. Saxena, D.P.H., medical officer incharge, Hygiene Publicity Bureau, supervised and co-ordinated the work of this branch throughout the year.

2. The detailed examination of the boys was conducted in 173 out of 177 Anglo-Vernacular schools as compared to 153 out of 159 of the last year in the 13 larger municipalities where the whole-time school health officers are working. The number of boys whose medical history sheets were filled was about 19,950 out of about 59,400 on roll against 22,300 out of 56,500 in the previous year. About 4,000 scholars were re-examined and 422 were examined as special cases.

Out of 468 primary and vernacular schools within their area, 199 were visited by the whole-time school health officers against 431 and 172 in the previous year.

Ordinary examination of noting down main defects of about 15,600 scholars out of about 61,000 was done against 16,100 and 44,500 in the last year. Due to pressure of work in Anglo-Vernacular schools under the scheme of detailed examination the whole-time school health officers of the bigger towns were unable to find time to visit a large number of vernacular institutions under their charge. A large number of parade inspections were made by several school health officers in schools for ordinary inspections.

The report submitted by 17 out of 21 medical officers of health who are *ex-officio* school health officers for the schools in their municipalities show that out of a total of 51 schools for detailed examination they visited 48 and out of 18,690 scholars on roll they examined about 6,630. These officers also inspected 145 schools out of 211 for ordinary examinations and examined about 12,220 boys out of about 25,000 on roll.

Similarly 32 out of 37 district medical officers of health, who are *ex-officio* school health officers for municipalities within their jurisdiction conducted detailed medical inspection in 79 schools out of 84 schools and examined about 6,520 scholars out of 21,770 on roll i.e., 29.4 per cent. The number of schools in their area for ordinary inspections was about 9,926 out of which they inspected 2,177 schools and examined about 180,370 scholars, out of 677,800 on roll i.e., 26.6 per cent.

3. The statistics of defects given below will give an idea of the predominance of certain diseases. The total of all main defects was 42.2 per cent. for urban and 24.8 per cent. for rural areas as compared to 53 per cent. and 18.7 per cent. in the previous year assuming that each boy had one defect (even though he may have more than one).

It has further been calculated roughly that of all the boys examined about 30·8 per cent. had one defect only, 9·6 per cent. had two defects and 4·7 per cent. had more than two in the urban areas as compared to 20·9 per cent., 14·5 per cent. and 10·1 per cent. respectively in the previous year.

It will thus be seen that there were not less than 45·1 per cent. defectives to share all the defects compared with 45·5 per cent. in the previous year in the urban areas. These figures for one, two and more defects for rural areas were 15·9 per cent, 6·3 per cent. and 2·7 per cent. respectively, as compared with 12·6 per cent., 4·4 per cent. and 1·6 per cent. in the previous year giving 24·9 per cent. defectives to share all the defects against 18·6 per cent. in the last year.

4. In the larger urban areas poor nutrition was found to be in 18·3 per cent. of the cases as compared to 19·4 per cent. in the last year.

Poor nutrition.

Of the five bigger towns Cawnpore again this year reached the highest figure of 28·7 per cent. of poor nutrition and Lucknow the lowest of 9·67 per cent. In the eight smaller municipalities there had been a greater uniformity in the observation of the school health officers during the year under report than it was last year, the maximum of 35 per cent. being reported from Saharanpur and a minimum of 12·1 per cent. from Bareilly. In the rural areas this percentage was 17·5 as compared to 18·1 in the last year.

Poor nutrition in school children was chiefly due to faulty nutrition and was more due to lack of knowledge about balanced diet than to poverty. The school health officers gave advice regarding proper diet both in the clinics and in the schools while delivering lectures.

5. There were 11·1 per cent. of scholars with defective teeth (specially carries) in urban areas and 11·3 per cent. in the rural areas against 13·7 per cent. and 8·2 per cent. in the last year.

Defect in teeth.

Pyorrhoea was found in 3 per cent. in urban and 1·1 per cent. in rural areas as compared to 4·1 per cent. and 2·2 per cent. in the previous year.

Some schools have adopted regular *datoon* parades for inculcating regular habits of keeping the mouth and teeth clean in order to overcome these defects.

6. This defect was found in 12·2 per cent of boys in urban areas and 4·6 per cent. in rural areas as compared to 12·9 per cent. and 2·7 per cent. in the last year. The maximum was again reported from Cawnpore being 23 per cent. as compared to 46 per cent in the last year. It is believed that the number of enlarged tonsil cases was much higher in urban areas—25 to 40 per cent.

Enlarged tonsils and adenoids.

The figures for other glandular enlargements in urban and rural areas were 5·4 per cent. and 1·9 per cent. as compared to 6·8 per cent. and 1·9 per cent. respectively, in the previous year.

The percentage of pulmonary tuberculosis reported during the year under report was ·09 per cent. only from Allahabad.

7. The percentage of anaemia due to enlarged spleen in urban areas was 0.56 and in rural areas 3.2 as compared to 0.6 and 4.6 respectively, in the previous year. Control of malaria in rural areas being a difficult problem, its prevalence amongst the rural boys was commoner than in the urban area.

8. The percentage of boys suffering from this defect was 2.9 in the urban areas and 2.7 in the rural areas as compared to 3.3 per cent and 3.06 per cent. in the previous year. Scabies, ring-worm, eczema and boils were the chief skin diseases for which lack of personal cleanliness and bad hygienic conditions were chiefly responsible. Washing scheme with soap of the body and clothes were introduced in a few schools to remedy these defects.

9. In urban areas the percentage of diseases of eye-lids was 6.7 while in rural areas it was 5.7 as compared to 8.01 per cent. and 6.1 per cent., respectively, in the previous year. The chief causes responsible for this were lack of cleanliness, dirty environments and want of proper treatment, both in the schools and at home.

10. The percentage of defective vision in urban areas was 9.8 as compared to 13.3 in the previous year. The largest percentage of this defect was reported from Meerut. The central school dispensaries in Lucknow, Agra, Cawnpore, Benares and Allahabad provided necessary corrections by supplying free glasses also in addition to the advice and treatment. In the smaller towns, however, free glasses could not be supplied due to lack of necessary provision of funds in the budget of central school dispensaries of these places.

11. The percentage of unvaccinated children recorded was 19 (?) in the urban areas against 6.5 in the last year. These figures for the rural areas were 24.7 and 28 respectively.

12. No mentally defective students were referred by the education authorities from the compulsory education areas, hence no tests were carried out.

13. The scheme of the free milk supply was continued in the five bigger towns with central school dispensaries. The total number of poor and ill-nourished boys fed on milk in these places was 828 as compared with 611 in the last year. This scheme again could not be introduced during the year under report in the other places where there are central school dispensaries as no funds were provided in the budget of the central school dispensaries of these places.

In Lucknow the supply was arranged in half pound bottles from the Lucknow Cooperative Milk Supply Union, Limited, to 268 poor and ill-nourished students in 21 different institutions. Some of these institutions also made arrangements for milk supply during school hours for paying students from the same source.

In Benares free milk was supplied to 180 poor ill-nourished students at the rate of $\frac{1}{4}$ sr. per boy.

In Agra and Cawnpore free pasteurised milk was supplied to 207 and 170 boys respectively.

The duration of supply in all the above places was limited to short periods of about 15 days to 2 months. In Allahabad due to other pressing needs milk could be supplied free to three students only. A few other schools started their own milk clubs.

A special feature during the year under report was the introduction of free milk scheme by Government in five schools at Achnera, Midhakar, Kagrol, Fatehabad and Itmadpur at a cost of Rs.4,200, under the District Board, Agra.

In this scheme 400 boys received sweetened milk daily at the rate of 6 chhataks per head since 17th July, 1939 to March 15, 1940. Height and weight records of these boys and of control group were taken every month and regularly maintained. The scheme was carried out under the supervision of the District Medical Officer of Health, Agra and a local committee was also set up at each place to check the quality and quantity of milk and its proper distribution. 109 samples taken from the contractors' supply from time to time showed 12 to be adulterated.

The records of weight taken showed that the average increase in weight per head in the case of boys fed on milk was 3.8 lb. while in controls (not fed on milk) it was only 2.1 lb.

14. The total number of cases treated at the central school dispensaries was 68,700 as compared with 66,500 in the last year.

Attendance at the clinics.

15. Boys with defective vision were paid special attention in the school clinics. Agra, Lucknow, Cawnpore, Benares and Allahabad had the benefit of the services of Honorary Ophthalmic Surgeons and were equipped with necessary appliances for proper examination of eye-sight. Of the eight smaller towns, Meerut, Shahjahanpur, Moradabad and Saharanpur secured the services of Honorary Ophthalmic Surgeons who did the work at their private clinics.

In all 310 pairs of glasses were supplied free to poor boys and 65 boys purchased glasses at their own cost as compared to 267 and 30, respectively in the last year. In Fyzabad and Gorakhpur the cost of glasses was met from the balance of funds of the students medical aid associations which have now ceased to function due to the opening of the central school dispensaries at these places.

16. All the five bigger dispensaries which are provided with dental equipment had the benefit of the services of honorary dentists. At Gorakhpur and Fyzabad the cost of dental treatment was paid out of the balance of funds of students medical aid association. In some of the other places though the services of honorary dentists were available but were not of much use for want of proper equipment.

In Cawnpore and Fyzabad, the central school dispensaries received as usual a contribution of Rs.300 and Rs.150, respectively, from the municipal boards in lieu of which the municipal vernacular school boys also derived the advantage of free treatment at the central school dispensaries of these places.

The school health officers issued 246 emergent prescriptions as compared to 293 of the last year.

The total income from the medical fee at the thirteen towns aggregated Rs.31,049 and the budgetted expenditure on central school dispensaries including supply of milk, etc. was Rs.17,270. The aim of medical inspection of school children is to place the school child in a healthy environment, to build him up mentally and physically and on sound lines, to see that he is adequately nourished and to protect him against diseases. The opening of the school clinics in the eight smaller towns has no doubt added considerably to the usefulness of the scheme of medical inspection of scholars but these useful activities are greatly handicapped due to poor equipment of dispensaries and lack of funds for the scheme of free supply of milk and glasses to poor and deserving students. From the figures reported above it is evident that there is a clear saving of Rs.13,779 out of the medical fees realized from the scholars. The matter was fully discussed with the Director of Public Instruction and he was in agreement with the view that the whole income of the medical fee should be spent on the benefit of the boys and accordingly in the budget of 1940-41, the Director of Public Instruction was asked to provide money for the dental and ophthalmic equipments of the smaller dispensaries and for free supply of milk and glasses at these places and also for more money to supply milk in the five bigger towns as the present allotment is quite inadequate.

The question of the removal of the central school clinics in the five smaller towns where they are located in school buildings or hostels to separate hired buildings was also enquired into and the system was not found to be so successful as in other places where separate buildings have been provided. It has further been recommended to the Director of Public Instruction to provide centrally situated rented buildings for these places also to meet the requirements of all the schools equally.

The question of providing suitable buildings, proper equipment and a more liberal supply of milk for central school dispensaries is a vital one and the usefulness of these dispensaries mostly depends upon these things.

The village aid medicine chests were the chief source of providing medical relief of a first aid nature in rural areas. The Provincial Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society distributed 123 village medicine chests during the year under report. These were besides those supplied by the district medical officers of health out of the local funds. The medicines of these boxes were replenished locally.

The attendance of cases in fixed dispensaries recorded by 36 civil surgeons in 1939-40 as compared to 41 in 1938-39 shows that in urban areas out of about 48,750 school boys who attended for treatment about 1,650 were voucher cases as compared to 1,500 in the last year. In the rural areas 98,450 boys who attended for treatment, the number of voucher cases was 1,418 as compared to 1,150 in the last year.

During summer vacation and on the occasion of the outbreaks of epidemics the whole-time school health officers assisted the medical officers of health in anti-epidemic work.

The whole time school health officers during the year under report were entrusted with the following special investigations :

- (1) Collection of statistics of weight and height of scholars at different age groups.

(2) Collection of statistics of mottling of teeth in school children due to flourisis.

(3) Goitre survey in school children.

The first investigation is being done under the direction of the Hygiene Publicity Bureau with a view to compare the physique of the people of the eastern and western districts.

The School Health Officer, Fyzabad, has compiled a table, given below, from the statistics of 2,500 scholars collected by him showing normal weight of school boys at different height and age groups with a view to indicate normal weight in proportion to height and age.

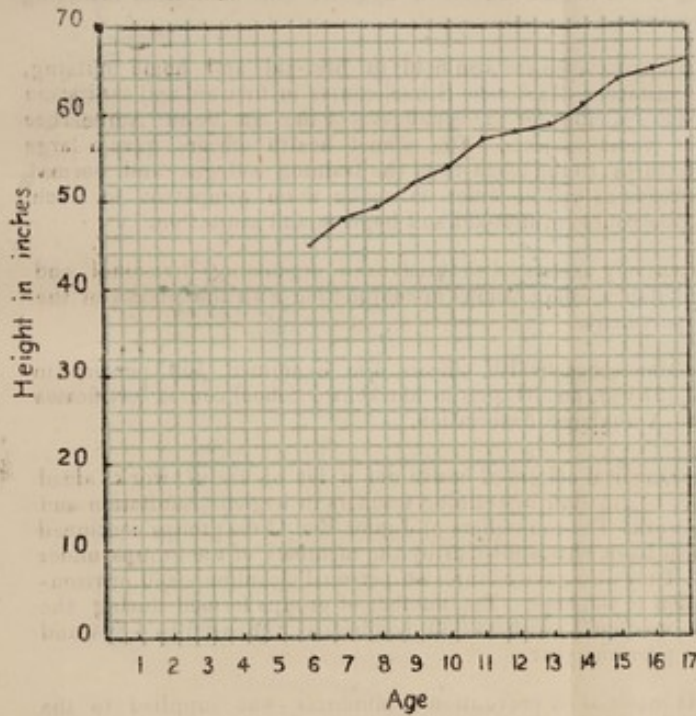
How to use these tables

1. Take the height first.
2. Child's age—Take the chart for the nearest birthday.
3. Then consult the chart for the proper weight for the child's age and height.

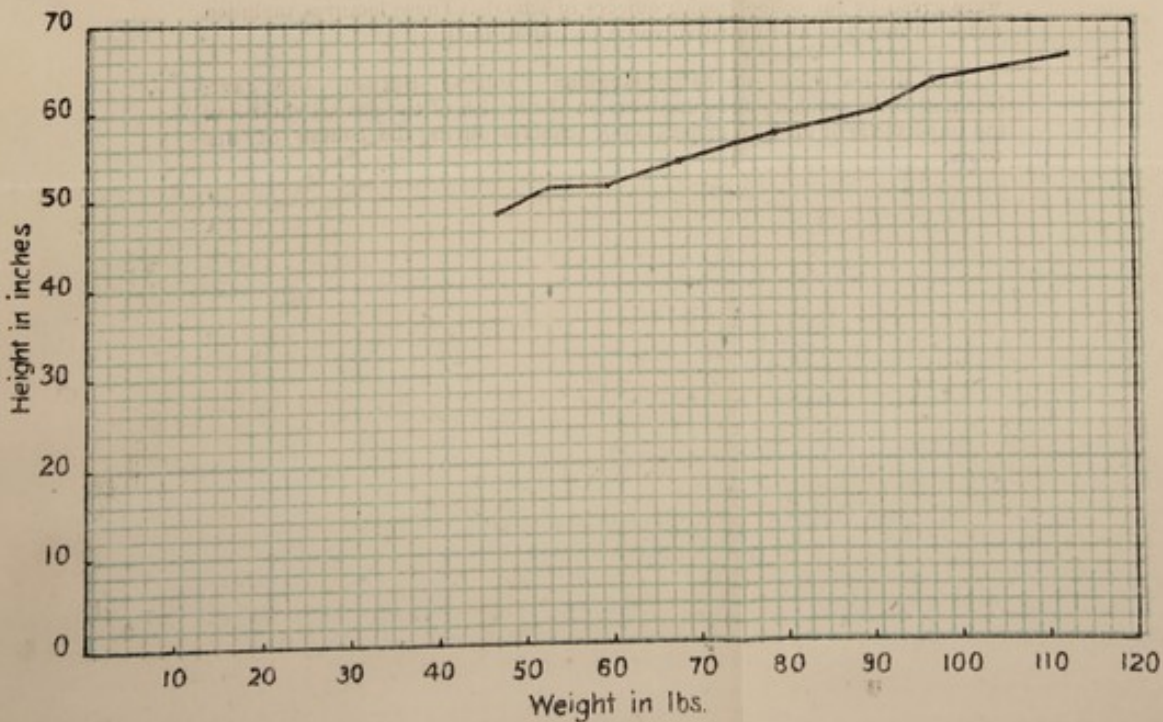
Example—A child 54" in height completing his 12th year in November 1939, should weigh 71 lbs. normally.

The school health officer, Agra, has estimated the average height of scholars in different age groups from height measurement of 2,140 scholars and also average weight of scholars against certain height groups from 4' to 5'-9". These observations have been plotted in the following two graphs :

The above observations cannot be taken as standards as they are based on the examination of a very small number of students.

The other two investigations are being done under the direction of the Medical Officer-in-charge, Provincial Hygiene Institute. The school health officers have supplied the statistics of mottling of teeth amongst the scholars found in their areas and also sent samples of the sources of water-supply used by them to the Provincial Hygiene Institute, for analysis.

17. The subject of hygiene is included in the school curriculum of training colleges, normal schools, high schools, Health education. anglo-vernacular and vernacular schools and about one to two hours per week are devoted to the teaching of this subject. The school health officers are required to give lectures to the teachers of the training colleges and normal schools in hygiene and sanitation including infectious diseases.

Extra curricular classes are also held in first-aid and home nursing, hygiene and sanitation, Mackenzie School course in first-aid and sanitation according to the syllabus for the certificates of the St. John Ambulance Association in these subjects. The school health officers gave a large number of lectures to the teachers in the training colleges and normal schools and outside as well in order to make them competent to teach Mackenzie School course in first-aid and hygiene and sanitation.

They also actively associated themselves in organizing divisional and provincial ambulance competitions in conjunction with the officers of the Education Department.

The whole-time school health officers also examined 469 persons in first-aid and 3,597 boys and 31 girls in Mackenzie School course certificates of the St. John Ambulance Association.

The district medical officers of health did a lot of useful work aided by the district health staff by training teachers in hygiene, sanitation and anti-epidemic work. The counsellors of Junior Red Cross groups continued to get the health habit charts filled in by the members of the groups under their charge. They also gave lectures on personal cleanliness and environmental sanitation to the boys. The number of groups formed during the calendar year was 3,677 with 84,399 members as compared to 4,804 and 109,950 in the previous year.

Propaganda material on prevention of blindness was supplied to the Director of Public Instruction for the use of pupil teachers in training colleges. Health habit posters and the pamphlet "Our food in villages" were also supplied free to all the Junior Red Cross groups at the time of registration. A course of lectures on prevention of blindness was delivered by specialists at Cawnpore, Benares and Aligarh to the pupil teachers of training colleges. A number of hygiene publicity lectures were given by the school health officers in schools. These lectures included those on dietetics and nutritive value of Indian food.

The Medical Officer-in-charge, Hygiene Publicity Bureau, also gave lectures to the teachers and guardians on the health of the school child and the importance of medical inspection of scholars during the course of his tours.

The Assistant Hygiene Publicity Officer, Senior, also addressed several special gatherings of teachers on Junior Red Cross aims, objects and activities in his tours.

About 67 lectures with magic lantern and 381 without magic lantern were delivered on different health topics by the whole-time school health officers.

CHAPTER XI

Health propaganda

Dr. S. N. Saxena, D.P.H., held the charge of the Hygiene Publicity Bureau throughout the year. He also worked as Staff. Honorary Secretary of the Provincial Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society and as Honorary General Secretary of the Provincial Centre of the St. John Ambulance Association. Dr. B. Gopal, D.P.H., Senior Assistant Hygiene Publicity Officer, also held the office of Honorary Joint Secretary of the Provincial Centre of the St. John Ambulance Association. Dr. D. L. Hajela, L.P.H., who was the Junior Assistant Hygiene Publicity Officer up to October 17, 1939 and Dr. Prakash Chandra, L.P.H., who succeeded him, worked as the Deputy Director and Honorary Secretary, Junior Red Cross Sub-Committee in addition.

2. The number of Red Cross groups during the year was 3,677 as compared with 4,804 in the last year. The number of schools with Junior Red Cross groups was 2,592 against 3,958 in 1938. About 97 per cent. of these were in rural areas. The number of members was 84,399 against 109,950 in 1938; the number of girls for the two years was 4,069 and 4,447, respectively. The United Provinces Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society made a grant of Rs.1,425 for the purchase and supply of village aid medicine chests to certain selected groups. 150 medicine chests were accordingly supplied. The activities of the Junior Red Cross groups were in brief as under :

(i) In the districts of Partabgarh, Banda, Lucknow, Etawah, Shahjahanpur, Muttra and Farrukhabad regular nail cutting and teeth cleaning parades were organized. The District Red Cross branches of Gonda and Fyzabad supplied soap, soap-cases, towels and looking glasses to some schools to promote personal cleanliness. The Lucknow district Red Cross branch supplied spittoons to several schools to check the dirty habit of spitting here and there. In three schools of the Health Unit, Partabgarh, training was given in soap making. In the districts of Bara Banki, Gonda, Lucknow, Fyzabad and Farrukhabad boys were instructed to wash their clothes in schools and for this purpose soap was supplied. For educating the boys in hygiene, health essays were written and models were prepared in several districts.

(ii) At Partabgarh, Sultanpur, Etawah, Fyzabad and Farrukhabad, Red Cross Day was observed. In Partabgarh Health Unit, Naini Tal and Tehri (Garhwal States) Baby Shows were held in which sweets, warm clothings, toys, soaps, utensils, etc. were awarded to the babies.

(iii) In the districts of Unao, Partabgarh, Bara Banki, Etawah, Fatehpur, Fyzabad, Hardoi and Partabgarh Health Unit, the members of the Junior Red Cross groups carried on extensive propaganda against malaria and distributed quinine and cinchona to persons suffering from this disease and enforced anti-malaria measures. In the districts of Bara Banki, Rae Bareli, Shahjahanpur they helped in anti-cholera measures, such as, permanganation of wells, distribution of essential oils mixture and in persuading people in affected areas to take anti-cholera inoculations. Those trained in first aid also rendered help, when needed. Propaganda was also done for anti-rat campaign in the Partabgarh Health Unit.

(iv) Health dramas were staged by the Juniors on the occasion of prize distributions, fairs and social gatherings in several districts and in one district they helped the villagers in cleaning cattle-sheds and rendered help in melas.

(v) In Shahjahanpur cod liver oil and milk was freely distributed to the weak children and propaganda against administering opium to the children was undertaken at Fatehpur, Shahjahanpur and Muttra.

(vi) Several schools at Muttra constructed soakage-pits.

(vii) At Gonda, Rae Bareli and Fatehpur the Juniors collected money and distributed to the destitutes.

(viii) Propaganda for the prevention of blindness was also done through the counsellors of the groups. A course of special lectures was organized at Agra, Cawnpore and Benares with the help of the local eye specialists.

(ix) The Juniors continued to actively participate in international correspondence and provincial competitions. Thirty-nine portfolios were exchanged with foreign countries this year against 13 in the last year.

(x) The Junior Red Cross competitions were held at Aligarh along with the First Aid competitions of St. John Ambulance in January, 1939. Forty-one teams from different districts in the province competed and the "Harrop Jubilee Trophy" and the "Lady Kailash Srivastava Challenge Cup" were won by the Government Intermediate College, Fyzabad and the Government Model School, Agra, respectively.

3. The St. John Ambulance Association held the annual competitions in first aid in January, 1939. Ninety-eight teams including those of the Junior Red Cross participated in various categories of competitions.

Activities of the St. John Ambulance.

The number of district centres in the province towards the close of the year was 23 in addition to two State centres. There were also 14 Ambulance Brigades, 3 Nursing and 18 Cadet Ambulance and two Cadet Nursing divisions. 4,530 persons were awarded certificates of the Association of which 1,580 belonged to the Police Force. 7,669 persons were trained in the Mackenzie School Course certificates. A training camp for the officers and members of the Brigade divisions was held at Chillawan, Lucknow district.

4. Popular health education work was done by the officers of the Hygiene Publicity Bureau, and the other public health staff, through magic lantern lectures, cinema films and oral lectures on epidemic diseases with the help of models and pictorial posters, distribution of leaflets, exhibitions, health weeks and competitions. The officers of the Bureau delivered 111 magic lantern lectures. The municipal and the district health staff delivered 810 magic lantern and 20,649 oral lectures which were attended by approximately 257,000 and 756,000 persons, respectively.

Lectures were also given by the officers of the Hygiene Publicity Bureau to the students of the post-graduate and L. P. H. classes, and the Lucknow University, as also to the teachers and the guardians of the schools

visited, prisoners of Etah and Banda jails, to the Congress volunteers, *gur* development organizers and to a class in first aid. The medical officers in charge fixed dispensaries delivered 1,234 lectures with an approximate attendance of 101,900 persons.

The hygiene publicity van fully equipped with public health models, loudspeakers, cinema films and gramophone records toured in 23 districts covering an area of 6,123 miles and gave 105 cinema shows on various health subjects which were witnessed by about 156,500 persons.

During the epidemic of cholera at Lucknow the publicity van gave eleven demonstrations of the film "Why die of cholera" in the eleven different municipal wards to an approximate gathering of 13,200 persons.

Sixty-eight cinema shows were given by the portable projector at Gorakhpur, Fyzabad, Mainpuri, Moradabad, Dehra Dun, Garhwal and Lucknow to a total gathering of about 78,500 persons. Cinema shows were also given at the Khadi Industrial and Agricultural Exhibition, Lucknow.

Cinema films were lent to the municipal medical officer of health, Jhansi, the anti-malaria officer, Meerut cantonment, the district excise officer, Budaun and the collector of Jaunpur.

A talkie film on nutrition "Enough to eat" was obtained from the Director, Nutrition Research Laboratories, Coonor, and was shown in the five cinema houses in Lucknow.

Public health exhibitions were also arranged by the officers of the hygiene publicity bureau at the Anti-Tuberculosis Appeal Fund exhibition, Lucknow, the industrial and agricultural exhibitions, Lucknow, and Gorakhpur, the Deogarh fair and exhibition, Lalitpur and the industrial and agricultural exhibition, Moradabad. The bureau also participated in seven other exhibitions by supplying public health posters, models, literature and the hygiene publicity van and in some cases the services of an officer as well. Publicity work was also undertaken by giving radio talks on public health subjects and by contributing articles on such subjects in the journal of Public Information.

5. Leaflets on various epidemic diseases and other health subjects were revised, reprinted and supplied to the various agencies for propaganda work in the province. Supply and distribution of literature, posters, etc.

About three lakhs of booklets, leaflets and pamphlets and over a thousand of posters were thus distributed. Three new leaflets on "Looh" (cause and prevention of sun-stroke), "What is Alcohol" (depicting its evil effects) and "Evil effects of opium" were prepared and printed at the bureau. Literature on Junior Red Cross was supplied to the Director of Public Instruction, United Provinces, for distribution to all the deputy inspectors of schools in the province.

Samples of the posters of the bureau were sent to the Rural Development Officer, United Provinces, the Director of Public Health, Punjab, the Assistant Director of Public Health, Jaipur State, the Surgeon General with the Government of Bombay, the Officer incharge, Food and Nutrition, Calcutta, Agricultural Estate, Rajghat, Gwalior State Labour and Welfare Officer, the Librarian, Free Library of Philadelphia, the Curator of the Museum, London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine and the Malaria Institute of India, Field Station, Delhi.

Literature and posters were also supplied to various local and other organizations and to certain interested authorities in other provinces.

6. The cinema section was, for want of funds and due to the Board of Public Health having curtailed the grant from Rs.12,000 to Rs.5,000, amalgamated with the Health Education Section of the United Provinces Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society from April 1, 1939. This section produced one film on Rural Uplift (Kayapalat) and short films of a typical case of Uramia, His Excellency the Governor's visit to Gauri and the Ambulance Brigade training camp at Chillawan.

Copies of the following films were also prepared :

- (1) City life (Evils of temperance).
- (2) Village tale (Temperance).
- (3) Key to Health.

7. The voluntary contribution by local bodies for carrying hygiene propaganda work in their local area amounted to Rs.2,050 as compared to Rs.3,700 in 1938.

8. The Bureau also supervised village aid work and the medical inspection of schools and notes on their work are contained in other chapters of this report.

CHAPTER XII

PUBLIC HEALTH ADMINISTRATION

Appendix "D" to this report gives the strength of the executive public health staff below the rank of assistant directors of public health.

2. Mention was made in the last year's report of the withdrawal of 20 posts of assistant medical officers of health from the public health department. Reorganisation in districts to which they had been attached, and the creation of a central reserve with these officers for epidemic duty. This arrangement did not work satisfactorily as extra men had to be appointed for epidemics. The assistant medical officers of health were therefore reposted to their respective districts in the month of October, 1939, subject to the condition that their services were to be utilized for epidemics in contiguous districts if work permitted.

From the middle of November, 1939, the post of assistant director of public health in the epidemiology and malaria branches, which was vacated by me on my appointment as director of public health, has remained unfilled for reasons of financial stringency. There are now only two posts of assistant directors in the United Provinces, viz. those in charge of the two territorial ranges.

3. Mention was also made in the last year's report of the fixation of the revised (1938) scales of pay for gazetted posts in the public health department. For the non-gazetted posts the question of fixation of the revised rates has been dropped. Revised scales of pay for officers and subordinates of the public health services.

4. A sum of Rs.23,59,121 was provided by Government in its recast budget for the year 1939-40 for the entire public health department, including the public health engineering section and the grants-in-aid for sanitary works administered through the board of public health. The following items of new expenditure were passed :

Recurring

(1) Provision for the cost of quinine to be obtained from Madras and the appointment of a central authority for distributing it to local consumers—Rs.74,382.

(2) Extension of the district health service to three districts and expansion of the staff in Garhwal district.

(3) Opening of four anti-rabic treatment centres, viz. at Aligarh, Muttra, Moradabad and Farrukhabad—Rs.6,212.

(4) Grant to the municipal board, Gorakhpur, for anti-rat campaign—Rs.4,000.

(5) Lump provision for increasing the pay of inferior servants and for their leave salaries—Rs.10,509.

Non-recurring

(1) Grant-in-aid to Women's Social Service League, Lucknow, for building a Women's Institute—Rs.5,000.

(2) Grant to the United Provinces Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society in connexion with the retention of the Health Unit at Partabgarh—Rs.2,420.

(3) Appointment of an expert committee to inquire into the water-supply problem in the province—Rs.3,000.

(4) Contribution to the district board, Agra, for the district health service—Rs.4,000.

Out of the total of Rs.23,59,121 a sum of Rs.18,41,409 was for activities directly controlled by the director of public health.

The number of vaccination campaigns was 232 against 220 in the preceding year.

The Vaccination Act was in force in all municipalities, cantonment, notified areas and in certain town areas.

Expenditure on vaccination in the province amounted to Rs.18,41,409 exceeding that of the last year by Rs.1,20,000. The increase was due to the fact that the number of vaccination campaigns was 232 against 220 in the preceding year. CHAPTER XIII.

VACCINATION.

This chapter is a resume of vaccination work done in 1939-40, as compared with that of 1938-39.

Period covered.

2. The cadre of assistant superintendents of vaccination employed during 1939-40, continued to consist of 49 posts. The number of vaccinators employed was 932 against 950 in the preceding year.

3. The Vaccination Act was in force in all municipalities, cantonments, notified areas and in certain town areas.

4. Expenditure on vaccination in the province amounted to Rs.3,78,294 excluding that of the Bahraich district (figures for which were not available) against Rs.3,83,537 in the preceding year. These figures exclude charges on account of assistant directors of public health, their establishment, contingencies as well as the expenditure on the maintenance of the Government Vaccine Depot. Out of the total expenditure of Rs.3,78,294 a sum of Rs.3,01,650 was spent in rural areas and Rs.76,644 in urban areas.

5. The average cost of each successful case of vaccination in these provinces was annas three and pies six against annas three and pies eight in the preceding year.

During the year under report 2,096,333 persons were vaccinated—2,058,605 by special staff (district and municipal) 28,880 by sanitary inspectors, 518 by dispensary staff, 752 by private medical practitioners and 7,578 at railway dispensaries as against 1,907,727 in the preceding year, showing an increase of 188,606. The number of vaccination operations performed in 1939-40, also showed an increase of 190,840 over the work in the preceding year,

the actual figures for the two years being 2,106,269 (1,635,158 primary and 471,111 revaccinations) and 1,915,429 (1,606,335 primary and 309,094 revaccinations). Nine thousand, nine hundred and thirty-six secondary operations were performed against 7,702 in the preceding year. The number and percentage of successful vaccinations in which the results were known were 1,568,037 and 96·91 in the case of primary vaccinations and 151,678 and 36·39 in the case of revaccinations against 1,553,879 and 97·85 and 129,174 and 48·31, respectively, in the preceding year. Each vaccinator vaccinated on an average 2,209 persons while in the previous year only 1,987 persons were vaccinated by each vaccinator.

7. The number of persons vaccinated aggregated 434,854 and the number of operations 437,548 (primary 222,578 and revaccinations 214,970.) The number and percentage of successful vaccinations in which the results were known amounted to 206,202 and 94·48 in the case of primary vaccinations and 48,867 and 24·90 in the case of revaccinations. The number of persons successfully vaccinated per mille of the population was 46·89. The town showing the highest degree of protection was Chakrata Cantonment (Dehra Dun) 451·24, followed by Charbagh-Alambagh (Lucknow) 298·55, Pithoragarh (Almora) 285·99 and Pauri (Garhwal) 266·37. Amongst those showing the least protection the most conspicuous were Bansaon (Gorakhpur) 1·33, Nimsar (Sitapur) 3·84, Bhusawal (Gorakhpur) 4·26 and Dalmau (Rae Bareilly) 4·32.

8. During the year under report 1,623,751 persons were vaccinated in rural districts. The number of operations performed was 1,630,990 (primary 1,400,968 and revaccination 230,022). The number and percentage of successful vaccinations in which the results were known during the year under report were 1,355,243 and 97·47 in the case of primary vaccinations and 95,324 and 47·97 in the case of revaccinations. The number of persons successfully vaccinated per mille of the population was 33·76. The district showing the highest degree of protection per mille of population was Garhwal 83·38, followed by Almora 58·13, Sultanpur 45·57 and Agra 45·49. Amongst those showing the least protection were Fyzabad 22·92, Kheri 25·71, Gonda 26·22 and Lucknow 27·49.

9. The number of vaccination operations performed was 330,694 (150,132 primary and 180,562 revaccinations) against 221,671 (138,909 primary and 82,762 revaccinations) in the preceding year. The total number of persons vaccinated was 328,604 against 220,491 in 1938-39. The ratio of persons successfully vaccinated per 1,000 of the population was 51·63 against 45·44 in the preceding year.

Amongst the well protected municipalities, Mussoorie stood first with a ratio of 232·70 per mille. Next in order were Dehra Dun 96·54 and Bela (district Partabgarh) 83·61. Amongst those showing the least protection were Naini Tal, Kanauj and Tilhar with respective ratios of 22·35, 28·09 and 28·74.

The number of successful operations performed on children under one year of age was 99,849 against 96,852 in the preceding year, showing an increase of 2,997.

10. During the year under report the total number of persons vaccinated was 19,067 against 16,761 in the preceding year. The total vaccination operations numbered 19,080 (6,007 primary and 13,073 revaccinations). Of these, successful primary vaccinations totalled 5,563 and successful revaccinations 4,635. The corresponding figures for the preceding year were 16,768 (5,579 primary and 11,189 revaccinations), 5,353 and 4,013. The ratio of persons successfully vaccinated per mille of the population was 51.63 as against 47.42 in the preceding year. Amongst the well protected cantonments, Chakrata stood first with a ratio of 451.24. No vaccination work was done in the Naini Tal Cantonment. Like last year Muttra showed the least protection (6.69). 23,767 operations were performed by military medical officers.

11. During the year under report the total number of persons vaccinated and that of vaccination operations performed was 28,385 and 28,682 (19,655 primary and 9,027 revaccinations) as against 24,777 and 24,877 (18,854 primary and 6,023, revaccinations), respectively, in the preceding year. The number of successful primary vaccinations and revaccinations were 18,434 and 3,680, respectively, as compared with 18,152 and 2,854 in the preceding year. The ratio of persons successfully vaccinated per mille of the population was 45.57 as against 44.47 in the preceding year.

Amongst the well protected areas Charbagh (district Lucknow) stood first with a ratio of 298.55 whereas Nimsar Misrikh (district Sitapur) 11.97 was the worst protected.

12. The total number of vaccination operations performed by these officials was 28,883 (10,483 primary and 18,400 revaccinations) against 17,527 (8,354 primary and 9,173 revaccinations) in the preceding year.

Vaccination by Sanitary Inspectors. (Vaccination Statement I.)

13. The total number of vaccination operations performed at dispensaries was 518 (56 primary and 462 revaccinations) as against 439 (29 primary and 410 revaccinations) in the preceding year.

Dispensary vaccination. (Vaccination Statement I.)

14. The total number of vaccinations performed by this agency was 7,578 (992 primary and 6,586 revaccinations) as compared with 2,212 (621 primary and 1,591 revaccinations) in the preceding year. The percentage of successful cases in which the results were known was 98.97 in the case of primary vaccinations and 41.48 in the case of revaccinations as compared with 85.13 and 37.42, respectively, in the preceding year.

Vaccination by railway staff at railway dispensaries. (Vaccination Statement I.)

15. The public health staff inspected 3,374 schools for vaccination purposes and vaccinated 58,645 scholars. The respective figures for the preceding year were 1,785 and 33,942.

Vaccination of school children.

16. During the year under report the percentage of successful primary vaccination operations in proportion to births was 56·47 in respect of children under one year of age, 25·12 in respect of those between one and six years of age and 88·95 for all ages. The corresponding figures for the preceding year were 57·45, 24·75 and 86·94 respectively.

17. No case of encephalitis following vaccination was reported.

Occurrence of cases of encephalitis following vaccination.

18. (a) *Charge of the depot*—The charge of the depot was held by Dr. B. S. Yajnik, D.P.H., for the whole year.
Government Vaccine Depot, Patwa Dangar (district Naini Tal).

(b) *Supply of calves*—The contract for the supply of the buffalo calves was given to a butcher of Bareilly at Rs.9 per calf, excluding the cost of railway transit. All the calves were brought from Bareilly to Kathgodam or Haldwani in specially improvised railway wagons at Government expense to avoid risk of infection *en-route* and to avoid deterioration in their physical condition by tedious and continuous marches. After vaccination the calves were, as usual, sold to the same contractor at Haldwani at Rs.2 each.

The total number of buffalo calves obtained was 397 against 343 in the preceding year. Out of this, 377 were sold to the contractor, one was rejected and returned without any payment, two were disposed of locally and 17 died.

Physical examination of calves was done, as usual, by the veterinary assistant surgeon incharge of the district board veterinary dispensary at Haldwani for a fee of Rs.5 per batch of calves. All calves were immunised against rinderpest at the time of examination.

Twenty-one bull calves were obtained locally on hire at the rate of Rs.4 per calf for preparation of seed lymph. After removal of the vaccine pulp they were returned to the owners.

(c) *Quantity of lymph obtained and manufactured*—The total quantity of vaccine pulp obtained during the year was 27,522 grammes from 411 successfully vaccinated animals with an average yield of 66·9 per animal against 25,270 grammes from 359 animals with an average yield of 70·4 grammes in the preceding year. The average yield of pulp from buffalo and bull calves separately was 69·21 and 25·29 grammes, respectively, as compared to 72·77 and 33·95 grammes, respectively, in the preceding year.

2,655 grammes of seed lymph (1 in 5) (including 155 grammes prepared from the English and Swiss strains) from 21 hill bull calves were prepared as compared to 3,735 grammes from 22 calves in the preceding year.

134,955 grammes (1 in 5) and 1,161 grammes (1 in 6), i. e. a total 136,116 grammes of issue lymph were manufactured against 123,138 grammes (1 in 5) in the preceding year.

The total amount of vaccine manufactured represents 3,402,900 doses calculated on the basis of 25 vaccinations (with 3 or 4 insertions each) per gramme as compared to 3,078,450 doses in the preceding year.

(d) The total quantity of lymph issued for vaccination was 141,020.5 grammes (3,525,513 doses) against 122,897 grammes (3,072,425 doses) in the preceding year. The amount issued was 133,214.75 grammes in bulk doses and 7,805.75 grammes in 195,143 single dose capillary tubes as compared to 116,705.75 in bulk doses and 6,191.25 grammes in 154,791 single dose capillary tubes in 1938-39.

The cost of manufacture of issue lymph used for human consumption was 4 annas 7 pies per gramme (2.21 pies per dose) in 1939-40 as compared with 5 annas per gramme (2.39 pies per dose) in 1938-39. The cost has been calculated on the basis of actual expenditure excluding other overhead charges such as pensionary and leave charges, depreciation on buildings and plants and interest on capital investment. The cost including these charges was 5 annas 8 pies and 6 annas 2 pies for the respective years 1939-40 and 1938-39.

Seed lymph amounting to 2,655 grammes including 155 grammes prepared from English and Swiss strains and the glycerinated issue lymph amounting to 128,868 grammes have been set aside in the cold storage for use in 1940-41, as against 2,586 grammes of seed lymph and 134,808.5 grammes of glycerinated issue lymph (1 in 5) set aside in the previous year for use in 1939-40.

(e) *Bacteriological and animal tests*—Vaccine lymph was bacteriologically tested before issue. The results obtained showed complete absence of streptococci and gas producing anaerobes in all the samples tested and issued. The number of viable organisms per c. c. of vaccine lymph was less than the prescribed standard of 5,000 in all the samples issued for vaccination. All the samples were chloroformed and were issued only when subsequent tests showed adequate reduction of organisms. It will thus appear that the standard of bacteriological purity of vaccine lymph aimed and achieved here is the same as laid down under the British Pharmacopoeia. Pathogenicity or toxicity tests on guinea-pigs were also performed on all samples.

The potency of lymph was also tested on rabbits on each production of vaccine lymph. Contents from several samples were pooled and then tested on rabbits in various dilutions ranging from 1 in 500 to 1 in 8,000. The tests indicated that the vaccine was of uniformly good quality. This accounts for successful vaccination in the hot weather. Several samples as much as nine months old gave cent per cent. success in the Baroda State. This state has now become a regular purchaser of vaccine from the depot. The percentage of successful vaccinations was 96.90 for primary vaccinations and 36.39 for re-vaccinations.

(f) Contract price from all local bodies amounting to Rs.39,990 was realized in full.

Lymph to the value of Rs.1,836 (including packing and postage) was supplied to the Defence Department as compared to Rs.1,612 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs.224. Sales to the Indian States, private persons, railways, cantonments and other indenters amounted to Rs.18,719 as compared to Rs.11,404 in the previous year.

558 capillary tubes and 699 grammes of vaccine at a cost of Rs.623 (including packing and postage) was issued free of cost for use in jails and police lines against 724 capillary tubes and 533 grammes to the value of Rs.578 in the previous year. The supply of free vaccine to the Superintendents of Jails was regularised and economised this year in consultation with the Inspector General of Prisons, United Provinces.

(g) Sale and expenditure of the depot. The total value of the sale of vaccine lymph and other articles during the year under report was Rs.61,710 against Rs.54,059 in the preceding year, showing an increase of Rs.7,651.

The total expenditure actually incurred during the year under report amounted to Rs.39,985 against Rs.39,492 (excluding pensionery depreciation, interest on capital outlay on buildings and machinery and leave charges) in 1938-39. Considering the total sales and cash expenditure, a surplus of Rs.21,725 was exhibited in 1939-40 against Rs.14,567 in 1938-39. The average annual profits of the depot are worked at Rs.12,446 and Rs. 11,735 on the basis of actual cash receipts and actual sales, respectively. After accounting for the overhead charges named above the profits of the depot have averaged to Rs.8,220 and Rs.7,510 annually.

(h) *Cold storage plant*—Annual overhauling of both the old and new plant was done during the winter months under the supervision of the Electrical and Mechanical Engineer, Municipal Board, Naini Tal. The plants gave no trouble and efficient refrigeration was produced. The temperature in the cold room was not allowed to exceed above 32° F. Considerable alterations have been made in the ammonia pipes to enable cooling of the two rooms with independent pipe system for each room, so that one system could be repaired while the other is working. Besides, a longer belt drive has been arranged for the new compressor.

(i) *Electric installation*—The supply of electric current from the Naini Tal Municipal Board's Power House was satisfactory. The consumption of the current was not allowed to exceed the prescribed limit.

(j) *Buildings and roads*—In addition to the thorough annual repairs to all the depot buildings, roads and paths, the following new constructions were undertaken during the year under report and the expenditure was met from the normal budget:

(i) Construction of a masonry water reservoir roughly 10' × 8' × 5½' with an approximate capacity of 2,750 gallons near the Patwadangar spring.

(ii) Construction of 3 semi-katcha manure pits near some calf sheds.

(iii) Construction of a road about 300 feet long at Baldia Khan joining the main Public Works Department road below the municipal toll barrier along with widening of the road and smoothing of about a dozen curves.

(iv) Repairing to the fencing round the depot grounds together with fixing 54 new reinforced concrete posts.

(v) Construction of a parapet wall near the intake at Talli Tal.

(k) *Water supply*—The E. C. D. plant for sterilization of water supply worked satisfactorily. At present electrolysis of 3.3 per cent. to 5 per

cent. of brine ($\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ lb. of salt in $1\frac{1}{2}$ gallons of water) for one hour (current about 10 Amp.) produced sufficient chlorine (hypochlorite) for efficient sterilization of two days supply. The residual chlorine in water is found to be about 0.05 to 0.1 parts per million, and this invariably produces reduction of coliaerogenes group of organism from -1 c. c. to -100. This is achieved at an insignificant cost of 8 annas to 12 annas per month. There was acute shortage of water supply during May and June on account of extreme reduction in the yield of spring at Naini Tal. Lake water from Naini Tal had to be used after efficient chlorination. A reservoir near local spring was constructed so as to store up as much water as possible to meet emergency demand.

(b) *Control burning*—Control burning of the depot forests was done in March, 1940, and the entire area within the depot boundary was burnt with success to minimise the risk of fire.

CHAPTER XIV.

Other Public Health Services.

HYGIENE INSTITUTE.

Dr. J. T. Cornelius, M.A., M.D., P.H.D., D.P.H., held charge of the Institute throughout the year except from 8th May to 15th July, when he was on leave and

Dr. H. G. D. Mathur, B.S.C., M.B., B.S., M.R.C.P., D.T.M. and H., DR.P.H., II Lecturer of the Institute, officiated for him. Dr. K. N. Segal, M.B., B.S., D.P.H., D.T.M. and H., worked as III Lecturer except for the periods from 3rd January to 2nd February and 4th to 9th November, 1939, when he was on leave and again from 8th May to 15th July, 1939, when he was appointed to officiate as II Lecturer.

Dr. A. S. Dikshit, L.P.H., continued to work in the cholera vaccine section of the Institute.

2. (a) (i) Six hundred and seventy-six samples of water as against 327 in the previous year were examined, of which 225 were examined chemically and 451 bacteriologically.

(ii) The reports of routine bacteriological and chemical analyses received from the local bodies and from the divisional medical officers of railways were scrutinized and necessary recommendations made to the authorities concerned.

(b) Seven samples of disinfectants received from the Stores Purchase Department, United Provinces, Cawnpore, were examined for Radial Walker Coefficient and for physical stability test. Six samples of phenyle received from private firms were also similarly examined.

(c) The germicidal efficiency of solutions of lime and bleaching powder were tested. Tests were also carried out on the chlorine solutions manufactured by the E. C. D. plant and by a firm in Cawnpore for their chlorine content and stability.

(d) Bacteriological examination of water samples by the method recommended by the British Ministry of Health and by the method adopted at the Institute was undertaken.

(e) Fifty-six samples of stools from suspected cases of cholera, two for the enteric group of organisms, two for Helmenthic ova, four smears from rats suspected to have died of B. Pestis infection, and one sample of cerebro-spinal fluid from a case of meningitis were examined.

(f) Chemical and bacteriological tests were carried out for poisonous substances like arsenic and copper and for pathogenic bacteria on the samples of *ghee*, *dahi* and *rabri* received from the Medical Officer of Health, Hathras, in connexion with food poisoning in a village.

(g) Fifty-four samples of vaccine lymph received from the Superintendent, Government Vaccine Depot, Patwadangar, were tested for bacterial count.

(h) Eleven samples of sugar factory effluents were chemically tested.

(i) Twelve samples of sewage for septic tank in Lucknow were tested to determine the working efficiency of the septic tank.

5. (i) The models in the museum continued to serve as a medium of instruction to the students, officers undergoing post graduate training and the visitors.

Museum.

(ii) Sixty bacteriological, parasitological and epidemiological charts and 64 photographs were prepared.

3. The total number of doses of cholera vaccine manufactured and supplied during the year was 476,788 against 476,394 doses in the preceding year.

Manufacture of cholera vaccine.

The cholera vaccine at present manufactured at the Institute is from the standard Inaba and Ogava strains which have been recommended by the Central Advisory Board of Health. This vaccine was tested at the School of Tropical Medicine, Calcutta, and was certified to compare favourably with vaccines manufactured in other Government laboratories and to be potent in its anti-genic and agglutogenic properties.

6. (i) Goitre prophylaxis by the administration of Iodine to school children in the villages Berinag, Lohaghat and Pithoragarh in the Almora district was continued.

Miscellaneous activities.

(ii) Instructions for making a thyroid survey in connexion with goitre prophylaxis were prepared and issued to the school health officers.

(iii) At the suggestion of the Government of Madras a note on fluorosis was sent to all the school health officers to determine the extent of prevalence of mottling of enamel of the teeth of school children in the United Provinces with a view to ascertain if flourine in the water supplies used by the affected children is responsible for this condition.

(iv) An officer of the Institute was deputed to investigate into the conditions of pollution in the wells of water-works at Muttra and necessary recommendations were made to the authorities concerned.

(v) Other matters relating to public health such as preparation of a form for making health survey, plans of a model village, drawing up of schemes for anti-epidemic organization, for birth control clinics, charts and diagrams, revision of the syllabus for the training of health visitors, etc., were also dealt with.

ANTI-RABIC TREATMENT

7. During 1939, three more centres were opened at Aligarh, Moradabad and Farrukhabad and the centre at Muttra which was hitherto financed by the Municipal Board, Muttra, was taken over by the Government. The total number of centres now aggregate seventeen including one seasonal centre at Mussoorie.

8. *Number of patients who attended the centres for treatment—* During 1939, 12,824 patients sought treatment against 10,688 in 1938. Of these 12,328 were actually treated and 496 were advised, as no treatment was necessary in their case.

11. *Paying patients*—Cost of treatment was recovered from 525 patients against 437 in the last year.

The Public Analyst.

12. The office of Public Analyst to Government, United Provinces, was held by Dr. B. M. Gupta, M.Sc., PH.D., Deputy Public Analyst to Government in addition to his own duties from 1st January 18th to July, 1939. Professor P. S. MacMahon, M.Sc. (MAC), B.Sc., (OXON), F.I.C., held this charge on return from extraordinary leave out of India from 19th July, 1939 to the end of the year.

13. The provisions of the United Provinces Prevention of Adulteration Act were further extended during the year to three notified areas and to certain rural areas of a district. The operation of the Act was extended to additional articles of food-stuffs and drugs in those localities where it was already in operation. The Act is now in force in 85 municipalities, 45 notified areas, 17 cantonment areas, two important fair areas and several town and rural areas in 40 districts.

14. The total number of samples received for analysis during the year under report was 11,814 against 11,210 in 1938, as per details in the appended table :

15. Two thousand one hundred and eighteen persons were prosecuted under the Act, of whom 1,368 were fined, three were sentenced to imprisonment in addition to fines; while two persons were imprisoned for non-payment of fines. In four cases, the offenders were warned. Seventy-seven persons were acquitted and 13 cases were withdrawn by local authorities and seven cases were filed by the courts. Nineteen persons absconded, 44 were untraceable and five died during trial. Cases against 577 persons were pending in the court for decision. Cases against four persons were compounded by the local authorities. This is not permissible under the rules. The total amount of fines inflicted for 1,368 successful cases was Rs.53,499 against Rs.54,859 for 1,342 successful cases in 1938.

The average amount of fine per case was 39.1 for the whole province as compared with 40.8 in 1938. The punishment awarded was generally deterrent but in the municipalities of Lucknow, Benares, Bareilly, Moradabad, Fyzabad, Mussoorie and Naini Tal, the fine imposed was much below the provincial average. In some localities fines under section 4(1) of the Act ranged from Re.1 to Rs.5 and were not deterrent.

16. A sum of Rs.18,230 was credited into the Government treasury on account of the cost of analysis in accordance with sub-section 3 of section 19 of the Act. A sum of Rs.92 was also realized from private persons for the analysis of their samples.

17. During the year under report, the percentage of adulterated samples was 18.8 against 20.0 in 1938. The sub-joined table shows the total number of samples received for examination and of those certified as genuine or adulterated in the 15 larger towns during the last 3 years.

This table indicates that although the extent of adulteration detected amongst the limited number of worst samples of food-stuffs submitted for examination by the various local bodies ranged on the average to about 20 per cent. the practice of sophistication is more common in important places like Benares, Shahjahanpur, Muttra, Dehra Dun, Mussoorie, and Naini Tal. Intensive action under the Act is indicated for these places.

18. The butter, ghee and fat licensing rules which have proved their usefulness in the prevention of the sale of vegetable products under the guise of genuine ghee are now in force in 69 areas out of 189. It is hoped that other local areas will see their way to adopt these rules as soon as possible.

19. The analytical work in this branch is steadily increasing. Additional staff had to be sanctioned by the Government towards the middle of July, 1939, to cope with the work. Still 2,596 samples were left unanalysed at the close of the year. A comparative statement showing the figures for the last five years is given below :

20. With a view to arm Government with sufficient powers to control the sale of ghee and hydrogenated vegetable products in particular and food-stuffs and drugs in general a bill entitled the United Provinces Prevention of Adulteration Bill, 1939, was drawn up on the lines of the latest British Food and Drugs Act, 1938. It contains provisions for the destruction of adulterated ghee. It also provides for deterrent punishments both for sellers and purchasers of "banaspati" and other vegetable oils and charbis who use it for the purpose of adulterating it with ghee or for selling it as genuine ghee. The Bill is under the consideration of Government.

It is reported that a number of persons escaped prosecution as they were not traceable. The official inspectors, it is suggested, should in all doubtful cases take adequate sureties under section 176 of the Indian Penal Code read with section 57(1) of the Criminal Procedure Code.

No samples were received from 25 localities where the Act is in force. It is desirable that in order to check the evil of adulteration which has become very common, the Act should be rigorously enforced and samples taken regularly.

21. Inspection of factories was, as usual, carried out by district and municipal medical officers of health in their capacity of *ex officio* additional inspectors of factories under the Indian Factories Act.

CHAPTER XV

General remarks

No legislation affecting public health was passed by the Government during the year. In order to provide immediate medical aid, the Government have ordered that the **Public Health Acts.** medical officers incharge of fixed dispensaries in rural areas including towns without municipalities should supplement the efforts of the public health staff in dealing with primary outbreaks of cholera and plague. The services of the medical officers incharge of fixed dispensaries under the rural department scheme and of allopathic practitioners subsidized by the state are also similarly utilized. These orders in effect imply visits to the station concerned by the medical officers incharge of fixed dispensaries immediately on receipt of a report of a primary outbreak of an epidemic disease for enforcing preventive measures including inoculation. These medical officers hold charge of the epidemic areas until the arrival of public health officers. The scheme contemplates that ordinarily a medical officer should visit the scene of an outbreak once except in cases when the outbreaks are extremely serious or when the places are within their easy reach more than one visit will be made.

2. The subject for the essay connected with the award of Rai Shambhu Dayal Sahib Gold Medal for 1939 was **Public Health Essay.** "A Scheme for Physical Culture in Rural Areas". Among the essays received the one submitted by Pandit Vishnu Dutt Dwivedi of Gorakhpur was the best and the medal was awarded to him.

Personal proceedings

3. (a) Rai Bahadur Dr. K. P. Mathur, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., D.P.H., Director of Public Health, retired on 14th November and was succeeded by me. Dr. Mathur made the following inspections :

- (1) Sanitation of Mussoorie, Kheri-Lakhimpur and Mainpuri municipalities, Sandi notified area (Hardoi district), Kariaganj town area (Aligarh district), (2) certain aspects of public health administration in the Agra, Meerut, Dehra Dun, Bareilly, Amroha and Unao municipalities, (3) improvements made in Chakra Tirath tank at Nimsar, (4) fly-proof latrines at the Indian Military Hospital, Lucknow, (5) water -works at Meerut, Dehra Dun, Allahabad, Aligarh, and Moradabad, (6) rural development work in the Fyzabad, Lucknow, Sitapur, Unao and Etawah districts and the rural public health work in the districts of Meerut and Allahabad and the Health Unit, Partabgarh, (7) vaccination in the Fyzabad district and in the Banda and Dehra Dun municipalities, (8) medical and sanitary arrangements in Magh Mela at Allahabad, Jhanda fair at Dehra Dun, Mahbarni fairs at Hardwar and Rikhikesh, exhibition at Moradabad, Mahadeo fair at Pandela village in the Allahabad district and the Shri Dauji fair at Hathras and visited Chaubari fair area in the Bareilly district in connexion with water-supply arrangements, (9) school health work at Fyzabad, Shahjahanpur, Agra, Meerut, Allahabad and the sanitation of the Government Intermediate College Hostel at Fyzabad and the school building and hostel arrangements at Oel in the Kheri district, (10) municipal infectious diseases hospitals at Dehra Dun, Benares, Allahabad and site for the same at Etawah, and isolation huts at Meerut, Sitapur and Bareilly, (11) anti-cholera measures in the Bara Banki, Benares, Allahabad,

Sitapur, and Aligarh municipalities and districts, the Fyzabad and Bareilly municipalities and the Rae Bareli, Kheri, Unao and Etawah districts, (12) working of the special anti-malaria schemes in the villages of the Hardoi district and Bazpur area of the Naini Tal district, (13) Sri Mangla Prasad Sanatorium at Sarnath in the Benares district and the Harijan colony at Allahabad, (14) anti-rabic treatment centres at Dehra Dun, Fyzabad, Benares, Allahabad and Moradabad, (15) maternity and child welfare centres at Banda, Dehra Dun, Fyzabad, Benares, Etawah, Allahabad, Moradabad and Amroha and one centre in the Allahabad district, (16) offices of district medical officers of health at Sitapur, Kheri, Pilibhit, Allahabad, Etawah, Moradabad and that of the Assistant Director of Public Health, II Range at Allahabad and (17) the working of the United Provinces Prevention of Adulteration Act in the Dehra Dun, Fyzabad, Sitapur, Kheri-Lakhimpur, Pilibhit and Moradabad municipalities and discussed with local authorities and merchants at Benares the question of establishment of a *ghee* testing laboratory by the local merchants' association, (18) a cemetery at Dehra Dun and discussed with local authorities byelaws in that connexion and (19) Government Vaccine Depot, Patwadangar, district Naini Tal. He inquired into the spread of Kala Azar in the Benares municipality and into the working of the Banda district Red Cross Branch.

Dr. Mathur visited Banda, Jhansi, Shahjahanpur, Dehra Dun, Budaun, Etawah and Mainpuri in connexion with the extension of the district health service to these districts with a view to induce the district boards to pay their share of contribution towards the service. He discussed water-supply arrangements on account of shortage of chlorine at a meeting at Lucknow and the draft rules framed under the United Provinces Melas Act with the Assistant Director of Public Health, II Range at Allahabad. He attended meetings of:

Provincial Rural Development Board, Epidemic Advisory Board, Bhowali Sanatorium Trust Committee, the United Provinces Board of Public Health, the United Provinces State Medical Faculty, Nurses and Midwives Council, Lucknow University Court, the Executive and Branch Committees of the Indian Red Cross Society, the meetings of the Provincial Centre of the St. John Ambulance Association, the annual general meetings of the Headquarters Indian Red Cross Society and St. John Ambulance Association at New Delhi, the Conference of Central Advisory Board of Health at Madras and of its sub-committee at Pandharpur and Poona (Bombay Presidency) and a meeting at Delhi convened by the Central Marketing Officer to discuss the question of adulteration in edible oils, several meetings at the Secretariat to discuss the programme of provincial health week and the supply of medicines to indigenous dispensaries and of the United Provinces Tuberculosis Association and its various sub-committees. He also attended meetings of the Public Service Commission as representative of the public health department in connexion with the selection of certain persons for the special anti-malaria schemes.

Dr. Mathur also conducted the L.P.H. and sanitary inspectors' examinations.

I inspected the municipal infectious diseases hospital, anti-rabic treatment centre, water-works, school dispensary at Cawnpore and the working

of maternity and child welfare centres, Cawnpore. I visited the St. John Ambulance training camp at Chilawan in the Lucknow district.

I attended meetings of the United Provinces State Medical Faculty, the United Provinces Nurses and Midwives Council and its special sub-committees, the United Provinces Branch of the British Empire Leprosy Relief Association, Executive Committee of the United Provinces Tuberculosis Association and the annual general and branch committee meetings of the provincial branch of the Indian Red Cross Society and of its maternity and child welfare sub-committee and the annual meeting of the provincial centre of the St. John Ambulance Association. I also attended meetings of the United Provinces water-supply inquiry committee and the meeting held at the Secretariat to discuss the water-supply arrangements for the province due to shortage of chlorine. I also attended a meeting of the drugs representatives.

(b) Dr. L. K. Ray, D.P.H., held the charge of the I Range throughout the year except during the period from 22nd October to 21st December, 1939, when he was on leave and was officiated by Rai Sahib Dr. S. P. Srivastava, D.P.H. Dr. Ray was on tour for 71 days and Dr. Srivastava for 35 days.

The Assistant Director of Public Health, I Range, made the following inspections during the year :

(1) Vaccination in the rural areas of the Meerut, Bijnor, Moradabad, Bulandshahr, Etah, Aligarh, Shahjahanpur, Lucknow, Hardoi, Saharanpur districts and also in the municipal towns of Chandpur, Sial, Sambhal, Bulandshahr, Sikandra Rao, Etah, Jalesar, Ghaziabad, Najibabad, Moradabad, Sikandrabad, Atrauli, Aligarh, Kasganj, Hapur, Shahjahanpur, Tilhar, Baraut, Hathras, Meerut, Budaun, Chandausi, Agra, Hardoi and Bijnor.

(2) Sanitation of the municipal towns of Ghaziabad, Sambhal, Sikandrabad, Atrauli, Hapur, Baraut, Hardwar, Saharanpur, Bulandshahr, Mainpuri, Muttra, Brindaban, Meerut, Ujhani, Sahaswan, Hathras and Hardoi and those of the notified areas of Anupshahr (Bulandshahr), Rikhikesh, Shikohabad (Mainpuri) and Kosi (Muttra).

(3) Anti-cholera measures in the district of Lucknow including the municipality, Unao, Rae Bareilly, Kheri and Bareilly,

(4) Anti-rat campaign in certain municipalities.

(5) Anti-smallpox measures in the Meerut district and the Hathras municipality.

(6) Infectious diseases hospitals at Moradabad, Bareilly, Hardwar, Rikhikesh, Muttra, Brindaban and Lucknow.

(7) Anti-malaria work in village Ajrara in the Meerut district.

(8) Sanitary and medical arrangements made in connexion with the Nauchandi fair (Meerut district), Piran Kaliar fair (Saharanpur district), Dikhauti fairs at Hardwar and Rikhikesh, Chaubari fair (Bareilly) and Batesar fair (Agra) and supervised the arrangements at the lunar eclipse fair at Hardwar and Garhmuktesar fair in the Meerut district.

(9) Five travelling and two indigenous dispensaries, a sugar factory at Bijnor and the Central distillery and the Modi mills at Meerut.

(10) Anti-rabic centres at Meerut and Lucknow.

(11) Water-works at Moradabad and Bhola water-works at Bhola (Meerut).

(12) Five district medical officers of healths' offices.

Dr. Ray attended the meetings of the Aligarh and Mainpuri district boards in connexion with the extension of the district health service. He visited Bareilly in connexion with the proposal of the district board to abolish the district health service. He also attended the meetings of the Hardwar improvement advisory committee.

(c) Dr. C. Trivedi, D. P. H., held charge of the Second Range till March 25, 1939, when he proceeded on leave preparatory to retirement and was succeeded by Rai Sahib Dr. B. P. Mital, D. P. H., who held charge during the rest of the year. They remained on tour for 165 days during the year.

The Assistant Director of Public Health, II Range, made the following inspections :

(1) Sanitary and medical arrangements made in connexion with the Magh Mela at Allahabad including pilgrim inspection posts, Dadri Fair (Ballia), Nauratri Fair (Mirzapur), Syed Salar Fair (Bahraich), Sawan Jhula Fair (Ajodhya), Dewa Fair (Bara Banki district), and the Etawah Exhibition.

(2) Vaccination in the districts and municipal towns of Etawah, Benares, Mirzapur, Azamgarh and Gonda.

(3) Sanitation of the municipal towns of Jhansi, Azamgarh, Etawah, Farrukhabad-cum-Fatehgarh, and Balrampur.

(4) Anti-plague measures in the districts of Mirzapur including the municipality, Benares, Jaunpur, Azamgarh, Basti, Gorakhpur, Fyzabad, Sultanpur, Allahabad, Gonda, and Hamirpur.

(5) Anti-cholera measures in the districts including some municipal towns of Ballia, Bara Banki, Banda, Jhansi, Hamirpur, Mirzapur, Benares, Ghazipur, Jaunpur, Gonda, Basti, Gorakhpur, Bahraich, Azamgarh, Cawnpore, Fatehpur, and Farrukhabad. He also visited Puraniapur (Allahabad district), in connexion with anti-malaria measures.

(6) The work of the district health staff including rural development work in the districts of Etawah, Basti, Jaunpur, Azamgarh, Fatehpur, Gonda, Mirzapur, and Benares, and the offices of district medical officers of health at the first five places.

(7) Some Ayurvedic and Unani dispensaries in the districts of Fatehpur, Jaunpur, Benares, Gonda, Azamgarh and Etawah and a public health travelling dispensary.

(8) Anti-rabic centre at Cawnpore.

(9) Goitre scheme in the Gonda and Gorakhpur districts.

(10) Water-works at Mirzapur and Cawnpore.

(11) Infectious diseases hospitals at Gorakhpur, Gonda, Benares, Mirzapur and Jhansi.

The Assistant Director of Public Health visited Cawnpore, Farrukhabad and Jalaun in connexion with the extension of the district health

service to these districts with a view to induce the district boards to pay their share of contribution towards the service.

4. Out of the two cases of corruption—one of bribery against a second clerk of the office of a district medical officer of health and the other of extortion of money against a head clerk of the office of another district medical officer of health, which were referred to in the last year's report, the inquiry in the former was completed during 1939. The second clerk in that case was found guilty of accepting illegal gratification from certain vaccinators and of misappropriation of small sums of money by getting fictitious receipts written. He was accordingly removed from the service. During the inquiry into that case a temporary embezzlement of Rs.417-8 by a clerk of the district board who was employed in the office of the district medical officer of health was detected in the Maternity funds. This official was recommended to the District Board for removal from service. The district medical officer of health under whom these clerks worked was held negligent in not detecting the malpractices, and Government have withheld the next increment of this officer for two years.

The other case of extortion of money, which is pending against the clerk in the other office, is still under investigation.

Too great an emphasis cannot be laid upon the fact that the funds placed at the disposal of the Board of Public Health are too meagre for a large province like the United Provinces to meet the daily increasing demands for public health works both in urban and rural areas. With the progress of time and advance in education these demands are bound to become more insistent as the advantages of a pure water-supply and proper drainage are more and more appreciated by the public.

The smaller municipalities and notified and town areas are now coming forward and clamouring for water-supply and drainage amenities more or less on the lines of the larger ones.

The clamant need of villages, for which large sums of money are required, is a provision of pure water-supply. But the funds, viz., Rs.53,000 provided for these purposes are very inadequate. During the last nine years the allotment for minor public health works has been reduced from Rs.2,40,000 to Rs.53,000 only with the result that many of the works are being postponed and the progress made is very slow.

It is, therefore, of utmost importance that the funds placed at the disposal of the Board of Public Health should be increased and the Government have been urged to revive the original allotments and

bring them to a total of about Rs.4,60,000 which used to be sanctioned prior to the year 1931-32.

It was represented that meetings of the Board of Public Health are not frequent enough and that the agenda paper becomes overloaded with the result that discussions on important matters have to be curtailed or even postponed. It was, therefore, decided that the matter be brought to the notice of Government for the provision of sufficient funds to enable them to meet four times in a year and to discharge their duties efficiently.

During the year under report, two meetings of the Board were held, both at Lucknow. The first meeting was held along with the session of the Legislative Assembly.

The following were the more important matters which came before the Board :

(a) Special Assistance to Pilgrim Centres

Last year the Board of Public Health requested the Government to issue orders to all the municipal boards in these provinces who are entitled to levy pilgrim-tax to show clearly and separately in their accounts the income derived from the pilgrim-tax every year and the expenditure incurred on water-supply, drainage and other sanitary arrangements provided for the benefit of the pilgrims. The Board of Public Health also requested Government to impress upon these municipal boards the importance of exhibiting under recognized heads the expenditure of the funds derived from the pilgrim-tax and to issue a warning to them that if these funds were not used mainly for the benefit of the pilgrims, Government would be compelled to take the necessary steps to prevent such funds being diverted towards other items of expenditure.

The Government could not accede to the request of the Board of Public Health. They pointed out that it was not possible to direct the local bodies to keep separate accounts of pilgrim-tax funds but they were prepared to take such action as might be called for if the Board of Public Health would bring to their notice the case of any municipal board which levied the pilgrim-tax but did not take adequate measures for the benefit of the pilgrims.

The Board of Public Health then pointed out to Government that the Fyzabad Municipal Board derived an income of about Rs.35,000 to Rs.40,000 annually from the pilgrim-tax but the expenditure incurred by it for the benefit of the pilgrims amounted to Rs.5,000 to Rs.10,000 only and requested them to compel the Municipal Board to earmark a substantial amount out of this income for carrying out the Ajodhya water-supply and drainage schemes.

The Government have expressed their inability to accept the above recommendation with the remark that it would be unreasonable to ask the Fyzabad Municipal Board to spend on pilgrims all the income

derived from the pilgrim-tax considering that this tax is paid not only by pilgrims but also by a large number of non-pilgrims who visit that city.

Allahabad—The Government's refusal to advance a loan of Rs.25,000 to the Municipal Board Allahabad for the purchase of motor lorries for the removal of nightsoil was considered by the Board of Public Health who requested Government to reconsider their decision with the remarks that it was desirable in the interests of public decency that the transport of nightsoil through the streets of a big city should be accelerated and the time had come when the present method of animal transport should be replaced by mechanization.

A loan of Rs.50,000 to start the work of constructing Infectious Diseases Hospital at Allahabad was asked for by the Municipal Board and was recommended to Government for sanction. The Government replied that no funds could be made available for this loan either during the year under report or next year. In view of the coming Kumbh Mela in 1942 the Board of Public Health have requested Government to reconsider their decision. The project for this work is estimated to cost Rs.1,97,694. It was administratively sanctioned by the Board of Public Health early in the year 1937-38 but the work could not so far be taken in hand as the Board of Public Health could not find their way to accede to the request of the Municipal Board for a grant of half the estimated cost of the scheme. As advised by the Board of Public Health, the Municipal Board have now agreed to take a loan for a major portion of the cost of the work and to spread the work over four years so that grants can be earmarked annually by the Board of Public Health towards the cost of this important work.

Sanction was accorded to the project amounting to Rs.71,642 for the installation of 4th pump at Khushrubagh and a loan of Rs.71,000 applied for by the Municipal Board to meet the cost of the work was recommended to Government for sanction.

A loan of Rs.53,489 applied for by the Municipal Board to meet the cost of the 2nd instalment of the Katra-Colonelganj drainage extension scheme was recommended to Government for sanction. The Government have sanctioned the loan. The project for Katra-Colonelganj drainage extension is estimated to cost Rs.83,489 and was sanctioned by the Board of Public Health in the year 1937-38. The first instalment of the scheme has already been carried out by a loan of Rs.30,000 from the Government.

The final instalment of Rs.40,392 out of the loan of Rs.1,90,392 sanctioned to the Municipal Board to meet the entire cost of their sullage project was paid during the year.

Baldeo (District Muttra)—The balance of Rs.5,960 out of the grant of Rs.18,718 sanctioned towards the cost of the drainage scheme of Baldeo town area was paid during the year. The work is nearing completion.

Brindaban—An offer of a sum of Rs.3 lakhs has been made by Rai Bahadur Ramji Das Bajoria to the Municipal Board Brindaban provided Government give a guarantee that the Jumna river can be trained in such a way that the stream during the winter months will remain permanently in front of the Brindaban Temple Ghats. Mr. Gerald Lacey, Superintending Engineer, III Circle, Irrigation Works, United Provinces, who was approached by the Municipal Board Brindaban for advice, has pointed out that having regard to the vagaries of a large river in flood and the known variation in the course which rivers have adopted from year to year, it is not possible to give an absolute guarantee that the river can be trained in such a way that in the cold weather the river-water will permanently flow past the Brindaban Temple Ghats and all that can be done is to take the best expert advice available and to recognize that in addition to permanent works some annual expenditure in the way of repairs will be necessary. He has advised the Municipal Board that before any training works are undertaken, the river should be surveyed and Mr. Inglis, Director of the Hydrodynamic Research Station, Poona, be requested to visit Brindaban and initiate model experiments so that various schemes for protection may be tried out and finally the best type may be adopted. Mr. Lacey suggested that the Municipal Board might request Mr. Bajoria to pay a sum of Rs.5,000 to meet the cost of preliminary inquiries and the framing of a scheme.

Mr. Bajoria has refused to pay the amount and has said that he would pay Rs.3 lakhs only on the condition that the Government undertake to guarantee a permanent flow of the river along the Ghats. The Municipal Board therefore approached the Board of Public Health for a grant of Rs.5,000 for this purpose.

The matter was considered by the Board of Public Health and it has been decided that the Municipal Board be informed that it is not possible for Government to give a guarantee that training works will result in a permanent flow of river-water along the Ghats. They are, however, prepared to give a grant of Rs.5,000 to cover the expenditure on preliminary investigations proposed by Mr. Gerald Lacey provided that Rai Bahadur Ramji Das Bajoria deposits Rs.3 lakhs to the credit of Government or alternatively gives an assurance to the satisfaction of Government that this amount will be forthcoming in full if the experts on the results of the investigations report that it can be reasonably expected that a permanent flow of river-water along the Ghats during the winter months can be established and on condition that the Municipal Board give an undertaking that they will meet the recurring expenses involved in the proper maintenance of the works after completion.

The following grants were sanctioned towards the water-supply and other health works at Brindaban :

- (1) A grant of Rs.717 equal to half the estimated cost of constructing a shed at the Infectious Diseases Hospital for disinfection and boiling of clothes.
- (2) A grant of Rs.2,710 equal to half the estimated cost of constructing certain surface drains.

(3) A grant of Rs.2,566 to meet the fees of the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department, United Provinces, for the preparation of the project and supervision charges in connexion with the Brindaban Kumbh Mela water-supply 1938. The unspent balance of Rs.501 of this grant was resumed.

(4) A further grant of Rs.10,000 towards the cost of water-supply extension scheme. The project for this work is estimated to cost Rs.34,144 and a grant of Rs.17,072 equal to half the cost was made by the Board of Public Health last year. The Municipal Board have taken a loan to meet the other half which was sanctioned by Government during the year under report. A further grant of Rs.10,000 was asked for by the Municipal Board to meet the additional cost of the pumping plant required in connexion with this scheme as due to the war the cost of the pumping plant has considerably increased.

(5) A grant of Rs.3,077 towards the cost of the scheme estimated to cost Rs.5,110 for the construction of Medical Officer's quarters and water-supply to the Infectious Diseases Hospital. At the request of the Municipal Board this grant was later on diverted to meet excess expenditure in connexion with the water-supply extension scheme.

Approval was given to the estimate amounting to Rs.5,765 for certain further extensions to the distribution system in connexion with the water-supply extension scheme but the Board of Public Health could not accede to the request of the Municipal Board to make a further grant of half the estimated cost of these extensions.

The Board of Public Health also refused to make a further grant of Rs.1,225 to meet half the excess expenditure required to construct the balancing tank of a larger capacity in connexion with the water-supply extension scheme and informed the Municipal Board that as the amount involved was small they should meet it out of their own funds.

Dalmau (District Rae Bareilly)—The recurring annual grant of Rs.250 was sanctioned to the Dalmau town area for the benefit of pilgrims.

Gokul (District Muttra)—With regard to a grant-in-aid required for the drainage scheme of Gokul Town Area in the Muttra District, the Board decided that they were not prepared to consider the question of giving a grant for this work until the Town Area Committee guarantee to meet the annual recurring expenditure of Rs.3,130 which would be required for the proper maintenance of the work after completion.

Gola Gokarannath (District Kheri)—Approval was given to the scheme amounting to Rs.9,564 for converting a portion of the Gola Tank feeder in a length of 1,470 ft. in front of the Gola Mills from an open channel into a covered piped channel. This scheme was later on abandoned and a revised scheme amounting to Rs.10,827 for covering the whole of the length of the distributary from the Mill up to the sacred Tank was prepared with a view to effectively prevent the fouling of the channel and was approved by the Board of Public Health. Funds for this work have been provided by the Hindustan Sugar Mills.

The original tube-well and waterworks plant which was installed some years ago at Gola by the Public Health Department for the benefit of pilgrims has become obsolete. It was reported by the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department that if the pilgrims were to be supplied with potable water in the future a new well and pumping plant would be necessary for which a sum of about Rs.55,000 would be required. The matter was considered by the Board of Public Health and they have decided to give a grant of Rs.10,000 for this work provided the local authority is willing to find the balance of funds required to meet the cost of the work. In case, the local authority is unable to find the necessary funds, this grant would be utilized in constructing Abyssinian tube-wells.

Hardwar—The request of the Municipal Board Hardwar Union for a grant of Rs.12,000 to meet the entire cost of constructing a new tube-well at Mayapur was considered by the Board and the grant asked for was sanctioned. The grant will be paid after the detailed proposals for the work have been submitted to and sanctioned by the Board of Public Health.

Sanction was accorded to the revised estimate amounting to Rs.2,24,500 for improvement to Har-ki-Pairi. A grant of Rs.2,000 recommended by the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department for lining the steps on the Island platform with stones has also been sanctioned.

A further grant of Rs.16,000 was sanctioned towards the cost of the Hardwar drainage and sewage farm scheme. The revised estimate for Hardwar drainage and sewage farm amounts to Rs.6,19,453 and the Board of Public Health have in the past given a grant of Rs.1,20,000 towards its cost.

Indian Red Cross Society, United Provinces Branch—Since the year 1926-27, the Board of Public Health have sanctioned to this Society every year a grant of Rs.12,000 for the production of cinema films on health and hygiene for exhibition purposes at fairs and religious gatherings. During the year 1937-38, this grant was reduced to Rs.5,000 and a grant of this amount only was sanctioned in the subsequent year 1938-39.

The Board of Public Health have observed that although they are no doubt fully alive to the importance of this work they do not consider that a grant by them for this work is a fair charge on their limited funds. During the year under report, a grant of Rs.5,000 only was sanctioned on the distinct understanding that no further grant would be sanctioned by them in future for this purpose and the Government were requested to provide funds for this work in the budget of the Director of Public Health. The Government, however, stated that owing to the imperative need for economy it was not possible for them to make a separate provision in the budget for 1940-41 for this grant and advised the Board of Public Health to continue the grant of Rs.5,000 for another year 1940-41. The Board have, therefore, sanctioned a grant of Rs.5,000 for this purpose.

Nimsar (District Sitapur)—The revised project amounting to Rs.18,237 for sanitary improvements to Chakra Tirth at Nimsar was rejected as it was lacking in many essential details. The Board of Public Health have sanctioned a grant of Rs.18,000 towards the cost of this work, which will be paid when the project for the work is sanctioned by them.

Pilgrim Route, Garhwal—The Board sanctioned grants aggregating Rs.25,000 towards the cost of constructing sweepers' huts on the Pilgrim Route, Garhwal during the last five years. During the year under review, a further grant of Rs.5,000 on account of the sixth instalment was sanctioned. The estimate amounting to Rs.44,188 for constructing 96 huts was sanctioned by the Board in 1934-35.

The application for a further grant of Rs.5,000 in the year 1940-41 on account of the seventh instalment for this work was considered by the Board and it was decided that the grant be sanctioned. It was also decided that a report be called for from the Director of Public Health as to whether the huts are being constructed in accordance with the sanctioned plans and estimates and whether the scheme in general is a success.

A re-grant of Rs.2,150 towards the cost of the incomplete works of the fifth instalment of this work was also sanctioned.

Out of the grant of Rs.8,027 sanctioned last year to meet the entire cost of constructing cholera huts at Devaprayag, Rudraprayag and Guptakashi, a sum of Rs.6,207 only could actually be expended. From the balance of Rs.1,820, a sum of Rs.1,480 was resumed and the remaining amount of Rs.340 lapsed to Government. A regrant of Rs.1,585 was asked for during the year under report to complete the works, which was sanctioned.

Piran Kaliar (District Saharanpur)—The usual annual grant of Rs.2,797 was sanctioned to meet the cost of the sanitary arrangements at Piran Kaliar fair held in April, 1939.

The question of duplicating the plant with a view to improve the fair water-supply was dropped as there appeared to be no need for augmenting the present supply because the fair would be held in cold season for several years to come.

(b) Urban Sanitation

Projects, as detailed in Appendix III, the estimated cost of which aggregated Rs.11,39,266, were either administratively or finally sanctioned by the Board of Public Health. In addition to these, forecasts of cost for certain works were also approved.

Agra—The Government asked the Board to consider the financing of the Agra drainage scheme costing about Rs.15 lakhs presuming that provincial finances would not be able to spare a grant for this scheme beyond what the Board could give from their own allotments. The matter was considered by the Board of Public Health and it was decided that Government be informed that the Board of Public Health are not in a position to finance a scheme of such magnitude as the funds placed at their disposal are very limited.

The drainage scheme of Soamibagh Colony Agra amounting to Rs.8,200 was rejected as it was lacking in several essential details.

Aligarh—With regard to the request of the Aligarh Municipal Board for a grant of a substantial amount to improve the sanitary condition of the town, it was decided that the Municipal Board should be asked to submit a detailed scheme with proposals for financing the same.

Benares—Sanction was accorded to the project amounting to Rs.38,657 for the construction of a building for child welfare and maternity centre at Benares and a grant of Rs.5,000 was made towards its cost.

Cawnpore—The project amounting to Rs.52,312 for the construction of 88 sweepers' quarters at Cawnpore submitted by the Municipal Board was sanctioned and a loan of Rs.50,000 required for the work was recommended to Government for sanction. There being no provision for this loan in the budget for the year, it will be considered by Government next year.

Dehra Dun—A further loan of Rs.21,000 required for the purchase of water meters in connexion with the Bandal water-supply extension scheme was sanctioned by Government.

The revised project amounting to Rs.3,47,532 for Dehra Dun water-supply reorganization and extension of the distribution system was sanctioned.

The project amounting to Rs.79,356 for the drainage scheme of Khurbura and Khadri mohallas was also sanctioned. The Municipal Board asked for a loan of Rs.50,000 towards the cost of this work, which was recommended to Government.

Etah—With regard to the repeated request of the Etah Municipal Board for a grant-in-aid of the entire amount, viz., Rs.69,000 required for their drainage scheme, the Board decided that they would not give any grant-in-aid unless the Municipal Board are prepared to find a substantial amount from their own funds.

Etawah—Government accorded their sanction to the programme of funds for the Etawah water-supply scheme. The project for this work is estimated to cost Rs.1,74,712 and was sanctioned by the Board of Public Health last year. The Board of Public Health have also given a grant of Rs.20,000 towards the cost of this work and the remaining amount is to be found by the Municipal Board either from their own funds or by taking a loan from Government.

Fyzabad—The Board of Public Health accorded sanction to the estimate amounting to Rs.11,937 for a new tube-well and pump house in connexion with the Fyzabad water-supply extension scheme. With regard to the request of the Municipal Board for a grant to meet the entire cost of the work, the Board regretted that they had no funds to give the grant but were prepared to recommend to Government to give a loan.

The Board also sanctioned the supplementary estimate amounting to Rs.1,634 for pumping plant for the tube-well near the existing tube-well no. 3.

An application for a loan of Rs.10,000 required for the purchase of water meters submitted by the Municipal Board was considered and recommended to Government for sanction. The Government found that the finances of the Municipal Board were not satisfactory enough to take this loan. The Municipal Board were informed accordingly and they have now dropped the idea of incurring this expenditure.

The other application of the Municipal Board for a loan of Rs.5,000 required to meet the cost of the extension of pipe line to Deo Kali Road was held up until the Municipal Board submit a detailed estimate for the work.

The Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department brought to the notice of the Board that the Municipal Board Fyzabad had not attended properly to the recommendations made in connexion with their waterworks and that their waterworks staff lacked interest and keenness in improving the undertaking although there should be no hesitation in doing so as the undertaking is in a sound financial position. The Board have asked the Commissioner to see that early steps are taken by the Municipal Board to set matters right.

Ghazipur—The Board could not accede to the request of the Municipal Board Ghazipur for a grant to meet the fees of the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department for the preparation of detailed proposals for their drainage scheme.

Gorakhpur—The following schemes were submitted by the Municipal Board Gorakhpur during the year and were sanctioned by the Board of Public Health :

(1) Detailed estimate amounting to Rs.8,162 for the construction of a trial tube-well in connexion with the water-supply scheme. The estimate is likely to go up to Rs.10,000 due to increase in prices on account of the war and the Board of Public Health have sanctioned a grant of Rs.10,000 to meet the entire cost of the work on condition that the Municipal Board would refund the grant in case the tube-well proves a success but is not utilized by them for the water-supply scheme within a reasonable time.

(2) Project amounting to Rs.32,834 for Gorakhpur drainage extension-retaining wall. The Board of Public Health had given a grant of Rs.10,786 for meeting the entire cost of constructing a retaining wall on the storm-water drain at Gorakhpur. The work was carried out by the Public Health Engineering Department. Unfortunately the wall collapsed only a few months after its completion due to unusual floods. The Public Health Engineering Department therefore prepared a project amounting to Rs.32,834 for its reconstruction. The Municipal Board asked for a grant of the entire amount as they were unable to provide any funds themselves. The Board of Public Health enquired from the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department whether it was

possible to reduce the expenditure on the work as they were not in a position to give a grant of Rs.32,834. The Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department stated that the minimum amount of work required to repair the retaining wall would cost about Rs.14,870. The Board, therefore, sanctioned a grant of this amount which will be paid in 1940-41.

(3) Project amounting to Rs.22,137-8 for the construction of Infectious Diseases Hospital. In view of the urgent need of the hospital, items of work costing Rs.11,792-3 were carried out by the Municipal Board from their own funds and they applied to the Board for a grant of the balance, viz., Rs.10,345-5 to complete the work. The Board decided to give a grant of Rs.5,000 in 1940-41 in case their funds permit and provided the Municipal Board find the balance to complete the work.

Hamirpur—A regrant of Rs.787 equal to half the cost of constructing a 6 feet diameter well in mohalla Badanpur was sanctioned.

Hardoi—Due to paucity of funds, the Board could not accede to the request of the Municipal Board Hardoi for a grant-in-aid to meet half the cost of second instalment of their drainage scheme estimated to cost about Rs.86,000. The first instalment of this scheme estimated to cost Rs.84,535 has already been carried out and the Board of Public Health gave a grant of half the amount of the work.

Hathras—The Board noted that the Municipal Board Hathras could not carry out for want of funds most of the major recommendations made in connexion with their water-works and requested the Commissioner to impress upon the Municipal Board the necessity of imposing a water-tax sufficient to make the water-works undertaking at least self-supporting. As the Municipal Board have refused to increase the existing tax at 2½ per cent. the Board have decided not to give any grant to this Municipal Board unless they carry out their legal obligations.

Jaunpur—Sanction was accorded to the detailed estimate amounting to Rs.42,161 for Jaunpur drainage improvement. The Board also sanctioned a grant of Rs.30,000 towards the cost of the work provided the Municipal Board find the balance of funds required to complete the work. The grant will be paid in two instalments one in June, 1940 and the other in March or April, 1941.

Jhansi—The Municipal Board applied for a loan of Rs.27,203 to meet half the cost of constructing Civil Lines service reservoir and staff quarters in connexion with their water-supply extension scheme, which was recommended to Government for sanction. The project for this work is estimated to cost Rs.54,406 and was sanctioned by the Board of Public Health last year. The Board have also sanctioned a grant equal to half the estimated cost of the scheme, out of which a sum of Rs.13,600 was paid last year and the balance of Rs.13,603 will be paid in 1940-41.

A grant of Rs.5,000 asked for for providing an asbestos sheet roofing to the vegetable market was refused.

Kanauj—The Board sanctioned the project amounting to Rs.7,715 for sanitary improvements to Phoolmati Devi and Lala Kunj Behari Lal Roads and made a grant of Rs.3,857 equal to half the cost. A sum of Rs.2,357, which was not likely to be expended during the year, was resumed and will be regranted next year.

The Board rejected the project amounting to Rs.3,347 for the construction of two sweet-water wells at Kanauj as it was not technically in order and returned the same to the Municipal Board for resubmission after rectification of the defects. The Board have promised to give a grant equal to half the estimated cost of the work to the extent of Rs.2,000 when the scheme after rectification is submitted to and sanctioned by them.

A report in the feasibility of diverting a portion of the flood-water from the Pata Nala in Mohalla Balai Pul at Kanauj for removing the danger of the city being washed away by a severe downpour of water during rains was called for from the Chief Engineer, Public Works Department, Buildings and Roads Branch. The report received from that officer was considered by the Board and forwarded to the Municipal Board for taking necessary action in the matter.

Kasganj—The Board refused to give any grant-in-aid to the Kasganj Municipal Board for their drainage scheme unless adequate flushing arrangements were made. The Municipal Board requested for the reconsideration of the decision. The Board reconsidered the matter and informed the Municipal Board that they stick to their previous decision that they are averse to giving any grant-in-aid for the drainage scheme unless adequate flushing arrangements are made.

Lucknow—Sanction was accorded to the project amounting to Rs.14,412 for the construction of certain additional works in the Infectious Diseases Hospital. A grant of Rs.6,000 was also sanctioned towards its cost on condition that the work is entrusted to a reliable contractor and is supervised by a properly qualified engineer and that the balance of funds required to complete the work is found by the Municipal Board. The grant will be paid in 1940-41.

The failure of the Municipal Board to prevent the sewage water discharging into the Gomti beyond the Residency rendering the beautiful River Bank Road unfit to be used as a strand for airing in the evenings because of the foul smell was brought to the notice of the Municipal Board and they were asked to prevent the pollution of the river which might cause epidemics of diarrhoea, dysentery, cholera, typhoid, etc. and especially to prevent the discharging of the drains near the bathing ghats where hundreds of pious Hindus bathe in the river and use the river-water for their daily morning ablutions.

The question was thoroughly discussed by the authorities concerned, as a result of which, the two schemes mentioned below were submitted by the Municipal Board and sanctioned by the Board of Public Health :

- (1) Project amounting to Rs.19,942 for repairs to breach in the western intercepting sewer—42" Hume Pipe sewer.

(2) Project amounting to Rs.10,058 for repairs to breaches in open sullage drains and cleansing the silt from the western and eastern intercepting sewers.

Although in the opinion of the Board of Public Health the expenditure on these schemes was a fair charge on the Municipal Board's revenue as it was due to their negligence that the river was polluted at several places, the Board sanctioned, as a special case, a grant of Rs.15,000 equal to half the cost of the works. The work has been carried out but it is still to be seen how far successful it is.

The balance of Rs.1,06,025 from the loan of Rs.2,06,025 sanctioned to the Municipal Board by Government for the installation of a fourth pump at Aishbagh waterworks was paid during the year.

The fact that the Lucknow Municipal Board did not take any action on the inspection reports of the Waterworks and Mechanical Engineer for a long time was reported to Government who were requested to impress upon the Municipal Board the necessity of taking immediate action in the matter to avoid a breakdown during hot weather.

Meerut—Approval was given to the scheme for the construction of a new market at Meerut and the Municipal Board were asked to prepare detailed proposals in accordance with the rules laid down in the Municipal Manual incorporating therein all the suggestions made by the Director of Public Health.

Muttra—A loan of Rs.3,67,174 required for the reorganization of water-supply was recommended to Government for sanction. The Government have made available a sum of Rs.50,000 during the year under report and the balance will be paid in subsequent years as funds will be required. The project for this work is estimated to cost Rs.4,17,174 and was sanctioned by the Board of Public Health in 1938-39. The Municipal Board propose to finance it by a loan of Rs.3,67,174 from the Government and by a grant of Rs.50,000 from the Board of Public Health. A sum of Rs.5,000 was sanctioned by the Board of Public Health as grant-in-aid and consideration of giving a further grant of the remaining amount, viz., Rs.45,000 was postponed.

Sanction was accorded to the project (alternative no. II) amounting to Rs.48,419 for the drainage scheme of Dig Darwaza. The Municipal Board propose to finance the scheme by a grant and a loan of equal amounts. The Board could not sanction the grant asked for as no funds were available during the year.

Sanction was also accorded to the project amounting to Rs.5,110 for the construction of two 8-seated water flush latrines one at Bengali Ghat near Bharatpur Wali Dharamshala and the other at Calnanganj and a grant of half the estimated amount of the work, viz. Rs.2,555 asked for by the Municipal Board was sanctioned. This grant will be paid from the allotment for the year 1940-41.

A grant of Rs.1,087 equal to half the estimated cost of constructing a 4-seated water flush latrine and two urinals at Hardinge Gate was sanctioned during the year.

The Board refused to give a grant of Rs.15,300 to the Municipal Board Muttra to meet the entire cost of training the river Jumna as they are averse to making any recurring grant and asked the Municipal Board to find the necessary funds themselves.

Muzaffarnagar—The Board accorded sanction to the project amounting to Rs.70,200 for the drainage scheme of Muzaffarnagar municipality. The Municipal Board propose to finance it by a grant and a loan of equal amounts. The Board sanctioned the grant required and recommended the loan to Government. The loan has been sanctioned by Government who have paid a sum of Rs.20,000 during the year and the balance of the loan, i.e., Rs.15,000 will be paid in 1940-41. The Board of Public Health have paid the whole amount of the grant, i.e., Rs.35,100 during the year.

Naini Tal—The Waterworks and Mechanical Engineer's inspection report on the condition and maintenance of Naini Tal water and hydro-electric undertakings reveals a very unsatisfactory state of affairs. A general reorganization of the undertaking is necessary and the cost of the capital works recommended in the report roughly amounts to Rs.10 lakhs. The matter was considered by the Board and they are of opinion that it is not advisable to press the Municipal Board to incur such a heavy capital expenditure as the future of the town is uncertain. They have requested Government to give some indication as to their future policy in the matter.

The Board sanctioned the project amounting to Rs.1,63,278 for Naini Tal sewerage but they could not make a grant of half the estimated cost of the work required by the Municipal Board. The Municipal Board requested the Board of Public Health to recommend to Government to waive the fees of the Public Health Engineering Department on account of the supervision of the work. The Board did not agree to this but decided to recommend a loan of the full amount required for the work. They have also decided to point out to Government that the work is very urgent and unless their policy is known as to whether Naini Tal will continue as the summer capital of the province, it is very doubtful if the Municipal Board can finance this as well as other capital works in connexion with the drainage, water-supply and hydro-electric undertakings and also meet the additional recurring expenses in the maintenance of these works.

A grant of Rs.5,000 asked for for making a survey and preparing plans and schemes for the development of the town was refused.

Najibabad—The estimate amounting to Rs.5,000 for sinking 4 inches gas pipes in 18 wells at Najibabad was approved and the Board decided to make a grant of Rs.4,000 towards its cost in the year 1940-41 provided the balance of Rs.1,000 is found by the Municipal Board.

Roorkee—The Municipal Board Roorkee submitted a project estimated to cost Rs.3,221 for the construction of side drains on both sides on Ambertalab Feeder Road which was rejected for want of several essential technical details.

Unao—With regard to the request of the Municipal Board Unao for a grant or a loan of Rs.9,500 required for the extension of water-supply mains in Stevensonganj and Parao, the Board decided that they would be prepared to recommend to Government to give a loan for this work when the detailed proposals are submitted to and sanctioned by them.

In order to improve the financial condition of the waterworks undertaking, the Municipal Board Unao were advised to charge meter rent especially in cases where the consumption of water was in excess of free allowance fixed by them. In reply, the Municipal Board have stated that they charge for the cost of water consumed and therefore they do not think it necessary to charge meter rent. The Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department who was consulted in the matter, informed the Board that as the Unao waterworks made a profit in the year 1938-39 without imposing meter rent, it is not necessary to press the Municipal Board to impose meter rent. The Board have agreed with the view of the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department.

(c) Rural and Minor Sanitary Works

Funds to the extent of Rs.49,564, as shown in Appendix II(c), were made available for the construction of petty health works, such as drainage schemes, construction of new sanitary wells, improvement and repairs of existing wells, filling of depressions and insanitary pits, etc.

Funds were allotted only to those areas in which the works could be conveniently supervised by the District Rural Development Associations, Panchayats constituted under the Village Panchayat Acts or by Co-operative Better-Living Societies organized by the Co-operative Department; the underlying idea being that the funds should be spent on properly supervised works and expenditure incurred by bodies of people who have shown public spirit in a marked degree and who are prepared to make the most of the grant. The Commissioners were requested to make it a point that the local bodies receiving the grant should be encouraged to spend the money on a work of permanent utility and that if necessary the carrying out of a work be spread over a period of two to four years so that they may be able to show some tangible result of the expenditure of the cumulative grant made for a particular work.

Batesar (District Agra)—A large cattle fair is held at Batesar. It is one of the largest cattle fairs of Northern India and is attended by about a lakh of cattle and two lakhs of pilgrims from all parts of the United Provinces, the Punjab and the Indian States. There is no provision for a pure water-supply and for removal of dust nuisance. The District Board Agra requested the Board of Public Health to get a scheme prepared and to provide the necessary funds for carrying out the work. The matter was considered by the Board of Public Health and it was decided that the attention of Government be invited to the fact that a large sum of money is derived by the local zamindars as income from the stall-keepers and cattle-dealers and yet these zamindars do nothing to improve the amenities of the place and that the Government

be requested to bring this fair within the purview of the United Provinces Melas Act 1938 and the Director of Public Health be requested to prepare a set of by-laws for ensuring adequate supply of wholesome water for drinking and to make arrangements for keeping the mela area free from dirt. The Government have observed that as this is not a religious fair and as it is managed by the District Board, it cannot be brought within the purview of the Act. The question of provision of water-supply at the fair is again under the consideration of the Board of Public Health.

Daranagar (District Allahabad)—The drainage scheme of Daranagar estimated to cost Rs.4,249 was rejected as it was found wanting in several essential details.

Dewa (District Bara Banki)—Sanction was accorded to the revised estimate amounting to Rs.7,893 for Dewa Fair water-supply extension of pipe line to Dargah. A grant of Rs.5,880 was sanctioned by the Board of Public Health in the year 1937-38 towards the cost of the work and the balance of Rs.2,013 has been provided by the Dargah Committee.

Ganges Fair (District Shahjahanpur)—An estimate amounting to Rs.2,612 for the purchase and fixing of 100 tube-wells in the Ganges Fair held twice a year in the Shahjahanpur district was submitted by the District Board Shahjahanpur and approved. A grant of half the amount, viz., Rs.1,306 was also made.

Garhwal District—With regard to the request of the District Board Garhwal for an annual recurring grant of Rs.5,000 for the improvement of sanitation and for combating epidemics, it was decided that the District Board be informed that the Board of Public Health do not give any recurring grant. As regards the other request of the District Board for an allotment of Rs.14,412 for water-supply schemes in 9 villages, it was decided that the District Board be asked to submit revised schemes for the consideration of the Board of Public Health.

Ghagwa and Juhi Dayal (District Gorakhpur)—A further grant of Rs.411-4-9 required to clear the accounts of constructing two tube-wells for supplying calcium free water to villages in endemic goitre area at Ghagwa and Juhi Dayal in the Gorakhpur district was sanctioned during the year. The work has been completed at a cost of Rs.3,629-4-9 and the Board of Public Health have given a total grant of Rs.2,229-4-9 towards its cost.

Ismailganj (District Allahabad)—The District Board Allahabad submitted a project amounting to Rs.10,389 for the drainage scheme of Ismailganj which was rejected for want of many essential technical details.

Jhanjar (District Garhwal)—The Board of Public Health could not see their way to make a grant required to meet half the cost of the project amounting to Rs.10,022 for providing water-supply at village Jhanjar in the Garhwal district.

Kotdwara (District Garhwal)—Sanction was accorded to the project amounting to Rs.77,004 for Kotdwara water-supply and a grant of Rs.15,000 was made towards its cost.

Moghal Sarai (District Benares)—A further grant of Rs.5,500 was sanctioned towards the cost of Moghal Sarai water-supply scheme which will be paid in 1940-41. The project for this work is estimated to cost Rs.36,828 and was sanctioned by the Board of Public Health in the year 1938-39 when a grant of Rs.20,000 was also made towards its cost.

Sanction was accorded to the estimate amounting to Rs.5,319 for the installation of chlorinating plant in connexion with Moghal Sarai water-supply. The Board of Public Health have found the entire funds for this work.

Nangal (District Bijnor)—The Board of Public Health could not approve the project amounting to Rs.4,460 for the construction of two masonry falls at Nangal in the Bijnor district as it was not technically in order.

Pauri (District Garhwal)—Approval was given to the scheme amounting to Rs.3,668 for Pauri water-supply and a grant of Rs.2,445 equal to about two-thirds of the cost was made.

Ram Ganga Chaubarighat Mela (District Bareilly)—This mela is held twice every year, once on the occasion of Jeth Dasehra and again at the time of Kartiki Ganga Ashnan, on the bank of the river Ram Ganga in village Chaubari in the Bareilly district on the 6th mile on Bareilly-Budaun Road. The mela comprises an area of about two miles in length and about one mile in breadth and takes place in the open fields and inside mangoe groves. In addition to the Ashnan, a cattle market is held where about 50 to 60 thousand cattle are brought for sale. The mela lasts for about a week and on the main bathing day there is a gathering of about three lakhs. The Director of Public Health recommended that the Board of Public Health should make a grant of Rs.4,000 spread over a period of two years for the construction of 8 *pucca* wells. The matter was considered by the Board of Public Health and it was decided that the Government be requested to bring this fair within the purview of the United Provinces Melas Act, 1938. The Government are taking necessary action in the matter and in the meantime they have asked the Board of Public Health to consider the question of making arrangements for providing a good water-supply at the mela.

Ramnagar (District Naini Tal)—A further grant of Rs.61-11-6 to meet half the excess expenditure of Rs.123-7 over the original estimate amounting to Rs.14,000 for remodelling Ramnagar water-supply was sanctioned.

Srinagar (District Garhwal)—A regrant of Rs.5,635 to meet the entire cost of constructing K.C. drains on either side of the main bazar of Srinagar town area in the Garhwal district was made.

(d) F—Works

Syed Salar (District Bahraich)—The estimate for the construction of a tube-well at Syed Salar amounts to Rs.8,558 and was sanctioned by the Board of Public Health in the year 1936-37. A sum of Rs.1,000 was made available for this work in the year 1938-39 out of which Rs.45 only could be expended and the unspent balance of Rs.955 lapsed to Government. During the year under report, a further sum of Rs.5,500 was paid for this work. The tube-well has been completed successfully.

Malaria Sub-Committee

The Malaria Sub-Committee of the Board of Public Health was formed in the year 1932 at the instance of Government of India. There being no important matter which could be referred to the Sub-Committee no meeting was held during the year under report. A few cases, were, however, disposed of by the Chairman.

The office of the Chairman of the Sub-Committee was held by Rai Bahadur Dr. K. P. Mathur, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., D.P.H., Director of Public Health, United Provinces, till 14th November, 1939, when it was taken over by Rai Bahadur Dr. A. C. Banerjea, DR.P.H.

Rai Bahadur Dr. A. C. Banerjea, DR.P.H., Director of Public Health, United Provinces, held the office of the Secretary till 14th November, 1939, when he was succeeded by Dr. P. N. Chatterjee, Senior Assistant Malaria Officer who is at present in charge of Malaria Branch.

General

The statements showing (1) the results of bacteriological and chemical analyses of municipal water-supplies for the year 1938-39 and (2) the death rates per 1,000 of population from water-borne diseases

together with notes on the working of water-supplies and on the incidence of water borne diseases in relation to the quality of water-supplies, forwarded by the Director of Public Health, United Provinces, were considered and recorded.

Most of the water, drainage and hydro-electric works in these provinces were inspected by the Waterworks and Mechanical Engineer during the year. Inspection reports or the action taken thereon by the local bodies concerned in respect of the following works were considered by the Board :

(1) Agra, (2) Dehra Dun, (3) Fyzabad, (4) Hathras, (5) Jaunpur, (6) Jhansi, (7) Lucknow, (8) Mussoorie, (9) Naini Tal and (10) Unao.

The budget estimate of the office of Secretary, Board of Public Health, as well as of the grants and loans for sanitary schemes for 1940-41 were approved and forwarded to Government.

The annual report on the working of the Board of Public Health for the year ending 31st March, 1939, prepared by the Secretary, was passed and a copy was forwarded to the Director of Public Health, United Provinces, for incorporation in his annual report, as usual. It was further resolved that the Honourable Members of both the Legislatures be informed that a copy of the same can be had on application to the Secretary. A copy was also ordered to be supplied to the Press.

The annual report of the Director of Public Health for the year ending 31st December, 1937, and that of the Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department, for the year ended 31st March, 1938, copies of which were supplied to members, were recorded.

Mr. H. G. Trivedi, Superintending Engineer, Public Health Department, stated that the question of storage cistern for domestic water-supply was under the consideration of the Water-Supply Enquiry Committee and requested the Board of Public Health to make a grant of Rs.500 to meet the cost of making experiments for a design of a small cistern suitable for domestic water-supply. The grant asked for was sanctioned by the Board of Public Health. The experiments were carried out by Mr. Dastoor, Waterworks Superintendent, Benares.

The Board of Public Health considered the minutes of the Sub-Committee appointed to consider and report on the "Necessity for introducing legislation to prevent people not inoculated against cholera from visiting the larger melas in the United Provinces" and resolved that they are definitely of opinion that Government should make arrangements for making cholera inoculation compulsory and should devise the necessary ways and means for the enforcement of the measure, *vide* resolution No. 55, dated the 30th January, 1940, Appendix No. I. The Government have been requested to take necessary action in the matter.

A small committee consisting of the following members was appointed to enquire into the question of the pollution of rivers in the

United Provinces and to suggest ways and means of preventing the same :

In order to make all the municipal boards alive to their responsibilities in connexion with the drainage and water-supply schemes, the Board of Public Health have decided that a copy of the minutes of their meetings be sent to all the municipal boards so that they may know what municipalities are receiving grants from the Board of Public Health. This the Board of Public Health hope would prove an incentive for those municipalities which are not making any efforts to formulate proposals for their sanitary improvements.

During the year under report, the office of the President of the Board of Public Health was held by the following :

Necessity for introducing Legislation to prevent people not inoculated against cholera from visiting the larger meals in the United Provinces

55. Mr. V. N. Mehta, ex-President of the Board of Public Health, drew up a note on the cholera epidemic at the last Kumbh at Hardwar and circulated it among the members of the Board of Public Health for consideration.

The Board of Public Health, at their meeting held in July, 1938, considered the note, a copy of which is enclosed herewith, and resolved that a committee be appointed to report in the matter. The personnel of the Sub-committee was decided as below :

Rai Bahadur Dr. D. D. Pandya, (retired Assistant Director of Public Health, United Provinces), Jopling Road, Lucknow, and Dr. Abdus Samad, M.L.A., Cawnpore, were elected in April last members in the vacancies caused by the expiration of the term of membership of Major Dr. D. R. Ranjit Singh and Dr. Vyas.

At the instance of the President, Rai Bahadur Dr. K. P. Mathur, late Director of Public Health, United Provinces, prepared a detailed note on "Necessity for introducing legislation to prevent people not inoculated against cholera from visiting the larger melas in the United Provinces". A copy of the note is attached hereto. All the members of the Sub-Committee are in general agreement with the note.

The Board of Public Health considered the minutes of the Sub-Committee appointed under resolution No. 42, dated the 23rd July, 1938, and resolved that they are definitely of opinion that Government should make arrangements for making the cholera inoculation compulsory and should devise the necessary ways and means for the enforcement of the measure.

Copy of note, by late MR. V. N. MEHTA, I.C.S., President, Board of Public Health, United Provinces, on Hardwar Cholera

It is in no spirit of cavilling against the very best efforts made by the Public Health Department to cope with the Cholera epidemic that I write this note and circulate this report to the Members for their consideration.

In the first place as regards the origin. The place was practically free till after 30th April from Cholera.

Infection came from Bihar and Brindaban. Are we or are we not in a position to make it illegal for certain melas of all-India character, which may be proclaimed under the Act which I suggest for your consideration, for visitors to visit these religious fairs without inoculation certificate against cholera?

If the Iraq Government can insist on these certificates from Shias, if the Saudi Government on one side and the Egyptian on the other can do it for the Haj and pilgrimage to the shrines in Iraq, is there to be a confession on our part that we in India could not do it? Is the crowd going to the Id-uz-Zuha Haj better hygienically informed than the crowd that frequents these all-India fairs? I am prepared in the name of national self-respect to give a reply in the negative. It is only a question of (1) Legislation, (2) training public opinion to see that legislation is enforced, (3) staff to cope with the work, (4) funds.

We have made pilgrimages lose all their merit by making them so cheap. No pilgrimages to Arabia are cheap. But there are modern arrangements. Could we not suggest that for certain fairs of an all-India character inoculation against cholera be insisted on and a certificate to that effect alone will enable a person to enter the area? Inspection may be held at the Railway Station and at all barriers and also checked on the spot and those who do not comply with the law should not only be prosecuted and fined but sent back immediately. The second point that strikes one is that that no more tickets should be allowed to be issued unless the railway siding arrangements for deploying special trains is enough to empty the area within five days of the big day, i.e., if the trains can clear 70,000 a day the issue of third class railway tickets be stopped after 3,50,000 tickets were issued or we should demand the Railway authorities to double the track. It was the lamentable congestion of pilgrims on the road and the station for two days that caused the inbreeding of cholera through cholera struck patients infecting humanity closely packed together sitting for two days on the road. The scene could not be visualized by any one who did not see it and I saw it and felt the hopelessness of the whole position. Unlike Allahabad, Hardwar couped up between the hills and the Doab is topographically unfit to accommodate at one time a huge stationary mass of humanity and unless we throw more bridges on the Bijnor side of the river and divert traffic from that side there is bound to be congestion.

Sanitary and other arrangements were all right, but we are apt to be over-optimistic. I am afraid they erred on the side of too much optimism. They were fair weather arrangements. No squalls were expected. But squalls are the rule and the subordinate staff for moving patients from the place of infection to the place of treatment or of dead bodies from the hospitals to the Ghats broke down. I ordered Mr. Johnston to pay exorbitant price as daily wages and send down Kahars from Saharanpur to Hardwar. There should be a crematorium electrically worked near the infectious diseases hospitals. This crematorium is a necessity for disposing of unclaimed bodies. Please understand that I blame no one. Both Dr. Ray and Banerjea worked to

my knowledge to the bone. But there was lack of sufficient skilled and unskilled menial workers. The Department will have to keep this in hand and we should press on Government the necessity of providing more funds for the Public Health Department so that the Director of Public Health can make adequate arrangements.

I must ultimately put down for the self-respect of this storied land that we cannot afford to countenance the attitude of the masses. "In such shows people are to die and they die in a holy place." We have to train people into hygienic self-respect. We have to see that these all-India fairs do not become the foci for the dissemination of cholera all over India. We have to deal with an inert mass of prejudice but this has to be tackled. For favour of suggestion to my colleagues.

Copy of note, by RAI BAHADUR DR. K. P. MATHUR, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., D.P.H., late Director of Public Health, United Provinces, on necessity for introducing legislation to prevent people not inoculated against cholera from visiting the larger melas in the United Provinces.

Necessity for the measure—While there is always some cholera in the United Provinces every year, there has almost always been wide-spread epidemic in the years in which the Kumbh or Adh Kumbh melas have been held at Hardwar or Allahabad, as the following table will show :

3. The effect of the importation of cholera in a large gathering like the Kumbh and the Adh Kumbh is not confined merely to the actual seizures in the mela area. A very large number of other people receive infection and develop the disease en-route to their homes. Pilgrims are drawn from numerous towns and hamlets scattered all over the United Provinces and other provinces, and infection is carried to these villages and towns by the returning pilgrims and simultaneous outbreaks occur all over immediately after the dispersal of a mela. This is clearly illustrated in the weekly analyses of the incidence of cholera in India in Appendix 'A' in connexion with the Kumbh mela of 1938, where the first case of cholera was noticed on 6th April, 1938, and the fair dispersed after the chief bathing day of 13th April, 1938.

4. *Measures taken to prevent importation of cholera*—In order to prevent the importation of the disease into these fairs, a very limited system of inspecting persons entering the mela area through the main points of entry used to be undertaken previous to 1927 in order to intercept those obviously suffering from the disease. Owing to the great rush at these points on the principal days, these inspections were not productive of much result. In 1926-27 accordingly, in consultation with the Railway authorities, the United Provinces Government introduced the inspection of pilgrims travelling by rail at stations on the borders of the United Provinces and at others at which the people finally alighted for the pilgrimage. These inspections, which are still in vogue, are undertaken for specified periods only (usually some time before and after the principal days of a mela), and are confined to persons travelling in pilgrim specials and slow passenger trains.

5. This arrangement, although an improvement on the system of limited local inspections previously in force, has not completely stopped the importation of cholera into the melas. This is because modern research has shown that a large number of people, who have previously had the disease, continue to harbour its germs. Such people owing to the acquired immunity do not any longer show signs of illness but if the water-supply or the food-supply in an area get contaminated through them, this contamination will be sufficient to infect others who have not any acquired immunity. No amount of inspection at the Railway stations could detect such "carriers" of the disease.

6. It must also be admitted that owing to the crowded state of the trains during the rush periods when passengers even up to one thousand may travel in a single train, and the short periods of halt, and the limited staff, it is extremely difficult to undertake effective inspection of all the pilgrims even for obvious signs of cholera. A more effective way would be to detrain the passengers and pass them through a gate but this would mean great inconvenience to them, particularly at night. They would not also get down without taking their personal belongings with them, and great confusion and sometimes loss to the passengers by theft might result in the process. Shelter against adverse weather conditions would also be required.

7. During recent years, sanitary and medical arrangements at the large fairs have become more and more elaborate. Drainage has been introduced in Hardwar, and piped water-supply at almost the farthest end of pilgrim enclosures in Hardwar and Allahabad. More staff and more funds are being provided on every occasion. The number of inspection posts has been increased at Railway stations and roads, and watch for infectious cases has been made more vigilant. Very close attention is paid to the detection of disease, rapid transport of the sick and their treatment. It is felt that the limit in these directions has now been reached, and that without more effective protection against insidious importation from outside, nothing further can be done to prevent the outbreaks in the melas, and the subsequent spread to the rest of India.

8. *Compulsory inoculation against cholera of intending pilgrims*—The suggestion that all pilgrims proceeding to these large gatherings may be inoculated against cholera was first made in 1927 by Sir Leonard Rogers, the well-known authority on cholera, who has had a distinguished career in India and was at the time Medical Adviser to the India Office. Anti-cholera inoculation had at that time been only just introduced by the Health departments in India and it was felt that compulsory inoculation of intending pilgrims, without much previous propaganda or the demonstration of results, would be premature. The suggestion was not accordingly proceeded with, but the question was taken up by one of my predecessors, Lt. Col. C. L. Dunn, C.I.E., in 1929.

9. Col. Dunn's suggestion to the Government was that as cholera in the large gatherings in the United Provinces is almost always imported from Bengal and Bihar-Orissa :

(i) persons from these Provinces desiring to enter the United Provinces during certain specified periods to be determined with reference to each mela, should not be permitted entry into the Province unless they can produce a certificate of having been inoculated against cholera within the preceding six months;

(ii) requisite inspection posts for this purpose should be established by the United Provinces Government at the eastern border stations of Bhatni on the B. N. W. Railway and Mughalsarai and Benares on the E. I. Railway through which all passengers from Bengal, Bihar and Orissa must pass for a journey to the United Provinces.

The proposal was referred by the United Provinces Government to the Governments of Bengal and Bihar. The latter were opposed to it. Bengal, though not against the measure, did not wish, as a provincial Government, to assume responsibility for preventing pilgrims from starting on a pilgrimage, and suggested that the Government of India might initiate the necessary prohibitory measures. They however insisted that uniform and concerted action in this respect should be taken by all neighbouring provinces, as prohibitory orders against one province would be of little practical value.

The views of the United Provinces Government on the subject are summarised in their letter no. 4240/C, dated the 8th October, 1928, to the Secretary, Railway Board, wherein they said that :

“the only completely effective means of preventing the spread of cholera by pilgrims is, if satisfactory arrangement could be made, to protect the pilgrims by anti-cholera inoculation before they leave their homes in Bengal and Bihar.”

The Kumbh of Allahabad in 1930, for which these measures were being primarily considered, passed off before final decision in the matter could be reached. The question thereafter was dropped, and has not been revived since, but it is significant that the necessity for some such measure has occurred independently to the Chief Commissioner, Delhi Province, who in 1937 enquired if people who have not been recently inoculated against plague could be forbidden entry into Delhi Province from the Meerut district of United Provinces.

The case of the United Provinces for some protective regulation of the nature suggested, arises from the fact that it is situated somewhat centrally in the geography of India and along the main line of the movement of people and commerce. It has five pilgrim centres of all-India importance (Benares, Ayodhya, Allahabad, Brindaban and Hardwar) and has also to be traversed for pilgrimage to Badrinath and Kedarnath in Garhwal. The Kumbh and Adh Kumbhs which are held at Allahabad and Hardwar alternately after every three years, and at Brindaban after every 12 years, draw pilgrims from all over India, and particularly from the endemic areas of Bengal and Bihar. Other provinces of India are not situated in the same way; consequently there has been no demand from them for prohibitory orders of the nature suggested.

When compulsory inoculation of intending pilgrims from Bengal and Bihar was considered in 1929 it was suggested that the necessity for compulsion might cease if voluntary inoculations increased within the Province. The Director of Public Health, Bengal, made special arrangements at Howrah for the inoculation of intending pilgrims to the United Provinces in 1929, but in his opinion the number inoculated was far too small to be effective. Since then inoculation against cholera has increased in all provinces in India but the numbers inoculated are but an infinitesimal proportion of the total population, and no reliance can be placed on the meagre degree of protection achieved by such voluntary efforts. It is through the unhygienic habits of the most backward that disease spreads, and these backward people are also the least likely to voluntarily take inoculation.

The Scheme

(a) *The Scheme of 1929*—In connexion with the proposals submitted by Col. Dunn in 1929 it was suggested that—

(i) the scheme should only apply to pilgrims from Bengal and Bihar;

(ii) it should apply to persons in pilgrim specials and slow passenger trains;

(iii) intending pilgrims from these Provinces should have in their possession a certificate of inoculation within six months of the date of journey;

(iv) these certificates should be *examined* by a special staff to be provided by the United Provinces Government at Mughalsarai and Benares on the East Indian Railway and Bhatni on the Bengal North Western Railway, and

(v) those not in possession of this certificate should not be allowed to proceed further.

(b) *Present suggestions*—In my opinion, the following procedure would provide less opportunities for evasion, and would be simpler of enforcement—

(i) Railway administrations should by law be required to desist from issuing the lower class tickets (inter and III) without the production by each intending passenger of a certificate of inoculation within the previous six months;

(ii) the restriction should apply to all passenger trains—not merely to those in pilgrim specials;

(iii) the United Provinces Government in consultation with the provincial Governments should fix the specific period on each occasion for which this prohibitory order on the railways should apply;

The intention is that the prohibitory order should apply only for the Kumbh and Adh Kumbh melas, and only in very exceptional cases for other melas, for the minimum period necessary with reference to the actual dates of the melas :

(iv) the prohibition order should apply to such Provinces or Indian States or parts of a Province or State as may be specified in this behalf by the United Provinces Government in consultation with the Provincial Government or Indian State concerned;

The intention is that if cholera is epidemic in Provinces other than Bihar and Bengal, or in an adjoining Indian State, the prohibitory order may be made to apply to that Province or Indian State also, and that if parts of Bengal, Bihar and Orissa are free from cholera, the prohibitory order may not apply to such parts.

(v) the particular stations in the United Provinces to which tickets may not be issued should be specified in each case.

It is impossible and unnecessary to order that tickets to no stations in the United Provinces during the period in question should be issued without the production of a certificate of inoculation, as the intention is only to regulate the traffic to the melas. An order that tickets to the place of the mela only, viz., Hardwar and Allahabad, should not be issued, would not on the other hand be sufficient, as people might take

tickets to the next previous station, and complete the journey on foot. As a working principle, I have in view all stations within a radius of 10 miles of the place of mela, no tickets to which may be issued either from the areas outside United Provinces to be specified in paragraph (iv) or from any part of the United Provinces itself, without the production of a certificate of previous inoculation.

(c) *Duty of Railway*—According to this scheme, each pilgrim intending to proceed to any station within a radius of 10 miles of the place of mela to be specified in this behalf will have to produce before the booking clerk a certificate of inoculation against cholera within the previous six months. Booking clerks will issue tickets for only as many people as are certified to have been inoculated according to the entry in the certificate, and they should stamp each certificate in token of the tickets having been issued, so that the same may not be used by others. Children below 3 years of age should be exempt from the necessity of inoculation.

In the same way, all persons wishing to travel Inter class or III class upon a pass or privilege ticket order must produce before their superiors a certificate of inoculation against cholera within previous six months, and no pass or privilege ticket order should be issued to the specified area without such a certificate.

The issue of railway tickets at the point of commencement of the journeys, after satisfying that the intending passengers are inoculated, would save the larger checking staff at border stations throughout day and night that the United Provinces Government would otherwise have to provide, as also inconvenience to the travelling public and detention of trains at borders.

The time required for the scrutiny of the certificates at booking offices may necessitate some extra staff at those stations from where very large traffic originates (e.g. Lucknow, Cawnpore, etc.). It is hoped that the Railways would not grudge the little extra cost. If the degree of protection against cholera among intending pilgrims is as high as it is proposed to make by this scheme, Railways may be saved the cost of some extra arrangement and disinfection they have usually to undertake on these occasions.

(d) *Traffic by Road (i) Motor traffic*—A large amount of traffic from districts adjoining Allahabad, Hardwar and Brindaban reaches there by motor bus. In fairness to Railways the same restriction should be applied to this kind of traffic as is intended for Railways. I suggest that rules should be framed under the United Provinces Motor Vehicles Act prohibiting the drivers of all motor vehicles (including private-owned motor cars) from carrying to within a radius of 10 miles of the mela any person who has not been inoculated against cholera within the last six months.

(ii) *Foot Traffic*—In the case of persons travelling to the mela by foot, or by bullock cart, or other means of conveyance checks should be applied at convenient points within the radius of 10 miles on roads leading to the mela, and no one should be permitted to proceed except on the production of a certificate of inoculation.

(iii) *Traffic from Nepal*—Intending pilgrims from Nepal would usually take train or bus somewhere on reaching British India, and as such would come within the purview of the orders to be promulgated for each kind of traffic.

(e) *Other Local Governments*—It will be necessary for local Governments of the Provinces or States included in the prohibitory order—

(i) to make known the provision of the Prohibitory order as widely as possible;

(ii) to provide free inoculation for intending pilgrims at all towns, rural hospitals and dispensaries and other places and to issue the requisite certificates of inoculation, just as is the practice for Haj pilgrims.

This will mean some cost to these Governments but popularization of anti-cholera inoculation is already the policy of all Provincial Governments in India. At present they have to give much thought and attention to the risk of infection of their province from pilgrims returning from large melas. The high degree of immunity among intending pilgrims that is desired to achieve in this scheme would altogether eliminate the risk of the spread of cholera in their provinces and states from this source, and reduce the worry and cost to which they are put on this account.

(f) *Public Opinion*—Inoculation and vaccination is compulsory in the case of the Haj pilgrims, and no objections have been raised by the people concerned. It may be anticipated therefore that there would not be much public opposition to inoculation for pilgrimage within India, the inoculating material not containing any objectionable material. For some years past, Health departments in India have undertaken active propaganda in favour of anti-cholera inoculation. It is now not the novelty that it was in 1927. The increasing number of inoculations indicates its progressive popularity and it is felt that the necessity for submitting to inoculation before undertaking a pilgrimage would not thus be resented.

Regulations in respect of journeys to other countries—It may be added that—

(i) in the case of passengers to East and South Africa and to Iraq a certificate of vaccination within six months of the date of the journey is required (*vide* paragraph 51A, Chapter XIV, page 218 of the United Provinces Public Health Manual, 1938 edition);

(ii) in the case of pilgrims proceeding to Hedjaz or elsewhere overseas also, a similar certificate of vaccination is required (*vide* paragraph 51A (3) of the same chapter of the Manual);

(iii) in the case of pilgrims proceeding to Hedjaz, a certificate of inoculation against cholera is also required (paragraph 8C, Chapter XV, page 238 of the Public Health Manual);

(iv) in the case of all persons proceeding by Air to Persia, Iraq, Trans-Jordan, Egypt, Palestine and Greece various medical restrictions have been imposed (*vide* Appendix II to the United Provinces Public Health Manual 1938 edition).
