History

From a Hudson's Bay Company trading post (Fort Garry) in 1870, with a poulation of 215, Winnipeg has grown to the size and finish of a first-class city of approximately 244,000 people. When the City was incorporated in 1873 there was a pupulation of 1,869.

The present Health Department may be said to date from 1900 when the late Dr. A. J. Douglas was appointed the first full time Health Officer.

From 1881 to 1900 Winnipeg had a series of part time Medical Health Officers.

In 1941 amalgamation with the School Medical Services occurred and the services increased and extended to all child caring institutions in the City without distinction. This applies to Medical, Dental and Nursing Services.

The Child Health Services Board has been set up to help the Department in a consultative manner.

The Department has now several well organized and efficient divisions to carry out the provisions of the Public Health Act of Manitoba, the Health By-law of the City and a number of other City By-laws.

Area and Population

The City covers a total area of 25 square miles -- land 24.27 square miles (15,535 acres), and water .73 square miles (465 acres). The density of the population is 15.6 persons per acre of land.

For statistical purposes the population for 1954 is 244,033, as determined by the Assessment Commissioner. This figure shows an increase of 746 over the 1953 figure of 243,287. However, the natural increase in 1954 (live births less deaths) shows an increase of 3,593.

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From a Midson's Ray Company trading post (Fort Osery) in 1870, with a possibility of 215, France has grown to the size and finish of a first-oldes eity of approximately 244,000 people. When the City was insorporated in 1875 there was a pupulation of 1,069.

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Live Births, Residents Only

During the year 1954, there were 5,920 live births to Winnipeg Residents giving a rate of 24.3 per 1,000 population which is the highest rate ever recorded in the City. During the war years, 1939-1945 birth rates in Winnipeg remained fairly constant but in the years immediately following, birth rates increased considerably to a peak of 23.6 in 1947. In 1948, there was a sharp decline to 20.4 but since that year the rate has increased steadily to the present peak of 24.3 per 1,000 population.

Out of the total of 5,920 live births, 2,366 or 40.0% were the first children of the mother, 1,685 or 28.5% second children, 1,042 or 17.6% third children. In 1954, 5,738 or 96.9% of the births included the fifth child. 99.7% were born in a hospital. Of the 5,920 children born there were 3,052 boys and 2,878 girls giving a ratio of 1,064 boys to 1,000 girls.

Infant Mortality

There were 145 deaths of infants under one year of age in 1954 as compared with 166 in 1953. The infant mortaility rate of 24.4 per 1,000 live births was a decided drop from the 1953 rate of 29.7. The lowest rate ever recorded in Winnipeg was in 1951 when a rate of 21.9 per 1,000 live births was reached. A detailed list of the causes of Infant Mortaility is on page 12 of this report.

Neo-Natal Mortality

Deaths of infants occuring within the first four weeks of life numbered 95 in 1954 giving a neo-natal mortality rate of 16.0 per 1,000 live births as compared with 129 neo-natal deaths in 1953 giving a rate of 23.1 per 1,000 live births. Neo-natal deaths in 1954 constituted 65.5 percent of the total deaths of infants under one year of age as compared to 77.7% in 1953.

Maternal Mortality

There were 3 maternal deaths during the year 1954 giving a rate of .5 per 1,000 total (live & still) births which is a reduction of 2 from the total of 5 in 1953 with a rate of .9.

Continued progress in the control of the Tuberculosis in Winnipeg is reflected in the following report of the Tuberculosis Division of the City Health Department.

King Edward Memorial Hospital

Perhaps the most notable feature indicative of progress was the official closing of the King Edward Memorial Hospital in August 1954. This hospital was built in 1912 and from that date until closing it was used as a hospital for treating tuberculous patients. For some decades the one hundred beds available were constantly occupied; however in the past few years the state of bed occupancy has steadily declined to the point where it was apparent that the hospital could be utilized for a more useful purpose than a tuberculosis sanatorium. Therefore in August patients in the King Edward Hospital were transferred to available beds in the various Sanatoria operated by the Menitoba Sanatorium Board. The present lack of need for a tuberculosis treatment centre maintained by the City is indeed an indication of progress in the control of this disease.

Death Rate

There were 17 deaths in Winnipeg due to tuberculosis. This corresponds to a death rate of 7.0 per 100,000 population and is the second lowest death rate ever recorded in Winnipeg. (Tuberculosis death rate in 1953 was only 6.3) The following table illustrates the gradual but steady decline in the death rate since 1920.

Hospitalization

There was a monthly average of 191 patients hospitalized at City expense in the various Sanatoria during the year 1954. This is a substantial reduction in the monthly average of patients hospitalized during 1951 (258 patients), in 1952 (214 patients) and 1953 (199 patients). X-ray Surveys

During 1954 the chest X-ray survey programme continued to expand. The mobile 70 mm. X-ray machine previously purchased by the Manitoba Sanatorium Board and loaned with staff to the City Health Department, the stationary 4 x 5 X-ray Unit at the City Hall and two other 70 mm. machines (provided by the Manitoba Sanatorium Board for use during the survey of all school children) were all utilized in X-raying a total of 83,883 individuals. This is the second largest number of citizens to be X-rayed during any single year.

Industrial Surveys

1048 office, business and industrial concerns were provided with an opportunity for their employees to have a chest X-ray at one or other of the 82 sites where the X-ray machines were set up. 96.2% of the employees of these business concerns attended for an X-ray.

Seventeen new cases of pulmonary tuberculosis were discovered during the year which is 25.4% of the total number of new active pulmonary cases discovered by all agencies such as, private physicians, Sanatoria, Hospitals, private and public clinics. (See Table 2)

There was a ratio of one new case discovered for every 4934 individuals X-rayed. Once again the progress that is being made in stamping out this disease is evident in Table III which shows that in 1949, out of every 1,118 individuals X-rayed one new unsuspected case of tuberculosis was discovered compared to one out of every 4934 individuals X-rayed in 1954. The value of the pre-employment chest X-ray program is also well illustrated by the finding of 3 new unsuspected cases among 3,694 pre-employment X-rays or one new case for every 1,230 individuals X-rayed.

In addition to these new unsuspected cases of Tuberculosis some individuals were found to have other significant pathology of the lung, heart or great vessels. Such individuals were advised to consult their own physician for further advice or treatment as required.

Table IV shows the source of active cases discovered by the Health Department. It should be noted that there were 893 individuals referred to the City Hall by private physicians for chest X-rays and that I new active case was discovered among this group. These referrals were in the main for pre-natal chest X-rays, routine chest X-rays in conjunction with a physical examination or suspect lung pathology. It is of interest to record that of the 17 new cases discovered 9 were discovered by the X-ray Unit at the City Hall and 8 by the Mobile Units.
