Buildings, Grounds and Equipment Committee.

Duties :

The Buildings, Grounds and Equipment Committee shall, in accordance with the Rules of Order, and with the approval of the Board :

- (a) deal with all building projects and works, including new buildings and extensions or reconstruction of existing buildings,
- (b) select all building sites,
- (c) appoint all architects, quantity surveyors, clerks of works, and other necessary officers in connection with building schemes or works, fixing the remuneration of every such appointment,

Finance Committee.

Duties :

- (a) supervise all the fiscal concerns of the Board and report periodically as to the state of the several funds of the Board,
- (b) prepare and submit to the Board during the month of December in each year a statement of the estimated recurrent income and expenditure of the Board and its Institutions in respect of the next ensuing year,
- (c) prepare and submit to the Board during the month of December in each year a statement of the estimated capital income and expenditure of the Board in respect of the next ensuing year,
- (d) receive at each monthly meeting a statement of the payments effected by the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board during the preceding calendar month, and thereafter report to the Board the total amount of the expenditure in question,
- (e) arrange all investments of moneys held by or funds entrusted to the Board,

- (f) report to the Board at the request of any of the other Standing Committees as to the provision of funds for any object connected with the administration of the Board,
- (g) supervise the collection of all revenue due to the Board and its Institutions,
- (h) be responsible for the control of the Head Office of the Board, and deal with all matters appertaining to the appointment, emoluments, resignation or leave of the Secretary and Treasurer and other officers employed therein,
- (i) invite and deal with all tenders received for annual supplies and services required by the Board,
- (j) arrange all insurance policies, whether in respect of fire, fidelity guarantee, workmen's compensation, or any other risk,
- (k) consider and report upon or conclude, as may be directed, such matters as are specifically referred to them.

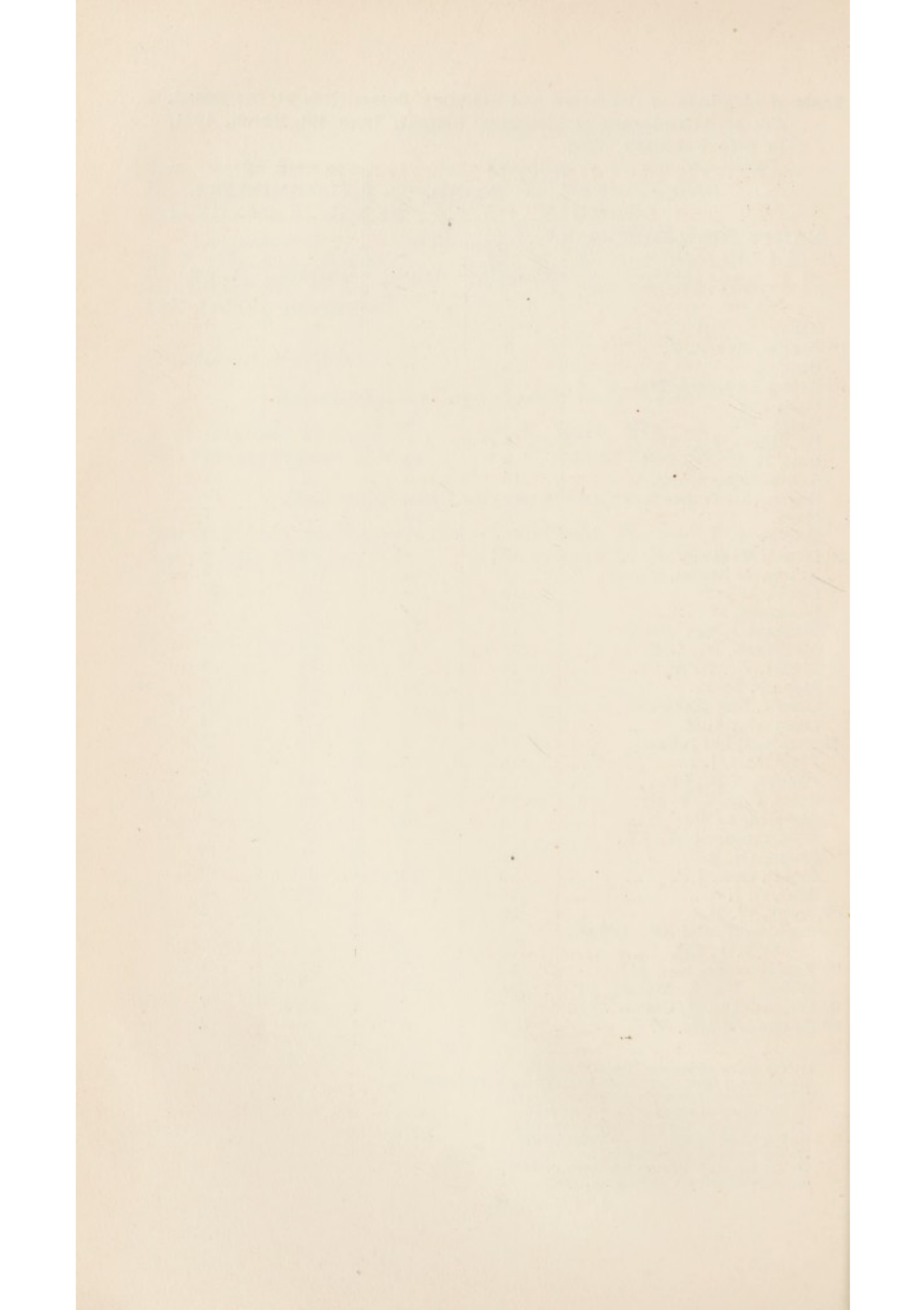

MINUTE OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1921-1922.

INTRODUCTORY.—Following the precedent set by my predecessor in office, I submit in this Minute a summary of the principal transactions of the Board during the past year. The period covered by my Minute is that from March, 1921, to February, 1922, including both these months. The accounts and statistics in this volume, however, relate to the calendar year 1921.

MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD.—In February, 1921, Mr. A. Boag, Mrs. A. Dale, Mr. Thos. Mossop and Dr. J. E. Waterston retired by effluxion of time. Mr. Boag and Mr. Mossop were again returned, together with Mr. S. A. Harvey. Mrs. Dale, who was in India at the time of the election, was co-opted as a member at the March meeting of the Board.

Mr. W. D. Hare, one of the representatives of the City Council of Capetown, who retired at that time, was re-appointed for a period of three years. The retiring representatives of the Cape Divisional Council, Messrs. W. H. Smith and Amos Bailey, were re-appointed, and Mr. S. N. Ponder was again appointed the joint representative of the Municipalities of Wynberg, Simonstown and Durbanville.

The representatives on the Board of the Honorary Visiting Medical Officers of Institutions were appointed as follows:—

Somerset Hospital: Professor C. F. M. Saint and Dr. H. A. Moffat.

Woodstock Hospital: Rr. R. Sharp.

Rondebosch and Mowbray Cottage Hospital: Dr. L. F. McDowell.

Victoria Hospital, Wynberg: Dr. H. Claude Wright.

Simonstown-Kalk Bay Hospital: Dr. T. W. P. Hayes.

Sir Walter E. Gurney was re-appointed by the Administrator, and the Rev. Canon H. Orford was appointed by the Administrator in the place of Dr. Mathew Hewat, who had resigned.

CHAIRMAN AND VICE-CHAIRMAN.—At the first meeting of the re-constituted Board I had the honour of being appointed Chairman in succession to Mr. Geo. Smart. Mr. A. J. S. Lewis was appointed Vice-Chairman.

PRESENTATION TO MR. GEO. SMART.—Mr. Smart's decision to decline nomination again as Chairman of the Board was received with much regret. In order to mark their appreciation of his services, the members of the Board decided to present him with an armchair and an occasional table (suitably inscribed), together with a lady's handbag for Mrs. Smart. I was asked to make the presentation, on behalf of the subscribers, at the close of a meeting of the Board held on 22nd June, and I did so in the following words:—

When Mr. George Smart retired from the Chairmanship of the Board a few months ago, after serving continuously in that capacity for six years, it was decided that the occasion should not be allowed to pass without some tangible expression being offered on the part of the members of the Board of the devoted service which he had rendered to the cause of hospitals and other institutions for the alleviation of sickness and suffering in Capetown and the Cape Peninsula over the long period of 23 years. Mr. Smart has set an example of voluntary public service in Capetown which it would be difficult to equal. I believe I am correct in stating that his first essay in public affairs was as a member of the City Council, and the confidence his fellow-councillors had in him thus early in his career as a public man was shown by his election as Mayor of Capetown in 1894. He also rendered signal service for many years on the School Board. In other capacities, too, he has been before the public of Capetown for the best part of a lifetime. The Government showed their appreciation of his capacity by appointing him a member of the Railway Grievances Commission which visited the principal railway centres some years ago to enquire into the working conditions of railway employees. But to attempt to chronicle all the activities of Mr. Smart in the public life of Capetown would be to sketch the history of the city for the past thirty years. To-day we are mainly concerned with his work on behalf of the hospitals and charitable institutions of the Cape Peninsula. In that sphere it may be said that Mr. Smart began as soon as the opportunity of such service was given to the public. In 1898 the Somersét Hospital ceased to be a State institution and came for the first time under popular control, with a constitution and a Board of Managers. Mr. Smart was a member of this first Board of Managers,

which was presided over by the late Mr. F. Y. St. Leger. Evidently the new Board showed discernment in their allocation of the honours and labours of office, for Mr. Smart was at once chosen as Chairman of the Finance and Building Committee, and it is interesting to recall that one of the other members of that committee was the present Minister of Railways. The Rev. A. P. Bender, whose record of hospital service synchronises with that of Mr. Smart, was also one of that band of pioneers in hospital management. I am sure we all regret Mr. Bender's inability to be present to-day, but Mr. Smart, I know, will be pleased to learn that before leaving for England Mr. Bender associated himself with the presentation which we are making this afternoon. In 1906 Mr. Smart was elected Chairman of the Board of Managers of Somerset Hospital, and in 1913, when the Cape Hospital Board came into being and assumed control of all the State-aided hospitals and charitable institutions of the Cape Peninsula, he became an elected member of the larger body. He still retained his seat on the committee of the Somerset Hospital, which under the new regime succeeded the Board of Managers, whilst on the Cape Hospital Board he was appointed the first Chairman of the Finance Committee, an office which he held until his elevation to the Chairmanship of the Board in 1915. Mr. Smart's occupancy of the chair commenced a few months after the outbreak of the Great War and continued for six years. It covered the difficult period of the war and the more trying period of the post-war years, with their special problems of adjustment and settlement due to the war-time disorganisation of civil hospital management. It also included the influenza epidemic of 1918, which made greater demands than all the years of war upon the resources of our hospitals and left a record of sickness and death which it is to be hoped will never be repeated in this or any other generation. When the Cape Hospital Board was first established in 1913, seven institutions then existing were brought under its control, namely, Somerset Hospital, Woodstock Hospital, Rondebosch and Mowbray Cottage Hospital, Victoria Hospital (Wynberg), Simonstown Hospital, the Capetown Free Dispensary, and the Eaton Convalescent Home. Just before Mr. Smart succeeded Mr. Polhemus Lyon as Chairman in 1915 a small beginning had been made with the District Nursing Organisation, under which two nurses had been appointed, one in Capetown and one at Retreat. During Mr. Smart's tenure of office the District Nursing Organisation grew to seven branches, serving almost every neighbourhood of the Peninsula; the McGregor Home for Children was

established at Plumstead; an additional Free Dispensary was opened at Salt River; and the Peninsula Maternity Hospital was modestly begun in hired premises at Salt River, which are now found quite inadequate for their purpose. The mere recital of the fact that the number of institutions controlled by the Board increased from seven to eleven during Mr. Smart's chairmanship of the Board—although no mean achievement in the face of the difficulties which had to be dealt with—conveys but an inadequate idea of the development which has taken place. Large building extensions have been carried out, particularly at Somerset Hospital, including the Shipley Pavilion for eye, ear and throat cases; an additional Nurses' Home has also been erected at that Institution; the X-Ray Department has been reorganised, and many other improvements effected. The bed capacity of the Hospital has been increased in consequence from 225 beds to 269 beds. At Woodstock Hospital even greater development has taken place, speaking relatively. There the number of beds and cots has been doubled. In 1913 there were 32 beds at Woodstock; at the end of 1919 the number had risen to 46; whilst now that the Denis Buxton Memorial block has been brought into use, the number stands at 64. The improvement of the conditions under which the nursing staff are housed has been a settled policy of the Board since its inception, and in pursuance of this policy the Board have provided Nurses' homes at Woodstock Hospital, Rondebosch and Mowbray Cottage Hospital, Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, and Simon's Town—Kalk Bay Hospital, in addition to erecting the second Nurses' Home at Somerset Hospital already mentioned. In the conception and planning of all these buildings, Mr. Smart has played a prominent part, and his sound judgment and ripe experience in building construction have been of the greatest possible benefit to the Board in carrying these schemes to completion. In fact it might be said that since the establishment of the Board, Mr. Smart has been the principal adviser on all building projects and works. I do not wish to burden you with figures, but the most convincing evidence of the real development of the work of the Board under Mr. Smart's guidance is to be found in a comparison of the numbers of patients treated and convalescents cared for in 1913 and in 1920. In 1913, 3,921 in-patients were treated in the several hospitals of the Board; in 1920 the number had risen to 6,468, an increase of 65 per cent. In 1913 there were 30,788 attendances of and upon out-patients; the corresponding number in 1920 was 76,896, an increase of almost 150 per cent. The convalescents cared

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for during 1913 numbered 521; in 1920, 856 were dealt with, an increase of over 64 per cent. These figures are the more remarkable when it is remembered that during the greater part of the period under review the Board's activities were cramped in every direction by reason of the prevailing financial stringency. We who know how assiduously Mr. Smart carried out the onerous duties of Chairman of the Board are in the best position to appportion to him his due measure of credit for what has been achieved. We are glad that Mr. Smart's resignation of the Chairmanship of the Board does not mean the severance of his connection with our work, and we look forward to the continuance of his association with us as a tried and trusted colleague. His judgment, experience and ability will be invaluable in working out the details of the great new hospital scheme on the Groote Schuur Estate, a project in which we know he has taken the keenest interest. The Committee which was formed to carry out the desire of the Board to do honour to Mr. Smart, decided that the most appropriate and useful gifts would be an arm-chair and, to stand alongside the chair, a small table, and these were the articles chosen. The table bears a silver plate suitably inscribed, to commemorate the occasion of the gift. I should like to add that the proposal to make this presentation was most enthusiastically taken up by the members of the Board. Every member who has been associated with Mr. Smart, except those few who could not be reached, has subscribed to this testimonial. In handing over these gifts to you, Mr. Smart, as a small token of our personal esteem, I know I am expressing the sentiments of all the subscribers when I say that I hope you will long be spared to enjoy the measure of leisure which you have so well earned, but that I also hope you will still on many occasions rise from this easy chair, take your agenda paper from this table, and resume the path you have so long followed, that which leads to the Board Room where we have been accustomed to meeting you, and where we have learned to appreciate your ability as a chairman, your value as a colleague, and your qualities as a man.

Mr. Smart, in replying, said it was difficult to find words to express his grateful thanks for the very kind words said about him, and for the handsome present they were giving him. In looking back over the past six years, he felt deeply grateful for the appreciation shown of what little he had been able to do. He thought they would agree with him that during his term of office on no occasion had members

gone away with unkindly feelings towards each other, and it was one of his pleasantest reflections that they had preserved a high tone in their debates. Of course everyone felt a special interest in his own particular hospital and its affairs, and as in other assemblies it was not always easy to get away from the parish pump. That insular feeling, however, was passing away, and the broader issues were taking its place. It was a source of thankfulness to have been able to take some small part in hospital work. He remembered the year 1898, when first he began to take an active part in hospital affairs. Mr. F. Y. St. Leger was at that time one of their brightest lights. There were few left of those who were connected with the New Somerset Hospital in the early days, but they had Mr. Liberman still with them. He (Mr. Smart) could only regret that his strength would no longer allow him to take that share in the work that he would like to take. He wanted to express the hope that the greater issues which lay before them would be realised, and that in a few years their highest hopes, which centred in the Grootte Schuur scheme, would be realised. It had been a terrible reproach to the city that they had been in the position of having to refuse admission to their hospitals for want of accommodation, and to push along the great work they had in hand was his greatest desire. He wished to thank their present chairman (Mr. H. F. East) and the other members of the Board for their kindly assistance in the past, and particularly the Secretary, for the encouraging and helpful way in which Mr. Sinclair Thomson had always stood by him.

INCOME AND EXPENDITURE.—The year which has just closed has been a most difficult one from the financial point of view. When the Board prepared their Estimates of Expenditure for 1921, they found that the total sum required was £95,040, but when the Estimates were submitted to the Hon. the Administrator, he directed that the expenditure should be reduced to £84,837, being an increase of 5 per cent. over the actual expenditure during 1920. The Board had no alternative but to accept this decision, which was afterwards embodied in the Payment of Subsidies Ordinance (No. 4 of 1921) passed by the Provincial Council and promulgated on 10th June, 1921. The expenditure Votes were accordingly reduced, but when adopting the revised schedule of expenditure, the Board made it clear that the sum of £84,837 did not represent their estimate of the expenditure for the year 1921, but was the result of acting in accordance with the mandate received to reduce the expenditure of £95,040

which was considered necessary for the year, to the maximum allowed. It was decided that the Hon. the Administrator should be advised accordingly, and be informed that while the Board would strongly endeavour to carry on all their activities within the limits set for them, they must decline to take any responsibility either collectively or individually for any curtailment of the Board's activities which might have to be resorted to, if it should ultimately be found impossible otherwise to confine the expenditure within the amount of £84,837 allowed for the year.

By dint of careful management, and taking full advantage of the complete financial control vested in them by Ordinance No. 6 of 1920, the Board were able to close their accounts for 1921 with the authorised expenditure of £84,837 underspent by a sum of £19 7s. 5d., and with the Estimates of income exceeded by £2,256 14s. 2d. In reporting this satisfactory result to the Board, the Finance Committee felt impelled to reiterate the following statement which they had presented to the Board, through a Sub-Committee, on 12th May, 1921, in the course of a report upon the reductions in the Expenditure Votes already referred to:

“It will be observed that in respect of nearly every Institution, the Vote for Repairs (Ordinary) has been ruthlessly cut down. The inevitable effect of this must be that the buildings of the several Institutions will be allowed to become more and more dilapidated. For several years past, through financial stress owing to the war, the expenditure on the upkeep of buildings has been kept at less than the minimum required to maintain the buildings in a proper state of repair, and at most of the Institutions the buildings are now deteriorating rapidly. This is a matter which, in the opinion of your Sub-Committee, should be brought specially to the notice of the Hon. the Administrator.”

PATIENTS REFUSED ADMISSION.—Returns are still submitted to the Board every month, giving particulars of patients refused admission through lack of accommodation at the several Hospitals. The following is a summary of these returns for the year which ended on 31st December, 1921:

It should again be pointed out that these figures are necessarily incomplete, since members of the Board, medical practitioners and others who realise the position of affairs, refrain from recommending cases which they know cannot possibly be admitted through lack of accommodation.

TREATMENT OF CASUALTY CASES.—In March, 1914, by arrangement with the Provincial Administration, the Board accepted a measure of responsibility for dealing with casualty cases in Cape Town. In carrying out the arrangements then made, difficulties and misunderstandings arose from time to time, and with a view to placing the matter on a more satisfactory basis, a conference was held in June last, at the instance of the Board, between representatives of the Board and the Government, with the result that the following new arrangements were agreed to and have now been put into operation, with the approval of the Provincial Administration, as a code of instruction and advice to all concerned:

1. Only minor casualties and accident cases should be taken to the Cape Town Free Dispensary in Buitenkant Street;
2. Serious casualties and accident cases, including all patients not able to walk unaided, should be taken direct to the nearest hospital;

3. Assault and other criminal cases in respect of which the Police contemplate criminal proceedings, where of a minor nature and able to walk unaided, should be taken by the Police to the Police Surgery; serious cases of this class should be taken direct to the nearest hospital;
4. While the foregoing rules are to be followed as far as practicable, it is to be understood by all concerned that every case must receive first-aid treatment, assistance or advice, as may be available, at the Institution to which the patient is first taken.

REMEDIAL DENTAL CLINICS.—The University of Cape Town issued invitations in July last to a round-table conference to consider a proposal to establish a remedial dental clinic in connection with the treatment of the poorer school children in the Peninsula, and at a meeting of the Board held on 24th August, Mr. A. J. S. Lewis, Dr. A. Marius Wilson and Rev. Canon H. Orford were appointed to represent the Board at this conference. At the September meeting a deputation representing the Conference waited upon the Board and submitted the following resolutions:

1. That early provision should be made for a remedial dental clinic or clinics for the treatment of poor children; and
2. That facilities should be provided as early as possible for remedial dental treatment for necessitous dental cases of all ages at those institutions under the Hospital Board where provision is made at present for teeth extraction.

The members of the deputation submitted that, if it were possible, a clinic should be established at one of the Board's institutions, say the Somerset Hospital or the Cape Town Free Dispensary, where treatment might be given, in addition to extractions being carried out. It was pointed out that statistics compiled by Dr. Maughan Brown showed the following comparisons between the children with four or more bad teeth in Cape Town and in Graaff-Reinet: Children under 8 years of age—Cape Town 41 per cent., Graaff-Reinet 7 per cent.; Children aged 14 years of age—Cape Town 27 per cent., Graaff-Reinet 5 per cent. It was represented that it is very important that such a clinic should be established in Cape Town, not only for the benefit of dental students, but also for the medical students, as so many diseases had recently been traced to the condition of the gums and teeth.

At the meeting of the Board held on 28th December, 1921, the General Purposes Committee reported that they had referred the matter to the respective Committees of the Somerset Hospital and the Cape Town Free Dispensary, and had ascertained that there is no accommodation for the purpose of a dental clinic at the Somerset Hospital, but that accommodation could be made available at the Cape Town Free Dispensary. The University of Capetown was advised accordingly.

DENTAL ANAESTHETICS.—In December of last year, after considering the conditions governing the administration of dental anaesthetics at their several Institutions, the Board decided that when an anaesthetic is administered for a dental operation, a charge of 5/- should be made to the patient, with the proviso that in extreme cases the Medical Officer or the Medical Superintendent, as the case may be, may remit the charge if he is of the opinion that the operation should not be performed without an anaesthetic, and is satisfied that the patient is not able to pay the prescribed charge.

PENINSULA MATERNITY HOSPITAL.—The lease of the premises at "Hareville," Woodstock, occupied by the Peninsula Maternity Hospital since the establishment of that Institution by the Board at the beginning of 1918, being due to expire on 31st December, 1921, consideration was given, in August last, to the question of finding more suitable accommodation. As a first step, it was decided to proceed as early as possible with the construction of the maternity block comprised in the scheme for a new general hospital on the Groote Schuur Estate. The Public Works Department was, therefore, requested to prepare sketch plans and an estimate of the cost of the building on the lines laid down by Col. D. J. Mackintosh (the Board's expert adviser on the new hospital scheme) bearing in mind, however, that when first erected, and for some time afterwards, the building would have to be self-contained, that is to say, it would be necessary to provide within it accommodation for nurses and servants, a kitchen and other domestic offices, such accommodation being of a temporary nature, convertible to hospital purposes proper when the staff quarters and central kitchen, which are embodied in the main scheme, should become available. In this connection it was reported to the Board that it was understood that the University of Cape Town would be prepared to place at the Board's disposal the sum of £20,000 promised in connection with the new hospital scheme. Plans

were subsequently prepared by the Public Works Department of a building containing two wards of 12 beds each, two isolation wards, kitchen, etc., and accommodation for the staff. The estimated cost of this building is £35,000. The plans were dispatched to Col. Mackintosh, and at his suggestion they have been altered to some extent. Working drawings are now in course of preparation, and it is hoped to begin building operations at an early date, if the difficulties connected with the acquisition of the site are overcome.

In the meantime, negotiations were entered into with the owners of "Hareville," with a view to the extension of the lease of that property, but the terms offered by the lessors were considered most unfavourable to the Board. At this stage, in the course of a search for suitable premises for the Children's Home of the Society for the Protection of Child Life, I discovered the premises known as "Buckingham Lodge," at the corner of Caledon and Mount Streets, Cape Town, the property of the Eastern and South African Telegraph Company, Limited. These premises had been formerly utilised by that Company as staff quarters, but had been unoccupied save by a caretaker, for some years, and had fallen into disrepair. The building was considered sufficiently commodious to serve the purposes of both the Maternity Hospital and the Children's Home. After prolonged negotiations with the Eastern and South African Telegraph Company, Limited., the occupancy of the building was offered to and accepted by the Board on the following terms:—

1. A lease for one year, and tenancy thereafter to be subject to three months' notice of termination by either party.
2. The building to be taken as it stands; all necessary repairs to be effected by the Board.
3. In the event of the Board being required to vacate the premises in less than two years from the commencement of the lease, the Company to refund to the Board a proportion of the amount which it may be necessary to expend on roof repairs, on the basis of two years' occupancy.
4. The Board to give an undertaking that the Company will not be liable for rates and taxes during the period of occupation by the Board.
5. The rental to be at the rate of £1 per month.

The expenditure on repairs, which amounted to about £650, will be shared by the Board and the Society for the Protection of Child Life in the proportions of two-thirds and one-third respectively. The money has been borrowed temporarily from the Board's funds, and the loan will be repaid, in the form of rent, over a period of two years. The Peninsula Maternity Hospital moved into these new premises at the end of last year. The part of the building allocated to this Institution comprises ample accommodation for patients and staff; the position, too, of the new premises is very suitable for the purposes of a maternity hospital.

VICTORIA HOSPITAL, WYNBERG.—A plan and specification were prepared at the end of last year of the following alterations at the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg:—

- (a) To convert the nurses' old quarters into a coloured female ward by removing the partitions.
- (b) To alter the matron's old quarters which abut on the balcony, by removing the partitions, and utilising the space for coloured children. This would accommodate about ten coloured women and eight coloured children.
- (c) To abandon the present coloured children's ward.
- (d) To apply the whole of the building known as the "Hygeia" for the use of coloured men's wards, as the present accommodation is totally inadequate for this class.

At the November meeting of the Board, the principle was approved of pooling the balance of funds standing to the credit of the Institution (with the exception of the linen fund, the fund for the erection and equipment of the nurses' kitchen, and the fund of £300 earmarked for the purchase of surgical instruments and appliances) in order to meet the cost of this reconstruction work. Tenders have been received and are now under consideration.

EXTENSION OF FREE DISPENSARY TREATMENT TO SCHOLARS.—Arising out of representations made by the Committee of the Salt River Free Dispensary, the Board granted authority in May of last year to the Principals of public schools to sign cards of recommendation for treatment at the Free Dispensaries of the Board, in order to provide greater facilities for the medical treatment of poor children.

MOTOR AMBULANCES.—During the calendar year 1921, 1,323 cases (including 103 arising from street accidents) were removed in the Board's motor ambulances, an average of 110.25 per month. Of this number, 426 removals were free, and 897 were charged for. In March of last year, the Lansdowne and District Civic Association represented the necessity of another motor ambulance being provided, to be stationed at Wynberg to meet the requirements of the Cape Flats and Southern Suburbs area. The Board, however, were unable to entertain the proposal, as there were no funds available for the purchase and maintenance of another motor ambulance.

TRAINING OF COLOURED AND NATIVE WOMEN AS HOSPITAL NURSES.—At a meeting of the Board held on 23rd March, 1921 the General Purposes Committee submitted the following report:—

A letter has been received from the Honorary Secretary of the Conference of Women Missionaries of the Church of the Province of South Africa, held in Grahamstown last January, conveying a resolution asking that facilities should be given for the full training of native and coloured women as nurses in some of the larger training schools of the Union which have native and coloured wards, in order that such nurses may be available to attend upon their own people in case of sickness. The resolution recognises that separate accommodation will have to be provided if the terms of the resolution are to be carried out. Your Committee recommend that this matter be submitted by the Board for the favourable consideration of the Provincial Administration.

This report was referred back in order that the Committees of the several hospitals controlled by the Board might be consulted as to the practicability of adopting the resolution of the Conference of Women Missionaries. The Committees of all the hospitals were duly consulted, and all agreed that the principle of the resolution is a good one, but without exception they reported that they were unable to carry it into effect on account of the lack of accommodation, which precludes the classifying of patients and nursing staff in the manner which would be necessary to provide the facilities desired.

LECTURES TO NURSE-PROBATIONERS.—In September last the Board decided that the system whereby lectures are de-

livered jointly to the nurse-probationers of the Woodstock, Rondebosch and Wynberg Hospitals at the Rondebosch Town Hall should be discontinued, in consequence of representations having been made that this arrangement had proved unsatisfactory. It was then resolved that the lectures should be given separately at each of these hospitals, but that the total expense incurred should not exceed the amount being spent under the combined method, which comprises a fee of £72 per annum to the lecturer, and the cost of conveying the probationers to and from the Rondebosch Town Hall. The details of the new arrangements are now in course of settlement.

NURSES' PRIZE SCHEME.—After the Colonial Medical Council examination in June, 1921, the following awards were made to nurses trained in the hospitals of the Board who were successful in obtaining certificates as trained nurses:—

Miss B. Stableford, 1st Prize, £5.

Miss H. B. Hodgson, 2nd Prize, £3.

Miss M. MacDonald, 3rd Prize, £2.

All these nurses were trained at Somerset Hospital, and their respective places in the examination list for the Province were second, third and fourth. A prize of £2 10s. was also awarded to Miss M. B. Musto, of the Peninsula Maternity Hospital, who passed highest of the pupil midwives trained at that Institution. It is worthy of note that Miss Musto took first place in the Province midwifery examination list.

After the December examination, awards were made as follows:—

Miss D. E. Guybon-Philpott, 1st Prize, £5.

Miss M. D. Connell, 2nd Prize, £3.

Miss M. E. Legg and Miss S. J. van Heerden, 3rd Prize, £1 each.

All the prize winners on this occasion were also trained at Somerset Hospital. In order of merit in the examination list for the Province, they were placed first, sixth and tenth (bracketed). The half-yearly prize of £2 10s. to the pupil midwife trained at the Peninsula Maternity Hospital who passed highest on this occasion was gained by Miss E. D. Mackenzie, who took third place in the midwifery examination list for the Province.

TENNIS COURTS FOR NURSES.—Following the lead given by Woodstock Hospital, a tennis court was laid down during

the year at the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, for the use of the nursing staff of that Institution. The cost of construction of this court was provided by voluntary effort through the generosity of the Victoria Hospital Association.

COST OF LIVING ALLOWANCE.—The following resolution of the Provincial Council was transmitted to the Board in a circular letter dated 17th May, 1921, from the Provincial Secretary:—

That in all cases of teachers and employees of School and Hospital Boards of all grades and classes to whom the Provincial Administration is paying cost of living allowance during the current financial year, from each payment there shall be deducted an amount of 25 per cent. (in order to secure the retention of 75 per cent.) of such allowance for the current financial year, and that at the expiration of the current financial year, payment of the cost of living allowance shall be discontinued.

At first sight this might appear to be generous treatment, compared with that meted out to the Civil Service, in which the cost of living allowance has been reduced gradually, quarter by quarter, throughout the past year. It should be remembered, therefore, that the maximum allowance ever paid to officials of the Board was £50 per annum, this being the rate applicable to a married male actually supporting a wife. Notwithstanding the repeated representations of the Board for the increase of this allowance to an amount which would bear some relationship to the higher cost of living—which in principle it was designed to meet—no relief was granted to the staff of the Board. Hospital Board officials were doubly penalised in this regard, for the Civil Service and the staffs of the Cape Town Corporation and other Municipalities, had part of their cost of living allowance consolidated in their salaries two or three years ago. This grievance was brought specially to the notice of the Hon. the Administrator at the beginning of last year by a joint deputation of the Board and the staff, and it was shown, further, that the salaries fixed under the Officials' Salaries Ordinance, which became law in 1920, evidently took no account of the fact that during the two years between April, 1918, and April, 1920, no increments of salary were granted to officers of the Board, although it was during that period that the sharpest rise in the cost of living took place. Although these arguments have never been refuted, the salary scales of officials have remained

unaltered. This refusal to reconsider the salaries of the officials is in striking contrast to the attitude of the Provincial Council towards the salaries of nurses. In May, 1918, the Nurses' Salaries and Pensions Ordinance was promulgated, fixing the salaries of hospital nurses throughout the Cape Province. In May, 1920, following upon representations made by the Trained Nurses' Association, an amending Ordinance was passed raising the salaries of all grades of nurses, although their salary scales were then only two years old. The amount of the increase granted was 25 per cent. in the case of Matrons and Sisters, and 30 per cent. in the case of Staff Nurses. And it should be noted that nurses less than any other section of the Board's staff are affected by the cost of living, since their emoluments include board, lodging and uniform clothing.

RESIGNATION OF DR. A. D. KETCHEN.—At the beginning of this year (1922), the Board learned with regret that Dr. A. D. Ketchen had resigned his appointment as an Honorary Visiting Physician to Somerset Hospital, a position which he had occupied for over eighteen years. Dr. Ketchen was invited to become an Honorary Consulting Physician to the Institution, and he has signified his willingness to accept this appointment.

LEAVE GRANTED TO SECRETARY AND TREASURER.—On 22nd June, 1921, the Board reaffirmed the grant of four months' leave of absence, on full pay, to the Secretary and Treasurer (Mr. W. Sinclair Thomson). Mr. F. B. Morris (Accountant) was appointed Acting Secretary and Treasurer of the Board during the term of Mr. Sinclair Thomson's leave, which commenced on 28th June.

APPOINTMENT OF MATRON OF SOMERSET HOSPITAL.—Whilst on long leave in England, last August, Miss H. G. Liell tendered her resignation as Matron of Somerset Hospital, and after considering applications for the post, which was advertised both in South Africa and overseas, Miss Florence A. Goodacre, Matron of the General Infirmary, Stockport, was appointed to the vacancy. Miss Goodacre assumed duty on 7th February, 1922.

CHARGE DISTRICT NURSE.—In a reference to the District Nursing Organisation in the last Annual Report of the Board, it was mentioned that applications for the new post of Charge District Nurse were under consideration, but it was

not until July that it was found possible to make an appointment. Miss Ada Elliott was the selected candidate, and she assumed duty, upon her arrival from England, on 8th August, 1921.

NEW HOSPITAL SCHEME.—Considerable discussion took place during the year between the Board and the University of Cape Town with regard to the conditions upon which the site selected for the projected general hospital on the Groote Schuur Estate is to be leased to the Board. The University of Cape Town (Medical School) Act No. 33 of 1920, enacts that after a grant has been made to the University of Cape Town of such portion of the Groote Schuur Estates as is referred to in sub-section (1) of section three of the University of Cape Town Act, 1916, it shall be lawful for the said University (anything to the contrary notwithstanding in the said Act or in Act No. 9 of 1910) to grant to the Cape Hospital Board a lease for a period of ninety-nine years, at a rental not exceeding one pound per annum, of land on the portion of the Groote Schuur Estates aforesaid, and provides that the extent and situation of the land the subject of the lease shall be as agreed between the Council of the University and the Administrator of the Cape Province. At a meeting of the Board held on 12th May, 1921, a draft lease in terms agreed upon between representatives of the Board and representatives of the University was formally adopted. The following are the main conditions of this draft lease:—

1. The lease is for a term of ninety-nine years.
2. A rent of £1 sterling per annum is payable by the Board for the land comprised in the site.
3. Within a period of five years from the date of the commencement of the lease, the Board undertake to erect upon the land leased, and thereafter maintain during the currency of the lease, a fully-equipped hospital for sick people at which undergraduate and postgraduate students of the University may obtain practical teaching and training in medicine and surgery.
4. The professors, lecturers and students of the University are to have access to the Hospital for the purposes of and incidental to practical teaching and training in medicine and surgery, in accordance with such conditions as may be agreed upon from time to time between the University and the Board, and approved by the Administrator of the Cape Province.

The Further Hospital Accommodation Committee of the Board took up the attitude at the beginning of the discussion with the University representatives regarding the terms of the lease, that the Board could not agree to the incorporation in the lease of any conditions not specifically laid down in Act No. 33 of 1920. It became necessary, therefore, to have a supplementary agreement between the University and the Board which should be executed concurrently with the signing of the deed of lease. The following are the terms and conditions of the agreement accepted by both contracting parties :—

1. The hospital to be erected on the site leased to the Board shall be called “ The Somerset Hospital.”
2. The hospital shall be a fully equipped hospital for the sick poor, and a teaching hospital for undergraduates and postgraduates, medical students of the University being admitted to the full practice of the hospital under conditions to be laid down by the Board on the recommendation of the Committee of the Institution; but accommodation may be provided for contributing and paying patients in accordance with the provisions of Ordinance No. 5 of 1912 and any amendments thereof duly enacted.
3. There shall be a consultation between the University and the Board prior to the erection or variation of any of the hospital buildings.
4. The allocation of the beds in the hospital to the various branches of medicine and surgery shall be as agreed upon between the University and the Board.
5. Those professors and lecturers belonging and attached to the University whose University work demands that they should hold associated hospital appointments, shall be *ex-officio* members of the visiting medical staff of the hospital and shall have such material at their disposal for teaching purposes as is recommended by the University and approved by the Board.
6. No professors, lecturers or students except those who have been duly authorised by the authorities of the University shall be given access to the hospital for the purpose of obtaining practical teaching and training in medicine and surgery.

7. The membership of the Board shall not be greater than at present (36 members) and representations shall be made to the Administrator with a view to the University obtaining four representatives on the Board.
8. In appointing the committee of the Institution, the Board, following its established practice, will appoint the University representatives to that committee.
9. In addition to the Medical Advisory Sub-Committee already provided for in the regulations of the Board, there shall be a special sub-committee of the Institution to be called the Appointments Sub-Committee; this Sub-Committee to consist of the members of the honorary visiting medical staff holding the senior appointments, and to be consulted with regard to all medical appointments, honorary or paid, as well as any appointment of matron. When the hospital is first instituted, and until the completion of the honorary visiting medical staff, the members of the Medical Advisory Sub-Committee of the Somerset Hospital holding the senior appointments shall be the Appointments Sub-Committee.

The Board approved of both the draft lease and draft agreement subject to the proviso that a report be obtained from the Board's Attorneys to the effect that the interests of the Board are adequately safeguarded in both documents, and that the documents are in proper legal form. The Board's Attorneys (Messrs. Findlay and Tait) reported on 27th June, 1921, that the University, in terms of Act No. 33 of 1920, could only grant the Board the proposed lease after it had received the grant from the Union Government of the portion of Groote Schuur Estates allocated to the University, and it would be reversing the order of things to attempt to settle the lease before the grant had actually been made; and as five years had elapsed since Act No. 14 of 1916 was passed (whereby the University of Cape Town was constituted and the grant to it authorised of the requisite portion of the Groote Schuur Estates) it was obvious that some serious obstacle must exist to account for the inordinate delay in effecting the grant. They had accordingly made enquiries in various directions, and found, *inter alia*, that the portions of the Groote Schuur Estate comprised in the grant to be made to the University were traversed by roads shown on old sub-divisional

plans, but long since closed, title to which was never acquired by the late Mr. Rhodes, and that when the Groote Schuur Estates were vested in the Union Government by Act No. 9 of 1910, it was the various properties *as held by the late Mr. Rhodes*, that were so transferred, and consequently the Union Government in turn did not obtain title to the areas comprised in the roads already mentioned. The Board's Attorneys pointed out that it would now lie with the Board to decide whether they would accept the lease of the piece of land in question as it is, and accordingly risk any claims to rights of way being hereafter established in respect of any of the roads shown as traversing the land, or whether they would insist on this matter of the roads being cleared up and settled before they accepted the lease. After consideration of this report the Board decided, on 28th September, that the lease could not be completed until the University had obtained title to the portion of the Groote Schuur Estates covered by the lease, including the closed roads referred to. In the hope of expediting the matter, with the Chairman of the Further Hospital Accommodation Committee (Mr. A. J. S. Lewis) I interviewed the Hon. the Administrator with a view to enlisting his influence with the Union Government to obtain a special grant to the University of the land comprised in the hospital site. Sir Frederic De Waal undertook to do what he could in the matter, but pointed out that up to that time the University Authorities had not approached him in regard to the site, as required by the provisions of Act No. 33 of 1920. It is understood that steps are being taken in connection with the transfer of the land, which is likely to be effected shortly.

CO-OPERATION WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF CAPE TOWN IN THE TRAINING OF MEDICAL STUDENTS.—In pursuance of the policy of co-operation with the University of Cape Town in building up a medical school, to which reference was made in the sixth and seventh Annual Reports of the Board, a redistribution of the beds in Somerset Hospital was effected during the past year, to enable the number of beds available for the Professor of Surgery to be increased. The cost of effecting this rearrangement, namely, £235, was borne by the University.

Consent was also given to the erection of a teaching block in the grounds of Somerset Hospital. This building was constructed at a cost of about £2,000, the expense being defrayed by the University of Cape Town. With the assistance of the

THE CONSTITUTION

OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Article I
Section 1

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2
The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 3

When the United States shall move from one Place to another, the Congress shall have Power to designate and fix the Place where the same shall be held, and until such Meeting shall be made, they may at any Time adjourn to another Place within the United States.

Section 4
The Times, Places and Manner of holding the Elections of Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any Time by Law make or alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of Elections.

Section 5
The Congress shall have Power to regulate the Election and Term of Service of Senators and Representatives, and the Election and Term of Service of the Electors in each State, and to make or alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of Elections.

Board, the University Authorities obtained a promise from the Hon. the Administrator that when the Provincial Administration takes possession of the Somerset Hospital under the arrangement made with the Board in October, 1920, the Administration will make an offer for the building in question, if it has any use for it; if such an offer is made and is not accepted, the University will be at liberty to remove the building and dispose of it elsewhere. This arrangement was made contingent upon the building being of a temporary character, and not constructed on permanent foundations.

Another departure at Somerset Hospital has been the establishment at that Institution of a dermatological clinic. The University lecturer in dermatology (Dr. Hugh Smith) has been appointed Honorary Visiting Dermatologist to Somerset Hospital.

The University Authorities requested that facilities be offered for the teaching of gynaecology at the Cape Town Free Dispensary, and that the Professor of Gynaecology be allowed to conduct courses of instruction in that subject for medical students of the University. After receiving a report upon this proposal from the Committee of the Cape Town Free Dispensary it was decided to accede to the requests of the University, provided no expense devolved upon the Board, and on the understanding that the fees received from students admitted to the practice of the Institution would be credited to the funds of the Cape Town Free Dispensary on the same lines as have already been laid down in the case of Somerset Hospital.

WOODSTOCK HOSPITAL.—It was recorded in the last Annual Report that the Arnold Wynne Operating Theatre at Woodstock Hospital would shortly be completed. Considerable delay occurred, however, in obtaining possession of the building, on account of difficulties which arose in connection with the electrical installation, and the delivery of sterilising and other plant. These difficulties were eventually overcome, and the Committee of the Institution decided that in view of the fact that several war memorials were incorporated in the building and its equipment, a formal opening ceremony should be arranged. His Royal Highness Prince Arthur of Connaught (Governor-General of the Union of South Africa) consented to perform the ceremony of formally opening the building on 24th February of this year, and Her Royal Highness Princess Arthur of Connaught on the same occasion declared formally open the new Home for Nurses at Woodstock Hospital.

The history of the growth of the Institution, with particular reference to the memorials of the Great War which it embodies, is of more than passing interest.

Woodstock Hospital was established in 1892. In 1913 it passed under the control of the Board. At that time it had 20 beds and cots; since then the accommodation for patients has been continuously increased, and to-day, the Institution has 64 beds and cots. In 1913, 301 patients were treated in the hospital. Last year this number had increased to 863. It is the only hospital under the control of the Board which has a separate building set apart for the treatment of children. The children's block, known as the Denis Buxton Memorial Hospital for Children, was a gift to the Board from Earl and Countess Buxton, in memory of the Hon. Denis Buxton, who lost his life at Ypres in 1917, whilst on active service. It was a condition of this gift that the Board should undertake to provide nurses and maintain the hospital, and in order to meet the first of these conditions, it was found necessary to erect an additional Nurses' Home. This building, which contains a sitting room and 17 bedrooms, was designed by Messrs. McGillivray and Grant, Architects, of Cape Town, and was built by the late Mr. A. Hopkins at a cost of £6,732. It is so designed as to permit of further extension when necessity arises. The whole cost has been met out of loans advanced by the Provincial Administration.

The genesis of the scheme for a new Operating Theatre was an offer made in 1918 by the brothers and sisters of the late Arnold Wynne, M.A., of a sum of £350 towards the cost of an Operating Theatre at Woodstock Hospital, on condition that such a building would be constructed at a cost of not less than £850, and be called "The Arnold Wynne Operating Theatre." The Board accepted this offer, and the original project was subsequently expanded until it took shape as the present complete and well-equipped operating theatre suite. Messrs. McGillivray and Grant were also entrusted with the designing of this building, and the construction work was again carried out by the firm of A. Hopkins. The total cost of the completed building was £2,795, of which £350—the donation already referred to—was received from the Estate of the late Arnold Wynne. A further donation of £600 was contributed by Mr. Jas. Weight (a member of the Committee of the Hospital) in memory of his son, James Weight, who also made the supreme sacrifice during the Great War. The balance of the cost, namely, £1,845, has been advanced out of Loan Funds by the Provincial Administration.

This record would not be complete without a reference to those whose memories are perpetuated in the hospital buildings and equipment. Arnold Wynne, M.A., was lecturer in English Literature at the South African College. As a member of the Society of Friends, he enlisted as a non-combatant, but after having had personal experience of enemy methods, he transferred as a combatant to the 13th Battalion of the Liverpool Regiment, in which he was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant. He fell at the battle of Arras on Easter Monday, 1917. He was keenly interested in the welfare of the Native and Coloured peoples of South Africa, an interest which is mentioned in the inscription which has been placed on the Operating Theatre building.

James Weight left the South African College in May, 1917, in order to enlist for military service. In November of that year he joined the Royal Air Force as a cadet. He was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant on 1st April, 1918, and after passing the test for pilots was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant on 24th April of the same year. On 4th June, 1918, he proceeded to France and was attached to Squadron 42 of the Royal Air Force. He was killed on 4th July, 1918, near Aire, during the last German offensive. He was only eighteen years of age at the time of his death.

The Operating Table in the new theatre building also takes the form of a war memorial, as £100 of the cost of it was subscribed by Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Robb, in memory of their son, Thomas Douglas Robb. He was educated at the Diocesan College, from which he graduated B.A. at the age of nineteen years. He then went to Oxford University, where he graduated B.A. and B.C.L., being called to the Bar (Inner Temple) in 1911. He joined the 17th London Regiment in June, 1914, was sent to France in March of the following year, and was killed in action at Loos on 26th September, 1915.

The X-Ray room in the Operating Theatre building has been partly equipped through the generosity of Mr. F. B. Barling, of Woodstock, who contributed a sum of £183 10s. towards the cost of the new X-Ray plant. The diathermy apparatus in that Department has been provided out of a donation of £100 from the Woodstock Court (No. 8069) of the Ancient Order of Foresters Friendly Society, in memory of Brothers V. Heeger and D. C. Gardiner, who also lost their lives in the Great War. The Foresters Society has given, in

addition, a first annual contribution towards a fund to be established for the complete renewal of this apparatus when it becomes obsolete or worn out.

The need for a new Operating Theatre at this Hospital is fully demonstrated by a comparison of the surgical work performed in 1913 (when the Institution first came under the control of the Cape Hospital Board) and during last year. In 1913, the operations performed numbered 172, including 77 major operations; last year 544 operations were performed, of which 210 were major operations. The cost of the sterilising and other plant installed in the new building will be almost entirely met out of bequests of £500 to the Hospital from the late Miss J. M. Eldridge.

In 1913 the cost per patient per day was 5s. 8½d.; in 1921, notwithstanding the abnormal increase in the price of hospital commodities, consequent upon the War and its aftermath, the cost per patient per day was kept as low as 7s. 3d. This reflects much credit on the management of the Institution, and particularly on Miss J. A. Farquharson who has held the post of Matron during the past twelve years. The reputation of the Institution for medical and surgical treatment stands very high, and for this the credit is mainly due to Dr. Robert Sharp, who has been Honorary Medical Superintendent for the long term of 26 years.

TREATMENT OF VENEREAL DISEASES.—In pursuance of the policy adopted by the Board in this matter, as mentioned in the last Annual Report, it was decided to create the new appointment of Honorary Visiting Surgeon for Venereal Diseases at Somerset Hospital, and on 27th April, 1921, the Board approved of the appointment of Dr. A. Reith Fraser to the position, in terms of the regulations.

WOMEN'S HOSPITAL BOARD OF AID.—At the meeting of the Board held in August of last year, the Finance Committee reported that they had been interviewed by a deputation representing the Women's Hospital Board of Aid, as to the advisability of continuing their system of house-to-house collections in aid of the Hospitals, which had been carried on for many years. It was pointed out by the deputation that the work entailed in these collections is out of all proportion to the amount realised, and it was suggested that the collection of contributions of less than £1 be discontinued by the W.H.B.A., and that the names of their regular subscribers of £1 and over be transferred to the Head Office records of

the Hospital Board to be dealt with by the same method as is followed in connection with direct subscribers to particular Institutions. In order to compensate for the revenue which would otherwise be lost through the discontinuance of the existing system, it was suggested that arrangements should be made to hold two additional street collections, and that the co-operation of the organisers of the Hospital Saturday Collection should be enlisted in this connection if possible. The Board appointed a Special Committee, consisting of the Chairman of the Board, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, Mrs. A. Eburn-Salmon, Mrs. W. G. R. Murray, Sir Walter E. Gurney, and Mr. A. J. S. Lewis, together with the Mayoress (Mrs. W. Coldicott Gardener) and Mrs. R. C. Zoutendyk, Mrs. B. L. Southwell-Jones, Mrs. J. D. Cowan and Mrs. J. H. Brydone, to consider the new proposals.

PREPARATION OF PLANS, ETC., BY THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT.—On 28th September, 1921, it was reported to the Board by the Buildings, Grounds and Equipment Committee that a letter, dated 18th August, had been received from the Provincial Secretary stating, in effect, that in view of the financial stringency and of the fact that the Public Works Department renders services to the Province free of cost, it had been decided that in all future cases of the construction of hospital buildings, for which the Administrator's authority has been obtained, the Public Works Department should be asked to undertake the preparation of plans, etc., and the supervision of the erection of the buildings.

OBITUARY.—At a meeting held on 22nd June last, I made brief reference to the sad news which had just been received of the death of Mrs. A. Brown Lawrence, in England, on 3rd June. Mrs. Brown Lawrence was a member of the Board from the inception of it in 1913 until her death; prior to 1913 she was a member of the old Board of Somerset Hospital for many years. She closely identified herself with all matters affecting the welfare of the patients in the several hospitals in the Peninsula, and was particularly interested in the Somerset Hospital where her name and that of her husband is associated with the Shipley Pavilion, which was equipped out of their generosity. I reported to the Board that upon being apprised of her death, I dispatched a cable to Mr. Brown Lawrence in London, conveying the regret and sympathy of the Board. The following resolution was then adopted and placed on record:—

That the Board, having learned with extreme regret of the sudden death of one of their members in the person of Mrs. A. Brown Lawrence, desire to place on record their sincere condolence with the bereaved husband and relatives.

When the Board met on 28th September, 1921, it fell to me to make reference to the death of the late Mr. John Parker who, during his lifetime, was associated with this Board during his term of office as Mayor of Cape Town, and also in his personal capacity as an architect. A resolution was then adopted by the Board expressing sincere sympathy and condolence with the bereaved family.

On 25th January, 1922, reference was made to the bereavement sustained by Mr. Amos Bailey in the loss of his wife, who died on 5th January, and the following resolution was adopted by the Board in the usual manner:—

That the Board place on record their sincere sympathy with Mr. A. Bailey in the sad loss he has sustained through the death of his wife, and that the Secretary be directed to convey this resolution to Mr. Bailey.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.—I am glad to have this opportunity of acknowledging gratefully the support I have received throughout the year from the members of the Board, and the assistance given me by the Chairman of the General Purposes Committee and the Further Hospital Accommodation Committee (Mr. A. J. S. Lewis), the Chairman of the Buildings, Grounds and Equipment Committee (Mr. A. W. Sawkins) and the Chairman of the Finance Committee (Mr. H. Liberman). My thanks are due in special measure to Mr. Lewis, who as Vice-Chairman of the Board, has been called upon in recent months to carry the responsibilities of the chairmanship, during my enforced absence through illness.

The thanks of the Board are due to the Committees of the several Institutions, the Women's Hospital Board of Aid, and the Committees of the Hospital Saturday Collections for the invaluable voluntary service they have continued to render.

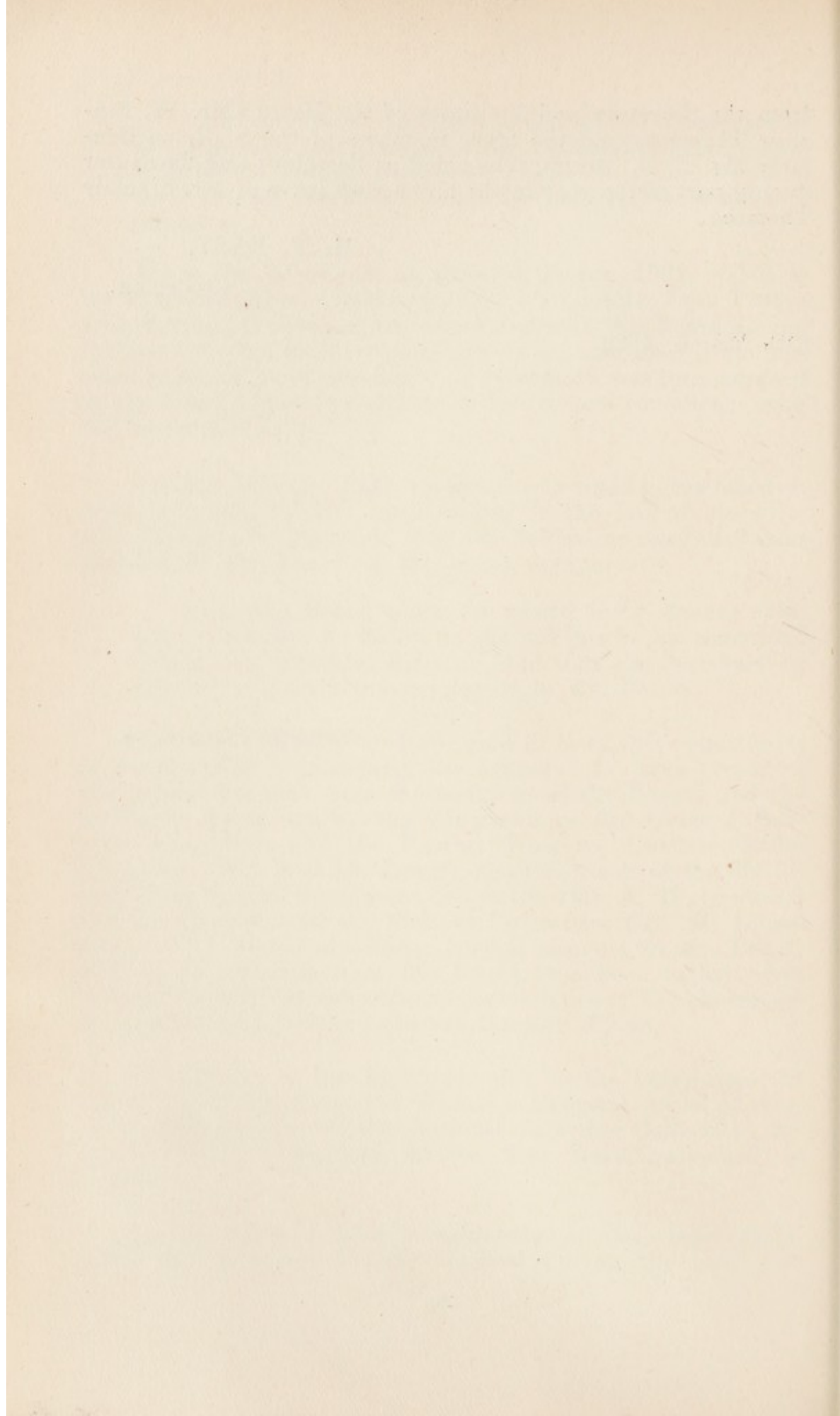
In conclusion I wish to acknowledge also, most gratefully, the assistance I have received during the past year

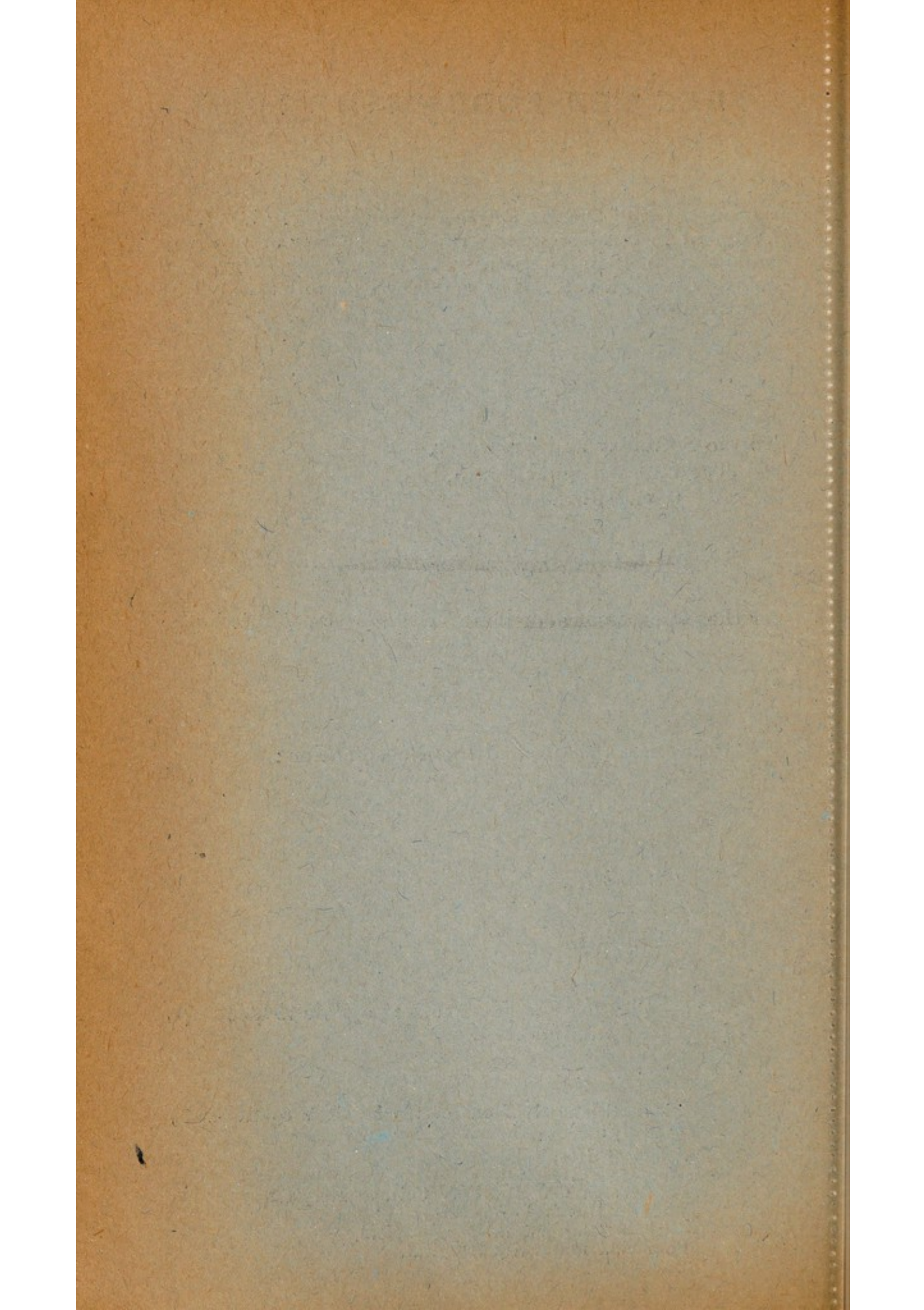

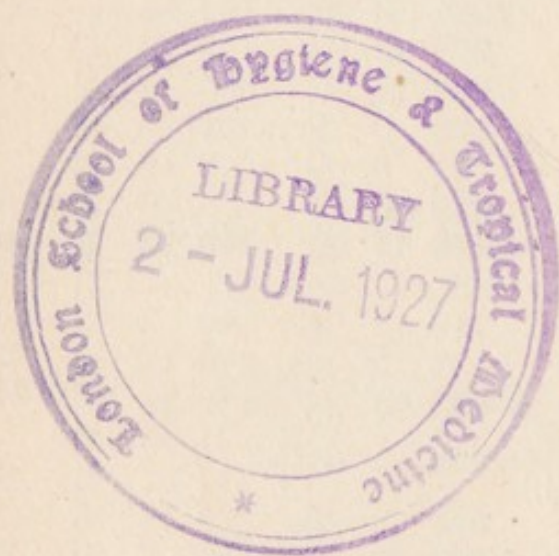

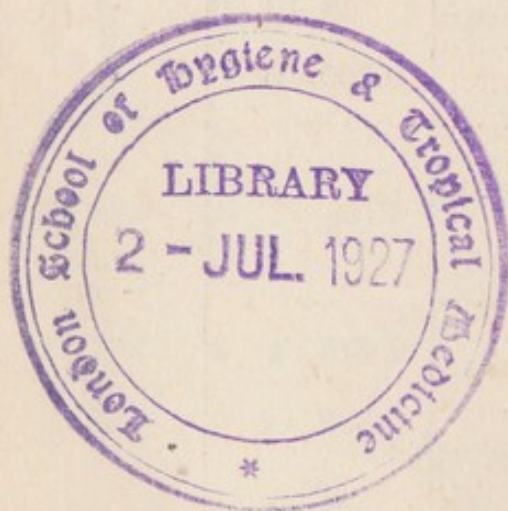
