tors the hospital question has been very prominently before the public. In June the report of the Public Hospitals Inquiry Committee was published, and it contained far-reaching proposals for the amelioration of the unsatisfactory condition of affairs under which hospital authorities generally, and the Cape Hospital Board in

particular, have laboured during the past five years.

On 26th August, 1925, the Board appointed a Special Committee to consider this report, and as a result the findings of the Government Committee of Inquiry were debated on 27th January, 1926, when it was resolved that the Board approve of the general principles of the Government Committee's report, reserving to themselves the right to criticise individual items as necessity may arise; and it was unanimously recommended that the Union Government should adopt the report with a view to the immediate

improvement of hospital conditions in the Union.

The report was a formidable indictment of the four Provincial Administrations and particularly of the Cape Provincial Administration. The main recommendations in the report are already familiar to all interested in hospital affairs, and it is unnecessary to repeat them here, especially as the Union Government, which appointed the Committee of Enquiry, has already definitely intimated its intention of disregarding their recommendations. Mr. Morris Alexander, K.C., M.L.A., at whose instance the Committee of Enquiry was originally appointed by the Government, initiated a debate in the House of Assembly last week with a view to inducing the Union Government to reconsider its decision to take no action in the direction of bringing hospitals under national control.

At the same time it should be said that there is reason for hope in the fact that a new Administrator has taken office in the Cape Province, and has already indicated that he is not in agreement with the policy of hospital starvation followed consistently by his predecessor. Already there are signs that a more enlightened view is being adopted in hospital matters by the Provincial Administration, and a more sympathetic attitude towards Hospital Boards, and it is earnestly to be hoped that the friendly reception recently accorded to the Cape Hospital Board by the Administrator will hearten the Board to proceed boldly and speedily with their long-

deferred scheme for a new general hospital.

In another part of this report details are given of the controversy —which unfortunately has become an annual event—between the Board and the Provincial Administration with regard to the Board's Estimates of Expenditure. The procedure last year differed only to the extent that the fiat of the Administrator (Sir Frederic de Waal) to retrench was more drastic than ever before. The Board were instructed to prune £17,000 out of their Estimates of Expenditure. This instruction was certainly in accordance with the law, for the annual enactment of an Ordinance limiting the payment of Provincial subsidy had been duly observed; but it is difficult to understand how the Provincial Council was led to pass such legislation last year in the face of the altered financial relations between the Union Government and the Provinces, unless it be assumed that it acted entirely through force of habit. One good result followed the commission of this wrong to the sick and injured —the Board appealed to the public for more generous assistance in money, and the public made a remarkably generous response. The result was that again the Board were enabled to scramble through to the end of the year without much slackening of effort in their humane work, and without restricting the already inadequate accommodation in their hospitals.

The machinery of the Board has been creaking more than usual during the past six months. The reception given to the report of the Board's Committee of Inquiry into the administration of Somerset Hospital and the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, was a clear indication of this condition of things, and showed also that there is a deep cleavage between the two main opposing sections of the Board. Another symptom of the same trouble was the resolution adopted at a recent meeting of the Board requesting the Administrator to appoint a Commission to enquire into and report upon the best system of controlling the hospitals in the Peninsula area, the constitution of the existing Board, the efficiency of their management and the retention or abolition of the Committees of Institutions. The Committees of Institutions do not appear to me to have functioned satisfactorily since their status was altered in 1920. The first intention then was to abolish them altogether, but this intention was altered and they were left as semi-independent advisory bodies, stripped of their financial powers and all their executive functions, except the making of appointments subject to the Board's approval. In these circumstances it is little wonder that during the past twelve months it was found necessary on fourteen occasions to abandon meetings of such committees through lack of a quorum, although the quorum was only five out of a membership of fifteen. The Board's regulations were recently altered to provide for the reduction of the quorum to three, so that it will now be possible for one-fifth of the membership

of the committee of an institution to constitute a meeting. The absurdity of bolstering up an unsatisfactory committee system by such means calls for no comment from me.

MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD.—The elected members who retired last year were Mrs. Ruth Fisken, Mr. E. Graham Green, Mr. A. W. Sawkins and myself. With the exception of Mr. Graham Green all were re-nominated and elected unopposed. Mr. J. L. Zadik was also returned unopposed in the place of Mr. Graham Green, the latter being appointed by the Administrator to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. George Smart.

The other two vacancies for representatives of the Administrator were filled by the reappointment of the Rev. A. G. du Toit and Mr. M. C. Vos.

The City Council of Cape Town reappointed Mr. S. Goldstein, and in the place of the Rev. A. J. S. Lewis (who declined a further term of office) Mr. W. James was appointed. Mr. J. McDonald was reappointed as joint representative of the Municipalities of Wynberg, Simon's Town and Durbanville.

The Divisional Council of the Cape reappointed Mr. J. J. Michau and appointed Mr. E. Hutt in the place of Mr. A. H. Oxenham.

The representatives on the Board of the Honorary Visiting Medical Officers of Institutions were appointed as follows:

Somerset Hospital: Dr. J. Luckhoff and Dr. H. W. Rey-NOLDS.

Woodstock Hospital: Dr. R. Sharp.

Rondebosch and Mowbray Cottage Hospital: Dr. A. R. McLachlan.

Victoria Hospital, Wynberg: Dr. G. F. FISMER.

Simon's Town-Kalk Bay Hospital: Dr. A. B. Bull.

In October Mrs. W. G. R. Murray was appointed a member of the Board to hold office until 1927, in succession to the late Mrs. J. L. Plant.

CHAIRMAN AND VICE-CHAIRMAN.—My colleagues did me the honour of appointing me, for the fifth time, Chairman of the Board, and Mr. M. C. Vos was appointed Vice-Chairman.

THANKS TO REV A. J. S. LEWIS.—At the first meeting of the reconstituted Board, held in March, 1925, the following resolution was carried unanimously:

That the Board hereby express their cordial thanks to the Rev. A. J. S. Lewis for the great service he rendered to the hospitals of the Peninsula whilst he was a member of the Board.

the Board referred to a Special Committee the whole question of the departmental working of the Board, including the constitution and duties of the Standing Committees, with a view to recommendations being submitted for simplifying the procedure and eliminating delay and circumlocution. The Special Committee consisted of the Chairman of the Board and the Chairmen of the three Standing Committees, Messrs. M. C. Vos, Frank Robb and A. W. Sawkins. Unfortunately, illness prevented Mr. Sawkins from taking part in the Committee's deliberations. On 28th October the Committee submitted a report which was amended to some extent by the Board. The following is the text of the report as amended before being adopted by the Board:

1. Your Committee were appointed on 24th June, 1925, under the following terms of reference:

That the whole question of the departmental working of the Board, including the constitution and duties of the Standing Committees, be considered by a Special Committee consisting of the Chairman of the Board, the Vice-Chairman of the Board and the Chairman of the Standing Committees, with a view to recommendations being submitted for simplifying the procedure, and eliminating delay and circumlocution.

2. A meeting was called for 20th July but other business intervened, and another opportunity for holding a meeting did not occur until 9th October. Mr. A. W. Sawkins was, unfortunately, prevented from attending on that occasion

on account of serious illness.

3. After considering various suggestions, your Committee have unanimously resolved to recommend that the several Standing Committees of the Board be abolished, and that in place of them there be constituted one committee, to consist of seven members, comprising (a) the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Board for the time being, and (b) five other members, two of whom shall be appointed at each ordinary meeting of the Board, and the two retiring members shall not be eligible for re-election during the remainder of the Board year. Your Committee recommend, further, that the Chairman of the Board be the Chairman of the Committee, and that three members form a quorum.

4. Your Committee also recommend that the members of the Committee be the Board's official visitors to institutions, and that the present system of official visitation be dis-

continued.

5. It will only be found by experience how frequently it will be necessary for the Committee to meet. As a beginning,

your Committee suggest that they should have one regular meeting every week, on a day and at an hour to be fixed by the Committee first constituted, and that the Chairman be authorised and directed to convene such additional meetings as may be found necessary.

6. The system recommended will necessitate the amendment of the Rules of Order, and your Committee recommend that the Committee first appointed be specially directed to revise the Rules of Order, and submit a report thereon to the Board.

The Rules of Order were revised in accordance with the direction given by the Board, and were sent to the Administrator for approval, but he has deferred consideration of the matter in view of the fact that a Commission has since heen asked for by the Board to enquire into hospital administration in the Cape Peninsula. The one-committee system, however, was duly inaugurated in accordance with the recommendations in the foregoing report, and has been in operation since November last.

ENQUIRY INTO THE ADMINISTRATION OF SOMERSET HOSPITAL AND VICTORIA HOSPITAL, WYNBERG.—On 20th July an Emergency Executive Committee acting on behalf of the Board, appointed a Special Committee of Investigation, consisting of Mr. M. C. Vos (Chairman), Mr. E. Graham Green and Dr. Julius Petersen to enquire into the whole administration of Somerset Hospital. The terms of reference were extended to include in the enquiry the administration of the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, particularly with regard to an outbreak of diphtheria which had occurred amongst the nursing staff. The report of the Special Committee was presented to the Board on 26th August, and was considered at meetings held on 2nd September, 9th September, 16th September, 23rd September, 28th October, 11th November, 25th November and 9th December. Several of the most important recommendations of the Special Committee were rejected by the Board.

meeting of the Board held on 8th January this year, the Vice-Chairman (Mr. M. C. Vos) reported that just before Sir Frederic de Waal relinquished office as Administrator he invited several members of the Board, in their personal capacities, together with Sir Carruthers Beattie and a member of the "Cape Times" staff, to an interview. Sir Frederic, in the course of his remarks at this interview suggested that the Board should approach the Administrator with a view to the appointment of a small Commission to enquire into the management of the Board and its institutions, and to devise legislation providing for better methods of

working. Mr. Vos moved accordingly, and after discussion the proposition was adopted in terms of the following amendment

moved by Mr. Frank Robb:

That His Honour the Administrator be respectfully requested to appoint a Commission for the purpose of enquiring into and reporting upon the best system of management and control of the Hospitals in the Peninsula area; the constitution of the present Board and the number of its members; the efficiency of its management; the retention or otherwise of the local Institutional Committees.

In February of this year the Provincial Secretary advised the Board that the following gentlemen had been appointed members

of the Commission requested by the Board:

Mr. Peter Dreyer (Chairman),

Dr. F. C. Willmot, Mr. J. R. Booth, Rev. A. J. S. Lewis.

The Provincial Secretary also notified that Mr. A. C. Robson of the Provincial Administration will act as Secretary to the Commission.

It has been stipulated by the Provincial Administration that the expense involved in conducting this enquiry will have to be borne by the Board, and this has created a difficulty and delayed the Commission getting to work, for at a special meeting of the Board, held on 16th February, 1926, a resolution was adopted expressing the opinion that the expenses of the Commission should be paid by the Provincial Administration.

HEAD OFFICE PREMISES.—At a meeting held on 25th March last year the Board by unanimous resolution expressed their thanks to the School Board for the Cape Division for the use of the Board Room in the premises at 85, St. George's Street, since 1913, for the monthly meetings of the Hospital Board, and directed that this resolution be conveyed to the Secretary of the School Board. The headquarters of the Board were removed to the new premises at 31, Burg Street, at the end of March, 1925.

was recorded that application has been made to the Administrator for his sanction, as required by Section 52 (3) of Ordinance No. 5 of 1912, for the building of two new wards for coloured patients at the Rondebosch and Mowbray Cottage Hospital, at an estimated cost of £3,000. At the April meeting of the Board fourteen tenders for the new building were considered, and the tender of £2,993, submitted by Messrs. J. Forster & Co., was accepted. The building has now been completed except for certain additional works recently decided upon, and it is expected that the coloured patients will be transferred to their new quarters at an early date.

The European male ward at Woodstock Hospital has also been reconstructed at a cost of nearly £300, towards which a special donation of £130 was received.

PUBLIC TENDERS FOR REPAIRS.—On 25th March last the Board adopted a recommendation of the Buildings, Grounds and Equipment Committee that tenders be invited by public advertisement for all repairs and renovations of buildings when the estimated cost of the work or works exceeds the sum of £50.

the University of Cape Town requested that when an out-patient clinic is established in psychological medicine the present arrangements for the teaching of this subject to medical students should be reconsidered; and the Board were asked if they considered the institution of such a clinic feasible. The enquiry was referred to the Committee of Somerset Hospital, and on 28th October the Board adopted the recommendation of that Committee that a purely out-patient clinic in psychological medicine be established at Somerset Hospital on similar lines to the clinic for diseases of the brain.

August, 1921, the Board passed a resolution with regard to the liability of patients in hospital for medical fees. As the result of questions raised at the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, it was decided on 25th November last to record the following interpretation of the former resolution:

Accounts for hospital charges are to have priority over medical fees, but the Board's resolution is not intended to operate to the extent of preventing the medical attendant of a patient from rendering his account to a patient who is liable for medical fees. It will be distinctly understood, however, that the medical fees are not to be collected until the hospital charges have been paid, and if any medical fees are received by the medical attendant before the hospital account is discharged, he is to remit them to the Board.

Since August, 1922, the Board have had under consideration the advisability of instituting a form of consent for operation and/or treatment which patients would be asked to sign. The matter was brought to a head in April of last year, when the Board adopted the following draft regulation, and submitted it for the approval of the Administrator in terms of the provisions of Ordinance No. 5 of 1912:

Before an operation is performed on or any special treatment applied to any patient, whenever possible a consent to the

operation or treatment as the case may be, signed by the patient or some person duly authorised thereto on his behalf shall be obtained in the following form: (1) in respect of an operation; or in the following form (2) in respect of treatment, and if such consent is not obtained, owing to the act or default of the patient, he may be discharged forthwith from the Hospital:—

(1) SURGICAL.

Witnesses 1 Signed

(2) MEDICAL.

2.....

* Such as X-ray treatment, Salvarsan injection, etc.

At a meeting held on 24th June it was reported to the Board that the Administrator had approved of the regulation in question, and since then the authorised form of consent has been in use in the several hospitals.

1912.—At the request of the Board, the Administrator, with the advice of the Executive Committee, approved of the exemption during the calendar year 1925 of all the institutions under the control of the Board from the provisions of sub-section (a) of Section 54 of Ordinance No. 5 of 1912, and of Somerset Hospital and the Peninsula Maternity Hospital from the provisions of sub-section (b) of the same section.

APPOINTMENT OF HONORARY CONSULTING SURGEONS.—On his retirement from the Honorary Visiting Staff of Somerset Hospital, Dr. H. A. Moffat was appointed an Honorary Consulting Surgeon to that Institution, and a similar honour was conferred upon Dr. H. Claude Wright and Dr. P. B. Travers Stubbs in respect of the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg.

RESIDENT MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT, SOMERSET HOS-PITAL.—In order to fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Dr. A. Carrington Seale, the post of Resident Medical Superinendent of Somerset Hospital was advertised in South Africa and verseas. Forty-two applications (11 from South African candilates and 31 from Britain and Ireland) were received, and Dr. Kenneth C. Middlemiss, of Glasgow, was appointed. In reporting on the matter the Committee of Somerset Hospital said that in rriving at their decision consideration had been given to the lesire of the Board that the person appointed should have been pecially trained for such a position and have had adequate adninistrative experience, and that these requirements ruled out he whole of the South African applicants. The Board approved of the appointment of Dr. Middlemiss at the advertised salary of 800 per annum, with furnished house, lighting and laundering, and the appointment was sanctioned by the Administrator with he advice of the Executive Committee. A cable was then dispatched to the Board's London Agents requesting them to make he necessary arrangements with Dr. Middlemiss, and later a cabled eply was received intimating that Dr. Middlemiss had accepted another appointment. The applications of the two candidates who had been placed second and third were then reconsidered, and it was decided that neither candidate was suitable for the position. The Committee of Somerset Hospital, therefore, recomnended that the post be readvertised at a commencing salary of £1,000 per annum, rising to £1,200 per annum, together with the other authorised allowances. This procedure was accepted by the Board and approved by the Administrator, subject to applications being invited only in South Africa. A further advertisement was recently published throughout South Africa, and eleven applications received in response thereto are now under consideration.

RETIREMENT OF DR. A. CARRINGTON SEALE.—On 23rd September last the Committee of Somerset Hospital reported that Dr. A. Carrington Seale, the Resident Medical Superintendent of the Institution, had intimated that on account of continued poor nealth he did not intend to seek reappointment at the conclusion of his engagement then existing, which would terminate on 31st December, 1925. The Committee of Somerset Hospital unanimously recommended that the necessary steps be taken to secure a pension for Dr. Seale, and the Board agreed to take action in this connection at the conclusion of Dr. Seale's term of office.

On the eve of Dr. Seale's retirement the Committee of Somerset Hospital adopted the following resolution which was reported to the Board at a meeting held on 23rd December last:

The committee of Somerset Hospital desire to place on record their high appreciation of the ten years of good service rendered by Dr. A. Carrington Seale as Resident Medica

Superintendent at the Institution.

During the strenuous and trying time of the war, whe medical men were most difficult to obtain and the staff of th Institution was very depleted, he had not only to superintene but also on many occasions had to act as house surgeon an anæsthetist. After the war and the subsequent depression he was obliged to economise in many ways to make ends mee but he never did so at the expense of the patients.

They also wish to state how deeply they value his unfailir tact, kindness and attention to the comfort and well-being

the patients and staff under his care.

The Committee hope that his health, which necessitated h sending in his resignation, may be fully restored, and the wish him every success in his future career.

—On 23rd December last the Board approved of the Appointment of Dr. J. van Roojen as part-time Radiologist at Somerset Hospita and decided to anticipate the authority of the Administrator for this appointment in order that Dr. van Roojen might take under the duty from 1st January, 1926.

CASUALTY WARD AT SOMERSET HOSPITAL .- Arising of of the trouble experienced in several instances during last year dealing with casualty cases at Somerset Hospital, a Sub-Committ of the Board was appointed to consider the possibility of providing an observation or casualty ward at that Institution. After caref enquiry on the subject the Sub-Committee decided upon a suitab site, and submitted a sketch plan of a building which in their opinion was adequate for the purpose, and could be erected at a cost about £1,250. The Board adopted the proposal, and directed th the expenditure on the building should be taken from the beques and donations not specifically earmarked which are standing the credit of the Somerset Hospital. The plan of the project building was submitted in the ordinary course to the Provinci Administration, but it did not meet with the approval of t technical officer of the Public Works Department to whom it w referred, and a new plan is now under consideration.

of the establishment of a kosher kitchen at Somerset Hospit was revived some months ago, and following consultations betwee the Committee of the Institution and the Jewish Sick Relief Societ the Board, on 25th November, approved of the principle of establishing such a kitchen, and authorised the Committee of Somers Hospital, acting in conjunction with the Jewish Sick Relief Societ to submit concrete proposals.

of the Board held on 26th August last it was announced that an anenymous donor had promised a sum of £500 for the provision of a Pathological Laboratory and Dark Room at Woodstock Hospital. It transpired later that the generous donor was Mrs. Chadwick, of Kenilworth. Plans and specifications of the new building were accordingly prepared, and at the December meeting of the Board it was reported that the work had been put in hand at a cost of £430.

Another anonymous donor presented Woodstock Hospital last year with a gift of £100 to provide an installation of eight electric fans in the wards of the Institution.

PATHOLOGICAL LABORATORY FOR VICTORIA HOSPITAL, WYNBERG.—In the last Annual Report it was recorded that the Board had decided to establish a Pathological Department at the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, at an estimated cost of £275. When the equipment ordered for the purpose arrived from England, it was ascertained that considerable expenditure would still be necessary for structural alterations, electricity and water connections and furniture and fittings, and in September last the Board provided an additional sum of £100, making an appropriation of £375 in all.

VENEREAL DISEASES CLINIC AT VICTORIA HOSPITAL, WYNBERG.—In August last a letter was received from the Town Clerk of Wynberg, asking if the Board would grant the Municipality the use of two rooms at the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, for the purpose of a venereal clinic, to be open twice a week to men and once a week to women. The request was referred for consideration to the Committee of the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, and that Committee reported later that they had adopted the recommendation of their Medical Advisory Sub-Committee that a clinic for the treatment of venereal diseases be provided for in the out-patient department which is to be established in the building called "Hygeia," and that the clinic be on the lines suggested in a memorandum prepared by Dr. A. Reith Fraser, and dated 18th March, 1923, with certain modifications, which include a stipulation that the required nursing service for the clinic should be provided by the Municipality of Wynberg. The Board at a meeting held on 28th October adopted the proposals in this connection submitted by the Committee of the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, subject to the proviso that no expense whatever should devolve upon the Board in respect to the conduct of the clinic, and that it shall not interfere in any respect with the ordinary work of the hospital.

ELECTRIC LIFT FOR VICTORIA HOSPITAL, WYNBERG.— It was reported at a meeting of the Board held on 26th September last that tenders had been invited for providing an electric lift at the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, in the place of the hand-operated lift which had become obsolete. Messrs. Hudson & Pickering generously agreed to give their consulting services gratuitously in this matter, on the understanding that the usual out-of-pocket expenses which might be incurred by them would be a charge against the contingency amount included in the specification. On their advice the Board accepted the tender of £689 submitted by Messrs. Waygood-Otis (South Africa), Ltd. A fund of £560 has already been accumulated for the purpose of providing this lift, and the shortfall was guaranteed by the Wynberg and District Tradesmen's Gala Committee through the Victoria Hospital Association. The lift has been on order for nearly six months and may be expected shortly.

BRITISH CHARITIES ASSOCIATION.—Messrs. Price & Sons, Cape Town, acting in their capacity as agents of the British Charities Association, intimated towards the end of last year that the Association had decided to distribute the sum of £1,000 among South African Hospitals nominated by H.R.H. Princess Alice, and that a sum of £250 had been allocated to the Peninsula Maternity Hospital. The money has since been received, and due acknowledgment has been made of this generous donation.

WIRELESS RECEIVING SETS.—Wireless receiving sets were installed during the year in Somerset Hospital and the Eaton and McGregor Convalescent Homes. The expenditure in each case was defrayed from special donations, the Board having decided that it should not be a charge against ordinary revenue.

MATERNITY NURSING.—In May last the Committee of the Peninsula Maternity Hospital recommended that the position of staff nurse at that Institute be filled for a period of six months at a time, so that at the end of each term of training one of the graduates of the Hospital might have an opportunity of obtaining further experience in midwifery. In support of this recommendation it was stated that it had been found that very few of the general nurses who qualify as midwives at the Peninsula Maternity Hospital take up maternity work, and it was believed that this was due mainly to the fact that, having no opportunity of post-graduate experience, they hesitated to undertake any responsible position involving maternity nursing. The Board adopted this recommendation, and the new arrangement has since been put in force.

out that the name of the district known as "Black River and Milner" had been changed to "Black River and Athlone" and on the recommendation of the Committee of the C.H.B. District Nursing Organisation, it was decided that the name of the local

branch of the Organisation should be altered to the "Black River and Athlone Branch."

In December the Board agreed to alter the name of the Salt River Branch of the Organisation to "Woodstock and Salt River Branch," as the latter designation more correctly describes the area in which the district nurses now work.

SPECIAL DUTY LEAVE FOR NURSES .- At the April meeting of the Committee of Somerset Hospital the Matron (Miss F. A. Goodacre) submitted an application for "special duty leave," without deduction of pay or privileges, for a period not exceeding ten days, to enable her to attend a Conference of the South African Trained Nurses' Association, to be held at Grahamstown during the first week in May, in the capacity of a delegate appointed by the Western Province Branch of the Association. It was stated that the Assistant Matron (Miss E. Hill) would act in the place of the Matron during her absence, and that no additional expenditure would be incurred. On the recommendation of the General Purposes Committee the Board adopted the principle involved, and decided to represent to the Administrator the desirability of amending the Nurses' Salaries and Pensions Ordinance so as to provide that special paid leave may be granted in such circumstances, as is done in other Provinces of the Union. In a letter dated 12th June, the Provincial Secretary replied to the Board's representations by stating that no change in the leave privileges for nurses was then in contemplation.

NURSES' PRIZE SCHEME.—At the June (1925) examination of the Colonial Medical Council for nurses and midwives, twenty-seven candidates entered as follows: Somerset Hospital, 11; Woodstock Hospital, 4; Rondebosch and Mowbray Cottage Hospital, 1; Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, 1; Peninsula Maternity Hospital, 10. With the exception of the one from the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, all these candidates were successful. The following awards were accordingly made under the Board's prize scheme:

In order of merit in the examination list for the Province Miss Lawrie was placed first, and the other three nurses were bracketed for fifth place. The prize of £2 10s., awarded to the most successful pupil-midwife, trained at the Peninsula Maternity Hospital, was awarded to Miss R. C. Bacon, who was placed second in the midwifery examination list for the Province.

At the December (1925) examination twenty-five candidates entered as follows: Somerset Hospital, 9; Woodstock Hospital, 1; Rondebosch and Mowbray Cottage Hospital, 4; Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, 2; Peninsula Maternity Hospital, 10. These candidates were all successful, with the exception of one from Somerset Hospital, and the following awards were made under the Board's prize scheme:

In order of merit in the examination list for the Province, Miss Brennan was placed first, Miss Versfeld third and Miss van Niekerk seventeenth. The prize of £2 10s. to the most successful pupil-midwife trained at the Peninsula Maternity Hospital was awarded to Miss C. M. Powell, who was bracketed for second place in the midwifery examination list for the Province.

INOCULATION OF NURSES.—In 1922 the Board decided that the question of inoculation of the nursing staff against enteric fever should be a matter of voluntary arrangement between the nurse and the institution. This decision, however, was recently reviewed, and on 23rd December last the Board directed that the hospitals under their control should be notified that it is considered advisable that all nurse-probationers should be inoculated against enteric fever.

PATIENTS REFUSED ADMISSION.—By direction of the Board the monthly return showing the patients refused admission, through lack of accommodation, was discontinued at the end of June. The following is a summary of the information compiled during the first half of the year 1925:

motor ambulances.—During the calendar year 1925, 1,858 cases (including 181 arising from street accidents) were removed in the Board's ambulances, an average of 154.83 per month. Of this number 997 removals were free and 861 were charged for.

During the past year two Bean cars have been purchased for the ambulance work, and arrangements have been made for one of the attendants at Somerset Hospital to be licensed as a driver, in order that he may be available in case of emergency when the two regular drivers are not available.

AMENDMENT OF REGULATIONS.—The amendment of Regulations 30, 57 and 73 mentioned in the last Annual Report were duly approved by the Administrator and promulgated in the "Provincial Gazette" on 20th March, 1925.

After a very protracted discussion, it was decided on 25th November to amend Regulations 44 and 63 so as to make the medical superintendant the admitting officer and officer-in-charge of a hospital, responsible for the whole administration of the institution. The amended regulations have not yet been approved by the Administrator.

OBITUARY.—At a meeting of the Board held on 25th March, 1925, the Acting Chairman, who presided, intimated that on Friday evening, the 20th of February, Sister S. B. Dreyer, of the staff of Woodstock Hospital, died in the Institution. She had undergone a surgical operation early in December, when she was found to be suffering from an incurable malady. The late Sister Dreyer first joined the staff of the Hospital as a probationer on 1st December, 1911, and remained in its service during the long term of thirteen years. She was appointed a Sister on 1st August, 1916. During the last few years of her service she was in charge of the Denis Buxton Memorial Children's Wards. The death of Sister Dreyer was a very severe loss to the Woodstock Hospital. She had a high conception of duty, and set a worthy example to her juniors on the nursing staff of the Institution. The sad occurrence was recorded in the form of the following resolution:

That the Cape Hospital Board have heard with much regret of the untimely death of Sister S. B. Dreyer of the Woodstock Hospital, whose faithful service will long be gratefully remembered both by the medical and nursing staffs and by the patients to whom she ministered.

Another death has to be recorded in this report—that of Mr. W. M. Martin, which took place on 5th April, 1925.

Mr. Martin was connected with the Rondebosch and Mowbray Cottage Hospital for many years in the capacity of Secretary, first under the old Board, and later under the Committee of Management and this Board. When his post was abolished, upon the passing of Ordinance No. 11 of 1920, Mr. Martin was appointed a representative of the Board on the Committee of the Institution, and had been regularly reappointed thereafter upon the expiration of each term of office.

At a meeting of the Board held on 16th September last it fell to me to announce the death, on 12th September, of Mrs. J. L. Plant. Mrs. Plant's health had not been good during the preceding twelve months, and a few days before her death she had written to the Secretary of the Board suggesting that whilst she was loth to sever her connection with the Board, she felt that it would be unfair to ask for any more leave of absence, and, therefore, she offered her resignation if the Board should desire to fill her place. Mrs. Plant became a member of the Committee of the Rondebosch and Mowbray Cottage Hospital in 1913, and retained her membership of that body until her death. She was elected to the Board in March, 1919, and was appointed to the General Purposes Committee where her experience and good judgment contributed not a little to the solution of some of the problems which confronted the Board. Also, in March, 1919, Mrs. Plant was appointed a member of the Committee of the Peninsula Maternity Hospital, an Institution in which she took the deepest interest. A few months later she was elected Chairman of the House Sub-Committee, and in that capacity she had much to do with the domestic administration of the Maternity Hospital. In May, 1922, she was appointed a Board representative on the Committee of Woodstock Hospital, and there, too, her knowledge and experience were found very helpful.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.—The thanks of the Board are due to the Committees of the several Institutions; the ex-Mayoress of Cape Town (Mrs. R. J. Verster) and those who assisted her in organising the Hospital Ball; and the organisers and collectors who carried through the Hospital Saturday Collection and the midweek Street Collection, as well as the ladies who have continued the work of house-to-house collecting.

In concluding this report, I wish to acknowledge the support given me by the members of the Board throughout another year; my special thanks are due to the Vice-Chairman, Mr. M. C. Vos, whose whole-hearted co-operation has been most helpful in many directions.

I also wish to express my thanks to the staff of the Board for their loyal and efficient service, and particularly to acknowledge very gratefully the assistance I have received from the Secretary and Treasurer, Mr. W. Sinclair Thomson. In dealing with the many difficult problems which have arisen Mr. Thomson's advice and help have been invaluable to me, and his organisation of the business of the Board has considerably lightened my labours.


