Duties :

- The Finance and General Purposes Committee shall, in accordance with the Rules of Order, and with the approval of the Board:
 - (a) supervise all the fiscal concerns of the Board and report periodically as to the state of the several funds of the Board;

 - (e) arrange all investments of moneys held by or funds entrusted to the Board;
 - (f) report to the Board at the request of any of the other Standing Committees as to the provision of funds for any object connected with the administration of the Board or any of its Institutions;
 - (g) supervise the collection of all revenue due to the Board and its Institutions;
 - (h) be responsible for the control of the Head Office of the Board, and deal with all matters appertaining to the appointment, emoluments, resignation or leave of the Secretary and Treasurer and other officers employed therein;
 - (i) invite and deal with all tenders received for annual supplies and services required by the Board;

(j) arrange all insurance policies, whether in respect of fire, fidelity guarantee, workmen's compensation, or any other risk.

The control and administration of the several Institutions of the Board, are allocated to Standing Committees as follows:—(1) Somerset Hospital to the Somerset Hospital Committee; (2) Rondebosch and Mowbray Cottage Hospital and Woodstock Hospitals to the Rondebosch and Woodstock Hospitals Committee; (3) Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, and Simon's Town—Kalk Bay Hospital to the Wynberg and Simon's Town Hospitals Committee; (4) Eaton Convalescent Home and McGregor Convalescent Home to the Convalescent Homes Committee; and (5) Cape Town Free Dispensary, Peninsula Maternity Hospital and the C.H.B. - (c) Subject to the approval of the Board, make all professional and other appointments in connection with such Institution or Institutions;
- (d) Deal with the representations of patients in and members of the Staff of such Institution or Institutions;
- (e) Advise the Board in all matters affecting such Institution or Institutions;
- (f) In December of each year, in consultation with the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board, frame Estimates of the recurrent income and expenditure of such Institution, or Institutions in respect of that year

and submit the same without delay to the Finance and General Purposes Committee;

MINUTE

of the Chairman of the Board for the Year 1929-1930.

HOSPITAL DEVELOPMENT.—The most important event to be recorded in respect to the year under review is the acceptance by the Provincial Administration, of the revised scheme for the erection of the new hospital at Groote Schuur, to contain from 840 to 850 beds, at an estimated cost of £735,200. It will be remembered that in the early part of 1929 the Press devoted considerable space to a discussion of the acute shortage of hospital accommodation in the Cape Town area. Doubtless the publicity given to the matter had its due effect on the minds of the Administrator and the members of the Executive Committee of the Provincial Council, who invited representatives of the Board to meet them and discuss the position. The result of this interview, which took place on the 18th April, 1929, was the granting of authority to proceed with the complete scheme. The letter from the Provincial Secretary notifying the Executive Committee's decision, which marked the conclusion of a controversy which had raged, more or less fiercely, for several years, was dated 22nd April; and immediately upon its receipt the Public Works Department were requested to proceed as rapidly as possible with the preparation of working drawings. It is understood that a large proportion of the staff of the Department have been busily occupied in this connection ever since; it will be understood that the work of planning the details of a scheme of this magnitude is very great. From time to time sketch plans of the various departments of the hospital have been submitted to and approved or amended by the specialists and others concerned. There is reason to hope that a commencement of the actual work of building will be made in September next, and that the hospital, or at any rate the greater part of it, will be ready for occupation three years later.

The Groote Schuur Hospital comes at the end of a series of extensive hospital schemes, which have been or are now being carried out in various parts of the country under the direction of the Public Works Department; consequently, it has been possible to apply to its planning the valuable practical experience which has been gained in connection with the schemes which have preceded it. A very important departure has been made from the

original lay-out of the scheme, which was based on what is known as the pavilion type of hospital construction. Partly as the result of experience gained in the course of a recent visit to Europe and America by Mr. J. S. Cleland, Chief Government Architect, a new lay-out plan, embodying radical alterations of the scheme previously adopted by the Board, has been submitted to and, after careful examination, has been adopted by the Board. In brief, the new plan, which has also been accepted by the Provincial Administration on the condition that the total estimated cost is not exceeded, provides for the concentration of the hospital buildings, including the Out-patient Department, in one main block, a large portion of which consists of six storeys. There can be no doubt that this concentration, which is in accordance with the latest developments in hospital planning, will greatly simplify the administration of the institution.

It may fairly be assumed that when the Groote Schuur Hospital is completed, the hospital needs of this area will be adequately met. The Board's greatest anxiety at the present time is occasioned by the need for coping with the ever-increasing demand for hospital accommodation during the interval which must elapse before the new hospital is ready for occupation. The Provincial Administration, quite reasonably, consider that all available resources should be concentrated on the Groote Schuur Hospital scheme; this policy has been clearly enunciated by them on several occasions, and it therefore seems useless to expect them to approve of any major scheme of development in connection with existing institutions.

In the circumstances, the Board have considered it wise to concentrate their attention on the question of utilising the resources at their disposal to the best possible advantage. That their efforts have been attended with success will be realised from the fact that in 1929 the total number of patients treated in the several hospitals was 9,487, as compared with 8,855 during 1928 (an increase of 632), the average daily numbers for the two years being 515.26 and 475.47 respectively. With regard to the average daily numbers, the following figures, which have been extracted from recent records of the hospitals mentioned, will show to what extent the institutions are overcrowded from time to time:—

The expansion of the out-patient work has been very marked. The number of cases dealt with during 1929 was 53,874, compared with 43,136 in 1928, an increase of 10,738; the total numbers of attendances for the two years were 174,427 and 143,017 respectively, an increase of 31,410.

MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD.—As required by law, the following elective members of the Board retired in October, 1929:—

- Rev. A. P. Bender (representing the contributors to Somerset Hospital).
- Dr. R. Sharp (representing the contributors to Woodstock Hospital).
- Mr. W. D. Hare (representing the contributors to Rondebosch and Mowbray Cottage Hospital).
- Dr. O. J. Currie (representing the contributors to Victoria Hospital, Wynberg).
- Mr. P. G. Flint (representing the contributors to Simon's Town—Kalk Bay Hospital).
- Dr. F. M. Morris (representing the contributors to the Peninsula Maternity Hospital, Cape Town Free Dispensary, Eaton and McGregor Convalescent Home and C.H.B. District Nursing Organisation).

All these members were re-elected to the Board with the exception of Mr. P. G. Flint, Miss N. E. Warner being elected in his place.

The term of office of Mr. M. C. Vos, one of the three representatives of the Administrator on the Board, expired last year; Mr. Vos was reappointed for a further term of three years.

Mrs. H. C. Horwood's term of office as a representative of the Cape Town Council expired last year, and she was reappointed for a further period of twelve months. I resigned my own appointment as a representative of the Cape Town Council, and Mr. A. Brown was appointed for the remainder of my term of office, which expires this year.

The Divisional Council of the Cape reappointed Chevalier J. B. Callanan and Dr. C. F. Juritz, and I was appointed as their third representative.

Mr. A. Withinshaw was reappointed as the representative of the Municipalities of Simon's Town and Durbanville.

Professor A. W. Falconer and Dr. A. R. McLachlan were reappointed by the Honorary Visiting Medical Officers, and Dr. P. T. Cairns was appointed by them in place of Dr. Julius Petersen, who was compelled, through ill-health, to resign his seat on the Board in June, 1929.

Dr. Petersen had been a member of the Board since its establishment, and prior to that time had been associated for many years with the management of Somerset Hospital. His resignation, particularly in view of the circumstances, was received with great regret and reference was made to his valuable services as Chairman of various Committees and as Vice-Chairman of the Board.

At a special meeting of the Board held on 29th October, I was honoured by being reappointed Chairman of the Board, and Mr. M. C. Vos was reappointed to the position of Vice-Chairman, which he had held since the resignation of Dr. Julius Petersen, in June.

somerset Hospital.—No one who has made it his or her business to keep in touch with Somerset Hospital can have failed to be impressed by the improved aspect of the buildings and grounds of this hospital, which, until quite recently, presented a gloomy and dilapidated appearance. Let it be said at once that the improvement referred to is not confined to appearances; there had been a general "toning-up" in all departments, until to-day, it can be said quite truthfully, that the hospital is functioning very satisfactorily, when due allowance is made for the lack of adequate space and for the fact that the buildings are antiquated and, in some respects, totally unsuited to modern requirements.

During the year steps were taken to introduce what is known as the "bulk" system in connection with the supply of electricity to the hospital. This will ultimately result in a considerable saving in expenditure, and also, it is hoped, in an increase in efficiency. In this connexion, it may be mentioned that the main kitchen of the hospital is being electrified.

WOODSTOCK HOSPITAL.—The Nurses' dining room at this institution has been increased in size, and a verandah has been added to the out-patient department, which affords additional waiting accommodation for patients. Another notable improvement consists in the tar-paving of the whole of the area in front of the hospital which has had the effect of reducing the dust nuisance to a minimum.

The need for additional beds at Woodstock Hospital is very great, and a scheme for providing about 20 additional beds, together with the consequential enlargement of the Nurses' Home, has been under consideration. Unfortunately, the question has reached a deadlock, principally for the reason, already mentioned, that the Provincial Administration consider that all available resources should be concentrated on the Groote Schuur Hospital scheme.

The precincts of the hospital have now been properly fenced, and the responsible committee hope shortly to secure the services of a full-time gardener with the object of improving the rather desolate appearance of the grounds.

was found necessary during the year to afford some additional protection for the nurses and patients at this institution, which on several occasions has been broken into by coloured marauders. All the windows in the Nurses' Home are now provided with bars or shutters, and the stoep of the non-European wards has been enclosed

with thief-resisting wire netting.

The long corridor connecting the non-European wards with the main hospital building is now enclosed on both sides, thus affording greater protection from the weather and from night-prowlers. Among other improvements which have been carried out at the hospital are the reconstruction of part of the roof of, and the cementing of the area around, the non-European Wards, and the provision of a covered washing area with washing troughs. The work of erecting a sterilising room is now proceeding, and it is hoped shortly to proceed with the reconstruction of the stoep of the European female ward and the construction of a corresponding stoep for the European male ward.

A cottage is in course of erection in the grounds of the hospital

for the accommodation of the Resident Medical Officer.

A tennis court with shelter has been provided for the use of the nurses and their friends.

The corner of the hospital grounds formed by the junction of the Camp Ground and Liesbeek Roads has been rounded, thus enlarging the angle of vision of motor drivers on both thoroughfares. It is hoped that this will remove the need for the constant hooting of motor cars at this corner.

Largely as the result of representations made to the S.A. Medical Council by Dr. E. Barnard Fuller, the status of a first-class training school for nurses has been restored to this hospital.

wards at this institution are now approaching completion, and it is expected that they will be in commission by the middle of this year. The nett increase of 27 beds which will be brought about by means of these new wards will assist materially to relieve the shortage of hospital beds in the Wynberg area. The new building, together with the extension of the Nurses' Home, rendered necessary by the increased number of beds, constitutes a very handsome addition to the hospital premises. The basement portion of the new wards is far more commodious and well-lighted than appeared from the

plans; it was originally intended to utilise the basement as accommodation for orderlies, but it is hoped that it will be possible, by effecting some minor alterations, to adapt the space available for the purposes of an out-patient department. A scheme to that end is in preparation, and if it is carried through it is proposed to provide a dispensary and to house orderlies and native boys in a section of the old building. The old wood and iron building, known as "Hygeia," which has hitherto been used for non-European pateints, could then be removed entirely, thus enabling considerable improvements to be made in the grounds of the hospital. Largely by means of contributions made by the Victoria Hospital Association and the Wynberg Tradesmen's Gala Committee, it was possible to provide for the erection of extra balconies to the new wards, which will add very materially to their comfort and convenience.

SIMON'S TOWN-KALK HOSPITAL.—This hospital, BAY probably on account of its situation, has hitherto been somewhat difficult to administer, and until quite recently, the accommodation available there has not been fully availed of. In view of the acute congestion at the other hospitals, the Board have given their serious consideration to this matter, and it is satisfactory to be able to report that, largely as the result of a complete reorganisation of the staff of the hospital, most of the difficulties which formerly militated against the more profitable use of the institution have disappeared. The hospital contains 26 beds, and it is not proposed to take any steps to increase that number; on the other hand, the accommodation for the nurses is inadequate and unsatisfactory, and application has been made to the Provincial Administration for a loan to enable a second storey to be added to the Nurses' Home. Simon's Town does not offer many attractions to nurses, whose opportunities for recreation are necessarily very limited, and it is therefore incumbent upon the Board to see that the living conditions of the nursing staff at the Simon's Town—Kalk Bay Hospital are made as comfortable as possible.

The surgical and other equipment of the hospital has been brought up to date, and among other appliances which have been purchased are a portable X-Ray apparatus and a microscope, both of which were urgently needed.

PENINSULA MATERNITY HOSPITAL.—Reference was made in the last Annual Report of the Board to the fact that steps were being taken in the direction of rebuilding this hospital. Circumstances over which the Board had no control, have caused considerable delay in this matter. As the result of prolonged discussions with the Medical Staff and others interested, a very satisfactory

plan was produced, but, unfortunately, when this was submitted to the Quantity Surveyor it was found that the estimated cost of the scheme was about £10,000 more than the funds available. It then became necessary to prepare revised plans, which, in due course, were submitted, through the Provincial Secretary, to the Departments of Public Health and Public Works. These plans did not immediately meet with the approval of the two departments; and ultimately the Vice-Chairman and the Secretary of the Board proceeded to Pretoria and discussed the question in person with the technical officers concerned. As the result of this visit the revised plans, with sundry modifications, were accepted, and the working drawings were put in hand immediately. It is expected that the contract for the work will be let by the end of this month (March).

It is intended for the present to retain the existing building to serve the purposes of a Nurses' Home.

In the meantime, various improvements have been effected at the hospital. Some very necessary painting and renovation work has been carried out, and a detached building at the rear of the hospital premises has been converted into a laundry, which has been fitted with an electric washing machine and other appliances.

The normal condition of the hospital is one of over-crowding. The new hospital will provide accommodation for 8 or 10 additional patients, but this increase will not, in itself, be sufficient to cope with the demand for maternity beds. Steps have, however, been taken to systematise and extend the district work of the institution. Rules have been framed in this connexion, the underlying object of which is to ensure that, as far as practicable, normal cases shall be dealt with in the homes of the patients, due regard being had to the suitability of the conditions in such homes; it is hoped that by these means a greater number of beds in the hospital will be available for abnormal cases.

convalescent Homes maintained by the Board at Plumstead (The Eaton Convalescent Home for European and non-European adults, and the McGregor Convalescent Home for European children) have not, in the past, been availed of as fully as the Board could have wished. There is a large number of patients in the general hospitals who could be discharged (thus making room for more acute cases) provided that they could be assured of some skilled nursing attention in their own homes. Unfortunately, in the great majority of cases, such attention would be entirely lacking. The possibility of using the Convalescent Homes for the purpose of accommodating such cases has engaged the attention of the Board for some time past,

but it was necessary at the outset to overcome a number of difficulties, notably in connexion with the staffing of the institutions. Advantage was taken of the retirement, early last year, of the Lady Superintendent of the Eaton Convalescent Home to appoint in her place a trained nurse with the status of Matron. Miss M. K. Murphy, the first incumbent of the new position, died very suddenly in October, 1929; in the short period of her appointment she achieved a great deal in the direction desired by the Board. Mrs. G. Beckh succeeded to the post, and is very ably carrying on the work of her predecessor.

A somewhat similar state of things exists at the McGregor Convalescent Home. The Lady Superintendent of that institution is now on long leave, at the conclusion of which she will be retired from the service. The lady who has been appointed as Acting Matron is a trained childrens' nurse, and it is hoped, with her assistance, to bring about some much needed improvement in the administration of the institution.

During the year some important structural alterations were effected at the Eaton Home, and a considerable sum of money was spent in replenishing the furniture and equipment, thereby greatly enhancing the comfort of inmates and staff. The large building in the grounds of the Home is at present being converted into sleeping accommodation with bath-room and lavatory. Steps are also being taken to secure accommodation for convalescent non-European children, who are very badly catered for at present.

Playground equipment, comprising a giant-stride, see-saw, slide and ocean-wave, have been purchased for the McGregor Home, and are now being erected. A large playroom has been planned, and in various other ways the amenities of the Home are being improved.

I take this opportunity of recording my appreciation of the work done by a committee of ladies, organised by Mrs. Horwood and Mrs. Sales, who gave a great deal of time and labour to the work of brightening both Homes. The result of that work is particularly noticeable at the Eaton Home, the appearance of which, at one time drab and dreary, has been completely transformed.

CAPE TOWN FREE DISPENSARY.—The extensive additions to the buildings of this institution, to which reference was made in the previous Annual Report of the Board, are now at the point of completion. The new buildings, which are imposing in appearance, will permit of a considerable extension of the beneficent work of the Dispensary.

Until recently the dental work at the Dispensary was confined to extractions; but during the latter part of last year permission was obtained from the Administrator to appoint a part-time dental surgeon to enable remedial dental treatment to be given to school children; later on it became evident that the volume of work was too great to be dealt with by one man, and the Administrator's sanction to the appointment of a second part-time dental surgeon was obtained. The Board have thus taken over, and considerably extended, the work carried out by the dental clinic formerly administered by the Society for the Protection of Child Life, which was discontinued last year.

DISTRICT NURSING.—The District Nursing work of the Board continues to expand. During the year branches of the C.H.B. District Nursing Organisation were established at Mowbray, Bellville, Grassy Park and Parow. The Southfield branch was closed, but the work begun there was taken over by a new branch which was established at Plumstead. A second nurse at the Lakeside-Kommetje branch, and an additional relieving nurse, were appointed. The Organisation now consists of 17 branches, and employs 28 district nurses (general and maternity) and a Superintendent. The position of Superintendent of a large institution of this kind is a very difficult one, and calls for abilities of a very high order, and it gives me great pleasure to testify to the value of Miss A. Elliott's services in this connexion.

INSPECTION OF INSTITUTIONS BY THE ASSISTANT HEALTH OFFICER, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH.—During the month of December, 1929, the several institutions controlled by the Board were inspected by Dr. A. J. van der Spuy. It is a source of considerable gratification to the Board that Dr. van der Spuy, in his detailed reports, refers to the marked improvement in the conditions at each of the institutions since his previous visit early in 1928.

REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD.—The very arduous work of revising the Board's Regulations was brought to a conclusion last year; the revised Regulations have been forwarded to the Administrator, and will doubtless be promulgated in due course.

In re-casting the Regulations, the Board were faced with the difficulty of devising rules which could be applied to all of their institutions, the conditions at which vary very considerably. It was finally decided to eliminate, as far as possible, those rules which were not of common effect, and to incorporate them in bye-laws for the several institutions, due regard being had to the peculiar circumstances of each.

EXEMPTION FROM SECTION 54 OF ORDINANCE NO. 5 OF 1912.—At the request of the Board, the Administrator, with the

advice of the Executive Committee, approved of the exemption during the calendar year 1929, of all the institutions under the control of the Board from the provisions of sub-section (a) of Section 54 of Ordinance No. 5 of 1912, and of Somerset Hospital and the Peninsula Maternity Hospital only from the provisions of subsection (b) of the same section.

OBITUARY.—It is with deep regret that I record the deaths of two ex-members of the Board.

Mr. E. Hopper, who died on 20th May, 1929, was one of the City Council's representatives on the Board, from 1924 to 1926. Prior to this he was for many years a member of the Woodstock Hospital Committee, and was a member of the Committee of the Salt River Free Dispensary from 1917 until the work of that institution was transferred to Woodstock Hospital in 1923.

Mr. A. J. G. Simpson, who died on 27th May, 1929, was a member of the Board from March to September, 1926, as the representative of the Wynberg, Simon's Town and Durbanville Municipalities.

TRAINING OF NURSES.

General.—At the examination for nurses held by the South African Medical Council in April, 20 candidates entered, as follows:—Somerset Hospital, 10; Woodstock Hospital, 4; Rondebosch Hospital, 3; Wynberg Hospital, 3. Fifteen of these candidates were successful, one each from Somerset and Wynberg Hospitals and the three candidates from Rondebosch Hospital having failed to secure the requisite number of marks. The following awards were made under the Board's prize scheme:

In order of merit in the examination list Miss Loopuyt was placed first in the Province (fifteenth in the Union); Miss Stocks third in the Province (twenty-third in the Union); and Miss Ruperti fourth in the Province (in the Pass Division).

At the October examination, 28 candidates entered, as follows:—Somerset Hospital, 17; Woodstock Hospital, 1; Rondebosch Hospital, 4; Wynberg Hospital, 6. These candidates were all successful, and Miss I. F. Eddy of Somerset Hospital, who was placed in the Honours Division, was awarded a prize of £5.

Midwifery.—At the examination for midwives held in April, 1929, nine candidates entered from the Peninsula Maternity Hospital and all passed. Miss J. E. S. Freeman and Miss L. C. Preller, who were placed in the Honours Division, were awarded prizes of £2 2s. each. At the October, 1929, examination, nine candidates entered

and all passed. Misses I. J. Dalton, L. B. Ferguson and O. Vincent, who were placed in the Honours Division, were awarded prizes of £2 2s. each.

The Board have revised their scheme of prizes for nurses. Formerly it was the practice to award, each half-year, three prizes of £5, £3, and £2 to the nurses trained in the Board's general hospitals in the order of merit which they achieved in the examinations, and also a prize of £2 10s. to the pupil-midwife who secured first place among the successful candidates from the Peninsula Maternity Hospital. In future the procedure will be to give prizes of £4 4s. and £2 2s. respectively to every general trained nurse and pupil-midwife who is placed in the Honours Division at each half-yearly examination. It will be understood, of course, that the prize scheme will be confined to nurses trained in the Board's hospitals.

Arrangements have been concluded with the City Health Department under which a limited number of nurse-probationers in training at the Board's hospitals are admitted to the City Hospital for a three-months' course of training in fever nursing. At the present time ten of such nurses are in residence at the City Hospital.

There is a very definite shortage of trained midwives in practise, both in Cape Town and in the country districts. To some extent this shortage is attributable to the lack of facilities for training. Another cause of the shortage is said to be the fact that, of the comparatively small number of midwives whom it is possible to train, many undergo the midwifery course in order to obtain posts in respect to which a midwifery certificate in an essential qualification; these women have no intention of practising midwifery. But a scheme is under consideration for establishing district centres, in charge of district maternity nurses, to which pupil-midwives could be attached for part of their training. A good deal of preliminary work will be necessary before this proposal can assume practical form; in the meantime, arrangements have been made under which not more than half of the total number of pupilmidwives in training at the Peninsula Maternity Hospital at any one time shall consist of persons who have already secured a certificate of competency in general nursing, and that, so far as general trained nurses are concerned, preference shall be given to those who intend to practise midwifery and to those, such as District Nurses and Health Visitors, to whom a knowledge of midwifery is essential. The other half will, of course, consist of untrained persons, who, it may be assumed, desire to obtain the midwifery certificate to enable them to earn their livelihood as maternity nurses.

NURSES' SALARIES AND ALLOWANCES.—A new Ordinance (No. 25 of 1929) was introduced last year, the principal effect of which has been to increase the remuneration of nurses in State-

aided hospitals in this Province. The Provincial Administration did not go as far as the Board wished in this direction; nevertheless, a considerable measure of relief has been afforded, and the inducement to nurses to leave the Board's employ in order to take up posts in the other Provinces, where salaries are higher, is not so great to-day as it was a year ago.

It is to be regretted that the Provincial Council did not take the opportunity of revising the pension regulations in regard to nurses. The pensions payable to women who have spent the best years of their lives in nursing the sick are still lamentably small. There is, however, some ground for hoping that this long-standing

grievance will be removed very soon.

NURSES UNIFORMS.—Visitors to the Hospitals will no doubt have observed that the uniforms of the nurses have been radically altered. Comfortable and rational dress, in the form of white overalls, has been substituted for the stiff collars, cuffs and belts of the old regime.

appealing for contributions to a fund of £12,000 which is needed in connexion with the establishment of a Radium Clinic in Cape Town. In proportion to the benefit which is expected to accrue from the use of Radium in the treatment of malignant disease, the amount mentioned is not large, and although the response to the appeal, up to the present, has not been very encouraging, there is little doubt that eventually the sum required will be forthcoming. The following memorandum has been prepared in connexion with the Fund, and is being widely circulated:—

RADIUM FUND.

The Cape Hospital Board, in appealing for £12,000 to enable a Radium Clinic to be established in Cape Town, desire to draw public attention to the following points:—

1. Cancer is one of the greatest scourges which afflict humanity.

2. As the result of careful and prolonged experimentation, the use of Radium in the treatment of cancer has been proved to be successful in a large number of cases.

3. Radium, if its use is to be successful in the treatment of cancer, must be applied under scientific direction and

control.

4. This scientific direction and control is available in Cape Town, which, largely by reason of the fact that it is the seat of a University which possesses a Faculty of Medicine, can command the services of specialists in every branch of surgery and medicine. It is thus possible to organise at

- Somerset Hospital the "team work" which is essential to the proper employment of Radium.
- 5. If Radium is to be used advantageously, it must be placed in the hands of a trained Radiologist. Among the citizens of Cape Town is a gentleman who is probably the leading authority on the subject in the whole of South Africa. This gentleman, at considerable pecuniary sacrifice, has offered to place his services, in a full-time capacity, at the disposal of the Cape Hospital Board.
- 6. The Board are appealing for £12,000. Of this amount, approximately £9,000 is required for the purchase of Radium, the balance being needed to supply the necessary equipment. Unless this amount is forthcoming it will be impossible for the work to be carried on, and the available facilities will be wasted.
- 7. As previously stated, the use of Radium in the treatment of cancer has been proved to be successful in a large number of cases. Supposing that only six cases of cancer can be cured by Radium in Cape Town, in the course of a year; would not the expenditure of £12,000 be justified? There can be only one answer to this question.
- 8. The question has been asked: What are the Government doing? This question can be answered quite simply. In 1929, the Cape Hospital Board expended £112,881 in the maintenance of the Hospitals under their control. Towards this expenditure, the charitable public contributed £5,985, the Government's share being £63,102. The Government have authorised the Board to accept the offer of the Radiologist previously referred to, and have thus virtually made themselves responsible for an additional expenditure of £900 per annum.
- 9. It may be that the Government will also accede to the requests of the Cape Hospital Board, and assist the Fund by subsidising the contributions received from the public, but the Board feel that it would be wrong to postpone making their appeal any longer; the world-wide demand for Radium is very great, and orders must be taken in rotation, so that, in any case, a considerable interval must necessarily elapse between the placing of an order for Radium and its delivery here. Delay is dangerous and must be avoided at all costs.
- 10. The law in regard to the State-aided Hospitals in this Province lays it down that Hospital charges must be assessed in accordance with the ability of the patients to pay. The primary duty of the Board is to provide Hospital

accommodation and treatment for persons whose means are insufficient to enable them to pay for such services in their own homes or in Nursing Homes. But it is fully recognised that the Hospitals exist for the benefit of all; at Somerset Hospital, for example, facilities exist for the treatment of special diseases which are not available anywhere else in the Province. No differentiation whatsoever as regards treatment or class of accommodation is made between what are known as "paying patients" and those who are unable to contribute anything towards their maintenance. If a Radium Clinic is established in Cape Town, whatever benefit can be derived from it will be available for rich and poor alike, without respect to persons. Those who are able to pay for it will, of course, be required to do so; those who are unable to pay will receive exactly the same services for nothing.

It only remains for me to add that active propaganda in furtherance of the appeal is proceeding, not only in Cape Town and its immediate vicinity, but in all centres in the Province. I take this opportunity of thanking those ladies and gentlemen who have taken charge of collection lists and in other ways have shown their practical sympathy with the objects of the Fund.

PRINCESS ALICE HOME OF RECOVERY FOR CHILDREN .-One of the greatest and most urgent needs at the present time is the provision of an institution to which could be drafted children (e.g., orthopaedic cases) who have received surgical or medical treatment in the hospitals, but require a lengthy period of rest in bed, with proper food and adequate nursing attention in order that they may be ensured a chance of permanent cure. I use the term "chance" advisedly, because, after all, there is no certainty in these matters. One thing, however, is quite certain, and that is, that the Board are faced with two terrible alternatives at the present time. Either the children must be discharged from hospital. to return to home conditions in which their chances of recovery are practically nil, or they must be retained in hospital to the exclusion of other urgent cases. Given the necessary funds, the solution of the question is really very simple. All that is needed is an institution to which the children could be sent for after-care. under proper hygienic conditions. Apart from the fact that the maintenance cost, per patient, of such an institution would be very much lower than it is at a general hospital, the general atmosphere would be far more favourable to the recovery of children than is the case at a hospital.

The Administrator has approved of the suggestion to establish the Home of Recovery, and has authorised the Board to undertake its maintenance, on the condition that the cost of erecting and equipping the necessary buildings is defrayed by the Board—in other words, by the charitable public. The Board have a suitable site at Retreat, which they are willing to devote to the purpose, and it now remains to raise the necessary capital expenditure,

estimated at £20,000.

Cape Town has always been noted for its generosity to good causes, and there has never been any lack of earnest workers in aid of charity. Formerly there was, in our midst, a body of ladies known as the Women's Hospital Board of Aid. These ladies did not merely collect money for the hospitals; they gave a great deal of service in other directions, and above all, they kept alive public interest in the hospitals. Unfortunately, the Organisation was disbanded some years ago, mainly for lack of recruits. Last year, however, the suggestion was made that the work be recommenced; the proposal was received with acclamation, and an influential committee, under the Chairmanship of the ex-Mayoress (Mrs. Reid) was formed, under the title of the Women's Hospital Auxiliary. It was felt that the best method of inaugurating the new association would be to give them a definite object to accomplish, and it was decided that, at the outset, their efforts should be concentrated on the raising of funds for the Princess Alice Home of Recovery for Children. As indicated by the title of the proposed institution, Her Royal Highness has given her support to the project. She has done more; she has spoken on several public occasions on the subject, and has shown unmistakably that the establishment of the Home would give her very great happiness. The arguments in favour of the Home are overwhelming and unanswerable, and it will be a source of gratification to all concerned if, prior to her departure from South Africa, it is possible to inform H.R.H. Princess Alice that the necessary funds have been secured, and to ask her to lay the foundation stone of the Home. It is my sincere conviction that no more worthy object has ever been proposed for consideration by the charitable public of Cape Town. The Secretary of the Board will be pleased to furnish details to those who are prepared to assist it.

MOTOR AMBULANCES.—During the calendar year 1929, 4,370 cases (including 329 due to street accidents) were removed in the Board's ambulances, an average of 364 per month. Of this number,

3,344 removals were free and 1,026 were charged for.

The new ambulance referred to in the previous report has given good service, and, as previously stated, is in every way superior to its predecessors. Nevertheless, the Board consider that there is room for improvement, and now propose to import a motor ambulance with body and equipment complete, which, if satisfactory, can serve as a model for future requirements.

The motor ambulance service has now been placed in charge of the very capable Engineer at Somerset Hospital, and in general efficiency leaves little to be desired. Surprise calls are made at intervals.

STAFF.

Clerical.—During the year a new Ordinance (No. 15 of 1929) was introduced which provides, in the main, for new scales of salary in respect to School and Hospital Board Officials. As soon as possible after the promulgation of the Ordinance, the Board submitted their recommendations in regard to the reorganisation of the Head Office, necessitated by the resignation of Mr. W. Sinclair Thomson, formerly Secretary and Treasurer of the Board. These recommendations, with some modifications, have been accepted by the Provincial Administration, and, with the approval of the Administrator, have now been given effect.

Mr. F. B. Morris was appointed Secretary and Treasurer of the Board, with effect from 1st June, 1929. Mr. Morris had held the appointment in an acting capacity since 1st February, 1929.

Mr. E. R. Kemp was appointed Accountant as from 1st June, 1929, vice Mr. F. B. Morris.

As a result of repeated representations to the Provincial Administration, authority has been given for the appointment of an Almoner at Somerset Hospital. Miss G. Gerber, who had carried out the work in an honorary capacity since 1st August, 1927, was appointed to the position on a salaried basis as from 1st April, 1929.

Nursing.—Miss M. Milledge, Matron of the Rondebosch and Mowbray Cottage Hospital, was retired from the service, on account of ill-health, on 20th November, 1929. Miss Milledge had rendered good and self-sacrificing service to the Board for a period of many years, and her retirement is greatly regretted. Miss M. R. Stewart, who had been employed as a Sister at Woodstock Hospital since the beginning of 1918, has been appointed Matron of the Rondebosch and Mowbray Cottage Hospital in succession to Miss Milledge.

Miss M. E. Watts resigned her position as Matron of the Victoria Hospital at the end of May, 1929, in order to take up the position of Matron at the Brown and Annie Lawrence Home at Pinelands. Miss Watts possesses administrative abilities of a rare order, and her resignation was a cause of very great regret to the Board. Her place as Matron of the Hospital has been taken by Miss M. E. Foxon.

Miss R. R. Mills, who had been Matron of the Simon's Town-Kalk Bay Hospital since August, 1913, has been obliged to relinquish her appointment on account of ill-health. Miss Mills gave up the whole of her energies to the service of the hospital, and it is the

Board's earnest wish that she may be restored to health and be able to enjoy a period of rest after a lifetime spent in nursing the sick. Miss M. McBean, formerly a Sister at the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, has been acting Matron of the Simon's Town-Kalk Bay Hospital since 1st December, 1929, and has been recommended for the permanent appointment.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.—On behalf of the Board I desire to thank all those organisations and individuals who have assisted in various ways in promoting the welfare of the hospitals and allied institutions during the past year. It may seem invidious to single out anyone for special mention in this connexion; at the same time, I feel that I must refer to the action of two young ladies, Miss C. Barclay and Miss A. Divine, who devoted their spare time to amusing the children at the McGregor Convalescent Home. Not only that, but they took books, clothing, pictures, etc., to the Home, and mended dolls and toys. These young ladies may be assured that they brought a good deal of brightness into the lives of the children in the Home.

I would also express my thanks to the staffs of the several institutions and of the Head Office for their whole-hearted co-operation and assistance throughout the year.

In conclusion, I should like to repeat some remarks which I made at the last meeting of the Board held in 1929; these were, as follows:—

"The occasion of this, the last meeting of the Board to be held during the year, seems to me to afford a fitting opportunity of recording my personal appreciation of the efforts made by members to improve the conditions at the various institutions controlled by the Board. That these efforts have been attended by a considerable measure of success will be obvious to anyone who cares to visit the institutions; the position to-day, compared with what it was even so recently as twelve months ago, shows, in every instance, a very marked improvement. I do not refer only to the material aspect; there seems to have been a definite upward trend in what I can only describe as the "tone." As you know, I am very keenly interested in all that pertains to the well-being of the Board's institutions, and I might, on that account, hesitate to rely on my own judgment the wish is often father to the thought; so that it is very encouraging to learn from our Secretary that Dr. van der Spuy, on the occasion of his recent inspection, was greatly impressed with the change for the better which had taken place since his previous visit in 1928.

To what is this happy state of affairs due? Partly it may be ascribed to the fact that we have had more money to spend some of the members of the Board will be able to contrast our present position in this respect with what it was when we were haunted by that dismal spectre known as the limitation of subsidies, now happily exorcised. But the spirit of co-operation and, If I may say so, comradeship which has pervaded the deliberations and actions of the various Committees and the Board had contributed in very large measure to a successful year's work. The year 1929 will be notable in the Board's annals for the number, variety and magnitude of the undertakings which have been inaugurated and carried through in the period; little or nothing could have been done without the goodwill and enthusiasm which have been so freely evinced by all concerned. Much remains to be done; and indeed, we need never, so long as we remain members of this Board, expect to be able to sit down with a sigh of relief in the knowledge that our task has been accomplished—there will always be work to do and problems to be faced and solved. But at least we shall be able, if we continue as we have begun, to say truthfully that we are tackling our responsible job to the best of our ability; and no one can say more . . .




