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
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Annual Subscribers

Finance and General Purposes Committee.

Indies :

- The Finance and General Purposes Committee shall, in accordance with the Rules of Order, and with the approval of the Board :
 - (a) supervise all the fiscal concerns of the Board and report periodically as to the state of the several funds of the Board;
 - (b) prepare and submit to the Board in the month of December in each year a statement of the estimated capital income and expenditure and of the recurrent income and expenditure of the Board in respect of that year;
 - (c) prepare and submit to the Board during the month of December in each year a statement of the estimated recurrent income and expenditure of the Board's Institutions in respect of that year, which shall be framed after consultation with the other Standing Committees concerned;
 - (d) receive at each monthly meeting a statement of the payments effected by the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board during the preceding calendar month, and thereafter report to the Board the total amount of the expenditure in question;
 - (e) arrange all investments of moneys held by or funds entrusted to the Board ;
 - (f) report to the Board at the request of any of the other Standing Committees as to the provision of funds for any object connected with the administration of the Board or any of its Institutions;
 - (g) supervise the collection of all revenue due to the Board and its Institutions;
 - (h) be responsible for the control of the Head Office of the Board, and deal with all matters appertaining to the appointment, emoluments, resignation or leave of the Secretary and Treasurer and other officers employed therein;
 - (i) invite and deal with all tenders received for annual supplies and services required by the Board ;

(j) arrange all insurance policies, whether in respect of fire, fidelity guarantee, workmen's compensation, or any other risk.

- (f) In December of each year, in consultation with the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board, frame Estimates of the recurrent income and expenditure of such Institution, or Institutions in respect of that year

and submit the same without delay to the Finance and General Purposes Committee;

(g) Generally administer such Institution or Institutions, provided, however, that no expenditure shall be incurred unless prior provision has been made therefor in the approved Estimates of the Board for the current year or by special resolution of the Board.

MINUTE

of the Chairman of the Board for the Year 1931-1932.

In presenting this, the nineteenth report of the Cape Hospital Board (and the fourth which I have signed in my capacity as Chairman) I have great pleasure in stating that the steady progress in all directions to which I have referred in previous reports was well maintained during the year 1931.

The prospects at the beginning of that year were not very promising. At the outset, the Board were called upon to reduce their estimates of expenditure by between £4,000 and £5,000. This was a very serious matter indeed, in view of the fact that the Board, in preparing the estimates as originally submitted, were only too well aware of the need for restricting expenditure, and had framed their estimates on an extremely conservative basis, due regard being had to the desirability of safeguarding the state of efficiency which has happily been reached in recent years. It would have been virtually impossible to reduce the estimated expenditure by the amount mentioned without imperilling some essential services; and the Board decided to supply the deficiency by making liberal use of special funds belonging to the several institutions, and of the Board's " Contingency Fund," the latter representing monies accumulated over a period of many years past for the purpose, it would seem, of meeting just such an emergency as this.

The financial position to-day is far worse than it was at this time last year. I am not of a pessimistic turn of mind, and am convinced that the troubles we are passing through are only temporary; still, the fact must be faced that the immediate future looks very dark; and the lot of those who are responsible for the maintenance of a large organisation like the Cape Hospital Board, the calls upon which must necessarily, in times of depression, increase in inverse proportion to its resources, is an extremely anxious one. It would be nothing less than a national calamity if the hospitals were compelled, through insufficiency of funds, to curtail their services to the public, especially when it is remembered that the existing hospital accommodation, in this area at all events, is hopelessly inadequate for the needs of the sick. We must reserve our strength to meet such a position, if and when it arises; in the meantime we can, I think, look forward with courage in the certain knowledge that in the recent past, at all events, we have made some notable strides in the direction of placing our institutions on a satisfactory footing.

The total number of in-patients treated at the Board's hospitals during 1931 was 10,996, compared with 10,323 for the previous year. The average daily number of in-patients under treatment was 566.93 in 1931, the corresponding figure for 1930 being 529.08. This increase is largely due to the enlargement of the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg; there has also been a decrease in the average length of stay of patients in three of the hospitals.

The number of individuals treated as out-patients at the several institutions rose from 58,877 (representing 199,242 attendances) in 1930 to 60,458 (representing 214,316 attendances) in 1931. This increase is mainly reflected in the work of the Cape Town Free Dispensary and the C.H.B. District Nursing Organisation, and, to a lesser degree, in that of the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg. As I have noted elsewhere, the out-patient department at the lastmentioned institution was opened in the latter part of 1931, and there has not yet been time to judge the full effect of the innovation.

There was a notable increase in the number of convalescents cared for during the period under review, as will be seen from the following figures:

I will endeavour, in the following brief summary, to give some indication of our achievements during the past year.

NEW HOSPITAL.—The Board's most important activities continue, of course, to be connected with the new Hospital at Groote Schuur. The contract for the foundations of the main building was secured by Messrs. Cornelius (Pty.) Ltd., the contract price for this portion of the work, which is now completed, being £49,846. It is expected that, provided no hitch occurs in connexion with the provision of the necessary loan funds, tenders for the superstructure of the building will be called for in the course of the next two months. It is too early yet to say when the building of the hospital will be completed.

Arrangements have been made for the ceremony of laying two foundation stones of the new hospital, which will be performed by His Excellency the Governor-General and the Honourable the Administrator, to take place on 12th April next. **SOMERSET HOSPITAL.**—Having regard to the fact that the work of this institution will, if all goes well, be transferred in the not too far distant future to the new hospital at Groote Schuur, the policy of the Board as regards structural alterations, has been, in a sense, to mark time. Nevertheless, it has been considered wise to affect some more or less minor improvements, including the enclosing of a portion of the Parson Ward stoep and of a balcony on the first floor, the provision of lavatory accommodation for the office and visting staff, and of a waiting room for the massage department. The cost of these improvements was debited to the Funds Account of the institution.

The lack of adequate waiting room accommodation for outpatients has for long been a sore point; and last year the Administrator drew attention to the desirability of providing separate waiting rooms for European and non-European patients. The matter was taken in hand immediately, and inasmuch as it was found possible, at the same time, to improve the accommodation provided for students, the University Authorities agreed to contribute £90 towards the cost of the work.

The dilapidation of the hospital buildings, due to the neglect of many years, may now be said to have been effectively arrested. The institution to-day presents a neat and workmanlike appearance, and the condition of the grounds, formerly a depressing wilderness, is admirable. In this connection I cannot forbear to pay a special tribute to the work of the Engineer, whose selfless devotion to his varied and responsible duties is beyond praise.

WOODSTOCK HOSPITAL.—The need for an up-to-date X-Ray apparatus at Woodstock Hospital has been acutely felt for some years past. The students of the University of Cape Town, who, for the past four years, have contributed very materially to the success of the Hospital Saturday Collections, expressed a wish that part of the proceeds of the 1930 and 1931 collections should be earmarked for the purchase of such an apparatus, and this has recently been installed at a cost of about £750. Before the apparatus could be installed, however, it was necessary to effect certain radical alterations to the X-Ray Room, and these were carried out early last year at a cost of approximately £170. The alterations referred to included the provision of a dark-room with the necessary developing appliances; and it is now possible for X-Ray negatives to be supplied with a minimum of delay.

A "milk-room" for the preparation of infants' feeds has now been fitted up in connection with the Buxton Wards. This room is equipped with an electric steriliser and a refrigerator, and the cost of the improvement was £129. Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Taylor, who gave £100 some years ago for the improvement of the grounds of the Buxton Wards, kindly agreed to £50 of that amount being applied towards the cost of the work referred to.

The kitchen at Woodstock Hospital had, for many years, been the most unsatisfactory feature of the hospital. Last year the Board tackled this matter in earnest, and entirely remodelled the whole of the kitchen and the adjacent premises, and reorganised the main hot-water services. Gas-cooking appliances, comprising a large range, a porridge-boiler, a griller and a fishfryer, have been installed, with the most satisfactory results.

The front stoep and entrance to the hospital have been completely altered. Part of the stoep has been enclosed and thrown into the casualty room, the latter being thus practically doubled in size, and, incidentally, properly lighted. The remainder of the stoep has been tiled, and the entrance steps have been remodelled.

The various structural alterations, with the exception of the X-Ray Room, were carried out departmentally under my supervision. Only by this means was it possible to effect them at a cost within the limit of the funds available.

The "old" operating theatre at the hospital, which is largely used for minor operations, has been equipped with an up-to-date operating table.

The front of the hospital has been renovated, and the wide carriage drive between the main building and the Nurses' Home has been re-surfaced. Thanks to this and to the care given to the grounds by the Vice-Chairman of the Board (who is also Chairman of the responsible Committee), the very dreary appearance formerly worn by Woodstock Hospital has entirely disappeared.

RONDEBOSCH & MOWBRAY HOSPITAL.—In my report last year I mentioned that it was intended to enclose portions of the front stoep of this hospital for the purpose of enlarging and improving the lighting of the adjacent wards; I also referred to a proposal to enclose two stoeps at the rear of the main building in such a way as to adapt them for use as dressing-duty rooms. I am glad to say that these alterations have been effected, with the result that the amenities and appearance of the hospital have been very greatly improved.

Inspired by their success in regard to the alteration of the kitchen at Woodstock Hospital, the Board have entirely re-modelled the kitchen and the water-heating plant at the Rondebosch Hospital also.

Other improvements effected at the hospital are the addition of three bedrooms and a commodious balconcy to the Nurses' Home, which have had the effect of remedying the state of congestion which formerly existed, and the re-arrangement of sluice rooms and provision of new sluices.

The areas in front of the hospital has been re-surfaced with bituminous compound.

During last year a dance, organised by the wives of the Honorary Visiting Officers was held in the Rondebosch Town Hall, in aid of the hospital, which realised the large sum of $\pounds 200$. This has rendered possible the purchase of much-needed surgical equipment, including an operating table.

VICTORIA HOSPITAL, WYNBERC.—The official bed-roll of this hospital has been increased to 105; it is thus the second largest institution under the Board's control. In my last report I drew attention to the extensive alterations and additions to the institution. The new non-European wards were formally opened by the Administrator on 24th April, 1931, these wards had been in actual use for some months previously.

The new out-patient department was opened to the public at the beginning of October last. There had been some delay in this matter, owing to difficulty in regard to the appointment of a part-time Dispenser, and to the necessity for equipping a dispensary; it will be understood that it would have been impossible to conduct an out-patient department in the absence of a dispensary on the premises. Incidentally, it may be mentioned that the dispensary serves the needs of the in-patients as well as the out-patients, and that it is hoped that it will be possible to effect a substantial saving on this account. The out-patient department is working satisfactorily, and fills a long-felt want in this area.

The very fine balconies of the new non-European wards have been fitted with glazed screens and blinds, and it is thus possible to utilise them for the accommodation of patients in all weathers. The cost of this improvement— $\pounds 376$ —was defrayed by the Victoria Hospital Association.

A handsome addition, in the form of a stoep and balcony for the European Wards, has been erected at the north-eastern end of the main buildings. The cost of this work, half of which was defrayed by the Victoria Hospital Association, was $\pounds702$. The Association also paid half the cost ($\pounds128$) of enlarging the main larder at the hospital.

Another structural improvement carried out consisted of the provision of quarters for native orderlies and ward boys at the rear of the main building. This has made possible the removal of the unsightly and unsanitary wood and iron structure which formerly housed these employees. The old wood and iron building known as "Hygeia," previously utilised for non-European patients, was demolished when the new block was taken into use; and with the disappearance of these two eyesores it has been possible to complete, under the direction of the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the laying out of the grounds of the hospital, which, as I have had occasion to remark before, is the most beautifully situated of all of the Board's institutions.

FALSE BAY HOSPITAL.—The additions to the Nurses' Home, to which I referred in my previous report were completed early last year, and are now occupied by the nursing staff, who, for the first time in the history of this institution, can be said to be comfortably housed. The cost of this work was $\pounds 2,507$ 6s. 10d.; $\pounds 2,500$ of this amount was defrayed by means of a loan, on the usual terms, obtained from the Provincial Administration, the small balance being paid by the False Bay Hospital Association.

The rooms in the hospital building formerly used by the Matron as a bedroom and an office sitting-room have been enlarged and adapted for use as wards. The official bed-roll of this institution is now 28.

PENINSULA MATERNITY HOSPITAL.—The new building of this hospital was formally opened by Her Excellency the Countess of Clarendon on 28th January, 1932. It is probably the finest Maternity Hospital in this country, and, I am informed, would bear comparison (except, of course, in regard to size), with the most up-to-date institutions of the kind overseas.

When the new building was approaching completion it became necessary to deal with the question of re-modelling the old building in order to fit it for the accommodation of the nursing staff, resident doctors (two) and students. At first sight the task seemed to be almost insuperable; but I am glad to say that the energy and resourcefulness of all concerned have overcome all obstacles, and that the conditions, while being far from ideal, are at any rate reasonably comfortable.

Even if one wished to do so, it would be difficult to avoid enthusiasm in regard to this hospital. Now that the change has been made, it seems almost impossible to realise the incredibly sordid and uncomfortable conditions under which the work was carried out for eleven weary years; and I think a meed of praise is due to the Matron, nurses and doctors, for their splendid courage and devotion to duty in the most trying circumstances.

CONVALESCENT HOMES.—The cottage at the Eaton Convalescent Home, formerly occupied by the Resident Official, has been adapted for use as accommodation for non-European children. This notable improvement was made possible by the action of the then Mayoress (Mrs. Lewis) in allocating a portion

of the proceeds of the 1930 Hospital Ball for the purpose; and the addition was inaugurated by Mrs. Lewis in person on 22nd December, 1931, in the presence of representatives of the non-European section of the population. The precincts of the cottage have been enclosed by a fence, and the children are thus entirely segregated from the adult patients; such an arrangement is, I am sure, very desirable from all points of view. The utilisation of the cottage has not led to an increase in the official bed-roll of the institution, which remains at 56; but it has relieved the congestion in the non-European section, and one result has been to make available a sitting-room for the non-European male patients.

The whole of the upper floor of the "De Pass" wing of the main building has been altered and renovated, and now contains the bedrooms of the Matron and Assistant Matron, a sitting-room for the matron, and a bathroom. These rooms, with the adjoining balcony, constitute a separate unit, and the advantages of the new arrangements are obvious. A rather dark and ill-ventilated room nearby, which formerly accommodated four patients, has been converted into a linen and ironing room, the patients having been transferred to the rooms previously occupied as bedrooms by the Matron and Assistant Matron.

During the year, active steps were taken to deal with the large area of ground at the rear of the Home, which had become overgrown and practically unmanageable. The efforts made have been successful, and during recent months both the Eaton and McGregor Homes have been supplied with an abundance of vegetables and flowers cultivated on the premises.

No structural improvements of any moment were made at the McGregor Home during 1931. The Board have at present under consideration the question of erecting a playroom for the children, and it is hoped that it may be possible at the same time to provide additional sleeping accommodation.

In my last report I described this Home as a model institution, and I have had no occasion since then to revise my opinion. This Home is not, I think, sufficiently well-known, and I am sure that a visit to it would repay anyone interested in the beneficient work carried out there.

CAPE TOWN FREE DISPENSARY.—In my last report I referred at some length to the fact that the work of this institution had been completely reorganised. It remains for me to say now, in the light of subsequent events, that the reorganisation has been abundantly justified. The work of the institution, which has increased, not only in volume, but in practical value, is being carried out smoothly and well, under the very able supervision of Dr. C. E. Jones-Phillipson, who is not only the Honorary Medical Superintendent but is also Chairman of the Medical Subcommittee of the institution.

I mentioned previously that it was intended, when Dr. Prisman's appointment as Resident Medical Officer expired at the end of September of last year, to appoint two resident medical officers in his place. Subsequent experience has shown the undesirability of such a course, and the outcome of the discussions held regarding the matter is that Dr. Prisman's appointment has been extended for a further year until 30th September, 1932. It is now clear that the services of two resident medical officers are not required at the Dispensary, and the existing arrangements have worked so satisfactorily that it would be unwise to disturb them.

C.H.B. DISTRICT NURSING ORCANISATION.—No development (apart from the increase in the volume of the work which is common to all of the Board's institutions) has taken place during the year as regards the C.H.B. District Nursing Organisation.

On 3rd June, 1931, Her Excellency the Countess of Clarendon addressed a well-attended meeting of persons interested in the Organisation, and expressed a lively interest in the work.

RADIOLOCY.—No hospital can be said to be worthy of the name to-day unless it is equipped with adequate X-Ray appliances; the absence of such appliances renders efficient diagnosis not only extremely difficult, but in some cases virtually impossible. It is therefore satisfactory to report that the Board's hospitals are well equipped in this respect. The Woodstock, Rondebosch and Wynberg Hospitals and the Cape Town Free Dispensary are provided with up-to-date X-Ray apparatus capable of being used not only for examination purposes but also for treatment. The False Bay Hospital is equipped with a portable apparatus which is in constant use for diagnostic purposes.

The Board were recently faced with the necessity for incurring heavy expenditure in connexion with the X-Ray plant at Somerset Hospital. Sir J. B. Robinson came to the Board's assistance in this matter with a most generous gift of $\pounds 2,000$ by means of which it has been possible to arrange for the installation of new apparatus which will, it is believed, render Somerset Hospital second to none in this country so far as X-Ray equipment is concerned.

Several of the Board's hospitals are now in a position to afford deep therapy treatment, which, I am informed, is becoming increasingly important in the combating of disease, especially malignant tumours and the like. Diathermy treatment is also available at most of the hospitals. As regards Radium, I can say that the Board have no reason to regret their action in appealing to the public for funds to enable them to acquire a supply of this wonderful element. The quantity now stored at Somerset Hospital is about 800 milligrams, valued, with its containers, at approximately $\pounds 10,500$. During the year 1931, approximately 200 patients were treated with Radium at the hospital; and while it is best, in a matter of this kind, to be cautious and conservative, I can say definitely that some very good results have been obtained, especially in cases of cancer of the face and throat.

Arrangements have been made for the loan of Radium, under suitable guarantees, to outside medical practitioners and private nursing institutions; so that the benefits accruing from it are not confined to patients treated at the hospital.

Considerable difficulty has been experienced in regard to the staffing of the Radiological Department at Somerset Hospital. The volume of the work carried out there is very large, and this, coupled with the nature of the work itself, has imposed a severe strain upon the personnel of the department, which has resulted in continual changes and illness. In times like the present, it is naturally difficult to obtain authority for the additional expenditure which would be involved in reorganising the staff of the department; nevertheless, the Board recognise the urgent need for affording some relief, and are in negotiation with the Provincial Administration in the matter.

CANCER CONFERENCE.—A Conference convened for the pur pose of considering what steps should be taken to combat cancer in this country was held in Johannesburg in September, 1931. The Board were represented at the Conference by Dr. A. R. McLachlan, Dr F. M. Morris and myself. Another member of the Board (Mrs. H. C. Horwood) also attended the Conference as the representative of the Trained Nurses' Association, and the Administrator was represented by Dr. J. van Roojen, Radiologist at Somerset Hospital. Dr. J. M. B. de Wet, Resident Medical Superintendent of Somerset Hospital, was also present.

Some very interesting and important discussions took place at the Conference, at which the following Resolutions were adopted:

- 1. (a) To establish a National Association for combating cancer, on the general plan of the Memorandum and Articles of Association submitted to the Conference.
 - (b) To call upon the State and all public bodies and publicminded citizens to give active support to this Association.
 - (c) That the immediate activities of the Association shall be directed principally towards—

- (i) Collating and distributing to medical practitioners information on advances in the causation, pathology, diagnosis and treatment of cancer.
- (ii) Public propaganda by every practical means on the prevention and importance of early treatment of cancer.
- (iii) Acting as a clearing house and co-ordinating body between the various research workers and treatment centres in South Africa.
- 2. That a committee of 17 persons, with power to co-opt, be now appointed to carry into effect Resolution 1, and to proceed particularly with the incorporation and establishment of the Association. This Committee is empowered to sign the Memorandum and Articles of Association and proceed to registration.

The Council of the Association has been duly appointed, Cape Town being represented thereon by Mrs. Horwood, Dr. H. A. Moffat and myself.

One of the objects of the Conference was to discuss the feasibility of establishing a Radium Institute for South Africa. In the opinion of the Cape Town representatives the time for this has not yet come; and in any case, so far as the Cape Hospital Board are concerned, all their resources are, and will be for a long time to come, required for the development of their own radiological services, and they could not, therefore, participate in any national campaign for the raising of funds to equip a Radium Institute. The functions of the new Association will be largely educative, and steps have been and are being taken to affiliate with similar organisations in other parts of the world.

HOSPITAL ASSOCIATIONS .- Prior to the introduction of Ordinance No. 5 of 1912 those of the institutions now under the control of the Board which were then in existence were managed by independent bodies. One effect of centralising the control of these institutions in the Board was, as might have been expected, This interest is not to be to reduce local interest in them. measured merely in terms of money, although I may here repeat that voluntary contributions towards the cost of maintaining the institutions, so far from keeping pace with their development, have acually diminished in volume in recent years; what I refer to is the fact that the public in general appear to be rather apathetic as regards the work of the Board, and this is apt to be a little disheartening to those who, year after year, carry on that work in the face of difficulties which, at times, seem to be almost insuperable. The process of decay in public interest in the

hospitals has not been universal; the ladies forming the local committees of the C.H.B. District Nursing Organisation still display as much enthusiasm as ever; and the efforts of the Victoria Hospital Association to collect funds for improvements at the Wynberg Hospital have never flagged. I am glad to say that there is a definite movement on foot to re-create the local interest to which I have alluded. This is shown by the formation, some two years ago, of the False Bay Hospital Association, and, more recently, of the Woodstock Hospital Association. The opportunity of the formal opening of the Peninsula Maternity Hospital on 28th January, 1932, was taken to inaugurate an association of ladies who will work for the betterment of that institution. I hope and expect that the movement will spread, and would reiterate that what the Board want, perhaps more than anything else, is the practical sympathy and assistance of the public.

WIRELESS INSTALLATIONS.—Toc H, who some years age generously undertook the work of installing wireless apparatus in the Board's Hospitals, and have since devoted a considerable amount of time and money to their maintenance, have completed their self-imposed task, so far as the Board are concerned, by equipping the new Peninsula Maternity Hospital building with wireless. Only those who have experienced the tedium of long hours of sickness and convalescence can fully appreciate the relief afforded by those means.

I wish publicly to express the Board's thanks to the members of Toc H and also to Mr. Curtis, who entirely reorganised the wireless equipment at the Woodstock Hospital and the Eatom Convalescent Home; to Mr. Cairns, who performed a similar kind of office at the McGregor Convalescent Home; and to the False Bay Hospital Association, who recently presented the False Bay Hospital with a new wireless set.

It may not be generally known that the wireless installation at Somerset Hospital is a most elaborate concern, and supplies, in addition to about 300 earphones and a number of loudspeakers at the hospital itself, approximately 200 earphones at the adjoining City Hospital.

PRINCESS ALICE HOME OF RECOVERY FOR CHILDREN

I learn from the Princess Alice Home of Recovery Committee of the Women's Hospital Auxiliary that the erection of the buildings for this institution is proceeding satisfactorily, and will be completed within the contract period. I understand that the Committee are now engaged in the collection of funds for the equipment of the Home, and, in view of the splendid success which has already attended their efforts I feel sure that, despite the present shortage of money, they will achieve their object. The purpose of the Home is such as must appeal to all.

It is expected that the Home will be in commission towards the end of the present year.

LADY MICHAELIS ORTHOPAEDIC HOME .--- Keen regret was felt by all who knew of and appreciated the work carried out at this institution when it became known that Lady Michaelis, who founded it and defrayed the whole of the cost of maintaining it, had decided to close it. The Home was offered by Lady Michaelis as a gift to the Union Government, who passed the offer on to the Provincial Administration, who, in turn, referred it to the Board. The latter were only too willing to assume control of the institution, provided, of course, that funds could be made available for the purpose; it was thought, however, that it would be unwise on the Board's part to commit themselves to the maintenance of the Home for an indefinite period, in view of the possibility that the whole position, as regards facilities for the treatment of orthopædic cases, may be entirely altered when the new hospital at Groote Schuur is completed. I may here say, in parentheses, that, inasmuch as provision for only 32 beds for orthopædic cases of all ages is made in the new hospital scheme, it is very unlikely that the work hitherto carried on at the Lady Michaelis Home could be transferred to the new hospital.

The Board's proposals were duly communicated to the Provinoial Administration, who, I am informed, transmitted them to Lady Michaelis, with the additional stipulation that she should make herself responsible, in the form of an endowment, for part of the cost of maintaining the Home. The upshot of the matter was that Lady Michaelis withdrew her offer. More recently, however, the matter has been reopened; and while it is as yet too early to make any definite pronouncement, I think there is every reason to hope that agreement will be reached in the near future, and that the work of the Home will be resumed.

RETIREMENTS.—In April, 1931, Dr. Robert Sharp resigned the position of Honorary Medical Superintendent of Woodstock Hospital, which he had held continuously since 1895. Dr. Sharp's enthusiastic interest in the hospital is well known, and no words of mine could give adequate expression to the affectionate regard in which he has been held by those associated with him in the management of the institution, which he has seen grow from very small beginnings to its present imposing proportions. He was the prime mover in most of the alterations and extensions which have been carried out there. I am glad to say that Dr. Sharp has not severed his connexion with Woodstock Hospital; he is still, in his capacity as Honorary Surgeon, a member of the staff.

Dr. Sharp's place as Honorary Medical Superintendent has been taken by Dr. H. C. Baker.

Another very earnest worker, in the person of Mrs. Ruth Fisken, retired from active participation in the Board's work at the end of last year. Mrs. Fisken, who was at one time a member of the Board, was for twelve-and-a-half years the Honorary Secretary and Treasurer of the St. Paul's and Cape Town Central Branch of the C.H.B. District Nursing Organisation. Her energy and resourcefulness were remarkable, and the loss of her generous assistance is deeply deplored.

Sister E. Woodyoung and Sister B. Millar, of the staff of Somerset Hospital, retired from active service in the latter part of last year. Both were granted long leave prior to being placed on pension. Sister Woodyoung had performed 31 and Sister Millar 21 years' service with the Hospital.

Sister A. Luscombe was placed on pension from the beginning of this year. She had been employed by the Board, first as a Sister at Woodstock Hospital, and subsequently as a District Nurse, for nearly fifteen years.

Mr. G. Quinn, Dispenser, at Scmerset Hospital, a post which he has held since the end of 1903, is about to be retired on pension.

In the name of the Board, I wish these faithful employees all happiness in their well-earned leisure.

OBITUARY.—It is with deep regret that I record the following deaths which occurred during the year under review :—

Mr. Frank Robb died on 3rd March, 1931. He was a member of the Board (as a representative of the Administrator) from 1923 to 1926, and was Chairman of the Finance Committee and *ex officio* a member of the Buildings, Grounds and Equipment Committee and the General Purposes Committee. He was also a member of the Somerset Hospital Committee from 1923 to 1926, and of the Further Hospital Committee from 1924 to 1926.

Mr. Jas. Weight, who was for some time a member of the Woodstock Hospital Committee, died in June, 1931.

Mr. John Garlick died on 11th June, 1931. He was a member of the Board of Management of Somerset Hospital prior to the establishment of the Board in 1913, and was a generous benefactor of the Somerset Hospital during his lifetime, having inaugurated the fund which was raised for the purpose of erecting the original Nurses' Home by a donation of £1,000; the institution also benefited under his will. Dr. Mathew L. Hewat died on 18th August, 1931. He was one of the original members of the Board, having been appointed to represent the Administrator in 1913; he resigned in 1921. Dr. Hewat was a member of the General Purposes Committee from 1913 to 1921, and Chairman of that Committee from 1915 to 1919. He was also a member of the special Committee appointed by the Board in 1913 to consider the general policy of the Board with regard to the betterment of hospital accommodation in the Peninsula, which Committee. Dr. Hewat was a member of the Schuur Hospital Committee. Dr. Hewat was a member of the Rondebosch and Mowbray Hospital Committee before the inception of the Board; he was also a member of the Honorary Medical Staff of that institution for many years, and on his retirement therefrom in 1918, he was appointed an Honorary Consultant in appreciation of his services.

Miss N. E. Warner (the representative of the contributors to the False Bay Hospital) sustained a loss in the death of her father in June, 1931, and on 22nd November, Dr. Simpson Wells lost his son under tragic circumstances.

Sir Ernest Kilpin, K.C.M.G., J.P., died on 10th December, 1931. He was a member of the Board from 1919 to 1923, and for many years prior to the inception of the Board he was associated with the Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, and was Chairman of that Committee until 1923, when he resigned.

MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD.—As required by law, the following elective members of the Board retired in October, 1931:

- Rev. A. P. Bender (representing the contributors to Somerset Hospital).
- Mrs. A. M. Morris (representing the contributors to Woodstock Hospital).
- Mr. W. D. Hare (representing the contributors to Rondebosch and Mowbray Hospital).
- Dr. O. J. Currie (representing the contributors to Victoria Hospital).
- Miss N. E. Warner (representing the contributors to False Bay Hospital, Simon's Town).
- Dr. F. M. Morris (representing the contributors to the Peninsula Maternity Hospital, Cape Town Free Dispensary, Eaton and McGregor Convalescent Homes and C.H.B. District Nursing Organisation).

All these members were re-elected to the Board, with the exception of Mrs. A. M. Morris, Dr. R. Sharp being elected in her place.

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Mr. J. W. L. Krige, one of the representatives of the Administrator on the Board, resigned in April, 1931, and Mr. B. von M. Louw was appointed in his place. The term of office of Mr. A. Liberman (another of the Administrator's representatives) expired last year, and he was re-appointed for three years.

The term of office of Mrs. H. C. Horwood, as a representative of the City Council, expired in October last, and she was reappointed for two years.

The Divisional Council of the Cape re-appointed Dr. Juritz, Mr. Rees and myself as their representatives.

Dr. P. T. Cairns was appointed as the representative of the Municipalities of Simon's Town and Durbanville, vice Mr. A. Withinshaw, resigned.

Dr. H. C. Baker, Professor A. W. Falconer and Dr. A. R. McLachlan were appointed by the Honorary Visiting Officers.

CHAIRMANSHIP AND VICE-CHAIRMANSHIP OF THE BOARD.—At a special meeting of the Board held on 2nd November, 1931, I was honoured by being re-appointed Chairman of the Board, and Mr. M. C. Vos was re-appointed Vice-Chairman.

TRAINING OF NURSES: Medical and Surgical Nurses.—At the examination for nurses held by the South African Medical Council in April, 1931, candidates entered as follows: Somerset Hospital, 8; Woodstock Hospital, 4; Rondebosch Hospital, 1; Wynberg Hospital, 2. All of these candidates were successful, and Miss L. P. Hodkin and Miss E. I. H. Simpson of Somerset Hospital, who were placed in the Honours Division, were each awarded the Board's prize of £4 4s.

Miss Simpson and Miss Hodkin were placed first and second, respectively, in the list of candidates trained in the Cape Province and Provincial bursaries of $\pounds 20$ and $\pounds 10$ were awarded to them.

At the October examination, candidates entered as follows: Somerset Hospital, 16; Woodstock Hospital, 1; Rondebosch Hospital, 1; Wynberg Hospital, 2. All of these candidates were successful, Miss D. T. Nelson and Miss M. J. E. Scholtz of Somerset Hospital, Miss S. A. P. Benson and Miss U. K. Miles of Wynberg Hospital, and Miss E. H. M. Walter of Woodstock Hospital, who were placed in the Honours Division, being each awarded the Board's prize of £4 4s.

Miss Nelson and Miss Benson were placed first and second, respectively, in order of merit in the list of candidates trained in Cape Provincial Hospitals, and Provincial bursaries of £20 and £10 were awarded to them. Miss Nelson was also awarded the Kenneth B. Gloag prize; this prize is awarded to the candidate who passes most satisfactorily the examination in all three divisions—written, oral and practical. Midwives.—At the examination for midwives held in April, 1931, eight candidates entered from the Peninsula Maternity Hospital and all passed. At the October, 1931, examination nine candidates entered and all passed. Miss A. Beaumont, Miss G. T. Hutchinson and Miss H. Rowlands, who were placed in the Honours Division, were each awarded the Board's prize of $\pounds 2$ 2s.

Miss C. M. Courtenay, Sister Tutor at Somerset Hospital, resigned and left the Board's service early in August; she was succeeded by Miss E. Knowlton, who assumed duty on 19th November, 1931.

LECTURES TO MIDWIVES AND MATERNITY NURSES.—A course of lectures to midwives and maternity nurses practising in Cape Town and its vicinity was given at the Peninsula Maternity Hospital in January last. In all 22 lectures were delivered, and the experiment was very successful, between 25 and 30 persons attending each lecture. The question of arranging for a similar course to be held in the middle of the year is under consideration.

CIFT OF DIATHERMY APPARATUS TO CAPE TOWN FREE DISPENSARY.—I take this opportunity of acknowledging the kindness of Messrs. Forsyth and Parker, the architects for the extensions to the Cape Town Free Dispensary building, who presented a diathermy apparatus for use at that institution.

STREET COLLECTIONS.—The mid-week street collection which is organised annually by Mrs. H. J. Stodel was held on 11th February, 1931, and realised the large total of £765 2s. 8d., £712 12s. 8d. of which amount was allocated, in accordance with Mrs. Stodel's wishes, to the Maintenance Accounts of the several institutions, the balance being apportioned, in amounts of £10 10s. each, to the Ladies' Branch of the Free Dispensary, Stellenbosch Hospital, Kosher Kitchen Fund, Princess Alice Home of Recovery and the Board's Radium Fund.

The Hospital Saturday collection took place on 5th September, 1931. The work on this occasion was organised by Mrs. Milner, whose efforts were augmented by those of the students of the University, who staged the "Hospital Rag" which has now become (I hope) a permanent feature of this collection. The total proceeds of the 1931 Hospital Saturday collection amounted to £918 Os. 4d., and at the express wish of the students, £500 of this amount was set aside for special purposes at the Woodstock Hospital, the remainder being credited to the Board's Maintenance Account. I have already explained that the amount earmarked for Woodstock Hospital was the means whereby that institution has been equipped with an up-to-date X-Ray apparatus. **HOSPITAL BALL.**—The 1931 Hospital Ball, organised by the Mayoress (Mrs. Lewis) and held in the City Hall on 29th July, realised £1,100 0s. 6d. Mrs. Lewis directed that out of this amount donations of £200 and £150 respectively should be made to the funds of the Victoria Hospital Association and the False Bay Hospital Association. The balance of £750 0s. 6d. was credited to the Board's Maintenance Account.

HOSPITAL SUNDAY.—The amount credited to the account known as Hospital Sunday Fund during 1931 was £251 6s. 5d. The bulk of this sum was collected in churches and at golf clubs on Hospital Sunday, which was set for last year on 6th September.

NURSES' AND OFFICIALS' PENSIONS.—Two new Ordinances dealing with the pensions of nurses and officials employed by Hospital Boards in the Cape Province were introduced and duly passed during 1931. Ordinance No. 5, 1931, makes provision for retiring pensions and other financial benefits for nurses. It is common knowledge that for some years past the Nurses' Pension Fund established by Ordinance No. 18, 1918, was, from an actuarial point of view, hopelessly insolvent. The new law provides, *inter alia*, for the payment by a nurse of contributions at the rate of 5 per cent. of her pensionable emoluments (the contribution was formerly at the rate of 1 per cent.); and Hospital Boards are required to contribute to the pension fund an amount equal to that contributed by the nurses in their employ.

Ordinance No. 10, 1931, is intended to consolidate the law relating to the pensions of officials employed by School and Hospital Boards in the Cape Province. The Officials' Pension Fund, which was established by Ordinance No. 11, 1920, was also said to be actuarially insolvent. Under the new law, officials (like nurses) are required to contribute 5 per cent. of their pensionable emoluments to the Fund (previously they contributed at the rate of 4 per cent.) and Hospital Boards are called upon to pay a similar amount to that contributed by the officials. Whereas, under the old law, officials could exercise the right of choice as to whether they would or would not join the Pension Fund, under the new law all officials, provided that their ages do not render them ineligible, are obliged to join the Fund, whether they wish to do so or not.

MOTOR AMBULANCES.—The "M.A.B." Ambulance which, as I mentioned in my report last year, had been ordered by the Board, has proved to be completely satisfactory. It is, I believe, the best type of ambulance in use in England, and perhaps the whole world, to-day. The cost of importing this vehicle was high, but I am convinced that the Board were justified in incurring the expense involved— $\pounds 1,156$ —because it was very necessary that they should have a standard to work to in future. Unfortunately, despite repeated representations made to the Board of Trade and Industries, full duty had to be paid on the vehicle, notwithstanding that the chassis, at all events, could not be manufactured in this country.

So impressed were the Board with the performance of this ambulance that they decided to standardise it, and have ordered two complete chassis of the same type. One of these has been delivered, and a body is now being made for it locally. The new vehicle will be put into commission early next month. Owing to the benefit of the exchange, and the fact that duty is not payable in respect of the two chassis referred to, the cost of the new ambulances will not exceed £700 each.

The contribution made by the Cape Town Council to the Board in consideration of the latter undertaking the removal to hospital of persons injured in street accidents has been increased from $\pounds400$ to $\pounds750$ per annum.

EXEMPTION FROM SECTION 54 OF ORDINANCE No. 5 OF 1912.—At the request of the Board, the Administrator, with the advice of the Executive Committee, approved of the exemption during the calendar year 1931 of all the institutions under the control of the Board from the provisions of sub-section (a) of Section 54 of Ordinance No. 5 of 1912, and of Somerset Hospital and the Peninsula Maternity Hospital only from the provisions of sub-section (b) of the same section.

In concluding this report, I desire to thank the Vice-Chairman, the Chairman of the several Standing Committees and the other members of the Board for the whole-hearted support which I have received from them during the year. The position of Chairman of a large and complex organisation like the Cape Hospital Board is not, I can assure you, a sinecure; but to me the work has been a pleasure, principally by reason of the harmonious relationship which has subsisted between the members of the Board.

I also wish to express my thanks to the Honorary Visiting Officers and the staffs of the several institutions and the Head Office for the unstinted service rendered by them during the year.

I repeat the Board watchwords—Efficiency and Courtesy—and from my experience I am satisfied that there is little or no danger of their ever being overlooked.






