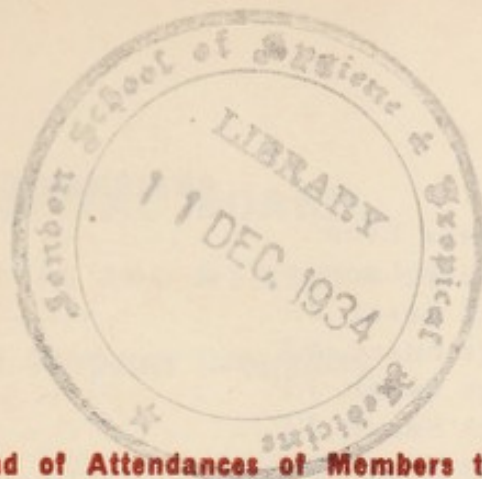

Duties :

The Finance and General Purposes Committee shall, in accordance with the Rules of Order, and with the approval of the Board :

- (a) supervise all the fiscal concerns of the Board and report periodically as to the state of the several funds of the Board ;
- (b) prepare and submit to the Board in the month of December in each year a statement of the estimated capital income and expenditure and of the recurrent income and expenditure of the Board in respect of that year ;
- (c) prepare and submit to the Board during the month of December in each year a statement of the estimated recurrent income and expenditure of the Board's Institutions in respect of that year, which shall be framed after consultation with the other Standing Committees concerned ;
- (d) receive at each monthly meeting a statement of the payments effected by the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board during the preceding calendar month, and thereafter report to the Board the total amount of the expenditure in question ;
- (e) arrange all investments of moneys held by or funds entrusted to the Board ;
- (f) report to the Board at the request of any of the other Standing Committees as to the provision of funds for any object connected with the administration of the Board or any of its Institutions ;
- (g) supervise the collection of all revenue due to the Board and its Institutions ;
- (h) be responsible for the control of the Head Office of the Board, and deal with all matters appertaining to the appointment, emoluments, resignation or leave of the Secretary and Treasurer and other officers employed therein ;
- (i) invite and deal with all tenders received for annual supplies and services required by the Board ;

- (j) arrange all insurance policies, whether in respect of fire, fidelity guarantee, workmen's compensation, or any other risk.

The control and administration of the several Institutions of the Board, are allocated to Standing Committees as follows:—(1) Somerset Hospital and the Cape Town Free Dispensary to the Somerset Hospital Committee; (2) Rondebosch and Mowbray Hospital and Woodstock Hospital to the Rondebosch and Woodstock Hospitals Committee; (3) Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, and False Bay Hospital to the Wynberg and Simon's Town Hospitals Committee; (4) Eaton Convalescent Home, McGregor Convalescent Home, Princess Alice Home of Recovery for Children and Lady Michaelis Orthopædic Home to the Convalescent Homes Committee; and (5) Peninsula Maternity Hospital and the C.H.B. District Nursing Organisation to the Combined Institutions Committee.

Duties of these Committees are as follows:—

- (a) Exercise a general supervision of such Institution or Institutions, including the fabric and grounds thereof;
- (b) Carry out such regulations as may be framed by the Board in respect of such Institution or Institutions;
- (c) Subject to the approval of the Board, make all professional and other appointments in connection with such Institution or Institutions;
- (d) Deal with the representations of patients in and members of the Staff of such Institution or Institutions;
- (e) Advise the Board in all matters affecting such Institution or Institutions;
- (f) In December of each year, in consultation with the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board, frame Estimates of the recurrent income and expenditure of

such Institution, or Institutions in respect of that year and submit the same without delay to the Finance and General Purposes Committee;

- (g) Generally administer such Institution or Institutions, provided, however, that no expenditure shall be incurred unless prior provision has been made therefor in the approved Estimates of the Board for the current year or by special resolution of the Board.

MINUTE

of the Chairman of the Board for the Year 1933-1934.

There is some danger of my annual reports degenerating into a mere recital of the difficulties encountered by the Board in the performance of the very responsible duty laid upon them, viz., the care of the sick (and in particular the sick poor). It would be too much to expect that the Board's work could be carried out without difficulties, and, speaking for myself, a great deal of the interest of the work would disappear if there were no obstacles to contend with. My object in mentioning them at all is to show how, by unremitting care and attention to detail in all departments of the Board's activities, they have been successfully surmounted.

The Board in the ordinary way submitted their Estimates of Expenditure on Maintenance Account for the year 1933, in which they allowed for a certain percentage of development; they were told, however, that no increase in expenditure (apart from the unavoidable increase connected with the payment of interest on and redemption of loan charges in respect of the Groote Schuur Hospital building, and that involved in the maintenance of two new institutions, the Princess Alice Home of Recovery and the Lady Michaelis Orthopædic Home) could be allowed; consequently it became necessary to effect a substantial reduction (amounting to about 2 per cent.) in the Estimates. Strict economy in all directions became the watchword; and so successfully was this practised that at the close of the year it was found that the reduced Estimates had been underspent by £1,119. £575 of this "saving" appears under the head of Interest on and Redemption of Loans in connection with the Groote Schuur Hospital; this "saving" could not, in any case, have been applied to other purposes. Nearly the whole of the balance of the "saving" was due to the avoidance (by means of the utilisation of the floating balance on Funds Account) of the payment of overdraft charges. In effect, therefore, the Board just contrived to keep their expenditure within the limits of the reduced Esti-

mates, an achievement of which they have every reason to be proud, having regard to the ever-increasing demands upon their resources.

In 1932 the Board treated 11,144 indoor patients in their hospitals, the total of the daily units being 206,227. The corresponding figures for 1933 were 11,654 and 213,960 respectively. Of this increase the Lady Michaelis Orthopædic Home, which is classified as a hospital, accounted for 60 individuals and 5,924 daily units. As regards convalescent cases, the figures for individuals and daily units were:—1932, 1,232 and 25,964; 1933, 1,534 and 42,268. The Princess Alice Home of Recovery, which for this purpose is classified as a Convalescent Home, accounted for 105 and 14,845 respectively of this increase.

The increase in out-patient work is equally striking, as will be seen from the following:—

It will be observed, therefore, that even if the two new institutions are left out of account, there was a very substantial all-round development of the work in 1933, notwithstanding that the Board had no more money to spend; and the result is the more remarkable in view of the reduced purchasing power of the South African pound as the result of our departure from the gold standard at the end of 1932.

The increase in the work as far as in-patients are concerned was general throughout the Board's hospitals, with the exception of the Rondebosch and Mowbray Hospital, at which institution there is a decrease as compared with 1932. The fact that the accommodation at the Rondebosch and Mowbray Hospital is not utilised to the same extent (it would, perhaps, be more correct to say "is not overcrowded to the same extent") as at the other hospitals is at present the subject of investigation. It has been stated that while the European wards, and particularly the European female ward, at Rondebosch Hospital are always fully occupied, there does not seem to be an equivalent demand upon the accommodation for non-Europeans at this institution, and the possibility of diverting some of the non-European cases from the other hospitals to the Rondebosch Hospital is being considered.

As regards out-patients, there was a reduction in the number of cases dealt with at Woodstock Hospital (from 6,772 to 5,342) but there was an increase in the number of attendances from 20,553 to 20,663. There was a decrease both as regards cases and attendances at Wynberg Hospital. All of the other

institutions show increases, the most notable being those at the False Bay and the Peninsula Maternity Hospitals. At the latter institution the number of individuals more than doubled, and the number of attendances more than trebled, as between 1932 and 1933.

During the year attention was drawn to the necessity for enlarging and improving the accommodation for out-patients at Somerset Hospital. The fact that the Board have embarked upon the new hospital scheme at Groote Schuur makes it impossible for them to consider the expenditure of money on extensive structural additions at Somerset Hospital, and they decided to explore the possibility of developing the very fine resources of the Cape Town Free Dispensary as a means of relieving the congestion as regards out-patients at Somerset Hospital. As the outcome of prolonged discussions, it was ultimately decided to amalgamate the work of the Cape Town Free Dispensary with that of the out-patient Department of Somerset Hospital, and this was duly carried out. The principal effects of the change are that the Cape Town Free Dispensary is now in the charge of the Resident Medical Superintendent of Somerset Hospital; positions on the Honorary Medical Staff of Somerset Hospital have been created for the members of the Honorary Medical Staff of the Cape Town Free Dispensary who were not already attached to the former institution, and the Cape Town Free Dispensary is now officially recognised as part of the training school for the medical students of the University (which was the case, in effect, prior to the amalgamation).

I wish here to pay a tribute to the loyal and unselfish attitude adopted by the Honorary Visiting Officers at the Cape Town Free Dispensary towards the amalgamation scheme, which involved, to a considerable extent, the submergence of the separate identity of one of the oldest and most honoured institutions in Cape Town. In particular I wish to thank Dr. C. E. Jones-Phillipson, the former Honorary Medical Superintendent of the Cape Town Free Dispensary, who may be said to be chiefly responsible for the creation of the splendid polyclinic there to which I have referred in previous Minutes.

I may here explain that although the Cape Town Free Dispensary and the Somerset Hospital are now regarded, for administrative purposes, as one institution, and are controlled by one Committee, the separate identity of the former is still preserved intact.

The average daily costs per in-patient (after making allowance for the cost of treating out-patients) for the years 1932 and 1933 were as follows:—

In arriving at these figures, an allowance of 2s. per attendance is made for the treatment of out-patients; this figure cannot, however, be regarded as being even approximately correct in the case of the Peninsula Maternity Hospital, a very large part of the out-patient work at which takes the form of district work, i.e., the treatment of patients in their own homes. It is hoped that it will be possible before long to calculate the actual average cost of dealing with such cases, so as to arrive at a more accurate estimate of the cost of treating patients in the institution itself.

No account is taken in the calculation of average daily costs of administrative charges and the large item represented by interest on and redemption of loans. It is extremely difficult, for several reasons, equitably to apportion these charges; here again, however, I hope that means will be found to do this before the end of the current year.

Turning to the income side of the accounts, I am sorry to have to record a further decline in revenue from voluntary sources (i.e., Annual Subscriptions, Donations, Hospital Saturday and Sunday Funds and Entertainments), which amounted to only £4,531 in 1933, this sum being £1,200 below the Estimates. This amount, which, incidentally, represents a little more than $3\frac{1}{4}$ per cent. of the Board's expenditure on Maintenance Account, is the lowest on record since the year 1924. It may be remembered that I dealt with this question rather fully in my last Minute; I cannot add anything to the remarks made by me on that occasion.

As regards patients' fees, it is obvious that the receipts from this source are not keeping pace with the increase in the numbers treated. This will be seen from the following table:—

There are several causes for this unsatisfactory state of affairs. One, no doubt, is the general shortage of money during the past few years; but I am convinced that an appreciable addition to our revenue would accrue if means could be found of tightening up our methods of assessment, which I think leave a good deal to be desired at present. This matter is engaging the Board's earnest attention at the present time, but the question is fraught with difficulties in several directions. There seems to be an impression on the part of the public that it is for the patient or the prospective patient to say how much he or she is prepared to contribute by way of hospital fees. This, of course, is not the case; it is for the Admitting Officer to assess the charges in accordance with the means of the patient, as disclosed by the patient in the statutory admission form and (in theory) vouched for by the "recommender." Now, an applicant giving false, incorrect or misleading information with a view to obtaining relief from the Hospital Board free of cost, or at a lower rate than otherwise such applicant would be required to pay, may, in terms of the law, be deemed to be guilty of fraud and may be punished accordingly; but apart from the difficulty which would, in any case, be associated with the prosecution of such a person, the fact that the law specifies no penalty would, in all probability, militate against a conviction. The Board are naturally averse from taking harsh action against defaulting debtors, and thereby accentuating trouble caused by the illness which brought the patient or his dependents to hospital in the first instance; but there can be very little doubt that the hospitals are often imposed upon in the matter of fees, notwithstanding all the efforts which are made to prevent it. Probably the only solution of the matter lies in the appointment of experienced persons as Almoners, whose duty it would be to enquire into the financial circumstances of each patient, and to see that the Board duly received payment for services rendered. But the employment of Almoners involves additional expenditure, and up to the present the Board have found it difficult enough to provide for the bread and butter requirements of the hospitals, without considering the creation of new salaried appointments, the return from which would, to say the least, be problematical.

During the year the Provincial Administration assented to the appointment, as a temporary measure, of a collector of outstanding hospital accounts, an appointment which has been justified by results; but this does not touch the original assessment of the charges, which to my mind is the key of the whole question.

Another factor which contributes to the general confusion surrounding the assessment of hospital charges is that, according to the law, a person who is contributing 3s. 6d. per day and over towards the cost of his or her maintenance in hospital is liable also for the payment of fees to his or her medical attendant. In passing, I may mention that exemption from this rule has been granted in the case of the Somerset and Peninsula Maternity Hospitals, and the Princess Alice and Lady Michaelis Homes; it operates, however, at the Woodstock, Rondebosch, Wynberg and False Bay Hospitals. It follows that a patient at one of these institutions adjudged to be capable of paying at the rate of say 3s. per day escapes the payment of medical fees; whereas a patient assessed at 3s. 6d. per day is liable in addition for such fees as the medical attendant may decide to impose—the Board have no control over the amount of such fees. There is a tragedy about this system, and I am convinced that it will have to be altered sooner or later; it must inevitably lead, in some instances, to the most undesirable complications, and the large proportion of patients in the Board's hospitals whose charges are assessed at 3s. 6d. per day—no more and no less—furnishes in itself a commentary upon it which gives food for thought.

All of the trouble in regard to patients' fees is intimately associated with a major question which, as I write, is coming very prominently to the forefront—that is, the abuse of hospitals by persons able to pay for their treatment in private. Undoubtedly a great many people of the class referred to do find their way into the Board's hospitals, to the detriment of the institutions and the members of the Honorary Medical Staffs, and the only way of preventing or lessening this abuse appears to consist in the appointment of Almoners. But an important point arises in this connection. Since, as I shall show presently, the bulk of the cost of maintaining the hospitals is provided from rates and taxes, is not every ratepayer and taxpayer, whatever his means may be, entitled to admission to hospital, always provided (a) that he or she is prepared to pay according to his or her means and (b) that as long as the available hospital accommodation remains inadequate for the needs of the public, preference as regards admission is given to the poor? If this point be conceded, it follows that every medical practitioner who desires it should have the right of following his patient into hospital; but this would entail a cor-

responding obligation (if it can be described as such) on the part of every doctor to undertake a share of the work of attending upon patients who cannot afford to pay, which work is at present performed by the Honorary Visiting Officers appointed to the hospitals.

It is thought by some that much of the present difficulty will be overcome when the new hospital at Groote Schuur is completed, since provision is made therein for a paying patients' block. But inasmuch as there will be only 80 beds in that block, out of a total of 870 for the whole hospital, I do not agree with this view.

Owing to the shortfall in the revenue from voluntary sources to which I have previously alluded there was, notwithstanding the "saving" in regard to expenditure, an unprovided deficit of £1,989 7s. 2d. on Maintenance Account at the end of last year. On the assumption that this deficit will be divided equally between the Provincial Administration and the Local Authorities, the latter will be required to contribute in all £36,603, as against £35,608 on the basis of the Estimates, while the former (curiously enough) will contribute £76,296 as compared with £77,193 on the basis of the Estimates. This anomaly (I refer to the fact that the Local Authorities will pay more than they were originally expected to do, while the Provincial Administration will pay less) is due to the incidence of Government Subsidy. The following is a statement of contributions from the Local Authorities and the Provincial Administration in recent years:—

Apart from contributions to Maintenance Account, the Board received a considerable sum from the public by way of bequests and donations earmarked for special purposes; the revenue from these sources in 1933 amounted to £8,441. Details will be found in the various statements which will be issued later in the year.

I now propose to give a brief résumé of what, to me, is the most cheerful aspect of the Board activities, viz., the improvements which we have been able to effect at the several institutions. The Board entered upon a vigorous policy of structural and other improvements some five years ago, and they have not relaxed their efforts in this direction since, with the result that the conditions at all of the institutions are such that the public, who own them, can reasonably be proud of them.

NEW HOSPITAL.—The work of erecting the superstructure of the New Hospital at Groote Schuur, which at the outset was retarded chiefly, it is understood by the difficulty experienced in securing a sufficient supply of bricks of the requisite quality, is now proceeding normally; and there is no reason to anticipate that the contract will not be completed within the specified period of 3½ years from 3rd May, 1933.

Arrangements will be made to proceed with the erection of the Nurses' Home, the Paying Patients' Block and other buildings to be incorporated in the hospital in time to ensure that their completion will coincide with that of the superstructure of the main block.

The total sum so far expended in connection with the New Hospital to 28th February, 1934, is £141,420 13s. 9d., of which £48,161 16s. 1d. represents expenditure on the superstructure of the main block.

SOMERSET HOSPITAL.—Although, as I have said previously, no extensive structural alterations at this institution are considered to be advisable, in view of the construction of the New Hospital, it has been possible to effect some notable improvements, principal among which may be cited the enclosure of the stoeps of the children's wards, the raising of the level of the floors of the stoeps and the construction of wide openings between the wards and the stoeps. The effect of these alterations is most pleasing.

WOODSTOCK HOSPITAL.—The alterations at this institution are very extensive indeed. Last year I alluded to the bequest of approximately £16,000 from the estate of the late Mrs. Annie Chadwick. No particular institution was specified in the bequest; but as Mrs. Chadwick, in a previous Will, had clearly expressed a preference for Woodstock Hospital, the Board, in allocating the money, decided to apportion £8,500 to that institution. With these funds in hand, the Board proceeded to rebuild the Out-Patients' Department (Free Dispensary), which has been designated the "Annie Chadwick Memorial." This is a very fine building indeed. In addition, a new Nurses' Dining Hall, with kitchen, pantry, etc., has been provided; the Night Nurses' Quarters (known as the Nurses' Old Home) which contained the Matron's quarters, have been completely reorganised; the main hospital building has been newly roofed with tiles; the stoep of the non-European Male Ward has been enlarged and enclosed, and a wide opening constructed between it and the ward itself; the room which formerly served as an office for the Matron (her office having been transferred to the Nurses' old dining room)—has been converted into a duty room for the casualty ward and the

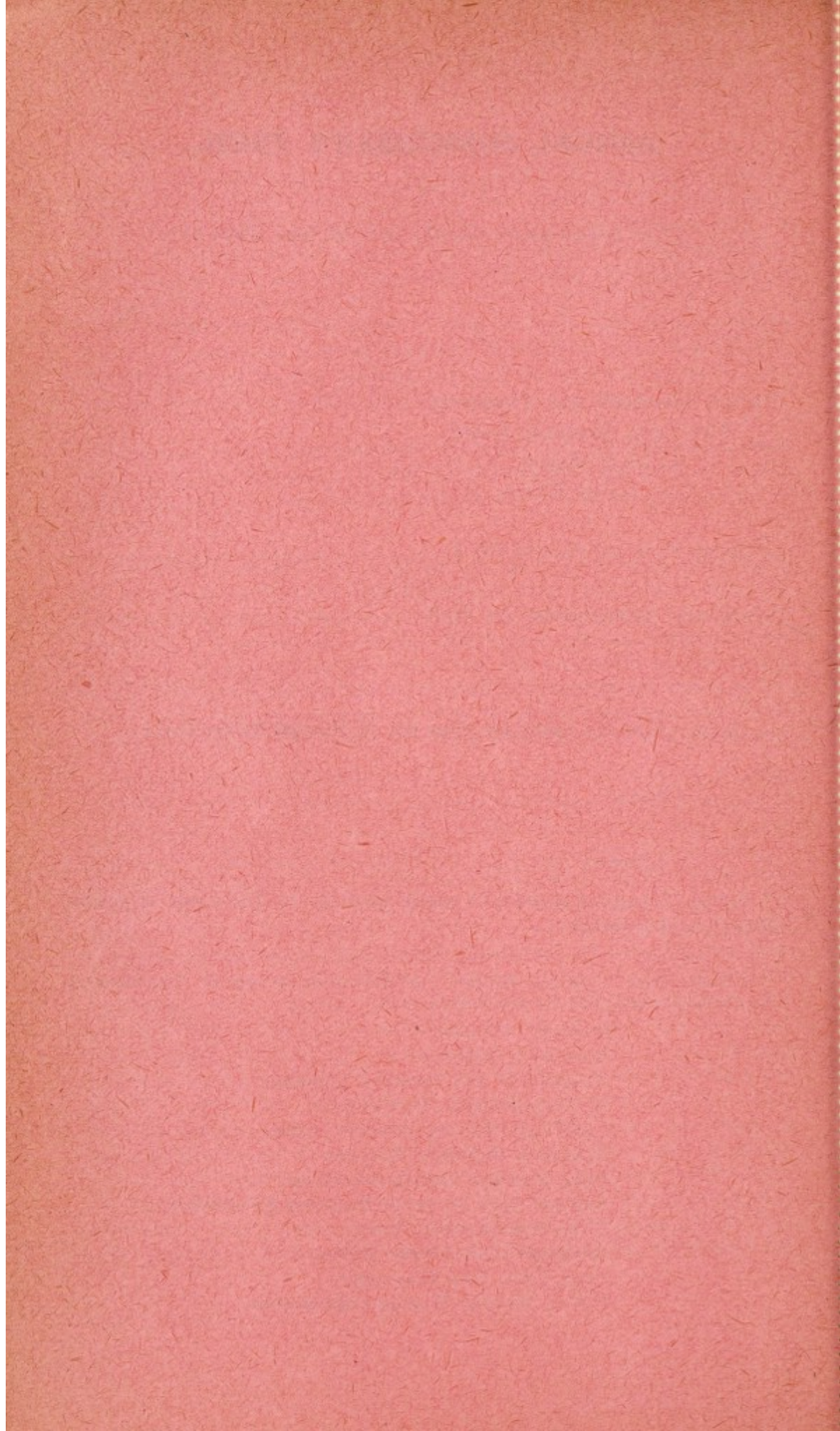

European Male Ward; an anaesthetic room has been added to the Operating Theatre Block; and many other improvements, too numerous to mention, have been effected.

Among other alterations in progress or in contemplation are the enlargement of the female wards by taking into them part of the adjacent stoep, and the erection of a new mortuary and post-mortem room. When the last mentioned improvement, which is greatly needed, has been effected it may be possible to utilise the existing mortuary building as a lecture room for nurses.

After prolonged negotiation with the City Hall authorities in connection with the encroachment of certain of the hospital buildings upon Mountain Road, the strip of ground comprised in the encroachments has been leased to the Board at a nominal rental of £1 per annum, and the hospital fence has been set back to the correct line.

RONDEBOSCH HOSPITAL.—At this hospital, chiefly by means of the Chadwick Bequest, a very fine sterilising room has been built as an annexe to the Operating Theatre, and has been equipped with an up-to-date battery of sterilising apparatus. It will be remembered that in my previous Minute I referred to a number of major improvements which were then being put in hand at this hospital; these have been completed with great benefit to the institution.

A "Commercial" type electrical refrigerator has been installed at this hospital.

WYNBERG HOSPITAL.—The new dining room for the Nurses and the new mortuary and post-mortem room to which I alluded in my previous Minute were completed during the year, and constitute a notable improvement; associated with the building of the new dining room were the complete reconstruction of the kitchen in the Nurses' Home, and the provision of a scullery, servery, etc.

The hospital has now been provided with a small laundry and drying room, equipped with up-to-date washing appliances, and also with a "Commercial" type electrical refrigerator.

I am sorry to say that no further progress has been made in the direction of converting the old mortuary into a chapel for the use of the nurses, which, as I previously mentioned, was intended to serve as a memorial to the late Dr. O. J. Currie. At the outset the Board's intention was to affect alterations to the building at a cost of two or three hundred pounds; this proposal, however, did not find favour with a number of persons who had interested themselves in the matter; what they had in mind, apparently, was something far more elaborate, and since there are not at present

sufficient funds to defray the cost of such a scheme, consideration of the question has been adjourned *sine die*.

A proposal was put forward during the year to provide separate accommodation for the better class of non-European patients; this was to have been done by partitioning off portions of the wards and adjacent stoeps and balconies. It was understood that the Wynberg & District Tradesmen's Gala Committee were prepared to defray the cost of the work, but apparently there has been some hitch in the arrangements so far as that Committee are concerned; at all events no action has been taken for several months.

FALSE BAY HOSPITAL.—This hospital has been completely reorganised—in fact, to quote the words of those who were familiar with the institution a year ago, it has been, for all practical purposes, rebuilt. It would be difficult, if not impossible, to particularise the improvements which have been effected during the past year; but I will mention some of them.

The kitchen, scullery, pantries and so forth have been redesigned; the walls and floors have been tiled, two “Aga” cookers have been installed, and numerous improvements in regard to food storage and the like have been carried out.

The walls of the Operating Theatre have been tiled.

A verandah has been constructed along the wall of the south-eastern side of the hospital.

The non-European wards have been enlarged, and have been provided with sliding glazed partitions giving access to the verandah. Similar sliding partitions have been provided for the European wards abutting on the verandah.

The bathroom and sluice-room accommodation for the European female wards and the non-European wards have been completely rebuilt and modernised.

The servants' quarters have been rebuilt.

A new entrance lobby has been built, which adds greatly to the appearance of the hospital.

The floors of the main corridor, one of the duty rooms and the Nurses' Dining Room have been refloored with “Context.”

The hospital has been repainted throughout.

All of this work was carried out departmentally under my supervision; and I do not think that any work with which I have been associated has given me greater satisfaction.

The cost of the improvements was approximately £2,050. Of this £1,600 was defrayed from the Chadwick Bequest and £250 by the False Bay Hospital Association; the balance was made up by a contribution from Maintenance Account and certain refunds.

PENINSULA MATERNITY HOSPITAL.—The lower part of the walls of the corridors in this hospital, and also the walls of the labour and delivery rooms and the operating theatre, have been tiled, and, in addition, the whole of the interior of the hospital has been painted. A room for the use of the Sisters engaged in district work has been contrived in the basement, and has been fitted with lavatory basins and so forth. The cost of these improvements so far brought to account is £1,014, the bulk of which has been defrayed from the share (£1,000) allocated to this institution from the Chadwick Bequest.

I have referred previously in this Minute to the growth of the district work carried out from this institution. In this connection the following figures will be of interest:—

CONVALESCENT HOMES.—At the Eaton Convalescent Home an annexe has been built to the European male dormitory block which houses three rooms—two double-bedded wards and one single-bedded ward. These were designed principally for the accommodation of patients requiring quiet, and also for youths whom it is desirable to separate from the adult patients.

The stoep of the southern side of the main building has been enclosed, and by this means a comfortable room has been provided for the use of those who desire to escape from the noise in the adjacent sitting and dining rooms.

A room in the rear wing of the building, formerly designed as a sitting room for non-Europeans, but seldom, if ever, used for the purpose, has been converted into a surgery, dispensary and dental room. Additional sleeping accommodation for non-European patients has been provided in the same block by transferring the houseboys to a new room which has been constructed for them.

The whole of the lavatory and bathroom accommodation on the first floor of the main building has been rebuilt; bathroom accommodation has also been provided for the domestic staff.

This institution is quite unrecognisable from what it was only a few years ago.

At the McGregor Convalescent Home a new dispensary and dental room has been provided by building up and enclosing the balcony on the western side of the main building; at the same time, improvements were effected to the Matron's bedroom and a separate bathroom was provided for her.

CAPE TOWN FREE DISPENSARY.—The buildings of this institution have been tiled and painted throughout, and present a very handsome appearance. Part of the waiting room space has been partitioned off so as to provide separate accommodation for European patients, and a considerable area of flooring has been relaid with “Corcolem” composition. Further alterations in the direction of providing improved lighting and ventilation of the waiting hall are contemplated, and will be carried out as soon as the necessary time can be given to the matter.

Two Resident Medical Officers have been appointed to this institution, in place of one.

I have previously alluded to the amalgamation of this institution with the out-patient department of Somerset Hospital. The growth of the work at the Cape Town Free Dispensary during recent years may be gauged from the following table:—

C.H.B. DISTRICT NURSING ORGANISATION.—No development of any importance took place in regard to this Organisation during the past year. The work, however, continues to increase, the number of attendances during 1933 being 104,340, as compared with 96,669 in the previous year.

Applications have been received for the appointment of a District Nurse in the Constantia-Hout Bay areas, both of which are, I consider, greatly in need of such services. Nothing can be done to give the necessary relief until the reorganisation of the service, to which I alluded in my previous Minute, and which has been postponed owing to the absence overseas of one of the members of the Committee dealing with the matter, has been completed.

PRINCESS ALICE HOME OF RECOVERY AND LADY MICHAELIS ORTHOPAEDIC HOME.—The Princess Alice Home of Recovery functioned normally throughout the year, although the difficulties to which I referred in my previous Minute cannot be said to have been disposed of. A special Admission Form applicable to this Home and also the Lady Michaelis Orthopaedic Home has been drawn up and brought into use, in which reference is made to the policy adopted by the Board of differentiating, as regards charges, between patients normally residing in the Cape

Hospital District and those coming from outside that area. In this connection it is pointed out that, since the Local Authorities in the Cape Hospital District contribute a considerable part of the cost of maintaining the two Homes, it is only fair to expect the Local Authorities in outside areas to make some contribution towards the cost of maintaining children admitted from such areas; and it has accordingly been decided to impose a minimum charge of 5s. per day for indigent and semi-indigent patients from outside the Cape Hospital District. The Board reserve the right to suspend the operation of this rule in their discretion. This rule has already been criticised in various quarters, and, notwithstanding its obvious equity, it is likely to lead to some trouble in the near future; in any case, it will be extremely difficult to carry out, having regard to the fact that the Homes are unique in this Province, and that they depend for their maintenance to a very large extent upon the subsidy received from the Provincial Administration, to which, of course, all tax-payers in the Province contribute. Moreover it will be appreciated that it would be extremely difficult for the Board to refuse admission to a suitable case for no other reason than that no Local Authority or other body could be found to guarantee payment of the charge in question.

Provision has been made in the Estimates for the current year for the enlargement of the official bed-roll of the Princess Alice Home of Recovery to 60.

The special limitation placed upon the expenditure on the Lady Michaelis Orthopædic Home, to which I referred last year, naturally gave rise to some administrative difficulty, owing to the necessity for keeping what was virtually a daily check upon the expenditure so as to ensure that it did not exceed the "ordinary" income by more than £2,500 for the year. In the latter part of the year it was found possible to authorise an increase in the number of patients to 20, and later still to 25; the total expenditure for the 11 months ended 31st December last (the Home was reopened for the reception of patients on 1st February, 1933) was £2,362, the "ordinary" income for the period being £219.

This year the position will be eased by reason of the fact that the Committee of the Lady Michaelis Home Aid Fund have guaranteed "ordinary" income to the extent of £1,200 for 1934. This means that the Board are able to budget for a total expenditure of £3,700 and, on the strength of this, and in the light of experience gained last year as regards actual expenditure, they have authorised an increase in the official bedroll to 35 during the current year.

Innumerable difficulties have arisen, and doubtless will continue to arise, in regard to the admission of patients to this Home, par-

ticularly patients from outside areas; these are largely due to the fact that the Lady Michaelis Home Aid Fund Committee rely to a considerable extent upon the support accorded to them by their up-country branches in providing the requisite funds to enable them to fulfil the guarantee to which I have referred.

Teachers have been appointed for the children in the Princess Alice Home and the Lady Michaelis Orthopædic Home, their salaries being defrayed by the Cape School Board, who have also supplied teaching equipment. The children at the Princess Alice Home are taught handicrafts in addition to the ordinary school subjects suitable to their condition; a considerable quantity of their work was exhibited and sold at the recent successful Garden Fête organised at the Home by the Women's Hospital Auxiliary.

BENEFACTORS.—I wish once again to extend my hearty thanks to those who assisted the Board's work during the year by donations of money and by gifts in kind. Among these I would mention specially the Mayoress and those who assisted her in the organisation of the annual Hospital Ball in the City Hall; the Presidents, Chairmen and members of the Women's Hospital Auxiliary and the Junior Hospital Service League; Mrs. H. J. Stodel and her helpers for their work in connection with the Mid-Week Street Collection, and Mrs. Milner and her helpers for similar work in connection with the Hospital Saturday collection held later in the year; the Peninsula Maternity Hospital, Woodstock Hospital, Victoria Hospital and False Bay Hospital Associations—(the last mentioned, besides helping liberally, as I have mentioned previously in this Minute, with the cost of the improvements at the False Bay Hospital, contributed £146 to the Maintenance Account of the institution); the Medical Students who organised the very successful Hospital "Rag"; and the Lady Michaelis Home Aid Fund Committee.

SURGICAL WORK AT SUBURBAN HOSPITALS.—An important decision has been made in regard to the performance of surgical operations at the suburban hospitals upon patients who, by reason of the fact that they are either free patients or are contributing less than 3s. 6d. per day towards their maintenance in hospital, have no choice of doctor.

Considerable difficulty was experienced in deciding upon an acceptable formula to meet the case; ultimately, however the following was adopted:—

"That the Honorary Visiting Staffs of the Suburban Hospitals shall include surgical specialists; and that the Medical Sub-Committees of the several suburban hospitals be re-

requested to furnish to the Board for approval the names of the Honorary Visiting Officers to whom the major surgical work upon patients who have no free choice of doctor is to be allocated."

This resolution was amplified to the extent of requesting the respective Medical Sub-Committees, when submitting the names of the Honorary Visiting Officers to whom the surgical work is to be allocated, to designate the doctors concerned as surgical officers and assistant surgical officers, as was done some four years previously by the Medical Sub-Committee of Wynberg Hospital.

PROVINCIAL FINANCE COMMISSION—Reciprocity between Provinces in regard to Salaries, Pensions and Service of Nurses and Officials.—The Vice-Chairman of the Board (Mr. M. C. Vos) and the Chairman of the Somerset Hospital Committee (Mrs. H. C. Horwood) attended one of the sittings of the Provincial Finance Commission for the purpose of making representations regarding the desirability of establishing co-ordination between the several Provinces of the Union in the matter of salaries, pensions and service of nurses and Hospital Board officials. The present absence of such co-ordination is definitely detrimental to the interests of hospital services, since it hampers the free movement in the Union of nurses and officials.

The report of the Commission is awaited with interest.

HEAD OFFICE ACCOMMODATION.—The Divisional Council of the Cape have very kindly placed at the Board's disposal, without additional rent, a large room at the rear of the existing offices of the Board which will serve as a Committee Room and also, it is hoped, as a Board Room; and also a smaller room which it is proposed to utilise as an office for the Secretary and Treasurer. This will materially relieve the present congestion in regard to office accommodation, and will also remove the difficulty hitherto encountered in connection with providing a suitable room for Committee meetings.

In this connection the Board have agreed to the renewal of their lease of the premises occupied by them in the Divisional Council Building for a further five years from 1st March, 1934.

CHARGES FOR MOTOR ACCIDENT CASES.—The extremely unsatisfactory state of the law in regard to the liability for the cost of treating the victims of motor accident cases in hospital remains unaltered, though I learn that a move in the direction of remedying the matter is likely to be made in the near future. In the meantime the position of the hospitals in this regard becomes

worse every month. During the year the Board appointed an investigator of motor accident cases on a commission basis, and also introduced a special form of undertaking applicable to motor accident cases in which what is known as a secondary assessment (i.e., an assessment on the basis of the means of the patient regardless of whether he or she secures compensation) is provided for. These measures, however, scarcely touch the fringe of the question; they are merely, so to speak, palliatives, and do not affect the disease itself, which, of course, is the entire absence at present of legislation dealing with the liability to which I have referred.

CHARGES FOR RAILWAYS & HARBOURS SICK FUND PATIENTS.—The Railways & Harbours Sick Fund Board have agreed to pay 5s. per day for each of their patients transferred from the general hospitals to the Eaton and McGregor Convalescent Homes and the Princess Alice Home of Recovery, and 9s. per day for each of their patients admitted to the Lady Michaelis Orthopaedic Home.

AMBULANCE SERVICE.—The Board's Ambulance Service, has worked very satisfactorily throughout the year. Another "Du Cros" chassis is on order, the body for which is being built locally; when this is completed the Board will possess five "Du Cros" ambulances, three of which will constitute the regular service, the other two being held in reserve for emergencies, and to allow of the necessary periodical overhaul. It is generally agreed that this type of vehicle is most satisfactory for its purpose.

The cost of maintaining a service of this description, which operates at all times during the day and night throughout the year, is necessarily considerable, and I want to take this opportunity of appealing to the public to refrain from using the ambulances for the conveyance of persons who could reach their destinations by other means.

REMEDIAL DENTAL CLINICS AT CAPE TOWN FREE DISPENSARY.—For some time past remedial dental clinics for necessitous school children have been conducted on four afternoons each week, the cost of which, including the salaries of the part-time dentists and anæsthetists, has hitherto been entirely defrayed by the Board. The Department of Public Education has now approached the Board with a view to the provision of two additional afternoon sessions, and has offered to contribute £150 per annum towards the cost thereof. It has been ascertained that the approximate cost of providing the extra facilities asked for would be £400 per annum, and, inasmuch as the Board are not prepared to expend additional funds on this service, the proposal to extend it

cannot be agreed to, unless, of course, the Department of Public Education are willing to defray the whole of the cost of such extension.

In this connection, I may mention that there is reason to think, from the appearance of some of the children attending the clinics, that this service is being abused to a certain extent; it is intended to be confined to children whose parents are too poor to pay for the treatment in private. This aspect of the matter is being investigated.

WYNBERG HOSPITAL—Facilities for Clinical Teaching.—In response to an application from the Medical School of the University of Cape Town to be allowed access to the non-European Wards of Wynberg Hospital for the purpose of teaching clinical medicine, until the completion of the new hospital at Groote Schuur, it has been decided to afford the facilities required for the year 1934, subject to the condition that it shall apply to patients paying less than 3s. 6d. per day. The limitation as regards the period has been decided upon so that the Board may be in a position to review the matter at the end of the year; this appears to be necessary having regard to the possibility of difficulties arising from the fact that the proposal involves the demonstration by outside medical practitioners of cases under treatment by members of the Honorary Visiting Staff of the Hospital.

RELIEVING NURSES.—The system under which a staff of Sisters was maintained for relief duty at the several institutions other than Somerset Hospital was abandoned during the year; the growth of the work at the Wynberg, Woodstock and Peninsula Maternity Hospitals has been such as to justify the appointment of an additional Sister at each of them; an additional Sister has been allocated to the Rondebosch and False Bay Hospitals jointly; while amalgamation of the Cape Town Free Dispensary with the Somerset Hospital has simplified the relieving arrangements at the former institution.

Posts were secured for two of the Sisters attached to the disbanded relieving staff; unfortunately no suitable permanent post could be found for the third Sister.

INVESTMENTS.—The Board were able to obtain an allotment of £2,600 in the recent issue of Electricity Supply Commission $4\frac{3}{4}\%$ Stock which was issued at par, and of a further £10,000 in the subsequent issue of $4\frac{1}{2}\%$ Stock issued by the Commission at a premium of 1%. Unfortunately these transactions were queried by the Provincial Auditor, on the ground that the Board are not permitted by law to invest Trust Funds in stocks of this descrip-

tion; consequently the Board were obliged to dispose of their holdings—incidentally they made a profit of nearly £650 on the sale.

Subsequently the Board purchased £3,000 Port Elizabeth 5% (1960) Loan at a premium of £499 odd, which absorbed some of the profit made on the sale of the Electricity Supply Commission Stock.

Some months elapsed before a suitable opportunity again occurred of investing Trust moneys; a few weeks ago, however, we applied for and were allotted £15,000 worth of Stock in the newly issued Cape Town 3 $\frac{3}{4}$ % Loan.

JANE WATERSTON MEMORIAL MATERNITY SCHOOL—
Occupancy of part of Cape Town Free Dispensary Building.—An agreement of lease, with effect from 1st June, 1933, has been entered into with the Jane Waterston Memorial Maternity School under which that organisation continue to accupy a portion of the Cape Town Free Dispensary building at a nominal rental of £1 per annum, subject to the condition that at least 18 months' notice of the termination of the lease shall be given by the Board in the event of their requiring the use of the premises. One of the results of the meeting at which this arrangement was made was the change in the title of the organisation in question from the "Ladies Branch, Free Dispensary," which had given rise to some confusion in the past.

LIMITATION TO PERIOD OF APPOINTMENT OF STAFF NURSES.—It has been decided, for several reasons to limit the period of appointment of staff nurses to the Board's institutions to one year. The principal reason for this is that a nurse, in order to qualify for a Sister's post, must serve for at least a year as a staff nurse and if the appointments of staff nurses are not limited they may retain their posts for several years, and thus block the way to promotion for other nurses. An almost equally cogent reason is the desirability of nurses obtaining a wider experience than is possible in a single institution. It may happen that a hospital may wish to retain the services of a staff nurse after she had served for a year, with a view, possibly, of promoting her to a Sister's post at a later date; and to meet this contingency it has been decided that the appointments in question may, if so desired, be extended for a further year or years.

The staff nurses appointed under the new arrangement, being temporary employees, are not eligible for membership of the Pension Fund. This is to be regretted, but is apparently, an unavoidable necessity.

The new arrangement does not apply to staff nurses appointed before it came into force.

CHAIRMANSHIP AND VICE-CHAIRMANSHIP OF THE BOARD.

—At a special meeting of the Board held on 25th October, 1933, I was honoured by being re-appointed Chairman of the Board, and Mr. M. C. Vos was re-appointed Vice-Chairman.

MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD.—As required by law, the following elective members of the Board retired in October, 1933:—

Rev. A. P. Bender (representing the Contributors to Somerset Hospital).

Dr. R. Sharp (representing the Contributors to Woodstock Hospital).

Mr. W. D. Hare (representing the Contributors to Rondebosch and Mowbray Hospital).

Dr. W. Robertson (representing the Contributors to Wynberg Hospital).

Mrs. A. van der Horst (representing the Contributors to False Bay Hospital, Simon's Town).

Dr. F. M. Morris (representing the Contributors to the other institutions of the Board).

These members were re-elected with the exception of Dr. R. Sharp and Dr. W. Robertson. In default of any nomination of a representative of the Contributors to the Woodstock and Wynberg Hospitals, Dr. R. Sharp and Dr. W. Robertson were re-appointed by the Board.

The term of office of Mr. B. von M. Louw, one of the Administrator's representatives, expired last year, and Mr. B. N. Volsteadt was appointed to fill the vacancy.

The Divisional Council of the Cape re-appointed Dr. C. F. Juritz and myself, and in July, Mr. F. B. Barling was appointed in place of the late Mr. W. Rees.

Dr. P. T. Cairns was re-appointed as the representative of the Municipalities of Simon's Town and Durbanville.

Dr. H. C. Baker, Professor W. Campbell and Dr. A. R. McLachlan were appointed by the Honorary Visiting Officers.

The term of office of Mrs. H. C. Horwood, as a representative of the City Council, expired in October last, and she was re-appointed for two years.

TRAINING OF NURSES.

Medical and Surgical Nurses.—At the final examination for nurses held by the South African Medical Council in April, 1933, candidates entered as follows: Somerset Hospital, 18; Woodstock Hospital, 6; Rondebosch Hospital, 2; Wynberg Hospital, 7. These candidates were successful, with the exception of two from Somerset Hospital, three from Woodstock Hospital and one from Rondebosch Hospital.

At the October examination, candidates entered as follows: Somerset Hospital, 14; Woodstock Hospital, 4; Rondebosch Hospital, 4; Wynberg Hospital, 5. All these candidates were successful, and Miss C. Furber (Somerset Hospital) and Miss L. H. Langmore (Wynberg Hospital), who were placed in the Honours Division, were awarded the Board's prize of £4 4s. each.

Midwives.—At the examination for midwives held in April, 1933, 10 candidates entered from the Peninsula Maternity Hospital and all passed.

At the October examination, 14 entered and 12 passed. Miss M. E. Robb was placed in the Honours Division and was granted the Board's prize of £2 2s.

EXEMPTION FROM SECTION 54 OF ORDINANCE No. 5 OF 1912.

—At the request of the Board, the Administrator, with the advice of the Executive Committee, approved of the exemption during the calendar year 1933, of all the institutions under the control of the Board from the provisions of sub-section (a) of Section 54 of Ordinance No. 5 of 1912, and of Somerset Hospital, the Peninsula Maternity Hospital and the Lady Michaelis Orthopædic Home from the provisions of sub-section (b) of the same section.

Similar exemption has been granted for the year 1934, and, in addition, the Princess Alice Home of Recovery has been exempted from the provisions of sub-sections (a) and (b) of Section 54 of the Ordinance.

OBITUARY.—It is with deep regret that I record the following deaths which occurred during the year under review:—

Mr. W. Rees died on 25th May, 1933. He was appointed to the Board by the Divisional Council of the Cape in November, 1930, and remained on the Board until his death: during the whole of this period Mr. Rees was a member of the Rondebosch and Woodstock Hospitals Committee: he was appointed to the Finance and General Purposes Committee in November, 1931, and served on the Groote Schuur Hospital Committee during the period November, 1930-1932.

Mrs. H. Bairnsfather, who died during December, always took a keen interest in the work of the C.H.B. District Nursing Organisation and was Honorary Treasurer of the Plumstead-Southfield Branch for several years.

RETIREMENTS.—Miss M. E. Chesters, who had been Matron of Woodstock Hospital since 1st September, 1924, resigned her post on 31st October, 1933, on account of ill-health. Every effort was made to induce her to remain until the end of August, 1934, by which date she would have qualified for a pension, but without avail. The Board very much regret losing the services of a tried official in this way, particularly since Miss Chesters, by her own action, made it impossible, in terms of the law, for her to be awarded a pension. An effort is being made on her behalf to obtain from the Provincial Administration a refund of part of her contributions to the Pension Fund.

Miss M. B. Topp, formerly a Sister at Wynberg Hospital, was appointed Matron of Woodstock Hospital in succession to Miss Chesters.

One of the oldest servants of the Board, in the person of Sister V. Shaw, of Woodstock Hospital, retired on pension on 24th October last, after over 25 years' service. She carried with her the best wishes of the Board and of those who had been associated with her during her long service.

Three other Sisters with long records of service also retired on pension during the year; these were:—

Sister E. Cave, Night Superintendent of Somerset Hospital (over 20 years' service).

Sister J. F. Mott, of Somerset Hospital (nearly 19 years' service.)

Sister M. H. J. Hammond, of Somerset Hospital (over 20 years' service).

All of these ladies will, it is hoped, live for long to enjoy their well-earned rest, though, I am sorry to say, the reports I have received regarding Sister Mott's health are far from reassuring.

Sister M. Billingsley also retired, on reaching the age limit, on 11th July last. This lady's service with the Board was insufficient to enable her to qualify for a pension.

The resignation of Miss D. Burmester, Matron of the Lady Michaelis Orthopædic Home, is impending. Miss Burmester, who was Matron of the institution for several years prior to it being taken over by the Board, only agreed to continue in a temporary capacity until the re-establishment of the Home under the Board's control was completed; her resignation, therefore, did not come as a surprise to the Board. She has been prevailed upon to continue

in office until the end of May next, so as to give the Board as long a time as possible in which to select her successor.

Before concluding this report I desire to extend my most grateful thanks to the Chairmen of the several Standing Committees and to the members generally for the generous support they have accorded to me throughout the year, and for the time and trouble they have so ungrudgingly given to the solution of the many problems with which we have been faced. I wish particularly to refer to the excellent work done by the Vice-Chairman of the Board (Mr. Vos). Mr. Vos' zeal for the welfare of the Board's institutions is too well-known to require mention by me; it may, however, not be common knowledge that he pays a weekly visit to nearly all of them, and that many of the improvements which have been carried out have been the result of his efforts. His personal contact with the staffs is greatly appreciated by the latter, who feel that they can look upon him as a friend with whom they can discuss their difficulties freely.

I should like also to refer to the splendid example set to the younger members by the Rev. A. P. Bender, who is, so to speak, the father of the Board. He is the last of the members of the Board as originally constituted in 1913 and was associated with the work of the hospitals long before that date, being a member of the Committees of Management of the Somerset Hospital, Cape Town Free Dispensary and Eaton Convalescent Home when the Board was founded. Mr. Bender, by his influence and persuasive powers, has been instrumental in obtaining large sums of money for the hospitals—it may not be known that the Radium Fund owes its inception entirely to him.

Finally I wish to thank all members of the staffs of the institutions and of the Head Office for their work during the year. In this connection, I would like to refer particularly to the Secretary and Treasurer; very few people seem to realise the magnitude of the responsibility which rests upon his shoulders. The most sincere compliment I can pay to him is to say that the work of the Board has never been carried out more efficiently or expeditiously than it is to-day.

The Board can adopt as their watchwords, Progress, Efficiency and Courtesy. While the spirit embodied in these words prevails we can look forward with confidence to the future.

RESIDENT MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT FOR 1933.

HONORARY STAFF.—As a result of the amalgamation of the Somerset Hospital and the Cape Town Free Dispensary, which took place on the 1st November, 1933, the Honorary Visiting Staffs of the two Institutions were merged into one. Members of the Honorary Visiting Staff of the Cape Town Free Dispensary will retain their status at that Institution for five years and were given the status of Assistant Physician, Assistant Surgeon, etc., on the combined staff. Thus Dr. J. W. Rabkin became Honorary Assistant Paediatric Physician and Dr. A. I. Goldberg, Honorary Assistant Gynaecologist. The other members of the staff already had this status with the exception of Dr. C. V. Impey, Honorary Radiologist, whose status will not be defined until the whole question of the Radiological services of the Board's Hospitals has been settled, and exception was also made in the case of Dr. C. E. Jones-Phillipson who was given the status of Honorary Visiting Surgeon for Diseases of the Ear, Nose and Throat.

Dr. P. A. Thornton, one of the Honorary Visiting Anaethetists, resigned in October, 1933—the vacancy has not yet been filled.

NURSING STAFF.—Applications for training received during 1933 numbered 649. Of this number 139 were placed on the waiting list, bringing the total number on the waiting list to 170.

During the year Health Record Cards have been drawn up. These cards contain very full information and are kept and filed by the Home Sister, which involves a great deal of time and work, as also does the monthly weights, and weekly weight for Probationers on Trial. In addition to this, there is routine Schick Testing and Immunisation, Typhoid Inoculation, Physical Examinations, etc., to be arranged and organised, all of which increased the work in Matron's department.

Retirements.—Sister Mott and Sister Hammond retired on pension during the year, after years of devoted service.

Sister Cave will be retiring on pension in January, 1934, after 23 years' service, the last 17 as Night Superintendent, in which appointment she has zealously performed her duties.

Examination Results.—*S.A.M.C. Final*: 30 entered—all passed. One in Honours Division—Miss M. C. Furber.

S.A.M.C. Preliminary: 38 entered—37 passed, 3 with Honours. Honours were obtained by M. L. Brunyee, D. F. M. McKay, J. J. van der Merwe.

Correspondence.—Letters received and dealt with in Matron's Office totalled 4,202.

Domestic.—Sewing room—New garments made—6,386.

RADIOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.—This department is working to its full capacity. There has been a great increase in the number of patients seeking treatment for cancer, even from places as far afield as the Transkei, Queenstown, Aliwal North, etc. This appears to be due, to a certain extent, to the propaganda of the Cancer Association of South Africa, but until such time as the problem is recognised to be a national one and tackled as such by the establishment of a national treatment centre with adequate facilities for research, funds and energy will be dissipated amongst the various treatment centres where delay in treatment is unavoidable and consequently a great deal of the good done by publicity campaigns is neutralised.

OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.—The congestion in this department is worse than ever, but it is hoped that the transference of a few departments to the Cape Town Free Dispensary will bring some slight degree of relief.

IN-PATIENTS.—The wards are as congested as ever. A great improvement was effected by closing in the stoep of St. Leger Ward and the balcony of Lightfoot Ward, so that patients can be kept there overnight even during spells of inclement weather. Owing to the shortage of accommodation at the Cape Town Infirmary, the City Hospital for Infectious Diseases, and even latterly at the Mental Hospital, it has not always been possible to transfer cases without delay. The willing co-operation of the Administrations of these institutions is highly appreciated, but they are also labouring under the difficulties imposed upon us by a faulty health system which tries to divide diseases into water-tight compartments under authorities as widely apart as a hospital board and the Department of the Interior; unfortunately, general hospitals suffer most under the lack of co-ordination. Every body picked up in the street, whether he is merely suffering from the effects of hunger or starvation, or whether he is in the last stages of tuberculosis, or mentally deranged, is sent there and is kept there until he can be accommodated at the proper institution.

The tremendous increase in the number of diabetic patients treated during the year is reflected by the fact that the expenditure on insulin for the five months, July to November, was more than double that for the previous six months. I think the time has arrived for the establishment of an "Insulin Fund" by means of appeals to the public.

ENGINEER'S DEPARTMENT: Ambulance Service.—Another ambulance was bought during the year, bringing the fleet of ambulances up to a total of four Du Cros cars and one Bean car, which is used as a standby. The service worked satisfactorily and the total mileage covered by all ambulances was 56,280, and the accident mileage was 7,572.

Laundry.—Owing to the age of the laundry machinery several parts had to be replaced, nevertheless 683,367 articles were successfully laundered.

Boilers.—The coal consumption was 92 tons less than the previous year. In view of the age of the boilers this fact reflects great credit to the Engineer and his staff for the care and attention given them.

Wireless Installation.—This installation has proved a great blessing to patients. The cost of upkeep is increasing owing to the fact that a large number of earphones have had to be replaced.

Refrigerating Plant.—A domestic size frigidaire has been installed in each ward and a large one, specially constructed to meet the requirements of the hospital kitchen, in the renovated milk room, and a duplicate of the latter in the Nurses' Home. In addition, an ice-making plant, producing eight blocks of ice per diem, has been installed next to the milk room. The saving effected on ice bills will pay for the plant in $4\frac{1}{2}$ years, thus a long-felt want has been very economically supplied.

General.—The general upkeep, repairs, painting, etc., of hospital buildings and ambulances was carried out and, in addition, several improvements to buildings, etc., effected departmentally under supervision of the Engineer:—The ambulance garages were extended to provide for the housing of the additional garage and a workshop for the mechanic. The Almoner, who was temporarily accommodated in the Clinical Records room, was provided with an office in the entrance hall. The general office was partitioned off into two and a small excrudescence built on to the outer half. The counter in the dispensary has been enlarged and the shelves extended.

The ventilation of the hospital kitchen has been improved by extending the pantry with a door opening into the hall and installing a large exhaust fan. St. Leger stoep and Lightfoot balcony has been closed in with sliding glass windows. The old milkroom has been renovated and part of it converted into a store for X-ray films. An Electro-Cardiograph room has been built on the landing at the top of the main staircase.

DISPENSARY.—During the year the system was introduced of giving to Out-Patients supplies of medicines sufficient for 14 to 28 days, as directed. This has met with the approval of the staffs of the various departments and certainly benefits the patient, who is saved fares and the necessity of such frequent attendance. This departure from the old system will, no doubt, show a diminution in the number of Out-Patient attendances as reflected in our yearly statistics.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE RADIOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT OF THE NEW SOMERSET HOSPITAL, 1933.

In the year 1933 no important change in the accommodation equipment and organisation of the Radiological Department were made.

The alterations and additions effected in the previous year in the accommodation, equipment and staffing of the department resulted in greater efficiency and healthier and happier conditions.

Periodical examinations of the blood of all members of the staff engaged in the handling of radium and of the X-ray apparatus were carried out. The somewhat alarming blood changes in the radium workers, found in the first half of the previous year, were reduced to within normal limits and the blood picture of those concerned remained satisfactory during the whole year.

The number of Diagnostic cases attended to was recorded as 4,389 and that of therapeutic attendances as 2,763.

The slight decrease in the number of diagnostic cases given, as compared with that of the previous report, is not due to a decrease in the work, but to repeat cases having been recorded under the same numbers during this year.

The increase in therapeutic attendances (2,763 against 1,511 the previous year) was due to a suspension of radium work during several months in 1932 as well as to the progress and increased confidence in this method of treatment.

A copy of a report on the results of radium work in the New Somerset Hospital to the Medical Congress, held in September, 1933, in Cape Town, was presented to the Cape Hospital Board. Since then continued progress has been made in the methods of treatment and good results have been obtained in increasing numbers.

Many more cases could have been attended to and a greater number of cures obtained but for certain disabilities under which the department labours.

These disabilities come under four headings:—

- (1) Lack of hospital accommodation. This not only refers to the general lack of accommodation felt in other departments, but also to the fact that the department has no wards or beds of its own.

- (2) Lack of technical staff and equipment. The development of the technique of radium application has lead to the construction of special appliances for each case, many of which can only be satisfactorily constructed by a skilled dental mechanic. At present outside help must be obtained in many cases in order to attain a satisfactory result. The department has neither the staff nor the equipment to develop this technique to its fullest possibilities by its own resources.
- (3) Lack of continuity of service, through absence of qualified assistance.
- (4) Limitation of amount of radium and X-ray apparatus available.

On the other hand it can be safely stated that the utmost use was made of the facilities available, and as many cases attended to as the conditions allowed.

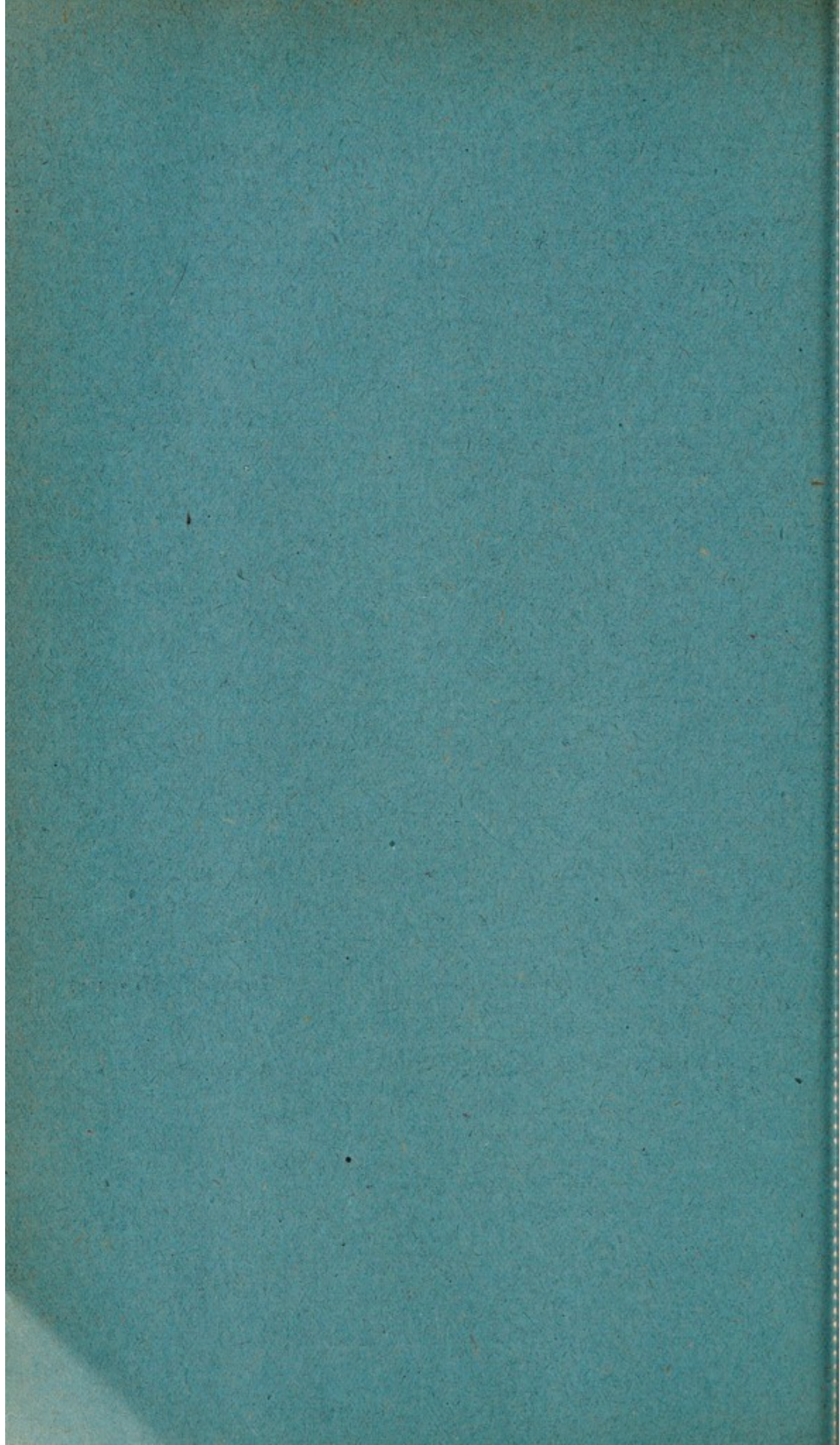

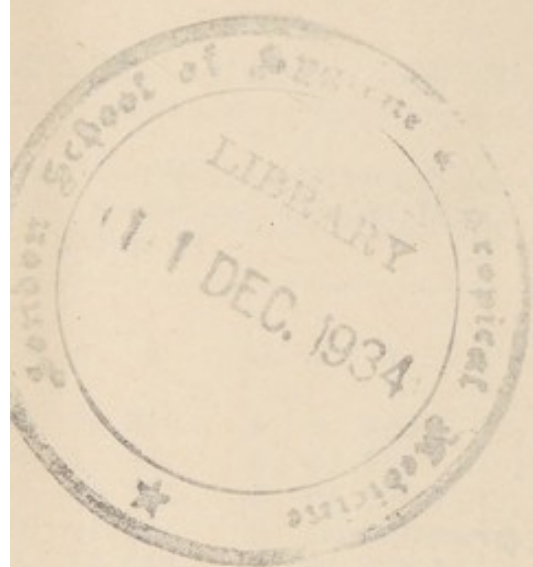
