II. PUBLIC HEALTH.

GENERAL REMARKS.

(I) *General Diseases.*

Diseases of the Respiratory and Digestive Systems remain the most prevalent, there having been 2,817 cases of the former and 4,298 cases of the latter—it is once more noticeable that respiratory complaints occur mostly during the relatively cold season, January to April, and digestive system complaints during the rains, June to October: the year passed without any outbreak of any serious illness under this heading of General Diseases.

(II) *Communicable Diseases.*

(1) *Mosquito or Insect Borne.*

- i. *Malaria*.—1,277 cases were diagnosed, most of them clinically, and placed on treatment.
- ii. *Trypanosomiasis*.—181 cases were treated in Bathurst with trypanamide as against 121 in 1930: there is no doubt that patients more readily present themselves for treatment; the more so as the bulk of them are treated as Out-Patients.
- iii. *Yellow Fever*.—No case occurred in 1931.
- iv. *Blackwater Fever*.—No case occurred.
- v. *Filariasis*.—44 cases recorded in the form of Elephantiasis.

(2) *Infectious Diseases.*

- i. *Influenza*.—411 cases recorded; these occurred throughout the year: one case ended fatally.
- ii. *Measels*.—No case recorded.
- iii. *Dysentery, Amœbic*.—37 cases with one death: this is not a prevalent complaint in the Gambia.
- iv. *Tuberculosis—Pulmonary and other Tissues*.—102 cases with 8 deaths.
- v. *Leprosy*.—63 cases with 5 deaths. It is likely that not all who have this complaint report themselves.
- vi. *Yaws*.—37 cases only were seen in Bathurst: it is more commonly found in the Protectorate.

- vii. *Tetanus*.—32 cases with 10 deaths.
- viii. *Septicæmia*.—5 cases with 3 deaths.
- ix. *Syphilis*.—22 cases with 1 death.
- x. *Gonorrhœa*.—189 cases.

(3) *Helminthic Diseases*.

- i. *Ascariasis*.—606 cases: all of which were treated as Out-Patients.
- ii. *Teniasis*.—4 cases only.
- iii. *Dracunculosis*.—5 cases recorded during the year.

The cases reported above are those treated at the Victoria Hospital, Bathurst. Cases under treatment in the Protectorate by the Medical Officer and Dispensers are summarised later in this report.

During the year under review the general health was satisfactory and the year passed without an epidemic of any kind.

Prevalent Diseases:—

Of the 29 patients under treatment 8 were suffering from Malaria.

No complaint was particularly prevalent: the ailments of the 29 patients were mostly of a minor nature, and were spaced out during the year.

(3) EUROPEAN OFFICIALS.

There were 45 Officials on the sick list as against 39 in 1930. Malaria and Influenza were responsible for the illness in 20 cases—17 cases of malaria and 3 of influenza. The cases of illness were spaced out during the year; the largest number occurred in November when 8 Officials were placed on the sick list.

Of those who were ill 19 were admitted to Hospital and 26 were under treatment in their quarters. The longest period any one Official was on the sick list was 25 days.

Malaria occurred in March, 2 cases; April, 1 case; June, 1 case; July, 1 case; August, 1 case; September, 2 cases; October, 5 cases; November, 2 cases; December, 2 cases.

III. HYGIENE AND SANITATION.

A. GENERAL REVIEW OF WORK DONE AND PROGRESS MADE.

(1) PREVENTIVE MEASURES :—

Malaria.—This complaint is widespread but the campaign against it is of course persisted in—sand filling and levelling of likely mosquito breeding places is practically always in operation and close scrutiny is given to trees, sump pits, and other likely breeding places.

The Hospital and Mother and Child Clinics continue to show a heavy incidence of this complaint with consequent losses in time and wages.

Trypanosomiasis.—Six deaths occurred during the year—it is still confidently believed that infection is acquired in the Protectorate and not in Bathurst and this is supported by the fact that no tsetse fly has been reported or caught in town.

This is all the more strange as there are swamps with much undergrowth within easy reach of the centre of the town: however an area between the town and the nearest swamp lands is kept clear of this undergrowth.

Yellow Fever.—No case has been under treatment during the year either in Bathurst or the Protectorate.

Plague.—No cases have been under treatment either in Bathurst or the Protectorate.

Dysentery.—This is not at all a prevalent disease anywhere in the Gambia—at the Victoria Hospital, Bathurst, for example, during the year only 47 cases came under treatment with one death.

Tuberculosis.—This complaint is not very rife: 102 cases were under treatment.

Whenever a case is notified in town it is visited, the danger of the disease is explained, and arrangements are made with the patients and friends to have disposal of sputum carefully attended to and the patient kept as much apart from other people as possible.

Both spittoon and carbolic acid lotion are given free to the patient.

Beri beri.—The prison remains free from this complaint.

(2) GENERAL MEASURES OF SANITATIONS.

Refuse.—This is disposed of at Lasso Wharf where it is used to reclaim land and where it is burnt *in situ*. For many years past it has been disposed of in this way and a very large amount of useful reclamation work has been effected. Two lorries are now in use on this work in addition to horse carts.

Night Soil.—During the year a lorry has been engaged in this work and dumping into Malfa Creek has now been organised and the scheme is working well—in addition dumping is permitted at certain points around the Island's edge.

Water.—The pipe borne supply from Lamin remains the same.

(3) SCHOOL HYGIENE.

Medical inspection of School Children is undertaken by the Medical Officers and Dental Surgeon and school buildings are under the supervision of the Public Health Department.

(4) FOOD IN RELATION TO HEALTH AND DISEASE.

Various inspections of food stuffs were made during the year.

Meat and fish are permitted to be sold in the Albert Market only and are inspected daily.

During the year a meat sterilizer was installed and is proving most useful as a means of dealing effectively with cyst infected pork—also the refrigerating room was completed and is a most useful addition to the amenities of the Market—since its installation no unsold meat has decomposed and therefore none has had to be thrown away: furthermore, meat can now be allowed to 'hang' before being sold and is consequently more tender and more pleasant to eat.

B. MEASURES TAKEN TO SPREAD THE KNOWLEDGE OF HYGIENE AND SANITATION.

Medical Officers in the pursuit of their daily work use every opportunity of imparting such knowledge as also do Sanitary Inspectors and Inspectors of Nuisances. In addition very useful work is done in this direction by the Staff of the Mother and Child Welfare Clinics.

C. TRAINING OF SANITARY PERSONNEL.

This has been undertaken by the Medical Officer of Health and by the Sanitary Inspectors. Courses of lectures have been given and examinations have been held.

IV. PORT HEALTH WORK AND ADMINISTRATION.

During the year ocean-going ships were boarded and passengers were inspected. No case of dangerous infectious illness was found.

In the Gambia the Sanitary Administration and Health work of the Port of Bathurst is part of the daily routine of work of the Public Health Department of the Colony.

V. MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

During the year under review Miss Storey, Sister in charge of the Clinics, was absent on leave for the last four months and the Medical Officer of Health for the last three months, and as a result the work of the Clinics had to be curtailed during that time.

Twenty-seven deaths were recorded amongst the infants born under the supervision of the Clinics and the total number of live births was 236. It will be seen therefore that the Mother and Child Welfare Clinics shows an infant mortality rate of 114.

The total number of births in Bathurst during the year was 422, and of these 321 were conducted under the supervision of the Clinics—and so it will be seen that these are now undertaking 75 per cent of all confinements.

(B) IMPROVEMENTS EFFECTED.

1. *Victoria Hospital, Bathurst.*—During 1931 the old Dispensary and Out-Patient rooms were converted into two Wards and this improvement enabled the Army Hut (old Ward 7) to be demolished and removed. These two Wards of eight and six beds respectively are light, airy, and attractive.

Another improvement was the demolition of old Ward 6 and the building in concrete of a Ward of 22 beds, with Ward scullery and lavatories in an annexe. These new Wards have enabled Wards 3, 4, 5 to be closed for general cases and to be used only for special cases.

2. A Medical Store was erected during the year near the Out-Patient Department.

(C) AVERAGE COST PER HEAD OF PATIENTS.

Bathurst—One shilling per diem.

Georgetown—Nine pence per diem.

VII. PRISONS AND ASYLUMS.

The average daily number of Prisoners was 77.97.

The number of Out-Patients examined at the daily sick parade was 306 of whom 56 were admitted to the Infirmary.

— The number of deaths during the year was 5, due respectively to:—

- (1) Pulmonary Tuberculosis
- (2) Broncho Pneumonia.
- (3) Heart Disease.
- (4) Bullet Wound due to escaping.
- (5) Heart Failure.

The general health of the prisoners was good, the commonest diseases being those due to the respiratory and intestinal affections.

The diet is sufficient, and satisfactory as regards quality.

The sanitary arrangements are efficient, night soil being disposed of in the bush.

The association cells are hygienic in all respects.

There is no Asylum in the Gambia nor are there any facilities for the confinement of dangerous lunatics.

On the 11th May two condemned Criminals were executed at the Prison.

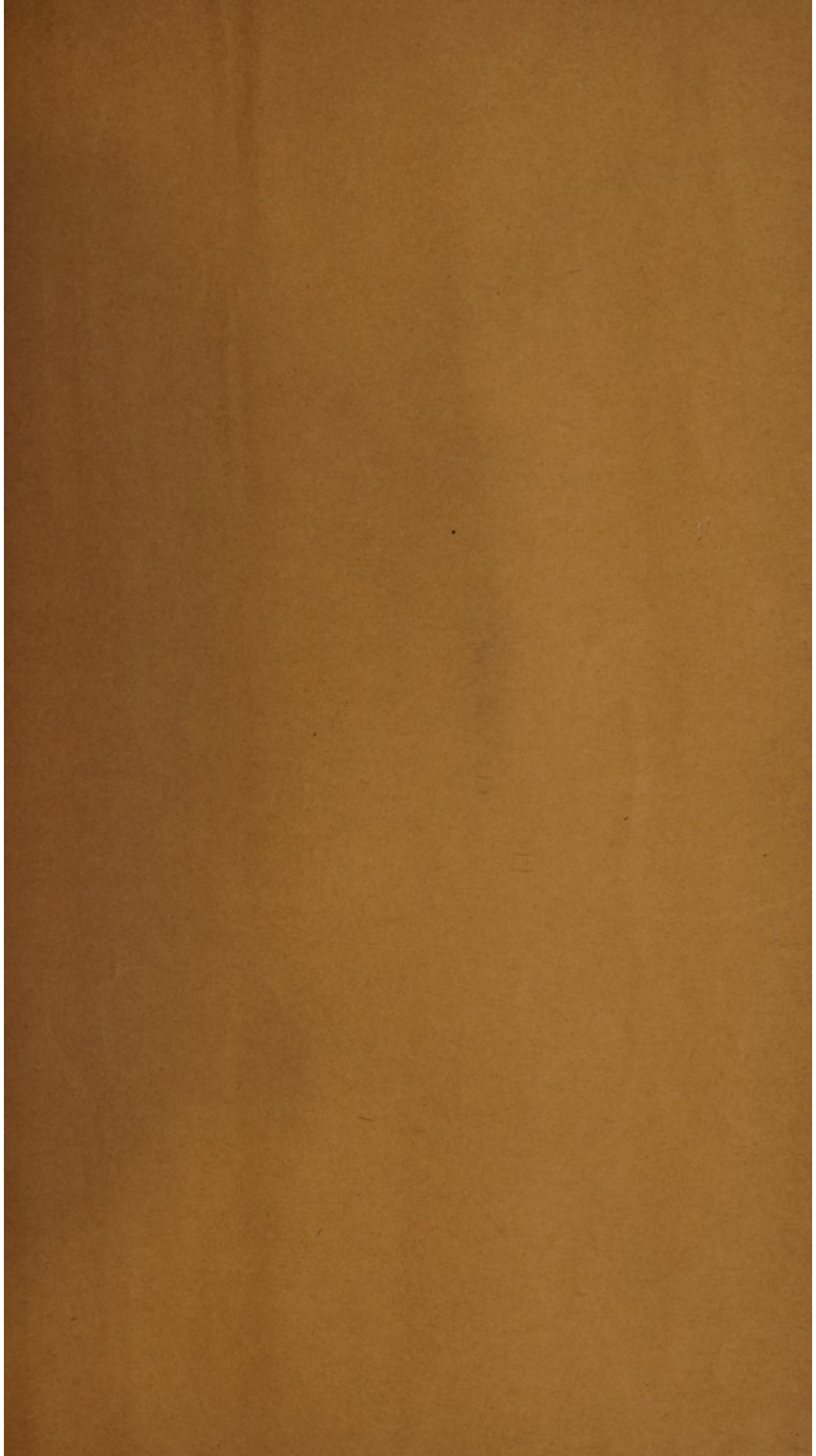
