



II. PUBLIC HEALTH.

GENERAL REMARKS.

General Diseases.

Diseases of the Digestive and Respiratory Systems remain the most prevalent, there having been 3,367 cases of the former and 1,894 cases of the latter—it is noticeable that respiratory complaints occur mostly during the relatively cold season, January to April, and digestive system complaints during the rains, June to October: the year passed without an outbreak of any serious illness under this heading of General Diseases.

(II) Communicable Diseases.

(1) Mosquito or Insect Borne.

 Malaria.—818 cases were diagnosed, most of them clinically—of the 100 cases admitted to Hospitals two died.

- ii. Trypanosomiasis.—580 cases were treated in Bathurst and Georgetown as against 366 cases in 1931 and 157 cases in 1930: there remains no doubt that patients more readily present themselves for treatment since the majority of them have been treated as out-patients.
- iii. Yellow Fever .- No case occurred in 1932.
- iv. Blackwater Fever.-Two cases, with two recoveries, were under treatment.
- v. Filariasis.-49 cases were recorded in the form of Elephantiasis.
- (2) In jectious Diseases.
 - Influenza.—134 cases recorded in comparison with 416 cases in 1931—all recovered.
 - ii. Measels .- 6 cases recorded with no deaths.
 - Dysentery, Amarbic.—59 cases in place of 37 cases recorded in 1931 no case ended fatally: this is not a prevalent complaint in the Gambia.
 - iv. Dysentery, Bacillary.—One case and one death.
 - v. Leprosy.—192 cases presented themselves for treatment in place of 153 cases in I931. It is likely that not all who have this complaint report themselves.
 - vi. Yaws.-124 cuses were under treatment: it is more commonly found in the Protectorate.
 - vii. *Tetanus.*—38 cases with 9 deaths in comparison with 32 cases and 10 deaths in 1931.
 - viii. Septicæmia .- 2 cases and one death.
 - ix. Syphilis.—33 cases, all recovered, in comparison with 51 cases and one death in 1931.
 - x. Gonor rhæa.-119 cases: in 1931, 272 cases.
- (3) Helminthic Diseases.
 - i. Ascariasis.-443 cases presented themselves for treatment.
 - ii. Taniasis .- 32 cases only.
 - iii. Dracunculus.-3 cases only.

The cases reported above are those treated at the Victoria Hospital Bathurst, and the Georgetown Hospital. Cases under treatment in the Protectorate by the Medical Officer and Dispensers are summarised later in this report.

During the year under review the general health was satisfactory and the year passed without an epidemic of any kind.

No complaint was particularly prevalent: the ailments of the 85 patients were mostly of a minor nature.

(3) EUROPEAN OFFICIALS.

There were 61 Officials on the sick list as compared with 45 in 1931. Malaria and Influenza were responsible for the illness in 27 cases—18 cases of Malaria and 9 of Influenza in place of 17 and 3 respectively in 1931.

The remaining 34 cases were mostly minor ailments with the exception of one case of Appendicitis. The cases of illness were spaced out during the year; the largest number occurred in October when 9 Officials were placed on the sick list.

Of those who where ill 26 were admitted to Hospital and 35 were under treatment in their quarters. The longest period any one Official was on the sick list was 21 days.

Malaria occurred in January, 2 cases; February, 3 cases; March, 1 case; April, 1 case; May, 1 case; August, 3 cases; September, 3 cases; October, 1 case; November, 1 case; December, 2 cases.

III. HYGIENE AND SANITATION.

A. GENERAL REVEIW OF WORK DONE AND PROGRESS MADE.

(1) PREVENTIVE MEASURES :---

Malaria. During the year sand filling and levelling of anopheline breeding grounds have been persisted in—one very large and deep depression in a cemetery was finally obliterated by sand filling and this has done away with the necessity for continuous supervision of this area and expensive applications of oil and Paris green, and as this deep depression was close to European and African houses its obliteration can only be to the benefit of all. Close scrutiny is given to all other likely breeding places such as trees, sump pits, and so on.

Trypanosomiasis. Three deaths occurred during the year—it is still confidently believed that infection is not acquired in Bathurst and this is supported by the fact that no tsetse fly has been reported or caught in the town.

An area between the town and the nearest swamp lands continues to be kept clear of undergrowth.

Yellow Ferer. No case has been under treatment during the year either in Bathurst or the Protectorate.

Flague. No case has been under treatment either in Bathurst or the Protectorate.

Dysentery. This is not a prevalent complaint in the Gambia—and so no special preventive measures are required.

At the Victoria Hospital, Bathurst, 60 cases were under treatment with one death.

Tuberculosis. This is not very rife : 43 cases were under treatment in Bathurst. Whenever a case is notified in town it is visited, the danger of the disease to others is explained, and arrangements are made with the patients and friends to have disposal of sputum carefully attended to and the patient kept as much apart from other people as possible. Spittoon and carbolic acid lotion are given free to the patient.

Beri Beri. The Prison remains free from this complaint.

(2) GENERAL MEASURES OF SANITATION.

Scarenging and Refuse. All household and other refuse is scavenged by Health Department labourers and conveyed by lorries or by horse carts to Malfa Creek (Lasso Wharf) and there incinerated and used to reclaim shallow tidal areas—it is estimated that approximately 1,600 tons of refuse is disposed of annually in this way

Night soil continues to be disposed of in the main by dumping into Malfa Creek : this site has been used for this purpose for approaching two years without the creation of any nuisance or unpleasantness—in addition dumping is permitted at certain points round the Island's edge.

Water. The pipe borne supply from Lamin remains the same.

(3) SCHOOL HYGIENE.

Medical inspection of school children is undertaken by the Medical Officers and Dental Surgeon and school buildings are under the supervision of the Health Department.

(4) FOOD IN RELATION TO HEALTH AND DISEASE.

Various inspections of food stuffs were made during the year. Meat and fish are offered for sale in the Albert Market only and there undergo a daily inspection.

The meat sterilizer and the 'cool chamber' are proving of value—the former in dealing with cyst infected pork and the latter in enabling meat to hang for some time without danger of putrefaction.

B. MEASURES TAKEN TO SPREAD THE KNOWLEDGE OF HYGIENE AND SANITATION.

Medical Officers in the pursuit of their daily work use every opportunity of imparting such knowledge as also do Sanitary Inspectors and Inspectors of Nuisances.

In addition useful work is done in this direction by the staff of the Mother and Child Welfare Clinics.

C. TRAINING OF SANITARY PERSONEL.

This is undertaken by the Senior Medical Officer and by the Sanitary Inspectors.

IV. PORT HEALTH WORK AND ADMINISTRATION.

During the year ocean-going ships were boarded and passengers inspected but no case of dangerous infectious illness was found.

In the Gambia the Sanitary Administration and Health Work of the port of Bathurst is part of the daily routine of work of the Health Department of the Colony.

Ten deaths were recorded amongst the infants born under the supervision of the Clinics and the total number of live births was 81. It will be seen therefore that the Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics show an infant mortality rate of 123.

The total number of births in Bathurst was 339 and of these 93 were conducted under the supervision of the Clinics—that is to say 27 per cent.

(B). IMPROVEMENTS EFFECTED.

During the year Ward No. 3 in the main building was reconditioned, divided into three cubicles, and put into use as a private ward for African patients desirous of such private accommodation and all door and window spaces in Wards 6, 7, 8 were protected by mosquito gauze.

VII. PRISON.

Average daily number of Prisoners was 70.08.

The number of Out-Patients examined at the daily sick parade was 301, of whom 42 were admitted to the Prison Hospital.

The general health of the Prisoners was good.

The diet is sufficient and satisfactory as regards quality.

The Sanitary arrangements are efficient ; night soil is disposed of by trenching.

The most prevalent diseases appear to be Malaria, Yaws, Ulcers, Goitre and Trypanosomiasis, apart from such common disorders as Constipation and Bronchitis. A large number of patients present themselves with Headache, Drowsiness and Enlargement of the Cervical Glands and say they are suffering from Sleeping sickness. These cases are entered as Trypanosomiasis without confirmation of the diagnosis by the discovery

of trypanosomes in the blood or gland juice. Parenchymatous goitre is very prevalent, especially in the upper part of the river.

The new Hospital, which was converted in 1930 and 1931 is working satisfactorily. There are three Male Wards and one Female Ward cach containing six beds.

A drawback is the absence of an operating Theatre, the only room at present suitable for operating being the Female Ward.

Refuse destruction and general cleanliness in the riverside towns is in the hands of the Chiefs and Headmen and appears to be working fairly satisfactorily.
