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

ANNUAL MEDICAL REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st December, 1949.

I. MAIN EVENTS.

Staff. The approved establishment of Medical Officers consists of a Senior Medical Officer and eight Medical Officers. At no time during the year, however, was the establishment at full strength.

Dr. G. G. Smith continued to act as Senior Medical Officer up to the 16th February. He left for the United Kingdom on vacation and study leave on the

9th December.

Dr. L. P. Younglao arrived in the Colony on the 11th February and as-

sumed duty on the same day as Senior Medical Officer.

Dr. H. Forde was transferred from the Stann Creek District to the Toledo District on the 1st March, whilst Dr. D. H. Wharton was transferred from the Toledo District to the Stann Creek District on the same day.

Dr. B. M. Hulse returned from vacation leave on the 19th March, thus releasing Dr. A. E. N. Perez, a private practitioner who acted as a part-

time Medical Officer, Belize.

Dr. S. Lach was transferred from the Northern Districts to the Toledo District on the 20th September and Dr. H. Forde from the latter to the Northern

Dr. A. H. Bartley, contract Medical Officer, resigned and left the Colony on the 26th November.

Training of Junior Personnel. Miss Grace Russell left for the United Kingdom to undergo training as a nurse under Development and Welfare Scheme D476 on the 4th February.

Mr. J. Alcoser left for Jamaica on the 2nd September to undergo training as a Sanitary Inspector under Development and Welfare Scheme D1108.

Five candidates were accepted for training in rural nursing, eight in gen-

eral nursing and two in pharmacy at the Belize Hespital.

Four candidates successfully completed their training in general nursing and midwifery, two in general nursing and three in midwifery. The latter three are members of the Black Cross Organization.

Visits. Dr. Paul O'Brien, President of the St. Louis Dental Association arrived on the 20th January to make a survey of the dental status of school children with special reference to dental caries and the fluorine content of their

Dr. A. J. Walker, Associate Professor of Tropical Medicine at Tulane University, U.S.A., visited the Colony in April and carried out a small-scale experiment in malaria control for the department. His aim was to try out the effectiveness of a new drug, Primaquine in the destruction of the gametocytic stage of the malaria parasite. The drug shows promise and it is intended to carry out a large-scale experiment with it before deciding whether it can be considered a safe and effective weapon in malaria control.

Dr. Paoliello, member of the Pan American Sanitary Bureau and Chief of the National Yellow Fever Service, Brazil visited in October and, as a result of discussion with the Senior Medical Officer, UNICEF has approved a grant of U.S. \$22,000 in materials for a two-year campaign to eradicate insect-borne diseases in children on a colony-wide basis. The campaign will consist of an ex-

pansion of the department's programme for the residual spraying of every house in the Colony with D.D.T. twice a year.

Miss Ibberson, Social Welfare Adviser to the Department and Welfare Organisation, visited in September and had discussions with the Senior Medi cal Officer on problems of mutual interest.

Legislation. Ordinance No. 14 was passed changing the name of the Lunatic Asylum to "Mental Hospital".

Finance. The estimated expenditure of the Department was \$308,848.40, representing 8.07% of the Colony's budget.

II. DEVELOPMENT AND WELFARE SCHEMES.

Scheme D1020—Rural Dispensaries. Three Rural Dispensaries, to two of which Nurses' Quarters were added, were erected under this scheme at a total cost of \$28,129. These dispensaries were erected in isolated villages and are in charge of specially-trained rural nurses. They are proving to be a great boon to the villagers. The scheme provides for the erection of ten dispensaries.

Scheme D13 a(b)—Improvement of Water Supply in Villages. Thirteen wells were sanitated in the rural areas at a total cost of \$749 bringing the total to seventeen wells thus far sanitated under this scheme.

Scheme D476 and D1108—Training of Junior Personnel. Training under these two schemes has already been referred to in paragraph 2.

III. HOUSING.

In Belize, the capital city, the majority of the population live in houses constructed of timber with galvanized iron roofs and usually standing on wooden piles about seven feet above the level of the ground, which is generally swampy and flooded in wet weather. The work of filling in plots is constantly being undertaken by private individuals and the City Council, while reclamation schemes have been undertaken by Government from time to time. Only a small number of the population live in houses which they own.

Housing conditions elsewhere in the Colony are poor. The principal building medium is locally grown pine with imported corrugated iron for roofing. The Indians utilise native round wood for framing with mud walls and that ched

roofs made from local palmetto leaves.

Housing for the low income groups in Belize is particularly acute and Government maintains seven houses for the accommodation of families of the labouring class. The Central Housing and Planning Authority have received approval for a scheme to erect thirty-three houses and lease twenty-two lots for houses for low income groups on the north side of the city. The scheme is progressing satisfactorily.

IV. PUBLIC HEALTH.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASES.

Malaria. This disease remains the principal cause of morbidity throughout the Colony. 898 cases were admitted to the Hospitals for treatment as compared with 954 in 1948. 45 deaths were certified by medical practitioners as against 54 in the previous year, representing 9% and 6.2% respectively of certified deaths from all causes.

Typhoid and Paratyphoid. Sixty cases of the enteric group of fevers were notified with five deaths as compared with forty-four cases and four deaths in 1948. The disease occurred in sporadic form, the majority of which came from Belize.

Dysentry. 148 cases were notified with 25 deaths as compared with 97 cases and 15 deaths in 1948. 39 cases were of the amoebic type, 4 were bacillary and 105 unspecified.

Pulmonary Tuberculosis. Forty-five cases were notified with thirty-three deaths as against thirty-five cases and forty-five deaths in the previous year, representing a death rate of fifty and seventy-one per 100,000 of population respectively.

Whooping Cough. 224 cases were notified with 10 deaths as compared with 4 cases and 5 deaths in 1948.

Venereal Diseases. 29 cases of congenital syphillis, 199 cases of acquired syphillis and 323 cases of gonorrhoea were notified during the year. Atten dances at the Venereal Disease Clinic numbered 5,383 as compared with 6,081 in 1949. Of 3,231 samples of blood taken for Kahn test, 690 or 21.3% were found positive.

Tables showing the distribution of cases and deaths from Communicable and Parasitic Diseases according to Districts and the age and sex distribution of deaths from Pulmonary Tuberculosis are shown in Appendices 1 and 2 re-

spectively.

Only 56.6% of all deaths were certified by a medical practitioner as compared with 51% in 1948.

Tables showing the age and sex distribution of deaths from all causes, classification of causes of deaths in infarts under 1 year of age, comparison of births and deaths in infants under 1 year of age for the period 1944-1949 and causes of death in the pre-school child (1-5 years) are shown in Appendices 3,4,5 and 6 respectively.

Hygiene and Sanitation. The Health Department continued to be in charge of the sanitation and scavenging of the capital city, District towns in addition to the rest of the Colony; it is also responsible, inter alia, for the enforcement of regulations governing the erection of new buildings and exten sions in Belize, bakeries, restaurants, hotels, slaughter houses, meat inspection, etc.

Malaria Control. Constant inspection and treatment of vats and other water receptacles, water courses, pools, stc. were maintained during the year.

A programme for the residual spraying of houses in malarious areas with a 5% solution of D.D.T. in kerosene was started in May. Due to shortage of D.D.T. and equipment, only 2,048 houses were sprayed at an average cost of 35.6 cents per house. An average of 100 mgm. D.D.T. powder was used per square foot of surface.

In addition, Paludrine was freely distributed in selected schools as a prophylactic measure.

UNICEF has approved assistance to the extent of U.S. \$22,000 in materials for an expansion of the D.D.T. programme over a period of two years and it is hoped thereby to reduce the attack rate from malaria and other insect-borne diseases considerably. Notwithstanding these measures, it would still be necessary for the World Health Organization to provide a Demonstra tion Team in Malaria if this disease is to be completely eradicated from this Celony.

3,449 blood smears were examined for malaria parasites, 501 or 14.52% were positive. Of the number of positives, 80.8% were found to be P. Falciparum.

Water-Supplies. Thirteen wells were sanitated as public water supplies

in various villages.

Latrine Construction. As a measure of control against Ancylostomiasis and intestinal diseases, a drive was started to get the inhabitants in the rurel areas to put up their own latrines, use them and keep them in sanitary condition. The response was satisfactory in some areas and a total of 575 private pit latrines was erected.

Hospitals. There are six hospitals with a total bedstrength of 187, the central Colony hospital in Belize having 103 beds.

There were 6,301 admissions during the year as compared with 6,015 in

1948, made up as follows:-

Maternity Ward, Belize Hospital. There were 490 deliveries with 2 maternal deaths as compared with 463 deliveries and 3 deaths in the previous year. Four cases of pre-eclamtic toxaemia were treated.

Dental Clinic. Two clinics were held weekly at the Belize Hospital with a total attendance of 2,389 as against 1,522 in 1948. The work consists mainly of extractions, very little prophylactic work being done.

Airport and Port Health Work. No cases of any of the Convention Diseases were seen in the airport or any of the seaports and no quarantine restrictions were imposed against any country.

Maternal Hygiene. Clinics were held at seventeen centres throughout the Colony with a total attendance of 3,712. In Belize the number of cases registered was 112.

Child Hygiene. Clinics were held at nineteen centres with a total attendance of 33,778. In Belize, clinics were held weekly at two centres, one on the north side and the other on the south side of the city. The following statistics show the volume of the work done in Belize:—

School Medical Work. 6,871 examinations were made throughout the schools of the Colony. The diseases chiefly encountered were: substandard nutrition, malaria, dental caries and bronchitis.

A cooked mid-day mal or milk was served to 410 children from governmentassisted- schools daily throughout the school year. The children were selected on the basis of poor nutritional condition and indigent circumstances.
