

VACCINATION REPORT

BIHAR AND ORISSA

for the year.

1918-19.

1. Staff.—Major W. C. Ross, I.M.S., was in charge of the Department from 1st April to the 30th November 1918 and Dr. S. N. Tiwari, from the 1st December 1918 to 31st March 1919.

The office of the Deputy Sanitary Commissioner, North Bihar Circle, was held by Dr. B. P. Mazumdar, throughout the year, and Dr. T. Sebastian, remained in charge of the Chota Nagpur and Orissa Circle and in supervising charge of the Vaccine Depôt during the year.

The office of the Deputy Sanitary Commissioner, South Bihar Circle, was held by:-

- (1) Dr. S. Maitra-from 1st to 30th April 1918,
- (2) Dr. B. P. Mazumdar—from 1st May to 20th September 1918, in addition to his own duties as Deputy Sanitary Commissioner, North Bihar Circle.
- (3) Dr. S. N. Tiwari-from 21st September to 31st March 1919.

The inspecting staff consisted of 20 District Inspectors of Vaccination and 66 Sub-Inspectors of Vaccination (including 3 deputed for duty at the Vaccine Depôt) in addition to the 2 Sub-Assistant Surgeons combining vaccination inspection with other duties in Angul. During the year two additional appointments of Sub-Inspectors were sanctioned for the Dhanbad Subdivision in the district of Manbhum. The total number of Vaccinators employed in the province during the year was 1,059 licensed and 208 paid, against 1,049 licensed and 208 paid in the previous year.

In Municipalities and in the districts of Puri, and Angul, vaccination was done by paid Vaccinators; but otherwise the work throughout the province was carried out under the licensing system, except for the employment of paid Vaccinators for short periods to deal with outbreaks of small-pox.

Heretofore Vaccination, in Sambalpur District, was done by paid Vaccinators; but licensing system was introduced from the last working season.

2. Operations performed.—The total number of operations performed during the year amounted to 972,423 as compared with 1,097,676 last year. The decrease amounts to 125,253 which was due to the widespread prevalence of influenza in the whole of the province during the last working season.

Of the total number of operations in the province, 953,535 were performed by the Vaccination Department as compared with 1,084,031 last year. 914,761 operations were primary and 38,774 revaccinations against 1,055,374 primary and 28,657 revaccinations last year.

There was a decrease of 140,613 in the primary operations and an increase of 10,117 in the revaccination during the year.

Of the total operations performed (953,535), 929,964 equal to 97.52 per cent were successful as compared with 1,061,531 equal to 97.92 last year.

The number of operations performed in Municipalities was 43,537 as compared with 41, 362 last year.

The number of successful operations in Municipalities was 35,213 for primary and 2,772 for revaccination, as compared with 35,570 and 3,043 respectively last year. The ratios of success in Municipalities were 96.28 per cent for primary and 39.80 per cent for revaccination as compared with 96.23 per cent for primary and 69.12 for revaccination. The number of operations performed in rural areas was 909,998 as compared with 1,042,669 last year. Of the former, 878,188 were primary and 31,810 revaccination against 1,018,414 primary and 24,255 revaccination last year. The number of successes was 870,804 for primary and 21,175 for revaccination against 1,008,095 for primary and 14,823 for re-vaccination last year; the ratios of successes being 99.15 primary and 66.56 revaccination as compared with 98.98 primary and 61.11 revaccination last year.

3. Vaccination in districts.—There was a fall of 16,825 operations in the Patna Division as compared with last year, which was shared by the district of Shahabad (10,664) and that of Gaya (6,206).

With the exception of the district of Muzaffarpur, there was a general fall in the operations in all other districts of Tirhut Division, viz., Saran 11,806, Champaran 1,447, and Darbhanga 6,527. Muzaffarpur recorded an increase of 902 operations.

All the districts of the Bhagalpur Division recorded a decrease in the number of operations with the exception of Purnea which showed an excess of 5,721 operations due perhaps to less prevalence of influenza there. The marked decrease was in the district of Monghyr (11,856).

In Orissa Division all the districts show a decrease in the number of operations; the greatest being in Sambal-pur (9,880) and Cuttack (9,712).

There was a general fall in the number of operations in this Division, the greatest being in Ranchi (14,310) and Manbhum (13,222).

4. Vaccination in towns and compulsory areas.—During the year under report the Vaccination Acts were extended to Garhwa Union in Palamau, Dhanbad in Manbhum and Chakradharpur Municipality in Singhbhum. Statement VII shows that during the year, 17,939 children under one year of age, out of an available number of 26,332 or 68·12 per cent were successfully vaccinated.

During the last three years the towns of Bhagalpur and Darbhanga have shown the smallest proportion of work done and the towns of Gaya, Chapra, Monghyr, Cuttack and Balasore have given unsatisfactory returns.

5. Work done in the Native States under the supervision of the Political Agent.—The following tabulated statement shows the results for the last 13 years:—

^{6.} Protection of Infants.—During the year under report the number of children available for vaccination was 944,025 and the number of successful operation was 346,974 equal to 367 per thousand, against 499,705 or 446 per thousand successful operations out of 1,119,606 children available during the last year.

The protection of infents in Municipalities is separately shown in statement VII. It gives a ratio of 681 per thousand of the surviving infant population as compared with 690 in the last year.

7. Incidence and mortality of small-pox.—During the last ten years the total number of deaths from small-pox in the districts of this province has been 75,731.

During the first quinquennium the number of deaths were 29,490 and during the second 46,241. In the last quinquennium the mortality was as follows:—8,979, 14,628, 9,742, 6,687 and 6,205.

The provincial ratios of the mortality from small-pox per 1,000 of population during the last five years have been '22, '42, '28, '19 and '17 respectively.

8. Prevention of small-pox.—Much has been done in the past to prevent small-pox and the mortality from it now, as compared with the pre and early-vacci nation days, has been reduced considerably. But it appears from the figures quoted in paragraph above that the decline in the death-rate from small-has now come to a degree beyond which it does not show much inclination to fall except in the areas where Vaccination Act has been made compulsory and there the decline is progressive.

Vaccination as a measure for prevention of small-pox has proved its efficacy beyond all doubt and the Vaccination Acts, enforcing compulsory vaccination, have been introduced in all Municipal towns and other important places—like Dhanbad—where life is considered more important and objections to its application are considered to be comparatively few. Opposition to vaccination has also gone down considerably, and I do not see much difference between the opposition offered by the urban and the rural populations. Opposition is now shown not so much to vaccination as to vaccination of an infant before twelve months of age.

The attitude of the people towards vaccination in urban and rural areas being almost the same, I agree with my predecessor in recommending that benefits of the Vaccination Acts be extended to rural areas of the province in the same way as they have been extended to urban areas by making them compulsory throughout the province.

9. Inspection of work.—During the year under report the Deputy Sanitary Commissioners inspected 79,610 primary vaccinations as against 155,456 in the previous year. The decline, in the number of vaccinations inspected, is due to the fact that there was no Deputy Sanitary Commissioner in the South Bihar Circle, for vaccination work.

The inspecting work done during the year by the Deputy Sanitary Commissioners has been comprehensive and valuable. They have submitted reports on the efficiency of the staff and the arrangements of work in 15 districts of the province. Action is being taken on these reports in each case.

The Civil Surgeons of the province inspected 52,467 primary and 6,907 revaccination operations against 65,694 primary and 6,385 revaccination last year. According to the existing system of inspection, vaccinated children are collected from villages, falling in a radius of about five or six miles, at places two or three miles apart, on the road through which the inspecting officer travels. The system of requiring vaccinated children to be brought to fixed places for inspection in an area where Vaccination Act is not compulsory, is illegal; and villagers generally resent in bringing their children for inspection, as the Civil Surgeon of Muzaffarpur remarks that "the system of thorough inspection of the work done in the rural areas has suffered by the spirit of independence pervading villagers—resulting in number of children not being produced-even for short distances for the Civil Surgeon's personal inspection." It is not possible for Civil Surgeons to pay more attention to the vaccination work as Major M. H. Thornely, I.M.s., the Civil Surgeon of Cuttack, points out that "the multifarious nature of the duties of the Civil Surgeon of Cuttack renders it quite impossible for him to give the time and attention necessary for directing and supervising the vaccination work of this large district with its difficulties of communication."

The officers of the subordinate inspecting staff are not trained, nor sufficiently paid to attract better class of men. They cannot, therefore, be trusted much. The only other agency for inspection is that of the Deputy Sanitary Commissioners. Their number is, however, limited to three only for the whole province which is evidently not enough for thorough and detailed inspection of the work in the villages. It does not appear to me possible, therefore, that without increasing the superior inspecting staff, the efficiency of the work can be improved very much,

In this connection I would recommend that the creation of the district sanitary service, which has been lately proposed by Government may be taken up early.

10. Supply of Vaccine.—The Vaccine Depôt at Namkum supplied the province with vaccine throughout the year,

The number of calves required for operation has been greatly reduced by the improved technique of operation and by better feeding of calves.

The following tabulated statement shows the number of calves purchased or hired, the number of doses manufactured, the average number of doses yielded per calf, the total gross cost, the total revenue and the average net cost per dose for five years:—

The working cost of the Depôt for the year amounted to Rs. 29,685-9-6 against Rs. 22,183-0-11 last year.

Two severe epidemics of Rinderpest broke out during the year under report, and prompt steps were taken to check their spread. There were 120 attacks and 23 deaths and the Depôt had to be closed and calves discharged on both the occasions.

The cost to the Depôt was greater owing to the rise in the price of all materials.

The loss in revenue was due to a fall of about 80,000 doses of Vaccine in the supply to the Native States.

11. Experimental work.—Further experimental work in connection with the manufacture of vaccine was continued during the year. Distilled water was tried as a diluent in place of Glycerine mixture. In the smaller dilutions the pulp and water mixture gave equally good results as the Glycerinated vaccine. In dilutions of 1 in 5 it gave good results when the diluted vaccine was used within two days of the preparation. After this period, the water diluted vaccine appeared to lose potency. The result of the experiment confirms the view that Glycerine serves not only as a diluent but also as a preservative.

Other experiments were done to determine whether crude pulp when rid of moisture by drying and made into vaccine, keeps up potency. The results have been negative. Further experiments will be continued during the rains.

12. Cost of the Department.—The total cost of the Vaccine Department (excluding the Vaccine Depôt) during the year, as detailed in Statement II, was Rs. 1,10,479 or Rs. 1,737 less than the previous year. The decrease in cost was due to the introduction of licensing system of vaccination in the district of Sambalpur.

The cost per successful operation was Re. 0-1-10 against Re. 0-1-8 in the previous year. The increase in rate is due to the fall in the number of operations.


13. General.—The discipline and work of the staff have been gradually improving. Owing to the wide spread influenza epidemic in the province the anticipated improvements could not be effected.

The staff in general worked fairly well. The work done by the Deputy Sanitary Commissioners in inspecting vaccination and reporting on the efficiency of the staff was very useful. The supervision exercised by Dr. T. Sebastian over the Vaccine Depôt at Namkum has resulted in much improvement of that institution for which he deserves commendation.
