

### VACCINATION REPORT

#### BIHAR AND ORISSA.

FOR THE YEAR

#### 1920-21.

1. Staff. - Dr. S. N. Tiwari was in charge of the Department from 1st April to 11th October 1920 and Major W. C. Ross, I.M.s., from the 12th October 1920 to 31st March 1921.

The office of the Deputy Sanitary Commissioner, North Bihar Circle, was held by Dr. B. P. Muzumdar throughout the year except for two months and seventeen days when he was on privilege leave and Dr. T. Sebastian remained in charge of the Chota Nagpur and Orissa Circle and in supervising charge of the Vaccine Depôt during the year except for five months and ten days when he also availed himself of privilege leave and was on special duty at Bhagalpur. The office of the Deputy Sanitary Commissioner, South Bihar Circle, was held by Dr. S. N. Tiwari throughout the year except for a period of less than four months when Dr. C. Trivedi was officiating as Deputy Sanitary Commissioner.

The inspecting staff consisted of 20 District Inspectors of Vaccination and 68 Sub-Inspectors of Vaccination (including three deputed for duty at the Vaccine Depôt), in addition to the two Sub-Assistant Surgeons combining vaccination inspection with other duties in Angul. The total number of vaccinators employed in the Province during the year was 1,088 licensed and 227 paid, against 1,067 licensed and 221 paid in the previous year.

In Municipalities and in the district of Puri, vaccination was done by paid vaccinators; but otherwise the work throughout the Province was carried out under the licensing system, except for the employment of paid vaccinators by District Boards, and employed temporarily by Civil Surgeons for short periods to deal with outbreaks of small-pox.

In previous years vaccination in Angul was carried out by paid vaccinators, but the licensing system was introduced during the year under report.

2. Operations performed.—The total number of operations performed during the year amounted to 1,060,485 as compared with 1,054,905 last year. The increase amounts to 5,580, which is not very satisfactory as compared with the previous year. Many reports were received of the unwillingness of the people to have their children vaccinated, and of increasing difficulties in realizing fees. As the year was a healthy one, these difficulties cannot be attributed to the prevalence of epidemic disease. They are probably to some extent of an economic nature and due to the increased cost of living, but also to a considerable extent due to political propaganda. Of the total number of operations in the Province, 1,041,481 were performed by the Vaccination Department as compared with 1,020,630 last year. 966,334 operations were primary and 75,147 revaccinations as against 920,075 primary and 100,555 revaccinations last year.

There was an increase of 46,259 in the 'primary operations and decrease of 25,408 in revaccinations during the year. Of the total operations performed (1,041,481), 1,002,986 equal to 96.29 per cent. were successful as compared with 975,537 equal to 95.58 last year. The number of operations performed in Municipalities fell by 13,184 as compared with last year's returns. The total number of operations performed was 43,903 and the number of successful operations was 36,870, of which 31,541 were primary and 5,329 were revaccinations as compared with 35,428 and 10,372 respectively last year.

The ratios of success in Municipalities were 95.09 per cent. for primary operations and 48.98 per cent. for revaccinations as compared with 96.24 per cent. and 51.15 per cent. respectively last year. The number of operations performed in rural areas was 997,578 as compared with 963,543 last year and the ratios of successes were 99.15 per cent. for primary operations and 62.23 for revaccinations.

3. Vaccination in Districts.—Of the three districts of the Patna Division,

Shahabad reported a large increase in the
number of operations performed (20,229)
whilst Patna reported a small increase and Gaya a decrease of over 5,000.
Small-pox was prevalent during the year in Gaya.

There was a general moderate increase in the number of operations reported from all the districts of the Tirhut Division.

The districts of the Bhagalpur Division also recorded small increases

except Monghyr, in which district considerable difficulty was experienced in carrying out the work of vaccination owing to non-co-operation propaganda.

With the exception of Angul all the districts of Orissa recorded increases in the number of operations, the greatest increase being in Puri.

There was a general fall in the number of operations returned from the districts of Chota Nagpur, the greatest decrease being in Manbhum (18,306).

 Vaccination in Towns and Compulsory Areas.—During the year under report the Vaccination Acts were extended to Husainabad Union in Palamau.

Statement VII shows that during the year, 17,066 children under one year of age, out of an available number of 23,705 or 59.45 per cent. were successfully vaccinated.

The towns of Monghyr, Bhagalpur (again) and Darbhanga (again) show the smallest proportion of work done, and the towns of Chapra, Purnea, Cuttack, Balasore and Hazaribagh have also given unsatisfactory returns.

5. Work done in the Native States under the Supervision of the Political Agent.—Vaccination work in the Orissa Feudatory States has steadily developed during recent years under the direction and encouragement of the Political Agent.

Both vaccination and to a large extent revaccination are practically compulsory in the majority of these States.

During the year under report 201,433 primary operations and 345,149 revaccinations were performed as compared with 315,878 and 364,225 respectively in the previous year. As the total population of the Feudatory States is under four millions, these figures are rather extraordinary when compared with the provincial figures, which show a total of roughly one million forty-one thousand operations performed amongst a population of 34,489,846. The number of children born each year in the Feudatory States may be estimated roughly at two lakhs, and of these a considerable number, certainly over 60,000, died in infancy.

6. Protection of infants.—During the year under report the number of children under one year available for vaccination was 978,806 and the number of successful operations was 377,981 equal to 386 per thousand, against 327,955 or 391 per thousand successful operations out of 838,706 children available during the previous year. The protection of infants in Municipalities is separately shown in Statement VII. It gives a ratio of 594 per thousand of the surviving infant population as compared with 743 in the previous year.

These figures are unsatisfactory as they show that more than half the total number of operations are performed on children over one year of age, whilst the ratio of protected children under one year of age has fallen to below 50

per thousand, the total number of operations performed is still in excess of the total number of infants available, as it always has been. In previous years the excess has been very marked, and as there has been a constant excess it must be inferred that the returns are to that extent on the average fictitious.

Civil Surgeons and Deputy Sanitary Commissioners are unanimous in attributing the opposition to vaccination to be concerned more with the age of the child than with the operation itself, and, in view of the strong popular prejudice which exists against the vaccination of infants at an early age, I consider that it is desirable that the Vaccination Act should be amended so as to raise the age for compulsory vaccination to one year instead of six months.

7. Incidence and Mortality of Small-pox.—During the last ten years the total number of deaths from small-pox in the districts of this Province has been 94,305.

During the first quinquennium the number of deaths were 33,783 and during the second 60,522. In each of the last five years the mortality was as follows:—9,742, 6,687, 6,205, 18,514 and 19,374.

The provincial ratios of the mortality from small-pox per thousand of population during the last five years have been 28, 19, 17, 53 and 56 respectively.

8. Prevention of Small-pox.—The constant and considerable mortality noted in the preceding paragraph is, in my opinion, a complete demonstration both of the insufficiency and of the inefficiency of the existing arrangements for vaccination.

It is well known—in fact it is an admitted axiom—that thorough vaccination can and does stamp out small-pox altogether, and in the light of that knowledge, and in face of the above facts, there is great necessity for a more definite vaccination policy.

I do not consider that small-pox can be effectively dealt with and stamped out unless vaccination is made compulsory throughout the Province, and I would recommend that the Vaccination Act should be modified so as to extend the age within which vaccination is required, to one year, and should be generally enforced; that vaccination should be free; and that the supervision and control of vaccination should be delegated to District Boards and Municipalities and their Health Officers.

9. Inspection of Work.—During the year under report the Deputy Sanitary Commissioners inspected 145,627 primary vaccinations as against 24,905 in the previous year. The increase is considerable and satisfactory. The inspecting work done by the Deputy Sanitary Commissioners has been comprehensive and they have submitted valuable reports on the efficiency of the staff and the arrangements in 19 out of the 21 districts in the Province.

The Civil Surgeons of the Province inspected 53,177 primary and 9,047 revaccination operations against 50,044 primary and 9,065 revaccination last year. It should be noted that the methods of inspection of Civil Surgeons and Deputy Sanitary Commissioners are different. Civil Surgeons inspect the new work which has just been done and the numbers returned by them are therefore smaller, whereas Deputy Sanitary Commissioners inspect all the children under ten years of age, and look at old work as well as new work and also look for unvaccinated children and children who are marked with s nall-pox, and they also examine vaccinators' registers and other records in the villages where they can be verified and checked.

10. Officers of the Inspecting staff,—The officers of the inspecting staff have not yet attained to a very satisfactory standard of efficiency. A few of them are energetic and capable, and these men are being rapidly promoted and put in the most responsible positions. The majority, however, are careless and negligent and do not attempt to carry out their duties honestly and efficiently. The supervision and control of a large staff which is distributed throughout the Province is a matter of considerable difficulty for a central

office with only three Deputy Sanitary Commissioners to carry on the work, and it is only possible to attain a moderate degree of efficiency by strict enforcement of the departmental rules and regulations and standing orders.

- II. Supply of Vaccine.—The Vaccine Depôt at Namkum supplied the Province with vaccine throughout the year. A large supply of vaccine is held in reserve and the necessary stores and supplies for manufacture are in ample stock. 1,869,908 do ses of vaccine were manufactured during the year as compared with 3,504,589 doses last year. The number of doses issued was 2,628,548 against 2,599,744 in 1919-20. The number of doses in stock at the end of the year was 1,493,759. The number of calves used during the year was 362 as compared with 602 in the previous year, and the average yield of crude vaccine was over 55 grammes per calf as compared with 48.6 grammes in the previous year. The number of calves required has been considerably reduced by improvement in the technique of operating and by the better feeding of calves, and the working costs are therefore low and compare most favourably with the costs of production in other provinces. The working costs of the depôt for the year amounted to Rs. 24,923 as compared with Rs. 25,048 in the previous year. The average cost of the vaccine per dose works out at 2.5 pies on the gross expenditure and to 5 pie on the net expenditure when the receipts are taken into account.
- 12. Vaccine Depot and Cold Storage.—The Vaccine Depôt was closed for manufacture twice during the working season in November and January on account of outbreaks of rinderpest. There were 65 attacks and 12 deaths during the two epidemics. The work of manufacture was seriously interfered with during the working season and considerable loss was incurred on account of the interruption of work, the deaths of calves, and the loss of vaccine.

During the year under report cholera vaccine and influenza vaccine were stored in the depôt and issued throughout the Province as required.

A class for the training of candidates for the vaccination inspecting cadre was held in February and March and seven candidates were trained and qualified.

The cold storage plant, which is essential for the preservation of the vaccine, gave trouble throughout the year and was with difficulty kept going until the end of the working season. The plant has now been dismantled and is under repair, and the reserve stock of vaccine is in cold storage in Calcutta.

13. Experimental work.—Further experimental work was carried out at the depôt during the year with some interesting results. With a view to producing a cleaner and purer vaccine, disinfectants were experimented with and it was found that the addition of 2 per cent. boric acid improved the quality of the vaccine by diminishing the number of other organisms present without decreasing its potency. After being kept in cold storage for six months the boric vaccine gave cleaner and better vaccination marks than the ordinary vaccine.

Experiments were also made with a view to producing a less fluid vaccine as there is a considerable wastage at present owing to the careless handling of the tubes by the vaccinators. It was found that a mixture of 5 per cent. starch and 2 per cent. boric acid with 93 per cent. water after boiling can be used to dilute and thicken the crude glycerinated vaccine with good results and without impairing its potency.

Further experiments are being made with this mixture before it is adopted for general issue, and if the results are satisfactory, a thicker and purer vaccine will be issued next season.

14. Cost of the Department.—The total cost of the Vaccine Department (excluding the Vaccine Depôt) during the year, as detailed in Statement II, was Rs 1,56,912 or Rs. 41,180 more than the previous year. The increase in cost was due to the increased rate of pay sanctioned by Government to the inspecting staff.

The cost per successful operation was 2 anna 5 pies against 1 anna 10 pies in the previous year. The increase in rate is due to the increased rate of pay.

15. General.—Owing to the lateness of the Puja holidays the work of vaccinators did not begin until November and it was considerably interfered with throughout the season by the increasing hostility of the people in various parts of the Province and by the discontent of the vaccinators caused by increasing difficulties in realization of fees. The latter difficulty was to some extent overcome by the sanction of a bonus of Rs. 20 to each vaccinator who worked satisfactorily during the season.

The results of the year's working in face of these difficulties are on the whole satisfactory. It is, however, a matter for serious consideration as to how long the existing arrangements can continue to work satisfactorily. The vaccinators are underpaid and discontented and find difficulty in many districts in realizing their fees. An increase in the rate of fee is necessary if the work is to continue under the present system, but I do not consider that this course will solve the ultimate problem, and I recommend a change of policy from the licensing system to a system of free vaccination under the supervision and control of the District Boards.

In conclusion, I desire to bring to the notice of Government the large amount of useful work done by the three Deputy Sanitary Commissioners during the year in inspecting work and reporting on the efficiency of the staff and work in almost all the districts of the Province. Dr. C. N. Banerjee has also carried out his duties as Superintendent of the Vaccine Depôt in a capable and satisfactory manner.
