A perfect copy of probably a unique edition of the earliest Fortune Telling book in English. There are three earlier editions, each known by a single or two copies, but the earliest recorded to bear the Kingston imprint is that of 1626, represented by a single copy in the British Museum. The above is a perfect copy, in very good condition, save for a natural defect in one leaf; and is probably the only survivor of many editions between Orwin's of 1592 and the first recorded Kingston edition of 1626.

Thomas Wotton (1521-1589), "The English Grolier," was the son of Sir Edward Wotton, treasurer of Calais, who was nominated by Henry VIII as one of his executors. Thomas Wotton was a great Book Collector, and in the habit of binding his books similar in style to his friend Grolier, whose motto he imitated, resulting in his being known as the "English Grolier." Fine specimens from his library are very scarce, as the greater part passed into the Chesterfield family.

THE FIRST EDITION of one of the earliest Books, with copper-plate engravings published in England. The date is variously given by different bibliographers. Watts gives 1588; the British Museum Catalogue 1590; the Huth Catalogue and Lowndes 1596.

Broughton was satirised by Ben Jonson in his "Volpone," also in the "Alchemy." He dedicated the "Consent of Scripture" to Queen Elizabeth.

"In 'this little book of great pains,' as Broughton himself calls it, he attempts to settle the scripture chronology, and to correct profane writers by it. The work is interesting, written in a lively style, full of learning and ingenuity, but removing all difficulties with a quaint oracular dogmatism, which entertains rather than convinces."

According to Drake ("Shakespeare and his Times") this is one of the books which "Shakespeare was well acquainted with." A writer in the Athenaeum points out that Shakespeare found in Castillonnois the description of the famous swordsman (Peter Mount), who is alluded to in Hamlet.

Interspersed through the work are a number of stories designed to add a lighter tone to the book.

S.T.C. 6254. Dedicated in verse to the Countess of Pembroke. A little volume of the greatest scarcity, two editions published in 1592 fetching £555 and £500 respectively and the edition of 1595 £450, all in the Christie-Miller sale of 1923-4.

The 1594 edition, besides containing the FIRST APPEARANCE OF DANIEL'S "CLEOPATRA," a tragedy modelled after Seneca, contains many revisions of the text. Daniel also displaced the prose dedication to Lady Pembroke with a sonnet, withdrew a few of the previously printed sonnets in favour of new ones, and added twenty-three stanzas to "Rosamond."

"The Tragedie of Cleopatra," which contains a further five-page poetical dedication to the Countess of Pembroke, is important as one of the dramatic versions of Cleopatra's history in Elizabethan England which preceded Shakespeare's "Antony and Cleopatra," first published in the folio of 1623. The earliest of these versions was a translation of Garnier's "Marc Antoine" by Sir Philip Sidney's sister, Mary Countess of Pembroke in 1592. Daniel's tragedy, an original work, was issued as a sequel to the Countess's piece.

Daniel, among native contemporaries, seems also, in no small measure, to have quickened Shakespeare's sonnettearing energy. The "Delia" actually contains 55 sonnets and it is interesting to note that Daniel's prefatory sonnet to the Countess of Pembroke touches the same note in its concluding couplet, as is expressed in Shakespeare's XXXVIII sonnet.

Daniel wrote:

"Whereof the travail I may challenge mine,  
But yet the glory, madam, must be thine."

whereas Shakespeare terminates his sonnet:

"If my slight Muse do please these curious days,  
The pain be mine, but thine shall be the praise."

A very rare and interesting work, listed by Collier in his "Rarest Books in the English language," Vol. I, p. 374. It may be safely assumed that the copies which Hitchcock mentions he distributed some years prior to this edition, were actually manuscript copies and that the above is the first edition. After the dedication "to Englande" follows a page of verses by "Fraunces Hitchcocke, to the Readers of this his brothers booke," and to it is added an address "to the frendly Reader."

It appears that Robert Hitchcock himself was a soldier, but his object in writing this work was to encourage the fisheries, furnishing his work with a table and a map to illustrate and enforce his design. An interesting chapter is devoted to "Beggars and Vacaboundes"; "And why you appointe twelve of them to every Shipp, I thinke they maie carie the Shippe awaie, and become Pirates."

The very rare issue, with "Throckemorton" so spelt on the title-page, of which only two copies are recorded.

The above work was published by the government as an official justification of the execution of Francis Throckmorton after his trial in the Guild Hall. Throckmorton's plot was concerned with the deposing of Queen Elizabeth and the succession of Mary Queen of Scots to the English throne, by means of an invasion of England by Spanish troops under the Duke of Guise.

William Wodwall, the Author, was in the year 1583 schoolmaster of the Free Grammar School, Birmingham, Warwickshire. This we learn from one of the marginal notes in the book (see page 61 verso):—

"At Birmingham in Warwickshire," "the Church being robbed of two rich velvet paul cloathes, and a gret somme of money, which was the overplus of the rentes of a free grammar Schoole in that towne, which sayd money ought to have ben employed to the use of the Schoole and the Schoolemaster, who was myself at that time. This fact was done at Birmicham in Warwycksheere, 1583."

The Manuscript was described in "Notes and Queries" of April 3rd, 1869. It was then in the library of Lord Foley, and the description given is as follows:—

"The work is preceded by commendatory verses—some in English and some in Latin—from John Howlett, M.A.; Thomas Vian, M.A.; John Blewet, M.A.; Elias Wrench, M.A.; Christopher Windle, and Edward Melinchamp. Of these persons, Elias Wrench—who styles himself Gymnasiarcha Glocestrensie, Head Master of, I suppose, the Free School in that city—is mentioned in Wood's Athene, iii. 19, and John Howlett in Wood's Fasti, i. 184. The latter, who came, as Wood states, from Rutlandshire, entered the Society of Jesus in 1571. These commendatory poems will not bear quotation, except that by Vian, which is short and somewhat amusing:—

"Fayre Babylonian walles were buylt with bryck by fayrest Queen  
Semiramis, and walles of Rome with stones erected ben,  
Lowe Countrey townes, where stones do want, immured are with mudde,  
But Castle Coeur adorned is, with newe found Wall of Wod."

Castle Coeur, as may be inferred from Mr. Vian's last line, is the name given by our author to England.

The original title of the work was simply "The Acts of Queen Elizabeth," to which "allegorized" was added at some subsequent period. The addition indicates the nature of the author's design. The leading facts in the reign of the celebrated Queen, and more especially those which relate to the active contest carried on throughout it between Roman Catholics and Protestants, are represented under the disguise of a war between the Devil, the World, and the Flesh on the one side, and Conscience on the other. The object of the assailants is to dispossess Conscience from Castle Coeur, and the actions of these opposing parties, the attack and defence in this great contest, are divided into Six Assaults or Conflicts, each of which forms the subject of a separate canto of the poem.

The "Sixth Conflict" deals with the Armada at great length, presents the reader with drawings of the whips for the torture of men and those for similar application to women found ready prepared for use in England aboard the ship of Don Pedro de Valdez. It also makes mention of the preparations in England for defence, the Queen's visit to Tilbury, and the banners and streamers of the designed invaders exhibited at Paul's Cross. Disappointed in his endeavours against Castle Coeur, both by sea and land, "Sathan," according to our author, stirred up Martin Marprelate to "deface" the English church. From Marprelate we proceed to Hacket and Coppinger, and the opinions of various sectaries concerning marriage:—

"For wyves in common some would have,  
and some to common were,  
Some others had no wives at all,  
some marriage would forswear,  
Some lawfull mariadge did deme  
and were of that opinion,  
Some in a corner more esteem  
a pretty pleasant minion."

In the course of his long work, it will be seen that the industrious author has been careful to introduce almost all the leading public events of the period. But the great oddity and peculiar feature of the work is the number of marvels of all sorts which the author crowds into his pages. Not a comet, nor an earthquake; not a deep snow, nor a great flood, nor a long drought; not a monstrous birth, nor a destructive fire; nor a great fish cast ashore, nor an

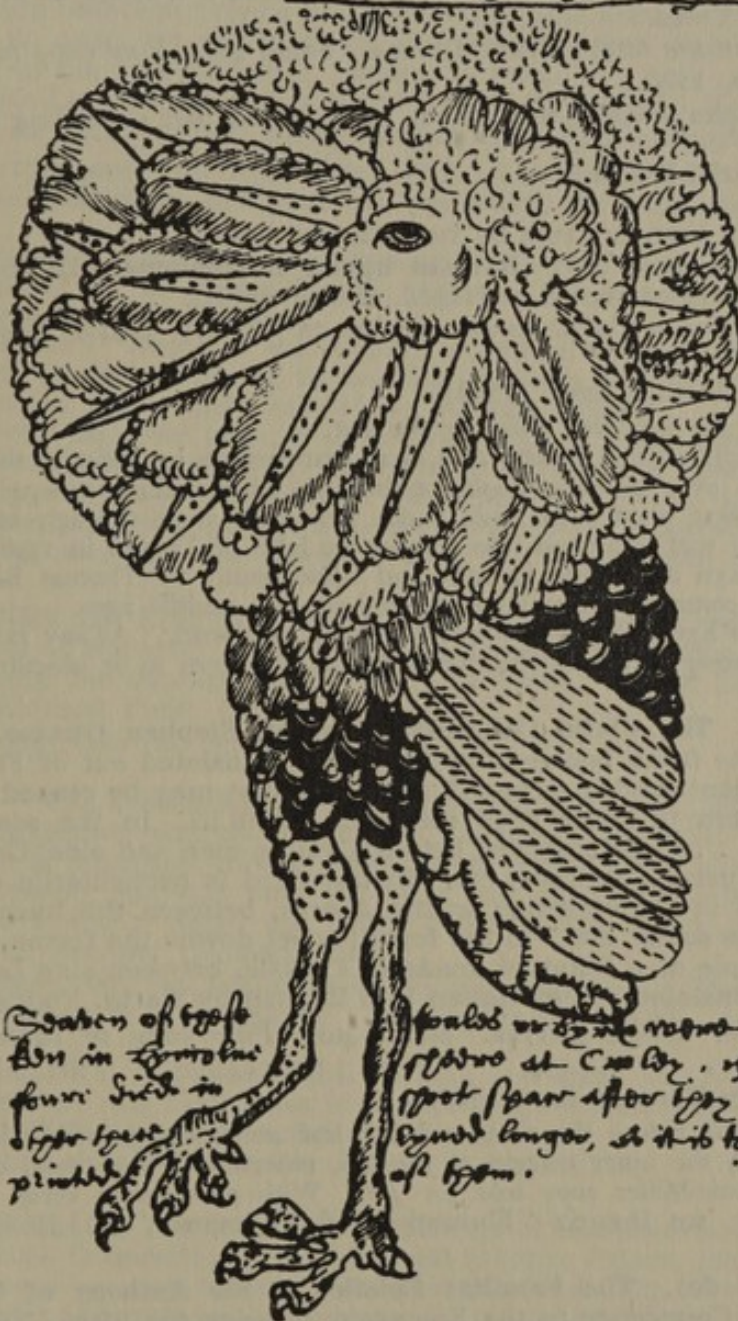

outbreak of pestilence in a crowded filthy town, but is chronicled in the author's most impressive manner, and "improved" by application to the condition or the fortunes of Castle Coeur.

In this Manuscript the Author gives us a true picture of the manners of his period, and of many of the thoughts of the general mass of the people, he is a faithful illustrator. In himself he stands forth in his work as a man possessed of many excellent qualities—a thorough lover of good things, and with a heart overflowing with piety and gratitude, but with an intellect only partially emancipated from the inherited superstitions and follies of his time.

This work, the encyclopædia of the middle ages, was first written in Latin at the close of the 13th century. It extends over nineteen books, embracing all the various departments of human knowledge. It was first printed in Basle about 1470, and went through fourteen or more editions before 1500. It was translated into English by John of Trevisa in 1398, and this version was printed by Wynkyn de Worde in 1495 and subsequently by Thomas Berthelet in 1535. It was the source of common information throughout the middle ages.

Shakespeare is supposed to have been well acquainted with this work. At any rate it often throws light on allusions relating to natural history which at first seem to be obscure.

John Harpsfield (1516-1578) was chaplain to Bishop Bonner, and Wood describes him as a "grand zealot for the Roman Catholic religion," and Bale calls him Dr. Sweetlips, from his smooth words and fair discourse.

Bishop Fisher's "Sermon" was preached in the vernacular, before Wolsey and Warham, at Paul's Cross, on the occasion of the burning of Martin Luther's writings in the churchyard, a discourse which was severely handled by William Tyndale.

Bound with the above pieces is an imperfect copy of James Brooks's "Sermon very notable, fructeful, and Godlie, made at Paules crosse the xii. daie of Novēbre, in the first yere of the gracious reigne of our Sovereigne Ladie Quene Mary. . . . Newly imprinted and perused againe by the author, and upon occasion somewhat augmented." [London: R. Caly, 1554.]

Hooker's "Ecclesiasticall Politie" was completed in 1597. Puritan opponents attempted to counteract its effects by the publication of the above "letter." The latter is clearly the work of some experienced puritan controversialist. Dr. Wordsworth suggests that it was by Andrew Willett. The writer's friends pretended that the attack so wounded Hooker "that it was not the least cause to procure his death." But William Covel, who issued a reply—"A Just and Temperate Defence"—in 1603, asserted that "he contemned it in his wisdom," although had he lived he would have answered it. Notes by Hooker on grace, the sacraments, predestination, etc., which were intended to form a reply to the "Christian Letter," have been printed by Keble from the manuscripts preserved in Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, and Trinity College, Dublin.

An uncut book of this early period is of very rare occurrence. The above copy has the original blank leaf at the end.

"Not the least of James's many ambitions was the desire to excel as an author. He left a body of writings which entitle him to a unique place among the English kings since Alfred for width of intellectual interest and literary faculty. His efforts were inspired by his preceptor George Buchanan, whose memory he cherished in later years. His first work was in verse, *Essays of a Prentice in the Divine Art of Poesie*, containing seventeen sonnets, 'Ane Metaphoricall invention of a tragedy called Phoenix,' a short poem 'Of Time,' translations from Du Bartas, Lucan and the Book of Psalms, and prose tract entitled 'Ane short treatise, containing some Reulis and Cautelis to be observit and eschewit in Scottis Poesie.' The volume is introduced by commendatory sonnets, including one by Alexander Montgomerie. The chief interest of the book lies in the 'Treatise' and the prefatory sonnets 'To the Reader' and 'Sonnet decifring the perfyte poete.' . . . It has been surmised that it was compiled from the exercises written when the author was Buchanan's pupil at Stirling, and that it was directly suggested by his preceptor's *De Prosodia* and his annotations in Vives. On the other hand it shows intimate acquaintance with the critical reflections of Ronsard and Du Bellay, and of Gascoigne in his *Notes of Instruction* (1575)." —Encyclopaedia Britannica.

About 1579, Knewstub appears to have become eminent as a controversialist, and was especially prominent as a writer against the teaching of Henry Nicholas, the founder of the sect known as the Family of Love. Nicholas taught an anabaptist mysticism, entirely without dogma, yet of exalted ideals. He no doubt imbibed his chief doctrines from David Joris (d. 1556). Love of humanity was clearly the familists essential rule of life. Although regarded as a protestant sect, Nicholas derived his constitution of the priesthood entirely from the Roman Catholic hierarchy.

The above work is based on Nicholas's "Evangelium Regni."

Leland's antiquarian tour through England extended from 1534 to 1543. He intended his finding to be the basis of a great work on the "History and Antiquities of this Nation," and spared himself neither labour nor cost. He claimed to have visited almost every bay, river, lake, mountain, valley, moor, city, castle, manor-house, monastery and college in the land. The above work was published by John Bale after his death. Bale added long notes of his own interpolated in Leland's text, also his own "Register of the Names of English writers, whom the second part of his work 'De Scriptoribus Britanniae' shall comprehend."

The above copy belonged to Sir Henry Spelman (1564?-1641), historian and antiquary, and bears his signature on the title-page: "Sr. Henry Spelman."

The Christie-Miller copy of this very rare book sold for £80 in 1925, although shaved and wormed in the margin. In the present copy the outer margins of about the first thirty leaves have been repaired, and there is a small worm hole in the lower margin of a few lines, but the text is quite complete, and the margins wide.

The book itself is of exceptional interest and rarity. The major portion is concerned with advice as to the use of food and separate chapters are devoted to Meats, Bread, Wine, Fleash, Fishe, Sauces, "of Grayne, Pulse, Rotes and Herbes," Fruites, etc. etc.

Gratarolus was an Italian who was compelled to leave his country on account of his having embraced the Calvinist faith. He practised physic at Bâle, and died in 1568. Thomas Newton, the translator, was famed as a poet, physician and divine.

He also wrote English verses with ease and fluency, and translated several works from the Latin.

William of Ockham (or Occam), an English monk and scholastic philosopher of the 14th century, was a native of Ockham, in Surrey. He entered the Franciscan order; was sent to study at Paris under the celebrated Duns Scotus; became a fellow of Merton College, Oxford, and a renowned teacher of the Scholastic philosophy. He was the greatest dialectician of his age, and obtained the name of "the Invincible Doctor." He asserted without reserve the rights of temporal sovereigns against the papal claims, and denied to the Pope any authority in secular affairs. It is said that Luther had the works of Ockham at his fingers' end, and that he was the only schoolman in his library whom he esteemed.

The translator, Sir John Harrington, was godson of Queen Elizabeth. Among other things, he translated for the amusement of the ladies of the court the story of Giocondo, from the twenty-eighth book of Ariosto's "Orlando Furioso," and his translation was handed about in manuscript till it fell into the hands of the queen. She reprimanded Harrington for corrupting the morals of her ladies by translating the least seemly part of Ariosto's work, and ordered him as a punishment to leave the court for his country house till he had made a translation of the whole. To this we owe the translation of the "Orlando Furioso," which was first published in folio in 1591, and reissued in 1607 and 1634. It is written in the same stanza as the original, and is easy and flowing. It is rather a paraphrase than a translation. As a preface to it Harrington wrote "An Apologie of Poetrie," an essay in criticism which resembles Sir Philip Sidney's treatise of the same name. The most remarkable part of it is that concerned with his use of metre, especially his defence of two-syllabled and three-syllabled rhymes. (D.N.B.).

According to the D.N.B. Forman records in his printed diary that "in 1600 he wrote out the two copies of *De Arte Memoratus* by Appolonius Niger." This evidently infers that he actually made two copies of the book and the present volume contains the whole of one copy and four leaves of the other, the latter including a colophon which reads "Explicit ars notoria cu figuris . . . . This booke and al the figures and signes therein contained as you here find yt was drawn out and writen according to the old coppie by Simon Forman gentlemá and d. of phisick with his owne hand, 1600 Anno Elizab. 42, June." The colophon to the complete copy is in latin. This is followed by nine columns of spells and invocations.

After Forman's death the volume seems to have passed with the rest of his astrological manuscripts to Richard Napier and subsequently to WILLIAM LILLY, who says in his *History of his Life and Times* (1822 ed., p. 76, foot-note), "Among Dr. Napier's MSS. I had an *Ars Notoria* written by S. Forman in large vellum." It also carries the bookplate of George Wighte of Gothurst.

The illuminated diagrams represent Grammar (3), Dialectic (2), Rhetoric (4), Physics, Music, Arithmetic (3), Astronomy (6), "Generalia" (4), Philosophy (7), Geometry (2), Theology (5), Chastity, Justice and Taciturnity, 41 in all.

Forman was a curious and very interesting character, not unskilled in the arts of astrology and medicine, for the practicing of which he many times suffered imprisonment. Ben Jonson refers to the fame of his philtres in "Epiceñe" (iv. 1). In Richard Niccol's poem entitled "Overbury's Vision" (1616), Overbury is made to say that he often crossed the river to Lambeth, where:—

"Forman was, that fiend in human shape,  
That by his art did act the devil's ape."

Bulwer devoted much attention to the discovery of methods for communicating knowledge to the deaf and dumb. Jonson, although he appears to have had nothing to do with the offensive passage, voluntarily imprisoned himself with them.

The part of Moll Cut-Purse is first introduced in this edition. The plot of this scarce piece (originally published in 1618) seems to be founded on the novel of the Curious Impertinent in *Don Quixote*. The play was written by way of making the ladies amends for a comedy called *A Woman is a Weathercock*, which Field had written some years before, and whose very title seemed to be a satire on their sex.

Field was the most popular impersonator of youthful rôles in Shakespeare's day, and a member of Shakespeare's Company. In the above play occur several very interesting references to the Fortune Theatre and to Shakespeare's character of Falstaff, etc., e.g.:—

"Faith I have a great mind to see Long-Meg and the Ship at the Fortune."

"Tarquin was a block-head, if he had had any wit and could have spoke, Lucrece had never been ravished, she would have yealded I warrant thee."

The Arms on the reverse of the title and the two engraved plates are only found in Large Paper Copies, and the occurrence of both plates is of excessive rarity. The first of these plates consists of an anagram on Edward Benlowes and verses in English by Fletcher between two vases of flowers, and the second an engraving of a ship in full-sail up a river, beneath a glaring sun. Above the words "Charissimo E. B. P. Fletcher" and beneath, verses in Latin with a second anagram on Benlowes.

Fletcher's "Purple Island" is cited by Dyce in his edition of "The Tempest." Drake ("Shakespeare and his Times," pp. 622, 623), says that, although not published until 1633, these poems were certainly written before 1610.

It is written in twelve cantos of seven-line stanzas, and is an elaborate allegorical description of the human body, and of the vices and virtues to which man is subject. There are many anatomical notes in prose. The body is represented as an island, of which the bones stand for the foundation, the veins for brooks, and so forth in minute detail. Fletcher imitates the "Faery Queene." Quarles calls him "the Spencer of this age," and Fletcher eulogises his master in canto vi, stanzas 51-2.

S.T.C. 11883. The first edition of the first great scientific book published in England. It has obtained for its author the fame which Dryden predicts in his epistle to Dr. Charlton: "Gilbert shall live till loadstones cease to draw."

"His merit was immediately recognised both in England and on the continent. Bacon mentions Gilbert with respect in the "Novum Organum." The author had worked at his subject for many years, revising and experimenting. He begins by a summary of existing knowledge about the magnet, exactly resembling the commencement of a modern scientific essay. The next part is characteristic of his own time, and is an account of the names of the loadstone and their etymology. The remainder is an investigation of the properties of the magnet, illustrated by diagrams and relating numerous experiments. The attraction of the magnet, its direction in relation to the poles of the earth, its variation and declination are treated in separate divisions. He does not neglect to point out the practical bearing of these points in navigation, and how the declination may be used in discovering the latitude at sea. His general conclusion is that the phenomena of magnetism are explained by regarding the earth as one vast spherical magnet." (D.N.B.).

The two verse dedications by Richard Nicols, which are often wanting, have been supplied from a slightly smaller copy.

Mr. Hazlitt, in his "Shakespeare's Library," reprints a portion of this volume as the foundation story of King Lear; he also points out that this edition differs from the earlier ones.

Ward, in his "History of Dramatic Poetry," remarks:—

"It is possible that the pretty title *The Winter's Tale* was suggested to Shakespeare by that of a 'Winter Night's Vision,' an addition to 'The Mirrour for Magistrates,' published in 1610, the year when *The Winter's Tale* was perhaps written."

"A Mirrour for Magistrates" was edited and partly written by Richard Nicols, who contributed to this, the last and only complete impression, the set of legends comprised under the general title of a "Winter Night's Vision," and an original poem called "England's Eliza," which open with new title-pages on Oo3 and Eee2. Baldwin's portion has a new title on S6, as follows:—"The Variable Fortune and Onhappie Falles of such Princes as hath happened since the Conquest. Wherein may be scene the instabilitie and change of state in great Personages." Higgin's preface, etc., are retained, but not Baldwin's, and although Blenerhasset's second part is incorporated, the preliminary matter and prose inductions are omitted, as has

. . . Jonson, in his "Timber: or Discoveries made upon Men and Matters" (at end of vol. 2), gives his opinion upon Shakespeare as follows:—

"I remember, the Players have often mentioned it as an honour to Shakespeare, that in his writing (whatsoever he penn'd) hee never blotted out a line. My answer hath been, would he had blotted a thousand. Which they thought a malevolent speech. I had not told posterity this, but for their ignorance, who choose that circumstance to commend their friend by wherein he most faulted. And to justifie mine owne candor (for I lov'd the man, and doe honour his memory (on this side idolatry) as much as any). He was (indeed) honest, and of an open, and free nature, had an excellent Phantsie, brave notions and gentle expressions; wherein hee flow'd with that facility, that sometimes it was necessary he should be stop'd . . . There was ever more in him to be praysed than to be pardoned."

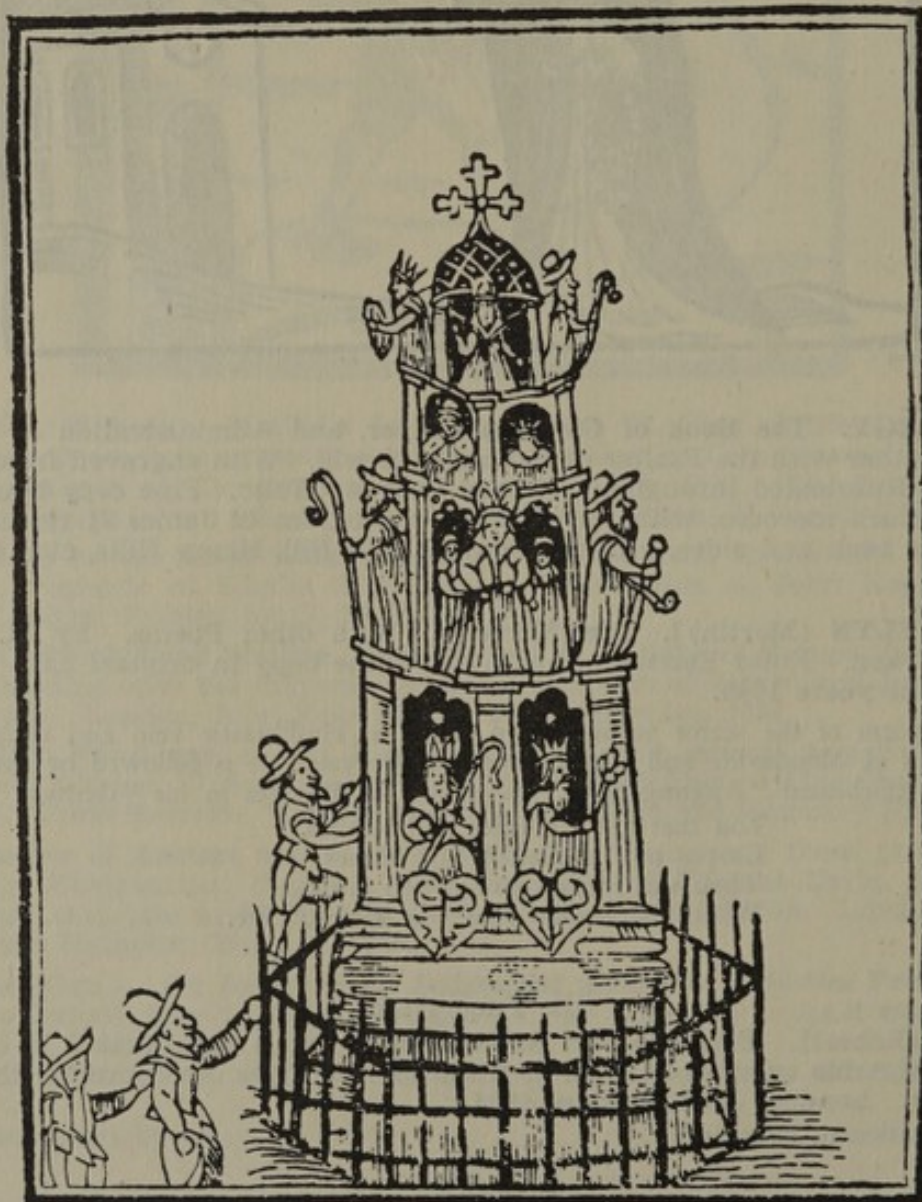

Sir Sidney Lee, in his *Life of Shakespeare*, writes:—

"In the autumn and winter of 1603 an exceptionally virulent outbreak of the plague led to the closing of the theatres in London for fully six months. The King's players were compelled to make a prolonged tour in the provinces, and their normal income seriously decreased. For two months from the third week in October, the Court was temporarily installed at Wilton, the residence of William Herbert, third earl of Pembroke, a nobleman whose literary tastes were worthy of a nephew of Sir Philip Sidney. Late in November Shakespeare's company was summoned thither by the royal officers to perform before the New King." Etc.

At the Restoration Milton, fearing arrest, concealed himself in a friend's house in Bartholomew Close. He remained there during the long debates as to the list of regicides to be excepted from pardon. On 16 June, 1660, it was ordered by the House of Commons that Milton's "Defensio" and John Goodwin's "Obstructors of Justice" should be burnt by the common hangman, and that Milton and Goodwin should be indicted by the attorey-general, and taken into custody by the sergeant-at-arms. The above proclamation was issued on 13 August ordering the surrender of all copies of the books named. It states that both the Authors had hitherto concealed themselves. Milton was arrested in the course of the summer, but in the next session it was ordered that he should be released on paying his fees. The Indemnity Act freed him from all legal consequences of his actions.

Whereas *John Milton*, late of Westminster in the County of Middleſex, hath published in Print two ſederal Books, The one Intituled, *Johannis Miltoni Angli pro Populo Anglicano Defensio, contra Claudii Anonymi, alijs Salmasii, Defensionem Regiam*; And the other in Answer to a Book Intituled, *The Pourtraiſure of his Sacred Majesty in his Solitude and Sufferings*. In both which are contained ſundry Treasonable Paſſages againſt Us and Our Government, and moſt Impious endeavours to juſtify the horrid and unmatchable Murther of Our late Dear Father, of Glorious Memory.

And whereas *John Goodwin*, late of Coleman-ſtreet, London, Clerk, hath alſo published in Print, a Book Intituled, *The Obſtrudors of Juſtice*, written in defence of the traitorous Sentence againſt his ſaid late Majesty. And whereas the ſaid *John Milton*, and *John Goodwin*, are both ſed, or ſo obſcure themſelves, that no endeavours

uſed for their apprehenſion can take effect, whereby they might be brought to Legal Tryal, and deſervedly receive condigne puniſhment for their Treasons and Offences.

Now to the end that Our good Subjects may not be corrupted in their Judgements, with ſuch wicked and Traiterous principles, as are diſperſed and ſcattered throughout the beſorementioned Books: We, upon the motion of the Commons in Parliament now aſſembled, do hereby ſtrictly charge and Command all

and every Perſon and Perſons whatſoever, who live in any City, Burrough, or Town Incorporated, with in this Our Kingdom of England, the Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, in whoſe hands any of thoſe Books are, or hereafter ſhall be, That they upon pain of Our high Diſpleaſure, and the forfeiture thereof, do forthwith, upon publication of this Our Command, or within Ten dayes immediately following, deliver, or cauſe the ſame to be delivered to the Mayor, Bailiffs, or other chief Officer or Magistrate, in any of the ſaid Cities, Burroughs, or Towns Incorporated, where ſuch perſon or perſons ſo live; or, if living out of any City, Burrough, or Town Incorporated, then to the next Juſtice of Peace adjoining to his or their dwelling or place of abode; or if living in either of Our Universities, then to the Vice-Chancellor of that University where he or they do reſide.

And in default of ſuch voluntary delivery, which We do expect in obſervance of Our ſaid Command, That then and after the time beſore limited, expired, the ſaid Chief Magistrate of all and every the ſaid Cities, Burroughs, or Towns Incorporated, the Juſtices of the Peace in their ſederal Counties, and the Vice-Chancellors of Our ſaid Universities reſpectively, are hereby Commanded to ſeize and Take, all and every the Books aſoſaid, in whoſe hands or poſſeſſion ſoever they ſhall be found, and certify the names of the Offenders unto Our Privy Council.

And the ſaid Sheriffs are hereby alſo required, in time of holding ſuch Aſſizes, to cauſe the ſame to be publickly burnt by the hand of the common Hangman.

And We do further ſtrictly Charge and Command, That no man hereafter preſume to Print, Blend, Sell, or Diſperſe any the aſoſaid Books, upon pain of Our heavy Diſpleaſure, and of ſuch further Punishment, as for their preſumption in that behalf, may any way be inflicted upon them by the Lawes of this Realm.

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**STROLLING PLAYERS IN SHAKESPEARE'S TIME.**

The conditions attaching in Shakespeare's time to stage plays, made it obligatory on the players of procuring a license for the exercise of their function, from a peer of the realm or “other honourable personage of greater degree.” In the absence of such credential they were pronounced to be of the status of rogues, vagabonds, or sturdy beggars, and to be liable to humiliating punishments. In the case of the above letter it is safe to assume that the actors in question were appearing without the necessary license. In 1603 James Ist sought to check an admitted abuse whereby the idle parasites of a magnate's household were wont to plead his “license” by way of exemption from the penalties of vagrancy or disorder. Quoting from the letter:—

“Understanding that there are certayn Players of comon Enterludes, belonging to some Noble-man, that travell, up and downe, those parts, usinge the same contrary to the Lawe. These are, therefore, to pray and require you, forthwth, to take Order, that some of the Chiefest of Them be Bounde to make their psonall appearance att the next Assizes for that County (Norfolk) to answer the same. And if thei shall refuse to fynde Suertyes, as aforesaid, to comytt them to the gayle, there to remayne, till they shall so do.” Etc.

The original ordinance for the suppression of stage plays was issued on Sept. 2, 1642. The actor was hated, both on account of his profession and as the minion of the despot. The puritan feared that the performance of an apparently harmless play might easily develop into a demonstration in favour of the king. The stage was too dangerous to be tolerated by any anti-royalist government. In the main, however, the intentions of the act were moral. The stage was swept away by the tide of puritan indignation and hatred. So drastic a measure could not be carried without considerable difficulty and opposition, and Parliament found it necessary to enforce its will by the above more stringent ordinance against the stage, ordering all players to be apprehended and publicly whipped, all playhouses to be pulled down and any one present at a play to pay a fine of five shillings.

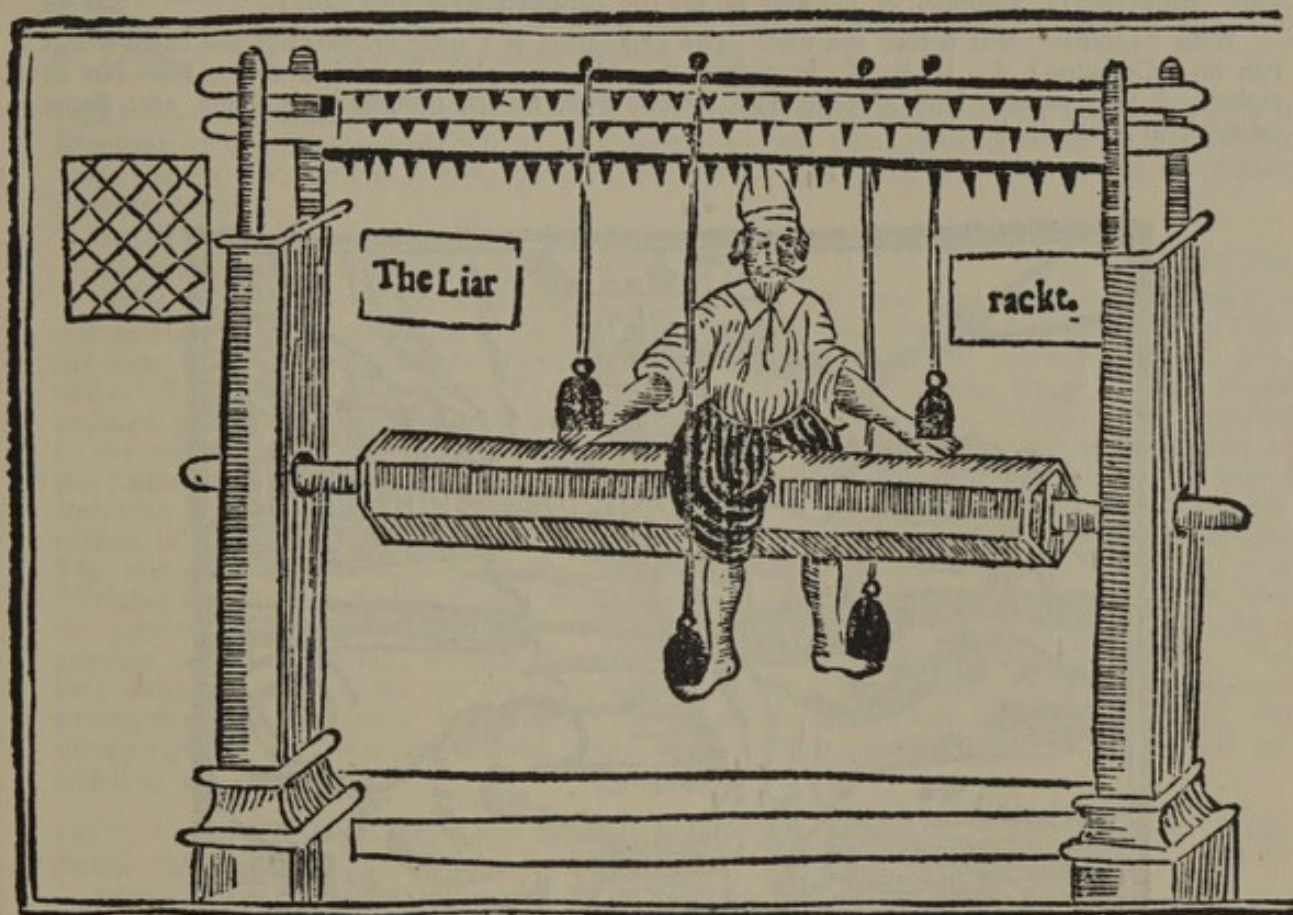

In the "Advertisement" to the Reader, it is said: "This parcell of exquisite Poems, have pass'd up and downe through many hands amongst persons of the best quality, in loose imperfect Manuscripts, and there is lately obtruded to the world an adulterate copy, surruptitiously and illegally imprinted, to the derogation of the Author and the abuse of the Buyer. But in this booke they appeare in their pure originals and true genuine colours." An examination of the two editions, however, shows that this edition is a literal reprint of that which is spoken of in such strong terms of disapprobation. The misprints and corruptions of the text are exactly the same in both. The first was "Printed for Thomas Walkley," and the second by "T. W." It would appear, therefore, that the printer, desiring to safeguard his interests, issued the above edition, purporting to be a genuine authorised edition, whereas it was also issued without the author's approbation. The only difference between the two books is that the Epistle "To my Lady," and the mendacious advertisement to the reader occupy three leaves, which are inserted after the title, and the speeches of the first issue are omitted, while two leaves of poems and two leaves of table are added at the end.

The first English edition published in the previous year had been translated by Henley from his transcription of Beckford's manuscript. Early in 1786 he had proposed publication to Beckford, but the latter, definitely forbidding publication for another year, wrote: "I would not on any account have him precede the French edition." Henley, however, took no notice of this command and published his translation on 7th June of the same year.

On hearing that Henley had published contrary to his wishes, Beckford at once handed his manuscript to Hignou, a Lausanne bookseller, for immediate publication. This edition has now become exceedingly scarce in comparison with which the English edition of the previous year is comparatively common.

The following volumes originally formed a portion of the library assembled by Gibbon in Lausanne during his residence there, and it was here that the fifth and sixth volumes of his "History" were written. As a result many of the items now offered are definitely the "source" books of his historical knowledge, and must have been his constant companions during the preparation of the history.

After Gibbon's death in 1794, a portion of his library passed by bequest to the Lausanne Academical Library, but the greater part was purchased by William Beckford, who is quoted as having remarked: "I bought Gibbon's library to have something to read when I passed through Lausanne." Beckford left the library at Lausanne and ultimately gave it to a physician named Scholl. Scholl sold half by auction in 1830, and it may be presumed that, as books from Gibbon's library have hitherto been almost unobtainable, the Lausanne Academy was largely the purchaser. The remaining portion of the library, from which the following volumes come, was sold privately to John Walter Haliday, of Geneva, and remained at Geneva until its recent disposal by auction in London.

All the items now offered contain either Gibbon's bookplate (see opposite), or his library label. **E GIBBON** and in some cases both together. Many con-

tain the price paid on the fly-leaf, in pencil, in Gibbon's autograph. Although Gibbon must have turned to these volumes time and time again, their condition is exceptionally good, and practically all are in their contemporary eighteenth century calf bindings.

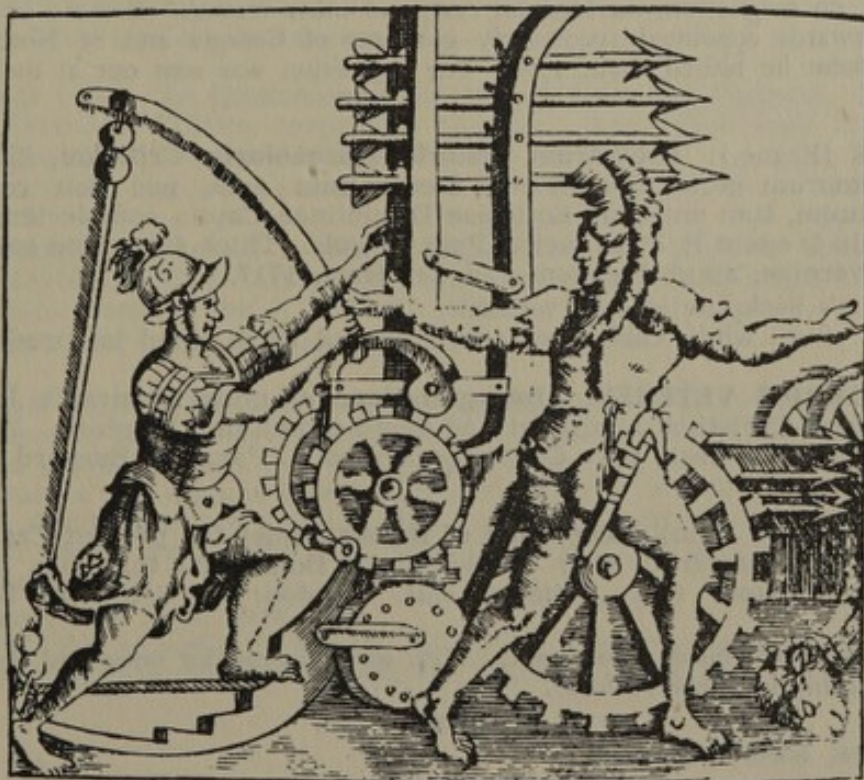

It was written in Thrale's house "between eight o'clock on Wednesday night and twelve o'clock on Thursday night." It supported the action of the Ministerial majority in the House of Commons in assuming that the expulsion of a Member of Parliament was equivalent to exclusion and in asserting Col. Luttrell (not John Wilkes, who had a great majority of votes) was the duly elected representative of Middlesex. The pamphlet, which was at once known to be by Johnson, was fiercely attacked, both in the newspapers and in separate productions.
