ARMORIAL BINDINGS.

The following 16 lots are all in old calf bindings, stamped with the arms of GEORGE WILMER, the son of George Wilmer, of West Ham. He was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge, and entered the Middle Temple in 1602. In 1606 he married Margery, daughter and heiress of Marmaduke Thweng of Upper Helmsley, Yorks. He died in May, 1626. He used two stamps, of which Variant A is found on the books in the first seven lots (Nos. 73-79), a chevron argent between three eagles displayed or armed and langued sable; crest, on a mural crown, an eagle displayed armed and langued; helmet, that of an Esquire; motto, *Expertus credo*. Variant B, which is found on the books in the next nine lots (Nos. 80-88), is as follows: Quarterly, 1 and 4, Wilmer Arms as above; 2 and 3—a fess between 3—leaves. Impaling 1 and 4 Gules a chevron argent between three popinjays of the second, beaked, legged and collared gules [Thweng]. 2. Argent, a lion rampant azure (Brus. of Skelton). 3. Argent, two bars gules, on a canton gules a lion passant guardant or [Lancaster].

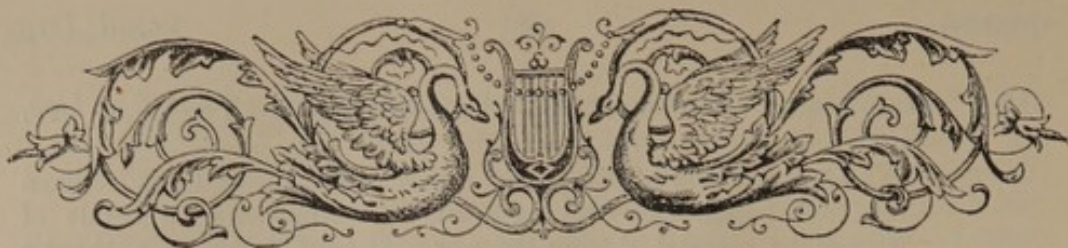

At a reading here on the 27th Feb. 1878, he read Bassanio in the *Merchant of Venice*, Herr Moritz reading Shylock. Mr. Irving read *Romeo* in the Balcony scene to Lady Martin's *Juliet*, and Orlando in *As you Like It* in the forest scenes of *As You Like It* (see p. 357 of "Life.") On this occasion it was, she added, the sleep walking scene from *Macbeth*. In a letter to me (7th July, 1878), Irving wrote: "If Kean's interpretation of *Shakespeare* were as if reading him by flashes of lightning, her's was reading him by the broad light of the sun. A more truthful and exquisite conception of *Rosalind* never entered into the imagination of man. P. S. Fletcher's criticism of Mrs. Martin's *Lady Macbeth* was confirmed by that one scene." On the 29th June, 1880, Irving read *Benedick* to Lady Martin's *Beatrice*. After this reading she gave the sleep-walking scene, and I remember Irving saying that the intensity of her treatment of it was beyond anything in its impressiveness that he could (have) imagined possible.

He being fully convinc'd of my innocence : As for the constant allowance I receiv'd from Him, the Author is quite mistaken. I never had any such, not even a single present from Sir Richard Steele ... As to ye proposal of my marrying his natural Daughter—the reason why and ye Terms on which he proposed it, the Author has not erred in, but as to the reason why the match did not go on, he is again mistaken, etc.

I am delighted to learn that your Edinburgh Aristarch has declared against the *Excursion*, as he will have the mortification of seeing a book enjoy a high reputation to which he has not contributed. Do not imagine that my principles lead me to condemn Scott's mode of pleasing the public, or that I have not a very high respect for his various talents and extensive attainments. I sent him the "Excursion" and am rather surprised that I have had no letter from him to acknowledge the receipt of it. Pray, present my regards to him when you see him...
