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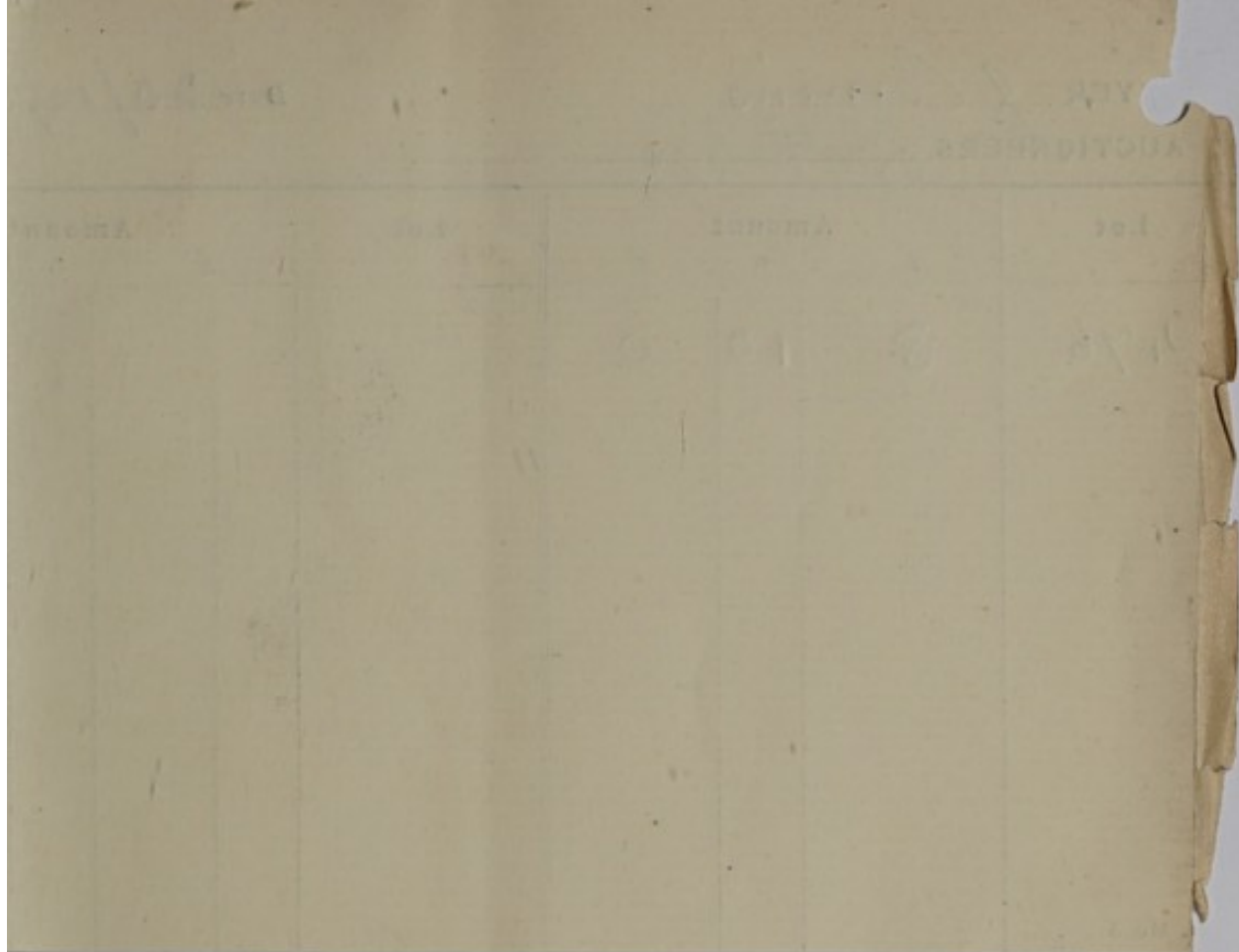

The present is the fourth work of Bunyan, having been preceded by *Some Gospel Truths Opened*, printed in 1656, followed shortly after by *A Vindication of Gospel Truths Opened*, in answer to Burrough's attack on the first book, *The True Faith of the Gospel of Peace*. The third book was *A Few Sighs from Hell*, issued in 1658, a few days before Cromwell's death. In the list of Bunyan's works given in the edition of 1692, this book is entered as "about 23 sheets 8vo," so that the compiler does not appear to have seen a copy.

The present copy, unfortunately imperfect, contains title-page and last leaf, but wants fourteen complete quires, and six leaves of another; it differs from the Museum copy in an important and interesting point. The imprint of the Museum copy runs, "London printed for M. Wright at the sign of the King's Head in the Old Bailey 1659." The imprint of the present copy is "London, Printed for Matthias Cowley Book Seller in Newport-Pannell 1659." This imprint is of great interest. When Bunyan was serving as a soldier he was apparently stationed for a time at Newport-Pagnell, and may then have formed a friendship with Matthias Cowley. At any rate the imprint to his first book, "*Some Gospel Truths Opened*," runs "London, printed for J.W. and are to be sold by Matthias Cowley, Bookseller in Newport Pagnell, 1656."

On the title-page are the words "The Eighth Edition Corrected and much Enlarged by the Author." This must mean that it follows the Eighth English edition.

This Edition appears to be of very great rarity, and there is no copy in the British Museum, Bodleian or Edinburgh libraries.

This is probably the first Scottish edition of the *Holy War*, and must be very rare. There is no copy in the British Museum or leading Scottish libraries, but there is one in the Bodleian. It is not mentioned in the very elaborate list of Watson's books compiled by John S. Gibb, issued in the publication of the Edinburgh Bibliographical Society.

This little volume describes the plot set on foot by Thomas Percy, seventh Earl of Northumberland, and Charles Neville, sixth Earl of Westmorland, for a Catholic rising to accomplish Mary Stuart's rescue.

The present edition has thirty leaves (A-G⁴ H²), the first and last being blank. It is usually stated that there were three different editions issued in 1569, and in the Cambridge Catalogue of Early English Books three variant editions printed by Bynneman are described. The Bodleian has two copies, both belonging to the last edition "newly perused and encreased." The British Museum Catalogue gives three editions, but in the later General Catalogue they are entered as two copies of one edition and one copy of the last edition, but *neither corresponds to the present edition.*

It appears, therefore, that the present is an unrecorded edition, of which there is no copy in the Bodleian, British Museum, or Cambridge University Library.

The book is entered in Scott's Bibliography of Mary Queen of Scots (No. 58), but he was unaware of this edition.

The present is a fine and uncut copy.

It contains an account of the rebellion of the Scottish Nobles which accompanied the murder of Rizzio. The first two pages are devoted to the matters leading up to the Conspiracy, to which Darnley was a party.

There were two issues of this book in octavo and one in quarto. The octavo has the imprint "Lovanii, Apud Rutgerum Velpium Bibliop. Jurat. Sub Castro Angelico. An. 1566." It consists of eight leaves and each page is surrounded by a woodcut border. The present issue, which is without printer's name or place of printing, consists of one gathering of six leaves, the last being a blank.

Mr. John Scott, in his Bibliography of books relating to Queen Mary, was only able to refer to one copy of each issue, both being in the Grenville collection in the British Museum.

* * * On 7th July, 1548, the Estates of Scotland ratified an agreement for her marriage to the Dauphin (Francis II) and decided that she should be sent to France immediately. The child-Queen sailed accordingly on 7th August in one of the French Royal Galleys and disembarked at Brest, arriving at St. Germain on 11th October, where this important State Paper was drawn up. The marriage agreement of 1548 is referred to in this document. The marriage did not take place until 24th April, 1558.

- 824 MARY, *Queen of James V of Scotland. MOTHER OF MARY QUEEN OF SCOTS.* Document signed, "Marie R." 1 page folio, dated *Edinburgh, 10th July, 1554*, with a fine impression of the seal and cord.

May 1st, barely a fortnight after this letter was written. The Massacre of St. Bartholomew took place four months later (August 23rd). Marguerite de Valois married Henri of Navarre (Henri IV) the day following the Massacre of St. Bartholomew, and we learn by this letter that the marriage was settled in April. The sole charge of the education of the little Queen of Scots was in the hands of her uncle the Cardinal (writer of this letter).

Has shewn his letter to the Queen Mother (*Catherine de Medicis*), who wrote immediately to the King (*Charles IX*). He is to reside with the Cardinal of Guise (*Mary Stuart's uncle*). The Queen Mother will not leave till August—etc.

The longest letter of the Duchess that has occurred.

Anne, Duchess of Guise, was the wife of the warrior Francis, Duc de Guise. The Queen of Scots was much attached to both during her residence in France from 1549 to 1561.

- 829 MAYENNE (Charles de Lorraine, Duke of) *Cousin of the Queen of Scots*. D. s. 5 pp. folio, *Paris, 2nd May, 1602*, also signed by the Duchess of Mayenne—Henrietta of Savoy, and five other witnesses.

The Queen of Scots was present at the baptism of this Duke.

- 830 URFE (Monsieur d') *Governor to Mary Stuart (later Queen of Scots)*. L. s. with long autograph superscription, 1 p. folio, *Trante, 23 Dec. (no year)*, to Monsieur Mesnage, the French Ambassador at the Court of the Emperor and author of the well-known work "*Menagiana*."

- 831 STROZZI (Philip) *Page of Honour to Francis II.* A. L. s. folio, *Bordeaux*, 25 July, 1572, TO THE KING (Charles IX of France):

. . . I hope that, with the aid of God in addition to the men that we are, there is no power on the sea for this time that we cannot make head against—etc.

Letters entirely in the autograph of Philip Strozzi are *excessively rare*. This is *the only* A. L. s. of Strozzi addressed to the King of France that has occurred.

- 832 CONDE (Louis de Bourbon, Prince de) *Present at the wedding of the Queen of Scots to the Dauphin.* A. L. s. folio, TO CATHERINE DE MEDICIS.

The only letter entirely in the hand of this Prince that has occurred.

The Prince was the uncle of Henry IV and Chief of the Calvinists.

- 833 VIEILLEVILLE (François de Scepeaulx, Sire de) *Marshal of France, Henri II's Ambassador at London.* D. s. 1 p. folio, on vellum, *Metz*, 25 Aug. 1553, relative to the raising of 1,500 spearmen by three German captains for the service of Henri II of France.

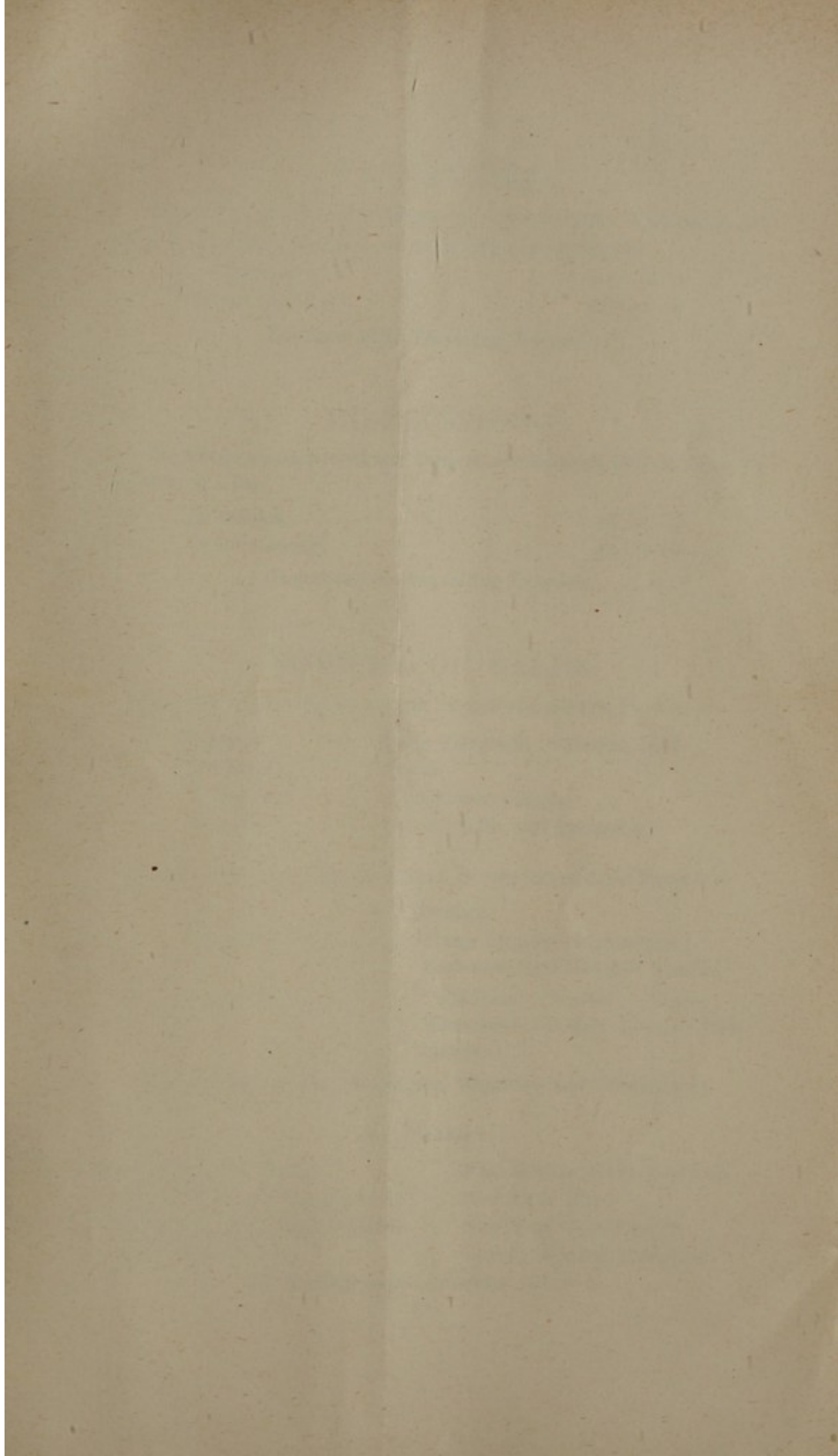

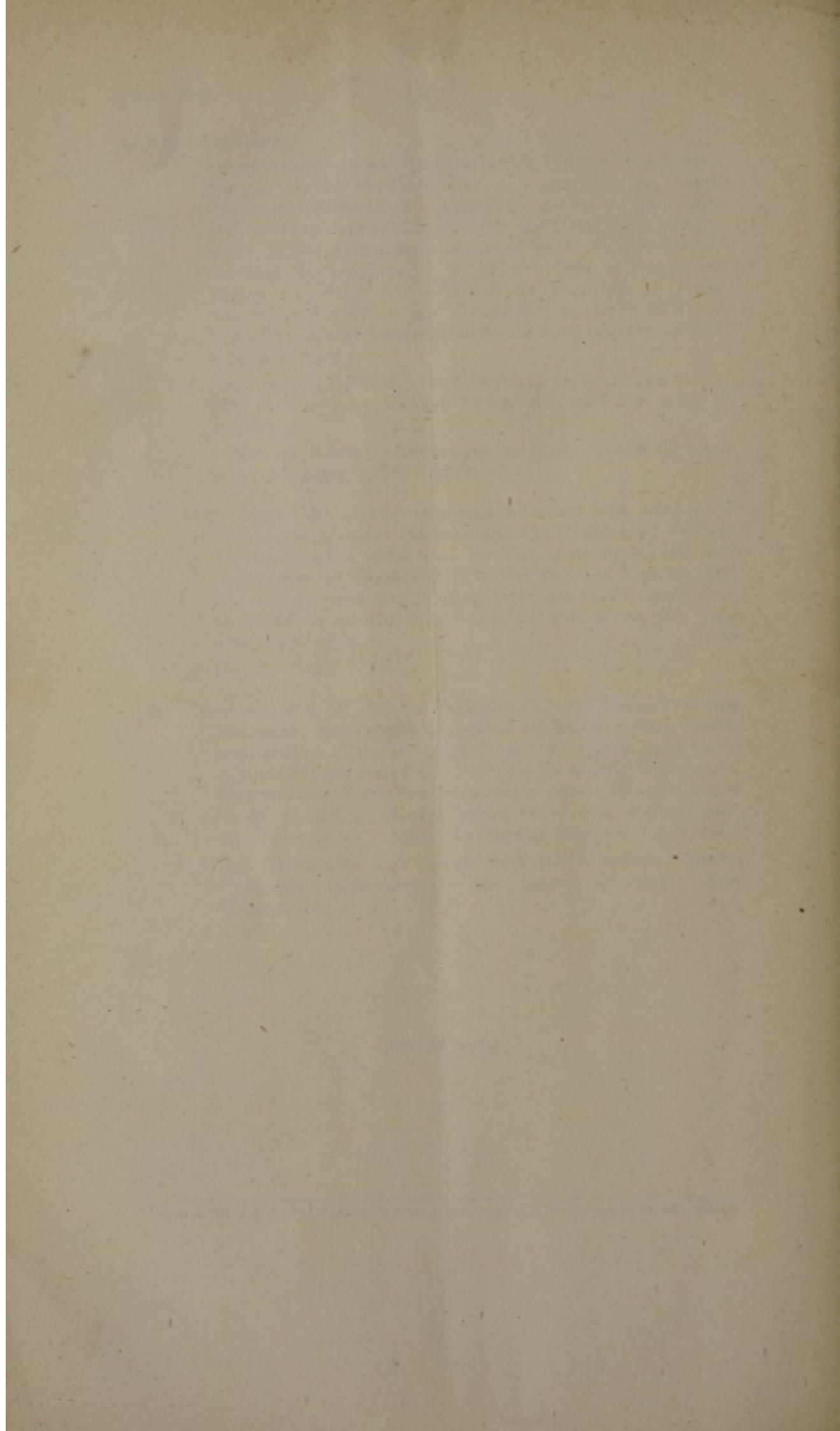
