I left Oxf. because the Prince staid for the Princess, &c. At Windsor I received the services of Sr. Maurice Eustace, Mr. Blathwait, also Dr. Burnett, and there is there such a concourse of Noblemen and Gentlemen that I believe there was never the like seen." A long letter of Sir R. Southwell contains much parental advice: "I cannot think you have soe little a heart as not to covett a ranck among the best, and to signify as much in your generation as another man." &c.—Mentions the visit of the Warden of All Souls', Dr. Jane and others, to King's Weston-Writing from Berlin in 1680 he says the Elector of Brandenburg had given him "20 pieces of amber wth, the flies buried in them"; in other letters he says "the Bristoll grandees and their wives report that my Lord Chief Justice was mad, but that will not save their bacon."—Mentions dining with Sir W. Petty, to whom he was related, who gave him verses on his coat-of-arms; of his visits to the Duke of Ormond, the Hon. R. Boyle; talks of the Old Bailey, and describes in amusing way the different classes of pickpockets, &c.; speaks of Dryden's last opera; of studying under Betterton, &c.—Many of Edward Southwell's papers on Logick, Rhetorick, Aristotle, &c. are included in the volume.

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

A long letter of Sir R. Southwell contains much parental advice: "I cannot think you have soe little a heart as not to covett a ranck among the best, and to signify as much in your generation as another man." &c.—Mentions the visit of the Warden of All Souls', Dr. Jane and others, to King's Weston-Writing from Berlin in 1680 he says the Elector of Brandenburg had given him "20 pieces of amber wth, the flies buried in them"; in other letters he says "the Bristoll grandees and their wives report that my Lord Chief Justice was mad, but that will not save their bacon."-Mentions dining with Sir W. Petty, to whom he was related, who gave him verses on his coat-of-arms; of his visits to the Duke of Ormond, the Hon. R.
