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
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

Messrs. Sother & Co. will have the option of reselling the lots uncleared either by public or private sale without any notice being given to the defaulter.
- VI. All the books are presumed to be perfect, unless otherwise expressed; but if upon collating, any should prove defective, the purchaser will be at liberty to take or reject them, provided they are received back within Fourteen Days after the conclusion of the sale, when the purchase-money will be returned.
- VII. 

Dallas had originally been intended as Executor, but his name is here scratched out by Byron and a note inserted at the bottom of the page "I forget the Christian name of Dallas.—Cut him out." and "Francis Hodgson Esqr. of King's College Cambridge" is substituted in Byron's hand. John Cam Hobhouse is described as "Now or late of Trin. Coll. Cambridge." This suggests that the Will must have been drawn up in great haste since there was not time enough to verify either Christian names, or addresses.

Against a query asking whether Nicolâ Giraud to whom he leaves £7000 on attainment of his majority, is resident in England, he has written "No" and if interest should be paid on the legacy during his minority, "Yes."

He adds to his legacy to his servant Wm. Fletcher the Water Corn Mill with the outbuildings and close called the Miller's Close "in the possession of I. Bowman."

He has also in several places altered or written in

in full the names of Executors, Legatees, etc.





The large miniatures represent Pentecost, the Annunciation, Visitation, Nativity, Shepherds, Magi, Presentation, Innocents, Coronation of the Virgin, David, S. Barbara, Les trois vifs et les trois morts, S. Mary Magdalen with a portrait of the original owner kneeling at a prie-dieu and the royal arms of France in the margin, and S. Catherine of Siena, again with the arms of France in the margin. The use appears to be of eastern France, but does not conform with any of those noted for the larger towns; the presence of S. Aldegonde, the patron Saint of Maubeuge, in the Calendar and Litany perhaps indicates that town as the place of writing. The criteria are: - Matins: Hymn, Quem terra, Antiphon, Benedicta tu, Lessons, Sancta Maria, etc.; Lauds: Capitulum, Haec est virgo, Hymn, Ave maris stella, Collect, Concede nos; Prime: Antiphon, O admirabile, Capitulum, Haec est virgo; Nones: Antiphon, Pulchra es, Capitulum, Virgo verbo. In the lower margins of the Calendar are entries of births of members of two families. The name of the first has been erased wherever it occurs, but seems to be Brissonville; there are five entries, 1561-78, and the baptisms are all at Nancy. The other is Colore de Linden (two entries, 1593 and 1612), and the baptisms are at Toul and Henold.

A number of pages in this manuscript have a row of capital Js, alternately red and blue, between or outside the columns of the text. This type of ornament indicates a Parisian atelier of the early 14th Century, and is found in the famous Bible written by Robert de Billyng, the miniatures of which are signed by Jean Pucelle Anciau de Ceus, and Jaquet Maci, and dated 1327 (see H. Martin, La Miniature française, Paris, 1923).
