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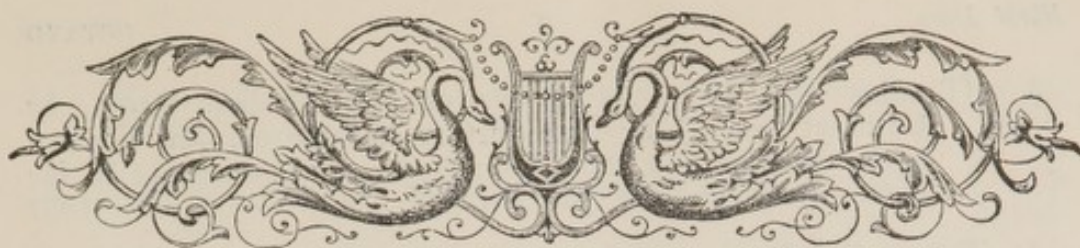

A. L. s. 2 pp. 8vo, 13, *Tite St., Chelsea, Wednesday, March 23th (1881)* :

I shall be very much pleased and flattered to see a reproduction of the portrait I am now painting of you, in the work you are about to bring out.—If therefore your publishers would wish to have it copied by the process called Photogravure I should be quite willing to let them have the copyright of the picture for your book, and would leave it to their consideration to pay me for the same thirty guineas or so. .

Hoping that you are quite well, and that you will soon write to fix another sitting, etc.

WHISTLER (J. McN.) A. L. s. 2 pp. 8vo, 110, *Rue du Sac, Paris* :

I beg to thank you for the prompt and courteous way in which you always carry out my wishes on the short notice I am so continually obliged to send you. Doubtless these last paintings will reach me directly—and I shall receive due notice from your house here.

Perhaps if you were to write and tell me what you have in your mind about purchases I might see if anything could be managed.

WHISTLER (J. McN.) A. L. s. 2 pp. 8vo, *Tite Street, undated*,
To Dr. Coles :

AMONG THE MEN OF LETTERS AND MUSICIANS represented are Dr. CHARLES BURNEY, the father of Fanny Burney, on "Romeo & Juliet" to J. C. Walker, the Irish Antiquary (1793)

JONES (Sir William) The Orientalist, to Richard Johnson, comparing Shakespeare and Sanscrit dramas (c. 1785)

MASON (William) The 18th Century Poet and Gray's Biographer, an important letter to Edmund Malone, the Shakespearean critic and scholar, about various disputed readings in Shakespeare

MOORE (Thomas) The Poet, to Leigh Hunt when in prison, 1814:

... If Wordsworth's absurdities had not been so rudely handled, we should have had more of his greatness, but *I think there is but little doubt that if Shakespeare had critics standing centinels over every pun and conceit that wanted to escape, we should have lost many a beauty that has rushed out headlong with them.* It is the talent of our present race of critics that makes them as pernicious as they are formidable, etc.

ROSETTI (Dante Gabriel) to the Poet, Wm. Davies, discussing Shakespeare's "Hamlet" and Keats' poems:

Hamlet to hand. It is full of admirable points, but on seeing it I am led to wonder that I should have mistakenly fixed on a subject which can develop so limited a side of the artist's gift in this method which the Milton series showed to be endlessly diversified. Nor do I think that the 2 Keats Poems are the best for the purpose after all. I think

perhaps my first notion of "As You Like It" may have been the most appropriate among Shakespeare's plays. The forest life, deer, etc. would afford material.

I would ... like to have ... the 2 Keats sets paying of course the same. But if not, then the *Tempest* you speak of, and the *Isabella*. The *Tempest* shd. be very good. Perhaps in the *Hamlet*, the finest for composition is the last of all, where the movement gives a full chance. Excellent are the expressions of the King and Queen upon the play and many others.

SWINBURNE (ALGERNON CHARLES) Two unpublished Auto. MSS. and Two A. L. s.

1. Shakespeare and the Shakespearean stage :

Massinger Duke of Milan (is) as much better than Love's Sacrifice as it is inferior to Othello; and the comparison with Ford fair and reasonable with Shakespeare, not ... What are the worst offences of the Shakespearean stage if we compare the offenders with the noisome novelists (the putrescent poeticules) of contemporary Paris?

Let him defile the birthplace of Burns, if the Scotch will allow him; let him pollute the birthplace of Longfellow, if the *Yankees* see no objection. But if he proposes to contaminate with the outrage of his intrusion the birthplace of Shakespeare, let the disgust and indignation of all Englishmen send him flying with a single kick to—Malebolge; to the particular division of that fragrant abode where even the eagle eye of such a visitor as Dante may be unable to discern whether his head is tansured or is not.

3. A. L. s. 12 pp. 8vo, 22nd June, 1879, to his friend Theodore Watts Dunton, a superb letter of great importance, expressing his disgust for professional literary ladies and referring to Thackeray in connection therewith; Tristram and Iseult; etc.

... As to my MSS. and proofs, the unfinished article on the sham Shakespearean play of K. Edw. III was assuredly left in the draw of the table I mentioned together with "Capell's Prolusions," and in that book a small slip of paper containing notes for the said article. Till I have these by me,—I can make no way at all ...

4. A. L. s. 6 pp. 8vo, 1st August (1875), to Ford Madox Brown, the painter, apropos of Brown's painting of "Cordelia, at the bedside of Lear," comments on the parentage of Cordelia, quoting from "King Lear" in support thereof

... I was shocked to see in Wm. Rossetti's note in the Academy on Your Pictures from Lear a singular oversight, wh. I thought of writing to point out, in the suggestion that Cordelia was born of a different mother from her sisters! He must have forgotten one of the finest bits of a transcendent scene where Kent says:—

"It is the stars
The stars above us, govern our conditions;
Else one self mate and mate could not beget
Such different issues. (Act IV. Sc. 3)." etc.

SYMONDS (JOHN ADDINGTON) Fine Series of Three A. L. s. all relative to Shakespeare

(a) 4 pp. 8vo, 2nd December, 1881, to T. Hall Caine, on the English Sonnet :

For my own part I have ever regarded the Shakespearean and Italian as two separate instruments, designed for different but equally effective

uses. Some of the intermediate forms (used *e. g.* by Gray) distress my ear, etc.

(b) 4 pp. 8vo, 25th January, 1884, to A. C. Swinburne :

I ... wish to announce to you a book of my own on the early Dramatists, a copy of which has I hope now reached you. You will find nothing new and nothing worth your attention in it. But your own most admirable "Study of Shakespeare" was so often in my hands during the composition of the volume, and I found myself so often in agreement with you, that I should have felt it wrong not to bring the book before your notice.

(c) 4 pp. 8vo, August 22nd, 1887, to Ellis, concerning a series of plays for a new volume he was about to publish and mentioning Shakespeare

WALPOLE (Horace) Two important A. L. s. *both unpublished*, and of the greatest Shakespearean interest

(a) 3 pp. 4to, *Strawberry Hill*, 26th July, 1788, to Dr. Lort, the antiquary :

I believed the doubtful Works were Catherine Parr's for two reasons : one, because it is certain that she was an Authoress, and I do not recollect that Catherine of Aragon was, but from the ascription of that doubtful piece to her; and when the one Catherine was an Authoress and both lived at the same time, it would not be extraordinary in that inaccurate age that they should have been confounded ... I think I recollect that Cath. Parr was jealous of her last husband for the Princess Elizabeth ... The first Catherine being a Spaniard, tho naturalised here inclines me to doubt her having written in English, tho Shakespeare had cause enough to suppose she talked English readily. Tho Lady Tyrwhit might not present the book to Elizabeth when a Prisoner in the Tower, is it at all improbable that she might offer it to her Majesty at the Tower, whence I think she proceeded on her accession, etc.

(b) 2 pp. 4to, *September 27th*, 1795, to Daniel Lysons, the topographer, referring to Ireland's Shakespeare forgeries, etc. :

... I am not surprised at any new lie that Ireland tacks to his legend; were He to coin himself into a grandson of Shakespeare, with his ignorance of all probabilities, it would be but an addition to his bed-roll of Incredibilities. My wives have met me here from Cheltenham and return with me to our homes on tuesday, etc.

WILDE (OSCAR) Two A. L. s. to Sherard (?) :

Enclosed is the praise of the Philistines ... I have been speaking at Stratford about Shakespeare, but in spite of that enjoyed my visit immensely. My reception was semi-royal, and the volunteers played God Save the Queen in my honour.

SHAKESPEARE'S "W. H." :

Wisden is obviously Willie Hughes in a reincarnation— that is why he is so delightful. He is very honey-coloured and charming, etc.

Wilde published an article in Blackwood's (1889), entitled "Mr. W. H." to whom Shakespeare addressed his Sonnets. "W. H." Wilde averred, was a lad named Willie Hughes who took a female part in the acting of the Plays of Shakespeare.

- 263 RICHARDSON (Samuel) Novelist, wrote "Clarissa," "Sir Charles Grandison," etc., an important Series of Eight unpublished A. L. s. L. s. MSS. and a Broad-sheet, relative to his magnum opus, *Clarissa*, and to his "Sir Charles Grandison" and "Pamela," addressed to Lady Echlin, 192 pp. 4to and folio, *brown morocco*:

... you were so good as to write and to enclose the two beginning Sheets of your History of *Clarissa* (see below) and gave me leave to send for the rest to Oxfordshire. Mentions Diana Ashurst and Lady B(radshiagh) who promised to write to the former for the remainder of the MS. of *Clarissa*. He received it last week. "It is read more than one half and am impatient to read the other to see what your ladyship does with your *Lovelace*, with *Clarissa*, with the *Harlowes*—What a good man have you made *Belford*! But is he not a little officious in forcing himself into the Retirement of *Lovelace* and *Clarissa* at *Hamstead*, as he appears in the Part of the Book unaltered, have borne his Intrusion, and offers of service to *Clarissa* against herself? Is not *Clarissa's* Terror on his Intrusion too much for the Occasion? Her Thoughts of Suicide, her Penknife; are they excusable on a less Occasion, than that of the whole Satanic Crew at *Sinclair's* assembled to assist, as evidently appeared in her Violation? etc.

Speaks of the honour Lady Echlin has done him by the pains she has taken (in writing her version of his *Clarissa*). Praises all his characters as rewritten by her:—

But think you, madam, as you spare him (*Lovelace*) his capital crime, the outrage on *Clarissa's* Honour, that she might not have been spared to ye world? You give Remorse to all her Family; why might not all have ended in a Complete Reformation of the Father, Uncles, James, Arabella (*Lovelace* and *Belford* you do not reform) and the whole joyfully, etc.

LOT 263—*continued*.

Lovelace, by his own Interest, and that of his uncle, might have been made a governor of one of the American colonies; and there shone, as a man you had reformed, etc.

How good was Charlotte Grandison to furnish your Ladyship with an Expression, how generously kind in you to adopt it, that we have been acquainted 100 years! etc.

2. *London, April 19, 1755 :*

How agreeably, how justly, has your ladyship answered all the little observations I made on your History of Clarissa! *History*, I call it (so far as it goes) in *Earnest*. I will not be satisfied with your Ladyship, for supposing I call it so in *Jest*, etc.

3. *London, April 1, 1761*, relative to a visit Lady Echlin intends to pay them and to his faltering hand :

... I owe you, dear Madam, a much longer letter, but my staggering fingers—you see how it is with me! etc .

** A very late letter—Richardson died three months later.

4. *London, January 30, 1754*, relative to the case between Faulkner & Company and himself, thinks of publishing the State of the Case at the end of his novel "Charles Grandison," and gives notice thereof on the title-page, will print some separately :

Naughty Lady B(radshaigh) once more I say, to put me out of Heart to ask so polite a judge for her Correction of those Passages in my Sir Charles's History, that a future impression might be the better for. I had not the pleasure of being known to the late ingenious and learned Mr. Tickell, but I always had the greatest Honour of his Character both as a writer and a gentleman, and it was not lessened by the affectionate Friendship Mr. Addison bore him .

5. MS. signed, "Observations on Mr. Faulkner's State of the Case between him and me, as published by him," 7 pp. 4to, *very closely written*, *London, November 24, 1753*, sent to Lady Echlin and commencing with a letter to her. The MS. sets out that on Nov. 3rd, 1753, George Faulkner of Dublin, Printer and Bookseller, contracted with Richardson for "The History of Sir Charles Grandison" to be sent to Ireland before publication in London; the author sent four sheets. Notice of publication appeared in Faulkner's shop but immediately after three other Booksellers posted up similar notices of the same work and showed twelve sheets on the work itself. Richardson avers that it was an arranged fraud on Faulkner's part. Richardson concludes with a letter to Lady Echlin stating : "My treaty with Mr. Faulkner, as well for "Clarissa," as for the new Piece, demonstrates that I had no thoughts of exporting my Books ready printed to Ireland. The two last volumes of "Pamela" had been stolen from my press before publication." Mentions Faulkner's threat to have "Grandison" translated into French in a printed edition. This letter is corrected and superscribed by Richardson (21 words in his autograph), *the MS. is written in an exceedingly neat hand*

6. ECHLIN (Lady) The unpublished Auto. MS. of her version of "Clarissa," 172 pp. 4to, *see above*, the letter from Richardson, Feb. 14, 1755 :

She too was seized with the desire of altering Clarissa, and making up the story to her own mind, which she accordingly executed, and after some hesitation and reluctance communicated to Richardson. She had reformed Lovelace by means of a Dr. Christian, and made him die after a lingering illness, occasioned by remorse, though the last outrage is not supposed to be committed. Though Richardson, after he had read her alterations, let her off very gently, one cannot but suspect he must secretly smile at the presumption which had induced so inferior a hand to lay colours upon his canvas.

Mrs. Barbauld's Observation upon Lady Echlin's alteration of Clarissa : *cf.* vol. I, p. ccix, "The Correspondence of Samuel Richardson."

7. A. L. s. from three young ladies, "Ethelinda," "Charlotte," and "Henrietta," to Richardson, 2 pp. 4to, *September 4, 1760* : asking the favour of his answer to a scruple they have concerning an expression he allows Sir Charles Grandison—his "making mention of the name of God as a mere expletive," etc.

8. THE CASE OF SAMUEL RICHARDSON, of London, Printer, with regard to the Invasion of his Property in the History of Sir Charles Grandison, before publication, by certain booksellers in Dublin, *September 14, 1753*

**Written *before* the arrival of the Special Ambassadors from the Emperor, Charles V, the father of Philip II, to negotiate the marriage. In this Manuscript the Articles are stated to have been drawn up on 12th January, but the Ambassadors did not arrive at Westminster until the 14th.

The Articles were communicated to the Lord Mayor and the City of London on 15th January. They provide that Mary and Philip were to bestow on each other the titular dignities of their several kingdoms. The dominions of each were to be governed separately, according to their ancient laws and privileges. None but Natives of England were to hold office in the Queen's court or government.

A similar Manuscript is in the British Museum. The Treaty is printed in Rymer, vol. VI, part IV (ed. 1741).

and Hilary, of Florence, and prays that a confessor appointed by each of the petitioners separately may have the power to give plenary absolution "in articulo mortis," even in cases reserved for the Holy See. At the end the Pope has inscribed "Fiat in forma communi A."

A further paragraph asks that the signatures to this petition may be sufficient without the preparation of Apostolic Letters. Against this the Pope has written "Fiat A." (The "A" represents, as was customary at the period, the initial of the Pope's Christian name, Alphonso.)

Accompanying the Document is an autograph letter and postcard from Alfred E. Stamp, of the Public Record Office, both referring to the present Document: "In the first place it is an original petition, not the Bull founded on a petition: the former are very rare, neither the Deputy Keeper nor Mr. Johnson had ever seen one before . . . the latter are pretty common in public and private collections."

I send the paper you gave me yesterday and in it two papers which dropt out of the Role de Combat—that it was exact I have sworn to, that it is now is impossible for me to say. Pray send the enclosed to Mr. Chiesa, etc.

PEYRON (General) A. L. s. 1 p. folio, *Paris*, 17 September, 1798, to the "Citoyens Directeurs de la Republique française":

Since I wrote you last but little has occurred worth your notice. Capt. Troubridge arrived here from Alexandria on the 17th without having been able to burn the French Ships there. He has left 3 Sail of the line to continue the Blockade, and as the French army has the plague amongst them I hope God Almighty will soon finish that hoard (*sic*) of Thieves.

Your excellency will have heard before us of the surrender of Corfu to the Russian and Turks, and I hope Malta will soon follow the example. I send the Marquis de Niza to attend to the Coast of Tuscany, being ordered to send Bellerophon and Minotaur to Minorca which is threatened with an attack.

An English Squadron sails in two days for the Bay of Naples, and I have to press it very hard for provisions, at all events it will prevent the French from detaching any Troops into the Provinces where the Count tells us all is going on well.

Had not the power of complying with the Chevalier Servatti's request. "I should have been little short of being mad, to have let loose two such formidable Cruizers on our Trade having got them fast in my hands," etc.

My dear invaluable Friend,

Although I may not answer letters regularly, or perform many other little acts which the world deem as of the very utmost importance, and for the omission of which, it is necessary to cut each other's throats, although I own I fail most miserably (towards my real friends in particular) in those things, yet believe me, Ball, my heart entertains the very warmest affection for you, and it has been no fault of mine, and not a little mortification, that you have not the Red Ribbon and other rewards that would have kept you afloat, and not to have made you a commissioner; but as, I trust, the war is at a close, you must, like Lord Hood, take your Flag when it comes to you, for *who is to command our fleets in a future war?* for whatever peace we make under the present government of France cannot be lasting. I pity the poor Maltese; they have sustained an irreparable loss in your friendly counsel and an able director in their public concerns: you was truly their father, and, I agree with you, they may not like step-fathers; however, I hope that you will find as much pleasure in your new office as it is possible for it to afford, although I am sure it will not be equal to your merit.

As I know you have always been kind to me, I know that you will be sorry to hear that I have been even at death's door, apparently in a consumption. I am now rallied a little, but the disorder is in itself so flattering that I know not whether I am really better, and no one will tell me, but all in the Fleet are so truly kind to me, that I should be a wretch not to *cheer up*. Foley has put me under a regimen of milk, at four in the morning; Murray has given me lozenges, and all have proved their desire to keep my mind easy, for I hear of no complaints, or other wishes than to have me with them. *Hardy is as good as ever*, and with Domett, join their kindest regards. I have also on board Colonel Stewart, who commands our *little Army*; he remembers you at St. Domingo.

I am just returned from the Gulf of Finland, Revel; and met Lord St. Helens at the entrance; by this, I am sure *Peace must be signed by Russia*, and Denmark and Sweden have so completely lost their consequence by joining against us, that they must submit to what we settle with Russia. The Northern Fleets are only formidable in point of numbers; in every other respect they are insignificant; and if our Fleet is active, in the spring of the year, may be got at separately; late in the summer they have their numerous Flotilla, who can join in spite of all our efforts to prevent them, for there is a complete

navigation inside, and amongst 10,000 Islands. I hope this will find you in England, as I know your American affairs claim your attention; it is, I trust (needless), my dear Ball, to assure you, that if it ever should be in my power in any way to be useful, that nothing could give me greater happiness; for believe me at all times, and places, for ever your sincere, affectionate and faithful friend,

Nelson and Brontë.

** This letter written shortly after the battle of Copenhagen is one of the longest and most interesting Nelson ever wrote. It is perhaps not generally known that he suffered from consumption, and nearly died of it soon after this. This letter is quoted in the D.N.B.

We are not however Favourites with the Chief, and suppose will be excluded.

[NELSON (Lord)] Copy in Lady Hamilton's writing of his letter to Sir John Orde, 3 pp. 4to (1802), relative to the latter's differences with Lord St. Vincent :

My Dear Sir John,

I return your pamphlet with many thanks for the perusal.—I cannot but see clearly the cause of Lord St. Vincent's differences latterly with you—they evidently took their rise from my being sent up the Mediterranean.—The order you gave out at Gibraltar is contradiction to the Commander-in-Chief, from the slow approach of the Princess Royal which hurt your feelings and from the certainly very wrong conduct of Capt. Draper and Coll. Desborough relative to the Marine. I can now assure you on my word of Honour that neither Lord St. Vincent nor Lord Spenser were the original Cause of my being sent into the Mediterranean the arrangement was made in April '97 a year before I was sent, it is plain that neither the First Lord of the Admiralty nor Commander-in-Chief thought it right to tell you the causes which naturally sent me in particular into the Mediterranean and I verily believe that if Admirals with flags of the main had been in the same situation as yourself that I should have been equally employed in the Mediterranean. I own myself sorry that the pamphlet was ever printed and am glad that you saw the propriety of calling them in for if answers had appeared by anonymous writers you would have had to contend with a shadow. Excuse my observations on your book and believe me, etc., etc., etc.

NELSON. A. L. s. "Nelson & Brontë," 2 pp. 4to, *Victory, Sept. 25th*, 1804, to His Excellency John Hookham Frere, Minister at Madrid:

The only information useful to me would be (when given) a copy of the French Admirals sailing orders, that would be worth thousands. I have directed no French men to be received on board the Fleet, we are in too high order for them to tell their friends in France.

Has received his letter of 16 Aug. sent me by Monsr. Lucians with one from himself from Barcelona in which he desires me to order the Consul to supply him with money to pay his debts at the Hotel, that I will send him to Naples that he may go to Florence and communicate with the Commandant of Elba. Such a very loose communication of course I could not attend to, and as to my supplying him with money, that is not in my power, whatever he may have to communicate relative to Elba or any other place would be much more proper to communicate to you for His Majesty's Ministers who will act as they please, etc.

CONNOR (Sarah) A. L. s. 4 pp. 4to, *Merton, Tuesday (20 Aug. 1805)*, to EMMA LADY HAMILTON, written during Nelson's last visit to England, A FINE LETTER:

Thank God he (Nelson) is safe and well, cold water has been trickling down my back ever since I heard he was arrived—Oh say how he looks and talks and eats and sleeps—never was there a man come back so enthusiastically revered—look at the ideas that prevade the minds of his fellow citizens in this morning post, timid spinsters and widows terrified at his foot being on shore—yet this is the man that is to have a Sir R. Calder and a Sr. Jorde sent to intercept his well earned advantages—I hope he never may quit his own house again, this was my thundering reply last night to a set of cowardly women—I have lash'd Pitt on this score to his idolatrie brawler—I send you her letter. The public are indignant at the manner L.N. (Lord Nelson) has been treated.—Old Edmonds died last Sunday and there was a caveat entire at the Commons early on Mondey morning—blessed disgrace—all Sophy and Mrs. Elliots coadjutors will melt if it comes to trial—the Prince at the head to dazzle an old crazy fool comes to use undue influence—for it is on that ground they are to be attacked—B. Smith has just left me—she died early on yesterday and Mrs. S had entered her caveat at the same moment Ld P had entered his—he has had the start of all great lawyers on his side—and he will out of spite keep them at bay these 10 years—Mrs.

Boscawen the Maid of Honour cuts a sad figure—for a paltry £400—my god—in short not one of the old woman's acquaintances save and except myself that will not be made to blush—only think of Townshend the thief catcher dining with the Prince at Brighton and getting so beastly drunk that he could not tell where he lodged I can hardly believe it—but Hookham assured me it was a fact ... I am made very unhappy—I hear *dear invaluable Ld. Nelson is not well*—no wonder—but quiet and peace and Merton air I trust in God, will establish his health—tell every one in the country he is in town and every one in town he is in the country—In short to use Hamlets words don't let the winds of Heaven visit his face to roughly—except on the quarter deck at Merton—Adieu say everything in thy tenderest stile of friendship to that good great man for Chas. and me, heaven bless him and you.

I did not fail to lay before Lord Barham my ideas respecting the keeping the Bay and Garrison of Gibraltar from being annoy'd by the *Enemies* gunboats ... I should be glad of any farther hints to make the gunboat system as perfect as we could expect but from what I heard Lord Barham say I think he see difficultys in the execution of my plan which I do not and therefore that some other will be adopted and I most sincerely hope much preferable than mine for the safety of the Town and comfort of the Garrison ... Should the Spaniards make any attempt to destroy the Town it might if you approved be held out to them that Cadiz, Malaga and many of their Towns on the Coast would be retaliated upon, etc.

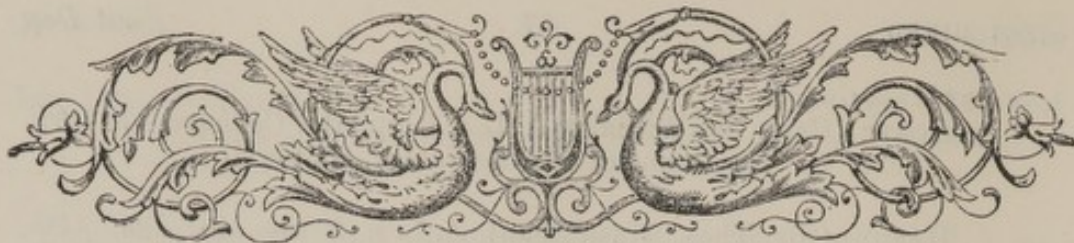



Van Ruremond, or van Endhoven, began to print at Antwerp about 1523, issuing in that year two Sarum service books, four more in 1524, and five in 1525. These early books were all printed for Peter Kaetz who acted as his London agent, but his later books were all printed for Byreckman. Early in 1526 he printed a Sarum Breviary, and also an English New Testament which was vigorously suppressed, and caused an active campaign against the printer, who, although an order of banishment was passed against him by the Margrave, seems to have escaped and continued printing. Between 1527 and 1530 he

printed six Sarum books, two "Missals," two "Horæ," a "Processional," and a "Hymni cum notis." In 1530-1 he went to England in connection with the sale of New Testaments. He is referred to by Foxe under the year 1531: "An Antwerp bookseller named Christopher, for selling certain New Testaments in English to John Row, bookbinder, was thrown into prison at Westminster and there died."

His first Missal, of 28th March, 1527, containing in all 308 leaves, is very much less rare than this one.

Certain prayers, psalms and hymns come next, including (folio 100 *verso*) a hymn in honour of Richard Scrope (Archbishop of York, 1398-1405, executed for treason), which begins:

The smaller illuminations are a white rose on a diapered background, with the sacred monogram in the centre, Archbishop Scrope, the Sudarium, the Sacred Heart, and the Instruments of the Passion.

As regards indications of provenance and date to be derived from internal evidence, the saints (apart from the Yorkshire saints) most prominently treated are St. Dominic and St. Leonard; the latter, who has a miniature, a special prayer and a double mention in the Litany was probably the patron saint of the institution by or for which the book was executed; this may perhaps have been the Hospital of St. Leonard at York. The date is almost certainly fixed by the references to Archbishop Scrope as the period of Yorkist domination, 1460-80.

Most copies contain between the preliminary ten leaves and the Missal proper a gathering of four leaves containing musical notes, and on the reverse of the fourth an elaborate border with the arms of the monastery within. Whether, however, this formed part of the book as originally issued may be doubted. These four leaves are not in this copy, and there is evidence that they did *not* form part of the book, as in the "Tabula" on the tenth leaf, where all the contents of the preceding nine leaves are mentioned, the next entry after "De anno et partibus ejus cum ejus concurrentiis" is "Dominica I in adventu domini," the beginning of the Missal proper, and there is no reference to the four extra leaves. THE ARMS AND DEVICES FREELY INTRODUCED INTO THE DECORATION FORM A MOST INTERESTING SERIES. THEY INDICATE THAT THE MANUSCRIPT WAS EXECUTED FOR A MEMBER OF THE REIGNING FAMILY AT MILAN, AND VERY PROBABLY FOR VALENTINA VISCONTI, WIFE OF LOUIS, DUKE OF ORLEANS, AND MOTHER OF THE POET AND BIBLIOPHILE CHARLES, DUKE OF ORLEANS, WELL KNOWN FOR HIS CAPTIVITY IN ENGLAND AFTER AGINCOURT.

The principal achievement shows the arms of the French royal house impaling those of the Duchy of Milan and surmounted by a coronet. The French coat appears separately in three borders, and the Milanese shield is likewise thrice repeated, twice in the usual quarterly arrangement, and once in the variant form (with the viper coat and another of three eagles in pale placed side by side as an impalement) which may be seen in the Castello at Milan, the Certosa at Pavia, and elsewhere. This latter shield (which is shown in one of our illustrations) is surmounted by a crest of a tree. This is not one of those most commonly stated to have been used by the Visconti, but it was certainly associated with Gian Galeazzo, Valentina's father. It appears among other of his insignia in the borders of a missal in the Ambrosian Library at Milan, surrounding a miniature of his coronation, and in those of a Book of Hours belonging to him also preserved at Milan.

Another shield shows the well-known device of three fire-brands alight at the bottom and having pails of water hanging from the top, which was used by Galeazzo Visconti II and others.

Two devices are prominently repeated throughout the book: (1) A mound bearing on its base the well-known legend "*Mit Zeit*." This is usually associated with Lodovico Sforza (il Moro). The Sforzas adopted many devices which had been

previously used by the Visconti. We have not yet found a definite instance of the use of this one by the former family. (2) An argent dove on an azure shield, accompanied by the motto "A bon droit." This popular emblem appears to have been particularly affected by Gian Galeazzo Visconti. It occurs in the border of the missal mentioned above, and in that of an illuminated copy of his funeral oration at the Bibliothèque Nationale in Paris.

A pair of blue dragons twice repeated in the book are likewise Milanese emblems, used, like the others, by a variety of princely personages at different dates.

It is difficult to ascribe the ownership of a manuscript of this kind with certainty to a particular individual. Popular emblems and devices were used by various persons, not necessarily of the same family, at various times, and even armorial bearings, in a book intended for private use, may conceivably represent no more than some ephemeral family claim barely noticed in the records of the time. The history of this manuscript and its royal ownership would repay investigation more lengthy than falls within the scope of a sale catalogue. In the meantime, the ascription suggested satisfactorily meets the facts and carries at the least a very high degree of probability.

Valentina, it may be added, is known to have shared the tastes of her husband and of her son, both of whom possessed fine collections of manuscripts. A list of some of those which she brought with her to France from Italy is in existence.

* * * The ascription of the *Court of Sapience* ("a poem containing descriptions of animals, birds and fishes, with a survey of the arts and sciences."—*Gordon Duff, William Caxton*, p. 178) to Lydgate rests on the authority of Stephen Hawes, his pupil. It has been generally accepted, but Blades (*Life of Caxton*, 1863, vol. II, p. 115) throws doubt on it and examines the opinion of Ames that Caxton was the author. No modern edition has been published, and only eight copies, printed or manuscript, of the poem appear to exist. These are as follows: Caxton's edition, c. 1481, three copies only, all in public libraries; Wynkyn de Worde's reprint, 1510, one copy only (British Museum); a manuscript in the library of Trinity College, Cambridge (wants the Prologue and 42 stanzas at the end, besides other omissions); two manuscripts in the British Museum, Harl. 2251 (a fragment only, imperfect at beginning and end, and occupying only seven pages of the volume) and Addit. 29729 (written by John Stow and copied from Caxton's text); and the present manuscript. Caxton's text ended with the *Tractatus de fide*, but in this manuscript a *Tractatus de spe* of nine stanzas follows and is succeeded by the eight-line stanza quoted above.

According to the D.N.B. the poem consists of 2,282 lines, or 326 stanzas. This manuscript contains 321 stanzas (besides

the Epilogue) and wants two leaves, of which the first contained eight and the other nine stanzas, making a total of 338. The twelve extra stanzas appear to be the *Prohemium secundi libri* of three stanzas, beginning

Forth to procede in matter of my boke
and ending

O lady myne in boke myne will I preche.
and the nine stanzas of *Tractatus de spe*.

THIS MANUSCRIPT IS THUS THE SOLE AUTHORITY FOR THESE TWELVE STANZAS AND THE EIGHT-LINE EPILOGUE, a total of 92 lines, making 2,374 in all.

The three tracts contained in the second manuscript have also a connection with Caxton, as editions of each of them were printed by him or in his types. The first and last occurred (together with the *Rule of St. Benet*) in the *Book of Divers Ghostly Matters*, considered to be the last book printed by Caxton and never reprinted. The author of the *Profits of Tribulation* is unknown; Blades records two manuscripts of it, Harl. 1706 and Royal C. XVIII. The author of the *Horologium Sapientiae* is described by Vapereau as "Henri de Berg, dit Suso, en allemand *der Seuse*, appelé aussi frère *Henri-Amand* et *Jean de Sousaube* . . . né a Ueberlingen, près de Constance, le 21 mars 1300, mort à Ulm le 25 janvier 1366." Brunet calls him "Henri de Sews (ou plutôt . . . Jean de Sousaube ou Suabe, en latin *De Suso* ou a *Swebia*). His writings, according to Vapereau "où le mysticisme emprunte volontiers le langage de la passion d'amour, ne furent pas moins populaires que l'*Imitation*." In English, however, they are represented only by Caxton's edition of the *Horologium*, of which Blades records one manuscript only, at Caius College, Cambridge.

The third tract, *The Treatise of Love*, was printed by Wynkyn de Worde, probably in 1493, and is considered to be the last book printed by him in Caxton's types. Blades does not record any manuscript.

To sum up, the contents of the volume are as follows:—*The Court of Sapience*, 34 leaves (wants folios 1 and 30, quires bound in the order a, d, c, b, e and d3 misbound after d8); *The Twelve Profits of Tribulation*, 20 leaves (wants the first); *The Treatise of Love*, 30 leaves (wants folios 1 and 22), followed by three blank leaves; *The Seven Points of True Love*, 38 leaves (complete). The first two quires of the last tract are reversed, folio 1 following folio 16. On the original blank leaf at the end of this tract is a poem on Fortune of seven stanzas in ballad royal metre in a sixteenth century hand:

After the poem is written an alphabet of majuscules and minuscules, ending "Per me John Southerne Anno 1576." The presence of this poem in the same metre as *The Court of Sapience* at the end of the other manuscript suggests that the two were already bound together in 1576.
