It appears from a contemporary folio MS. of Waller's Poems with corrections in his autograph, now in the possession of Mr. Waller, of Beaconsfield, that the Epistle addressed here and in the other printed editions simply "To my Lady," and applying not to the volume, in which it is inserted, but to a MS. copy sent to the patroness, was designed for Lady Sophia Bertie, for in the MS. the superscription is: "To my Lady Sophia Bartee," to which is added in a contemporary hand, "the Earl of Linsey's daughter." The Lady Isabella mentioned by Waller was Lady Isabella Thynne.
