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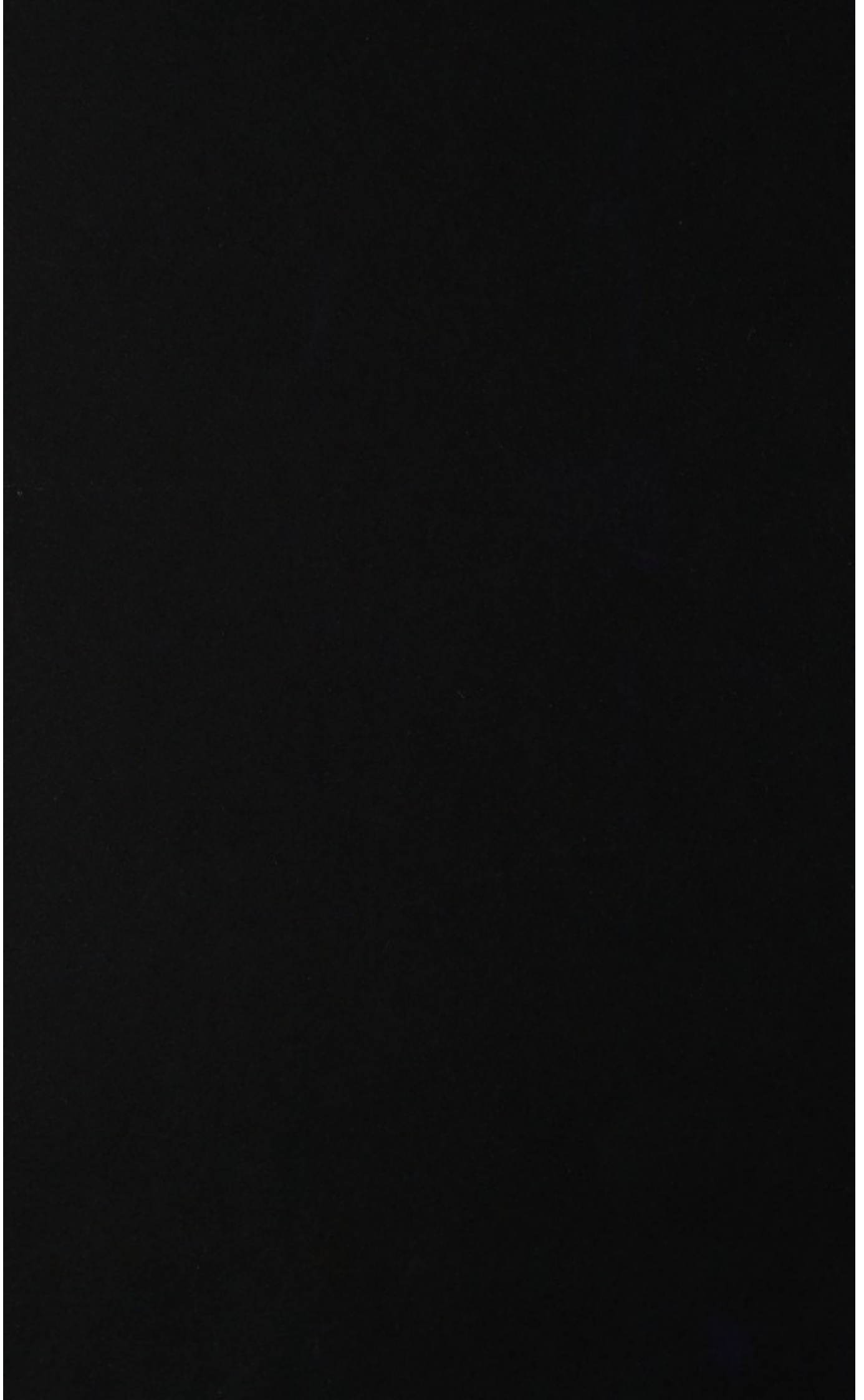

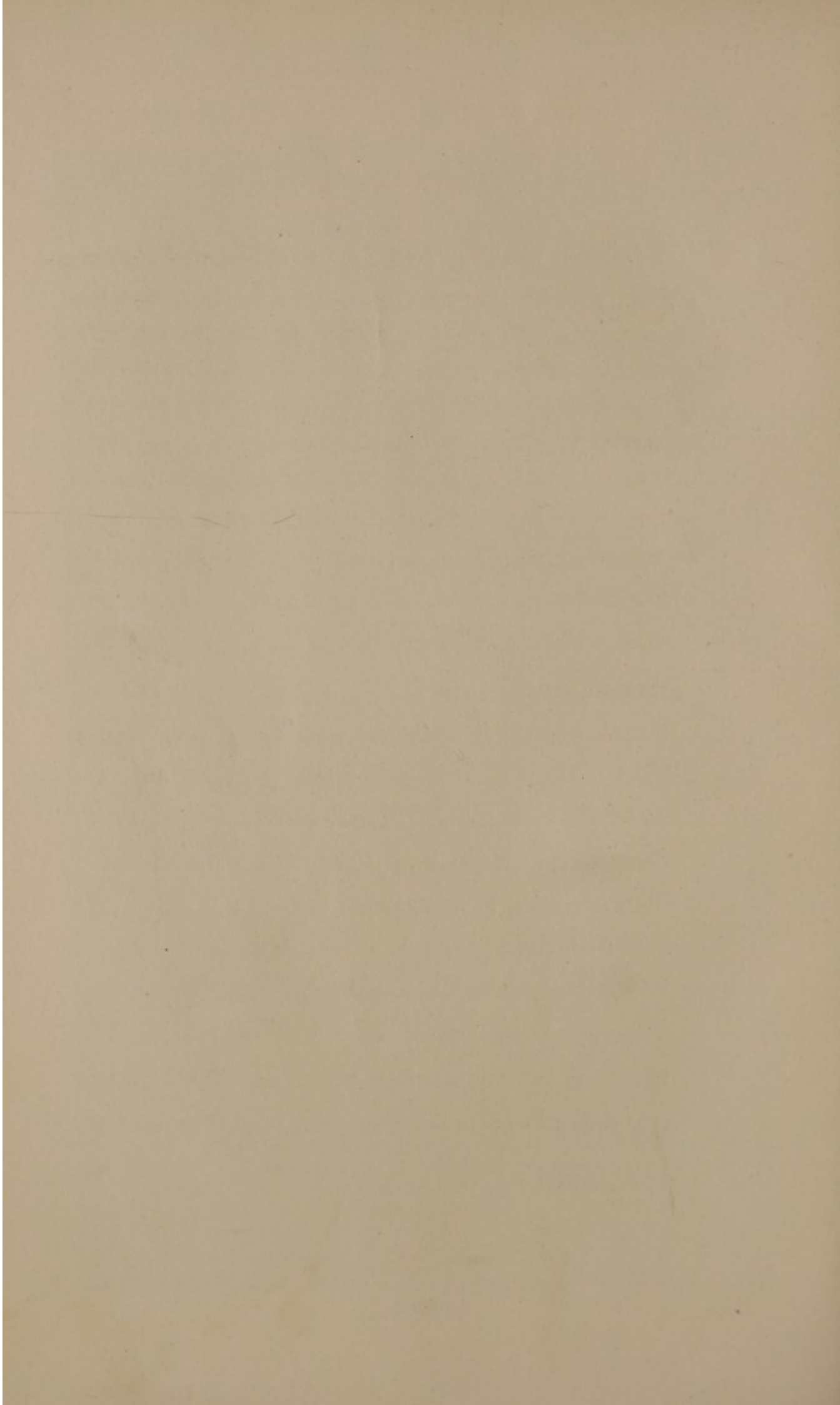

Sept. 17. Received the Poetry of Victor & Cazire. Charlotte offended & with reason as I think they have done very wrong in publishing what they have of her. The Diary is singularly reticent on the subject of the engagement, unless the many passages which were apparently obliterated shortly afterwards referred to it. And on Dec. 21st, 1809: "Louisa heard from Mr. Shelley who has heard that I am going to be married." There are other mentions of marriage in the Diary

Wilson in his elaborate study of Carlyle now in course of publication, and many important passages from them will be found in that work, but it is safe to say that at least five-sixths of this material has never been printed. A series of letters so completely illustrating the composition of a major literary work can hardly ever have been offered for sale.

The majority of the letters are accompanied by their original stamped envelopes, and are on 8vo or smaller paper unless otherwise described. The "notes" here catalogued differ only in length from the letters and are all written and signed by Carlyle. The whole collection is in excellent condition.

On this Earth, I believe, there is nowhere so intense a blockhead, so fatal to himself and mankind, as your learned College one who never dreams but he is a prophet and shining light." (7)
