* * * Perez de Oliva, the author of this and the following MS. was born in 1492. He became a Professor at the Universities of Salamanca and of Paris; he came under the favourable notice of the Emperor Charles V and was appointed by him instructor to Philip II. He died shortly afterwards in 1530. A number of his works were printed by his famous nephew, Ambrosio de Morales in 1586 at Cordova. From a note at the end of the second MS. it was presumably intended that these two historical works should also be printed, and it seems probable that these two MSS. were the fair copies which Morales had made for the Printers; when from some unknown reason the publication was made impossible.

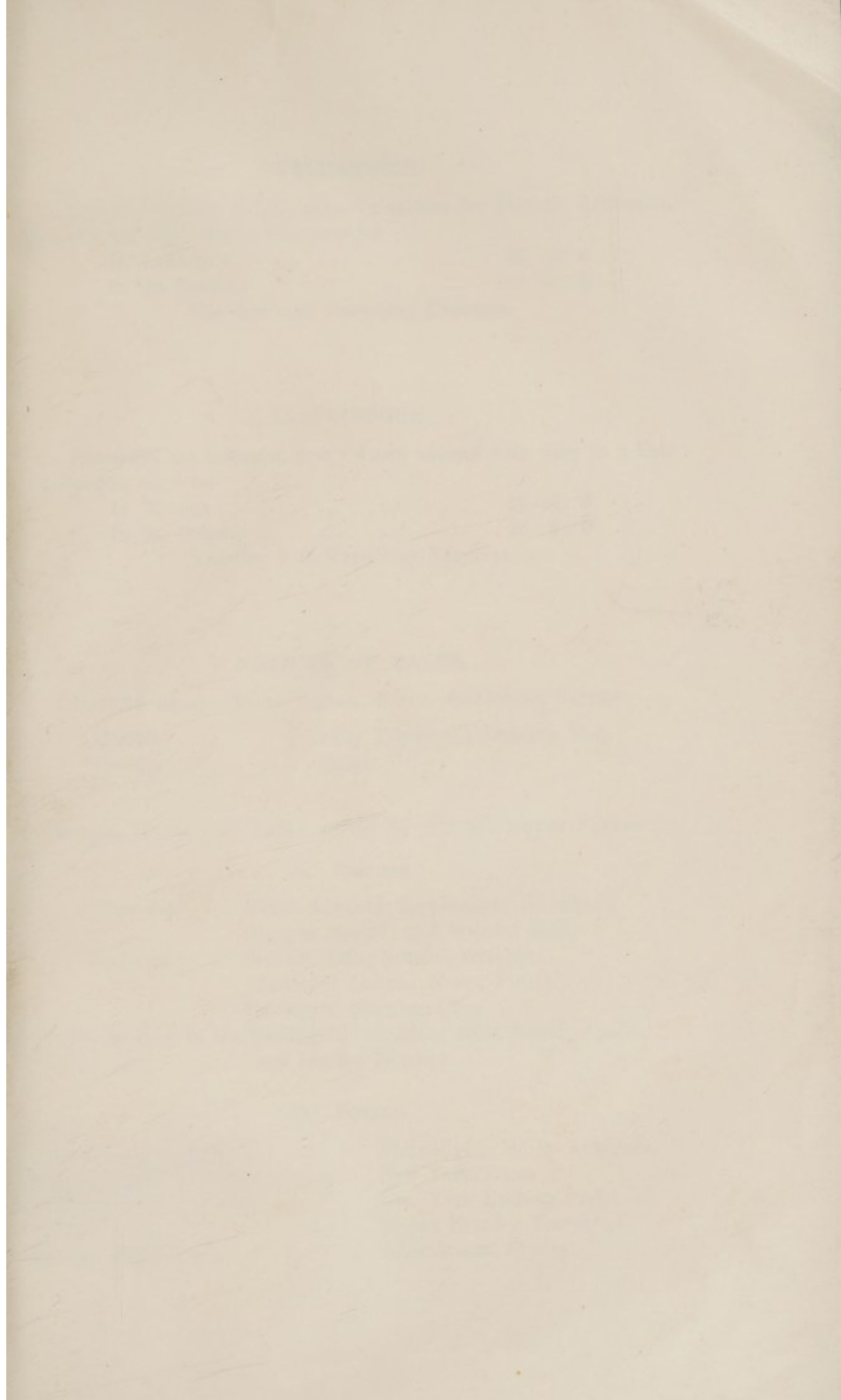
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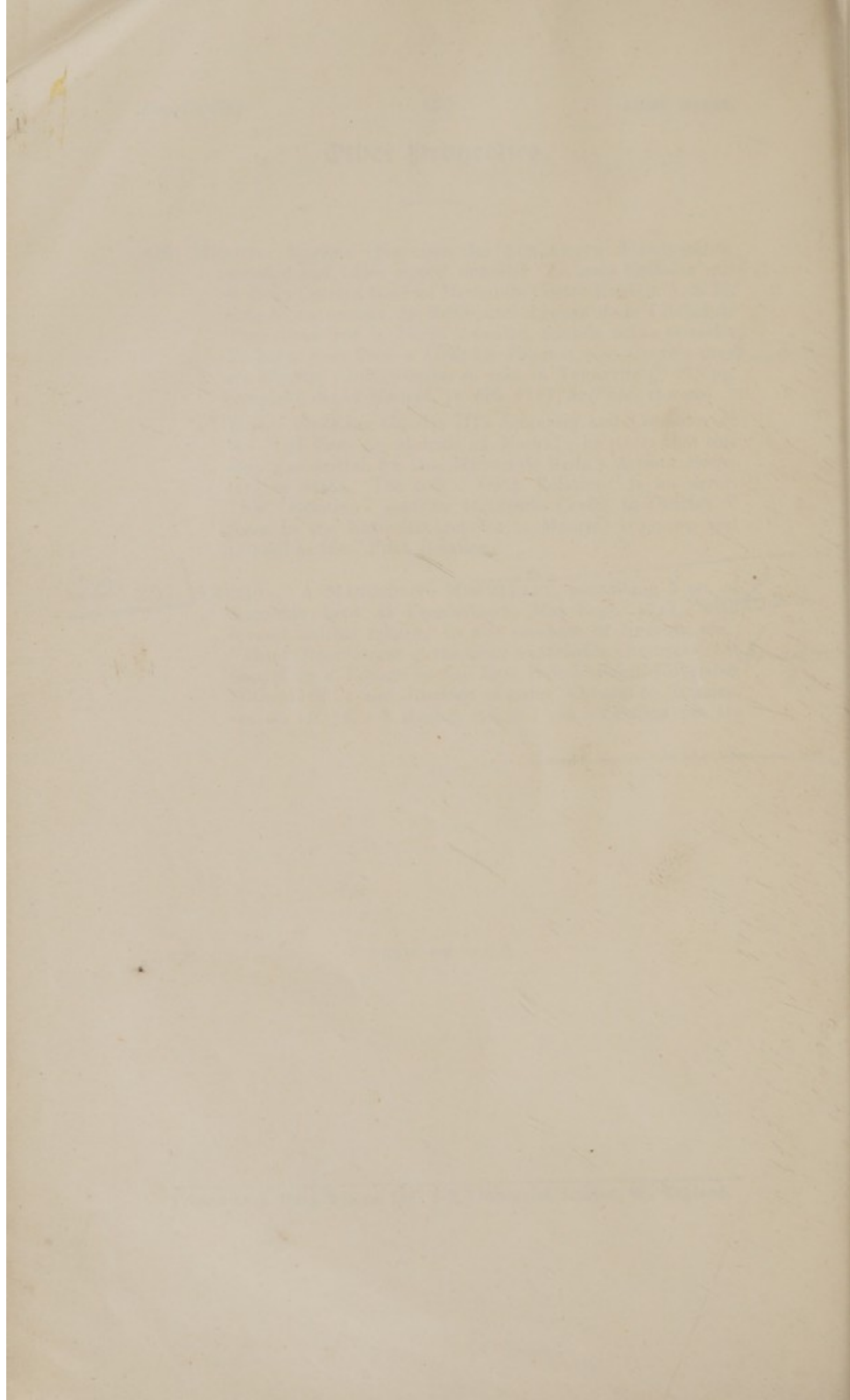
