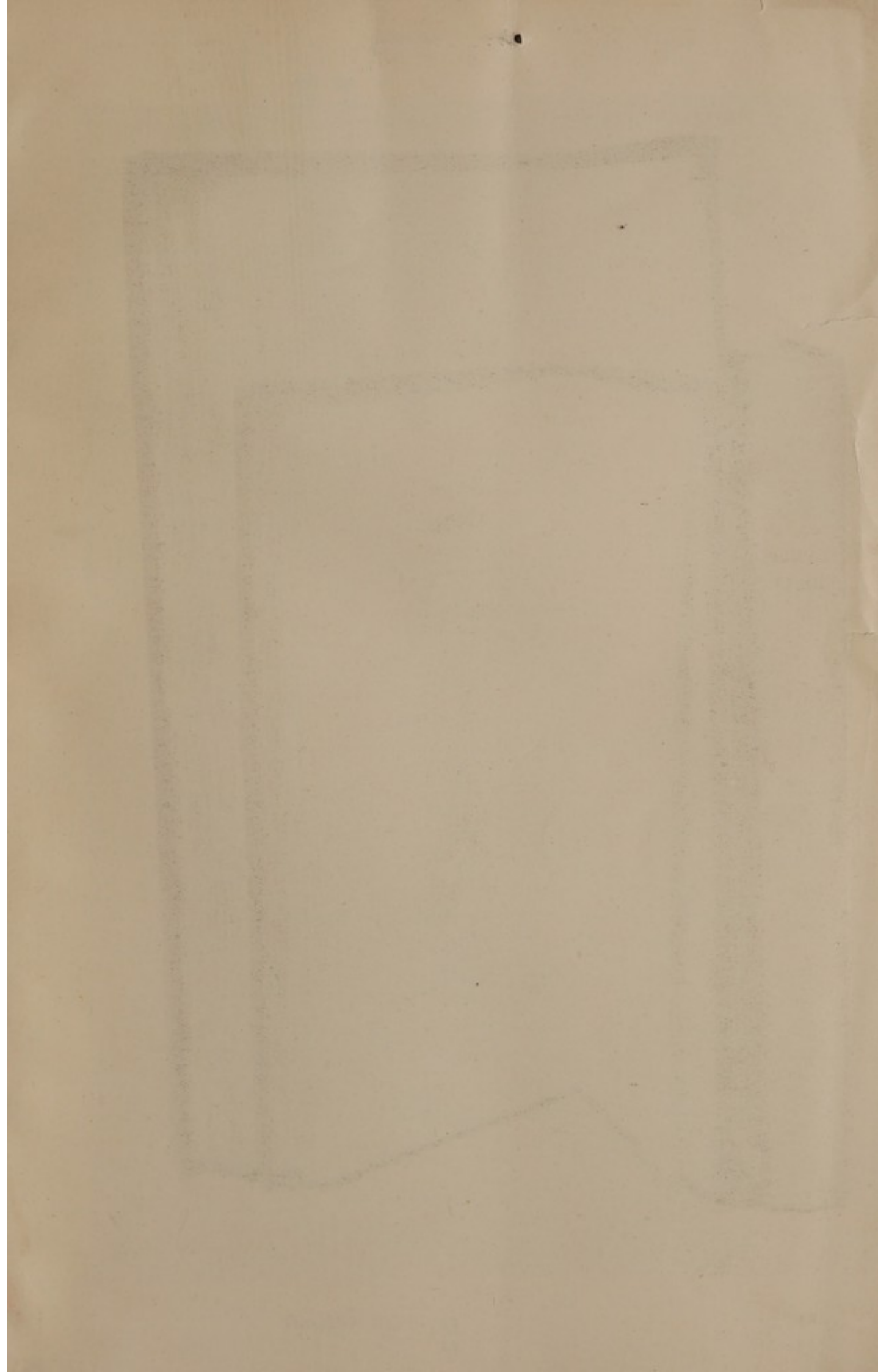

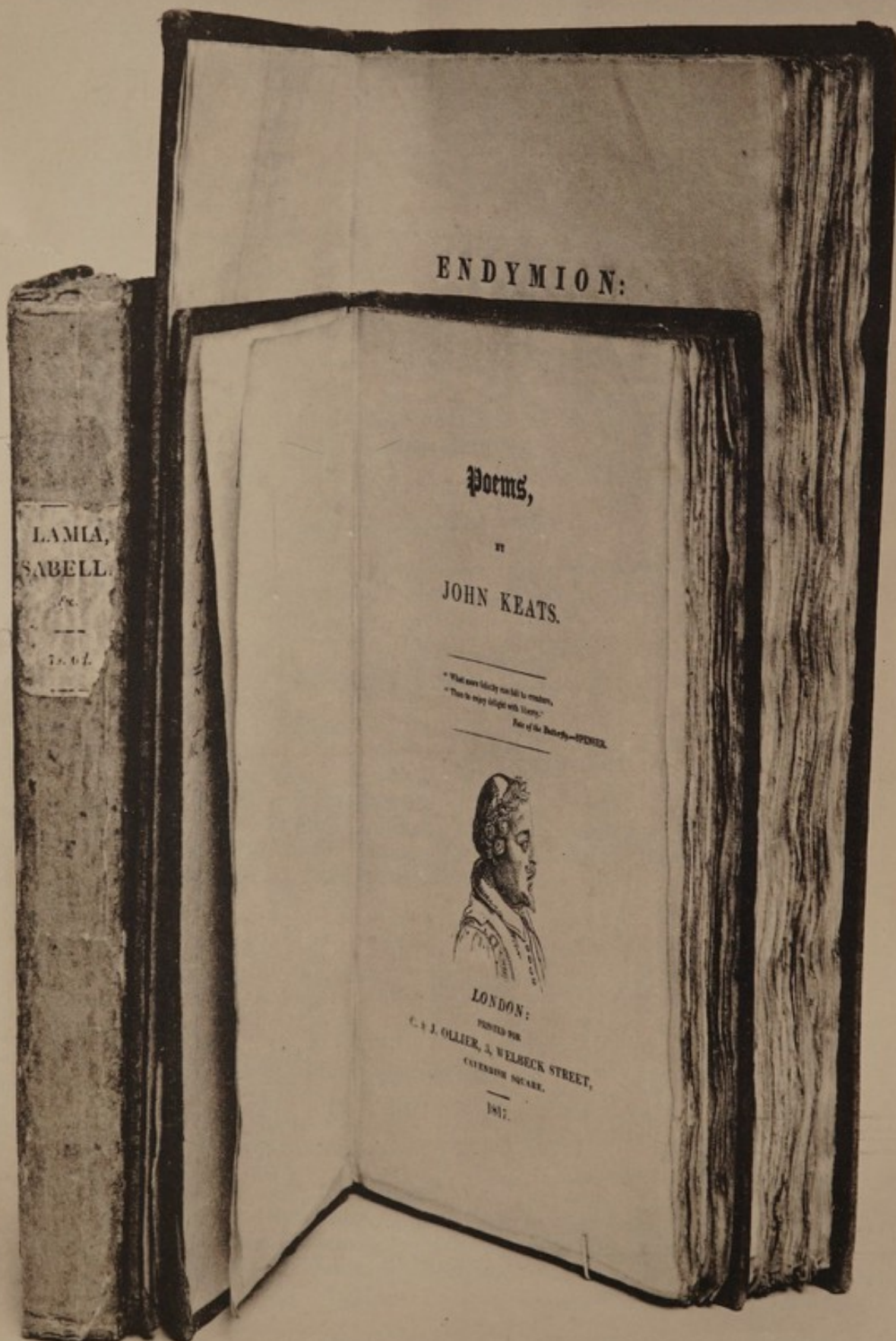

- II. No person to advance less than 1s.; above five pounds 2s. 6d.; and so on in proportion.
- III. All lots are sold subject to the right of the seller or his agent to bid, or else to impose a reserve.
- IV. The purchasers to give in their names and places of abode, and, if required, to pay down 10s. in the pound in part payment of the purchase-money, in default of which the lot or lots purchased to be immediately put up again and re-sold.

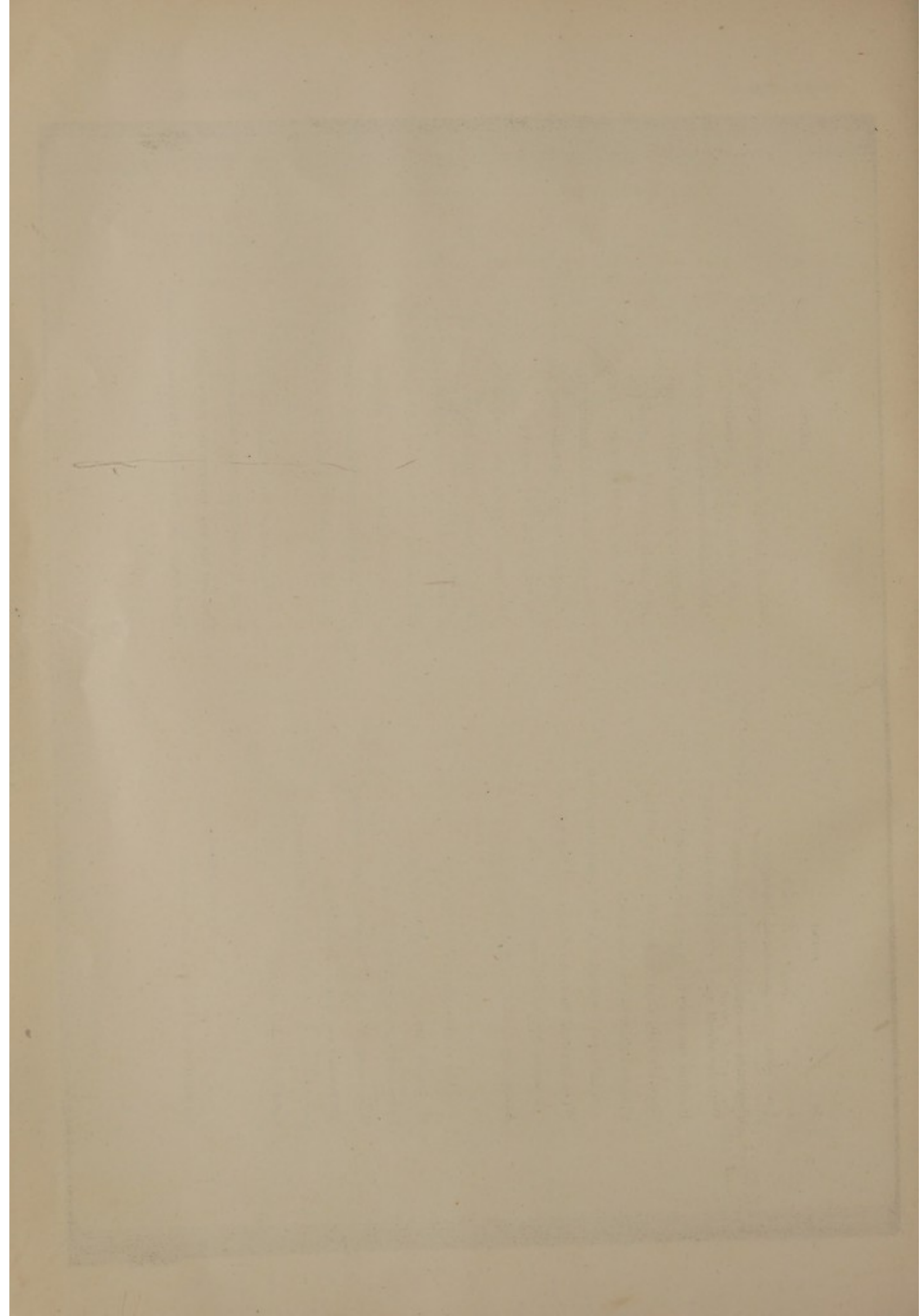

The dealings between Dickens and Thomas Tegg, in regard to the proposal that the former should write "Serjeant Bell," have always been something of a mystery, the more so as of the original correspondence only one letter appears up to the present to have come to light, namely, that communicated to "Notes and Queries" (V iii, 366, 1875), by William Tegg, son of the publisher, and subsequently reprinted elsewhere. This letter, dated "Wednesday morning," obviously intervenes between the first and second of those now offered. In it Dickens already drops the address in the third person, writing "Dear Sir," and puts forward a proposal that he should be paid £120 for the book, adding that he would be prepared to produce the whole by Christmas and that he agrees with his correspondent in not wishing

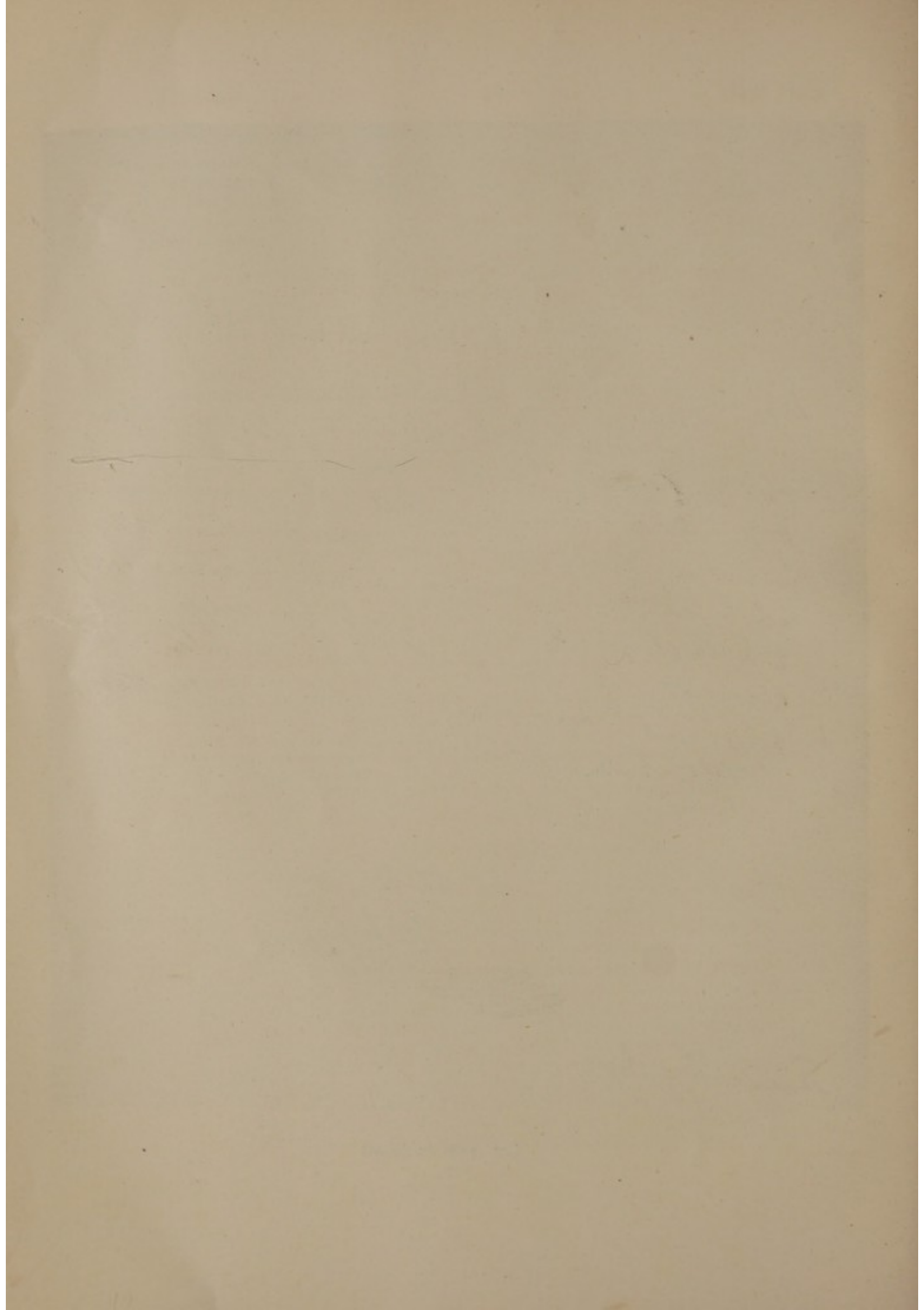

the name of "Boz" to be appended to the work. In publishing this letter, William Tegg added notes to the effect that his father had first communicated with Dickens upon his own suggestion after reading some of Dickens' work, and that "the terms were agreed upon and accepted, but for some reason it fell through." The original letter, which later became the property of the late Mr. J. F. Dexter, is stated to have had written upon it in William Tegg's handwriting, a note that the amount offered and accepted was £100. This statement, the second of the present two letters for the first time proves to be a fact.

The book eventually appeared with the date 1839, and even if this be taken to imply publication about Christmas, 1838, this is a full two years later than the date originally contemplated. Moreover, the book as it stands contains no suggestion of Dickens' authorship, invaluable though this would have been by that time to its prospects of sale. In view of these facts, and of William Tegg's statement quoted above, it became fairly generally accepted that Dickens did not after all have any part in the book. The tradition, however, that he had written at any rate portions of it died hard, and a serious attempt to establish it was made by Mr. R. H. Shepherd, author of the "Bibliography of Dickens," 1880. Mr. Shepherd, who in his bibliography had accepted the current view, wrote in 1887 an article (published in Walford's "Antiquarian Magazine and Bibliographer," July, 1887, and subsequently in "The Gentleman's Magazine," 1889) for the purpose of recanting his previous opinion, and upholding the opposite view. This he does principally upon considerations of style, though he also endeavours to answer the argument that had the book been by Dickens it would hardly at that period have been published without his name, by pointing out that according to the letter of Wednesday morning Thomas Tegg had for some reason expressed a particular wish that it should not be published as by "Boz." On this point the first of the letters now offered shows that, so far as Dickens himself was concerned, he was prepared to consider disclosing the "Boz" authorship.

The uncle of the present owner, from whom the letters have been inherited, acted as Thomas Tegg's legal adviser and executor.

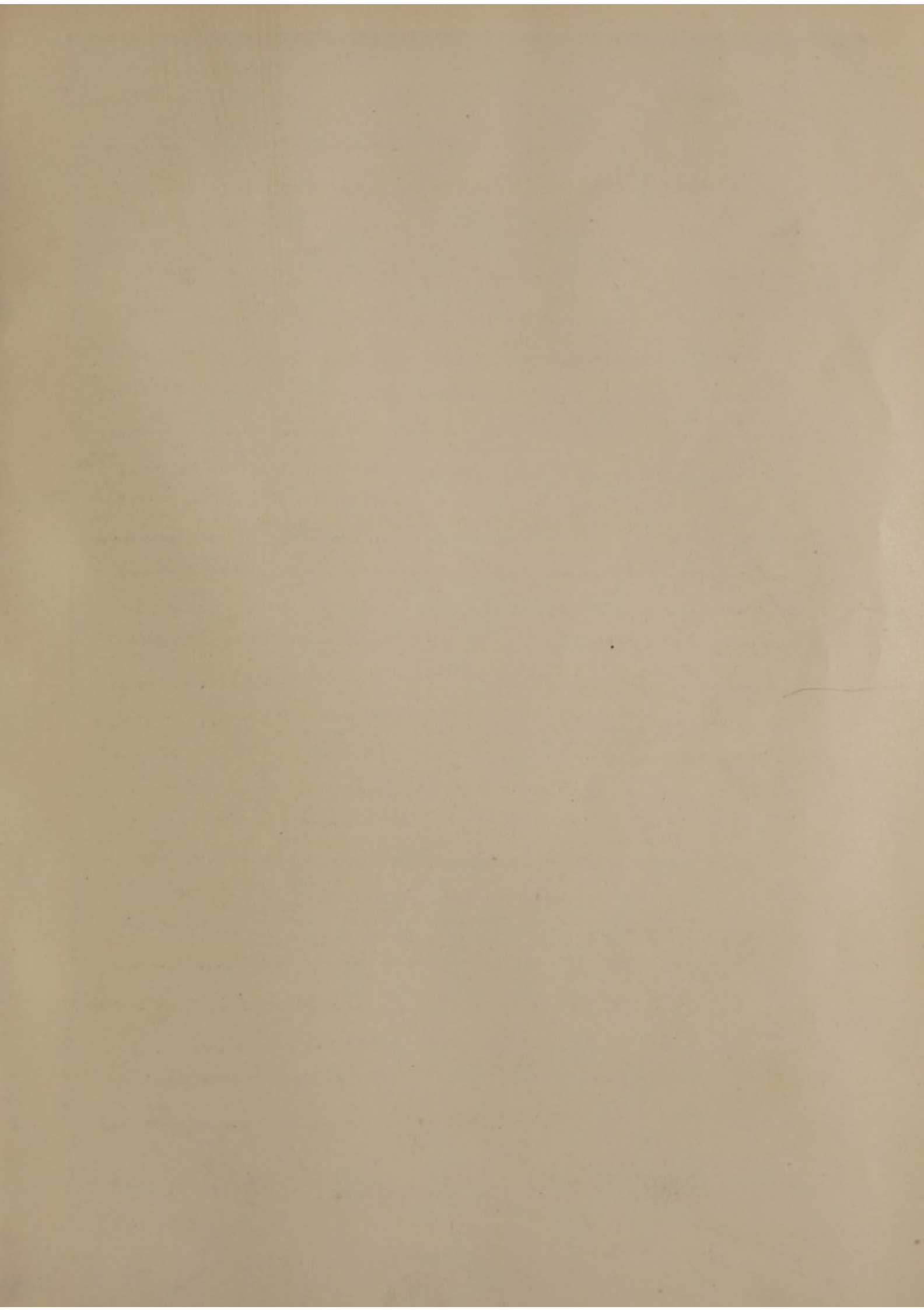

EDITOR OF THE "CULLODEN PAPERS,"

and now the Property of his Great Grandson.

This remarkable collection of upwards of 1900 Letters and Papers of the Forbes family of Culloden, in the 17th and 18th Centuries. Duncan Forbes, genealogist, 1644-1704, represented Nairnshire in the Convention of 1678 and 1681-2, Invernessshire in the Convention of 1689, and in the Parliament of 1689-1702, and Nairnshire from 1702 until his death in 1704. He was among the most active of those Patriots who in Scotland contributed to bring about the expulsion of James II. The year after the revolution his estates were ravaged by the Jacobite hordes of Buchan and Cannon and damaged to the extent of about £4,500. The Scotch Parliament met his claim for compensation by voting him a perpetual grant of a liberty to distil into spirits the grain of the barony of Ferintosh upon his paying a small specific composition in lieu of excise. He was succeeded by his son John, M.P. for Nairnshire, who died without issue in 1734. He was succeeded by his brother Duncan, Lord President of the Court of Sessions and Lord Advocate. In the '45 Rebellion, Forbes endeavoured to detach Lovat from the Pretender's cause. In the collection will be found a large number of interesting letters from Lovat which throw a strong light upon his duplicity. Many important documents relating to the affairs of Aberdeen and Inverness are included, and mention must be made of a fine Auto. Poem from Allan Ramsay, together with numerous letters of the leading figures in Scottish history of this period

The "Catholicon" is an etymological encyclopaedia, preceded by a treatise on grammar. The latter is imperfect in this copy, having only 24 out of 64 leaves, but the encyclopaedia is complete from Aalma to Zozimus. The missing leaf at the end contained only the last eight lines of the Register. The author was a Dominican monk of the 13th Century, and no less than 24 editions of his work were printed before 1501.

Of this the original edition De Ricci records eight copies on vellum besides the Solar-Crawford copy which he places among the "Exemplaires disparus." Of these eight two besides the present example are incomplete; the other five are respectively in the British Museum, the Bibliothèque Nationale, the Staatsbibliothek at Munich, the Hofbibliothek at Aschaffenburg, and the Hospital of St. Nicholas at Berncastel-Cues. The two imperfect copies are in the Municipal Library at Besançon and the State Library at Dresden.

Apart from the missing leaves a SOUND AND DESIRABLE COPY OF THE FIRST BOOK PRINTED FOR THE GENERAL READER.

** AN EXTREMELY INTERESTING PAIR OF LETTERS, forming part of one of Dickens' earliest negotiations with a publisher.

The dealings between Dickens and Thomas Tegg, in regard to the proposal that the former should write "Serjeant Bell," have always been something of a mystery, the more so as of the original correspondence only one letter appears up to the present to have come to light, namely, that communicated to "Notes and Queries" (V iii, 366, 1875), by William Tegg, son of the publisher, and subsequently reprinted elsewhere. This letter, dated "Wednesday morning," obviously intervenes between the first and second of those now offered. In it Dickens already drops the address in the third person, writing "Dear Sir," and puts forward a proposal that he should be paid £120 for the book, adding that he would be prepared to produce the whole by Christmas and that he agrees with his correspondent in not wishing

the name of "Boz" to be appended to the work. In publishing this letter, William Tegg added notes to the effect that his father had first communicated with Dickens upon his own suggestion after reading some of Dickens' work, and that "the terms were agreed upon and accepted, but for some reason it fell through." The original letter, which later became the property of the late Mr. J. F. Dexter, is stated to have had written upon it in William Tegg's handwriting, a note that the amount offered and accepted was £100. This statement, the second of the present two letters for the first time proves to be a fact.

The book eventually appeared with the date 1839, and even if this be taken to imply publication about Christmas, 1838, this is a full two years later than the date originally contemplated. Moreover, the book as it stands contains no suggestion of Dickens' authorship, invaluable though this would have been by that time to its prospects of sale. In view of these facts, and of William Tegg's statement quoted above, it became fairly generally accepted that Dickens did not after all have any part in the book. The tradition, however, that he had written at any rate portions of it died hard, and a serious attempt to establish it was made by Mr. R. H. Shepherd, author of the "Bibliography of Dickens," 1880. Mr. Shepherd, who in his bibliography had accepted the current view, wrote in 1887 an article (published in Walford's "Antiquarian Magazine and Bibliographer," July, 1887, and subsequently in "The Gentleman's Magazine," 1889) for the purpose of recanting his previous opinion, and upholding the opposite view. This he does principally upon considerations of style, though he also endeavours to answer the argument that had the book been by Dickens it would hardly at that period have been published without his name, by pointing out that according to the letter of Wednesday morning Thomas Tegg had for some reason expressed a particular wish that it should not be published as by "Boz." On this point the first of the letters now offered shows that, so far as Dickens himself was concerned, he was prepared to consider disclosing the "Boz" authorship.

The uncle of the present owner, from whom the letters have been inherited, acted as Thomas Tegg's legal adviser and executor.

This remarkable collection of upwards of 1900 Letters and Papers of the Forbes family of Culloden, in the 17th and 18th Centuries. Duncan Forbes, genealogist, 1644-1704, represented Nairnshire in the Convention of 1678 and 1681-2, Invernessshire in the Convention of 1689, and in the Parliament of 1689-1702, and Nairnshire from 1702 until his death in 1704. He was among the most active of those Patriots who in Scotland contributed to bring about the expulsion of James II. The year after the revolution his estates were ravaged by the Jacobite hordes of Buchan and Cannon and damaged to the extent of about £4,500. The Scotch Parliament met his claim for compensation by voting him a perpetual grant of a liberty to distil into spirits the grain of the barony of Ferintosh upon his paying a small specific composition in lieu of excise. He was succeeded by his son John, M.P. for Nairnshire, who died without issue in 1734. He was succeeded by his brother Duncan, Lord President of the Court of Sessions and Lord Advocate. In the '45 Rebellion, Forbes endeavoured to detach Lovat from the Pretender's cause. In the collection will be found a large number of interesting letters from Lovat which throw a strong light upon his duplicity. 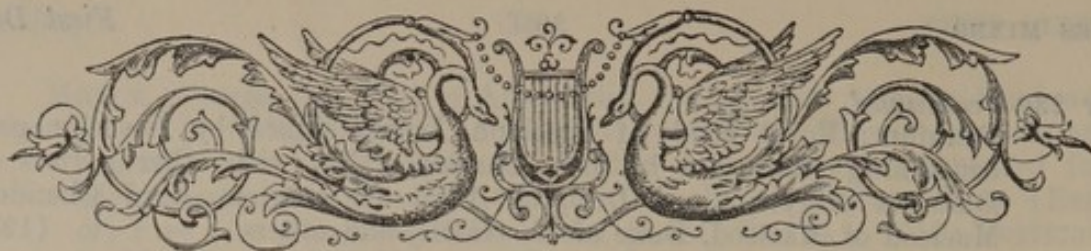

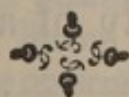

The "Catholicon" is an etymological encyclopaedia, preceded by a treatise on grammar. The latter is imperfect in this copy, having only 24 out of 64 leaves, but the encyclopaedia is complete from Aalma to Zozimus. The missing leaf at the end contained only the last eight lines of the Register. The author was a Dominican monk of the 13th Century, and no less than 24 editions of his work were printed before 1501.

Of this the original edition De Ricci records eight copies on vellum besides the Solar-Crawford copy which he places among the "Exemplaires disparus." Of these eight two besides the present example are incomplete; the other five are respectively in the British Museum, the Bibliothèque Nationale, the Staatsbibliothek at Munich, the Hofbibliothek at Aschaffenburg, and the Hospital of St. Nicholas at Berncastel-Cues. The two imperfect copies are in the Municipal Library at Besançon and the State Library at Dresden.
