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
THE HOOD COLLECTION OF EGYPTIAN ANTIQUITIES.

THE Hood Collection of Egyptian Antiquities has long been known by name to scholars but very few ever had the privilege of seeing it when it was housed at Nettleham Hall in Lincolnshire. It was formed by the Revd. W. Frankland Hood during visits to Egypt which extended over some ten years, from 1851 to 1861. Mr. Hood had gone out to the Nile Valley for reasons of health, and though he spent much of his time at Thebes, he never did any digging there on his own account. When not on his own dahabiyeh on the river, he resided on the necropolis in the house of Mustapha Aga at Qurneh, the house that was afterwards famous because it so often sheltered that charming woman Lady Duff Gordon, who is still remembered by the older natives at Luxor. Mr. Hood had exceptional opportunities in those days for collecting. The natives were plundering the ancient cemetery from north to south and selling the antiquities they found at a small price. In 1857 the Frenchman Mariette arrived at Thebes, and shortly afterwards had many hundred men at work excavating. Most of the specimens in the Hood Collection appear to have been discovered at Thebes. The only object that has so far been published, and that not wholly, is the famous papyrus which bears the name of Hood. Yet there are several specimens in the collection of the first importance. The roll of papyrus, No. 135A, has never been entirely unrolled, yet it contains a hymn of which, so far as I am aware, no other copy exists. The beautiful portrait of King Iuput is the only one of that monarch known, and it is not even referred to in any of the histories of Egypt. The Head of Queen Hatshepsut in black granite is equally unknown to students, and so also is the fine arragonite vase of Amenhotep II. This latter specimen was very probably stolen from the King's tomb in ancient times, and hidden somewhere at Thebes until; in the middle of last century, it was discovered by a native who sold it to Mr. Hood. The pair of sandals made of strips of the leaves of the date-palm are the most perfect examples of the kind that I have ever seen, and they are at least a thousand years older than the famous pair which inspired Sir Edwin Arnold to write his charming little poem, "To a pair of Egyptian Slippers," printed in Potiphar's Wife and other Poems. Collectors of amulets will find some beautifully cut specimens in this collection.



THE HOOD PAPYRUS. This celebrated Papyrus was acquired by Mr. Hood at Thebes in 1859. A copy was then made of it by Miss Harris, the daughter of the British Consul in Egypt. Of this copy Dr. Eisenlohr made a rough draft which he sent to Dr. Pleijte at Leyden, who published it in his Over drie Handschriften op Papyrus bekend onder de titels van Papyrus du Lac Moeris, du Fayoum, et du Labyrinth, Amsterdam, 1884. Several pieces of the Hood Papyrus were however omitted by Pleijte, and the Papyrus as a whole has not yet been published in facsimile. The document is of Ptolemaic date and is written in a very clear hand on papyrus of light colour and fine texture. It measures 8 ft. 2 in. in length by 111 in. high. The text is of geographical import, and is illustrated with vignettes of deities who presided over the chief towns of Egypt. Portions of the same Papyrus are preserved in the Cairo Museum and at Vienna. Fragments belonging to it, or to a document of a similar nature, were found in the collection of the late Lord Amherst of Hackney. Besides Pleijte's publication a fragment of the Hood Papyrus has been published by Cope Whitehouse, in Leemann's volume, Etudes archéologique . . . dédiées à Mr. le Dr. Leemanns. PLV.


