"Painter's reading was exceptionally wide, and he practically first made the Italian novelists known to English readers. The work was very widely read by Elizabethan Englishmen. But it is as the mine whence the Elizabethan dramatists drew the plots of their plays or poems that Painter's work presents itself in the most interesting aspect. He became acquainted with her through his father having managed the Abercorn Estates. Their friendship was constant and only ended by the death of her Ladyship in 1827. He consistently consulted her on his literary and official engagements and claimed from her a patronage which was always readily granted. He sent to her the ballads, chiefly copied in his own hand, which he so industriously gathered together with news of all that happened, whether he was living at Edinburgh, Ashestiel, London or Abbotsford.

To give a just idea of the value of this voluminous correspondence by mere extracts is quite impossible. Certain of the letters are printed in "Familiar Letters of Sir Walter Scott," edited by D. Douglas, 2 vol. 8vo, 1894, BUT ABOUT THIRTY REMAIN UNPUBLISHED.

The following paragraphs from a letter dated *8th January, 1813*, giving Scott's opinion of Lord Byron's powers, must serve as a small specimen of their entrancing interest.

"You ask me, dear Lady Abercorn, how I like Lord Byron's poem, and I

answer, Very much. There is more original strength and force of thinking in it, as well as command of language and versification, than in almost any modern poem of the same length that I have happened to meet with. It is really a powerful poem, the more powerful because it arrests the attention without the aid of narrative, and without the least apparent wish to conciliate the favour of the reader, but rather an affectation of the contrary. A say an *affectation* to the contrary, because I should be sorry to think that a young man of Lord Byron's powers should really and unaffectedly entertain and encourage a contempt for all sublunary comforts and enjoyments. . . . This tinge of discontent, or perhaps one may almost say misanthropy, is the only objection I have to Lord B's very powerful and original work. . . . By the way, there is a report Childe Harold is to be married to an heiress of our northern clime."
